Carpenters Work Completed and Decorations are to be Put Up Soon

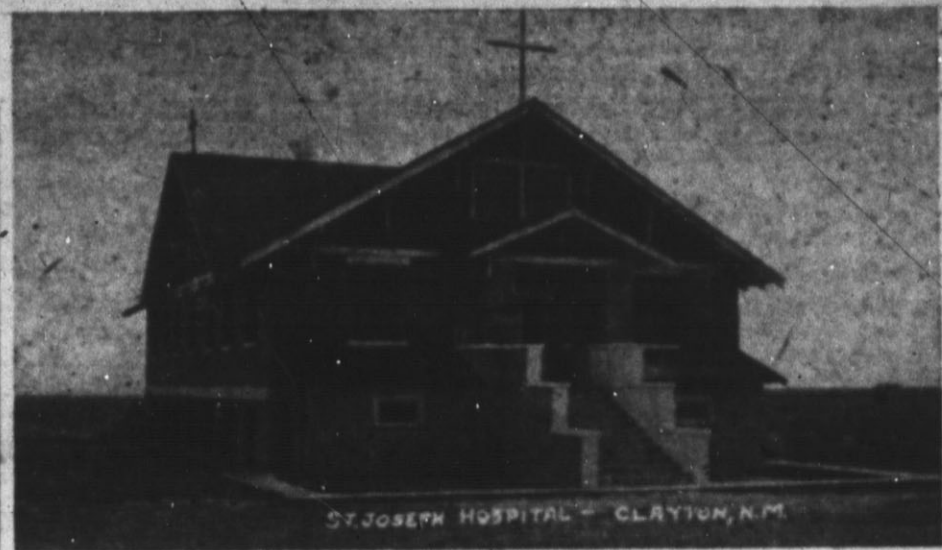
The merchants of Hereford have again rallied to the support of the Hereford Poultry Show, to be given in the Stock Pavilion on January 3-4-5, 1930. A. L. Biggs, vice-president, canvassed the business houses this week and 125 merchandise prizes have been offered for various winners, as shown in the list below. This is the finest list of special prizes ever offered here.

The construction work in the sales barn has been completed and the coops set ready for the show. An additional number of coops have been ordered from Amarillo to fill out the required number necessary. A committee composed of Messdames E. W. Kinney, A. L. Biggs and N. C. Vogele have been appointed to decorate the interior just a few days before the show, a large sign is being painted to go above the door, and a number of business men will have special signs to cover the bare walls. TWO HUGE FARM SALES BILLED NEXT WEEK

SCADS OF FINE STOCK AND MACHINERY OFFERED ON BLOCK

The improvement tax of 20c on the \$100.00 now being levied, if continued during 1930 and 1931 will take care of a hospital bond issue and also take care of the county debt. A reduction of the improvement tax to 15c on the \$100.00 levied for the years 1928, 1927 and 1928 will continue to take care of the hospital bond issue and the outstanding county debt. In 1929 the last court house warrant will be paid leaving only the hospital warrants chargeable against this improvement fund and the tax can then be reduced to 5c on the \$100.00.

Big Cave in New Mexico; Carlsbad Cavern Famous

Carlsbad Cavern is an immense cave in New Mexico that shows unusual beauty and a great variety of natural features. It is in the eastern foothills of the Guadalupe Mountains, about ten miles north of the Texas line and twenty two miles southwest of Carlsbad, the principal town in southeastern New Mexico.

The cavern is said to have been discovered in 1901 by J. L. White and Big Long, whose attention was drawn to it by the great number of bats they saw coming out of a hole in the side of a small valley. They entered the hole and found a cave containing large deposits of bat guano. These deposits

were worked for several years.

Mr. White has recently explored several miles of the chambers of the cavern. About half a mile from the opening from which the bats were seen coming the cavern becomes phenomenally large and spectacular. About three miles of its hallways and chambers, including its most ornate parts, were surveyed in the spring of 1923 by Robert A. Holley, of the General Land Office. In September, 1923, the cavern was visited by Willis T. Lee, a geologist of the Department of the Interior, who spent three days in examining and photographing it. On Mr. Lee's return from New Mexico the National Park Service recommended that the cavern should be made a national monument, and a proclamation setting it apart as recommended was issued by

the President October 25, 1923.

Cavern Not Yet Fully Explored
 No part of the cavern has yet been fully explored, but enough is known of it to show that it will rank high among the famous caverns of the world. Visitors to it who say that they are familiar with the other great caverns assert that some of its chambers surpass in size any others yet discovered. One room is more than half a mile long and several hundred feet wide, and its ceiling is so high that torch lights failed to illuminate it.

The floor of the cavern is 170 feet below the entrance, which was formed by the fall of a small part of the roof. In a distance of less than two miles from this point the floor descends about 500 feet, yet the bottom of the cavern lies still deeper, for Mr. White has found chambers and hallways 200

feet lower. The depths of the cavern therefore lie at least a thousand feet vertically below the entrance.

The geologic conditions in the vicinity of Carlsbad Cavern are unusual. The limestone in which the cavern has been carved is about 1,300 feet thick and is underlain by an equally thick series of beds of soft red shale and sandstone that include thick beds of gypsum and rock salt. The occurrence of these easily soluble limestone may have produced a cavernous condition of the rocks that will show spectacular results.

One of the worst snow storms and blizzards which has visited this country in the past several years, arrived during the early part of Sunday night and raged all day Monday and the greater part of Tuesday. The raging wind drove the powdery snow through even the smallest cracks, and tight indeed was the roof or building which was not invaded by these snowy atoms. Some poultry houses were almost completely filled from floor to roof, completely burying the occupants and the lives of the fowls were saved only by the owners resurrecting them with shovels from their snow graves and carrying them to places of better protection. In some places the snow was drifted to the tops of the trees in the small orchards and in town the drifts reached to the eaves of some of the buildings.

It is possible to reason this out for the best as it will help to lessen the over acreage of that cereal, and thus leaving a better demand for what shall be raised, and may also be the means of causing many of the farmers to plant a part of their land to cotton and thus assist in developing these plains as a cotton country. Why not so consider it anyway?

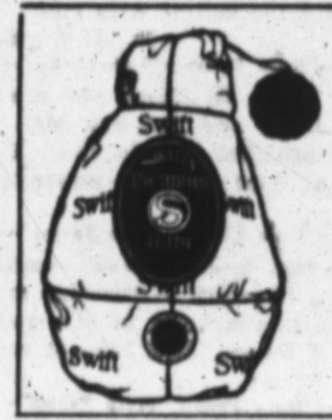
