

Building recalls area history

In the days when the XIT Ranch sprawled over three million acres of the Panhandle, the cattle operation was run from a modest building that looked more like a home than an office building.

Even though the ranch has faded into history, the building remains in the same location in Channing, a silent reminder of a day when cattle ruled the economy of the western Panhandle of Texas.

The community of Channing, with fewer than 300 residents, is not what it used to be, either. At the turn of the century, when the XIT flourished, trains brought new settlers to the Panhandle and many of them embarked on their new life from the Hartley County town, a business and banking hub in the area.

The XIT -- said at one time to be the largest ranch in the world to be enclosed by barbed wire -- stretched from the northern tip of the Panhandle southward, through large areas of Dallam, Hartley, Oldham, Deaf Smith and Garza Counties and smaller acreages in Castro, Bailey, Lamb and Hockley Counties.

In the western half of Deaf Smith County were the Mojares and Escarbada Pastures.

While the working cowboys were spread out tending cattle, repairing windmills, building barbed wire fences and performing the everyday tasks of ranching, the pulse of the

business was in the pink brick building in Channing.

The headquarters now is owned by a couple, who came to Texas by way of Kansas and Tennessee, Bill and Patricia Kirkeminde. They bought the structure in 1982 even though they still lived in Tennessee where he had a veterinary practice.

A couple of years later, he retired and they moved to Channing where they bought a house that once belonged to a Tascosa saloonkeeper. They had to re-do the house before they could start on the XIT building.

In 1986, they began the task that may not have seemed as daunting as it turned out to be.

The Kirkemindes are restoring the building, not redecorating or remodeling, but restoring, to the best of their ability. A history buff, Pat Kirkeminde did extensive research about the building before they ever started.

One of the first items about the house that Pat Kirkeminde discovered was that a Texas Historical Committee medallion on the building is wrong.

"It says it was built in 1890, but it really was in 1898 and 1899," she said.

The XIT Headquarters was typical of the day. There were high ceilings with decorative tin panels, richly stained wood door and window frames, coal-burning fireplaces outlined with decorative ceramic tile.

But, it took a while to find all the pearls of the building. Through years of misuse and abuse, mostly because it had been converted to a home at some time in the past, half the ceiling in the large room was missing. The wood was dirty, much painted. Tiles were missing from the fireplaces.

Some items that had been removed from the building were irreplaceable.

The ceiling panels, for instance, would cost the proverbial small fortune to be replicated in tin.

Kirkeminde proved the old adage that "necessity is the mother of invention," though. He resorted to fiberglass.

"I took down the tin panels and made patterns of them and made molds," he explained.

By the time he finished the job, he had made approximately 130 panels in nine patterns and several different sizes.

The fiberglass panels are virtually

the only substitution the Kirkemindes have used in the building as they have tried to remain true to the 1890s. It's next to impossible to tell which are originals and which are fiberglass.

Previous owners of the building had, for some reason, discarded some hinges from doors. The intricately engraved new hinges were replicated from one Kirkeminde sent to a craftsman.

Many hours of hard labor went

into stripping and refinishing woodwork in the house.

The Kirkemindes don't know what kind of wood they knew the walnut stain and cherry stain in the two rooms were authentic for the day.

As they moved shelving in the woodwork job, they came upon a real artifact of the days when the building was the XIT Headquarters.


"This is a checkbook that had dropped down behind the shelves," Pat Kirkeminde said as she displayed the item.

Bill Kirkeminde became interested in Channing and the area when he worked on the old Matador Ranch as a young man.

Pat Kirkeminde admits that she wasn't thrilled about moving to the western Panhandle, but after a trip through the area, she agreed.

The Kirkemindes have restored the rooms to the original configuration.

incidentally, is not finished, the exterior of the building has required long hours of labor.

Kirkeminde had to rebuild the chimney, shore up a wall and put on a new porch.

"We were lucky on the porch -- I found an old house being torn down and got the wood," he noted.

The building has two main rooms, the larger having been partitioned at some time in the past. Kirkeminde speculates that a dropped ceiling was installed in part of the larger room, accounting for the missing tin ceiling panels.

The Kirkemindes have restored the rooms to the original configuration.

Flood closes another bridge

Volunteers struggling to save the only way across the raging Mississippi for a 200-mile stretch scrambled to safety when the river burst through a levee at West Quincy, Mo., and flooded the road to the bridge.

"We just barely made it," one sandbagger said.

"It was just a tremendous, awesome, terrible event," said Ken Garner of the Army Corps of Engineers, who watched the scene from a helicopter.

A stream of burning gasoline was briefly swept along with the flood after an explosion, fire seeming to rise out of the water and sending up dense, dark smoke. The fire went out within minutes. The explosion apparently was at a gas station, said Hannibal, Mo., Fire Chief Roy Hark.

The Bayview Bridge had been the last bridge open between St. Louis and Burlington, Iowa. Four other bridges have closed as the rain-swollen Mississippi pushed out of its banks to record-high levels.

Strong thunderstorms struck again

today in the Dakotas, Minnesota, Nebraska and Iowa, dropping as much as 4 inches of rain in parts of the Dakotas.

One storm poured torrents of water into the South Skunk River near Ames, Iowa, which was nearly cut off by flooding a week ago. Nearly incessant lightning illuminated the pre-dawn sky.

The area got more than 2.5 inches of rain in less than six hours today, said the National Weather Service, which issued a flash flood warning for Squaw Creek in and near Ames, which is 30 miles north of Des Moines.

Relief from the rain appeared unlikely in the upper Midwest. Thunderstorms remained likely for several days as a cold front became stationary over the Plains, weather service meteorologist James McQuirter said today in Des Moines.

Months of above-average rainfall led to flooding that began in early June in Minnesota and Wisconsin and has been blamed for 26 deaths and at least \$5 billion in damage to crops and property.

Clinton decides to replace FBI chief

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Clinton has decided to replace William Sessions as head of the FBI but still wants "to find a graceful exit" for embattled director, a senior administration official says.

Sessions cut short a visit to Chicago where he was visiting FBI agents Friday and returned to Washington, while Clinton met with a potential replacement.

A senior law enforcement official said Sessions was meeting with Attorney General Janet Reno today and that she had a letter for him from Clinton.

The Office of Professional Responsibility has accused Sessions of using government cars and planes for personal travel, avoiding taxes on chauffeured travel to and from work, having a taxpayer-funded fence built at his home and using his position to receive a "sweetheart" deal on his home mortgage.

Sessions, a former federal judge, has denied the allegations and has fought to keep his job.

The president was flying to Missouri today to meet with state and federal officials and plan their response to the flood disaster in the Midwest.

On Friday night, Clinton met at the

White House with U.S. District Judge Louis Freeh of New York, reportedly the leading contender for the FBI post, said the senior administration official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

But, the official said: "Don't assume it's a done deal."

There will be an announcement on a new FBI director soon, but not necessarily over the weekend, said the official.

Sessions and Reno have had several previous discussions about his future. Session's departure "has been in the works for a while now," the administration official said.

The official said the president was concerned that some of the allegations against Sessions seemed baseless and that Clinton genuinely was looking for a way that the job change could occur smoothly.

The administration will "try to find a graceful exit for him," the official said.

"He was scheduled to be at the FBI Agents Association longer, but he did come back early, arriving this evening," the official said.

Sessions serves at the pleasure of the president and only Clinton can dismiss him.

Discovery launch is scrubbed Saturday

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - NASA called off the launch of space shuttle Discovery less than an hour before liftoff Saturday because of a circuit problem in the posts that lock the solid rocket boosters to the pad.

Launch officials did not say how long it would take to fix the problem or when the next launch attempt might be. But the delay was expected to be about five days.

"We'll see you here on another day," shuttle test director Mike Leimbach informed the five astronauts inside the shuttle.

Discovery was supposed to blast off Saturday at 9:22 a.m. EDT. But with just a few hours left to go, there were indications the booster-release system was on. That's not supposed to happen until 18 seconds before launch.

The twin boosters are bolted to the pad, and the bolts are supposed to detonate when the boosters ignite at liftoff.

"If you fire your boosters and these (bolts) haven't fired, then you have a catastrophic situation," said

NASA spokesman Bruce Buckham. In other words, the shuttle likely would blow up on or just above the pad.

The problem appeared to be a faulty switch, officials said.

Everything else about the countdown, including the weather, had been going perfectly.

"I hate to leave a good launch opportunity but we want to ensure that we have a fully functional pyrotechnic system for launch, and it's going to take some time to do that," said launch director Bob Sieck.

The nine-day mission was to be Discovery's 17th trip since its first flight in 1984. That's more flights than any other shuttle. It also would have been NASA's 57th shuttle mission overall and the fifth of eight flights planned this year.

Once in orbit, besides dropping off satellites, the crew plans to conduct a six-hour spacewalk to test tools to be used in December to fix the Hubble Space Telescope.

A washroom, later converted to a bathroom, was added in 1901.

Only two or three tiles from the fireplace in the larger room were missing and they found a craftsman in Stinnett who made very close copies.

The smaller room, which was the private office of Col. A.G. Boyce, the ranch's general manager when the building was constructed, also has a fireplace, but the tile is much harder to replicate.

"We're still hoping, though," said Mrs. Kirkeminde. "We're also looking for coal grates for the fireplaces."

Etched glass windows were decorative features in two gables of the building's exterior. At some time, probably not long before the Kirkemindes bought the building, the window on the front was broken out.

"We found the glass on the floor," said Mrs. Kirkeminde.

Her husband did a rubbing of the window in the south gable and sent it to be copied. Again, there's no way to detect the replica from an original.

Records indicate the building cost \$1,914.75 for materials and labor when built. Another \$248.95 was invested in 1901 with the washroom addition.

Clinton proposes 'gay' compromise

WASHINGTON (AP) - Although President Clinton is retreating from his pledge to lift the military's gay ban outright, the White House says the proposed "don't pursue" policy would end with hunts for homosexuals in uniform.

Clinton won't formally announce the new policy until next week, but both sides already are attacking his approach to the explosive issue.

The two openly gay members of the House said Friday that Clinton's plan didn't go far enough to end discrimination against homosexuals in the military - as the president had

promised during the presidential campaign.

Senate Armed Services Chairman Sam Nunn, D-Ga., said he would push for a law to ban military service by people with "a propensity to engage in homosexual acts."

Senior administration officials Friday laid out details of a Pentagon proposal billed as "don't ask, don't tell, don't pursue." They said Clinton was "generally supportive" of the plan, six months in the making, and was likely to announce a fine-tuned version early next week, perhaps Monday.

Under the plan, homosexuals would be allowed to serve in the armed forces if they kept quiet about their sexual orientation. Homosexual conduct itself would be prohibited.

Military personnel would not be asked about their sexuality, and military officials would be allowed to investigate them for potential ouster only if there were "credible evidence" of homosexual behavior.

"It will clearly create, we believe, a zone of privacy in the military for individuals ... that will respect the privacy on both sides," said a senior administration official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

"We think that probably the most significant advance is ... no witch hunts, no pursuit policy," the official said.

A second administration official, also speaking on condition of

anonymity, said that if someone were to declare himself or herself a "practicing homosexual" that would be cause for investigation.

Merely being sighted at a gay bar or attending a gay rights parade, for example, would not be grounds for investigation. But multiple reports of overt behavior such as same-sex kissing or dancing would be within a "danger zone" for investigation, the officials said.

Only a commanding officer could launch an investigation.

The officials said the new approach would be a significant departure from existing policy, under which the military spent some \$500 million between 1980 and 1990 pursuing investigations, with 17,000 people ordered out of the service as homosexuals.

HJH Roundup

Yes, students, it's true! Teachers just go to school all the time! A Thematic Science program sponsored by WTSU and Region 16 is being held July 12-August 6 and will be attended by HJH teachers Connie Gilbert, Dona Hendrickson and Nisar Chand. These teachers will also attend sessions two days each month during the '93-'94 school year. The study concludes with a four week program in the summer of '94.

For those who may not know all they'd like to know about the history of Deaf Smith County schools, the following is a brief introduction.

A county's development and growth are generally reflected in her school system. Deaf Smith County schools had an humble beginning, with a gradual and steady growth from a one room school, Womble, located in the northeast corner of the county in 1893, to a teaching staff of over 400 in the Deaf Smith County schools today. This number includes teachers working with over 4000 students in the HISD, Walcott, St. Anthony's, Nazarene Academy and Community School. There have been over sixty schools scattered throughout the county during this 100 years of growth and change.

Some early schools were known by as many as three names, as schools would be moved to be nearer the students. Before schools were formally organized, pioneers provided for their children's education in private homes and community schools sprang up as the area developed, proving the importance of education even in the early days of settlement.

The first school building in Hereford, moved from Old Dawn, had one room and was situated at the intersection of Eighth and Dewey Streets. Asa Martin was the first teacher. By 1899, there were 53 students and by 1900 there were four teachers and 208 students. This growth caused the need for more room and a square, two-story frame building was constructed where Old Central now stands. In 1901 a room was added on each level.

The first graduating class of nine students held their exercises May 18, 1906. Citizens had provided for higher education for their youth "at home" with the opening of Hereford Christian College, later named Add-Ran College, and still later, Panhandle Christian College. Hereford Christian College opened in 1902 with eight faculty members and 250 students. The college was located where the high school is now located. The first football team in the county was organized in 1909 at the college.

Many changes have occurred since that first school opened in Deaf Smith County. Gradually all of the county schools outside of the city of Hereford, with the exception of Walcott, have closed.

Things have been moving fairly rapidly here at City Hall during the last several weeks.

The City is proceeding to develop additional water supplies which will entail about \$2 million in improve-

ments and construction.

The City of Hereford Police Department is going to conduct a Citizens Police Academy starting in September. If you are interested, mark your calendar and look for more information concerning the academy.

Consultants may reap business from school finance bill

AUSTIN (AP) - The new school finance law might spell new business for some high-powered consultants who say they can ease the potential transfer of property from rich to poor school districts' tax bases.

The consultants - including two former lawmakers, a former Texas education commissioner and a prominent lawyer who represents poor school districts challenging portions of the new law - haven't done any property transfers yet.

But their venture could boom if rich school districts can't get voter approval to reduce their property wealth in another way, such as sending some money to the state. Unlike several other options for sharing wealth allowed under the new law, transferring property doesn't require a school district election.

"I'm going to be surprised if any substantial number of these elections pass," said Austin lawyer Buck Wood. He represents poor school districts suing over part of the new law and also is involved in the Property Placements Inc. consulting business.

Texas voters in May overwhelmingly turned down a share-the-wealth school funding proposal. That prompted lawmakers to pass the current measure, which didn't require a statewide vote of the people.

Under the new law, the 100 school districts with more than \$280,000 in property wealth per student must choose by Sept. 1 among five options for reducing their riches.

The alternatives include sending money to the state; contracting to educate other districts' students; merging tax bases with one or more poorer districts; consolidating voluntarily; or moving some taxable property to another district's tax rolls.

The first three options require voter approval. Officials say their discussions with school districts indicate the first two are the most popular, likely because there is a court challenge and those options could be easily abandoned.

But if those elections fail - and the law remains in place for at least this school year, which appears likely - school districts must make another choice to avoid having the state either

move their property or consolidate them with others.

School districts "might find themselves here in the middle of August with a failed election," Wood said. "Then there's going to be a mad scramble to get this done."

Besides Wood, the consultants include former state Sens. Kent Caperton and Jack Strong and former education commissioner Bill Kirby.

"We think we can be of help," Caperton said. "That's not to say a district could not accomplish a transfer without our services."

Property-poor Karnes City Independent School District is among those that have told the consulting firm to see what sort of arrangement it could come up with, said Superintendent William Gary.

"We should be attractive" to a business, considering the district's tax rate of 94 cents per \$100 property valuation, Gary said. The state average local property tax rate in school districts was nearly \$1.30 in 1992, according to the state comptroller's property tax division.

The rich and poor school districts must agree for property to be transferred. The business involved doesn't get a vote in the matter, said TEA spokeswoman Della May Moore.

But businesses - which could see their tax bills cut if they are moved to a low-taxing district - are the ones that would pay for the consulting service, said Caperton. "No taxpayer dollars would be paid to us," he said.

Trooper was victim of senseless violence which touched many lives

VICTORIA, Texas - That Bill Davidson was a victim of senseless violence is undisputed.

But when Ronald Ray Howard shot the veteran highway patrol trooper during a traffic stop, his bullet claimed many lives besides the one it ended.

For when Davidson hit the pavement on U.S. Highway 59 in 1992, it set off a chain reaction of shattered lives.

His wife, Linda, to whom he'd spoken on the telephone just minutes before he was shot, and their children, Kimberly and Trey, have been victimized by Howard's anger as surely as their husband and father was.

To Ronald Ray Howard, Bill Davidson was "the law" - a nameless person in a hated uniform, target for his rage.

To everyone else, he was Bill. Bill the husband. Bill the fishing buddy. Bill the city councilman. Bill the Little League president. Bill the UIL football referee. And so on.

With one bullet, he became Bill the cherished memory.

On Wednesday, with Ronald Ray Howard condemned to death, Linda Davidson said she and her children will now try to live a normal life again. But she called that task "impossible now that we don't have Bill anymore."

For Kimberly, a return to normalcy means going back to college - and hopefully to the Department of Public Safety Academy in Austin to follow in her father's footsteps.

But it also means an empty chair at graduation, where she would otherwise have found her father. And another one at home, where she would otherwise have found help understanding Texas traffic laws.

For Trey, to whom Bill Davidson was "coach" as well as "dad," it means a wall of trophies, bittersweet memories of championships and of a fallen champion.

To Don Wardlow, who sat through almost the entire trial - most days after an hour's drive from Rockdale after working all night - it means the end of a lifelong friendship.

"We really didn't see each other all that much the last few years, but our friendship was there," said Wardlow, a friend since both were second-graders in Belton.

For them, the pipe dreams of boyhood became reality when, in 1968, they enlisted in the Army together.

Wardlow would later follow his friend into the highway patrol, graduating from the DPS Academy two classes behind Davidson.

Add the loss of a brother officer to that of a boyhood chum.

And what of Howard's family?

His grandmother, Birdie Prince, wept uncontrollably Wednesday as she stretched to hug her 6-foot-1 grandson after the jury passed its death sentence.

"Don't kill my baby. Don't kill my baby. Don't kill my baby," she could be heard saying through her sobs.



Our 19th Congressional representative, Larry Combest, appears to be doing a good job for us in Washington. Combest this week helped introduce legislation that will assure West Texans in small communities can continue to use their local landfills safely.

Combest and fellow West Texas lawmakers maintain that a federal judge in Washington, D.C., incorrectly interpreted new landfill regulations when he insisted they also apply to small communities. The court ruling has reversed exemptions for small landfill operations actively pursued by Combest, and Reps. Bill Sarpalius and Charlie Stenholm.

We're not sure how the final ruling will apply to smaller communities, but we salute Combest for his action on the matter.

Combest said the legislation offered is "to correct a federal judge's mistaken view that the routine trash of our arid region should be handled the same as the mountains of waste in the polluted Northeast."

"Our exemptions apply to small landfills in dry regions where there is no evidence of causing groundwater contamination. To incorrectly assume that all trash is equal is a typical approach of the federal government's one-size-fits-all philosophy that will ruin these small communities."

Trade problems

WASHINGTON (AP) - Consider the apple, the congressman said, an everyday snack in America, a costly delicacy in Japan. Forbidden trade fruit, it is an apt symbol of the challenge facing U.S. negotiators trying to get more American exports into Japanese markets.

Rep. Sam Gibbons pointed that out at a hearing the other day, asking the U.S. trade representative whether he'd ever eaten a Japanese apple.

Mickey Kantor, just back from the economic summit in Tokyo, said he had. "They were nice enough to have a basket of fruit in my room, which I think must have cost a fortune," Kantor said.

"Their apple isn't an agricultural product, it's an art form ... it's a meal," said Gibbons, a Florida Democrat. Each apple is coddled and guarded while it grows, often gift wrapped after it is harvested.

It also is the subject of a 22-year trade dispute. Despite an agreement to open the market in 1971, Japan imports no U.S. apples, citing concern about agricultural diseases, insects and worms.

Obviously, apples are a small bite of the nearly \$50 billion U.S. trade deficit with Japan. But the case illustrates the differences negotiators must resolve.

Even the new Tokyo agreement that set the framework for a year of trade talks is read differently in the two capitals.

Kantor said this is different from prior agreements that didn't deliver reductions in the trade imbalance. "No, it's results oriented," he told the House panel, and that means specific measurements of progress toward more balanced trade.

But the Japanese rejected numerical trade targets, balked at a commitment to cut their \$50 billion U.S. trade surplus in half over the next three years, agreeing to "sets of objective criteria," but leaving the definition for later.

"We've got some hard bargaining to go," Kantor said. "These are only the rules of the game."

The agreement was reached with a lame duck Japanese government that may lose its parliamentary

July 7

El Paso Times on Spanish insurance policies:

Texas law requires all drivers to carry vehicle liability insurance, but someone who speaks only Spanish cannot now buy a policy that he or she can read.

That is about to change for the better.

Within two months, the State Insurance Board is expected to approve Spanish-language versions of the basic policies sold in Texas for use by insurance companies.

Soon after, insurance companies will be required to provide policies in Spanish to people who ask for them.

It was not a step that insurance companies volunteered to take. The Insurance Board ordered it after hearing a few consumer complaints and some statistics.

"Census figures show that 3.5 million or 22 percent of Texans speak Spanish in the home and that 750,000 report that they are not fluent in English," state Insurance Department spokesman Rafael Ayuso said.

Some people -- and insurance companies -- are bound to complain that the requirement represents some official acceptance of Spanish. In fact, it is just an acknowledgement of reality.

As the Insurance Department's Associate Commissioner for Consumer Service Rob Schneider said, "This is not to make Spanish an official language, just to facilitate communication. That's all."

El Paso Herald-Post on Haiti:

Temporarily at least, the agreement to restore Haiti's elected president must be counted a success for the Clinton administration, which gave the issue priority. Whether the ambitious agreement will hold is far less sure.

The palpable difficulty of stitching an accord together in the first place is symptomatic. The two principals, deposed President Jean-Bertrand Aristide and the military usurper, Lt. Gen. Raoul Cedras, refused to meet face to face, communicating only through United Nations mediators. And even now skepticism prevails in Port-au-Prince, where the attitude toward Aristide's announced return by Oct. 30 seems to be: show me. ...

July 8

San Angelo Standard-Times on school milk program:

Give the kids what they want even when they'd be better off without it.

That's sometimes claimed to be holy writ in the catechism of permissive child-rearing decreed so fervently by traditionalists (as well as others who realize the value of saying no even in a laid-back society).

The 1994 agriculture appropriations bill that came out of committee last month said no longer would school districts that take part in the federal lunch program be required to give the moppers a choice between skim, low-fat, whole or chocolate milk. But, some dairy state lawmakers did nips-ups over depriving kids of that fat, even though Congress itself has urged schools to cut back on fats in pupils' diets.

Floor debate became high-flown, invoking a "freedom of choice" right that is laughable in most minds. But it worked. Youngsters can have it their way. And you do understand that the 2-to-1 House vote was based on basic rights, not on the fact that the dairy states want markets for all that delicious, artery-clogging cream.

July 9

Austin American-Statesman on State's school textbooks:

Contrary to the cliche, ignorance is not bliss.

Like curriculum, Texas textbooks must be based on reality if they are to have any meaning to students. A most important example is health textbooks. Those books cannot ignore human sexuality. ...

Books the state board ultimately selects for secondary health courses must balance concerns of parents who are worried their children will be unduly influenced and the needs of students who must be well-informed about the life and death choices they confront daily. The scale must tip in favor of education.

July 12

Fort Worth Star-Telegram on court decision to allow bond sales:

The Texas Supreme Court has moved in timely fashion to ensure that state-supported colleges and universities aren't plagued by the same uncertainties to which lawsuits about equitable funding have subjected the public schools.

The court recently issued an order that will grant universities uninterrupted authority to sell bonds while the justices are trying to reach a decision on a lawsuit alleging inequitable state funding for colleges in South Texas.

Last year, ruling on a case filed in 1987 by the Mexican-American Legal Defense and Education Fund that charged state officials with denying a fair share of state resources to public universities in South Texas, State District Judge Benjamin Euresti Jr. gave lawmakers until this May 1 to make changes or quit funding all state colleges and universities.

The state appealed, and the case is still pending adjudication by the Supreme Court, prompting attorneys for the state to express concern about the legal status of bonds issued after May 1 should the court affirm Euresti's order.

To allay those fears, the court held Euresti's injunction in abeyance until a final ruling on the case is issued, which will allow schools to continue selling bonds in good faith.

It was a common-sense decision, one that can keep economic disruption to a minimum while the court continues to study the case.

Family fights to prove convicted rapist is innocent

"I'm fighting for the truth, and I knew from the beginning it was going to be a tough fight." Jacquelyn Mitchell, wife of a convicted Texas rapist.

ABILENE, Texas (AP) - Despite compelling and incriminating physical and scientific evidence, the family of a convicted rapist is taking extraordinary steps to prove him innocent.

"PLEASE HELP!!!!" said Jacquelyn Johnson Mitchell in a recent letter to The Associated Press and others.

"We know for a fact he did not commit this crime."

She insists her husband, Johnny Mitchell, 27, was "railroaded" by a zealous Abilene police force under mounting pressure to catch a vicious sex offender known as the "Southside Rapist."

"We realize there are those who simply can't accept the fact that their loved ones have committed such a hideous crime.... This isn't the case here," Mrs. Mitchell said.

Night and day, the family pores over trial transcripts, investigative reports and major and minor evidence, looking for flaws in the state's case.

"For him, it's like dying a different death every day," Jacquelyn Mitchell said. "For his family, it's like witnessing a loved one being slowly tortured before your very eyes."

"There is such an overwhelming feeling of helplessness and anger."

But Abilene police Det. Jay Hatcher told the AP Mitchell is a "dangerous individual" who grew "worse and worse and worse" as the sexual attacks escalated.

"The evidence is overwhelming," he said. "It is really amazing that the family is fighting this battle with such force."

A jury convicted John Henry Mitchell last fall of raping a 21-year-old Abilene woman and assessed a 99-year prison sentence. He is in jail awaiting trial on another sexual assault.

Police say Mitchell is a suspect in as many as eight attacks in 1991.

With her letter to the AP, Mrs. Mitchell sent volumes of news stories, trial transcripts, investigative records, crime lab reports, letters to and from lawyers and a provocative list labeled "Disturbing Factors."

Also included was a list of "testimonial inconsistencies" and questionable investigative procedures prepared by a lawyer friend of the family, John Young.

"Evidence which could have exonerated Mitchell if properly processed was destroyed, botched or not tested at all," Young concluded.

"...Particularly, I believe there is a serious question regarding the

thoroughness and, perhaps integrity of the investigation."

Hatcher, the lead investigator in the Mitchell affair, acknowledged that police made mistakes - none critical - but said that is not uncommon in a long, intensive case involving multiple offenses.

"It is a common defense ploy to look at a grueling investigation and focus on three or four mistakes," he said.

Mrs. Mitchell and her mother, Lucy Johnson, both of nearby Sweetwater, have taken their appeal to everyone from the NAACP to Donahue and Geraldo and to news shows such as "20/20", "Prime Time Live" and "48 Hours."

Just last week, they were in Austin seeking political support from the New Alliance Party.

"I would not be able to sleep at night knowing Johnny was gone for the rest of his life," Mrs. Johnson told a reporter during an interview with her and her daughter in their stylish Sweetwater home.

"We could cope with it better if he was guilty. We could go on with our lives," she said.

"It's enough to make you lose your sanity," her daughter sighed as she attempted to corral her young son, whom she calls Little Johnny.

Mrs. Mitchell and her mother testified that Mitchell was with them in Sweetwater the evening of the assault. And two of Mrs. Mitchell's co-workers at a day-care center swore they saw Mitchell there between 5 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. the Friday in question.

The attack occurred in Abilene, 40 miles east of Sweetwater, between 6:30 p.m. and 7 p.m. on Nov. 15, 1991.

The victim said she was bathing her 3-year-old son at her southside home when a gunman wearing a white hockey mask entered the bathroom and declared: "If you scream, I'll kill you."

The assailant, she said, was wearing a burnt orange satin stadium jacket, a gold earring, dark jeans, a blue Bugle Boy shirt and a distinctive gold ring.

He also wore gloves, one of which he left behind.

She said he dragged her into the bedroom, put a pillow over her head, ripped off her clothes and, when she resisted, threatened to kill her son.

"He got very angry and hit me across the face and kept hitting me," she said.

He sexually abused her with his pistol before raping her, she reported.

After the assault, the victim telephoned her boyfriend, who took her to a hospital. Several vaginal swabs were taken and a nurse said a stain on the victim's underwear tested positive for sperm.

In light of later events, this would be pivotal to the state's case.

On Dec. 3, 1991, after a series of sex crimes, Abilene police sent evidence from six assaults to Fort Worth for DNA testing by the Tarrant County Medical Examiner's office.

At the time, there were no arrests and no suspects.

Two days later, a gunman in a burnt

orange jacket and wearing a white hockey mask raped an 11-year-old school girl in her home. Within hours, police arrested an Abilene teen-ager.

At least two people identified him as the assailant and police said it was partial license plate numbers that led to his arrest.

Investigators said he also was a suspect in the earlier southside rapes.

However, on Dec. 9, an Abilene resident telephoned police to report what appeared to be a residential burglary attempt. The caller said a man was acting suspiciously at a nearby duplex.

When police arrived, the man climbed a fence and fled.

"He tried to hide but an officer found him," Melvin Martin, the assistant police chief, told a news conference.

The man was Johnny Mitchell, who was wearing an orange University of Texas jacket and a gold earring when arrested. Investigators soon learned he was on parole for an aggravated robbery conviction nearly a decade earlier.

"We feel this made him the perfect candidate for a major railroad job," Mrs. Mitchell said.

Police also reported finding a pistol and a white hockey mask in bushes outside a motel along Mitchell's purported "path of flight."

The search party reportedly recovered a yellow-gold ring and a

from the duplex.

Police apparently took no photographs. Nor did they later test the mask for fingerprints, which Hatcher concedes was a mistake.

But investigators soon theorized they were dealing not with a burglar but a rapist, and that the intruder was trying to get at a 17-year-old woman in the other side of the duplex.

"He was caught in the act," Martin, the assistant police chief, told the AP. "But at the time, the officer in pursuit did not realize he was chasing the Southside Rapist."

Under those circumstances, Martin said, he was surprised the family would "go to this extreme" in defending Mitchell.

In a recent jail interview, Mitchell told the AP his lawyer ordered him not to discuss the case, but said: "I wasn't there to bust through the wall to get to her, like the DA wants everybody to believe."

The earlier suspect, meanwhile, was freed on bond, and four months later the charges against him were dropped.

Shortly after Mitchell's arrest, police scoured his Abilene residence with a search warrant. Mitchell and Jacquelyn were not married at the time and he lived with his mother.

The search party reportedly recovered a yellow-gold ring and a

single glove, which, though fingerless, appeared to match the glove found in the home of the 21-year-old rape victim.

Hatcher says police took photographs of the evidence in place but inexplicably lost the film. And Mitchell now says neither the ring nor glove were his.

Investigators and a doctor also took blood and saliva samples and head and pubic hairs from Mitchell and these, too, were sent to Fort Worth.

The evidence against Mitchell was presented first at a bond revocation hearing in March 1992. And even though the rape victim testified, the parole board refused to revoke bond, citing insufficient evidence.

However, when the case came to trial last November, the victim recalled more vividly many details of the episode that tended to incriminate Mitchell, including identification of the ring.

Even more compelling was the DNA evidence.

Dr. Meghan Clement of Fort Worth, a forensic biologist in the medical examiner's office, testified that Mitchell's blood matched sperm from the rape analysis on five of five "probes" of DNA material.

The National Research Council,

in a 1992 report on DNA technology in forensic science, noted that "even in today's technology, which uses three to five loci (probes), a match between two DNA patterns can be considered strong evidence that the two samples came from the same source."

"My personal feeling in this case, with a five-for-five probe match, the chances of this DNA originating from someone else are infinitesimally small," Ms. Clement said.

Fort Worth lawyer Bill Lane, who tried the first case in Texas to incorporate DNA testing, is a strong advocate of using DNA evidence in criminal cases.

But he told the AP such evidence is easy to fabricate and "is no better than the integrity of the police department that collects it."


Mitchell, in the jail interview, offered no explanation for the DNA results but said: "Something isn't right about this. There shouldn't have been a match. I was in another city at the time."

His wife is more adamant.

"We know beyond a shadow of a doubt that the DNA had to be tampered with," Mrs. Mitchell said. "The evidence is in there somewhere and I'll dig until I find it."

"I don't care how long it takes."

Sox' Clemens makes sparkling return

Boston surged while Roger Clemens was on the disabled list, so it was only natural that the Red Sox stayed hot when he returned.

The Rocket allowed one run on four hits and struck out six in six innings Friday night in his first appearance since June 18, lifting Boston to a 5-3 victory over the Seattle Mariners.

The outcome capped an upbeat day for Red Sox manager Butch Hobson, who signed a one-year contract extension before the game. Before the Red Sox posted a 15-5 record with Clemens on the disabled list with a groin injury, Hobson's job security was decidedly shaky.

"I was a little sharper than I expected to be," said Clemens (8-6). "It was an exciting day. We got good news about 10 minutes before we took the field about Butch. You have to feel good about that."

Davis finds old form with Padres

Welcome back, Mark Davis.

After saving 44 games and winning the 1989 Cy Young Award with the San Diego Padres, Davis decided to seek his fortune in the free agent market.

He signed a four-year, \$13 million deal with the Kansas City Royals, but turned into a bust, saving only seven games in three seasons. The Royals sent him to Atlanta in 1992 and he moved to Philadelphia in the off-season.

He was released by the Phillies last week and the bargain-hunting Padres decided to give him another chance. His \$3.25 million salary this season is being paid by Kansas City, Atlanta, Philadelphia and San Diego.

On Friday night, Davis saved his second consecutive game (his first two since 1991) as he helped the Padres beat the slumping Phillies 5-3 at Jack Murphy Stadium.

"It's nice to do that, but I'd like to just come out and do what I can to help the team, whenever and wherever that is," Davis said.

Padres manager Jim Riggleman said, "He's a quality pitcher. Whatever the reasons he struggled before, I don't know, it's hard to throw better than he is now. He's got a good fastball and breaking ball."

Tony Gwynn hit a two-run homer to cap a five-run seventh inning as the Padres semi-first-place Philadelphia to its sixth loss in eight games.

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


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

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Rangers' draft picks are best since '86 class

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - Mike Bell considered his fellow members of the Class of 1993, and a smile slowly spread across his face.

"It's the best team I've ever played on," he said. "I think that's safe to say."

Safe to say? The Texas Rangers certainly hope so. Bell's last team was the Cincinnati state high school champion. Bell's current team is the Rangers' representative in the Gulf Coast rookie league, a club Texas officials say could be their best ever at that level.

"It's the most talented I've ever had, without a doubt," said Chino Cadahia, the Gulf Coast manager since 1988.

The Gulf Coast Rangers are loaded with the best, the brightest and the youngest prospects from the June amateur draft. The roster is filled with talented teen-agers, including Texas' first seven picks.

"They're very impressive," Rangers farm director Marty Scott said. "The jury's still out, but the early reports are that everybody's excited about them."

The young Rangers are so impressive that they are being mentioned in the same breath as the Class of '86. That year's draft crop included six future major-leaguers - a few of whom could be classified as superstars.

Juan Gonzalez, Dean Palmer, Sammy Sosa, Rey Sanchez, Kevin Brown, Roger Pavlik and Wayne Rosenthal all made the major leagues.

Cadahia didn't manage the Rangers that year, when they played in Sarasota, Fla. But he did manage most of the Class of '86 the next

season at Class-A Gastonia.

And he said Bell, Edwin Diaz, Andrew Vessel, Toure Knighton, Roderic Walker, Daniel Smith and Mark Ocasio, the first seven choices this year, have similar potential.

"If we can come up with that ('86) draft all over again, we're going to be OK," Cadahia said. "I think it will happen again here."

The similarities between '86 and '93 begin with the ages of the players.

With the exception of Brown, who played three games at Sarasota before moving up to Double-A Tulsa, and St. John's University product Rosenthal, the Class of '86 graduated from high school to the pros.

The same holds for this year's group. All seven were in high school just a month and a half ago. Walker and Smith are 17. The other five are 18.

Sandy Johnson, Rangers assistant general manager for player personnel and scouting, said the team didn't make a conscious decision to draft teen-agers. They just were the best players available.

"The guys at the top of our list were high school guys," Johnson said. "We stayed with the philosophy of whoever's at the top of our list we'll take. It turned out to be high school guys."

That doesn't mean there wasn't some trepidation about using the first seven choices on players who are several years away from helping the big-league club.

"Rather than go safely (with college players) we decided to take a chance on the high ceiling of the high school guys," Johnson said.

They took them because of the other similarity between the Class of

'86 and the Class of '93: the ability to hit, catch and throw a baseball.

The talent begins with Bell, a third baseman and their first pick in the draft.

The son of former Ranger Buddy Bell, he is leading the rookies with a .395 batting average. He had one double, six triples, one home run and 12 runs batted in through Tuesday, even though he's just now beginning to feel comfortable with a wooden bat.

"I'm starting to adjust to it, getting used to it," he said. "Anybody who says it's easy to hit with them doesn't know what they're talking about."

"Bell plays good defense and has a good bat," Scott said.

That also applies to Edwin Diaz, the second-round choice. The 18-year-old from Vega Baja, Puerto Rico, the same hometown as Gonzalez and Rangers catcher Ivan Rodriguez, is hitting .333 with seven extra-base hits, has stolen seven bases in nine attempts and playing a stellar second base.

"I'm very impressed with Diaz," Scott said. "Based on all the skills he exhibited he is a No. 1 draft pick, too. He's a solid second baseman who turns the pivot well. He'll hit some homers and steal bases for you."

Third-round pick Andrew Vessel should do the same thing. The 6-foot-3, 205-pound outfielder combines a powerful frame with a quick swing.

"When you see a kid with that swing, you can't help but get excited about him," Cadahia said.

Vessel is a favorite of Cadahia because he arrives at the ballpark every day with a smile on his face and with the desire to learn.

"I see him doing things now he couldn't do five days ago," Cadahia said.

Vessel has yet to hit a ball out of the yard, but no one's particularly worried. Gonzalez, who hit 43 home runs last year, didn't hit any homers when he was a rookie, even though he had a league-leading 233 at-bats.

When the comparisons to '86 are being made, Bell, Diaz and Vessel play the roles of Palmer, the Rangers third baseman, Sanchez, the Chicago Cubs shortstop, and Gonzalez, Texas' All-Star outfielder. Not just because Bell and Palmer are third basemen, Diaz and Sanchez are middle infielders and Vessel and Gonzalez are outfielders, but because they have similar potential.

"Those three are real exciting," Scott said.

The Rangers are also excited about Knighton, Ocasio and Smith, a trio of right-handed pitchers.

Knighton is 0-1 with a 4.09

earned-run average but has three walks and 13 strikeouts in 11 innings. Ocasio is the big winner of the staff so far. He is 2-0 with a 2.01 ERA. Smith is 1-1 with a 3.86 ERA.

"The three pitchers all look real good," Scott said. "They're not afraid to pitch inside. They have a good idea of what they're doing."

The final member of the Magnificent Seven is Walker, the shortstop.

He is struggling with a .154 average in his first 10 games, but no one is worried. Walker turned 17 in February and was the youngest player in the draft, so the Rangers anticipated some difficulties in his first season.

"He'll have his problems here, but that's to be expected," Cadahia said.

But even when he doesn't look good at the plate, he displays some positive attributes.

"He's not afraid to charge the ball," Scott said. "Sometimes he gets

out of control, but I like his aggressiveness."

While Rangers officials are excited about their rookies, no one expects all seven to march through the system and into the major leagues.

"There are so many things that can happen," Johnson said. "You've got injuries, you've got to hope they stay together mentally and physically. It depends on how they'll handle adversity, what kinds of bodies they'll have. So many things are out of our hands."

Cadahia knows that it's unrealistic to expect all seven to appear in the majors someday. He has had talented players before who never made it.

"This is not a picnic," he said.

"On any given day they're here before 8 a.m. It's not an easy life. It takes total dedication. A lot of kids don't adjust."

But a lot do.

Seven did it in 1986. The Rangers hope history repeats itself.

Pebble beach is golf heaven

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP) -

Jack Nicklaus was right. Pebble Beach is where you would like to be sentenced if you only had one golf course to play for the rest of your life.

A lifetime of stuffing the piggy bank with coins led this vacationing golf gypsy to the shores of the Pacific ocean and to the course that has the most spectacular stretch of holes and real estate in the world.

Augusta National, St. Andrews, Royal Troon, Spyglass, Bay Hill, Cherry Hills and Olympic, have their own particular appeal, especially Augusta National amid the pines, flowers, and green velvet fairways.

What can be more scenic than waves crashing against rocks, marking one of the most permanent out-of-bounds you've ever seen? Ball retrievers don't work here.

It's hard to concentrate at Pebble Beach. You can hear seals barking and it's tempting to watch a sea otter try to crack an abalone shell on a rock.

On land, deer stroll across the fairway like they are unafraid of what happens if they get hit by a line-drive 3-iron.

From the air, seagulls and crows swoop down on your golf cart to steal any food they can find. Recently, a lady lost a ring she had put in her cart while she made a swing. The seagull just carried it off.

The ocean doesn't come into play until you reach the seventh hole, a 100-yard shot from the top of a cliff with the tiny green below. Hit the ball too hard and you're in the ocean. Hit it too soft and you are bunkered short of the green.

This day my lucky lurch with an 8-iron into the wind landed three feet

from the pin. The putt dropped for a birdie deuce.

On to the eighth hole, a 400-yard par-4 doglegs right around the ocean. Your second shot has to carry over a cliff.

On the ninth and tenth holes, the ocean is on your right, awaiting a pushed tee shot.

The course swings back inland. Eventually you come to No. 14, a long par-5 that has a green as hard to hold with a shot as an upside down saucer. The bunker in front could swallow a team of Clydesdale horses. It's rated one of the best and toughest par-5s in the world.

The 16th hole is an intriguing par-4 which gives you two different areas to land your tee shot. This par-4 is protected by deep bunkers and overhanging trees.

Then comes the famed 17th, a 200-yard par-3 where Tom Watson once chipped into the hole out of thick rough around the green to beat Nicklaus in the U.S. Open. The green is protected by a deep bunker and a hooked shot will find the land of the sharks and whales.

The 18th could be, and if it's not should be, the most famous hole in the world. It's a sweeping dogleg left along the curve of Carmel Bay and the ocean. For a golfer, it's terrifying to see all that beach, rocks and ocean below.

Hale Irwin came to the hole once leading a tournament on the final day and hooked his tee shot badly. While it was on its way to be shark bait, the ball hit a rock and ricocheted back onto the fairway. Irwin went on to win the tournament.

I did the wimp thing here and bailed out to the right on three straight shots to ensure a bogey six.

It was a tremendous golfing experience playing Pebble which

we've all seen so many times on television during the Bing Crosby Pro-Am, now the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am.

If you want to play Pebble, start saving dollars not pennies. Pebble Beach, and nearby Spyglass and Spanish Bay are under new management since the Japanese bought the property.

The course was in great shape but the green fee situation is ugly. If you don't stay in the hotel (The Lodge) on the premises then you have to fork over \$225 to tee it up. Only 15 years ago the green fee was \$40.

One night's stay at The Lodge is about \$300. But they'll knock down your green fee to \$175. I played a "twilight" round at Pebble after 5 p.m. and it was a "bargain" at \$125. That was the best deal. I finished just at dark, chasing deer off the greens so I could put.

It's a crime that a national treasure and a public golf course like Pebble Beach has such pistol-to-your-head rates.

Maybe President Clinton's wheeling and dealing with the Japanese will produce lower green fees at Pebble.

Counting green fees of \$175 and \$125, it cost me about \$8 per hole for my 36 holes at Pebble Beach.

Pray tell what will it be in five years.

My memories of 85 and 81 from the gentlemen tees will have to last a long, long time.

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

It is estimated that Americans will spend \$236.5 billion while eating out this year, but how will they know which meals are more nutritious?

The average American eats out 3.8 meals per week or 198 meals per year, according to 1993 National Restaurant Association Foodservice Industry Forecast figures. Also, Americans are purchasing more take-out foods to eat off premises of the restaurant.

So, knowledge of factors such as ingredients and preparation methods are still essential in making healthier

Air conditioner needs routine cleaning

"My window air conditioner is humming right along, but doesn't seem to be cooling as well as it did earlier this month. Does it need service?"

According to home economists a room air conditioner that seems to have lost some of its "oomph" probably just needs a little routine maintenance rather than a service technician.

"The most frequent cause of poor cooling is a dirty or clogged air filter," they report. To correct the problem, home economists offer these suggestions:

-First, check the manufacturer's use and care instructions for removing, cleaning and replacing the filter.

-Remove the filter. If it's coated with dust, clean with a vacuum cleaner dusting brush.

-If the filter is very dirty, wash it in warm water with a mild detergent. Blot moisture from the filter with a towel, or air dry thoroughly before replacing.

-Replace the clean, dry filter. Economists suggest checking the air conditioner filter every two weeks and cleaning it before it becomes dust-coated.

choices. Also, if you are on a special diet such as a diabetes diet or just want to eat healthfully, knowledge about serving size from each of the six food groups--breads, vegetables, fruits, meat, milk and fats--is essential.

Many of the restaurants are offering heart-healthy choices designated by a heart on the menu. These foods are low in fat, saturated fatty acids, cholesterol, sugar and sodium. Some of the fast-food restaurants are offering information about the nutritive value, including carbohydrate, protein, fat, calories, sodium and cholesterol content of the food items on the menus. Many restaurants are even providing nutrition education bulletins on topics such as the dietary guidelines, healthy eating tips as well as selection of healthier food choices just to attract customers.

Skills and strategies for teaching clients to eat away from home are listed below:

-Develop healthful mind set and a can-do attitude.

-Determine frequency of eating out--how often, where, when and what's ordered.

-Balance higher-calorie restaurant food with lower-calorie choices the rest of the day and exercise.

-Preplan for what you will eat before eating out.

-Ask the server about preparation methods, ingredients used and added fat.

-Ask about portion size.

-Make special requests such as a luncheon portion for a dinner meal. Or, ask for a doggie bag to take extra food not eaten home.

-Enjoy the non-food pleasantries of restaurant dining.

-Remember, alcohol provides extra calories, plus increases your appetite. So, if you are trying to control your caloric intake, then select either tea, coffee, water, skim milk or juice.

How to call for help

Do you know what to do if someone is suddenly sick or badly injured? "In an emergency, every second counts," says Kelley Hails, MD, Medical Director of Emergency Medical Services (EMS) in Dover, NH. "Find out whether you can call 9-1-1 for emergencies in your area. If not, know your local emergency numbers and keep them by the telephone to get the help you need fast."

Emergency medical services, or EMS, is a whole team of emergency professionals who are trained to handle medical, fire, rescue and other emergency situations. The team includes dispatch operators, emergency medical technicians and paramedics, fire fighters and police, and emergency nurses and physicians.

In communities that have a 9-1-1 system, simply dialing 9-1-1 in an emergency will connect you with EMS, the police and the fire department. In other communities you should keep the list of emergency numbers by the telephone. Be sure to find out the correct numbers when you are away from home on business or vacation.

Even very young children should know how to call for emergency medical help. Teach your children how to call for help from home and from a pay telephone.

When should you call an ambulance instead of driving to the emergency department or calling your doctor? Ask yourself the following questions:

- Is the victim's condition life threatening?

- Could the condition get worse and become life-threatening on the way to the hospital?

- Does the victim need the skills or equipment of paramedics or emergency medical technicians?

- Would distance or traffic conditions cause a delay in getting to the hospital?

News for veterans

SUN'S OUT!

Of course, the sun is out all year around, but somehow we don't seem to notice it as much until spring when the days are longer and we spend more time out of doors.

Time was, wearing sunglasses was a matter of comfort. But now that we know that sunlight can damage our eyes as much as it burns the skin, it's extra-important to protect them from ultraviolet rays.

The American National Standards Institute (ANSI) has set up a ratings system. Cosmetic lenses that absorb less than 60 percent of visible light offer some eye comfort but little real protection. What ANSI calls general-purpose lenses will absorb from 60 to 92 percent of visible light, 95 percent of ultraviolet-B and 60 percent of ultra-violet-A, good enough for most outdoor activities in temperate regions. But where sun will be reflected off sand, snow or water, special purpose lenses are recommended to block at least 99 percent of UB-B, 60 percent of UV-A and up to 97 percent of visible light.

Americans wage war

For many Americans, a 29 cent investment may be the best they ever made. They're buying stamps to stick on letters to their legislators, expressing opinions on an important subject: PACs.

Although the letters stand for Political Action Committee, many people believe they also stand for Protect American Citizens against loss of money, loss of jobs, even loss of freedom.

PACs are a way for ordinary citizens to band together with their peers and make their needs and ideas heard in elections for Congress, in accordance with the right of free speech and to petition the government guaranteed by the First Amendment to the Constitution. There are PACs for nurses, teachers, dentists, architects and probably one representing you through your company, union or other interest group.

PACs were born in the political reform movement of the mid-1970's. Some political reformers of the 1990's want to eliminate or strictly curtail them in the name of campaign finance reform. Experts believe this is not only unnecessary, it could be a big mistake, in terms of protecting personal rights and promoting accountability of campaign funding. It also could affect the ability of economic interests to work with government, perhaps, endangering jobs and prices.

By pooling their contributions, PAC members become players in their country's political process. In a democracy, the experts say, PACs promote aspects of government that make society more tolerant of diversity, better educated, and more vigilant and involved as citizens. PACs stimulate small campaign donations and increase the political reach of average Americans.

Through PACs, teachers can promote their interests, such as drug free schools, adult literacy and dropout prevention. Nurses can help

candidates understand the importance of health insurance, prenatal care, the health needs of the elderly and much more. Architects can get out the facts on environmental protection, historic preservation, affordable housing and livable communities. Through a PAC, you can tell Washington what's important to you.

Remember, don't sign a contract until you are sure you have made the right decision. Finally, before driving away, the salesperson should go through the owner's manual and explain any special break-in procedures as well as routine maintenance schedules.

By taking just a little time, you can get the car or truck you want at the terms best for you.

The new book list this week begins with Jack Higgins **Thunder Point**. The story begins in 1945 in the Führer's Berlin Bunker, the day before Adolf Hitler's suicide. The Führer has arranged for Reichsleiter Martin Bormann to flee Germany and arrive in South America via German U-Boat. Then in 1992 Sean Dillon, an elusive terrorist is saved from a firing squad in Yugoslavia by Brigadier Charles Ferguson, the head of the British prime minister's personal action unit "Group Four." In exchange for his life Dillon must take the "black job" for Ferguson in the Caribbean. The wreck of the German U-boat has been discovered at Thunder Point just off the coast of St. Johns in the American Virgin Islands. Dillon is to retrieve the diary belonging to the U-boat captain and the contents of the watertight briefcase belonging to Martin Bormann. The papers are thought to contain the names of members of the British establishment who were Nazi sympathizers. Also among the papers, they hope to find the "Windsor Protocol." This is the document signed by the Duke of Windsor which assured his ascension to the British throne

Cut firewood now, enjoy fires later

If you've found it hard to kindle a winter flame, you may have cut your firewood at the wrong time.

That's the opinion of forestry experts. According to Forestry Engineer Mark Michaels, suburbanites, farmers and "week-end woodsmen" who do their own cutting will get best results from following a few simple steps.

-Cut firewood in spring or early summer. This will allow it to dry properly and burn more easily next fall.

-When cutting, stand on firm ground to one side of the cut. Keep an escape route open, should a log start to roll.

-If the trunk has a downward bend, start the cut at the top. Make the final cut form underneath.

-Avoid pinching the saw in any fallen trunk that is under tension. To do this, make the first cut one third the way into the tree on the side opposite the tension. Then, finish the cut on the side under tension.

-When cutting a pile of wood, make sure the chain saw tip does not come in contact with any logs behind the one you are cutting. Such contact may cause the saw to "kick back." Put larger logs on a sawhorse first. Never stand on a log pile.

-Always wear protective clothing: work gloves, eye and ear protection and chain saw protective pants or chaps.

DEAR OKLA.: Thanks for the input. Keep reading for another point of view:





THE BIONIC WORK FORCE

It is not a new idea. It is not new technology. In fact, there is evidence that bionic work forces have been around for centuries. The evidence exists in many forms of high quality products whose bionic craftsmanship has lasted for hundreds of years.

I realize I may have confused some of you who were big fans of the "Six Million Dollar Man" television series. You are thinking bionics as in electromechanically enhanced body parts. However, the bionic work forces I'm talking about existed long before electricity and medical science got together.

I first learned about the true bionic meaning a few weeks ago from Glenda Carper, the co-owner of Doodles Hamburg-

ers, Inc. She was preparing a work force training program for their employees and was kind enough to share her thoughts with us. As soon as I heard her discuss the subject, I knew I should pass it along to you.

The bionic meaning

Carper's bionic training program uses an acronym built from the word bionic. The letters introduce the phrase - "Believe It Or Not, I Care." Bionic service is pretty rare these days. In fact, when you run across a company or an employee who really cares, it stands out because it is so unique.

It's a shame that caring companies and employees are scarce, but it is true. There are glorious opportunities for every business owner to grow their business by providing caring service. People love to go where they are treated well.

Recently, my family traveled with me to Myrtle Beach, S.C. on a business trip. We saw many examples of employees who had forgotten their bionic training or had never been taught to care in the first place.

The most memorable poor service or lack of a bionic attitude was at a fast food restaurant. We arrived at 10:05 a.m. with the intention of ordering a quick breakfast at 10:25 a.m. we were still standing in a slow moving line when they announced that they were no longer serving breakfast.

Although the store was busy, the employees were standing around waiting for someone else to do something. The place was not nearly as clean as other stores in the chain and there was

a lot more conversation than activity. This crew needed a bionic attitude.

Low level service

The second most memorable need for bionic training happened on the airplane coming home. We boarded the plane and it was obvious to me that the plane would not be full. Since the airline assigns seats on its airplane, I asked the flight attendant for permission to take one of the empty seats. She replied, "Sir, the plane will be full, you will have to sit in your assigned seat." She said it firmly and without a smile.

As we settled snugly together in our seats, I offered to bet my seat mates that the plane wouldn't be full. The flight attendant must have been standing right behind me because she stepped up and repeated curtly that the plane would be full.

A few minutes later as we backed from the gate, I counted 11 empty seats in the three rows directly in front of me. Later in the flight the attendant told me it was alright to move to an empty row if I wanted. I told her my present seat was fine. What I didn't tell her was the seat was ok, but I would choose a different airline for my next flight. The airline's slogan "We love to fly and it shows" must not be based on bionic service.

Caring work forces can make a difference. Try developing a "Believe It Or Not, I Care" attitude and watch your business or career grow.

House designed for porch fans





The country style exterior is highlighted by the wrap around




porch, horizontal wood siding, steep gable roof and three dormers.

Questions/Answers

Q: We rarely use our General Electric dishwasher (once every six to eight months). Recently we decided to run it in order to keep the seals from drying out because the water that normally stands in the bottom of the tub had evaporated. The dishwasher filled with water and the heating element worked, but the motor would not run - it would just hum.

A: The water probably evaporated because the dishwasher was not used for a long period of time. The minerals that are left after the water evaporated, combine with detergent residue and grow into a very hard crust on the face of the seals inside the pump assembly. The crust is sometimes referred to as scale.

This crust causes the seals to stick together, and this prevents the motor from turning. The dishwasher will fill with water, but won't go into the wash cycle because the motor is stuck. Instead, the motor heats up and clicks off when overloaded.

To correct this, remove the standing water at the bottom of the tub using a turkey baster. Then dissolve 2 ounces of citric acid crystals (available from drug stores, hardware stores or GE parts centers) in 2 cups of hot water.

Pour the mixture over the pump cover, and let soak for 20-30 minutes. It should be able to dissolve the crust in that amount of time. Latch the door and start the machine through a cycle. If the motor doesn't start, you will have to turn it by hand. Disconnect the power to the dishwasher, and

remove the lower access panel by removing the Phillips head screws in the corners.

Use a flashlight and look under the machine to find the motor. The right side of the motor is bullet shaped. The left side of the motor next to the pump assembly, has some air holes through which you can grip its L-shaped fan blades and turn the motor. Grip these blades with your fingers and "walk" them around. Turn one blade down, then grip the next one and turn it down. Keep turning until you feel the fan blades snap free.

Now reinstall the access panel and reconnect the power. Fill the detergent cup with citric acid crystals as you would with detergent but don't put any dishes in the machine. Run the dishwasher through a wash cycle. The citric acid crystals will dissolve the remaining scale on the seals.


To prevent this from happening again, you might try running the machine with citric acid after long periods of disuse.



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PBS' 'Trailside' invites viewers to watch less TV

PBS encourages couch potatoes to get out of their living rooms and into the wilderness in "Trailside: Make Your Own Adventure," an outdoors how-to series premiering this summer in most areas. Check local listings for specific dates and times.

According to John Viehman, the program's host and editor of Backpacker magazine, many people have already heard the call of the wild. Viehman estimates there are more than 22 million day hikers in the United States and nearly 12 million backpackers. Sales of mountain bikes and camping gear have steadily increased despite a sluggish economy, he says.

"It points toward an appreciation of the obvious and that's what's outside your doorstep," Viehman says. "We have so many national and state parks, you can pretty much do it anywhere. The outdoors is a great place to get away from all the distractions."

Viehman's weekly, 30-minute program is a teaching and motivational tool, not only urging viewers to enjoy outdoor activities, but encouraging safe and responsible ways to enjoy the environment while providing a historical background to the places the show visits; sort of a "This Old House" of the outdoors.

"We're not trying to hide the fact that this is a how-to show," Viehman says. "The whole notion of teaching somebody something is what we're trying to do, and, of course, have some fun and make it entertaining."

"Trailside" takes viewers mountain biking in Moab, Utah, sea kayaking in Mexico's Baja California, rock climbing in Joshua Tree, Calif., and wet weather camping in a Caribbean rain forest — and that's all in the first

month. Program producers have plans to eventually take the show to places such as Iceland and New Zealand.

Safety is a natural concern for a show that exposes viewers to extreme activities that could be dangerous. Not everyone is ready to challenge the Sea of Cortez in a kayak or plunge two miles down a dark cave.

Viehman says, "We do sessions on

self-rescue. We make sure people are aware of judgment and whether or not they should be doing some of this."

Viehman had not planned on being host of the show when he first got involved with the project. But after 20 years as an outdoors writer and advocate, producers knew he was the person they wanted.

"I describe myself as the AHB — Average Human Being. I'm not above taking a spill or two and I'm always anxious to learn new things," he says.

Although Viehman is experienced at most of the activities that "Trailside" asks him to do, the show has presented

Robards & 'Heidi' so far, so good

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Jason Robards is known for his evocative portrayals of such men of letters as writer Dashiell Hammett, newspaper editor Ben Bradlee and Abraham Lincoln.

But in "Heidi," the Disney Channel's new movie based on the classic children's story, the 70-year-old actor takes on a more physically challenging role.

"I do a lot of yelling over storms," Robards says wryly, in his deep, distinctive twang.

The four-hour film, debuting July 18 and 19 on the cable network, put him through his acting paces on location in the rugged Austrian Alps.

"We were filming up around 10,000 feet," Robards says in a telephone interview from his home in Connecticut. "The hardest part was going up in the morning. We were living at about 7,000 feet and we all had to go up - all this equipment, actors, technicians.

"I was gasping, but I made it. They have an oxygen truck around for tourists in the area. They fall over, I guess."

For the record, he adds, "I didn't have to use it."

Noley Thornton stars as the scrappy Heidi, in a performance that Robards lauds. He also has praise for co-star Jane Seymour, in a different turn as a coldly unattractive governess. Acclaimed actresses Patricia Neal and Sian Phillips also appear.

Robards, who read "Heidi" to his children when they were young, says the Disney version differs from the 1937 film that starred a very famous dimpled, curly-topped child star.

"I thought this was more true to the book than one Shirley Temple did, although I thought she was marvelous," he says.

Johanna Spyri's 19th-century novel about an orphan who struggles to find love, and a home, also was the basis for a 1968 TV version. That version on NBC became famous, or notorious, when the network started the film and cut off the closing minutes of a New York Jets-Oakland Raiders football game, marked by an amazing reversal of the game's outcome in those minutes.

The new TV movie was adapted from a story written by Jeanne Rosenberg, whose credits include the films "The Black Stallion" and "White Fang" - also adaptations of much-loved novels.

"What I had in my mind was the fluffier, brighter images of the 'Heidi' movies I had seen," Ms. Rosenberg says. "What I found in the book was a darker side and edgier tone."

"Something seemed to resonate in a modern way. Here's a little girl whose family was ripped out from under her. She was searching for a family, that center, that core, to hang it on."

Heidi's character also undergoes a bit of a film transformation, Ms. Rosenberg says.

"She couldn't simply be a passive, golden light that affected people, but she had to make her own stand," she says. "That's probably a difference in the way we see little girls today from the way Johanna Spyri saw girls."

For Robards, this wasn't his first brush with "Heidi."

"Oddly enough, I was coincidentally involved with it back in the '50s

when I dubbed a foreign film version. I was dubbing films for a living."

Although only about 30, Robards was hired to re-create the character of the grandfather in English.

"I put on one of those voices," he says, dropping into a shaky-voiced parody of a crotchety older man. "I was good at it, so they hired me for three or four films - 50 bucks a picture."

His career, of course, soared, earning him Oscar, Tony and Emmy awards.

Robards debuted on Broadway in 1956 with Eugene O'Neill's "The Iceman Cometh." He also was featured in a landmark 1973 production of the playwright's "A Moon for the Misbegotten."

He etched indelible renderings of the mystery writer Hammett in "Julia" and Washington Post editor Bradlee in "All the President's Men."

He's played Lincoln more than once for TV, and Twain in "Mark Twain and Me," a Disney Channel film about the writer's friendship with an 11-year-old girl in the last year of his life.

In "Heidi," he again shares the screen with a young co-star. Robards, father of six children and grandfather of three, has never needed W.C. Fields' warning about avoiding scene-stealing child actors.

"I've only had the most wonderful luck with children," Robards says.

Why?

Their parents brought them up right," he quips.

Young actors "are very true to a lot of things that one might overlook," he continues. "They're very straightforward. It helps me. I just follow right along with how they're going."

"So far, so good."

"My family comes first now. If you don't make your life happy and enjoy your family, then the career means nothing," Tylo says.

Improvised 'Chantilly Lace' a true women's film

Last March, 1992 was declared the "Year of Women" at the Academy Awards presentation, a pronouncement many actresses still find laughable owing to the paucity of leading roles for women in film. Yet it seems that in the midst of every famine someone has a feast, and in this case it is a plum project served to seven fortunate femmes. "Chantilly Lace," debuting Sunday, July 18, on Showtime, is noteworthy not only as one of the few true "women's films," but also for the fact that it was almost totally improvised.

Executive producer/director Linda Yellen is happy with the results. "Nothing that I could have written could compare to when seven people with talent and imagination bring their own voices to characters that are very carefully delineated. It's just magical." In this gathering and a subsequent bachelorette party, the viewer sits in as the friends share their frustrations and revelations. A candid, home movie feeling is provided through the improvised dialogue and the consistent use of annoying hand-held camera shots. Not surprisingly, most of the girl talk is about sex — even Maggie the nun joins that conversation with disclosures that some viewers may find offensive.

The final scene draws six of the characters together to watch the goodbyecape tape of the seventh, who is dead. "We shot the first two parts not knowing who was going to be dead in the third part," Williams says. "We had to draw pieces of paper to find out who was going to be dead."

The improvisational nature of "Chantilly Lace" succeeds in approximating reality, but not all reality is engaging.

With his shiny vest, bushy beard and beady eyes peeking from under a giant hat, Charlie Daniels looks almost cartoonish while serving as host of a special children's edition of "American Music Shop." Smith could take or leave Hollywood, but entertaining film legacy survives

June marked the sad passing of Alexis Smith, after a brief battle with cancer. After roles in Canadian summer stock, Smith came to California to attend college. She was seen in a school production by a Warner Bros. talent scout and was soon signed to a contract, making her movie debut in 1940's "The Lady With Red Hair."

Elegant and sophisticated, Smith was most effective in romantic or suspenseful films. But career was never that important to her, and in 1959, Smith retired from acting. She made a brief comeback in the '70s with a triumphant Broadway turn in "Follies" and a handful of films.

"The Two Mrs. Carrolls" (1947)

Humphrey Bogart stars as Geoffrey Carroll, a London-based artist who murders his wife after finding a new love (Barbara Stanwyck) while vacationing in Scotland. All is well until pretty Cecily (Smith) catches his eye and he plans to use the old poisoning scheme once again. Adapted from

Martin Vale's Broadway hit, the film is saved from seeming stagey by the acting and Peter Godfrey's taut direction. Franz Waxman wrote the score.

"Split Second" (1953)

Two cold-hearted convicts (Stephen McNally, Paul Kelly) escape from a Nevada prison and hide out in an abandoned building within an atomic testing range. With them are six hostages, including a doctor, his wife (Robert Paige, Smith) and a reporter (Keith Andes) sent to cover the prison break. As the long night passes and tempers flare, the crooks and captives interact in surprising ways. Adding to the tension is the fact, known only to McNally, that a test bomb is scheduled for detonation at 6 the next morning.

"Sleeping Tiger" (1954)

A strange love triangle develops between a criminal (Dirk Bogarde) the psychiatrist (Alexander Knox) who saves him from prison in order to test his theories of rehabilitation, and the doctor's repressed wife (Smith). Joseph Losey directs with real flair.
