



## Emily may hit coast by Tuesday

MIAMI (AP) - Hurricane Emily picked up strength as it moved over the Atlantic early Saturday, and forecasters predicted it could hit the southeastern United States by early next week.

The storm - about 900 miles east of Florida and 400 miles south of Bermuda early today - was packing winds near 80 mph.

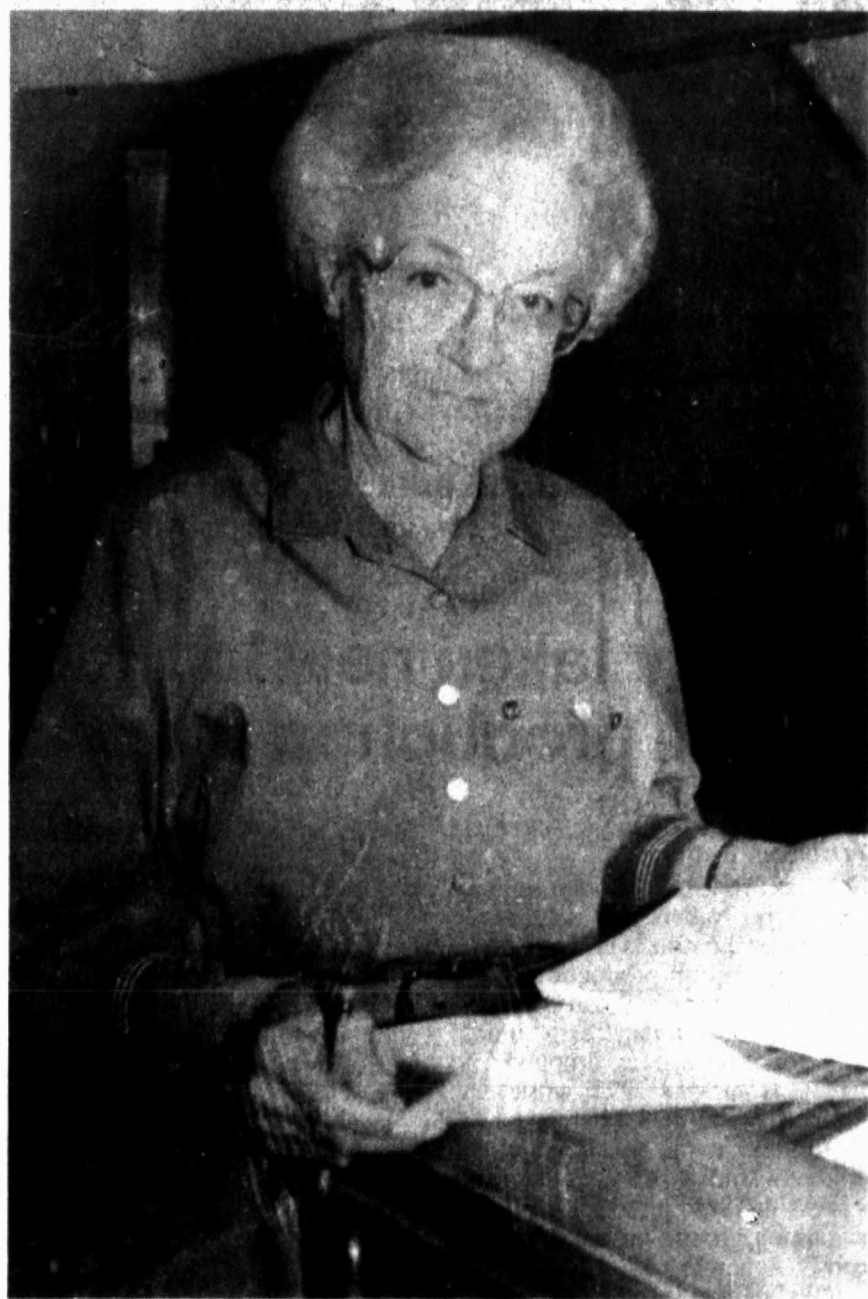
"We are forecasting a gradual strengthening to a minimal Category 3 hurricane," meaning sustained winds of more than 111 mph, forecaster Chris Burr said.

Hurricane Andrew, which devastated South Florida a year ago, was a Category 4 hurricane, with sustained winds of 145 mph.

While it was impossible to give the exact destination, residents from Florida to the Carolinas were preparing for foul weather.

The storm was upgraded Friday evening from a tropical storm to a hurricane when it reached the required wind speed of 74 mph. The storm had first grown to a hurricane Thursday, but lost its muscle later the same day and slipped back to tropical storm strength.

At its speed early Saturday, the storm could hit land sometime Tuesday anywhere from the southern tip of Florida to Cape Hatteras, N.C.

## Dean of county's elected officials won't run again

When Vesta Mae Nunley ran for, and was elected to, the office of Deaf Smith County attorney in 1970, she had no way of knowing that more than 20 years later she'd still hold the position.

But, the "dean" of Deaf Smith elected officials has decided she won't make another race for the job.

"I won't run again," said Nunley recently. Which means, of course, that when the month-long filing period for public office begins in December, her name will be missing from the list of candidates seeking office in 1994 elections.

But several other officials will be subject to the vote of the citizens of Deaf Smith County, including County Judge Tom Simons, County Clerk David Ruland, Justice of the Peace Johnnie Turrentine, Commissioners Lupe Chavez of Precinct 2 and Johnny Latham of Precinct 4, Criminal District Attorney Roland Saul and District Clerk Lola Faye Veazey, as well as Judge David Wesley Gulley of the 222nd Judicial District which includes Deaf Smith and Oldham Counties.

While Nunley is the elected official with the longest tenure in the Deaf Smith County courthouse, beginning in January 1971, Veazey has an edge in total time.

Veazey went to work in the district clerk's office in June 1970 and was appointed to fill a vacancy on Oct. 1, 1971, won election to the unexpired term in 1972 and has served continuously since that time.

While some counties in Texas have chosen to eliminate the treasurer's office, Deaf Smith is one that apparently has never considered such a move.

Because of the structure of the county's operation, the treasurer performs more than a financial record-keeping function.

"We keep all the county's personnel records; coordinate insurance benefits, workers' compensation and unemployment; handle payroll, file IRS reports and keep a record of all the county's monies," pointed out Nunley. Her able deputy for the last 11 years is Nan Rogers.

A discrimination lawsuit some years ago put Deaf Smith County under a federal court order on employment practices. A centralized personnel office was placed under the purview of the treasurer.

"All applications for jobs have to be made with me," Nunley pointed out. The office or agency seeking a new employee then does interviewing and hiring.

Changing times have brought new approaches to doing the work of the county treasurer, too.

"We do most of the records on computer now, instead of by hand," says Nunley.

But with a sly grin, she admits that she and her deputy still do some work by hand, saying, "I just don't trust the computer sometimes."

Although she was born in Curry County, N.M., Vesta Mae Nunley came to Hereford with her parents before she was a year old. They lived in town, then moved to Westway where her father, Joe Landers, farmed.

Nunley went to West Texas State Teachers College after finishing high school and earned a teaching certificate, which allowed her to begin a career in education.

"I taught English and math at Friona Junior High, and later at Westway and Summerfield," she observed. Nunley dropped fulltime teaching, though, to bring up her family, but kept her finger in by substituting in schools. She also did private bookkeeping.

"I didn't work fulltime until my youngest was in fourth grade," she said. She and her husband, W.B. Nunley, have two sons, Ronnie of Hereford and Rick of Amarillo, and a daughter, Jackie McNeese of Houston, as well as four grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

She remembers vividly when the idea of seeking public office first was put in her head.

"Velma Hodges had been treasurer for 30 years and ran an ad in the paper saying she wouldn't run again," Nunley explained.

"When my husband saw the ad, he said, 'you ought to run for it,' so I did," she laughed.

At the time, the couple was operating a store and cafe at Westway.

Nunley had two opponents in the Democratic primary in 1970 and won the office in a runoff.

"I went from cooking hamburgers to taking care of the county's money," she said.

In the years since she took office, Nunley said, there's no way to describe "how big county government has become."

Under her watchful eye are several accounts that must be kept up-to-date. And, the increase in state and federal regulations has placed additional burden on county governments, especially in preparing reports.

Nunley observed her 69th birthday on Aug. 11. She can't remember when she took off a week for the pure joy of taking a vacation.

"It will be nice to take a whole week's vacation," she said.

One of her goals when she leaves public office is to spend time on interests that haven't had much attention in recent years.

"I want to do some sewing for my twin great-granddaughters, for one thing, and I've always enjoyed crafts so I'd like to do that more," said Nunley.

"I hope I haven't hidden my talent under a bushel so long that I can't get it out," she continued.

In her future, she sees some traveling. She expects, also, to look for a good volunteer "job."

Nunley has served with four county judges and commissioners she hasn't counted.

"I'm grateful to the judges and commissioners who have been so patient with me," she said.

"I remember the first judge I served under, Hank Williams. He gave me some good advice. 'If you ever let anyone talk you into anything you think may not be right, remember you'll be left standing at the wall and they walk away.' My own integrity has been my main guideline."

## Sheriff 'can't discuss' tip on break in Baby Jane case

Deaf Smith County Sheriff Joe C. Brown had no comment Saturday morning to a rumor that authorities are closing in on the suspected mother of a child left abandoned in a garbage incinerator earlier this year.

"At this time we can't discuss it," Brown to **The Hereford Brand** Friday night when asked if an all-points bulletin had been issued for the woman. Saturday morning, the sheriff said there was no change in the situation.

The case began on the morning of March 18, when workers at Hutto Veterinary Hospital north of town discovered an hours-old child dumped in their incinerator pit.

The child -- dubbed Baby Ashley

by hospital workers at Deaf Smith General Hospital -- was estimated to have been two to three hours old when she was dumped in the trash pit. She weighed 4 pounds 7 ounces at birth.

The day after she was located, custody of the newborn was turned over to the state as sheriff's department investigators began searching for the mother of the child.

Temporary custody of the child remained with the state while deputies continued their investigation.

However, on July 27, 222nd District Judge David Wesley Gulley ruled that the rights of the parents would be terminated and conservatorship placed with the Texas Department

of Protective and Regulatory Services.

The ruling has paved the way for someone to adopt Ashley, who was referred to in court documents as Deaf Smith Baby Jane.

Department officials have refused to divulge any information about the child's whereabouts since they were given custody of her on March 19.

Officials have only said they she was not placed in a Deaf Smith County foster home.

## Litigation group sues firms resisting ADA

AUSTIN (AP) - One of every eight businesses contacted by a disability rights group for violations of the Americans with Disabilities Act is sued by the group for refusing to conform to meet the standards, an attorney said.

"It's certainly never been our desire to go out and find businesses to sue," said Geoffrey Courtney, assistant to the director of the Advocacy Inc. ADA litigation campaign.

"Either through their unresponsiveness or their flat out refusal, (they) have left us with no choice but to sue them," Courtney said.

As part of its summer-long drive to make businesses and other facilities accessible to the disabled, the group filed six more lawsuits this week.

The organization has sued a total of 45 businesses and other groups since June 10, Courtney said.

Letters of demand are written to businesses or groups not complying with the regulations before lawsuits are filed, he said.

Courtney said the group was suing Kolter Elementary School of Houston because the school was inaccessible to one student who uses a wheelchair.

The school lacked a loading and drop-off zone for the disabled and curb cuts, and it had heavy exterior doors and inaccessible bathrooms, he said.

"The elementary school is refusing to comply with access

guidelines," he said. "The building itself is not wheelchair accessible and so the student cannot get through the building or enjoy the use of the grounds."

Jaime de la Isla, associate superintendent for the Houston Independent School District, said the district had not been notified of the lawsuit.

"Our legal department is not aware of the lawsuit," de la Isla said. "I think the school district is going to be complying with all laws. I don't know where we are not in compliance."

Courtney said the suit seeks to compel the school to begin taking steps to comply with the ADA regulations.

Advocacy, Inc. also sued a restaurant and a convenience store in Corpus Christi.

J.P. Jordan, owner of Crystal Confectionery Restaurant and Bar, said he plans to knock down a wall and remodel the restaurant to make it accessible to the disabled.

"I've already rectified the problem," Jordan said. "It was just a misunderstanding."

"We have never been sued before on any ADA issue," said Judy States, a spokeswoman for Circle K convenience stores.

"We've always done everything necessary to comply with the act," Ms. States said.

On Monday, the advocacy group sued three Wendy's Old Fashioned Hamburgers restaurants in El Paso.

## Officials seek release of 113 UN personnel

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) - U.N. officials were trying Saturday to negotiate the release of 113 U.N. personnel trapped in Mostar by desperate Muslims who fear their departure would lead to renewed Croat attacks.

Brig. Gen. Luis Felyu, the Spanish deputy commander of U.N. forces in Bosnia, went to Medjugorje, just south of Mostar, to discuss the three-day-old crisis with local leaders, said a U.N. spokesman in Zagreb, Croatia.

Cmdr. Ideshald Van Biesebroek, a U.N. spokesman in Sarajevo, said the meeting, scheduled Saturday night, would be attended by Rasim Delic, commander of the Muslim-led government forces, and Bosnian Croat military chief Milivoje Petkovic.

The trapped relief workers and military observers were with a convoy that entered Mostar on Thursday with 175 tons of aid for 55,000 besieged Muslims on the east side of the southwestern Bosnian town.

Thousands of exhausted and bone-thin people mobbed the convoy upon its arrival.

But after the supplies were distributed, local people and soldiers blocked the path out of the city with

sit-ins and parked trucks, fearing their Croat besiegers would renew heavy shelling once the U.N. shield was gone.

Van Biesebroek said a Croat-Muslim truce reached on Thursday in the Mostar area was generally holding, with only sporadic small arms and mortar fire observed.

But heavy fighting was reported in the central Bosnian town of Gornji Vakuf, where Van Biesebroek said government forces were attacking Croat positions with small arms, machine guns, mortars and rocket launchers.

Croats and Muslims, once allied against Bosnia's Serbs, have fought bitterly in recent months over contested territory, mostly in central Bosnia and around Mostar, which the Croats want as the capital of a future Bosnian Croat state.

Leaders of all three sides were meeting today with their assemblies to discuss a peace plan proposed last week in Geneva that would divide the republic into three ethnic states.

The proposal would give the Muslim-led government, which now holds only about 10 percent of Bosnia, 31 percent of the republic.

Serbs would get 52 percent - down from the 70 percent of Bosnia they now control - and Croats 17 percent.

## Oil and gas industry takes new look at natural gas as oil production drops

**DALLAS (AP)** - When Texas' oil industry was in its infancy around the turn of the century, drillers had to burn off an annoying substance they saw as useless after it had pushed the precious crude to the surface.

That substance was natural gas. Although it has been decades since the fuel was burnt as a worthless nuisance, many in the industry are hopeful that natural gas now is poised to come on stronger than ever before.

While domestic oil production has dropped to its lowest level in 35 years and imports this summer have hit their highest ever, gas - sustained by higher prices - has been making gains.

"There used to be a saying in the oil and gas industry: 'Find gas three times and you're fired,'" said Charlotte LeGates, spokeswoman for the Natural Gas Supply Association, a Washington-based group that represents major domestic gas producers.

"We've always called ourselves an oil state. In fact, increasingly, to some extent, we're a gas state."

Texas is both the nation's largest consumer and supplier of natural gas. The state produces about a quarter of the total U.S. natural gas supply and has more than a fifth of the nation's reserves, said Brian Schaible, spokesman for the Texas Railroad Commission.

Domestic oil reserves are being increasingly played out, while experts believe a tremendous natural gas base remains. For that reason and because they say they are frustrated by U.S. government regulations and high costs at home, major oil companies have moved many of their oil operations overseas and turned more of their domestic exploration activities to natural gas.

Nationwide, average domestic daily production of crude oil is down 5.5 percent so far this year, while natural gas liquids have grown by 4.2

percent, according to the American Petroleum Institute.

Texas Railroad Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers said earlier this month that the state is on a course to see its lowest oil production in 50 years. Preliminary Railroad Commission figures show that Texas' crude oil production in May dropped 5.5 percent from May 1992, while gas production was up 3.7 percent.

"It looks to me as though we're looking at kind of a slow evolutionary process that's going to see gas kind of gaining ground but no dramatic leaps," Schaible said.

"We've had production going down in oil since 1972," he said. "Gas, on the other hand, has been coming on strong in the last couple of years."

Ms. LeGates said factors helping gas include more stable prices so far this year and new technology, especially three-dimensional seismic techniques, which help each well find more gas.

Victor Burk, a partner with Arthur Andersen & Co. in Houston, said he sees signs that industry spending will increase, driven by natural gas exploration.

"The oil and gas industry, at least the upstream industry, may be turning around after a 10-year recession, which could mean more jobs for the oilfield service and supply sector of the industry," Burk said. "It's probably the most optimistic period that I've seen in the exploration and production business in several years."

"The most opportunity for exploration and development here in the U.S. rests with natural gas as opposed to oil. Natural gas prices have been relatively strong now for several months, and I think that supply and demand for natural gas are essentially in balance now," Burk said.

George Mitchell, chairman of The Woodlands, Texas-based Mitchell

Energy, said his company expects to boost its drilling budget by 40 percent this year.

"We're increasing our budget because of gas, not oil. We are drilling oil wells too, to some extent, but gas is the best thing that we've got going for us," Mitchell said.

However, others warn that the industry remains deeply troubled.

"The picture is potentially very bright for gas. It is environmentally benign, it is the clean-burning fuel of the future," said Judy Leon, spokeswoman for the Independent Petroleum Association of America.

But, she said, unstable prices, falling production and spiraling imports reflect an overall industry crisis.

"Those three things taken together paint a very, very dangerous picture for the domestic producing industry, both in terms of oil and gas, because you have to look at the whole extraction picture," Ms. Leon said.

"The bottom line is, we'd like to see expansion in drilling for both oil and natural gas because we need to be producing more energy here period as opposed to importing it."

## Edward D. Jones & Co. names grant recipients for Main St. renewal efforts

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# Hundreds of new laws to take effect in Texas

AUSTIN (AP) - From regulating tattooists to paying for state government, much of the 1993 Legislature's work will take effect this week.

More than 1,000 bills were passed during the regular legislative session that ran from Jan. 12 through May 31. Of those, hundreds take effect Aug. 30 and Sept. 1, which is the start of the new fiscal year.

The state's \$70.1 billion appropriations bill kicks in to fund government for the next two years. The budget is an 11 percent increase over the last two-year spending plan.

Aside from appropriations, many pieces of legislation will touch upon the lives of Texans - from the locks on their doors to champagne brunches.

And with the start of the school year comes a law that increases the fines for driving past a school bus that is flashing warning lights while loading or unloading students. Drivers who pass a school bus that has its red warning lights on could be fined from \$200 to \$1,000 per offense. That's up from a range of \$50 to \$200.

The Legislature passed numerous

laws to increase protection of children, including making the murder of a child under the age of 6 a capital offense; increasing the availability of childhood immunizations, and suspending the driver's license of a minor caught driving drunk.

On the environmental front, pumping from the Edwards Aquifer, the primary water source for San Antonio, will be regulated by a nine-member board. The law limits annual withdrawals from the aquifer to 450,000 acre feet of water per year through 1997, and then 400,000 acre feet starting in 2008.

The compact that would allow Texas to receive low-level radioactive waste from Maine and Vermont takes effect. Under the proposal, Texas will receive \$25 million each from the two states to deposit their waste in Hudspeith County in far West Texas. But the plan is at best years from implementation because it requires adoption in Maine, Vermont, and then Congress.

Another law requires tattooists to get state licenses and comply with safety standards.

Chris Trevino, an Austin tattooist who is co-owner of Perfection Art, said he welcomes the regulation. "A

lot of people are tattooing out of their houses. I call them shade-tree tattooists. We need to know what kind of sterilization they might use."

All new rental property must have security devices, such as keyless deadbolts, peepholes, and additional locking devices on sliding glass doors. Existing rental units must comply with the law by Jan. 1, 1995.

And the noon, Sunday start for restaurants to sell alcoholic beverages has been moved to 10 a.m., paving the way for champagne brunches.

Other new laws taking effect this week will include:

**CRIMINAL JUSTICE**  
- Increase from 35 years to 40 years the minimum number of years an inmate must serve in prison who was sentenced to life in prison on a capital murder charge.

- Increase the minimum number of years an inmate who is convicted of a violent crime in which a weapon was used before they can be considered for parole. The old standard was 15 years. The new standard is 20 years.

- Increase punishment for drug or weapon violations around schools or other places that children frequent.

- Increase the punishment for all crimes motivated by bias or prejudice to the next highest category of offense, except in the case of a first-degree felony, which is not enhanced but is made ineligible for probation.

- Establish court fees that go toward courthouse security.

- Allow tents to house inmates for work, wilderness, forestry or boot camps.

**HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES**

- Set up a system to record birth defects. This was prompted by the high number of babies born with abnormalities, especially in South Texas.

- Establish reforms of private psychiatric hospital industry.

**BUSINESS**  
- Set up a program to make health insurance more available to small employers.

- Limit the liability of manufacturers and sellers for damages caused by their products.

- Decrease trucking regulations.  
- Phase out the authority of a three-member board that oversees the Texas Department of Insurance and placing that authority in the hands of a single commissioner.

- Allow a court to dismiss a case if it finds that it would be more properly heard in a court outside the state.

- Allow certain pubs to brew their own beer.

**ENVIRONMENT**

- Require the Railroad Commission to adopt and enforce safety standards for the storage of hazardous liquids in salt domes, and the underground storage of natural gas.

- Provide \$120 million to pay for the cleanup of leaking underground storage tanks.

- Cap the liability for damages to natural resources due to oil spill contamination.

**MISCELLANEOUS**

- Prohibit school districts from sponsoring extracurricular activities at athletic clubs that deny anyone use of equipment because of race, color,

religion, creed, national origin or sex.

- Require the Texas Department of Agriculture to certify producers, distributors and processors of organic food and fiber.

- Allow bounties on any animal that is not listed on a state or federal endangered species list.

- Allow a winery to give out promotional bottles of wine in a civic or convention center.

- Give people who have decided to go back to college after a 10-year absence a "fresh start" by, if they choose to, omitting their grade point average.

- Put a notice on drivers' licenses indicating that a directive has been filed with a physician on whether life-sustaining systems should be withheld.

- Require boards or commissions of a city's governing body and committees to comply with the Open Meetings Act.

- Allow motorcycles to use high-occupancy vehicle lanes on highways.

**ADMINISTRATIVE**

- Merge the Texas Water Commission and Texas Air Control Board into the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, which will be one of the largest environmental agencies in the nation with 3,000 employees.

Local governmental agencies throughout the state routinely ignore the state's open records and open meeting laws, an investigation by The Dallas Morning News reported recently.

The report comes as no surprise to The Brand and many newspapers all around the state. Many newspapers complain that local agencies often violate the Open Meetings Act--most often in discussing business in closed sessions which is not allowed under the Act.

Although violations of the Open Records Act carry a potential six-month jail term and a \$1,000 fine, the Dallas paper said it could find no record of convictions of public officials in the 20-year history of the law. The lack of criminal prosecutions, according to lawyers who practice First Amendment law, indicates the low regard many governmental officials have for the Open Records Act.

Violations of the Open Meeting Act have been prosecuted, but fines--not less than \$100 nor more than \$500--and jail sentences--not less than one month or more than six--are few and lightly applied. In many cases, the district attorney is reluctant to file charges against other elected officials.

In some cases, local governments don't check the law or do not follow the intent of the law--sometimes even on the advice of their attorneys. One lawyer, an expert on First Amendment law, says many reporters know more about the open meeting law than most lawyers.

The two acts are cornerstone laws to ensure Texans' access to their state and local government. Noting that government "is the servant of the people and not the master of them," the records law states:

"The people, in delegating authority, do not give their public servants the right to decide what is good for the people to know and what is not good for them to know. The people insist on remaining informed so that they may retain control over the instruments they have created."

While the law historically has been most widely used by the media, the law grants the same access to every individual who chooses to use it.

The Open Meetings Act provides that every regular, special or called meeting or session of every governmental body shall be open to the public. A notice of the date, time, place and agenda of each meeting is required to be posted at least 72 hours preceding the meeting.

The governing body shall prepare and retain minutes or make a tape recording of each meeting. The minutes shall state the subject matter, indicate each vote, decision or other action taken by the body. The minutes are public records and shall be made available for public inspection and copying on request.

Any discussion on a subject not on the posted agenda shall be limited to a proposal to place such subject on the agenda for a subsequent meeting. The agency is also required to keep a certified agenda of the proceedings of a closed meeting. This record can be inspected by a district judge if litigation has been initiated involving an alleged violation of the Act.

Closed or executive meetings or authorized for specific purposes, but a quorum of the governmental body must first convene in open session and the presiding officer must publicly announce that a closed session will be held and identify the subject which qualifies under the act.

Matters for which executive sessions are authorized include: discussion with respect to the purchase, lease, exchange, or value of real property, negotiated contracts for prospective gifts or donations to the state or governmental body, when such discussion would have a detrimental effect on the negotiating position of the body; for consultation with the governmental bodies' attorney with respect to pending or contemplated litigation, or settlement offers; cases involving the appointment, employment, evaluation, reassignment, duties, discipline, or dismissal of a public officer or employee or to hear complaints or charges against such officer or employee, unless such officer or employee requests a public hearing; and, for school boards, cases involving discipline of public school children unless an open hearing is requested in writing by a parent or guardian of the child.

## Editorials from around the state

Here is a sampling of editorial opinion from Texas newspapers:

Aug. 19

**The Lufkin Daily News on Gary Graham's Appeal For Hearing:** ... It's those slow wheels of justice again, but, in this case, it's time someone applied some grease. Twelve years ago a jury sentenced Graham to death by lethal injection. A year later he pleaded guilty to 10 similar robberies. In two, victims were shot, and a woman was raped in a third.

His conviction and death sentence were affirmed in 1984. A second appeal was denied in 1988.

Then beginning this year, no fewer than 15 decisions were made collectively by the parole board, the governor and a few courts. He's had two Supreme Court rulings against him since January.

On Aug. 16 the Court of Appeals voted 5-4 to affirm a stay of execution requested a few days prior, on a motion by Texas Attorney General Dan Morales and Harris County District Attorney John B. Holmes. Graham's attorneys say at least 10 new witnesses can prove he's innocent.

Anyone given the death penalty is entitled to a review by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals. Anyone facing that kind of punishment is entitled to request a stay. Allowing an inmate two or three years to find further evidence to prove his innocence is understandable. But 12 years? These appeals to state and federal courts and to governors are taking much too long.

Twelve years is too long to decide whether Graham is innocent or guilty. His execution has been postponed four times, the last just hours before his scheduled death. That's more emotional havoc that an innocent man deserves. If he's guilty, then we've wasted time and taxpayer money.

Gary Graham's new evidence should be heard, but, at the same time, we should not take chances with death-penalty convictions. Reviews should be thorough, but the courts could move faster in making the final decision.

**The Monitor (McAllen) on proposals to restrict violence on television:** The kindest reading of current federal attempts to bring the hammer down on a supposed epidemic of TV violence is that Congress, scared stiff by juvenile crime, will grab onto even the most tenuous evidence to lay blame.

A less kind interpretation is they simply want to tell us what to watch. Either way, pending legislation in the House and the Senate to regulate TV violence poses an infringement not only on the freedom of expression, but also on parents' role as the rightful arbiters of their children's entertainment ...

Rep. Edward Markey, D-Mass., chairman of the House telecommunications subcommittee, introduced a bill that actually would require television sets to carry computer chips that would block violent programming ...

In private enterprise wants to offer families a compelling product, like Markey's computer chip, that would screen programming of their choosing, great. That, after all, is the strength and rightful role of the free market.

But to take such powers away and vest them in government flouts both freedom and common sense. After all, parents not only have the power to choose what their children watch - but also to turn off the TV.

**Abilene Reporter-News on "Capital for a Day" program:**

A few months back, Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry raised some eyebrows when he suggested moving the department away from Austin.

Perry thought it would be helpful for his crew to leave the insular atmosphere of the capital behind and get closer to the real people he was supposed to be serving.

We thought that was a valuable idea. And now it appears others have picked up on it, if not exactly in the form Perry envisioned.

Gov. Ann Richards says her "Capital for a Day" program will bring state government to county courthouses throughout Texas, as heads of agencies and elected officials - including the governor - will be on hand to answer questions from local citizens. ...

The idea is a good one. State leaders need to get away from Austin, where government is the main industry, and listen to what people have to say in other parts of the state. The priorities may be very different.

**San Antonio Express-News on schools and AIDS prevention:**

The National AIDS Commission earlier this month said that an improved program of prevention and education could cut in half the fatal disease's spread in the United States.

But, the commission contended, partisan politics and ideology have kept that from happening. This has been particularly true of AIDS-education efforts in the nation's schools. ...

Now, the research data needed to formulate an effective AIDS-education and prevention effort for American teen-agers are finally available. This information supports the AIDS commission's conclusion and underscores the need to remove all irrelevant considerations from planning AIDS-education programs. ...

School officials dare not ignore this study. It and the AIDS commission's report clearly tell them they have no good excuse to base sex-education programs on ideological considerations - if they truly care about the welfare of their young charges.

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## SPS president says company is open to settle pending rate case

Conferences between Southwestern Public Service and city officials in the Texas service area have been held to brief cities on the company's position in a rate case due to go to a hearing Tuesday.  
 The president of the electric service company, Coyt Webb, reported that SPS "remains open to settling this case," especially since the alternative is a "fully litigated case lasting for months."

In a prepared statement, Webb said that the company's earnings in 1992 fell to a five-year-low and "we won't do much better this year."  
 The Public Utility Commission of Texas initiated a rate review in October 1992. The company has provided answers to more than 2,100 questions submitted by regulators and intervenors, Webb said.  
 "We have acknowledged that some reduction in electric rates may result

as a reflection of today's lower interest rates," he said. However, he noted that the company disagrees with the level being proposed.  
 SPS has prepared more than 20,000 pages of information and data for the hearing in Austin, Webb said.

Hereford's varsity football squad showed a world of improvement over one week at a scrimmage between the Herd and Amarillo High Friday in Whiteface Stadium.

The Herd played noticeably better than it did in the previous Friday's scrimmage in Plainview. Both the offense and the defense went through stretches where they played very well, and the players acted like they knew it.

Coach Danny Haney knew it, too. "We showed improvement over the last week--in execution, our routes, throwing the ball--it's looking lots better," Haney said. "Our mistakes were few and far between, compared to last week."

Amarillo High outscored Hereford slightly in each phase of the scrimmage (the Plainview total was 10-0), but there were plenty of signs of the Herd's improvement.

Hereford's first-team offense did nothing in its first set of plays, but the second team was able to move the ball in the second set. Quarterback Michael Brown finally scored for the Herd when he scooped up a Hereford fumble and ran it 30 yards to the goal. Brown hooked up with tight end Josh Tice for a 30 yard pass, then with tailback Marquise Brown for a 40-yard screen pass which would have been a touchdown if not for a penalty.

In Hereford's third offensive set, Elias Reyna completed consecutive passes to Hayden Andrews for 20

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## Braves blow chance to move in on Giants

The Atlanta Braves spent much of their game against Chicago looking at the scoreboard. After Derrick May batted in the seventh inning, they looked away.

May hit reliever Mike Stanton's first pitch for a grand slam Friday night as the visiting Cubs shocked Atlanta 9-7 in the Braves' first game since their three-game sweep at San Francisco this week.

A few minutes after the Braves' score was final, the Giants lost 7-4 to the Marlins at Miami to remain 4 1/2 games ahead of Atlanta.

The Braves led 6-4 entering the seventh when reliever Mark Wohlers walked Willie Wilson with one out and Dwight Smith singled. Ryne Sandberg then reached on Fred McGriff's throwing error, with Wilson scoring.

Wohlers (5-1) walked Mark Grace intentionally to load the bases, bringing up May, and Stanton relieved. May hit the first pitch deep into right field seats, his 10th of the season and first career grand slam.

Shawn Boskie (4-3) pitched three scoreless innings for the victory and Jose Bautista worked a shaky ninth inning for his second save, allowing a run.

The Braves scored four runs in the final inning off Mike Harkey, including McGriff's three-run homer. It was McGriff's 31st of the season, and third in two games. David Justice hit his 33rd homer in the third.

At Joe Robbie Stadium, Orestes Destrade hit two homers and drove in six runs for the Marlins against San Francisco. John Burkett (18-6) lasted just 4 1-3 innings against Florida, allowing nine hits and six runs, including Destrade's three-run homer in the fifth.

Pat Rapp (2-4) was the winner. Elsewhere in the NL it was Cincinnati 8, Philadelphia 5; Montreal 3, Houston 1; New York 3, Colorado 2; San Diego 10, Pittsburgh 6; and St. Louis 3, Los Angeles 2 in 10 innings.

In the American League it was Seattle 7, Toronto 6; Cleveland 9, New York 2; Boston 5, Kansas City 0; Texas 5, Baltimore 4; and Detroit 13, Oakland 4. There were two doubleheaders Friday: Milwaukee swept California, 7-6 and 4-3; and Minnesota and Chicago split, with the White Sox winning the first game 7-3 and the Twins taking the second 7-2.

Baltimore pitcher John O'Donoghue missed a throw for an error, allowing two runners to score in the seventh inning as Texas rallied at home.

The Rangers loaded the bases with two outs in the seventh against Todd Frohwirth (6-7). O'Donoghue relieved and Rafael Palmeiro hit a hard grounder that glanced off the glove of first baseman David Segui and bounced to second baseman Harold Reynolds. Reynolds' throw beat Palmeiro, but O'Donoghue missed the ball and it rolled into the dugout.

yards and to Mark Kuper for eight. On the third play, Marquise Brown scored on a 42-yard reverse.

Hereford's defense meanwhile had given up three touchdowns in two sessions: a 59-yard run and a 41-yard pass and run in the first set, and a short run after a sustained drive in the second set.

In Amarillo's third offensive set, though, the Herd defense stiffened, stopping two Sandie drives, including one that reached inside the Hereford 15-yard line. Amarillo didn't score in its fourth offensive set, either, and scored once each in the fifth and sixth sets on runs of 55 and 70 yards.

"They (the Hereford defense) started doing what they're supposed to individually, and that made them play better as a team," Haney said. "They started to realize what they were doing and started playing like they were supposed to."

About the big plays which accounted for four of Amarillo's five scores, Haney said: "Big plays are usually the results of missed assignments. Every defense is designed to stop the offense, and every offense is designed to score. When you have breakdowns, things go awry, and that's what happened (in those cases). It's certainly nothing you can't fix."

Hereford didn't score in its last three sets, but it did move the ball with some success. In the sixth and final set, Hereford moved into

Amarillo territory and converted twice on fourth down situations before running out of plays at the Sandie 11-yard line.

Neither team had any success during the two-minute drill, and in the goalline drill, Hereford scored three times out of ten plays and Amarillo scored six times, but gave up two fumbles in ten plays.

The scrimmage concluded with one regulation quarter. Amarillo won 14-0, scoring first on a one-yard run after four consecutive runs of 12 or more yards. The second score came on a 70-yard interception return; Herd QB Elias Reyna was off-balance and under pressure and threw the ball straight to a Sandie lineman.

Hereford outgained Amarillo 98 yards to 85. Hereford gained 42 yards through the air--most on a beautiful throw by Reyna and catch by Hayden Andrews that went for 30 yards. Marquise Brown accounted for 41 of Hereford's 56 rushing yards.

Reyna had one other interception, on a desperation throw in the final seconds.

Haney seemed pleased by the improvement.

"This raises your spirits and gets you ready for the first game, gets you in shape for the first game," Haney said adding that Hereford suffered no injuries.

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# Oilers have more talent than Steelers

The Houston Oilers were last year's fashionable pick in the AFC Central and the conference overall. They proceeded to lose their opener at home to the Steelers, also lost at Pittsburgh and kissed the division title goodbye.

Victories in their final two games, including a 27-3 decision over the Bills, got them a wild-card spot and a trip to Buffalo, where the Oilers staged one of the colossal flops ever, blowing a 32-point third-quarter lead.

That should be enough to label the Oilers underachievers and also-rans. So why are we picking them to win the division?

Simple: the Oilers have more talent than the Steelers. The Browns and Bengals aren't factors.

The playoff collapse against Buffalo can't be erased and could be the single biggest factor working against the Oilers this season.

"It was probably the most devastating day of my pro career in football," says owner Bud Adams, who founded the Oilers in 1959. "It's going to be a hard one for us to overcome."

Adds Warren Moon, still a premier passer at 36:

"I'm sure that game will always be remembered. You can never forget something like that. But the year before, we got beat by Denver in the final seconds after controlling the game for the first 58 minutes. That was a devastating loss, too, and people said we'd never make it back."

"Last year had all the makings of a great story, but I guess it wasn't meant to happen. Maybe there's another ending down the road."

That road could lead to the Georgia Dome in late January if Buddy Ryan can shore up the defense that leaked so badly in Buffalo. Ryan will have this bunch attacking from the opening snap in New Orleans, and he has the players to make it work.

Remember this: Houston was third overall on defense last season.

Ray Childress is an All-Pro at tackle and is flanked by solid veterans William Fuller, Lee Williams and Sean Jones. Al Smith is the conference's best middle linebacker and Ryan likes what he sees in outside linebacker Eddie Robinson. At some point, Ryan is bound to fall for rookie Michael Barrow.

Backs Cris Dishman and Bubba McDowell are proven stars and there is lots of depth.

"Buddy has a proven track record," said Jack Pardee, who might have endangered his own job as head coach by bringing in the high-profile Ryan, never one to downplay his desire to be in charge again. "The last three years, our defense had improved, but when a team is backed up and changes its offense, we haven't made the lead hold up."

Getting a lead rarely is a problem. Moon remains one of the NFL's most dangerous passers and has the deepest corps of receivers around in Haywood Jeffires, Ernest Givins, Webster Slaughter, Curtis Duncan and Leonard Harris. Four play at a time, giving Moon plenty of options.

The line might miss tackle Don Maggs, who left as a free agent, necessitating the selection of Brad Hopkins of Illinois on the first round. Veterans Mike Munchak and Bruce Mathews haven't slipped and David Williams is solid. They give Moon enough time in the run-and-shoot, and they opened enough holes for Lorenzo White to help him rush for 1,226 yards. White also is a receiving threat.

While the Oilers have the elements, if not the history, the Steelers seem headed back to the Steel Curtain days. Under Bill Cowher, they made a complete turnaround in 1992, earning Cowher coach of the year honors and getting themselves the division title and best record in the AFC.

The Steelers will be good, but unless Houston falters again, Pittsburgh won't finish first. There simply are too many holes.

If Pittsburgh could borrow a couple of defensive linemen and a receiver or two from Houston, it would almost guarantee a division championship. And Houston's backup quarterback, Cody Carlson, might be better than Pittsburgh's starter, Neil O'Donnell, who will make more than \$8 million during the next three years. The Steelers matched an offer sheet to O'Donnell, then let former starter Bobby Brister go and signed Mike Tomczak as a backup.

With Barry Foster, Tim Worley and Merrill Hoge, the Steelers will try to grind it out. Their personnel dictates such an approach. Foster, after a bitter holdout, must come close to last year's 1,690 yards rushing to erase the hard feelings and prove he deserves top dollar.

Cleveland has something of a

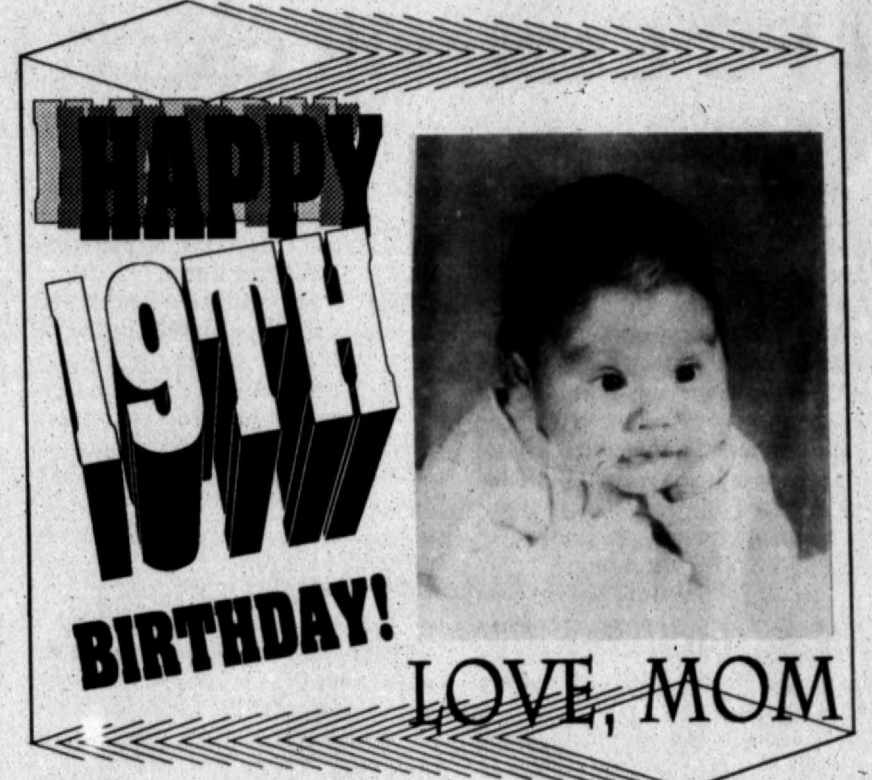
comfort zone: no matter how bad the Browns are, they will stay ahead of the Bengals.

Making the playoffs is another matter, particularly when your best player, nose tackle Michael Dean Perry, is unhappy. It also hurts when your quarterback, Bernie Kosar, has been so brutalized that he doesn't even throw normally anymore.

The Bengals are cheap, which everyone knew, and rebuilding, which everyone figured. Someday, behind David Klingler, Harold Green, Carl Pickens, John Copeland and promising young linebackers, they might be contenders.

For now, they'll surrender a lot of points and not score many. Cincinnati has a chance to be the worst team in the NFL.

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# New-look Chiefs to edge Chargers in AFC West

Kansas City went for the big names at the skill positions. San Diego opted for linemen and linebackers. Any questions about how the top two teams in the AFC West will go about their duties this season?

The Chiefs have Joe Montana seeking one last soaring moment and Marcus Allen looking to show up the Raiders for dumping all over him, then dumping him. They are the glitzy guys. Yes, right there in the heartland, a big dose of California cool just might take Kansas City back to the top.

Coach Marty Schottenheimer is counting on it, scrapping his two-back, power offense for a 49ers-style attack based on short, precise pass routes, three-step quarterback drops and plenty of variety?

Why?

"Because we're not playing in the

Super Bowl and that's where we want to be," Schottenheimer says.

Which means Montana throwing to an assortment of backs that includes Allen, who fell into disfavor with Raiders owner Al Davis and was buried on the bench the last two seasons.

New offensive coordinator Paul Hackett, once Montana's quarterbacks coach in San Francisco, has installed most of the elements of the 49ers' splendid system.

That should create a comfort zone for Montana. So will having a solid corps of running backs. Fullback Barry Word must show he can catch as well as crunch, while Allen and Harvey Williams should be particularly dangerous carrying Montana's tosses.

Although he won't find any Jerry Rice, John Taylor or Brent Jones on hand, Montana's receivers aren't bad. Tim Barnett, J.J. Birden and Willie

Davis have modest credentials, but they were working with Dave Krieg last year, not the master. Davis led the league with a 21.0-yards-per-catch average.

The offensive line is somewhat unsettled on the right side. Center Tim Grunhard and left tackle John Alt are solid.

With all the attention being paid to the offense, Kansas City's defenders might get peeved about the lack of notice. Getting Derrick Thomas, Neil Smith, Kevin Ross, Albert Lewis, Dino Hackett and Dan Saleaumua riled up is not a good idea.

Kansas City ranked fifth in defense last year, second against the pass. Montana will enjoy that, too, along with excellent special teams.

Given all that, the division still can't be given to the Chiefs in a walk. The Chargers should push them all the way.

The first team to win a division

after starting a season 0-4, the Chargers are a gutsy, grind-it-out group. Fullback Marion Butts rams his 248 pounds at opponents behind a hefty, relatively experienced line led by veteran tackles Harry Wayne and Stan Brock. For reinforcements, they drafted 245-pound Natrone Means. For speed, they have Ronnie Harmon, the team's MVP last year.

Other than Anthony Miller, however, the receiving corps is mediocre.

Stan Humphries guided the 1992 turnaround and, according to coach Bobby Ross, "showed me as much guts as anyone has" by playing two playoff games with a dislocated left shoulder. Humphries made good on his first opportunity as a starter after sitting in Washington.

San Diego's defense, which was better than Kansas City's last year and blanked the Chiefs in the playoffs, might have gotten even better with the signing of linebacker Jerrol Williams and the drafting of cornerback Darrien Gordon. But a

season-ending knee injury to secondary star Gill Byrd will hurt.

Junior Seau has been hearing comparisons to Lawrence Taylor lately and linemen Leslie O'Neal and Burt Grossman are terrific. Watch for a big season from free safety Stanley Richard.

The Broncos, Raiders and Seahawks don't figure to keep up with the top two and won't contend for wild-card slots.

The preseason focus in Denver has been on how happy John Elway and his teammates are that Wade Phillips is in charge and Dan Reeves is in New Jersey. Happiness helps, but better performances on the defensive line and a couple more receivers and runners would help a lot more.

In Elway, the Broncos have the game's most dynamic offensive creator. Except for the emerging Shannon Sharpe and Arthur Marshall, he doesn't have much established aid. Second-round pick Glyn Milburn could see plenty of running and receiving action at halfback.

The Raiders should be the fastest team in the NFL, especially if they get Rocket Ismail. They also will be one of the oldest, with 11 key players well into their 30s.

The long ball and a sack-happy front four have been the Raiders' trademark for years. New QB Jeff Hostetler's strength is not the deep throw, though, and none of the speedsters are particularly adept at shorter routes. But the defense still can nail passers, with Anthony Smith on the way to stardom.

Seattle's defense, anchored by 1992 Defensive Player of the Year Cortez Kennedy, might be good enough to contend.

But the Seahawks can't score (140 points in 1992) and figure to have a rookie, No. 2 overall choice Rick Mirer, at quarterback. Can Kennedy carry the ball?

## AFC East will catch up to Bills

Instead of maligning the Buffalo Bills for losing three straight Super Bowls, shouldn't they be lauded for winning three consecutive AFC titles?

Why not focus on the special achievements this team has managed since 1988, when it won the first of four straight AFC East crowns, a streak snapped by the Miami Dolphins last year? What's with this short-sighted obsession with their shortcomings when it comes to meeting the NFC champion?

"I think by the time we're done playing, people will remember us as a great team, not as one that lost all those Super Bowls," Bills nose tackle Jeff Wright said.

While still an impressive team, the Bills will be hard-pressed to get to Atlanta on Jan. 30. The Dolphins and even the Colts are stronger and will contend, with the Jets and Patriots trailing.

Of course, the Bills took the rough road last January with their historic rally to beat Houston, followed by playoff wins at Pittsburgh and Miami before the debacle against the Cowboys.

"This team showed it thrives on challenges," Jim Kelly says. "We proved that so many times last year and we're basically the same team."

Not quite. Although Kelly, Thurman Thomas, Andre Reed, Ken Davis and Kent Hull form a terrific offensive core, the Bills were damaged by free agency. The loss of premier tackle Will Wolford to Indianapolis will hurt, forcing 1992 No. 1 pick John Fina into the lineup prematurely.

Also gone is James Lofton, who slipped a bit in '92, but remains a more dangerous receiver than the player signed to replace him, Bill Brooks. Look for a bigger role for Don Beebe.

The defense also lost key players in free agency. Shane Conlan and Carlton Bailey, valuable inside linebackers, are gone. Plans called for Cornelius Bennett to move inside anyway, and Marcus Patton replaces him outside. But the Bills aren't deep at the position anymore and their run defense could suffer without Conlan.

The defensive line, once a source of concern when Bruce Smith was the only real threat, has become a strength. Wright is terrific and Phil Hansen has developed rapidly at end. Smith no longer is a full-time terror, but who wouldn't take him rushing from the right side?

Once again, the secondary could be the weak link. Only strong safety Henry Jones, a league leader with eight interceptions (two for touchdowns), is consistent. Top choice Thomas Smith might beat out James

Williams and Kirby Jackson at left cornerback.

Coach Marv Levy's toughest chore will be to keep everyone focused on this season, not the frustrating finishes to the last three.

The Dolphins have improved overall, and their defense should be formidable after surging to 10th in league ratings last year. Bryan Cox has become the big-play linebacker every great defense needs, and the secondary is superb. Cornerbacks Troy Vincent and J.B. Brown, safeties Louis Oliver and Jarvis Williams lead possibly the best and deepest backfield in the league.

Linebacking also is a plus if John Offerdahl can stay healthy, a big if. Coach Don Shula believes Dwight Collier, Offerdahl's stand-in down the stretch last year, can be a full-timer.

Marco Coleman gave the line a major boost as a rookie and enabled Jeff Cross to move inside. The combination of Coleman-Cox-Oliver could make passers and runners shiver.

Oddly, it is on offense where Miami has the most questions, something unusual during Dan Marino's tenure. Marino still is the game's most dangerous passer, but his wide receiving corps is markedly inferior now that the Marks Brothers - Clayton and Duper - are gone.

Rookie O.J. McDuffie has to replace one of them and also will return kicks. Irving Fryar was an excellent pickup and will provide more consistency than Clayton or Duper. Mark Ingram won't do nearly as much.

Having Keith Jackson for a full season will be a revelation for Marino and Miami's attack. No tight end has

as many game-breaking skills.

With Harry Galbreath gone from the line as a free agent and fullback Tony Paige retired, the blocking could be worrisome. Tackle Richmond Webb is the anchor.

The Colts appear better off without the divisive Jeff George. A rebuilt offensive line, led by free agents Wolford and center Kirk Lowdermilk, and an improved receiving corps sparked by rookie Sean Dawkins will help Jack Trudeau, George's replacement.

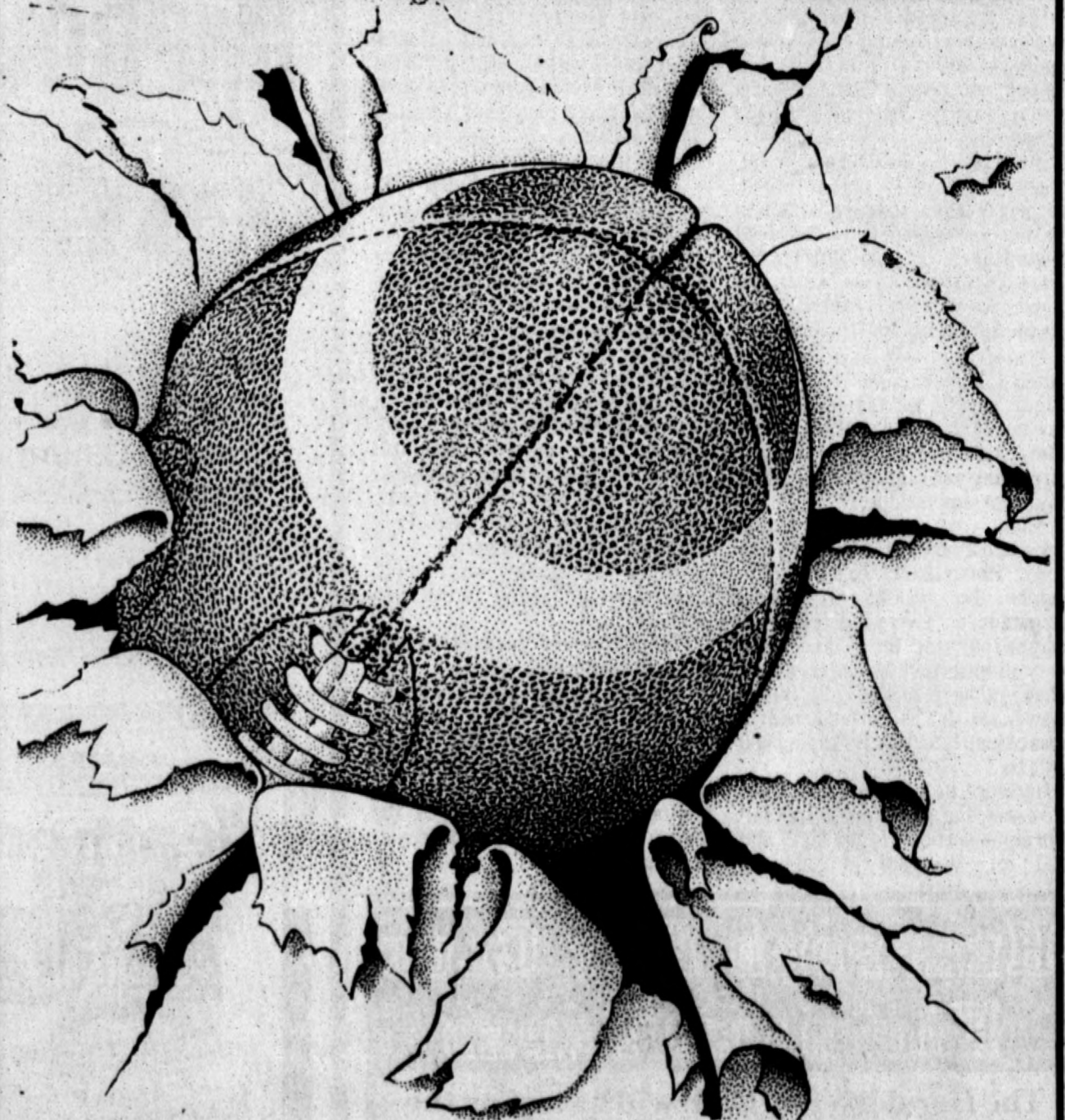

## 1993 crops tour to make five stops Grain sorghum, corn demonstrations to be checked

Five stops are on the annual Deaf Smith County Crops Tour Tuesday. The day will begin with registration and refreshments at 8:30 a.m. in the ballroom of the Hereford Community Center.

Sponsor of the event are the Deaf Smith County Extension Crops Committee and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Hosts for the coffee time are George Warner Seed Company, Garrison-Townsend, Inc., and AgriPro Seeds, Inc.

Participants that have private, commercial or non-commercial pesticide applicator certificates or licenses will receive three units of continuing education credit for attending the entire day.

Irrigated grain sorghum variety demonstrations and sorghum plan population demonstrations will be observed at the Grottegut Farm, four miles east of the Hereford airport, from 9:15 a.m. to 9:45 a.m. Here, information on sorghum weed control will be discussed and credit given for pesticide applicators.

The tour will move to the Bill and Cory Walden Farm, northwest of Hereford, where corn and grain sorghum silage demonstrations are being conducted, from 10 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. Use of forages in crop rotations to aid in weed and insect control practices will be reviewed.

Continuing the tour, the Roy Carlson Farm, a half-mile south of

Milo Center, is the site, from 10:45 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. of yellow and white food corn variety demonstrations, conducted in cooperation with Frito-Lay, Inc. This plot features more than 40 varieties of food corn. Corn pests and their management will be discussed.

Lunch and a tour of Frito-Lay food corn variety trials are scheduled at the Kenneth and Jimmie Christie farm, north of Summerfield, from 12 noon to 1:30 p.m.

Concluding the tour will be a stop at 2 p.m. at the Jim Cavin Farm, west of Hereford, where several corn varieties are being grown under dryland conditions.

Dennis Newlon, Deaf Smith

County agricultural extension agent, pointed out that dryland corn production is being tested for the first time in Deaf Smith County this year. The Cavin demonstration will offer an opportunity for producers to compare varieties that might be adapted for dryland.

Dr. Brent Bean, area extension agronomist, and Dr. Carl Patrick, area extension entomologist, will discuss management practices that will aid in the control of insects and diseases.

## Tilling fields as little as possible reduces topsoil loss by erosion

WASHINGTON (AP) - After three decades of testing, the Agriculture Department has concluded that tilling fields as little as possible prevents topsoil loss from erosion and protects groundwater from herbicides.

On low-till farm fields, which comprised 57 percent of the nation's cropland in 1992, the rainwater that filters deep into the soil carries "almost no trace of herbicides," said William Edwards, a soil scientist with the Agricultural Research Service.

Soil erosion dropped dramatically as well, Edwards told a recent

meeting of the American Chemical Society in Chicago.

"Eliminating conventional plowing has changed the flow of soil from tons to pounds per acre," Edwards said, adding that as a result more and more farmers are adopting the approach.

The research was begun 30 years ago on corn and soybean fields at the North Appalachian Experimental Watershed Laboratory in Coshocton, Ohio. The 1,000-acre lab, one of the first watershed research stations established, simulates weather conditions common in the East.

Tests at another USDA lab, the Southern Piedmont Conservation

Research Center in Watkinsville, Ga., showed similar results over 19 years of study.

There, soybean and grain sorghum were planted into fields with residue from wheat and other winter crops in the topsoil. Soil scientist George Langdale said, "Even six inches of rain failed to move more than nine pounds of soil per acre off the fields."

To estimate the effects of the low-till technique, instruments at the Ohio lab were placed on the edge of the sloping fields to record the amount of sediment, chemicals and water that drained off.

## Water district earns recognition for public awareness programs

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 is the 1993 recipient of the Universities Council on Water Resources education and public service award.

The UCOWR is an international organization devoted to facilitating water-related education at all levels; promoting meaningful research and technology transfer on water resources issues; compiling and disseminating information on water problems and solutions; and informing the public about water issues.

The award recognizes the water district's efforts to increase public understanding of water resources through education, research, public service, international activities and information support.

The award nomination was made by Dr. Lloyd Urban of the Texas Tech University Water Resources Center and Dr. Wayne Jordan of the Texas A&M University Water Resources Institute at College Station.

"As evidenced by the ambitious program of research, education and public service summarized in the district's anniversary publications, one can see that the district has had a profound impact on our region and the state since its creation in 1951," Urban said.

Some of the educational programs developed and implemented by the water district in recent years include:

-- Hydrologic atlases depicting the saturated thickness of the Ogallala Formation within each of the 15 counties of the district's service area are updated every five years. They give land owners information on the amount of ground water in storage under their tract of land.

-- The district has educated irrigators about the use of soil moisture monitoring devices such as gypsum blocks and resistance meters and tensiometers. Using these devices, irrigators are less likely to over-irrigate or under-irrigate their crops during the growing season.

-- A review of on-farm irrigation application efficiency tests conducted by the district revealed that most sprinkler systems were operating inefficiently. Since then, the district has promoted the installation of Low Energy Precision Application center pivot sprinkler systems which can apply water at about 95 percent efficiency.

-- Throughout the years, the water district has developed public school educational materials, audio-visual materials, supplemental textbooks and school textbook covers with water conservation messages to educate students, teachers and parents about the importance of conserving area water resources.

High Plains Water District Board President James P. Mitchell of Wolforth and Manager A. Wayne Wyatt of Lubbock accepted the award Aug. 5 during the UCOWR annual meeting in San Francisco.

## TAES station field day set

HALFWAY - Efforts of Texas Agricultural Experiment Station scientists to meet the challenge of agriculture survival in the 21st century will be put on display at the 84th annual field day on Sept. 14.

Tours will be conducted from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. with wagons transporting visitors to research sites at the High Plains Research Facility, located 14 miles west of Plainview on U.S. 70.

This year's tour will feature four stops, a walking tour, a youth tour an open house at the computer training center and several exhibits, said Jerry Jones, research associate in charge of the event.

Featured stops will be insect management, cropping systems and weed control, cotton breeding and irrigation scheduling with PET.

The walking tour will be conducted at the grape vineyard. Latest research equipment and experiments, such as high speed chemigation pivot, advanced strains of glandless cotton and peanut research will be on exhibit.

Home economists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service also will have displays.

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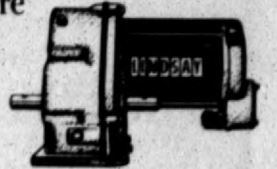
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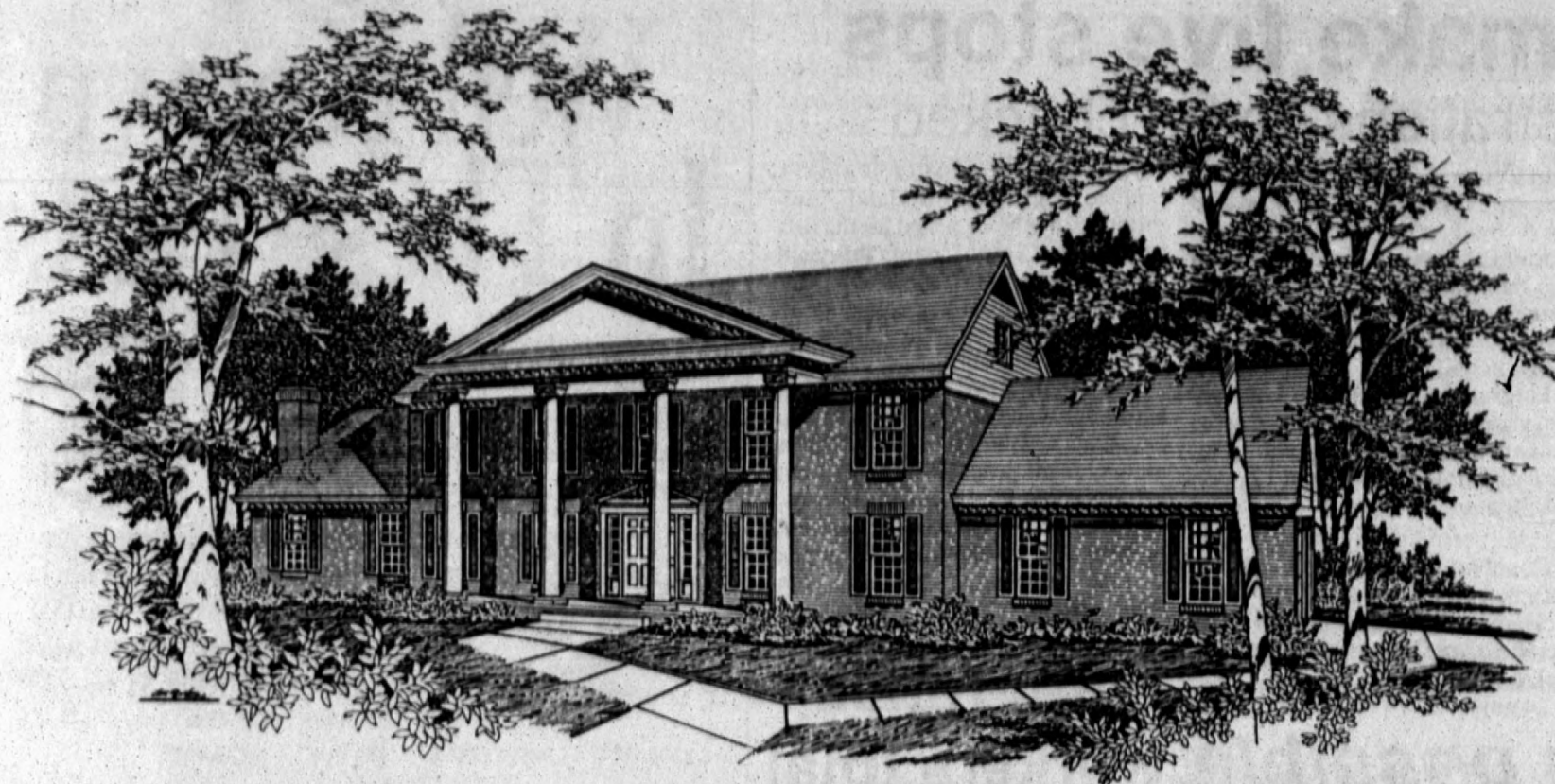

## Do you suffer from allergies?

If you suffer from allergies - sneezing, runny nose, nasal and sinus congestion and itchy, watery eyes - you probably know to avoid the outdoors when pollen levels are high. But do you know what to do to control indoor allergy problems? Take this "house tour" to learn how to allergy-proof your home by reducing allergens, the substances that set off your allergic reactions.

Following is a room-by-room guide for controlling the primary allergy culprits in the home: pollen, mold, pet dander and dust mites, which are microscopic insects that live in your carpets, bedding and upholstery.

**Bedroom** - To control dust mites, encase your mattress, box spring and pillows in allergen-proof plastic, zippered encasings. Cover the zippers with adhesive tape. Use washable blankets and spreads and polyester or dacron pillows. Avoid feather pillows, down or padded comforters, wool blankets and chenille spreads. Wash all bedding frequently in hot water (over 158 degrees Fahrenheit). Never allow pets in the bedroom.

It's also a good idea not to have curtains in your bedroom. Instead, opt for vinyl window shades or other washable window coverings. Air-conditioning is especially important in the bedroom. The filter can cut pollen counts by greater than 90 percent. Make sure to have the air-conditioner serviced regularly to assure good filtration.

**Bathroom and kitchen** - To kill molds apply bleach around sinks and bathtubs. Eliminate plumbing leaks to minimize moisture, a breeding ground for mold. Launder shower curtain and liner frequently.

**Living room** - Ideally, floors should be left bare since carpeting harbors many kinds of allergens. If you can't live without carpeting, short pile carpet is preferable to longer shag rugs. Scatter rugs may be used if they are washed frequently. Vacuum twice weekly, preferably with an "allergy vacuum" equipped with a high-efficiency particulate air (HEPA) filter. Most vacuum cleaners with paper filters blow allergens throughout the room.

Dusting is also an important aspect of allergen-proofing your home. When you dust, use a damp, rather than dry, cloth. Wearing a dust mask can also help prevent allergy flare-ups.

**Throughout the house** - Other ways to help allergen-proof your home include making it a smoke-free zone - no tobacco, no wood-burning fires in the fireplace. Consider renting or buying a high-efficiency particulate air (HEPA) cleaner to reduce pollen and dust even further. Avoid clutter such as stuffed toys, wall hangings, flower arrangements, books and knick-knacks.

Incorporating these home allergen-proofing steps can help you control allergies year-round. But, if symptoms do strike, they can be managed by using an over-the-counter antihistamine and/or decongestant.

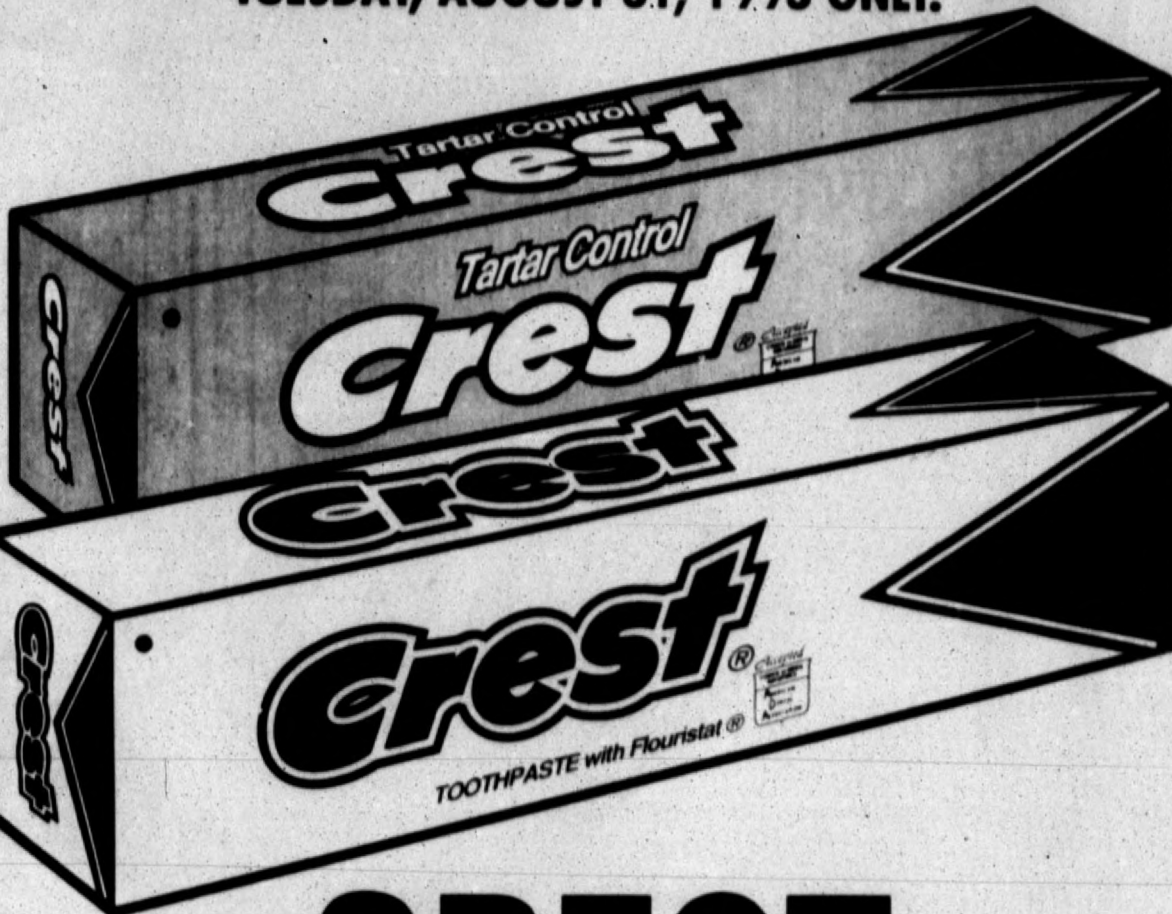

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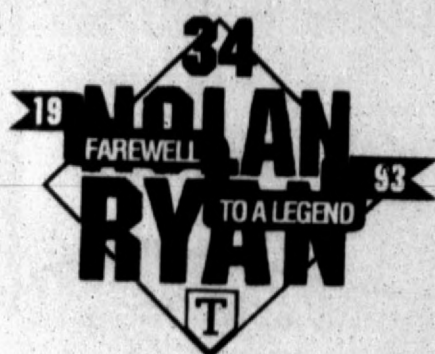

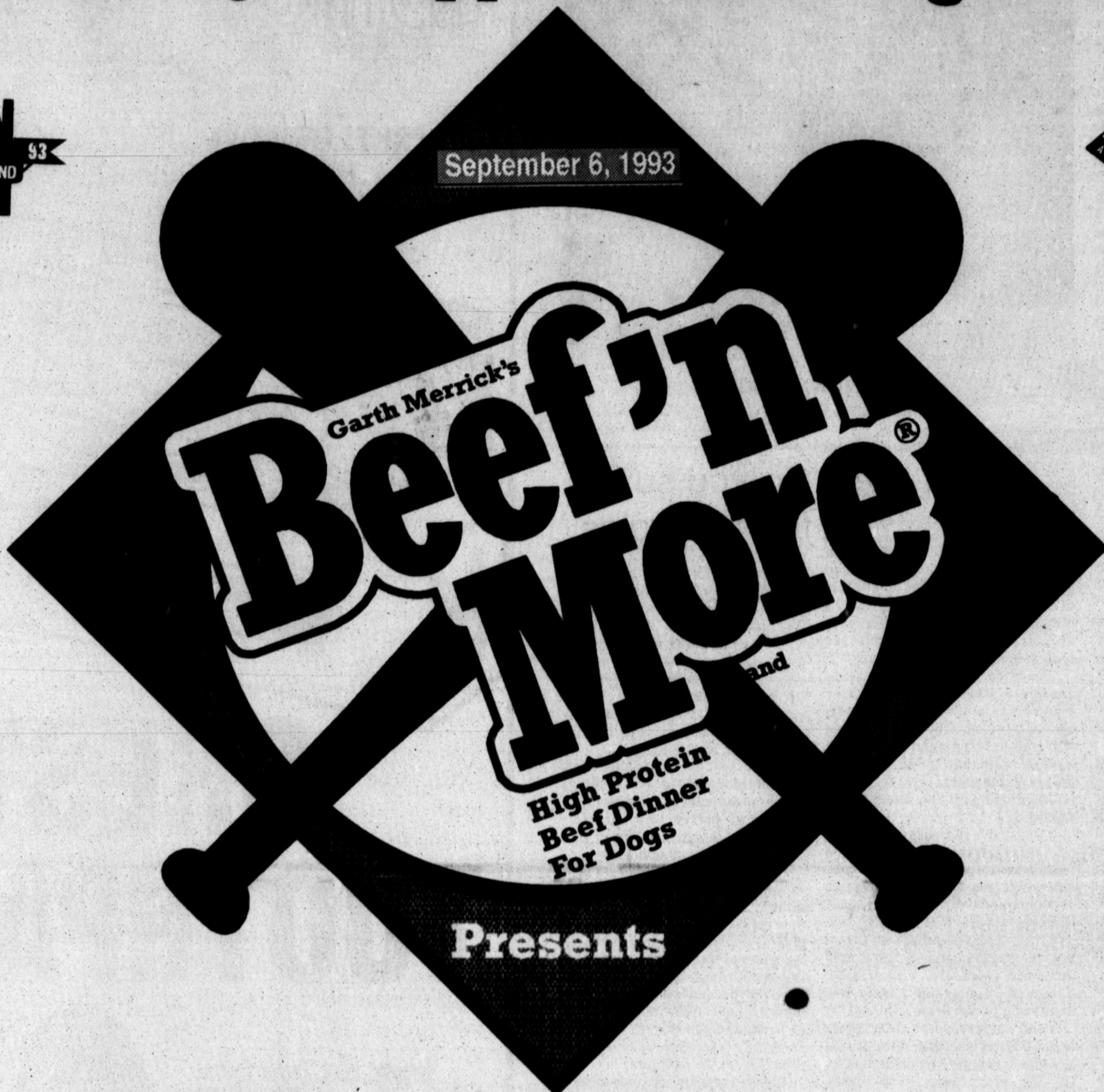

LAKE BUENA VISTA, Fla. (AP) — Princess Diana and her sons got the royal treatment at Disney-MGM Studios.

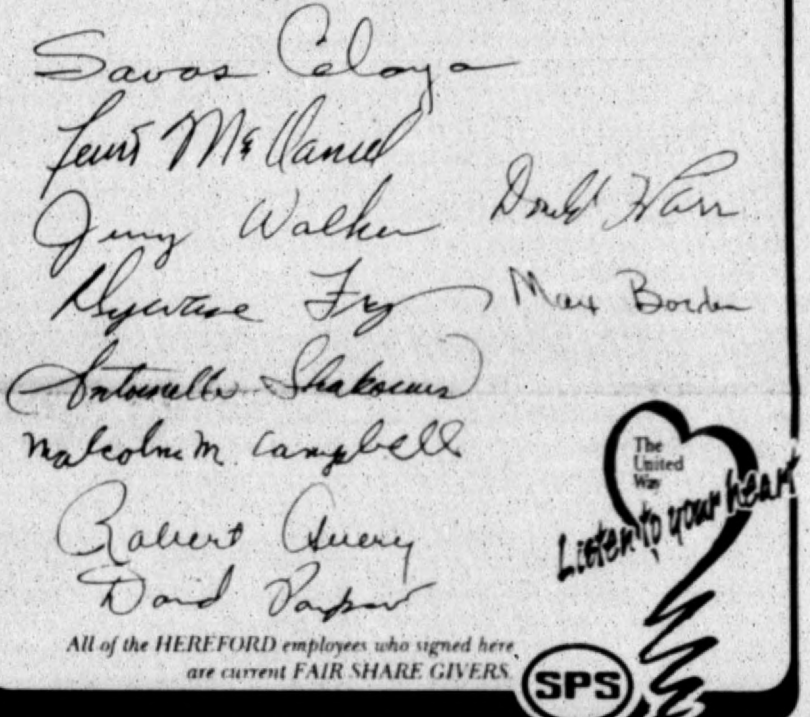
They had breakfast Wednesday with Mickey Mouse and other Disney characters, then went backstage to visit with performers in the Indiana Jones adventure show.

## Extension News

In the war against declining student achievement, many solutions have been tried. A quest for better teachers, improved texts and

challenging curricula have each played a role in major battles. Yet achievement falls. Perhaps, the answer is parental reform.

Since 1965, parental involvement in education has been a victim of societal changes in America. The divorce rate, the ratio of children

living in single parent families and the proportion of married mothers of young children working outside the home have all doubled. As a result, 70 percent of the parents never volunteer to participate in their children's schools.

When 24,600 eighth graders were polled, half of them reported that they rarely discuss school with their parents. Half of the parents of these eighth graders reported rarely having contact with their children's schools.

When parents fail to stress the importance of education, kids tend to do what they want to do. Few of them choose educational activities. This same group of eighth graders reported that they spent 21.4 hours a week watching television, but only 5.6 hours doing homework. Only 1.8 hours were spent on outside reading. Sixty-three percent of the parents reported they rarely or never set television viewing restrictions.

Here are some things parents can do to help increase their child's

success in school:

-The first step is communication. Talk regularly about current school experiences. Students who never talk to their parents about school are three times more likely to drop out of school than those who do talk with their parents.

-Restrict television viewing on school nights. Students with television restrictions are nine percent less likely to drop out than those with no restrictions.

-Finally, provide adequate after-school supervision. Let students know what is expected of them in terms of education. Parents who expect more for their children educationally, have children who perform at least adequately in school.

One third of burglaries take place by gaining entrance through open or unlocked doors or windows. Install good quality locks on all entry doors and windows-and use them.

### SPORT GOGGLES



Kids play rough-- but so do grown-ups. And both age groups need the special protection offered by sports goggles made of tough, poly-carbonate plastic. Regular street-wear glasses don't offer adequate protection. At first, it was only eye professional athletes on TV are wearing goggles, more amateurs realize they're "cool."

In recent years, it was racquetball that caused the most injuries when a high-velocity ball hit a player's eye, but goggles are commonly worn today and required for tournaments. In basketball, the close contact under the basket often results in scratched corneas, fractured cheek/eye sockets and detached retinas. This year, the Center for Sports Vision at Wills Eye Hospital in Philadelphia will concentrate on baseball, which causes the most injuries in 5- to 14 year-olds.

In case of an eye injury, see an eye doctor promptly. For first aid, tape a bag of crushed ice to your forehead, hanging over the eye area.

## Between The Covers

Now that school has started and schedules are being established, I hope each of you have, or will find time to visit the library.

This week we have a good selection of murder and mayhem, and each book sounds good to me. I must be in a strange mood, or maybe sending children off to college has this effect on everyone.

Michael Weaver's novel debut entitled *Impulse* will have you sitting on the edge of your chair from the first page to the last. The story begins with Paul and Emily Garret spending a peaceful weekend at their vacation home located on an old Appalachian Trail. The vacation home dated back to the 1740's and was a curiosity to many of the hikers that passed along the Appalachian Trail. Paul and Emily think nothing of the young handsome hiker who asks for some water for his canteen and they are even pleased when he expresses an interest in the house. The stranger introduces himself as Tom Shea, a carpenter who has a special interest in old houses. After talking with Tom for a while he is invited to examine the original floors and walls dating back to 1743. Once inside the calm easy manner of the handsome stranger changes. In a matter of minutes Paul is shot and Emily is raped and murdered. When Garret regains consciousness he identifies the killer, and learns William Mead alias Tom Shea, is a recently paroled psychopathic killer. Meade is amazed by Garret's recovery and designates him as the link to the world that is Meade's prey. Garret must battle with this brilliant perverse murderer and win the war before Meade can put an end to Garret forever.

*Missing Joseph* by Elizabeth George, takes Detective Inspector Thomas Lynley to the bleak winter mists of the English countryside. Deborah St. James' inability to bear a child has caused a deep rift between her and her husband, Simon. Chance and bad weather lead Deborah and the vicar of Winslough to London's

National Gallery on this particular day. While viewing Leonardo de Vinci's study for his *Virgin and Child*, the Vicar comments that Joseph is missing from the picture. This comment strikes a chord with Deborah and after further conversation with the Vicar she finds herself comforted by the description of his quiet northern village. Deborah persuades Simon to take her on a holiday to regain their peace of mind and visit with the Vicar. When they arrive in E, they discover the Vicar is dead. "Death by misadventure," a case of accidental poisoning is the report given by the coroner's office. As a forensic scientist, Simon knows the accidental ingesting of this particular poison would be next to impossible. With the help of his old friend Thomas Lynley, Simon wants to find the mysterious woman that served the Vicar his dinner. Simon also wants to know why charges were never brought against this mysterious, sensual woman.

*Hard Evidence* by John T. Lescroart begins with the assistant D.A. Desmas Hardy doing volunteer work after hours at the Aquarium. The Aquarium wants a live great white shark, badly, so any fishing boat catching one contacts them. Most of the time, the sharks are so badly injured or traumatized that they do not survive. The shark that Hardy was called on, that night was so exhausted Hardy and Pico would have to take turns keeping it moving, so it would not suffocate. After several hours, their efforts were unsuccessful. When the autopsy is performed on the shark, a severed hand of a man wearing a jade ring is discovered. Later, the rest of the body washes up on the beach, and it is clear the Silicon Valley billionaire was shot to death. Hardy finds himself prosecutor in San Francisco's biggest murder trial. A bizarre series of events results in the case being dismissed, and Hardy being fired. The case is reopened with a second suspect, a man known and respected by Hardy. In no time at all, Hardy finds himself as defense counsel. Things are looking up. Now Hardy has to contend with an

uncooperative client, the victim's seductive daughter, a prejudiced judge, and a revengeful prosecutor.

*Sleeping With The FBI* by Russell Warren Howe, is the true story of Richard Miller, an FBI agent assigned to the agency's Los Angeles pasture due to his failures. Miller's mediocre career was highlighted by suspension for "unacceptable obesity", selling Amway products out of his FBI car, stealing candy from a 7-Eleven, leaving the keys of the FBI office in the door all night and losing the agency's credit card. In an effort to redeem his career, Miller worked himself into a position he thought would result in the first agent to penetrate the KGB's spy network as a double knowledge of his colleagues. The 36 year old KGB super spy and mastermind, Aleksandar Grishin, saw an opportunity to set Miller up for the sting of his life. Shortly after Miller was arrested for espionage, Grishin was celebrating a lofty promotion in Moscow. This is the one time the FBI ended up with the egg on its face.

*In Spite of Innocence* by Michael L. Radelet is the true account of over 400 innocent Americans who were wrongly convicted of capital crimes. The book shows how easily safeguards against mistaken convictions can fail. If you are working on an argument against capital punishment, this is the book for you.

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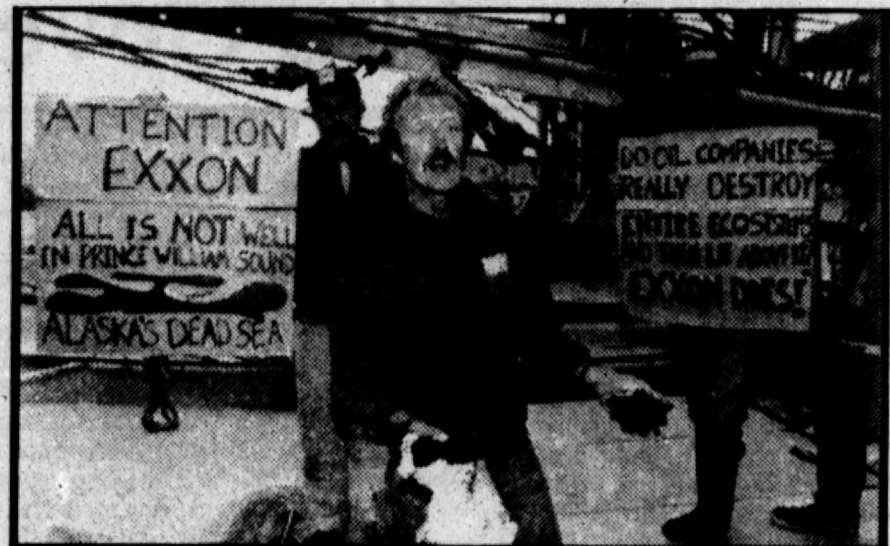

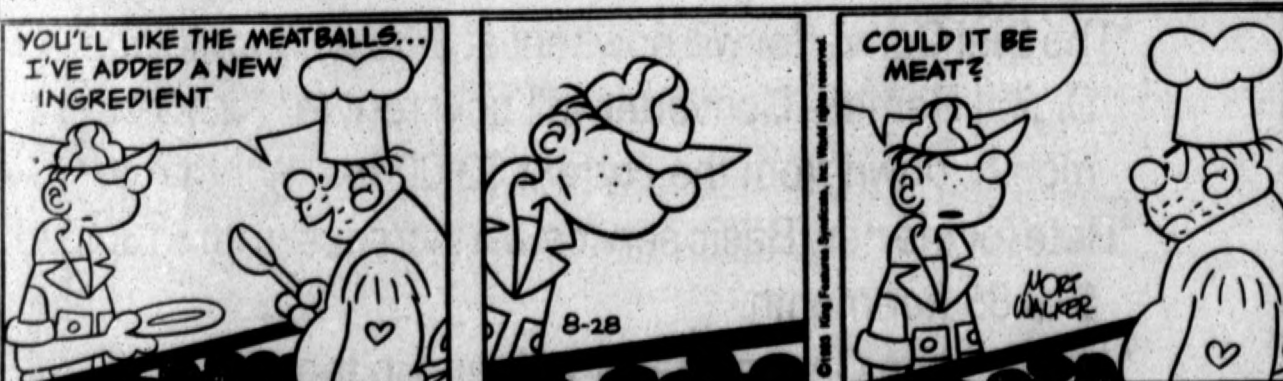

## Ask Dr. Lamb

**DEAR DR. LAMB:** Would you please tell me if smoking a pipe or cigars has the same harmful effects on the body as smoking cigarettes? Is secondhand smoke from pipes or cigars as bad as from cigarettes? My husband believes his pipe is not as harmful to him or others as cigarettes.

**DEAR READER:** The only advantage smoking a pipe or cigars has is if the smoker does not inhale. Most pipe smokers do not. But if a person inhales the pipe or cigars, the condition is far worse than smoking cigarettes. Former cigarette smokers who switch to pipes often do inhale.

The cigar produces a higher level of carbon monoxide than cigarettes do. Carbon monoxide is one of the factors that increase the risk of heart attacks from smoking. Since both pipes and cigars contain a greater amount of harmful substances, it follows that secondhand smoke from pipes and cigars is more harmful to non-smokers than cigarettes.

There is no safe tobacco habit.

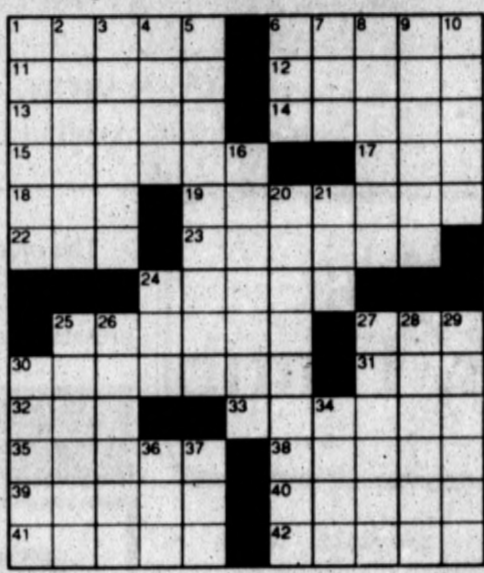

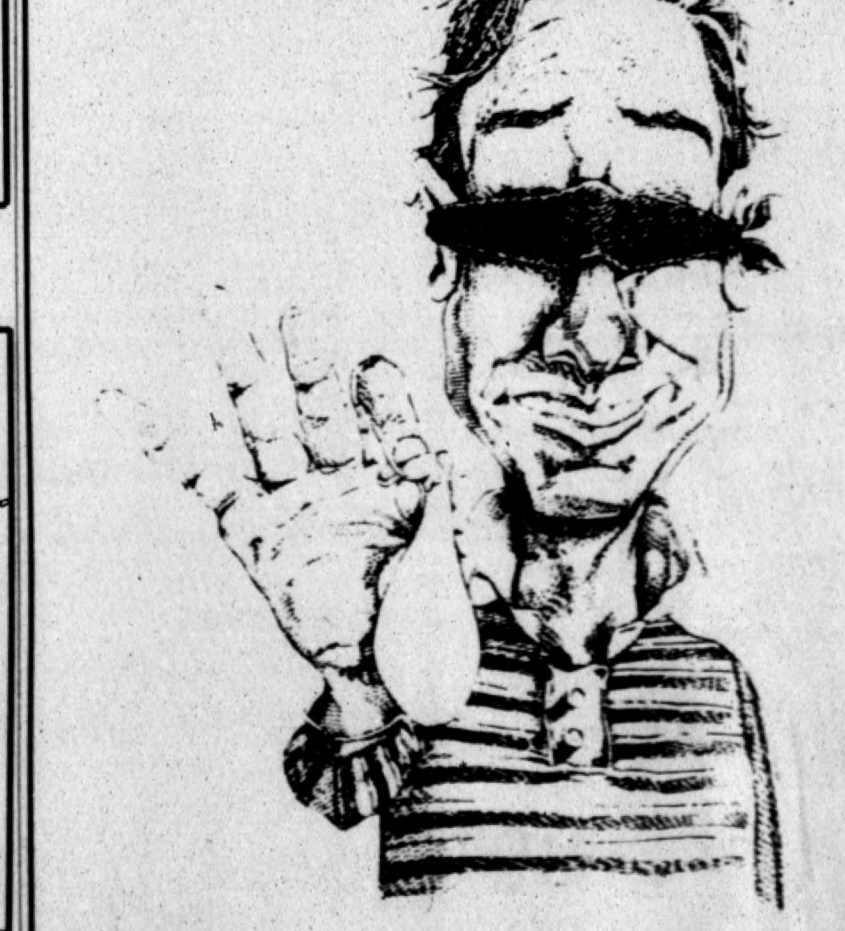

## Gardening at the Gazebo

By CARMEN FLOOD

The "dog days" of summer are upon us and taking their toll on most gardeners. It's too hot to spend much time in the garden, except for early in the morning or late in the evening. But the chores continue to go on whether we like it or not.

Most important us, as usual, watering just to keep plants alive. Only a couple of weeks ago we had some really fine and much appreciated moisture, but once again, we must add supplemental water just to keep things from withering. Something that I think interesting to know is that a plant may wither during the heat of day and not be in need of water, but is simply making itself a smaller target for the sun. In that case, it's best to check the soil before giving extra water.

This is the time of year to be watching for powdery mildew on many plants and shrubs. Heat and lack of circulation are often the culprits here, but spraying with a fungicide will help

greatly. You may want to remove the discolored and disfigured leaves since they will not look any better this season, or in some cases, go ahead and cut the plant to ground if the infestation is bad enough. You can identify mildew by the grayish coating on the leaves and many times the leaves will fall off. Be sure to remove any infected foliage from your garden.

August and September are good months to give some thought to your fall planting of spring blooming bulbs such as tulips and daffodils as well as any perennials you will want to set out this fall. One rule of thumb for fall planting is that if a perennial will bloom in the spring or early part of the summer, fall is the time to plant. If it blooms in the summer or autumn of the year, spring is a good planting time. Also, when planting in the fall, the plants have a chance to set their roots well as they're going into dormancy, and the benefit to the gardener is that they require less care

and water than the flowers we set out in the spring. The Black House Garden committee will be having planning meetings soon to decide on our selections for fall planting and if you have any suggestions, we would appreciate your help.

As you may have noticed, the Gardens are looking very lovely right now. We removed the Rose of Sharon hedge around the northeast corner. It had suffered greatly the last few years from the freezes and, we think, a disease of some sort, and we decided it best to take it out. This will allow room for the junipers in that area to spread out giving a nice deep green background to the flowers. We have also been doing some repair work on the fence and the Gazebo which were developing dry rot in several places. These will be painted by Tom Flood and his crew from the county jail. They have done a wonderful job at the museum and around town and we express our gratitude and appreciation to them.

## There's new help for women

For women who'd like to get out of the house more often without having to worry about a common - and often embarrassing - problem, science has come up with a wonderful solution.

The problem - which affects at least six million U.S. women - is urinary stress incontinence, the unanticipated sudden leakage of unanticipated significant amounts of urine during physical or emotional stress. It can occur when a woman is lifting, laughing, coughing, sneezing, running or exercising. Often the result of weakened muscles at the base of the pelvis known as "pelvic floor" muscles, it is caused mostly by child-bearing and aging, becoming more serious over time.

Fortunately, a successful treatment or cure for urinary stress incontinence is possible from a health care innovation recommended by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Called Femina, from Lifestyle 2000 Inc., it's a set of five tampon-like graduated vaginal weighted cones. Each cone is made of a neutral metal core covered with a non-toxic white polystyrene plastic coating with a short nylon string at the base for easy removal.

When a Femina cone is inserted, much like a tampon, into the vagina, the cone remains held low in the passageway. A woman feels the sensation of the cone falling out and tenses her pelvic floor muscles to keep it in. This tensing action exercises and strengthens the pelvic floor muscles. The exact ones necessary to help alleviate urinary stress incontinence.

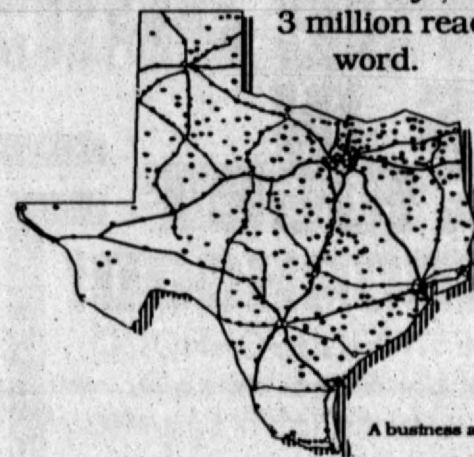

Funding for age-related research, however, has fallen far short of recommendations and it may get even worse.

The current administration has asked Congress to cut the budget of the National Institute on Aging, which directs the majority of federal

age-related research.

While the U.S. currently spends about \$300 billion annually on health care for those 65 and older, the federal government spends less than one percent of that money on age-related research which could yield new cures and prevention. Health care experts fear the administration hasn't recognized the potential payoff of age-related research.

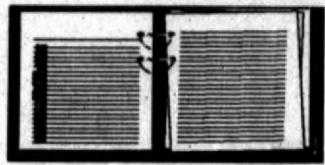

# Social Security

**Q.** My mother has been in a nursing home for several weeks. She has Medicare, but I've been told that Medicare won't help pay her bill because she's receiving "custodial" care. What does that mean?

**A.** Care is considered "custodial" when it is primarily for meeting personal needs and could be provided by people without professional medical skills or training. Custodial care includes, but is not limited to help in walking, getting in and out of bed, resting, eating, bathing, or taking medicine. This kind of care is not covered by Medicare.

**Q.** I have a medical condition that will require me to undergo some expensive laboratory tests. Will Medicare pay for them?

**A.** Maybe. Medicare can help pay for diagnostic tests provided by independent laboratories that are certified for the service you will receive. Not all laboratories are certified by Medicare, and some are only certified for certain kinds of tests. Check with your doctor, call the Medicare toll-free number--1-800-638-6833--to see if the tests you need are covered.

**Q.** How long should I wait before contacting my Medicare carrier to check on the status of a claim?

**A.** Allow 30 to 45 days for the claim to be paid. If you have not received a check or an Explanation of Medicare Benefit payment statement after 45 days, call the Medicare carrier for your area. In Texas, that toll-free number is 1-800-442-2620.

**Q.** My 19-year-old brother graduated from a trade high school last year but has not been able to find a job in his specialty. Since he has no income and few resources, can he get Supplemental Security income?

**A.** Probably not. While SSI is a needs-based program for which a person must have limited income and resources, the person must also be either 65 or older, or blind, or disabled. If disabled, the disability

must be the result of a physical or mental condition that prevents the person from doing any "substantial" work, and that is expected to last for at least 12 months or result in death.

**Q.** I intend to spend the first two years of my retirement in England. Can I get my Social Security check sent to England or must I have it deposited in an American bank?

**A.** Like American banks, banks in the United Kingdom also offer their customers the advantage of direct deposit. Once you have arrived in England and opened a bank account there, complete a Direct Deposit Sign-up Form to have your Social Security check sent to you bank in England. The bank will forward the form to the federal benefits unit at the United States Embassy for processing. For more information, contact your local Social Security office or call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, business days between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

**Q.** I am a 50-year-old welder with a deteriorating heart condition. I have a wife and two small children. My doctor has advised me to leave my job and to apply for disability benefits. Will my family be able to get benefits too?

**A.** Yes. If Social Security determines that you are disabled and entitled to Social Security benefits, your spouse and minor children can also receive benefits on your record.

**Q.** I am a 66-year-old woman who receives SSI. Several of my neighbors have asked me to babysit occasionally while they go shopping or tend to other matters. If I accept, will I lose my SSI because of the additional money I'll receive.?

**A.** Not necessarily. You can earn up to \$65 a month without a reduction in your SSI benefits. If your total income exceeds the \$65 allowed, your SSI benefit will be reduced \$1 for each \$2 of earnings over that limit.

**Q.** Several years ago, I worked for

a company that has since gone out of business. How can I be sure that I received Social Security credit for my wages?

**A.** The Social Security Administration maintains each person's individual earnings record at its headquarters in Baltimore, Md. All you have to do is contact the local Social Security office or call the toll-free number: 1-800-772-1213. Ask for the "Request For Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement" (Form 7004). The form asks a few identifying questions. About a month after you send in the form, you'll receive a statement that shows your earnings as reported to Social Security by your employers. Check our records against your own files. If you find an error, contact us right away with proof of your actual earnings.

**Q.** I have a foster child in my home and I receive payments to help support him. Will these payments reduce my SSI?

**A.** No. Foster care payments will not affect your SSI if the foster child is not entitled to SSI himself, is living with you, and was placed in your home by a qualified agency.

**Q.** My doctor advised me to get a flu shot. Will Medicare pay for it?

**A.** No. Medicare cannot pay for immunizations except pneumococcal vaccinations or those required because of an injury or immediate risk of infection.

## Memory lapses common

How's my memory? Well, there's good news and bad news. I'll tell you the bad news first. I really did put the milk in the cabinet and the cereal box in the refrigerator and I didn't find the milk until it had spoiled. I still don't know where my spare keys are and I had them in my hand just yesterday. Every time I do these things, I worry I have Alzheimer's. The good news is, I probably don't!

Whether we are 22, 42, 62 or 82, we all have memory lapses. A study reported in the New York Times a year or two ago (I don't remember exactly when!) found that healthy older people were not more forgetful about everyday things than a group of people in their 20's but that the older folks tended to worry more about their mistakes and memory lapses. While these memory lapses may be annoying, they should not be frightening. For most of us, they are not a sign of serious illness. Despite this fear, only 5% of people over 80 actually have Alzheimer's disease.

Why do we forget? Memory is greatly determined by "where our heads are at." Anything that cuts down on our ability to concentrate can affect

memory. Being worried about other things, being tired or depressed, decreased vision or hearing, a change in medication or a change in routine all can effect concentration and memory. If our forgetting makes us anxious and nervous, that can make us concentrate less and make our memory problem even worse!

A few rules to remember:

1) Most memory lapses are not serious, we all probably have what is called "benign forgetfulness."

2) At any age, it helps to write down important things that you have to remember.

3) It is never too late to learn to be neat, to keep things in order and to follow a routine that eliminates or reduces "lost" items or forgotten events.

4) Exercise your mind by keeping up-to-date, watching the news, reading the paper, and talking about things that interest you.

5) If change in memory seems sudden and severe, check with your doctor. Such change can be due to a medical problem that may respond to prompt treatment.

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# Nutrition Notes

## FIVE F'S ON HEALTHY RECOVERY AFTER CORONARY BYPASS SURGERY

The concepts to promote recovery after coronary artery bypass graft surgery are basic and need to be remembered guidelines to improve these patients nutritional status have been suggested. The typical diet order after surgery and when solids are resumed in the individual's diet, is a diet low in cholesterol with sodium restrictions. Maintaining optimal nutrition during the first four to six weeks after surgery can be difficult and is a real challenge.

The primary goal is to replete the patients nutritional status and then concentrate on limiting cholesterol later when the appetite and laboratory values return to normal. Because of weakness and loss of appetite following the surgery optimal nutrition during this recovery period is a prerequisite for repletion and maintenance of the body.

The five f's formulate a checklist which can be essential to keep in mind when enhancing the recovery of critical care and elderly patients.

Fiber: Rich foods such as fruit,

legumes, vegetables, and whole grain products has proven beneficial to prevent constipation because of factors such as immobility, poor intake, and medication. Adequate fluid is essential to prevent constipation. Appetites are usually best at breakfast so high fiber choices are encouraged.

Fluids: When appetites are poor and/or limited fluid intake is observed, dehydration may occur. Individuals are more prone to have inadequate fluid intake after discharge when the input and output are not monitored. Six to eight glasses of fluid intake per day is recommended providing there is not a need for fluid restrictions. Emphasis on nutritious fluids; milk, juice or supplement should be encouraged instead of coffee or carbonated beverages.

Frequent Feedings: Appetite is abnormally low 4 to 6 weeks after CABG surgery. Large meals are overwhelming to most patients. Serving 5 to 6 feedings per day of the patient's choice may prove valuable to obtain optimal nutrition.

Fruit, sherbet, pudding, custard, soup, and half sandwiches are initially well accepted. Food preferences should be always taken into consideration, and prior to actual meal service is

beneficial.

**Ferrous Iron:** Following surgery a patient's hemoglobin level is often below 10g/Leter on discharge. In a recent study it was pointed out that iron deficiency last up to 2 months. A hemoglobin value less than 12 g/Leter usually results in weakness and fatigue because of lack of oxygen to the muscle. Increased awareness of high iron foods will assist in returning the value to normal and in some cases an iron supplement is prescribed.

Iron is found in animal and plant foods. Animal sources: liver, lean meat, clams and oysters. These animal sources of iron are more easily utilized by the body. Plant Sources: fortified cereals, enriched bread, dried beans, and peas, raisins and green leafy vegetables. Vitamin C in foods helps the body use iron; therefore, plant sources of iron should be eaten with a food rich in Vitamin C to enhance absorption.

**Fortify:** The body requires approximately 50 nutrients per day; that amount is difficult to obtain with inadequate intake. Sometimes a multi-vitamin supplement will enhance appetite.

Patients usually will accept liquids over solids when appetite is poor. Fortifying the diet with a nutritional liquid supplement between meals is often well accepted as the nutritional status returns to normal.

The goal of nutrition support is to restore and maintain the patient's nutritional status. This should be an objective to not only the professional personal but to the family or critical ill or elderly persons.

## Velvetones, Bill Case to play for dance scheduled Sept. 25

Case originated the Velvetones while stationed with the U.S. Air Force in Japan in 1957. The musicians were from the 7th Air Division volunteer band. At that time, it was a 9-piece band. When Case returned to Clovis in 1960, he formed a combo and played mostly Bill Black, Ace Cannon and Boots Randolph tunes.

With "standing-room-only" crowds, Bill Case and his Velvetones played six nights a week at the Copper Penny from 1962 to 1969. Bill kept his set-up even while stationed in Thule Greenland for one year and Hawaii for three years in 1969-73.

In 1973, Bill returned from Hawaii and retired from the Air Force. With his transition to civilian life and his subsequent businesses in Clovis, he

has played in trios, a volunteer community band, country groups, and the Vern Byers Orchestra. Before Vern left Clovis to form "Vern Byers and the Las Vegas Knights," in 1989, Bill acquired some of his dance band music to start his own Big Band sound.

After putting together a book with arrangements like "Moonlight Serenade," "In the Mood," "A String of Pearls," "Pretend," "Harlem Nocturne," and "Fascination," Bill formed the band and performed for various functions and events in Clovis.

Sounding bigger and stronger than ever, Bill and his Velvetones decided to perform around the area to help keep the Big Band sound alive. The vocalist and emcee for the band is Jeff Jacobs. A native of New York, Jeff came to Clovis as a pilot trainee in the Army Air Force. With the end of World War II, Jeff decided to live in Clovis and was a CPA for many years. All members of the band are businessmen and women in the Clovis area, with a few in the USAF.

## Rural elderly living alone poorer than other seniors

Older persons living alone in rural areas are older, poorer and in worse health than other elderly Americans who live alone, according to a new AARP Public Policy Institute (PPI) report.

Prepared for PPI's Center on Elderly People Living Alone by Raymond T. Coward of the University of Florida, the report compares the lives and well-being of rural elders who live alone with the lives and well-being of other older Americans.

"Rural elders who live alone have lower incomes than rural elders who live with others or elders living alone in more urban settings," said Lou Glasse, chairperson of the Advisory Committee to AARP's Center on Elderly People Living Alone. "Because rural people with low incomes are often more vulnerable to poor health and a poor quality of life, they need the services provided by community-based social-service organizations.

"Their survival often depends on the outreach and home and community-based services provided by social service organizations," Glasse said. These agencies are a critical lifeline for older rural Americans. Unfortunately they are threatened by state and federal budget cutbacks."

The report also found:

-More than half of rural elders living alone are age 75 or older.

-Rural elders living alone have substantially lower average annual incomes than urban or suburban elders who live alone--\$9,200 per year, compared to \$12,300 and \$11,300, respectively.

-More than one in five rural elders living alone is poor; 21.2 percent of this group have incomes below the poverty line, compared to 15.5

percent of urban elders living alone and 9.2 percent of suburban elders living alone.

-More rural elderly people who live alone receive public assistance than other elderly persons living alone, but their benefits are much smaller. On average, rural elders living alone receive \$523 per month, compared to \$873 for suburban elders living alone and \$1,037 for urban elders living alone.

-Among elders living alone, those in rural areas are more likely than their urban and suburban counterparts to suffer from at least one medical condition, such as arthritis, hearing impairment or hypertension.

-Home care services become increasingly important to rural elderly people living alone as their health declines. However, only 8.1 percent of this group use in-home services.

-Almost one-third of the rural elders who live alone receive no help at all--neither from informal sources such as family or friend nor from private home care agencies.

-More than 30 percent of rural elders living alone take advantage of community services.

"If we are to improve the quality of life for rural elders living alone, we must find solutions to their problems," said Glasse. "They indicate the importance of community services for this population.

"For example, if support for community-based social-service programs is reduced, rural elderly persons living alone--one of the most vulnerable aging populations--could well be hurt," Glasse said.

Joint lubrication therefore offers a virtually natural solution to patients without any of the systemic side effects often associated with current osteoarthritis medications.

Osteoarthritis, a chronic degenerative disease of the joints, is

### Tips for Taking Calcium Supplements

- Calcium is best absorbed if taken in small amounts throughout the day — but taking it all at once is better than not taking any.
- Establish a habit that fits personal lifestyles by taking the supplement at the same time each day or with a meal.
- Avoid taking more than 500 to 600 milligrams at one time.

■ Calcium carbonate preparations should be taken at or near mealtime.

■ Avoid taking calcium with high-fiber meals or with bulk-forming laxatives. The fiber can reduce calcium absorption.

■ Consult a physician or pharmacist about possible interactions between calcium supplements and prescription or over-the-counter medications.

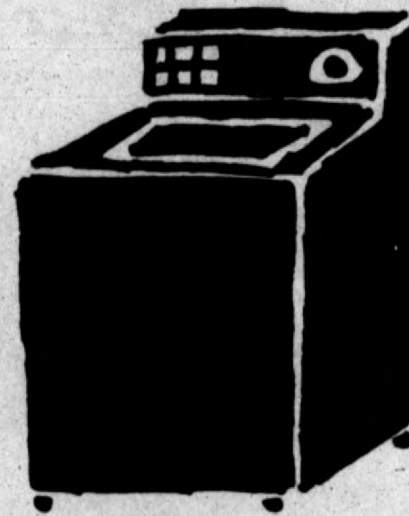
■ Drink plenty of fluids (six to eight glasses per day) when taking a supplement.

■ Individuals with a personal or family history of kidney stones should consult a doctor before beginning a high-calcium intake (more than 2,000 milligrams per day).

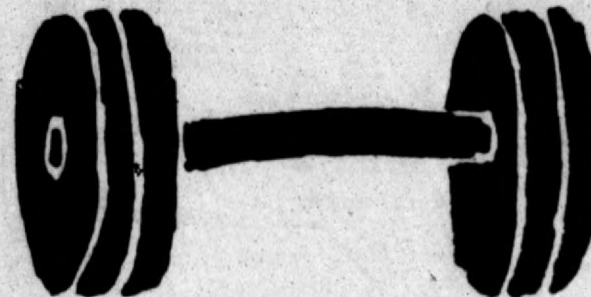
■ Iron supplements should not be taken at the same time as a calcium tablet because calcium interferes with iron absorption.

■ Calcium-fortified foods are alternatives to calcium supplements.

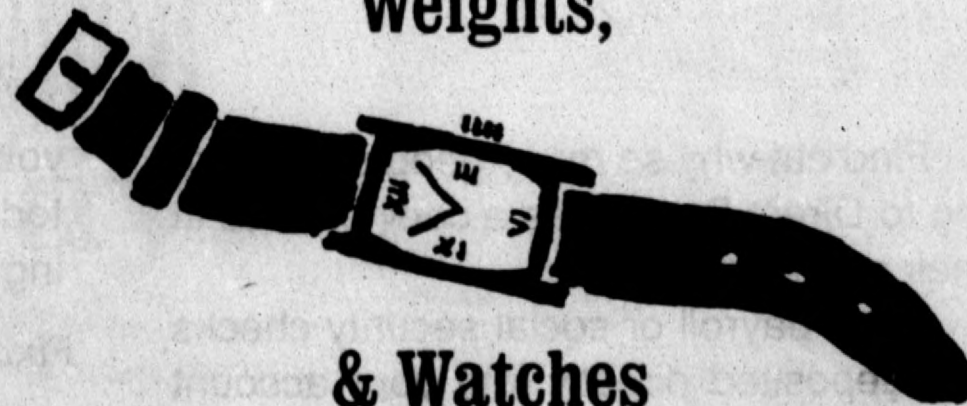

## Know cancer terminology

Every year, over a million Americans are diagnosed with cancer. All of these people, along with their families and friends, are suddenly confronted with a whole new language as they learn about the disease and its treatment.

Here are some of the terms you are likely to run into if you or someone close to you is diagnosed with cancer.

**Carcinogen:** A cancer-causing substance or agent.

**Lesion:** An abnormal change in the structure or function of an organ or other part of the body.

**Benign:** A condition that is not cancerous and not life-threatening.

**Malignant:** A condition that usually gets progressively worse and is potentially life-threatening. With tumors, this means cancer.

**Biopsy:** Surgical removal of a sample of tissue for examination.

**Stage:** A term used to designate how advanced the disease is. Usually stage I is the earliest form of the cancer and stage IV is the most advanced.

**Tumor:** An abnormal mass of tissue, which may be either benign or malignant, that develops when cells multiply at an increased rate.

**Carcinoma:** Cancer arising in the cells in the outer layers of parts of the body, including the skin and the surfaces of internal organs.

**Carcinoma in situ:** Cancer that has not spread beyond the original site.

It is often used to describe skin and cervical cancers that only affect the surface layers of tissue and have not penetrated deeper tissue layers.

**Sarcoma:** Cancer arising in connective or skeletal tissue, such as muscle and bone.

**Metastasis:** The spread of cancer to other parts of the body.

**Chemotherapy:** Drug treatment for cancer.

**Radiation therapy:** Cancer treatment involving X-rays or other sources of radiation.

**Immunotherapy:** Stimulation of the body's immune system to fight cancer.

**Adjuvant therapy:** Treatment given in addition to the primary therapy, surgery plus radiation therapy.

**Systemic therapy:** A course of treatment that affects the entire body.

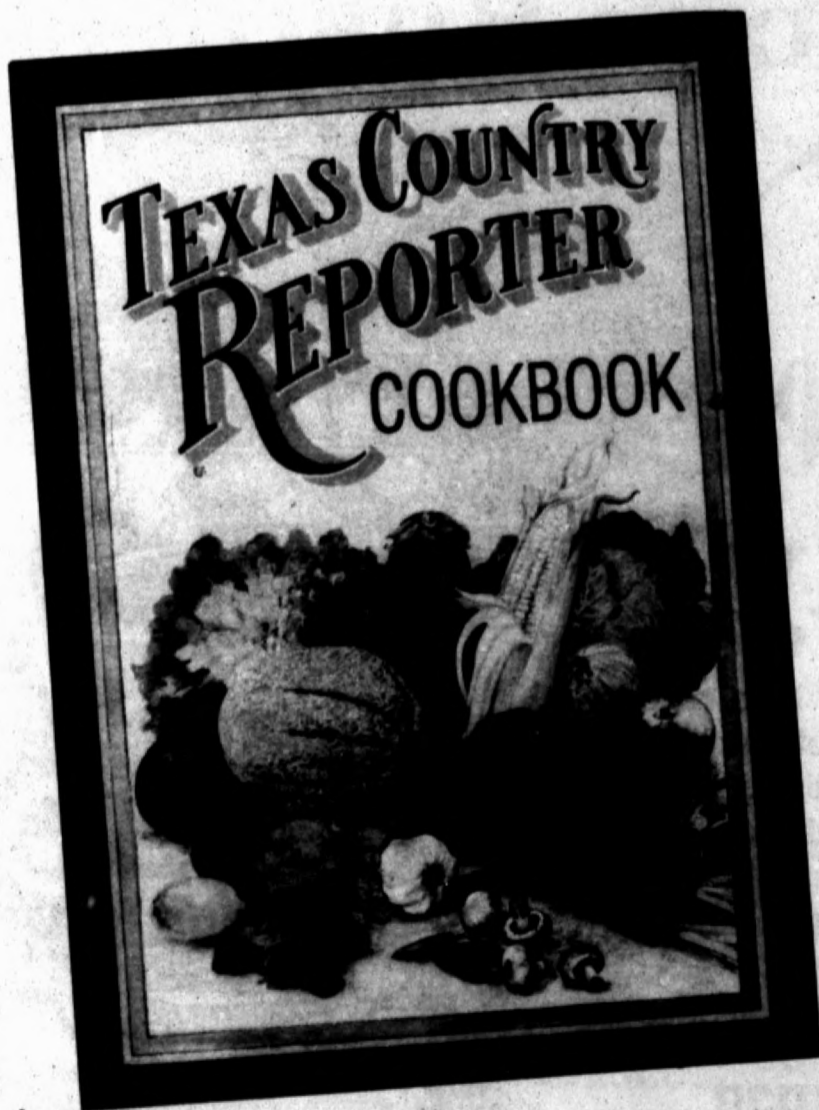
**Remission:** The diminution or disappearance of the signs of disease.

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## It's show-down time at the late-night corral

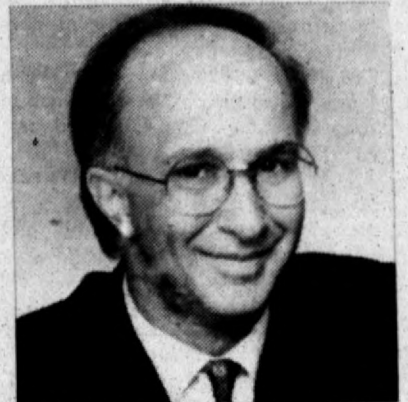
"Let the games begin!" cried a good-natured Jay Leno at a recent press conference. He referred, of course, to the late-night sweepstakes that begin Monday, Aug. 30, when "The Tonight Show," "The Arsenio Hall Show" and the new "Late Show With David Letterman" go head to head. And, Fox makes it a four-way competition with the debut of "The Chevy Chase Show" on Monday, Sept. 6.

Call it the Olympics, a horse race or an all-out war, the competition in late-night TV is not for wimps. It began about a year-and-a-half ago when NBC named Leno to succeed Johnny Carson as host of "The Tonight Show." The network passed over David Letterman, who had been Carson's heir apparent when he was given the time slot following "Tonight" a decade earlier.

Midway through that decade, NBC was sold to General Electric, a corporation known for its two-slice toasters and blue-chip stock. It was clear from the start that GE didn't appreciate Letterman. In a now-famous film clip, he tried to deliver a fruit basket to the corporate offices, only to be told by several stern employees to take his camera crew and leave. (Didn't anybody, from the receptionist to the general counsel, get the joke?)

Having won seven Emmy Awards for NBC, Letterman wanted a crack at the "Tonight Show" time slot. Still, NBC entertainment chief Warren Littlefield called him "a hard guy to understand."

Forbidden by his contract to negotiate elsewhere, Letterman signaled his interest at the George Foster Peabody Awards ceremony last August. Accepting the Peabody for infusing "one of TV's most conventional and least inventive forms" with "freshness and imagination," Letterman reached the

podium and said, "Is there a Mr. Stringer in the house?"

The Mr. Stringer who waved back was Howard Stringer, the British-born head of CBS Broadcasting and a fan of "Beyond the Fringe," "Monty Python's Flying Circus" and "Late Night With David Letterman."

The wooing of David Letterman included nuts-and-bolts meetings with producers Bob Morton and Peter Lassally, coy gifts and messages, such as the videotape of Letterman favorite Connie Chung reciting the top 10 reasons why he should move to CBS. Finally in mid-January, NBC decided not to match CBS' offer of \$14 million a year, and Letterman was effectively a free agent. Within an hour, the CBS deal was announced: Letterman would get his time slot, and CBS would finally have a late-night attraction worthy of the name.

While most CBS affiliates have signed on to carry "Late Show," some aren't yet willing to give up lucrative late-night lineups of their own making, from popular reruns to the syndicated

The building features a home-style environment with space for group therapy, exercise, relaxation and social events, as well as a training center for professionals desiring to start Gilda's Clubs in other cities.

Radner became famous in the late 1970s as a member of the celebrated original cast of NBC's "Saturday Night Live." Fittingly, two of the rooms, the "It's Always Something" room and "Noogieland," take their names from Radner's "SNL" skits.

Gilda's Club is funded by contributions from individuals and corporations, including founding contributor Vanity Fair Lingerie, and is endorsed

Birnbaum on New York City's Lower East Side, Burns first hit the stage in 1903. While performing in vaudeville, he met his two closest friends: Jack Benny and Gracie Allen. He married Allen in 1926 and worked with her on radio, television, film and the stage until her death 1964. In the decade that followed, Burns became a solo act and appeared on TV variety and talk shows. In 1975, he replaced Benny in the film version of Neil Simon's "The Sunshine Boys"; his old friend died shortly before production began. He has also appeared in "Oh, God!," "Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band" and "18 Again," and was recently inducted into the Humor Hall of Fame in Montreal. He is booked to play the London Palladium on his 100th birthday. 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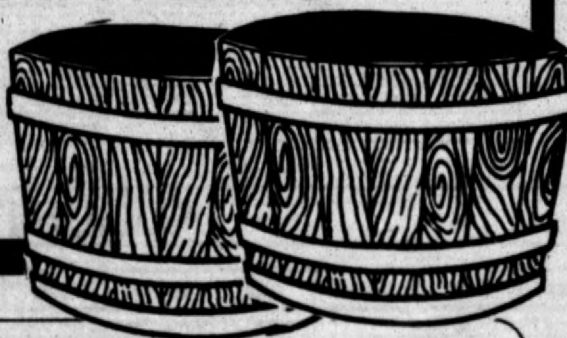

## Beloved 'Loving' actor dies

Bernard Barrow, who played Louie Slavinsky on ABC's "Loving," died of lung cancer on Wednesday, Aug. 4, in New York City's Lenox Hill hospital.

Executive producer Haidee Granger says, "Bernie's death has come as a shock to his friends and colleagues at 'Loving.' Bernie brought a zest and joie de vivre to his role and to our studio. Because of his kindness and support, he made the task of creating a daily show a true pleasure. Bernie was much loved and respected and will be greatly missed."

The actor was well-loved by fans, who enjoyed his charming, affable portrayals. Barrow's characters were famous for doling out good advice and always helping those in need — much like the actor himself.

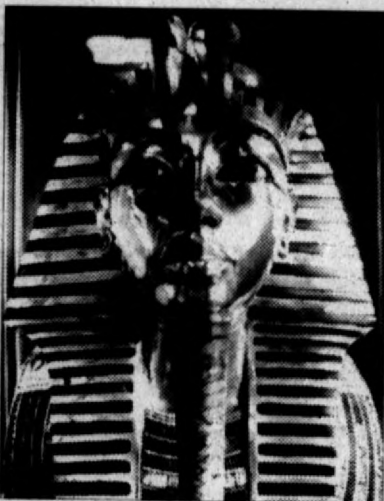
Barrow received the Emmy Award as Best Supporting Actor for his portrayal of Louie in 1991. He was nominated for two additional Emmys in the leading actor category for his work as Johnny Ryan on ABC's multiaward-winning daytime drama "Ryan's Hope." His other television credits include "The Edge of Night," "The Secret Storm," "Law & Order" and "The Waltons."

The veteran performer, born Dec. 30, 1927, began his professional career as a child radio actor in the 1940s. He graduated to the theater, appearing in musical and dramatic regional productions, and then went on to perform in motion pictures. His films include "Serpico," "Rachel, Rachel," "Glass Houses," "Claudine" and "The Survivors."

Barrow earned his doctorate in theater history from Yale University and was on the faculty of Brooklyn College from 1955 until his retirement from academia in 1983 as Professor Emeritus. Many of his students, including Jimmy Smits, have gone on to distinguished careers.

A native New Yorker, Barrow was raised in Manhattan's Yorkville section. He is survived by his wife, actress Joan Kaye of Manhattan; his children, Susan Barrow and Thomas E.L. Barrow; and stepchildren, Dr. Richard Katz and Sue Ann Cates.

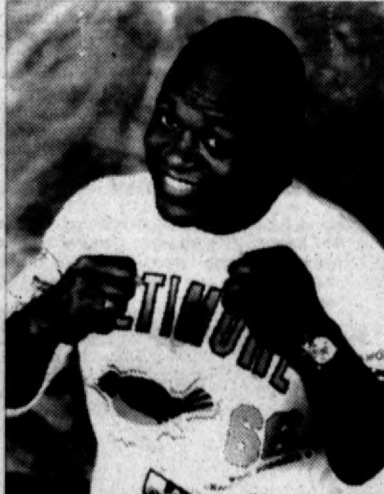

# A&E's 'Tutankhamun' updates archaeological legend

A four-hour documentary takes an exhaustive look at the greatest archeological find in history in "The Face of Tutankhamun." The BBC co-production debuts in four parts, Sunday through Wednesday, Aug. 29 - Sept. 1, on A&E. Jack Perkins introduces the episodes, each of which uses a distinct presentation style to study different facets of Tut's legend and legacy.

Sunday's opener, "The Great Adventure," resembles a "World of Discovery" episode. Christopher Frayling, professor of cultural history at London's Royal College of Art and principal narrator for the entire series, follows an experienced guide in an attempt to retrace the path of archeologist Howard Carter's 1920s expedition to find the long-lost tomb of the Boy King. Adding ironic humor to this footage is the fact that Frayling suffers from vertigo, a serious handicap in scurrying up and down desert cliff faces with sheer drops.

Monday's episode, "Wonderful Things," plays like a straightforward news documentary and makes the

heaviest use of archival footage in the series. This segment examines the grand treasures found in the tomb, as well as controversies sparked by Carter's excavation style.

On Tuesday, "The Pharaoh Awakes" drops the viewer squarely into "In Search of..." or similar speculative territory, to investigate rumors of curses that hound tomb-defilers. With its doggedly earnest discussions of radioactive mummies and poisonous gases released when a tomb seal is broken, this episode is the most overtly entertaining and titillating.

Wednesday's conclusion, "Heads in the Sand," uses "60 Minutes"-style interviews and confrontations to present a deeply disturbing look at how the contemporary Egyptian environment — with pollution, increased humidity and growing hordes of tourists — poses a lethal threat to these ancient artworks. In one ghastly segment, a "restorer" tries to inject glue into a cracked plaster figure, causing irreparable damage and leaving the piece in worse shape than before.
