As soon as a master list is received from Washington, the local selective service board will begin the task of sending out the questionnaires and classifying all persons who registered October 16.

Let's Cook Something

Here is Mrs. Jimmy Robinson's way of preparing Italian Spaghetti and if you can get it to taste half so good your family or guests will be calling for more.

ITALIAN SPAGHETTI

- Sauce — 1 lb. beef for pot roast cut in small pieces
 4 cloves of garlic
 2 large onions
 4 sprigs parsley
 4 stalks celery
 1-2 cup dried mushrooms (canned will do)
 2 small cans Del Monte Tomato Hot Sauce
 1-4 cup olive oil
 1 cup cold water
 2 8-oz. pkg. fine spaghetti

Clean mushrooms carefully, run water over them and soak in 1-2 cup water ten minutes. Cook in same water 5 minutes and set aside to drain. Meanwhile brown the meat, cut into 1-2 in. cubes, in the olive oil; add the sliced onions and garlic and saute a few minutes. Next add the cup of cold water and simmer slowly. Chop the mushrooms, celery and parsley together and add to the meat with salt and pepper to taste. Add the liquor which has been drained off the mushrooms and the tomato hot sauce. Cook slowly for a least 2 hours or until the meat is tender. Meanwhile cook the spaghetti until tender in 3 qts. of boiling water to which 1 table spoon salt has been added. Test by biting a strand—if it is tender, drain in a colander. Arrange a mound of spaghetti on a hot plate (there is enough for eight servings) and pour the sauce over it generously. Serve piping hot.

How to maneuver those long strands of spaghetti was once a matter of concern to Americans. But the increasing popularity of the dish has developed efficient manipulation of fork and spoon.

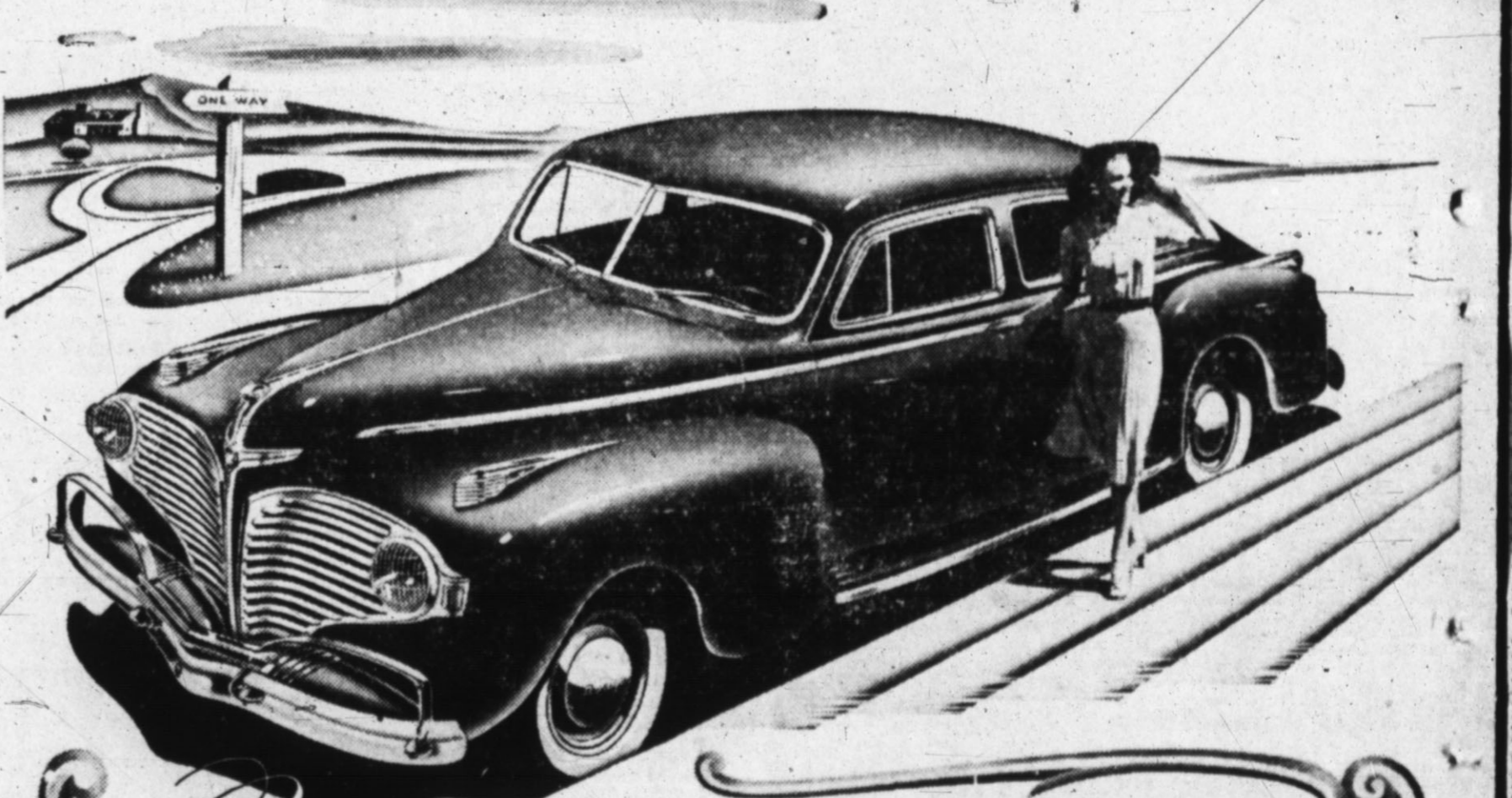

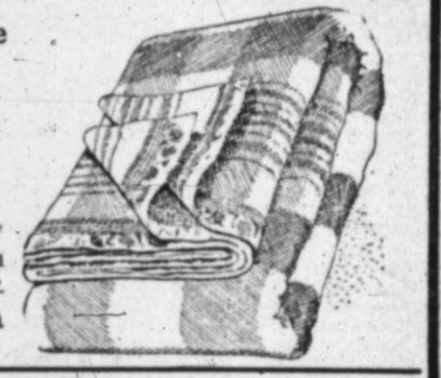

The Good Little Man Who Made Good Is Story Of L. B. Russell

When Hardin-Simmons Cowboys meet West Texas State Saturday at Canyon, L. B. (Scat) Russell, son of Judge and Mrs. W. H. Russell, is sure to be in the battle.

L. B. Russell, field general and triple threat star of the undefeated Hardin-Simmons University Cowboys, is a 150-pound blonde mite. Once a "little boy" judged "too small" to try out for the football team, he earned his spurs the hard way.

In the fall of 1937, from high school days at Hereford, L. B. went to Hardin-Simmons to try to make the freshman team.

"You're too light, too little and too delicate. You'd better go somewhere else," said Coach Frank Kimbrough.

Coach Kimbrough is the man who sent Jarrin Jawn and Jack, his little brother from Haskell, down to Coach Homer Norton at Texas A. and M., "because I don't want to be embarrassed by your abilities."

"Little boy" Russell went away. He went to Paris Junior College and played a year, while going to school.

In the fall of 1938, he was back again at H-SU. "How about it now?" he asked Coach Kimbrough.

"You still look too small to me, but you must have something, and if you want to try out, go to it," the Head Rancher told him then.

L. B. tried. He stuck like glue to the fringes of the Cowboys squad for a season. His junior year, things began to look up. In the third game of 1939 season, with Texas Mines, he got his first real chance. In the rain, he made good as the Cowhounds won, 12 to 0. Since, he's a regular.

In Hereford, he's the fifth of six brothers whose athletic ability has earned them recognition. An older brother, Babe, won the state interscholastic sprint title and lettered in track at the University of Texas, in the early '30s.

The youngest, Dan, is a high school footballer at Hereford today. The father, W. H. Russell, is an attorney there. Other brothers are Artis, Jess and Jack.

There's affection, too, in the campus nicknames for "Little Brother." Last year, when a junior, he was elected to the Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities.

In the latest H-SU win, over Texas Mines, 14 to 6, to run a winning streak to eight in a row, "Baby Ray" passed to H. C. Burrus, high scoring end, for 25 yards and one score. He slashed inside right tackle from the 4 for the other, that put the game on ice.

He held when Murray (Boom-Town) Evans, Burkburnett center, booted the two conversion points.

"Scatter" does the Cowboys punting. In the Mines game, he booted a wet ball 11 times for 456 yards, an average of 41 plus. Russell plays safety, taking in punts on the dead run without hesitation, with a confidence and sureness that fires his mates.

In the huddles—and he plays virtual 60-minute ball in the tough ones—he calls the signals. And does the pitching, too. In four games this fall, he's tossed 22 of 45 complete, for a percentage of 488. Four of them for touchdowns, to ends D. A. Parker and Burrus.

On punt returns, he's dangerous. In scoring, 2 touchdowns give him second rank on the H-SU eleven, behind Burrus, the end who led last year's scorers, and is off in front again this fall.

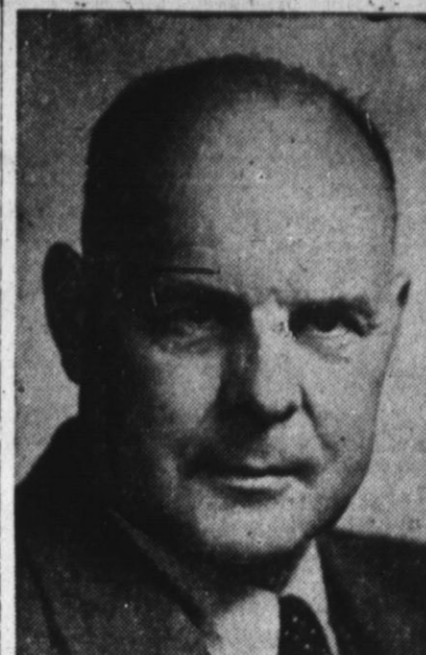

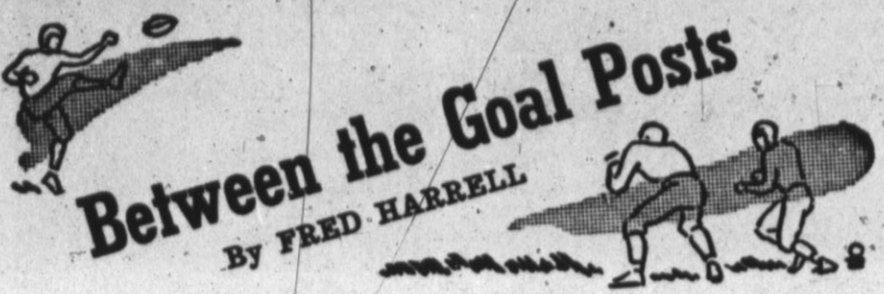

Since the Whitefaces, to whom this column has thus far been devoted, are taking this week off as far as a game is concerned, the column this week is dedicated to as tough, rough, hard-playing a bunch of footballers as ever smashed, ran, kicked and passed on a Hereford gridiron—the Hereford Huskies.

It was about this time of the year 20 years ago that a team of young men organized a football squad called the Huskies, or the Town Team. The squad was called other names by its opponents—most of them unprintable. Because in those days football was a he-man's sport. Rules offered few restraints on "dirty" playing and many things considered fouls nowadays were perfectly legal then.

The Hereford Huskies boasted in their two years of existence 1920 and 1921, such players as C. C. "Rock" Rockwell, Cliff "Tuffy" Acker, Jim "Tubby" Robinson, who was captain in 1921, "Fat" Fallwell, Jim "Dirty" Carter, Littrell Spratt, Paul Jowell, Bob Elliot, captain in 1920, Bobo McLean, Dubs Pitman, Charlie Bennett, Alban, Calude Skelton, Jack Murphy, Lee Roy Richards, Pack London, Jim Reed, Melvin Standifer, Ilo Channess, Dave and John McDonald, Fred Patton, John Patton, Travis Dameron, Lester Wilkinson, Guy, Lee and Hilliard Terry, J. L. Fuqua, Jim Lipscomb, Earl Gough, Landis Burns, Fred Fuqua, T. H. Mace, Fritz Ballard, Keith Stegall, A. Laurence, J. T. McClure, Douglas Connell, Pat Elliston, Cunningham, Easley and others.

Coach in 1920 was Bob Rowan and W. R. Steckman was business manager of the team. Homer Fox also had a part in handling financial problems.

Rivalry was especially bitter between Hereford and Vega. The Vega team boasted an array of big, tough, ex-college players and it was all Hereford could do to hold their own against them. One famous game was won by Hereford in the last 30 seconds of play when Tuffy Acker and Paul Jowell got their heads together while the Vega men were ministering to a wounded comrad and weren't watching the wily Hereford crew like they should. It was raining slightly and getting dark fast. Paul Jowell strolled casually over to the sidelines unnoticed by anyone and squatted down near the spectators. When play was resumed Acker threw him a long twisting pass which Jowell

FOUR AMENDMENTS

Dub Pitman has vivid recollections of a certain game but I promised him I wouldn't put anything in the paper about that incident, so ask him about it. The story is really good.

One time Hereford got its wires crossed and scheduled two games for the same afternoon. Nothing daunted, however, the tough

Huskies played a double-header, taking on both Wayland and Vega.

A large number of the men who played on the Huskies team still live in Hereford, a few have passed on, and others have moved away, but memories of the team and its deeds are still bright. It's doubtful if another team its equal will ever exist in Hereford.

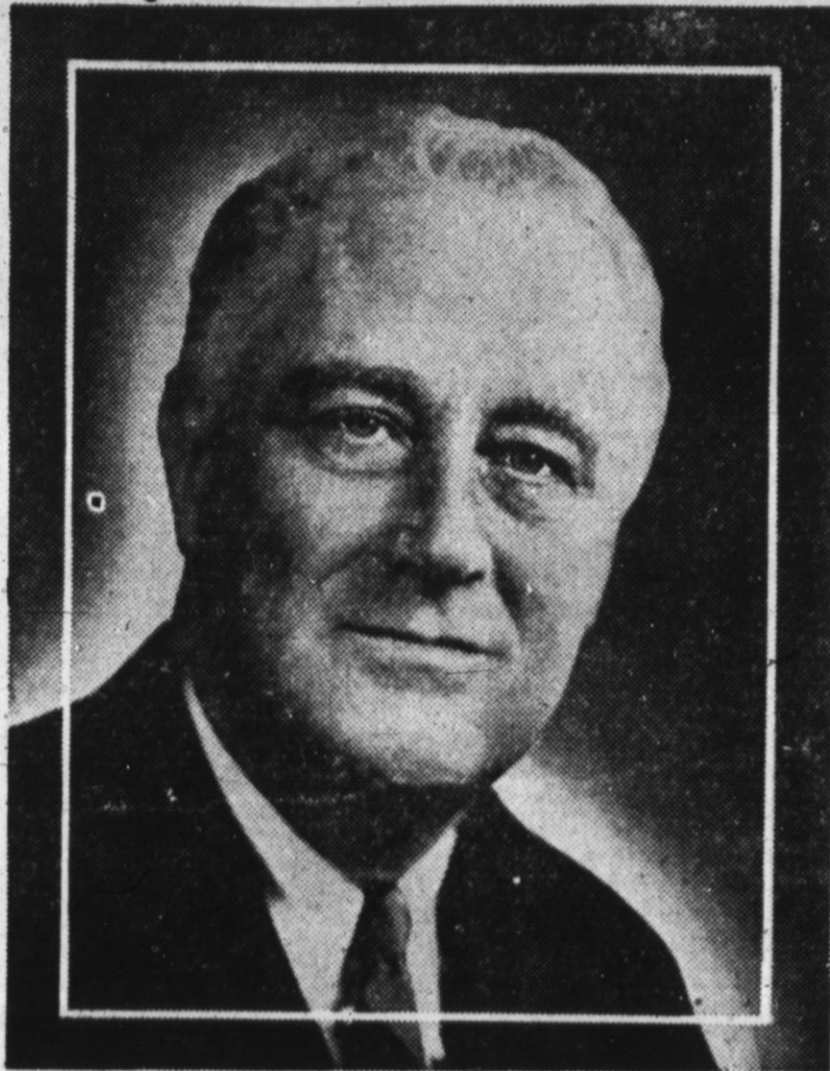

NEXT PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES --- WHICH?



Five more days and America will have decided between these two men—Franklin D. Roosevelt, the democratic candidate, and Wendell L. Willkie, the Republican nominee. A tense campaign, with more than ordinary issues involved plus extraordinary interest among the voters have given rise to predictions of a popular vote of 50,000,000.

FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT cast aside the third term tradition in seeking four more years as president of the United States and became the second person to break the tradition, the other being a distant kinsman, Theodore Roosevelt, who was defeated.

The president has charged the Republicans with incompetence in past years, with hampering the Preparedness Program. The Demos call for increased preparedness and the platform is mainly a continuation of the New Deal. The president denies that he is taking the nation into war and denies secret entangling alliances with foreign powers.

WENDELL L. WILLKIE has said that he is the only candidate fighting to uphold the ideals of Jefferson, Jackson and the Democratic party against the "New Deal Party" which would tear down those ideals. He says that breaking the third term tradition is a step toward dictatorship and charges that the present administration is leading the nation step by step into war. He promises creation of jobs in private industry, a stronger internal economy and a halt to the climbing national debt. He advocates government efforts to insure peace, instead of strife, between labor and capital.

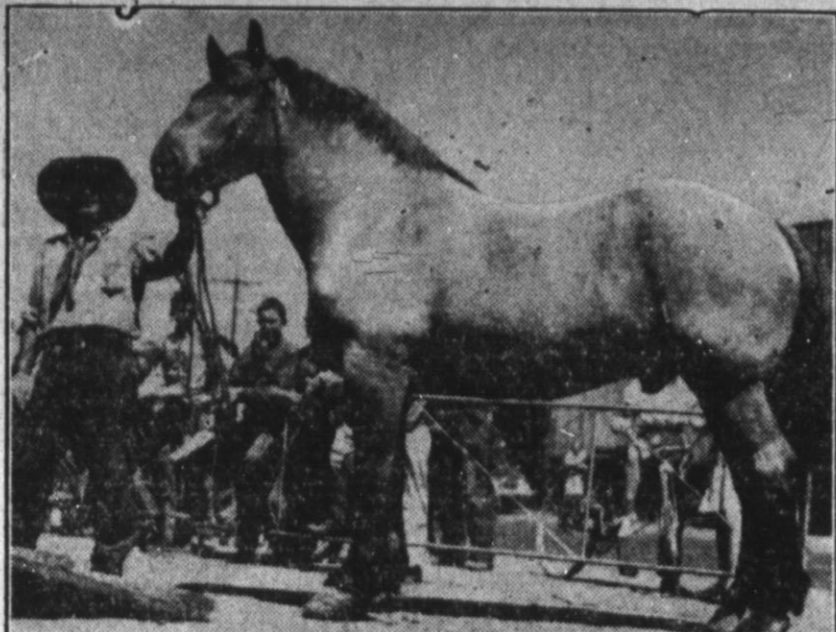

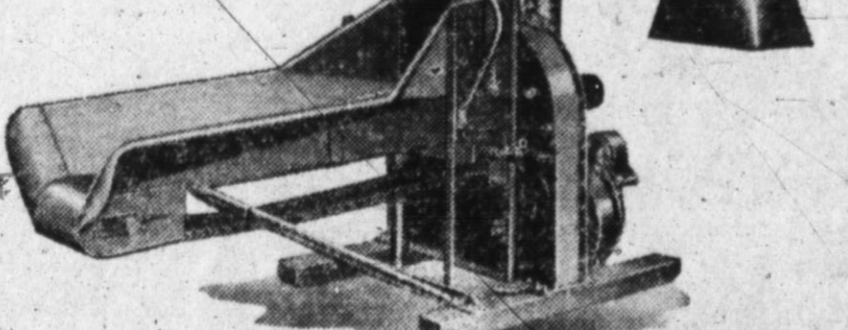
