ANOTHER FIVE-STAND COTTON GIN SEEMS ASSURED FOR HEREFORD 1924 CROP

Oklahoma Men Secure Prices on Sites and Have Gone to Dallas in Quest New Machinery. If Site Price is Right Machinery Will Be Shipped and Installed

Another cotton gin for Hereford is apparently about to be secured. In fact the negotiations have gone so far that prices on lots have been secured and the promoter is now in Dallas arranging for his machinery.

W. M. Johnson of Antlers, Okla., and his associate, S. H. Moore, spent Tuesday and Wednesday here looking into the gin situation. They conferred with the Cotton Committee of the Chamber of Commerce and were shown about by W. S. Williams, T. K. Wilson and other local men. They stated that they were looking for a good location for a new five stand Continental gin, were able to finance themselves, and asked nothing but the cotton acreage and the moral support of the people. They were assured they could find both here in unlimited quantities. After checking up on acreage they declared Hereford looked good to them and went to work to find a suitable location. It was found to be impossible to secure their first choice of location, but another site was found that suited. Negotiations are now in progress for the acquisition of this land.

Meanwhile the gentlemen departed for Dallas to purchase machinery, and the price of the lots is to be fixed as soon as possible. After which they are going to ship their stuff and get busy, if the price of the site meets their views.

It is the opinion of local men who talked to them that these men mean business and that a good gin is practically assured.

The advertising sent out by the Hereford Chamber of Commerce concerning cotton yields here the past year, and especially that of J. SPLENDID SHOW—PURE SEED WILL BE TRIED HERE FOR SEASON

McDONALD WILL PLANT 300 ACRES TEST FOR SCHEH

After negotiations between the Cotton Committee of the Chamber of Commerce and Messrs. Scheh and Kittel of Lockhart, Texas, had proceeded three days an agreement was reached which inaugurates a trial of Mr. Scheh's fine seed here and with prospects for future development work here that may result in mutual advantages all around.

In brief, the agreement is that no effort will be made to establish a breeding farm for the seed and a gin here this year but that the Lockhart men will demonstrate their seed here on the irrigated farm of D. L. McDonald; next year if the seed prove out O. K., and conditions are favorable the Cotton Committee promises to resume negotiations for the remainder of the program outlined by the visitors.

Mr. McDonald has agreed to plant 300 acres to Mr. Scheh's pure seed, at an agreed price, and sell them the seed next year at an agreed price. He is doing it without profit on the seed but merely to try out the value of this seed for the benefit of this country. The visitors thanked the Chamber of Commerce for aid rendered in the following letter:

"We had the pleasure of attending your meeting last Monday, at which time you kindly appointed a committee to confer with us with respect to locating a purebred cotton breeding association and gin at Hereford. Also handle other purebred seed.

"A meeting was held with your committee and it was decided by them and ourselves that the time was inopportune for organizing such an organization; first, because most of your farmers had already bought seed—to discard which would work a hardship on them; second, because the financing of a \$20,000 gin, and \$10,000 in cotton seed, mostly cash, presents difficulties which are not to be minimized under present conditions.

"For this reason the organization of such an association and gin at this time has been abandoned.

"We are going to try however to sell seed here, enough if possible to warrant the building this season of a gin to handle nothing but purebred seed. And recognizing your arrangement with Jones & McLean, we want to work with them for the sale of this seed. We do not want to cause any friction, and if they don't want us to sell any seed, we are not going to make any general offering of our seed.

"But we do want to establish a breeding farm, and enough of our seed planted to make a demonstration of its superiority. And we then want to come back here this year later on to organize a breeding association for next year; and to buy land here and it is our hope to be one of your members.

"We received the most courteous and cordial reception from your committee and your people, and a fine spirit of cooperation, for all of which we thank you. Sincerely,

Castro Man Buys Great Jersey Animal From Orr

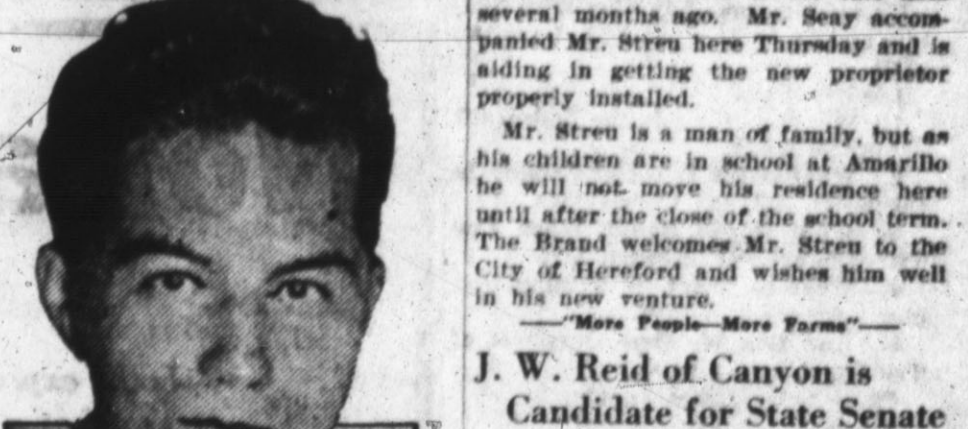

Plaintiffs allege that on said Sept. 16, 1918, they executed another promissory note to the defendants Scott & Blackmer, for \$850.00 and to secure payment thereof, executed, acknowledged and delivered to said Scott & Blackmer, a deed of trust on all of the S. W. 1/4 of Section No. 262, in Block M-6, S. K. & K. lands in Castro County, Texas, which said deed of trust is recorded in Volume 10, at page 571, of the deed of Trust Records of Castro County, Texas.

Plaintiffs allege that at the time said deed of trust was given to the said Scott & Blackmer, securing said note for \$850.00, there was an indebtedness secured by valid liens on said S. W. 1/4 of Section No. 262, Block M-6, Castro County, Texas, aggregating \$850.00.

Plaintiffs allege that each of said respective notes were given and the respective deeds of trust executed in consideration of the said Scott & Blackmer paying off and satisfying said respective amounts of indebtedness secured by said respective tracts of land and that each of said respective deeds of trust recited that the said Scott & Blackmer should and would use the money for which said respective notes were given to pay said pre-existing indebtedness against said respective tracts of land.

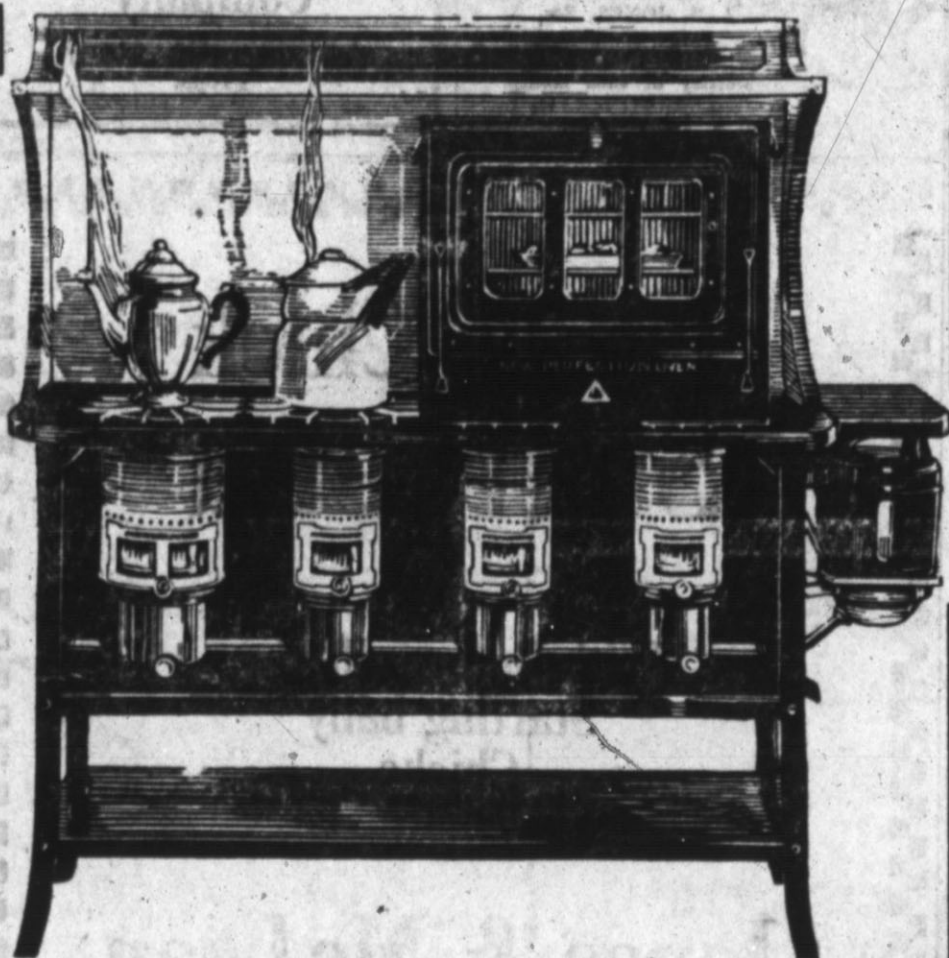
THE MAN WHO HAS NOTHING, MAKES FEW MISTAKES
