## Odds and Ends

The number of brood sows on farms on April 1, as estimated by the Department of Agriculture was 11,751,000, or 10.8 per cent less than a year ago. Indiana has 605,000, a decrease of 90,000 head, or 14 per cent as compared with 1923. Spring pigs will be less numerous in Iowa due to decreased number of sows.

Iva Marsh, Butler county, Iowa, tells of the sale of a pair of five year old geldings, weighing 4,040 pounds by Weibke Bros. to an eastern shipper for \$700. "There is a pretty good demand for horses out our way," he said. "Shippers take all good horses, and there aren't enough to go around. Farmers have been buying some workers at a range of \$60 to \$100.

"We are facing a shortage of horses. Most of the horses on farms are above twelve years old, and are not one-tenth as many foals will be dropped this spring as we had in the years before the war."

The West Texas Historical Association has been organized for the purpose of preserving the history of that part of the State. Most states consider themselves fortunate in having a state organization for that purpose, but Texas is so large and has so much history that these division associations can serve a most useful purpose. One of the benefits that will come from the proposed Texas Centennial Exposition will be an awakened interest in the history of the State. There is much of historic interest hidden away in attics that the Exposition should be the means of bringing to light.—Will H. Hayes, Department of Journalism, University of Texas.

Austin.—Approval by Judge George Calhoun of the Fifty-third District Court of Travis county last Saturday of the report of the commissioners on partition in the Syndicate case, concludes the final chapter in this famous litigation, which has been pending in the courts for five years.

Under the decree of the court, Texas recovered approximately 60,000 acres in the western portion of the State which was found to be an excess over the 3,000,000 acres donated by Texas nearly forty years ago to a syndicate in payment for construction of the Capitol. This 60,000 acres is situated in Dallam and Hartley counties and is in two bodies. This land is now worth from \$25 to \$75 an acre while forty years ago it could have been purchased at less than 50 cents an acre. This syndicate has sold practically all of the 3,000,000 acres, realizing a large profit on the deal with Texas.

## DRIVES BIG HERD CATTLE ACROSS COUNTRY

### DONALD AND PARTNER BRING STUFF FOR SUMMER HERE

Old-time trailing of vast herds of cattle were revived Tuesday when W. W. Brunson, rancher and secretary of the Midland Hereford Breeders' Association started a bunch of 2,000 Hereford yearlings from Midland to Hereford to summer them on the Chas. Donald ranch in this county. Messrs. Brunson and Donald are partners.

Eleven men will leave Midland with the cattle and will be on the road about twenty five days. The cattle will be routed from Midland to Hereford along the Texas-New Mexico line. Trailing the cattle will mean a big saving in freight, Brunson says.

Brunson bought 1,200 head of these cattle from the Scharbauer Cattle Company. Four hundred head will be from his own herds and the remainder were bought from Midland cattle raisers.

Press reports states that Mr. Donald recently bought 300 steers, most of them yearlings, from a Mr. Bailes of Columbus, N. Mex. The consideration was reported to be \$27 per head.

## POLITICS TO START BREWING MAY 3RD

### PRECINCT CONVENTION FOLLOWED BY THE COUNTY MEETING

### NEFF VS McADOO

### Whether Texas Delegates are To Be Instructed Is Big Question

On May 3, 1924, precinct Conventions will be held throughout the State for the selection of delegates to the County Conventions to be held on May 6. The County Conventions, in turn, name the delegates to attend the State Convention at Waco, May 27, where the forty delegates will be chosen to represent Texas at the National Democratic Convention to be held in New York City June 24.

There does not appear to be a vast amount of interest locally in state and national politics, and even the local agitation of former years is lacking, apparently. But it is believed that the enthusiasm will warm up as the primaries approach more closely.

But the matter of the precinct and county conventions is pressing and right on the Democratic voters of the county, and the various precinct chairmen should be busy this week preparing for the holding of precinct conventions next Saturday.

There is a great fight on in the state between a horde of candidates for governor and between Governor Neff on one side and the supporters of McAdoo on the other as to whether the delegates to the national convention for an un instructed delegation while the McAdoo men are striving for instruction for their man.

The delegates to be selected next Saturday will have a lot to do with the completion of the county delegation to go to the state meeting, where this question will be determined, and for that reason the meetings Saturday should attract more than passing attention from the voters of the county.

## Rural Carrier Examinations Held Here on May 24

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to be held at Hereford, Texas, on May 24, 1924, to fill the position of rural carrier at Hereford and vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from that postoffice. The salary of a rural carrier on a standard daily wagon route of 24 miles is \$1,800 per annum, with an additional \$30 per mile per annum for excess of 24 miles. The salary on motor routes ranges from \$2,450 to \$2,900 per annum, according to length. Separate examinations for motor routes and wagon routes are no longer held. Appointments to both positions will be made from the same register.

The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of the post office where the vacancy exists and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form 1977. Both men and women, if qualified, may enter this examination, but appointing officers have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles. Women will not be considered for rural carrier appointment unless they are the widows of U. S. soldiers, sailors, or marines, or the wives of U. S. soldiers, sailors, or marines who are physically disqualified for examination by reason of injuries received in the line of military duty.

Form 1977 and application blanks may be obtained from the vacancy office mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington, D. C., at the earliest practicable date. At the examination applicants must furnish unmounted photographs of themselves taken within two years.
