## Summer Program Of Recreation For Kids Planned

Coach H. V. Stanton, high school athletic mentor, has been employed as director for a summer recreation and athletic program for children in Hereford, according to announcement made this week.

The program is sponsored jointly by the Hereford Lions and Rotary clubs, and will be patterned after "Kids, Incorporated," the famous Amarillo juvenile organization.

A full program of activities is being planned for the three summer months for children 14 years old and under.

Several softball leagues will be organized, and each kid will compete in his own class. The leagues will be organized according to a scale of height, weight, and age.

Other activities will include junior track and field events, and other organized games for the purpose of developing skill in sports.

Stanton will enlist volunteer workers to assist in coaching the various teams and supervising activities.

Cost of the summer program is being underwritten by the Rotarians and Lions, but other organizations in the city are assisting in financing the work, and donations are being accepted. First donation to be received was \$100 from the First Christian Church.

### Ray Cowser Is Appointed New City Attorney

Ray Cowser was appointed City Attorney this week, succeeding James W. Witherspoon to that office.

The appointment was announced by Mayor W. E. Dameron. Cowser assumed the duties of the office yesterday.

Cowser, a World War II veteran, came to Hereford and opened a law office on January 1, shortly after being discharged from the army. He has since been joined by O. L. Bybee, and the firm of Cowser and Bybee now occupies offices over the Close Drug Store.

Cowser served 15 months overseas in New Guinea and the Philippine Islands with the Army Signal Corps, receiving his discharge from the service on October 29 last year. Before coming to Hereford, he was associated in the practice of law with his father, Mark Cowser, at Dimmitt.

He graduated from Hereford High School with the class of 1925.

Applications filed three weeks ago by the City of Hereford, local schools, and the American Legion-VFW building committee, for buildings and other property at the Hereford Prisoner of War Camp have apparently been side-tracked in a maze of bureaucratic juggling by Federal agencies for control of the property.

The applications were filed with the Federal Land Bank of Houston, which was acting as agent for the Federal Farm Mortgage Corporation which had just announced taking over control of the property for disposal.

In a telegram to Mayor W. E. Dameron Tuesday, C. W. Moehring of the Land Bank, who had been in Hereford accepting applications for the property three weeks ago, advised that another federal bureau, the Federal Public Housing Authority, had exercised a No. 1 priority and requisitioned transfer of all buildings at the camp, with the exception of those in the warehouse area, to the jurisdiction of the FPHA.

"Under the circumstances," Moehring wired, "we are unable to consider the city's application on its present basis. Will have our representative at the camp the first of next week and City may wish to consider submitting an application on a different basis if still interested in land and remaining buildings."

Moehring also advised that "I understand that the Soil Conservation Service, through their local regional director, intends to exercise priority, but this has not reached us officially." The regional office of the SCS is located in Fort Worth.

Hereford and Friona schools had applied with the Land Bank for some of the buildings from the camp to be used in relieving a currently pressing need for additional classroom space, and the American Legion. (Continued on page 8)

There is virtually no chance that there will be a swimming pool for Hereford this summer. Several factors have arisen to interfere with the project since the \$50,000 Parks Improvement bond issue was voted three weeks ago.

The immediate problem, according to Mayor W. E. Dameron, is that the municipal bonds cannot be sold at the present time with the city's current assessed property valuation.

"Even if the bonds could be sold now," Dameron said, "it is doubtful if materials would be available to complete the pool this summer."

A number of bonding companies have been contacted, and city officials have been advised that the authorized 3 per cent bonds cannot be sold for a 40-year term, and the present assessed valuation of city property does not provide sufficient revenue to support the (Continued on page 8)

## Government Will Take 25 Percent Of 1946 Wheat

The Government will requisition 25 percent of the 1946 wheat crop as it is delivered to the elevators this summer, the Department of Agriculture announced in Washington Tuesday.

The wheat will not be requisitioned directly from the farmers, but will be taken at the elevator.

Farmers will be required to sell 50 percent of the wheat delivered to the elevator immediately, the department has ordered. This means that farmers will not be able to store more than 50 percent of their crop at the elevator for future sale.

The announcement represented the most drastic action taken to date by the government in an effort to solve the problem of providing wheat for export to famine-struck countries overseas.

At the same time, announcement was made that the war food order prohibiting use of wheat products in the manufacture of beer and alcohol would be continued until next summer.

Off-white bread will be continued for at least another year.

The Department of Agriculture estimates of Texas' wheat crop this summer dropped from an estimated 89,940,000 bushels on April 1 to 35,000,000 bushels on the May 1 estimates which was released this week.

This would be the shortest wheat crop produced in Texas since 1941.

All farmers of this area who are interested in growing vegetables for the new canning plant now under construction in Hereford are invited to meet tomorrow night (Friday) at 8:30 o'clock at the County Courthouse in Hereford.

Worth Ware, manager of the Plant, has called the meeting for the purpose of contracting planted acreage in black-eyed peas, carrots, green beans, beets, and possibly other vegetables for canning this season. Arrangements for canning pease potatoes will be discussed.

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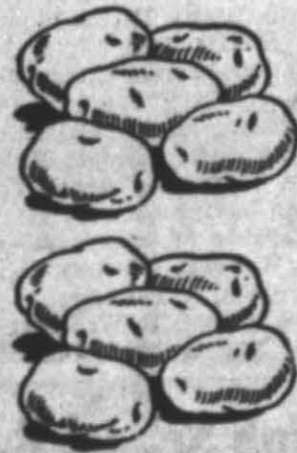

The President's Famine Emergency Committee asks us to conserve wheat and fat products so that 500 million people will escape starvation. bond issue for a shorter period.

A sufficient increase in the tax rate to support the bond issue cannot be made, Mayor Dameron pointed out, due to the fact that Texas statutes impose a maximum tax levy of 10 cents on the \$100 valuation to support parks improvement bonds.

Although Hereford's tax rate, at \$1.30, is still 20 cents below the legal maximum, the city cannot legally increase the tax rate to the maximum figure to support this bond issue.

The only solution to the problem is to raise the assessed valuations of city property, which, Mayor Dameron estimates, should be nearly double its present figure of about two and one-half million dollars.

Since the people of Hereford voted overwhelmingly in favor of the bond issue, and obviously want a swimming pool, the present city administration will do everything necessary to provide it, the mayor promised.

However, it is obviously impossible to start construction until the bonds can be sold, and steps must be taken to increase property valuations before this can be done.

If materials can be secured for the project, the pool should be ready for operation by next summer.
