Farm Goals for Texas Will Be High in 1946

COLLEGE STATION, December 31—Texas farmers have been given the green light for large scale production of field crops, livestock, milk, and poultry and poultry products in 1946. Suggested production goals for next year were accepted by a large group of farmers, and representatives of the Texas Extension Service, Production and Marketing Administration, teaching departments of the A. and M. College of Texas and other agencies working with agriculture at a meeting on the College campus December 17. The goals will be carried out in two-day educational meetings conducted by the A. and M. College Extension Service with representatives of state and federal agricultural agencies participating during January and February.

Prior to his navy service, Mr. Wilson was a member of the faculty of Vernon High School, and is returning to Hereford now in his new capacity as an agent for Southwestern Life Insurance Company.

Dimmitt Boy Fatally Burned When Gasoline Explodes



Little Tom Cowan, 5-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Bart Cowan of Dimmitt, was fatally burned last Thursday afternoon when a drum of gasoline at the rear of the Golden Harvest Cafe in Dimmitt exploded. Cause of the explosion was not definitely known, but it was believed that the boy either struck the barrel with a hammer, causing a spark, or struck a match nearby. Tom ran into his father's cafe with his clothing aflame, and Mr. Cowan was seriously burned about the hands, arms, and legs in a vain effort to save the child. Two customers in the cafe at the time, Raymond Wilson and Ray Cowser, extinguished the fire by wrapping table cloths and coats around the boy's body, and immediately rushed him to the Cogswell Hospital in Dimmitt, where he died three hours later. Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church in Tahoka Friday afternoon at three o'clock, with Rev. M. J. Lee, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Dimmitt, officiating. Pall bearers were Erwin Stewart, A. L. Smith, Morris Small, F. E. Calvery, and Wynne Collier of Tahoka and W. H. McMillan of Dimmitt. Surviving members of the family include the parents, three brothers and one sister.

County Passes Overall Quota On War Bonds

Reporting total amount of \$284,276.50, T. E. Ricketts, chairman of the Eight War Loan Drive, said today that Deaf Smith County passed its overall quota on war bonds. "This is the first time since the war that Deaf Smith County has fallen short of its bond quota," Claud Ricketts, County Chairman said. "He pointed out that because the overall quota the county did not really reach on the drive, which closed at 11:30. "In addition, he has described previous drives by large margins, including Series "E" Bonds," Mr. Ricketts said. He expressed appreciation for the splendid support of the committee and each of the War Loan chairman during the eight drives.

Brand Begins 46th Year in Hereford

With this issue The Brand enters its 46th year. Hereford Volume 1 No. 1 was published in Hereford in February 1900, when Hereford itself was only two years old, and, according to The Brand, "The most prosperous year in the past." A year later, because of 1902, the name of the flourishing little newspaper was changed to The Hereford Brand, and so it has remained.

Price Control On Tires Will Be Continued

The removal of price ceilings on January 1 has no bearing whatever on price control over tires and other rubber goods. E. H. Norton, Chairman of the Area Price Board, said today. Tires are still short and it is obvious that with so many people needing and trying to get scarce tires there will be a tendency to bid prices up. This bidding up of prices on scarce commodities is the stuff of which inflation is made, the Price Chairman said, pointing out that ceiling prices on all goods must be adhered to until the supply becomes plentiful enough to remove the threat of inflation. For the benefit of former "A" gasoline book holders who have not been able to buy tires since the war started Norton said that the top legal price for any 60x16 four-ply passenger tire is \$16.38 and that a 65x16 four-ply tire is \$19.75. The Price Chairman also suggested that drivers take the best possible care of their tires remembering that it will still be several months before everybody will want tires will be able to buy them. Consumers should keep in mind that all dealers are required to supply a sales ticket on an invoice showing the size of the tires and the price per unit. Where doubt exists as to tire costs the sales receipt may be submitted to local OPA Boards for examination.

New City Well Ready When Housing Finished

The new city well is ready to go into operation as soon as brick can be obtained to complete the pump housing, according to Mayor E. S. Ireland. Shortage of materials for the small building is all that is holding up the project, the mayor said.

Meeting of Dairy Men on Saturday

A meeting of all dairy men in Deaf Smith, Farmer and Castro counties at the County Courtroom in Hereford at two o'clock Saturday afternoon has been called by B. E. Brumley, Earl Springer, and Frank Wilde. The meeting will be for the purpose of forming a permanent dairy association. All dairyman who are interested in forming the association and in getting a higher price for milk are urged to attend.

Steak Fry Thursday Night at Christian Church for Vets

An informal steak fry held at the Christian church Thursday night, December 27, concluded the activities of the "Welcome Home" committee for this Christmas season. The occasion honored all local World War veterans and their families. Herman Ford, chairman of the committee, gave the welcoming address, after which Harold Cline led the group in singing a variety of songs. The Rotary club, with a committee headed by A. Peterson, had charge of preparing and serving the meal. Dinner was served to approximately 140 servicemen and their families.

E. B. Black Co. Begins 45th Year

The oldest business firm under continuous management in the city, the E. B. Black Company, Inc., is entering its 45th year in Hereford. The firm was established in 1901 in a small frame building on the exact spot where the present modern business structure now stands. The founder of the firm, E. B. Black, died on March 12 last year, but the company incorporated in 1937, is still under pioneer management J. M. Gilliland, now the senior member, joined the firm in 1913; followed in 1918 by W. Jesse Stanford, Marlin Gilliland joined the company in 1930. The firm plans to continue under the same name and management, and will continue to offer the same high quality in home furnishings, and the same high standards of mortgage services that have established its reputation in the past, says Mr. J. M. Gilliland at the beginning of the new year.

Red Cross Needs More Volunteers For O'Seas Kits

Mrs. Henry Hastings, sewing chairman, and Mrs. C. B. Williams, production chairman of the Hereford are issuing a call to all Red Cross Chapter this week. Cross voluntary workers to return to the job of preparing overseas kits for servicemen. With large numbers of American troops still in overseas service, the need for the overseas kits continues. Ray Cowser, formerly of Dimmitt, opened a law office on January 1 in the Close Drug building. Mr. Cowser was discharged from the army on October 29, after serving for 15 months in the Pacific Theater, having been in campaigns in New Guinea and the Philippine Islands with the Army Signal Corps. Since returning to the United States, he has been associated with his father, Mark Cowser, in law practice at Dimmitt. He is a graduate of Hereford High School, class of 1925, and attended the University of Texas Law School. Mrs. Cowser and daughter, Donna, are living in Lubbock at the present time, but expect to move to Hereford soon.

Victory Clothing Drive To Start Here Next Monday

The Victory Clothing Drive, sponsored locally by the Hereford Lions Club, will open Monday, January 7, continuing until January 31. Barrels for the collection of clothing will be placed at the Star Theatre, the Texas Theater, Ireland Motor Company, Consumers, J. C. Penney Company, and the Post Office. The collection, which is conducted on a nation-wide basis by the UNRRA, is for the purpose of providing clothing for the war-truck populations of Europe and Asia. Serviceable clothing of all kinds is wanted. Clothing donated for the drive should be clean as possible and free of dirt. W. J. Smith, chairman of the Lions Club committee in charge of the drive, said today. Clothes, shoes, and hats for babies and children, men and women, are needed. The clothing drive conducted in Hereford by the Lions Club last year was a great success, and the Lions hope to establish an equally good record this year. Donors are now permitted, Smith said, to include their name and address with the garments if they so desire. Many people established correspondences with people of other nations in that manner last year. Assisting Mr. Smith on the Lions committee are S. O. Wilson and Glenn Snyder.

The two new teachers will take their places on the faculty at the end of the current semester. Their arrival in Hereford, Miss Brown and Mrs. Franklin will substitute in their places on the staff.

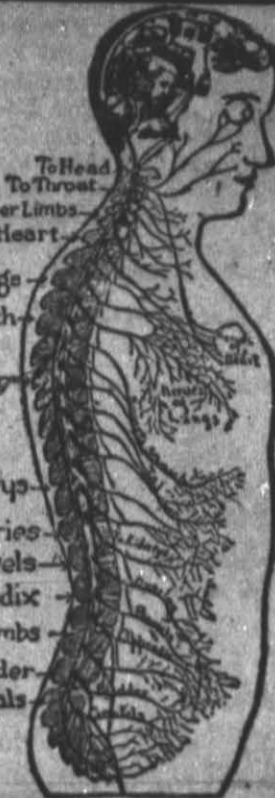

New Regulations Overseas Mailing Are Announced

New liberalized postal regulations governing mailing of newspapers and packages to service personnel have been announced by Postmaster J. R. Lipscomb.

The Navy Department has announced that effective on January 1 restrictions on mailing of newspapers and other second class matter through Fleet Post

Offices at New York and San Francisco have been lifted. No requests are necessary now to mail papers to addresses overseas in the Navy, Marines, or Coast Guard. Requests are still required for mailing of newspapers and packages to Army personnel overseas, however, Lipscomb pointed out.

Regulations governing the size of packages sent overseas to army personnel have been changed to allow a maximum weight of 11 pounds, instead of the former 5 pound limit. Size of the package has been increased to a maximum of 42 inches in length, instead of 18 inches, and the combined length and breadth is increased to a maximum of 72 inches instead of 36.
