Cotton planting is now underway on the Cauble place and Rexie believes they will get a fair stand.

Moisture rising from the lower levels hasn't been able to keep up range grass, however. Reports indicate that most cattlemen in this area who have not already done so are planning to unload most of their commercial stuff and try to carry their cows over on the meager feed supplies available. Tom Good has sold off 800 steers in cutting his herd down.

The cattle market in Big Spring continues to hold up as one of the best in the entire Southwest. It was reported Wednesday afternoon that bidding had to be halted on several head at the Big Spring Livestock Auction company's sale due to the ceiling price.

County Agent Gives Suggestions Using New Emergency Flour, Gives Recipes

"In using the emergency flour in biscuit, muffin and quick loaf breads I have found that my usual recipes work satisfactorily," Margaret L. Christie, county agent has told housewives.

Miss Christie added that the flour varies, as did the flour used in the past, and does not always require the same amount of liquid, but since most cooks are accustomed to adjusting such variation there should be little difficulty.

The Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics reported that the new flour used in regular biscuit, muffin and quick loaf recipes gave generally acceptable results. They suggest that the homemaker, starting out with her first new flour: (1) follow her own recipe as usual, unless the manufacturer gives specific directions on the package for his particular flour; (2) if the dough or batter seems a little soft with the familiar recipe, try a little less liquid and a bit more flour in the mixture. These are minor adjustments which some of the new flour may need.

Biscuits
3 cups sifted flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
4 to 6 tablespoons fat
Milk to make soft dough (about 1 cup)

Sift dry ingredients together.

Cut in fat. Make well in mixture. Add milk slowly, stirring from center until soft dough is formed. Place dough on lightly floured board. Knead gently about 18 strokes. Roll into sheet 3/4 of an inch thick. Cut into as many biscuits as possible from first rolling. Place on greased baking sheet. Bake in hot oven 12 to 15 minutes.

Variations:
Sour Milk Biscuits
Sour milk may replace the sweet milk in above recipe if 1/2 t. of baking soda and 2 t. baking powder are used instead of the 4 t. of baking powder.

Drop Biscuits
Stir dough about 18 light strokes. Do not knead. Drop by teaspoons on greased baking sheet.

Cheese Biscuits
Add 1 c. of grated cheese to the sifted dry ingredients.

Orange Biscuits
Add 1-2 c. grated orange rind to sifted dry ingredients.

Nut Breads
Add 1-2 c. chopped nuts to sifted dry ingredients.

Peanut Butter Biscuits
Decrease fat 1-2 and add 4 T. peanut butter with fat to dry ingredients.

Short Cake
Use 1-2 cup fat in above recipe instead of 4 to 6 T. 1 to 2 T. sugar may be added for fruit shortcake if desired. Roll to 1-4 inch thickness. Bake in two layers, spread-

ing butter between. Bake in hot oven.

Muffins
(12 medium-sized muffins)
2 c. sifted flour
3 t. baking powder
1-2 t. salt
0 to 2 T. sugar
1 egg, beaten
1 c. milk
2 to 4 T. fat, melted.

Sift the dry ingredients together. Combine the egg, milk, and melted fat. Add to the dry ingredients all at once; stir just enough to moisten and give the mixture a rough appearance. Fill greased muffin pans two-thirds full. Bake in a hot oven 400 to 450 degrees F. for about 20 minutes.

Whole Wheat Muffins
(12 medium sized muffins)
2 c. whole wheat flour
3 t. baking powder
0 to 2 T. sugar
3-4 t. salt
1 egg, beaten
1 c. milk
2 to 4 T. fat, melted

Sift the dry ingredients together. Combine the egg, milk, and melted fat. Add to the dry ingredients all at once; stir just enough to moisten and give the mixture a rough appearance. Fill greased muffin pans two-thirds full. Bake in a hot oven 400 to 450 degrees for 15 minutes.

Oatmeal Hurry-Ups
Sift flour, salt and baking powder together. Add oatmeal. Cut the shortening in. Stir in the milk. Drop by teaspoonful on a well greased baking sheet. Makes 1 1/2 dozen medium size. (May need more flour and salt.) Bake at 450 degrees for 15 minutes.

Cornbread
1 1/2 c. corn meal
2 t. baking powder
3/4 t. soda
1 t. salt
1 egg, slightly beaten
1-2 c. buttermilk
3 T. melted shortening

Mix dry ingredients together well. Mix egg, milk and melted shortening together. Add liquid to dry ingredients. Mix well. Pour into hot, well-greased pan and bake in moderate oven (about 375 degrees F.) 35 to 50 minutes.

Equal Terminal Pay For GI's Approved

WASHINGTON, May 9. (AP)—Reversing a previous stand, the house military committee yesterday approved legislation giving enlisted service personnel the same terminal pay rights that officers now have.

The legislation would allow a maximum of 120 days pay to army and navy enlisted men at the time of their discharge, provided they have accrued but unused furlough time when they are mustered out.

The committee bill makes the legislation retroactive to all enlisted personnel who have served since the draft law was enacted.

"DON'T DIE TILL YOU CAN'T HELP IT," HE SAYS AT 100

CHATHAM, Va., (AP)—"Uncle Sam" Lovelace, onetime slave now past the century mark in years, is still sound of wind, limb and philosophy. The elderly negro says his longevity is "God's providence." He believes that "you live as long as you can and die when you can't help it."

Free of ailments all his life, he does more work than many far younger men are capable of doing. He works from sunup to sundown at woodchopping, feeding his pigs, carrying sacks of feed from the mill nearby or hunting "poke salad" for the hogs.

He lives in a weather-beaten cabin on highway 37, rises at 3 a. m., eats three simple meals a day, works in between, and is bed by seven.

Born in slavery to Nellie Lovelace, cook and washerwoman for "Widow Barbara Wooding," who lived near Chatham, Sam was 19

when Lee surrendered at Appomattox. Until 22 he was bonded to his mother, which meant that she received his wages. Then he set out for himself, bought a mule, a bit of land and started making a crop. All his life long he has made enough in the fall to tide him over until the following fall.

He is pleased with the way his life has turned out. He has his children around him. Mary gave up cooking in Pittsburgh to keep house for him.

AUSTIN, May 9. (AP)—Attorney General Grover Sellers has told the supreme court he resented the proposition that the senate of Texas is set up to "check on the great governor of this state" in the discharge of his appointive duties.

Sellers was replying to an argument in the case testing validity of the senate's recent confirmation session, that such power and duty had been written into the constitution in 1876 "to check what had been the unbridled power of the governor to make appointments."

The shortage is due to the influx of persons from the country and the demolition of old houses, as the preliminary step of a modernization program. Thousands of families are sharing living quarters. Rents have risen sharply. Many houses are being rented for \$40 to \$100 and more a month, which is more than many middle-class workers are paid a month.

Take It Easy; Take It Easy; Clean Your House By Plan

It may sound fantastic, but how clean your house may be learned in Three Easy Lessons! Simple, no end!

1. PLAN AHEAD. Let your head save your heels by checking cleaning supplies, cloths, equipment, well in advance. Shop with a list so there will be no forgotten items. List and plan for necessary repairs. Work out a schedule—drawers, closets, book shelves one day; curtains, spotting of rugs and furniture another. Living room—Wednesday, bedroom—Thursday, and so on—one room at a time. Right glad you'll be that the sun room or the den is presentable on the day you have started on the living room and the new minister comes to call!

2. DAY BEFORE DOINGS. Take care of little things the day

before. Polish silver pieces, dust or wash the ornaments on the whatnot, figurines on the shelves, perfume bottles on the dressing table. House them on trays, under a dish towel, to be returned to their respective abodes tomorrow. Remove all pictures from the walls of that room, clean and stack them in a safe out-of-the-way place. Take down, and if there's time, wash and iron glass curtains; dust and hang out to air the draperies, table spreads, counterpanes, blankets.

3. TAKE IT EASY. Don't start more than you can finish easily, even though it does mean departing from schedule. Plan on stopping about 4 o'clock for a bath, a bit of a nap, a fresh frock before starting dinner. Order of the day: Dust down walls. Dust and clean furniture, rugs, floor. Clean windows, hang curtains and pictures. Polish furniture and floors. Have a cup of tea! Replace furniture, bric-a-brac. Easy does it.

IT'S A GOOD IDEA to have two sets of curtains for the kitchen, other rooms if you like; slip covers for the chairs, a change of pillow covers. And it makes sense to pull the furniture around this time of year. In winter, chairs should have a chummy, sit-by-the-fire-and-chat arrangement. Coziness and warmth should be in the air. But spring and summer demand airiness and a feeling of spaciousness; a general exodus from the fireplace and a turning toward sun room, patio and porch.

Lamb Fricassee
Pan Fried Tomato Slices
Buttered Noodles
Lettuce with Bacon Dressing
Hard Rolls
Prune and Walnut Pudding (Recipes serve four)

Bacon Dressing

8 slices bacon
1 teaspoon brown sugar
Few grains pepper
1-4 teaspoon paprika
1-8 teaspoon mustard
2 tablespoons vinegar

Shred lettuce and pile on white lettuce leaves on individual plates. Cut bacon in tiny squares and cook until crisp. Strain bacon fat into small bowl. Sprinkle bacon dice over the lettuce. Return four tablespoons bacon fat to frying pan and add rest of ingredients. Mix until smooth. Bring to boiling point and pour over lettuce.

Prune and Walnut Pudding

1 cup cooked prunes
1-2 cup prune juice
1 cup boiling water
1 cup sugar
1-8 teaspoon salt
1-4 teaspoon cinnamon
1-3 cup cornstarch
1-3 cup cold water
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1-3 cup shredded walnuts
2 egg whites

Remove stones from prunes and combine meat with prune juice, boiling water, sugar, salt and cinnamon. Bring to boiling point. Add cornstarch which has been mixed with cold water until smooth. Stir and cook until thickened, then cook ten minutes over hot water. Add lemon juice and walnuts. Mold and chill. Beaten egg whites may be added after removing from the range or used as a meringue to top the individual molds before chilling.

Rubber Rubs Out Weeds NEW DEVELOPMENTS EASE FARM LIFE

CHICAGO, (AP)—Some of science's new developments to short-cut drudgery and make farm life easier are being exhibited in Chicago by the United States Rubber Co. Among new agricultural chemicals and rubber products on display are:

A new chemical spray that smother the weed crop and destroys it. The chemical can be used on lawns and in fields to eliminate such broad-leaved plants

as bindweed, Canadian thistle or dandelion.

A new seed treatment designed to protect planted seeds against decay and harmful soil fungi until fickle weather can get to work and start growth.

A rubberized electric heating pad that is installed in the top of a chick brooder cover.

A large version of the pad is available for hotbeds, placed beneath the soil where it creates heat to germinate seed.

For the farmer's wife, and other wives, too:

A new textile permanent starch treatment that is invisible on fabric and unaffected by laundering and dry cleaning.

A tea towel for drying dishes that is made with 20 per cent asbestos fiber. The fabric is said to have great absorbency, quick polishing, minus lint and resistance to fire.

Study US Roads

DENVER, (UP)—Four Latin-American highway engineers are studying western road-building techniques in Colorado, Wyoming, New Mexico and Utah in preparation for launching a multi-million-dollar highway construction program in their native countries.

The engineers, representing Peru and Costa Rica, are working with the US Public Roads Administration.

The sampling method of obtaining information is becoming increasingly important, Lewter pointed out, in emphasizing that the survey is not only important to agricultural colleges but to the various agricultural agencies and others whose job it is to serve farm people.

As far back as the oldest residents can remember, Big Spring has been called "Big Spring." Even before the railroad pushed westward and was routed down through the hollow that divides the plains from the uneven terrain to the immediate south, the migrants referred to it in that manner.
Few are the natives who don't know the origin of the name, though the surge of water that inspired the label—located at the west end of the old T&P lake south of town—has long since dried up.
Other communities within the county have their "christening" stories, too, though they are be-

coming dimmer by the impact of time.
One of the youngest of the villages is Forsan, which sprang to life during the oil boom of the late 20's. Some one hit upon the idea of honoring the earth from whose bowels gurgled the life blood of the town. Oil was being produced at four different levels—four sands—at the time. Four sands was formally shortened to become "Forsan."
A big portion of the homesteaders who came west developed a liking for the land to the north. Part of the pioneers came all the way from Vincennes, Ind. When it came time to select a name for their community, they chose to honor the place they had departed and abbreviated it to be "Vincent."
Many of the communities were christened to honor leaders in their particular sections. Some of those leaders are still alive and their namesakes prove fitting memorials. Cauble, in the southwestern section of the county, adopts the name of a leading cattle breeder, J. B. "Doc" Cauble.
Ottisnik was first called Chalk for a rancher-olman of that part. It had to be altered when it was discovered another village was identified by that name. However,

every one still refers to the Howard county settlement as "Chalk."
Morgan grew to be known by that name after one Phillip Morgan had located there. Phillip now resides in Baltimore but the name he gave the settlement endures.
Morris was given birth by a former rancher who now lives in Lamesa.
W. P. Soash had illimitable designs for the community bearing his name. He built a bank and dreamed of a metropolis but the dreams were air castles that never materialized.
Coahoma, which ranks next to Big Spring in population, was first called Signal Mountain and was identified as such long after the railroad was put through there. Not until the turn of the century was it changed to Coahoma, a name of Indian origin.
Sand Springs is called that for a very obvious reason. A shallow spring which once provided water for cattle and man alike was located there. The property belonged to John Merzick before expansion set in.
R-Bar was given life by the old R-Bar ranch. The owners preferred not spelling out the "bar" but the settlers who later moved in elected to add it.
The late Luther Lawrence was the inspiration for Luther, which still maintains a post office, incidentally.
The venerable C. S. Knott, who long since has sold his property, left an indelible imprint on his community by leaving an appellation for that settlement.
Gay Hill; it is told, fell heir to the name of the late R. E. Gay, a leader in that section.
When the old Highway 80 traveled a circuitous route eastward to Coahoma, a small schoolhouse halfway between the two towns was, for want of a better name, called "Midway."
Highway was a community that came and went with the years. At one time boasting a school which long since has been moved to Knott, the stop was called that because it was situated on the thoroughfare between Big Spring and Lamesa.
A fork in a creek by the same name in the southwestern section of the county gave inspiration for the name of "Elbow."
There is a spot in the northeastern section of the county over which Mother Nature seems to have wielded a most fastidious brush. When settlers there chose a name, they picked "Green Valley." It must have been a wet year.
Vealmoor is an elaboration on the prominent ranching name of Veal. Mrs. Minnie Slaughter Veal still has holdings there.
Center Point was christened as such because, in other years, it was a focal point of activity in that section.
Hartwells was patterned after the name of a ranchman named Hart, who was prominent in that area for many years, and for vital wells.
The Lomax family is still prominent in the community known by that name. The school honored Uncle Louie Lomax, a long time resident there.
Sid Moore had a large ranch in the northwestern portion of the county. When his neighbors hunted around for an appropriate name with which to identify the section, they did the old man honor by choosing his cognomen.
