Transfer caps historic rise and fall of thrift

Managing Editor Hi-Plains Savings and Loan Association was started by wellmeaning men with a well-meaning premise, and \$125,000, in August

It came to rest Friday, as a branch of Bluebonnet Savings Association. Its deposits were sold to AmWest Savings. The signs are being taken down this weekend, and the onceproud association will become home of Hereford Cablevision on Monday.

In its 35 years, Hi-Plains became the granddaddy of what is now a super-huge government bailout of proportions only a bureaucrat could understand. The Resolution Trust Corp, the S&L bailout agency, has spent \$87 billion to close 652 thrifts. RTC is spending at least \$5 million a day to clean up the mess left by failed real estate deals, the culprit at HPS&L, and downright fraud at some others.

Hi-Plains Savings and Loan Association was chartered Jan. 28, 1957 and gained approval from the Federal Savings and Loan Administration in August. In the planning since October 1956, it opened at 128 East Third on a simple premise in simpler times:



Hearing is Monday on development

'Progressive Place' raises questions for some citizens

A new development planned northeast of Hereford will be the subject of a hearing Monday night by

the Hereford City Commission. Progressive Place is an 80 acre tract about 1 1/2 miles northeast of Hereford on Progressive Road. Charlie Bell of Hereford and John Davis of Corpus Christi plan to divide the tract into 28 lots and sell them.

Several citizens are concerned the subdivision could become another Coronado Acres, a subdivision that was sold by Bell over 10 years ago about seven miles south of Hereford along U.S. Highway 385.

At Coronado Acres, lots were sold in five acre tracts with virtually no deed restrictions. While some of the lots have a good appearance, others do not. Several have makeshift livestock pens on them; others have

Brand story leads to arrest in '89 vandalism

A story in the Hereford Brand over two years ago led to the Friday arrest of Mario Flores Jr. for criminal mischief on Halloween 1989 at West Park Cemetery.

Flores, 24, was arrested last month in the murder of Johnny Martinez, 15, on Sept. 2, 1990 southwest of Hereford.

Flores was arraigned Friday by District Judge David Wesley Gulley for criminal mischief, causing damage between \$750 and \$20,000. The charge says Flores pushed over grave markers and caused them to break. If Flores is convicted of that charge, he could be sentenced up to 10 years in prison and fined up to \$10,000. He could also be forced to pay

restitution. Flores' bond was set at \$50,000 on the criminal mischief charge. Flores is in Deaf Smith County Jail in lieu of \$100,000 on the murder charge. He was charged in Blackfoot, Idaho on July 1. He waived extradition

Bluebonnet has played hardball with its liabilities, including newspapers that have run negative articles about the thrift's dealings with the federal government. After a Brand series in 1989 over the Fail acquisition, Bluebonnet's ad agency in Dallas canceled its advertising schedule with the paper and threatened to refuse payment for an ad in that issue. The ad, however, was paid for, and the company later advertised a handful of times.

"These will be 2.5 acre tracts, half the size of those at Coronado Acres, and I think that will keep a lot of the junk out," Bell said.

Tower's victory was staggering. Texas Republicans hadn't even bothered to hold a primary election in 1960. But liberal Democrats couldn't bring themselves to vote for conservative William Blakely of Dallas, and many figured Tower would be easier to knock off when the term ended in 1966.

He wasn't. Tower won re-election in 1966, 1972, 1978, retiring in 1984. His seat remains Republican. In 1984 and 1990, it was won by Phil Gramm, a one-time "Boll Weevil" Democrat who had changed parties in 1983 and is widely considered a 1996 presidential

prospect. "The political system prior to Tower was one party with two factions," Knaggs said. "It didn't change the whole picture immediately, but Tower's election provided a rallying point for Republicans at lower levels who'd been

voting for conservative Democrats." Current GOP Chairman Fred Meyer of Dallas says the gradual change in voting by conservative Texans has boosted his party's ranks.

"Go back 20 years ago, the conservative Democrats were in control," Meyer said. "The thing today is that somewhere between 50 and 60 percent of voters in Texas identify themselves as conservative. They may not all be Republicans, but they're

Republicans say several factors contributed to GOP growth:

-Republican women's clubs. For years, they staffed phone banks, licked envelopes, conducted get-out-the vote drives. "I give them a huge amount of credit. They provided the determination and the workers that allowed us to get where we are today," Strake said.

-Party switching. In 1962, Democrat Jack Cox switched parties after losing a close gubernatorial race against Price Daniel. In the early 1970s, former Gov. John Connally switched. During Strake's tenure as GOP chairman, 55 incumbent or former Democratic officeholders did



"Take-home pay" is a common phrase used by folks who earn a regular paycheck. Most of them probably don't pay much attention to the itemized stub which includes two big items--federal income tax withholding and their contribution to the FICA, or Social Security system.

The FICA amount is matched by the employer and then sent to Washington to be safely stored away in a trust fund for employees' retirement years. Well, that's the way it's supposed to work.

But there is no such thing as a Social Security Trust Fund. Every dollar that is sent to our nation's capitol is immediately spent, either for benefits for current retirees or by the general fund. It's called robbing Peter to pay Paul. The social security funds provide a ready source of cash for all the other spending that Congress has mandated for the year.

What really blows your mind is to consider this: If the federal government had set up a separate fund to draw interest on those dollars when the Social Security system was initiated--and had not used the money except for retiree benefits--that fund today would form the richest treasury in the world! That's the word from a former administrator of the Social Security system.

And, if that had happened, we wouldn't have to keep increasing the FICA contributions.





Clinton schooled in counterpunch

On labels, on foreign policy, on capital punishment and other matters, the Clinton campaign has adopted a preemptive - rebuttal.

It may succeed and it may not. The Republicans haven't yet launched the full fall campaign offensive that is sure to begin at their convention in Houston, which opens Aug. 17.

But the Clinton campaign already has established that its candidate will Dukakis stuck to his own script and Urban League convention. seldom counterpunched. Dukakis now says the new campaigners have learned and applied the hard lessons of his losing race against Bush.

The difference is on display in the liberal labeling argument.

Dukakis said in 1988 that the campaign and election were about competence, not ideology. The Democratic National Committee issued a four-page compilation of statements by Republicans saying, as Clinton had, that the United States should consider air strikes to guard United Nations relief efforts in Bosnia.

"Dan Quayle and George Bush can talk about capital punishment," said Clinton, who has signed off on four executions as governor. "I'm the only one who's carried it out."

there is a lingering question in your damages caused to the rental vehicle mind as to whether you should go back and take the extra coverage. So what is the answer?

Basically, if you have comprehensive coverage on your personal vehicle, then you are fully covered while driving the rental vehicle. Your policy may limit coverage of rental vehicles to 20 or 30 days, so you only need extra coverage if you intend to keep the rental car for an extended period of time.

You should keep in mind that if your liability limit is only the minimum required by state law, then purchasing the extra coverages could be an inexpensive way of increasing your protection. If you are driving in heavy traffic or in an unfamiliar location, then the extra liability protection might prove valuable.

If you have liability coverage and uninsured/underinsured coverage on

When you rent a car, the rental your personal vehicle, then you should buy the extra coverage for property damage. If you damage the rental car, neither your liability or your uninsured/underinsured coverage would pay for repairs.

With uninsured/underinsured Inevitably, as you drive away, coverage on your personal car, by some third person would be covered by your insurance in the event the third person had no insurance.

Likewise, if your only carry liability coverage on your vehicle, then you would want to accept the extra coverages offered on the rental car. Under the rental agreement, you are made liable for property damage to the rental car and also for loss of use of the rental car while it is being repaired.

Corpus Christi, Tex., and St. Augustine, Fla., also observed Queen Isabella's birthday on April 22, braving further slings and arrows from Jewish and civil rights groups who grimly note that the Jews she expelled from Spain sailed on the same tide that carried Columbus out to sea on that first voyage. Corpus Christi, designated the official Texas city for the quincentennial, winds up its celebration with the dedication of a larger-than-life bronze statue of the explorer. St. Augustine was named by Ponce de Leon, the Fountain of Youth faddist who acquired his taste for exploration by sharing crew quarters with horses, goats and pigs on Columbus's second

Reprising those epic voyages, Spain dispatched replicas of the Nina, the Pinta and the Santa Maria to 21 New World ports at a cost of \$15 million. As was the case the first time around, the natives so far have not always been friendly. In several ports between Galveston and Baltimore Native Americans symbolically paddled out in war canoes to repel Spanish invaders. However, the volunteer Spanish naval officers aboard have been warmly applauded for their skill in navigating the tiny caravels with instruments similar to what Columbus used. Re-crossing the Atlantic was no picnic: Several sailors tired of coping with the cramped quarters aboard jumped ship in the New World.

What appears to Columbus buffs as only meager United States participation in the quincentennial has been redeemed by AmeriFlora '92 in Columbus, a rattling good show that manages to blend the exotic blooms of a European horticultural event with the wonder of a Disney theme park and the rural charm of a Midwest state fair.

This largest U.S. event is being staged at Franklin Park, a splendidly revamped 100-year-old municipal park covering 88 acres and graced with a magnificent Victorian glass house that went up right after Chicago's Columbian extravaganza. Enlarged and fitted out with computerized technology, the conservatory re-creates the ecosystems of seven climate zones ranging peaks of the Himalayas.

Disney-trained specialists were brought in to liven up what was first conceived as a flower show inside the abandoned Ohio penitentiary (asbestos roofing nixed that idea). The event soon blossomed with Epcot-style multimedia shows, a century-old carousel, a topiary garden of Mickey Mouse characters, theme restaurants evoking an Irish pub, a Bavarian beer garden and a Hawaiian luau, and a midway alive with strolling mimes, stilt walkers, magicians and marching bands.

"Horticulture was still our hook, but what do you do after you see 4,000 roses? Audiences today are more demanding," explained general manager Richard Franks of the Columbus Dispatch, who like his publisher, John Wolfe, AmeriFlora's chairman, has been a mover and shaker in his city's 500th anniversary salute to its namesake.

Fifteen nations, including Japan, Korea, Italy, Australia and Malaysia, contributed exhibits ranging from a Russian dacha and a bonsai courtyard to a live wallaby and an English

Among the attractions luring tour buses by the hundreds from Canada to Texas is Dino Discovery Dig, which AmeriFlora's master planner Scott Girard, a 23-year-Disney veteran, calls "the world's largest sand box. As soon as the gates open hundreds of kids get in there and dig for souvenir toys and trinkets we've salted away. By early afternoon they have uncovered the stainless-steel skeleton of a 70-foot long brontosau-

The mallway is dominated by Navstar, a 30-foot high stainless-steel sculpture by Columbus artist Stephen Canneto, depicting the three billowing sails of the explorer's caravels heading west into choppy waves created by dancing fountains.

Columbus has its own replica of the Santa Maria moored downtown in the Scioto River, against the dramatic backdrop of the skyscraper skyline. Other events include art and music festivals, a world horseshoe pitching tournament and a marathon with an international field of 6,000 runners. A local brewery has brewed up Columbus '92 to toast the jubilee, and the zoo features Qin Qin and Xing Xing, giant pandas from China. On Columbus Day the celebration reaches its climax when the big parade follows a purple stripe painted along Broad Street past the state capitol where another Columbus statue, not quite as large as William McKinley's, has been refurbished with a fountain gushing down a pedestal of Ligurian slate from his home province in Italy.

Quincentennial booster Franks admits the organizers were several years into their planning "when the issues of political correctness surfaced. We weren't sensitive to it at first, but we tried to deal with it honestly. We felt the best way was to bring in the Smithsonian's 'Seeds of Change' exhibition which deals with the good,

the bad and the ugly of the encounter."
The Smithsonian show, which draws long lines at AmeriFlora, shows how life on both sides of the Atlantic was affected by five "seeds": corn and the potato, which transformed European agriculture; the horse, which changed the Indian way of hunting; disease, which reduced the native population from 100 million in the time of Columbus to under than 2 million now, and sugar cane, which replaced

Caribbean rain forests with plantations worked by African slaves.

"We also worked hard to include Native Americans in the program, with an authentic long house displaying their culture and crafts" said Franks, "but I'd be very surprised if they all agreed with what we've done.'

Among the most vocal Native Americans not in agreement is John Sanchez of the Yaqui nation, a professor of communications at Capital University in Columbus. Sanchez was among the protesters at the gates of AmeriFlora when Air Force One made its flyover and delivered George and Barbara Bush for the opening day ceremonies. The Columbus legacy, he insists, "includes murder, rape, plunder, disease, racism, pollution and more. To us he's Hitler. The \$95 million spent on celebrating his 500th anniversary could have been better used helping the homeless and unemployed among this city's large Native American population." He derides Indians staffing the long house at AmeriFlora as "Uncle Tom-Toms who don't represent their people."

Sanchez has decided against any protest activities during the Columbus Day weekend. "Our tribal council of elders has declared this a year of mourning, and we have been asked not to be confrontational. Instead I have invited hundreds of tribal leaders from reservations around the country to set up tepees and lodges, hopefully on the Ohio State campus, for a day of mourning."



Courier, boxer Griffin upset in Barcelona

BARCELONA, Spain (AP) -There's no such thing as a sure thing

- just ask Eric Griffin or Jim Courier. Griffin, far and away the top U.S. boxer, and Courier, the world's No. gold rush today after a pair of stunning defeats to unheralded opponents. Both were considered medal shoo-ins.

Griffin's date with Olympic destiny was canceled by a hometown hero who won a narrow decision with a controversial judge. Courier was wiped out in straight sets by a Swiss player ranked No. 44 in the world.

Griffin, generally considered the best amateur fighter in the world, lost in the second round of the 106-pound competition to a squat Spaniard - as shocking a loss as the U.S. boxers could suffer and the biggest upset of the Games.

Medina Dixon of Norfolk, Va., led the Americans with 19 points. In their first game, the women blew out Czechoslovakia, 111-55 - setting U.S. records for most points scored and largest margin of victory.

The two-time world champion Courier's favorite surface and 8-4 victory over Australia. But the talk among the players wasn't the game; it was the missing Yugoslav team, which is the defending gold medal champion.

In other NL games, Pittsburgh reclaimed first place by beating St. Louis 3-2, Philadelphia shut down Montreal 2-0, San Diego beat Los Angeles 4-3, and San Francisco downed Atlanta 4-3. The Cubs-Mets game was postponed by rain.

In the AL, Minnesota beat Milwaukee 4-1 and Kansas City beat Oakland 6-5 in 10 innings, giving the Twins a half-game lead in the AL West. In other games, Toronto beat New York 13-2, Detroit downed Cleveland 9-6, Seattle defeated Chicago 6-3 and Baltimore and Boston split a doubleheader. The Red Sox won the first 7-4, while the Orioles claimed the rain-shortened second 4-3.

Nearly a week after they won - and then lost - their opening match with Japan, the U.S. volleyball team found out today its last appeal to get the victory back was rejected by the International Volleyball Federation.

The federation politely turned down the request and promised to look into the matter in the future," United States Olympic Committee spokesman Mike Moran said. 'There's nothing more we plan to

A red card for repeated complaints about the officiating cost the United States the game. Although the referee allowed the teams to finish play, with the United States winning, the federation reversed that ruling and awarded a penalty point to Japan.

Since the infraction occurred at match point, Japan was declared the winner. The volleyballers, seeking a spot in the quarterfinals, play France today.

There was more action in the boardroom this morning, as the International Olympic Committee rejected a proposal which would allow two British weightlifters banned for steroid use to compete at the Games.

The British Olympic Association argued the drug used by the pair was not on the IOC list of banned substances. The two athletes were sent home Wednesday after testing positive.

Four athletes with failed drug tests in the past won four medals Friday. If disgraced sprinter Ben Johnson is looking for inspiration, he can glance across the Olympic Stadium or over at the U.S. swim team.

On the day the Canadian track star returned to the Summer Games, four fellow Olympians found redemption after drug suspensions - three of them U.S. athletes, two in the same stadium

where Johnson ran again. The most stunning victory Friday came in the 1-2 finish of shot putters Mike Stulce and Jim Doehring, who gave the United States its first gold-silver sweep in the event since 1968. Bronze medalist Vyacheslav Lykho of the Unified Team won bronze; all three were returning from drug bans.

Angel Martino of Americus, Ga., who failed a 1988 drug test, returned to get a bronze medal in the women's 50-meter freestyle.

Day Seven of the Games brought another gold for swimmer Matt Biondi - a record-tying 11th career medal,

earned while he watched from poolside - and for teammate Summer Sanders, who won her fourth.

Biondi, who won eight golds over three Games, didn't get wet for the last one - a world record tying 400-meter medley relay. He swam in a qualifying heat, but sat out the final after a poor showing in the 100-meter freestyle.

Qualifiers count when it comes to handing out medals, and that's how Biondi won the one that ties him with swimmer Mark Spitz and shooter Carl Osburn. He finished with two golds and a silver in Barcelona.

Jeff Rouse of Fredericksburg, Va., Nelson Diebel of Hightstown, N.J., Pablo Morales of Santa Clara, Calif., and Jon Olsen of Jonesboro, Ark., made up the U.S. relay team, which finished in 3:36.93.

The Dream Team cruised again, led by Charles Barkley's 30 points in a 127-83 victory over Oscar Schmidt and Brazil. Chris Mullin scored 19 points and Scottie Pippen had 14.

The American boxing team put four fighters in the quarterfinals, and 10 of 12 U.S. fighters remain in the competition. Nine have won.

The final four for the first baseball medal was set after the United States stole 10 bases in an 8-2 victory over Puerto Rico. The Americans will join Japan, Taiwan and - sorry, fellas -Cuba in the medal round.

It was a busy day for the former Soviet republics, which had their ups and downs - in one case, both in the same game.

The new world order matched the old world's gold medalists against each other in basketball - four of the 1988 Soviet champions on the Unified Team, four on the Lithuanian team. The Unifieds, in a stunning comeback, overcame a 19-point deficit with 15 minutes to play and won 92-80.

The first-ever Estonian medal went to Erika Salumae, a gold in the women's cycling sprint. The introduction of the new nation confused somebody - the Estonian flag was flown upside down at the medal ceremony.

Last, but far from least, was the Unified Team's Ibragim Samadov, who won the bronze medal in 180-pound weightlifting - and then refused to accept it. Angry after losing in a tiebreaker, Samadov walked off the medal stand in the middle of the ceremony.

The winner: Pyrros Dimas, who won the first Greek Olympic weightlifting gold in 88 years.

Davis remembers days with Houston Buffs

HOUSTON (AP) - It is dark inside. A single uncovered light bulb casts an orange glow around the room but doesn't quite reach the corners. It is 95 degrees outside, but even

hotter inside.

The walls are covered with old, yellowing copies of The Houston Post. Almost all of the articles are related to baseball. One wall is lined with programs from funeral services. Must be 50 of them, all friends or relatives who have come and gone.

Otis "Fritz" Davis has outlasted them all, but this little Third Ward shanty is all he has to show for his 72 years of living - and one glorious day when he became the first black man to play professional baseball on a white team in the 20th century.

"I knew that someday, somebody would have to be the first," Davis said. "I figured it might as well be me."

The year was 1932, some 15 years before most in the white world of baseball even heard the name Jackie Robinson. Moses "Fleetwood' Walker and his brother Wellday Walker were the first black men to play in the major leagues; in 1884 for the Toledo Blue Stockings of the American Association. But they combined to play only 47 games before baseball went back into its deep, segregated sleep for 63 more years.

Fritz Davis grew up a few blocks from Buff Stadium and used to stop on the way home from school to watch the Houston Buffs practice. The players learned to like him, and one day Fritz was in the right place at the right time when Manager Joe Schultz fired the batboy. Homer Peel ran in from right field to the fence where Fritz was standing and said, "Hey kid, want a job?"

This was where Fritz became friends for life with Dizzy Dean and Joe Medwick, both of whom would be enshrined in Baseball's Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N.Y., and Joe Schultz Jr., the manager's son and the team's other batboy, who went on to participate in three World Series.

Together, they shared the joy of the Buffs' 1931 Texas League championship with a 108-51 record. Dean went 26-10 that year with a 1.53 ERA and had 303 strikeouts, while Medwick hit .305 before being called up to play for the St. Louis Cardinals the final month of the season.

While Fritz did all the grunt work from shagging balls to shining shoes, he was more than just a batboy. He earned the Buffs' respect and they taught him everything they knew.

Owner Wayne Ankenman took good care of Fritz. Ankenman paid him \$19 a week, but Fritz also would get tips from the players after each game. Fritz asked Ankenman to keep his money for him until he needed something, then Ankenman went out and bought it for him.

"They loved me," Fritz recalls.
"They thought, 'Good God almighty, that boy can play. We need to keep him."

Whenever the Buffs would travel to a game by car, Medwick would pile 12-year-old Fritz into the front seat. On off days, he would drive over to Davis' Third Ward neighborhood and play sandlot games with Fritz and his friends.

"Joe was my boy," Fritz recalls with a big smile on his face. "Good God almighty, he taught me everything. He was the best. He gave me everything I had. He took me anywhere I wanted to go. He loved black people.

"One day my boy told me, 'Fritz,

if I can do it, you can, too. One of these days you're going to be playing this game.

As the 1932 season dragged toward its close, the Buffs missed the playoffs. They finished on the road against the Galveston Buccaneers on Sunday evening, and Schultz decided he wanted to have some fun in a season-ending doubleheader.

The Bucs won the first game as George "Lefty" Darrow pitched a three-hitter and Galveston scored three runs in the fifth on the way to a 6-1 victory.

Then things got crazy in the nightcap. With darkness falling around Moody Stadium and a crowd of 1,400 watching, Schultz decided to do something no other manager on record had ever dared.

Nearly every Buffs infielder took turns pitching, with second baseman Bill Narlesky, shortstop Hank Baker and first baseman Lee Stebbins all taking turns on the pitcher's mound before Schultz himself took the mound to face portly left-hander Hank Thormahlen.

Then came the seventh. Schultz sent in his 13-year-old son, Joe Jr., to the plate to face Thormahlen and the boy responded with a single back up the middle to become the youngest player in pro baseball history to get a base hit, a record that still stands today. Joe Jr. eventually stole second and scored the Buffs' final run in a 6-2 loss.

"It wasn't planned that way," said Schultz Jr., who coached in St. Louis from 1963-1968, managed the expansion Seattle Pilots in 1969 (remember Ball Four?), and replaced Billy Martin as manager of the Detroit Tigers in 1974. "Dad just came up to me and said, 'OK, son, it's your turn

"I was excited, because I always loved to hit in batting practice. All I remember is facing that big left-hander and hitting a grounder back through the box.'

When the crowd turned to the on-deck circle, they began to laugh when little Fritz Davis picked up his favorite bat, took a few nervous cuts, then walked into the batter's box. This was the chance Schultz and Medwick had promised him, the chance he and many other black men before him had been waiting for.

He was announced as "Gene Rye." but newspaper accounts the next day called him "Snowball." One newspaper box score carried the name Snowball; another chose not to list his name at

"I was just a kid and scared. Oh, yeah, people were laughing," Fritz recalls. "Joe told me, 'Don't worry about anything. You know how folks are. You just go up there and don't worry about them.

Fritz swung at the first pitch, then pulled two balls foul down the left field line. He battled until the count reached 2-2, but then struck out on another Thormahlen curve.

Davis was more upset with the outcome than he was taken aback by the historical significance of the event. A black man playing a white

man's game. In Texas. In 1932. It was meant more as a gesture of appreciation than a social statement, and it would be 15 more years before Jackie Robinson became the first black man to cross major league

baseball's color line. 'We didn't think anything of it back then," Schultz remembers. "To

us, Fritz was just one of the guys." Davis didn't really understand the separation of black and white people until he left the Buffs as a batboy in 1941 at the age of 21 and began a professional career of his own as a

New Orleans Black Pelicans, we were just so glad to be playing Cleveland Clippers and Chattanooga anywhere. Choo-Choos.

Like many of the Negro League players, Davis was talented and waiting for a chance to play in the majors. Fritz said he hit 45 homers one year and stole 40 bases and must have hit somewhere close to .850 ("I hit everything they threw at me," he says), but he felt like he was starting all over again.

"The owners knew there were plenty of talented black players," said William "Fireball" Beverly, a former Negro League player who lives in Houston and is writing a book on the subject, "We would draw large crowds, and probably 60 percent of them were white people because they knew we played good

"The owners knew it, too, and they started signing us and sending us to the minor leagues, but they were just hiding us so that other owners couldn't have us. We eventually

"The owners were afraid to field a team with too many blacks. They were worried that the public wouldn't accept it, but they eventually found out the public doesn't care as long as you play good baseball."

Davis knew Jackie Robinson during his days with the Monarchs, and he believed he was every bit as

"He (Robinson) told me, 'I can't hit it or catch it like you can,' Davis recalls. "You the best one we

Branch Rickey, general manager of the Brooklyn Dodgers, knew there would be tremendous pressure on the first black player in the majors. Rickey believed Robinson was most capable to meet the challenge.

"He made the right choice," said Beverly, who recalls that Robinson learned everything he knew from Kansas City teammate Willie Wells. "Jackie had the kind of temperament





Greenville team once beat mighty Yankees

Greenville Herald-Banner GREENVILLE, Texas (AP) - In 1949, the New York Yankees won 97 games, captured the American League pennant and launched a string of six straight World Series titles.

But that spring, at least for a day, the Greenville Majors were one run

The Majors' 4-3 victory over New York on April 10, 1949, remains one of the most memorable sports triumphs of Greenville and Hunt County.

The exhibition game meant nothing in the standings and provided no obstacles to Casey Stengel's powerful Yankees. But it did and still does to those who still cherish the long-gone memories of big-league baseball in Greenville.

Marie Heidmann spent many a summer night at the ballpark. She jokes that her golden years have robbed her of last week's memories. They haven't, however, stolen her recollection of the old days.

"After supper, we would sit back on the porch and talk. A little after 7 p.m., we would hear sounds from Phillips Field (then the name of the stadium, not the current high school football field). It would start with 'Take Me Out to The Ball Game.' So up we went, to the ballgame," she recalled.

"That really was a wonderful, wonderful time. Nobody had much (money) then but you really didn't need it. People didn't have to pay a lot to see a baseball game. It was family entertainment. Those were the nicest boys. And they could play,

So the Yankees discovered. The April 10, 1949, edition of The Greenville Morning Herald called the upcoming game "one of Greenville's biggest sports events in history."

East Texas State University archivist and oral historian Dr. James Conrad said the meeting - scheduled to be one of two straight played against major league clubs - was the result of a "major coup" by Greenville's new owner, George

Schepps, a Dallas businessman, bought the Majors, a Class B team in the Big State League, and promised a winner. The Majors had been anything but that the previous year, finishing last and losing their final 12

At the annual league owners meeting in Minneapolis, Schepps ed for the Yankees to p Greenville in a spring game. It would be the first major league club to play Greenville in a quarter of a century, but only because an April 9 contest against the Chicago Cubs was called off due to rain.

The belief among some that the heavily-favored Yankees played a line-up of scrubs is a myth. The Bronx Bombers started five players who held starting berths during the '49 season, including Joe DiMaggio. DiMaggio hit .325, belted 39

homers and drove in 155 runs the year before, so his presence alone would probably have been enough to incite a near-frenzy among the 3,000 fans jammed into Majors Stadium.

But the talent didn't stop there. Starting shortstop Jerry Coleman later won Rookie of the Year honors. Starting pitcher Allie Reynolds won 17 games that year, second to Vic Raschi's 21 triumphs. Catcher Yogi

Berra hit 20 homers and knocked in 91 runs that year.

Starting for Greenville that Sunday afternoon? Guys named Slick, Conk, Red, Pepper, Buddy and Melvin.

"Before they knew it, Greenville was ahead and they sent in their big players," said Heidmann. "There were reporters (nine in all from New York, including broadcaster Mel Allen) in the pressbox working for their papers. They never caught up and lost 4-3.

In the end, the Yankees' infield led to their downfall. Greenville scored the winning run in the seventh inning without a hit. New York, displaying a lack of fundamentals that seems to haunt today's big leaguers, committed three errors in the inning.

The winning run scored, according to an account of the game in the

Morning Herald, on a "neat and headship piece of baserunning" by Pepper Martin. Martin scored from third on a Chris Sidaris grounder to the pitcher.

'Apparently, it was a surprise to everybody down at Majors Stadium Sunday, except to the members of the hustling Greenville Majors baseball club, themselves," the Morning Herald

reported.
"Our boys played like nobody had ever seen," Heidmann said. "My daughter was there and asked Casey Stengel for an autograph. But he was so mad! He just said 'nope' and walked away."

But the Yankees seemed no worse for the wear. New York went on to win 10 of the next 14 World Series. DiMaggio was injured early in the '49 season, retired after the 1951 campaign and made the Hall of Fame in 1955 with a .325 career average and 361 career homers.

Stengel, after a 25-year managing career, made the Hall in 1966, Berra in 1972.

And for the Majors? Just finding one that made the big leagues is a task. Sherman native Elmer "Red" Durrett, Stengel, known as much for his grouse as his nickname of "The Old who started at second for Greenville that day, played two years for the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1944 and 1945. Heroes of the game for Greenville

homers and a .229 average.

Local and baseball historians cannot verify without a doubt, but it appears the most extensive major league actions may have been seen by Martin.


Johnny Leonard Roosevelt Martin, "The Wild Hoss of the Osage," played for St. Louis in the National League from 1928-1944 and played in three World Series: 1928, 1931 and 1934. That same "Pepper" Martin, according to historians with the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N.Y., played for Greenville in 1924 and 1925, went to the majors and returned to play for Greenville in 1947. But records show Martin playing one game for Miami in 1949 and list him retiring in 1951. The chances of another "Pepper' Martin playing for Greenville are slim

His 19-game total: seven hits, no to none, but neither the Hall of Fame nor Conrad could guarantee the same Martin that scored the winning runs against the Yankees belted 59 career home runs for St. Louis.

> Greenville's win over New York put the Majors in a league of their own for a day. But the Majors came crashing down to earth 24 hours later in a 14-4 loss to the Buffalo Bisons. Though likely the most notable, the success against the Yankees isn't the only memory of Greenville baseball dear to old-timers.

> Season tickets for Greenville games were \$4, the same price as a general admission ticket to one Texas Rangers game. To say players received less money than they do now





PHILADELPHIA (AP) - The Rolling Stones, Madonna, U2 and other rock acts were overcharged nearly \$1 million by two concert promoters, prosecutors say.

Promoters Allen Spivak and Sidney Payne and their company, Electric Factory Concerts Inc., were charged Monday with mail fraud, unlawful payments to union officials, theft of union funds and tax evasion.

If convicted, Electric Factory could be fined \$2.3 million; Spivak, 54, could be fined \$2.6 million and sentenced to 20 years in prison; and Payne, 51, could get a \$2.1 million fine and 10 years in prison.

Other rock acts allegedly overcharged from 1987 to 1990 were the Grateful Dead, The Who, Genesis, David Bowie, Pink Floyd and Paul McCartney, federal prosecutors said.

Electric Factory said in a statement that the promoters "have amicably resolved the issue of discrepancies' with the various acts.



DEAR ANN LANDERS: Thanks for printing Lyle Prouse's letter about his recovery from alcoholism and his efforts to get a recovery program going while in prison. Prouse's appeal for public outrage at the reluctance of prison officials to cooperate in a recovery program inspired me to write.

Prouse was responding to a letter from Lincoln Warkocz, an inmate in Florida who couldn't seem to get any drug rehabilitation in prison. I, too, read the letter from Warkocz and thought that this Florida prisoner was just whining instead of taking advantage of recovery programs that surely must already be in place in Florida and everywhere else. Shame on all public officials who

are responsible for running our prisons. Locking people up and denying them access to drugs or alcohol does not, and never will, cure addiction.

Addiction is a disease, just like diabetes or any other illness. It is chronic and progressive, has no cure and can kill you. To recover from addiction requires a life-long effort. It takes courage and the continuing support of other recovering addicts in 12-step programs such as Alcoholics Anonymous. To deny prisoners access to this kind of help is criminal.

My eyes were opened to the true nature of addiction when my son began treatment six months ago. I still choke

up when I drop him off at his 12-step meetings. He is only 17 and his courage at going into mostly adult meetings with total strangers amazes me. I'm not sure I could do it.

So I say to prison officials everywhere: Get smart, get educated and get help to those inmates who want and need recovery programs. All they have is YOU; and you have the authority to establish these programs. Every minute wasted is a life lost.--G.A> in Lithonia, Ga.

DEAR G.A.: You've written a letter that is filled with good sense. I pray that prison officials will pay attention, and they just might if a tremendous number of readers clip this column and send it to the governor of their state. Phone your public library for the name and address of your governor, folks. A blizzard of letters will attract some attention.





Fashions can fit like glove

All men may be created equal, but women aren't - at least when it comes to clothing sizes.

Nature has more of a sense of humor than the garment industry and thinks nothing of putting a Size 10 bust on Size 12 hips - or the reverse. Some try to beat the fitting game and save on the budget - by sewing their own clothes. But even paper patterns used to measure and cut fabric generally need to be altered.

Now comes Dress Shop from a California company named Livingsoft. The \$99.95 computer program generates patterns tailored just for you.

Dress Shop works on just about any IBM PC or compatible with at least one floppy drive and 512,000 characters of memory. If you're a

"larger" size, the manual says you should have 640,000 characters of memory. Avoid the embarrassment of having a machine call you Tubbo and use Dress Shop only with 640-K. That way you can tell yourself without fear of contradiction that a skinny 512-K would have worked.

Installation means just copying the files onto a blank disk or a hard drive. The program comes with 3.5-inch and 5.25-inch disks. There's a setup program that lets you tell the machine what kind of monitor and printer you have.

The printer part is important, since the patterns you select will be produced on a dot-matrix printer running continuous-form paper. Dress Shop supports Diablo, Epson, IBM, Panasonic, Star Micronics and Tandy printers. If you don't have one of those, make certain your printer will emulate either an Epson or an IBM. Many do.

The key to making an accurate pattern is a tape measure, a trusted friend and brutal honesty. Thirteen measurements are required, and the software prompts you by highlighting the appropriate areas on a mannequin-figure. The manual says that taking your own measurements is "difficult, if not impossible."

Talk to doctor about formulas before birth

HOUSTON -- Parents should discuss formulas with their pediatrician before the birth of their child if they plan to bottlefeed, says Dr. Kathleen J. Motil at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center in Houston.

There is such a large selection of formulas; it is never too early to talk about choices, says Motil, an assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine.

Modern formulas are adapted to be as nutritionally close to breast milk as possible. They all supply proteins, fats, carbohydrates, vitamins and minerals, but one formula may not fit the needs of all infants.

Formulas fall into one of three groups. Based on protein content, the 20 or so infant formulas on the market today are classified as casein/whey,

soy, or pre-digested protein called hydrolysates.

Casein/whey or cow/s milk-based formulas make up the largest group of formulas. Approximately 85 percent of infants thrive on these formulas,

Infants who cannot tolerate the casin/whey protein in these popular formulas or who have a family history of allergies may need a soy-based formula. Industry studies indicate that 12 percent of the infant population

falls into this group.

According to Motil, sensitivity to cow's milk protein may result in vomiting, diarrhea or poor weight gain.

"Consult your doctor if feeding problems arise," she warns. "This is not the time for a parent to experiment with a new formula. Vomiting and diarrhea can quickly lead to dehydration in young infants."

Hydrolysates are the easiest to digest but the most expensive. Because they contain pre-digested cow's milk protein, they reduce the likelihood of allergies as well. Hydrolysates are designed for infants who fail to gain weight or suffer from severe diarrhea or disorders such as cystic fibrosis.

Formulas are also available "with" or "without iron." Motil believes iron is unjustly blamed for stomach upsets, and she recommends iron-enriched

We are finding that infants who are taken off iron-enriched formulas too early may become iron deficient."

Parents will quickly discover that formulas are available in three forms: powdered, concentrated liquid, or ready-to-feed preparations.

All three forms of formula have advantages. Powdered is compact and economical, concentrated liquid is easy to prepare by mixing equal parts of water and formula, and ready-to-feed offers trouble-free preparation-just open and pour. Choice will be determined by family finances, convenience and lifestyle

Parents can provide their pediatrician with valuable background information so he or she can recommend a formula best suited to their infant's needs. "The decision making then becomes a joint effort," Motil

MADE IN USA

just finished the late Sam Walton's autobiography, Sam Walton: Made in America. It is fascinating reading if your are a small business success story fan. It's pretty good reading even if you're not.

Although Mr. Sam and I were a generation apart, we had several things in common. For example, we both attended high school in north Missouri. We both served as class officers and lettered in more than one sport. We both opened our first retail store in small rural towns and we started out with exactly the same number of stores - one.

Okay, I know I've stretched a bit to find similarities, but I mean it in fun. Please don't take my comparisons too seriously. I respect and admire what Sam Walton achieved in becoming the world's greatest retailer.

Mr. Sam launched the first Wal-Mart store in 1962 when he was 44 years old. Today there are nearly 2,000 stores in the chain. I was a sophomore in high school that year, and I still don't know what I want to be when I grow up.

In Made in America, Walton shares the essence of his success under the heading of: "Sam's Rules for building a Business." I think "Sam's Rules" are worth sharing in this column.

Sam's Rules

Rule 1: "Commit to your business." To Mr. Sam, that meant pouring his heart and soul into Wal-Mart. Although he took time for God, his family, bird-hunting and tennis, he remained committed to building his business.

Rule 2: "Share your profits with all your associates and treat them as partners." Early in the book Walton said that profit sharing was a major force in the partnership forged between Wal-Mart and its associates. He cited examples like Bob Clark, a 20 year Wal-Mart truck driver, whose profit sharing account is more than \$700,000. Joyce McMurray, A company trainer, has nearly \$500,000 in her retirement account. Sharing profits began with the first store managers. Many of them are millionaires today.

Rule 3: "Motivate your partners." Mr. Sam stressed setting high goals, encouraged healthy competition and avoided becoming predictable.

Rule 4: "Communicate everything you possibly can to your partners." Mr. Sam wrote, "The more they know, the more they'll understand. The more they understand, the more they'll care. Once they care, there's no stopping them."

Rule 5: "Appreciate everything your associates do for the business." Mr. Sam believed in the value of sincere works of praise. He praised his associates openly and often.

Rule 6: "Celebrate your success." All though the book, Walton points out funny experiences that happened during Wal-Mart's growth years. The message is don't take yourself too seriously, have fun and enjoy.

Rule 7: "Listen to everyone in your company." Mr. Sam probably spent more hours in his stores listening to associates than any other company founder. I believe it

Rule 8: "Exceed your customers expectations." Walton always tried to give every customer exactly what they wanted - and a little more.

Rule 10: "Swim upstream." Walton said that the statement he remembers hearing more than any other, was that a town of less than 50,000 population can't support a discount store very long. All through his discount career he ignored the "conventional" wisdom.

Hear's some conventional wisdom I think Mr. Sam would approve of: Read Made in America. Who knows, the next "Mr. Sam" may be a Minding Your Own Business reader, too!

Wagner plays a businesswoman whose department store empire is challenged by evil machinations from within her own family. Anthony Hopkins also stars.

Wagner, Hopkins struggle with cliche-ridden script

By Steven Alan McGaw The miniseries To Be the Best, based on a best-selling novel by Barbara Taylor Bradford, has played in over 90 countries around the world since it was released in 1991. Presumably, this four-hour excursion into the lifestyles of the rich and evil (or at least the rich and ambitious) has been a popular, if not critical success, or its distribution would have petered out around country No. 32. Ms. Bradford's books (including A Woman of Substance and Hold the Dream) have built a devoted worldwide fandom surely ready to appreciate the dramatization as well.

American audiences can judge for themselves when CBS presents the two-part drama on Sunday, Aug. 2, and Tuesday, Aug. 4. Lindsay Wagner and this year's Academy Awards' Best O'Neill. As the plot thickens to a Actor Anthony Hopkins (Silence of the Lambs) star in the work, which was filmed on locations in London, New (Hopkins), O'Neill's droll director of York, Hong Kong and Macao. The large supporting cast includes Stephanie Beacham, Christopher Cazenove, Fiona Fullerton and Christopher teleplay by Elliott Baker.

Wagner plays Briton Paula O'Neill, the designated heir to the Harte's Department Store empire founded by her grandmother. Under O'Neill's farsighted, humane guidance, the business flourishes, and now she sets her sights on conquering America. Her plans, unfortunately, are no secret to evil Jonathan Ainsley (Cazenove), O'Neill's vindictive cousin, who was banished from the family business for embezzlement. Aided by his wily (and equally duplicitous) henchman Tony Chiu (James Saito), Ainsley plots an elaborate scheme to gain controlling shares of the business and depose

security, can prevent corporate upheaval.

The path taken by Bradford's tale is littered with overwrought subplots, Blake. Robert Bradford, the author's from the cruelly engineered downfall husband, produced the miniseries, and of Sandy (Blake), O'Neill's gambling-Tony Wharmby directed from a addicted cousin (who's dying of leukemia), to poor Madelena O'Shea (Fullerton), who's terrorized by an old boyfriend, an alcoholic soap-opera actor played to riotous excess by Stuart Wilson.

Wagner is an able actress and alatable enough in good material (like 1988's The Taking of Flight 847: The Uli Derickson Story), but she's no match for the high-dudgeon histrionics handed her here. No material (at least not yet) can vanquish Hopkins, and his portrayal of stolid, observant Jack Figg is the work's best.

It falls to Cazenove and Beacham (See BEST, Page 2)







Making films half the battle for Okazaki



Steven Okazaki is a documentary filmmaker who knows the ins and outs of public broadcasting. He is "in" this week, when PBS airs his Troubled Paradise on Sunday, Aug. 2. The hourlong film reveals the problems of native Hawaiians and their struggles to preserve their land and culture.

Okazaki makes pictures about issues that leave most Americans feeling uncomfortable. Survivors was the first English-language film of accounts by Hiroshima and Nagasaki survivors of the United States' atomic attacks. The Oscar-nominated Unfinished Business told the story of three Japanese-Americans who legally challenged the United States' wartime incarceration of their people, and Days of Waiting remembers Estelle Ishigo, one of the few Caucasians interned with Japanese-Americans during the war.

"There's so much conservatism (governing) the kind of programming that you can do, I'm just finding it very frustrating," Okazaki says of his making documentaries for PBS. "You can get funding from the government, but (PBS) might not even let you show the film. My film Days of Waiting, which was funded by the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, was rejected by PBS. We found another way in through this program P.O.V., and then it won an Academy Award. It's a really stupid system."

Linking Ivan's affection to Stalin's seduction of a nation, the director Andrei Konchalovsky abruptly darkens the mood. But the film's odd shift from wryness to pathos works to its advantage. Rated PG-13. Four Boxes
