## GOVERNOR IS TO BE HERE SATURDAY

### WILL DELIVER ADDRESS AT COURTHOUSE AT NIGHT

Press dispatches state that Hereford will have the honor of entertaining the Governor of Texas on next Saturday, April 28. Governor Neff is scheduled to speak at Tulsa in the forenoon and come here Sunday morning to meet the State Normal Board at Amarillo and accompany them to Friona, where the West Texas Normal will be inspected. From there the Governor and the Board will go to Denton Normal and the Commerce Normal for similar inspections. The local reception committee appointed by the Chamber of Commerce consists of Mayor Knight, chairman, E. Dameron and Judge L. Gough. All probably a Hereford car will be the Chief Executive to Hereford for his Tulsa speech. Exact details are not yet known. It is presumed that the Governor will spend the night here. More complete information will be given in Friday's Brand.

The Governor will speak Saturday night at the Courthouse, the exact hour to be announced later.

## Hospital Election Called for Saturday, June 10

An election has been called by the Commissioners Court for June 10 to determine whether or not the Court will be instructed and empowered to issue county bonds in the sum of \$10,000 to take over the Hereford Hospital. Official notice of this election began in an issue of The Brand. This action grows out of the recent meeting when it was decided the course open was to ask the people of the county to assume charge of the hospital. Petitions were prepared, signed by the requisite number of voters, and presented to the court, who have now called the election in accordance with law.

Informing facts concerning the local hospital situation will be issued to the voters by the committee in charge of the campaign from time to time between now and June 10.

## State Librarian Discusses Prospect For Future

## Brothers Denies Was Drowned In Canyon Flood

Prof. R. N. Brothers, instructor of the Hereford Band and member of the music department of the West Texas Normal, was reported drowned in the cloudburst which hit Canyon Monday morning and flooded the creeks thereabouts. Monday night Prof. Brothers appeared here as usual for band practice and smilingly declared that the early morning reports were "somewhat exaggerated."

The terrific downpour at Canyon in the early hours of Monday morning sent the two creeks between Canyon and Amarillo sky high in a few moments and washed out bridges on both roads. A Ford coupe coming from Amarillo was seen to drive into the waters and then disappear. Searchers spent the night looking for the driver without avail. Descriptions of the man driving tallied with Prof. Brothers and the car looked like his. His whereabouts were not known at the time.

Normal officials phoned The Brand to secure information about him here as he was due here Monday night. He was finally located at Friona, where he spent the night.

The car in the creek at Canyon turned out to belong to the Ford dealer at Plainview, Paul Barker, who escaped when the accident occurred, went to a farm house and spent the night. His appearance before noon cleared the mystery of the "drowned man."

Brack Williams and Roy Jowell were in Canyon in Brack's Packard when the rumor spread of a man being drowned and the two joined the searchers in the darkness. Coming down the Amarillo road in the mud the Packard suddenly turned round, slipped off in the ditch and then slowly turned over. The top was damaged and the windshield broken. Otherwise there were no serious consequences.
