"While we are not inting our chickens before they are hatched," said Mr. Murphrey, new manager of the plant, "the incubator is perfect and we expect a hatch above the average."

The Golden Rule started their two Buckeye incubators Monday morning with 2,000 eggs. "These eggs were all from heavy breeds,' said Manager Leslie Roberson, in talking to a Brand reporter., "We will add to this number each week until the season is farther advanced, when we will set twice a
