Dee Page, now in training as the Hereford Police Department's first female patrol officer, took the oath of office Thursday afternoon from City Secretary Bonnie Duke. Tuesday, a U.S. District Judge agreed to the settlement of a hiring discrimination suit which Page had filed against the department.

Sex suit dismissed, Page in training

A sex discrimination suit against the City of Hereford and the Hereford Police Department was dismissed Tuesday, when U.S. District Judge Mary Lou Robinson approved a settlement between the plaintiff and the city.

Under terms of the out of court settlement, Dee Toler Page, who had brought the suit after being denied a job as a police officer, is now in training for a patrol officer position with the department.

The city agreed to pay \$2,000 in at-

torneys fees incurred by Page, as well as court costs, but Page did not ask for back pay. When the suit was filed earlier this year, Page had sought pay from the time she would have gone to work for the department had she been hired.

Page graduated from the Amarillo College Police Academy in August, 1983 and applied for a job with the local department the following month. After being denied the job, she filed the suit which said her rights were violated under the Civil Rights Act.

Grand jury indicts man who testified in Smith case

A man whose testimony before a special grand jury resulted in the perjury indictment of Hereford attorney Jerry Smith was himself indicted for aggravated perjury Thursday by a Deaf Smith County grand jury.

Abelardo Tijerina, a Hereford man once brought to trial for manslaughter in connection with a car-pedestrian accident, is accused of falsely testifying that Smith, then an assistant district attorney, was present during an Oct. 6, 1982 grand jury proceeding which resulted in Tijerina's indictment.

Smith, who has maintained that he was hunting in New Mexico that day, was indicted for perjury on Dec. 19 based on his testimony that he was not in the grand jury room the day Tijerina was indicted.

The Dec. 19 indictment was quashed on March 25, and a new perjury indictment returned April 25 does not mention that incident.

Thursday's indictments were returned by an extended-term January grand jury, which met with special prosecutor David Hamilton of Pampa. Criminal District Attorney Roland Saul has recused himself from all grand jury activity regarding Smith because Smith was his assistant when the incidents alleged in the indictments occurred.

All the indictments returned against Smith since March of 1984 have been based on his alleged representation of two Hereford men while he was still employed as Saul's assistant. The indictments returned in March were quashed by visiting Judge Pat Boone Jr. in October, and the December indictments were (See INDICTS, Page 2)

Farm bill asks USDA to assess nuke site

An amendment to the 1985 Farm Bill was approved Thursday which places yet another safety measure on the Department of Energy's search for the nation's first high-level nuclear waste repository.

According to U.S. Rep. Larry Combest of Lubbock, the amendment will allow the U.S. Department of Agriculture to "determine if the nation's aquifers are being protected."

Combest, who informed The Brand of the amendment Thursday, said "it will allow the USDA to assess the impact of the proposed nuclear waste dump."

Since a site in Deaf Smith County is one of three preferred sites selected by DOE, Combest relayed the information to The Brand immediately after passage of the provision. The other two preferred sites are in Nevada and Washington.

The amendment (HR-2100) deals

with protection of the quality and quantity of surface waters as well as aquifers. Congressman Combest said he specifically asked the sponsor of the bill—Rep. Edward Madigan (R-Ill.)—if the amendment precluded the DOE project on siting a waste dump.

Combest said Madigan assured him it was meant to include the nuke waste repository search. In part, the amendment states that USDA can "provide technical assistance to property owners to protect the quality and quantity of surface water, including water in the nation's aquifers."

The provision is just part of the new Farm Bill being put together in the House. The complete Farm Bill must still be approved by the House and then reconciled with the bill being drafted in the Senate before the underground water provision becomes law.

In other action, the ag committee approved a conservation program which includes denial of federal farm program aid to farmers who till

Light craft nets big thrills

During the early morning or late evening, if the wind has yet to stir, one might notice a purring overhead. If just above the treetops there appears to be a giant dragonfly, squint harder and find the man at those wings.

David Ankeney is getting his kicks by piloting an ultralight aircraft over Hereford.

"There isn't a ride in Six Flags that will compare to it," he swears. "Not even the Cliffhanger."

Ankeney has always wanted to fly, so four or five years ago he started looking into the ultralight aircraft route to the sky. About a year ago he purchased his used MX Quicksilver in Amarillo. The company which manufactures that model, Eipper Aircraft, Inc., requires all buyers to take 10 hours of lessons for safety purposes.

Ankeney's safety rules include wisely wearing a helmet and buckling his seat belt — lest a puff of wind over 10 mph lift the 32-foot wingspan to an uneasy tilt.

Ankeney's aircraft weighs only 239 pounds, so it is easy enough for him to push from his home on Hickory to a vacant field nearby. Fueled with an oil

and unleaded gas mixture, the engine is cranked up with the yank of a rope much like a lawn mower starts. The two-stroke engine, designed from the snowmobile family, can get the propeller whirring to 6500 rpm. When the craft is rolling along at only 27 mph it's in the air.

Although the specifications say that the MX Quicksilver can operate at up to 10,000 feet, Ankeney usually keeps it below 500 feet.

"It seems an awful bunch for me," he says. "Any more than that and it looks like, 'Gee whiz, that's an awful long way to fall.'"

Saying he's outgrown "loud stuff," Ankeney also equips himself with earmuffs to muffle the engine noise, thus he can't hear any greetings from the ground.

He says he hasn't been scared. Except one day when he missed a bolt and forgot to hook up the control rod.

Otherwise he's pretty sure of himself and the machine.

"I just sit upright," he explained. "It's just as comfortable as sitting in a chair ... Like swinging on a star."

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Ryan reaches 4,000-strikeout milestone

It took him 18 years and 10 months to be in a position to notch his 4,000th career strikeout, and when the opportunity came, Houston's Nolan Ryan knew exactly what to do. Just as he had done so many times in his strikeout-filled major-league career, Ryan played New York Mets leftfielder Danny Heep exactly as he planned Thursday night, sending the

former Astro into the record books as the strikeout ace's 4,000th victim. Ryan needed only three pitches against Heep, a fastball Heep fouled away, a changeup, which he took, and a curveball that Heep chased and missed. "That's exactly what I wanted to do," Ryan said. "I went over those three pitches in my mind and I decided that's the way I wanted to do it if I didn't get behind him."

Following the historic strikeout, Ryan doffed his cap to the standing ovation that greeted him.

"This was special; I wanted to do this at home," Ryan said. "This was my last start before the All-Star break. After the All-Star Game we may have a long road trip, so that was my motivation."

Ryan started the game with 3,993 strikeouts and an 85-strikeout lead over his nearest rival, Philadelphia's Steve Carlton, currently on the disabled list with a shoulder injury.

He pitched seven innings and had 11 strikeouts, running his career total to 4,004. It also extended his career total to a major-league record of 158 games with 10 or more strikeouts.

"He's one of the most consistent pitchers around to throw as hard as he does for as long as he has," said Mets outfielder George Foster.

"He pitched a great game," said Mets outfielder Darryl Strawberry, a fifth-inning strikeout victim. "A couple of times he made mistakes and I know he would have liked to have had the win. But his fastball was overpowering. He's one of those pitchers you have to prepare yourself for."

It was a double celebration for Ryan, who was named earlier Thursday to the National League All-Star team.

"It was inevitable," Mets manager Dave Johnson said of Ryan's feat. "Just like (Cincinnati's Pete) Rose passing Cobb's hit record, it's a great

accomplishment, 4,000 strikeouts. But I think more of a plateau for a pitcher is 300 wins. Strikeouts are great, but the bottom line is not strikeouts, it's winning games."

Met's first baseman Keith Hernandez, who managed to avoid being one of Ryan's strikeout victims, said, "You have to get to him early. We had the opportunities but we didn't do it. You have to give him credit. He had good stuff, and he threw hard and had a good curve ball. I figured he'd throw good tonight."

Ryan left in the seventh inning. The Astros went on to win in the 12th to beat the Mets 4-3.

Montreal's Brad Mills was Ryan's 3,500th strikeout on April 27, 1983, breaking the career strikeout record of Walter Johnson that had stood for 55 years.

Ryan recorded his first major-league strikeout in a Mets uniform on Sept. 11, 1966, fanning Atlanta's Pat Jarvis.

Ryan, who has five career no-hitters, says he never imagined early in his career that he'd still be pitching in his late 30s.

He attributes his longevity to a devotion to proper pitching mechanics and a lucrative salary structure that allows players to avoid off-season jobs.

"The two keys for me are due to the fact that I've concentrated so many years on good mechanics of pitching and also I've concentrated on being as well-conditioned as possible," said Ryan, who is signed

through the 1987 season at a salary of about \$1 million per year.

The big celebration for the Astros was Ryan's latest strikeout milestone, but there were other personal victories to be celebrated following the 4-3 victory over the Mets.

Astros Manager Bob Lillis also applauded:

—Bill Doran's 5-for-6 performance, including the game-winning RBI in the 12th inning.

—The return of shortstop Dickie Thon, who got three hits and scored the winning run.

—The end of a string of extra-inning losses, although the Astros still are only 3-9 in overtime games.

—The halt of the Mets' winning streak at nine games.

"We had a lot of good performances tonight," Lillis said. "Bill's really got a hot bat, and Dickie had a good night. (Dave) Smith helped with an excellent sacrifice."

Thon led off the 12th inning with his

third hit of the game, a single to left, and was sacrificed to second by Smith. Doran then looped a single over the head of Mets third baseman Howard Johnson to end the marathon game.

The Astros scored single runs in the fourth inning on Glenn Davis' single, Doran's fifth-inning single and Kevin Bass' 10th homer of the year in the sixth inning.

The Mets, who scored first in the second on Johnson's double, tied the game in the seventh inning on Strawberry's sacrifice fly and Gary Carter's single, forcing the extra inn-

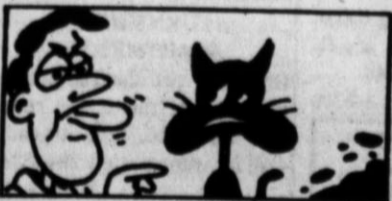

The reigning Miss Wheatheart was crowned Miss Hereford in 1983. She is currently attending Trinity University in San Antonio.



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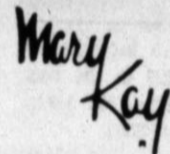
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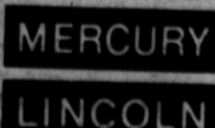
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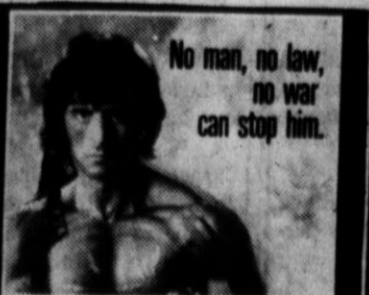
