Sex suit dismissed, Page in training

A sex discrimination suit against the City of Hereford and the Hereford Police Department was dismissed Tuesday, when U.S. District Judge Mary Lou Robinson approved a settlement between the plaintiff and the city.

Under terms of the out of court settlement, Dee Toler Page, who had brought the suit after being denied a job as a police officer, is now in training for a patrol officer position with the department.

The city agreed to pay \$2,000 in at-

torneys fees incurred by Page, as well as court costs, but Page did not ask for back pay. When the suit was filed earlier this year, Page had sought pay from the time she would have gone to work for the department had she been hired.

Grand jury indicts man who testified in Smith case

Staff Writer A man whose testimony before a special grand jury resulted in the perjury indictment of Hereford attorney Jerry Smith was himself indicted for aggravated perjury Thursday by a Deaf Smith County grand jury.

Abelardo Tijerina, a Hereford man once brought to trial for manslaughter in connection with a

car-pedestrian accident, is accused of falsely testifying that Smith, then an assistant district attorney, was present during an Oct. 6, 1982 grand jury proceeding which resulted in Tijerina's indictment.

Smith, who has maintained that he was hunting in New Mexico that day, was indicted for perjury on Dec. 19 based on his testimony that he was not in the grand jury room the day Tijerina was indicted.

The Dec. 19 indictment was quashed on March 25, and a new perjury indictment returned April 25 does not mention that incident.

Thursday's indictments were returned by an extended-term January grand jury, which met with special prosecutor David Hamilton of Pampa. Criminal District Attorney Roland Saul has recused himself from all grand jury activity regarding Smith because Smith was his assistant when the incidents alleged in the indictments occurred.

An amendment to the 1965 Farm Bill was approved Thursday which places yet another safety measure on the Department of Energy's search for the nation's first high-level nuclear waste repository.

According to U.S. Rep. Larry Com-

Combest, who informed The Brand of the amendment Thursday, said "it will allow the USDA to assess the impact of the proposed nuclear waste dump."

Since a site in Deaf Smith County is one of three preferred sites selected by DOE, Combest relayed the information to The Bran

Light craft nets big thrills

During the early morning or late evening, if the wind has yet to stir, one might notice a purring overhead. If just above the treetops there appears to be a giant dragonfly, squint harder and find the man at those wings.

David Ankeney is getting his kicks by piloting an ultralight aircraft over Hereford.

"There isn't a ride in Six Flags that will compare to it," he swears. "Not even the Cliffhanger."

Ankeney has always wanted to fly, so four or five years ago he started looking into the ultralight aircraft route to the sky. About a year ago he purchased his used MX Quicksilver in Amarillo. The company which manufactures that model, Eipper Aircraft, Inc., requires all buyers to take 10 hours of lessons for safety purposes.

Ankeney's safety rules include wisely wearing a helmet and buckling his seat belt - lest a puff of wind over 10 mph lift the 32-foot wingspan to an uneasy tilt. Ankeney's aircraft weighs only 239 pounds, so it is easy enough for him to push from his home on Hickory to a vacant field nearby. Fueled with an oil

and unleaded gas mixture, the engine is cranked up with the yank of a rope much like a lawn mower starts. The two-stroke engine, designed from the snowmobile family, can get the propeller whirring to 6500 rpm. When the craft is rolling along at only 27 mph it's in the air.

Although the specifications say that the MX Quicksilver can operate at up to 10,000 feet, Ankeney





Conspiracy claimed against nuke plant

BAY CITY, Texas (AP) - The second round of hearings to decide whether to issue an operating license to the South Texas Nuclear Project drew complaints from opponents who claim that plant owners hid a critical report from the Nuclear Regulatory Commission

Lanny Sinkin, representing the San Antonio-based Citizens Concerned About Nuclear Power, told the Atomic Safety and Licensing Board that executives of the Houston Lighting & Power Co. conspired to hide a critical report prepared in 1981 by a consulting firm, Quadrex Corp. of California.

"Everybody who sees the Quadrex report reacts with shock, outrage and indignation," Sinkin told the three-member licensing board Thursday. "Did they hide the report and does that reflect on the character and competence of HL&P?" he asked the board.

The Houston utility is manager of the \$5.5 billion plant being built near Bay City. Central Power & Light Co. of Corpus Christi, City Public Service of San Antonio and the city of Austin are the other coowners.

Trial nets freedom from sentence

NEW BOSTON, Texas (AP) - A man who served three years of a 99-year murder sentence is a free man today after a new trial ended with a conviction of voluntary manslaughter and 10 years' probation.

"I feel relieved. I haven't felt this good in a long, long time," Arthur Glenn McCoy said Thursday after the new jury returned its verdict.

The Bowie County jury's decision, the result of an appeals court overturning the original conviction, came in a case involving the 1961 shooting of a Texarkana youth.

McCoy, 22, was charged Oct. 30, 1981, with shooting Cedric Charles Witcher, 15, who died of a gunshot wound to the back.

Louis Raffaelli, Bowie County district attorney, prosecuted McCoy at his original trial and at the retrial.

"I got no comment," Raffaelli told the Texarkana Gazette after the jury's verdict was announced.

Stats on disease will resume

ODESSA, Texas (AP) - Ector County health officials should resume issuing reports on communicable disease statistics so that area doctors "don't have to meet in the coffee shop to know what's going on," the county judge said.

At a county budget meeting Wednesday, County Judge Jan Fisher asked Health Department Supervisor Toby Cross to resume giving doctors copies of the reports to docotr, which do not contain names, the Odessa American said.

Cross said doctors' statements showed that physicians stopped reporting communicable diseases because of the health department's failure to publish the information and follow up on some cases.

The reports, available through Medical Center and Women's and Children's hospitals, will start in "two or three weeks," Cross toldthe Odessa American.

Fowl farmer fixes skinny chickens

DALLAS (AP) - After a year of for an attack on fat. having his mind boggled by whole boneless chickens, Lonnie "Bo" Pilgrim has decided it's time to take something else out of the fowl that has made him the nation's eighth largest broiler producer.

So this time, figuring that Americans are still on the crest of the "lite" craze, the poultry potentate whose Pilgrim-style hat clashes with his East Texas drawl has opted

"People kept complaining about the fat glob they were finding in their chickens," says the 58-year-old head of Pilgrim's Pride, based in Pittsburg, Texas. "I figured there's lowcalorie and 'lite' everything else, so why not chicken?"

Sticking to his dietetic determination, Pilgrim says he developed a high-protein, low-calorie feed in his laboratories to go along with the spr-

ing water he started pumping into his future fryers.

In addition, he grows his leaner chickens only seven weeks - most producers fatten theirs from three to seven days longer - and he removes their abdominal fat during process-

The result, he says, is the world's first chicken with less fat than normally cultivated cluckers that he insists is still "plump and juicy" and

an average 3.25 pounds apiece.

He feels so strongly about his feat even more so than in his 1984 commercials that touted his boneless chicken discovery as being "a mind boggling thing" he rated as being "right up there with my first bicycle" - that Pilgrim is guaranteeing it with an offer of two free chickens if customers aren't satisfied.

Names could be added

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Vietnam Veterans Memorial has room for the estimated 300-plus names of dead or missing servicemen omitted from the monument due to a technicality, and the additions could begin by Veterans Day, says the chairman of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund.

The memorial, a series of black granite panels currently inscribed with the names of 58,022 dead or missing from the Vietnam war, was dedicated on Veterans Day, Nov. 11, 1982.

The Memorial Fund, which built the memorial from private donations, had asked architects to determine how many more names can be added after an Oklahoma man learned his son's name and many others were not on the memorial because they died outside the official combat zone.

"It's possible we'll add some names on or before Veterans Day," John Wheeler, chairman of the Memorial Fund, said Thursday.

Coca-cola and Pepsi-cola up in air

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - With all the world their battleground already, Coca-Cola and Pepsi-Cola are taking their soft drink rivalry into space as NASA officials fret about being caught in a commercial fizz!

The Hatfields and McCoys of the soft drink business put four cans each on board the shuttle Challenger, scheduled for liftoff at 4:30 p.m. today, for the first space test of carbonated-drink technology.

"One giant sip for mankind," said T-shirts handed out at the launch site Thursday by the Pepsi people.

"Drink Coca-Cola," said the red caps distributed by guess who. That sort of commercial boosterism gives the National Aeronautics and Space Administration heartburn, and the agency told Challenger's seven astronauts they are not to be seen on ship-toground television drinking either beverage during the seven-day flight.

But NASA could not stop representatives of the two soft drink giants from engaging in a bit of hucksterism as they faced the press Thursday.

Death toll on the rise

KUWAIT (AP) - A number of suspects have been arrested in the bombing of two crowded seaside cafes in which 11 people died and 89 were injured, a security official said today.

Authorities halted outgoing flights at Kuwait airport and coast guard boats patrolled Kuwait's territorial waters to try to seal all exits from the Persian Gulf country.

No one claimed responsibility for the Thursday bombings, the latest in a string of terror attacks in this oil-rich nation of 1.5 million.

"A number of suspects have been arrested," said the security official, who spoke only on condition he not be identified. "The two time bombs that ripped through the cafes were 25 kilograms (55 pounds) of TNT each, placed by terrorists on the grass under chairs long the playgrounds of the cafes." Other officials said an unspecified number of Shiite Moslem

ects had been rounded up. There are about 200,000 Shiites in Kuwait, including about 140,000 expatriate workers from Iran, Iraq and Lebanon

Kuwait has been the target of terror attacks by Shiites who aprently view it as favoring predominantly Sunni Moslem Iraq in its rear-old war against Iran. Iran is a Persian nation, not Arab, and is predominantly Shiite.







Ryan reaches 4,000-strikeout milestone

By MICHAEL A. LUTZ **AP Sports Writer**

It took him 18 years and 10 months to be in a position to notch his 4,000th career strikeout, and when the opportunity came, Houston's Nolan Ryan knew exactly what to do.

Just as he had done so many times in his strikeout-filled major-league career, Ryan played New York Mets leftfielder Danny Heep exactly as he planned Thursday night, sending the former Astro into the record books as the strikeout ace's 4,000th victim.

Ryan needed only three pitches against Heep, a fastball Heep fouled away, a changeup, which he took, and a curveball that Heep chased and missed.

"That's exactly what I wanted to do," Ryan said. "I went over those three pitches in my mind and I decided that's the way I wanted to do it if I didn't get behind him."

Following the historic strikeout, Ryan doffed his cap to the standing ovation that greeted him.

"This was special; I wanted to do this at home," Ryan said. "This was my last start before the All-Star break. After the All-Star Game we may have a long road trip, so that was my motivation."

Ryan started the game with 3,993 strikeouts and an 85-strikeout lead over his nearest rival, Philadelphia's Steve Carlton, currently on the disabled list with a shoulder injury. He pitched seven innings and had 11 strikeouts, running his career total to 4,004. It also extended his

career total to a major-league record of 158 games with 10 or more strikeouts.

"He's one of the most consistent pitchers around to throw as hard as e does for as long as he has," said Mets outfielder George Foster. "He pitched a great game," said Mets outfielder Darryl Strawberry, a fifth-inning strikeout victim. "A couple of times he made mistakes and I know he would have liked to have had the win. But his fastball was overpowering. He's one of those pitchers you have to prepare yourself for.

It was a double celebration for Ryan, who was named earlier Thursday to the National League All-Star team.

"It was inevitable," Mets manager Dave Johnson said of Ryan's feat. "Just like (Cincinnati's Pete) Rose assing Cobb's hit record, it's a great

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accomplishment, 4,000 strikeouts. But I think more of a plateau for a pitcher is 300 wins. Strikeouts are great, but the bottom line is not strikeouts, it's winning games."

Met's first baseman Keith Hernandez, who managed to avoid being one of Ryan's strikeout victims, said, "You have to get to him early. We had the opportunities but we didn't do it. You have to give him credit. He had good stuff, and he threw hard and had a good curve ball. I figured he's throw good tonight."

Ryan left in the seventh inning. The Astros went on to win in the 12th to beat the Mets 4-3.

Montreal's Brad Mills was Ryan's 3,509th strikeout on April 27, 1963, breaking the career strikeout record of Walter Johnson that had stood for 55 years.

Ryan recorded his first majorleague strikeout in a Mets uniform on Sept. 11, 1966, fanning Atlanta's Pat Jarvis.

Ryan, who has five career nohitters, says he never imagined early in his career that he'd still be pitching in his late 30s. He attributes his longevity to a

devotion to proper pitching mechanics and a lucrative salary structure that allows players to avoid off-season jobs.

"The two keys for me are due to the fact that I've concentrated so many years on good mechanics of pitching and also I've concentrated on being as well-conditioned as possible," said Ryan, who is signed


