**Hereford native starts Bangladesh relief fund**

The disaster in Bangladesh recently devastated the small country. Although the typhoon happened thousands of miles away, it hit close to home for one Hereford resident. Charlet Herr-Chowdhury's husband, Haider, runs a garment manufacturing in Dhaka, Bangladesh and was there during the storms.

"When I heard about the typhoon, my first reaction was, 'I hope he's alright,'" Chowdhury said. "After I found out that he was OK, I began to worry about all the people the storms left homeless."

Chowdhury recently visited Bangladesh and noticed the large numbers of beggars and homeless people.

"It is so different being in a safe environment and going to a place where you see people begging on the street and children standing around with no clothes on. There are a lot of people there who do not have homes. Many live in shacks and those (shacks) were destroyed during the storm."

"When I visited there I wanted to help, but there is only so much one person can do."

"The homeless situation was bad when I was there visiting, but it is 10 times worse now. There is not much left in the coastal city of Chittagong. It was the worst hit. The people who

have homes were not hurt, but the people who lived in shacks were hit hardest."

Because Bangladesh's government has limited funds, it doesn't have the resources to help all the victims.

"Many of the families now only have one or two members."

Chowdhury wasn't able to speak to her husband until 14 days after the disaster.

"The phone lines were down and when I finally talked with him. We only got to talk for three or four minutes. I didn't get the full story until his mother came to visit."

After her concerns with her husband's safety were calmed, she began to seek relief funds for the homeless.

"Through the American Red Cross we have set up a fund," Chowdhury said. "We want people to save their aluminum cans and the money raised will go to the disaster victims. All someone has to do is save their cans and call the Red Cross and we'll come pick them up or bring the cans to the Red Cross."

Not only must Chowdhury cope with her husband being in a country plagued with disaster, she must also cope with raising her family away from her husband who lives in a different country.

"It is difficult being away," she said. "We have a certain closeness.

Because we can spend only three to four minutes on the phone, we learn to say only important things and cut out the unimportant things. I think having two children makes it harder."

Chowdhury doesn't know when she'll be able to see her husband, who has been away for one and a half years.

"I might be able to see him sometime this month. I've seen him twice since he has been gone. I spent three months in Bangladesh and he spend five weeks here when my second child was born."

Being married to someone from a foreign country, one faces several cultural differences.

"Their culture, of course, is different than ours," Chowdhury said. "They dress different, but they are adaptive to the American culture. Most speak English."

"The Bangladesh people are very religious. They are strong Moslem. I understand being religious because I am Catholic."

"Our differences don't bother either one of us. I think if you love each other differences shouldn't matter."

Being far apart, they have learned to write letters as their main means of correspondence.

"We write lots of letters," she said. "They are usually about 10 pages."

**Area sets new fed cattle mark**

Deaf Smith County continued its ranking as the No. 1 cattle-feeding county in the nation in 1989, according to the 1991 Fed Cattle Survey released Friday by Southwestern Public Service Co.

The SPS service area, which includes the Texas Panhandle and a few counties in Oklahoma and New Mexico, fed a record 5.5 million head.

Fourteen feedyards in Deaf Smith County fed out 834,930 head of cattle in 1990 as Hereford retained its title as "Cattle Feeding Capital of the World." That total was about 50,000 head less than 1989, but Deaf Smith County had recorded an increase of more than 100,000 head last year and a record 885,563 last year.

Both Castro and Parmer counties had increases this year, pushing the three-county "Golden Triangle" total to a record 1,935,000 head. The three had a total of 1.86 million on last year's report, or almost 40 percent of the Texas Panhandle total. Deaf Smith accounted for about 17 percent of the Panhandle total.

Castro showed a slight decline on the '89 report, but rebounded with a

102,000 increase in '90 for a total of 591,349 head of fed cattle. Parmer's total was 508,752, a slight increase over the '90 report.

Deaf Smith is listed with 14 feed yards of 5,000 or more capacity, while Castro had 13 and Parmer had 8. The one-time lot capacity of all the feed yards in the area is at all-time high of 2.88 million. The survey included all feed lots of 5,000 head or more capacity, or a total of 107. The survey shows 14 yards under 5,000 capacity.

The survey shows the area has 13 beef packing plants with an annual slaughter capacity of 5.1 million. Fat cattle slaughtered in the SPS area last year was 4.66 million head.

**1991 Fed Cattle Survey**

Another record high of 5,570,203 head of cattle were fed in the Southwestern Public Service area, which comprises the Texas Panhandle and a few counties in Oklahoma and New Mexico. Deaf Smith County led the 1990 totals with 834,930 head. The annual SPS survey reflects that the "Golden Triangle" of Deaf Smith, Parmer and Castro counties had almost 40 percent of the Texas Panhandle total.

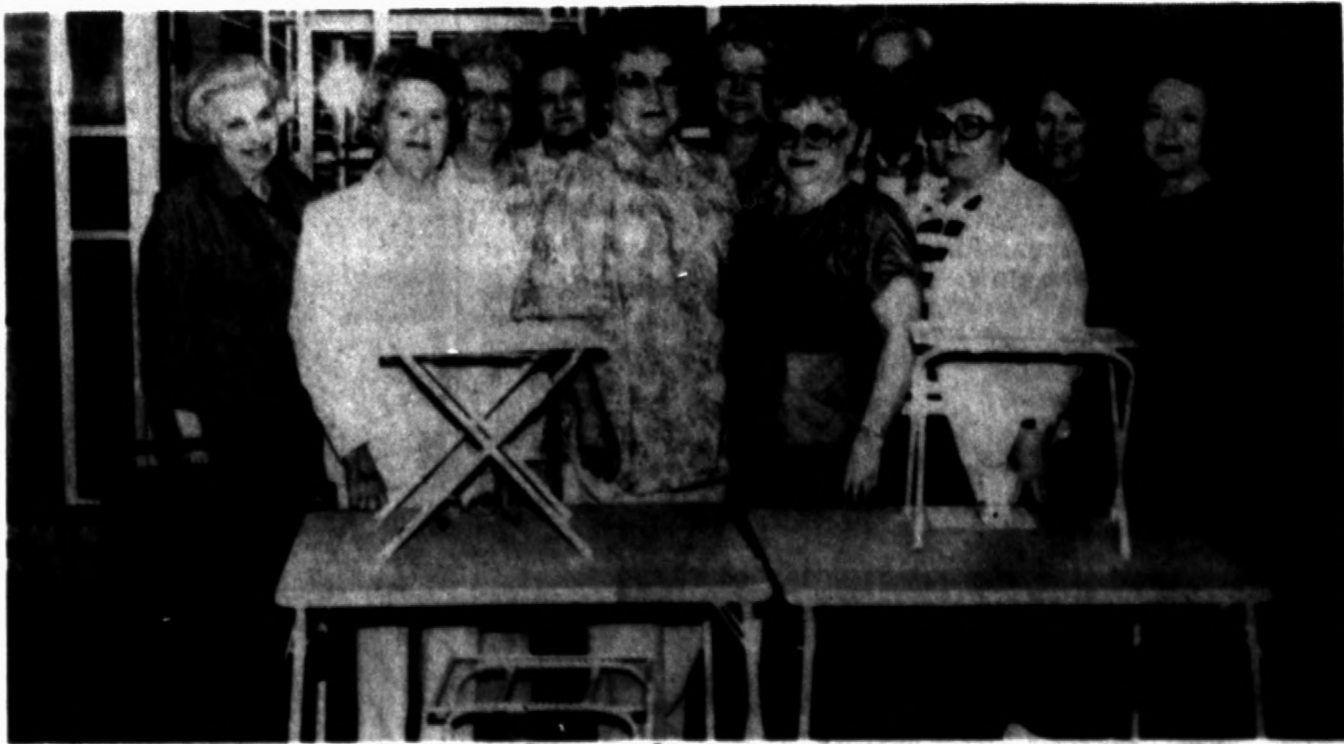
"We purchased these items for the Community Center not only for us to use but for anyone that uses the Community Center," said club member Seletta Gholson. "Anyone

## Changes in food labeling should benefit consumers

Manufacturers of products marketed as "fresh" learned last month that the U.S. Food and Drug Administration is getting serious about food labeling.

By November, the FDA will propose sweeping regulations that amount to the first major changes in food labeling in 20 years.

Products with labels that make glib claims using such terms as "light," "lite," "reduced," "low-fat" or "cholesterol-free," among others, will have to start backing them up when the FDA rules become final, likely by November 1992.

The new regulations, mandated by the Nutrition Labeling and Education Act of 1990, should benefit consumers the most, said Dr. Mary Kinney Bielamowicz, nutritionist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The new law requires that virtually all packaged foods contain nutrition information on the labels.

The FDA signaled in April that it will enforce the few food label rules on the books by seizing more than 2,400 cases of Citrus Hill fresh Choice orange juice. The FDA complained that the product's manufacturer, Proctor & Gamble, violated its policy that prohibits using "fresh" to describe processed orange juice.

Until now, nutrition labeling has been largely voluntary, Bielamowicz said. The FDA required only that a label contain the name and address of the manufacturer and a list of all ingredients in descending order of weight. Calorie information was optional.

"Once FDA regulations are implemented, consumers will be able to make better food choices, especially if they are on strict diets relating to health problems," she said.

Required nutrition information will focus more on macro-nutrient data such as fat, calories and protein rather than on such micro-nutrients as vitamins and minerals, Bielamowicz said. Labels will list serving size,

number of servings and total calories, total fat, cholesterol, sodium, carbohydrates, sugars, fiber and other ingredients in each serving.

High-fiber claims would be prohibited under the law unless the food is also low in total fat, Bielamowicz said. A health claim also is forbidden unless it is authorized by FDA regulation based on "significant, scientific agreement" supporting the claim.

For the first time, fresh fruits, vegetables and seedfood will be labeled. Regulations will allow nutrition information to be provided at a single location at the point of sale and permit the information to be expressed as an average, or range per serving.

Under the new law, FDA may allow a statement of the absence of cholesterol in a product, but only if it would help consumers maintain healthy diets. However, claims of "no cholesterol" won't be allowed in products that do not contain cholesterol to begin with, Bielamowicz said.

## First aid tips for boo-boo's

All active youngsters are prone to scrapes, cuts and bruises, but they can be less frightening to children if they know how to take care of them.

Dr. Geraldine Shepperson, 1990 School Nurse of the Year, has worked on a booklet that helps youngsters learn how to care for their own minor injuries. You might want to go over these tips with your own child.

-Remain calm. When you know what to do, you'll be able to take the hurt away faster. If there are grownups around, let them know you hurt yourself so that they can help.

-Wash the scrape or cut with some soap and warm water to clean it, making sure there's no dirt left behind. If there is a grown-up around, ask him or her to put some antiseptic cleaner, such as hydrogen peroxide, on the boo-boo.

-Cover the boo-boo with a bandage so it will stay clean.

When treating your child's wound yourself, Dr. Shepperson points out you should consult a doctor when dirt does not easily wash out of a cut or scrape; if bleeding does not stop or if the child continues to complain of pain or discomfort; any break in the skin that appears to more than just a simple cut or scrape.

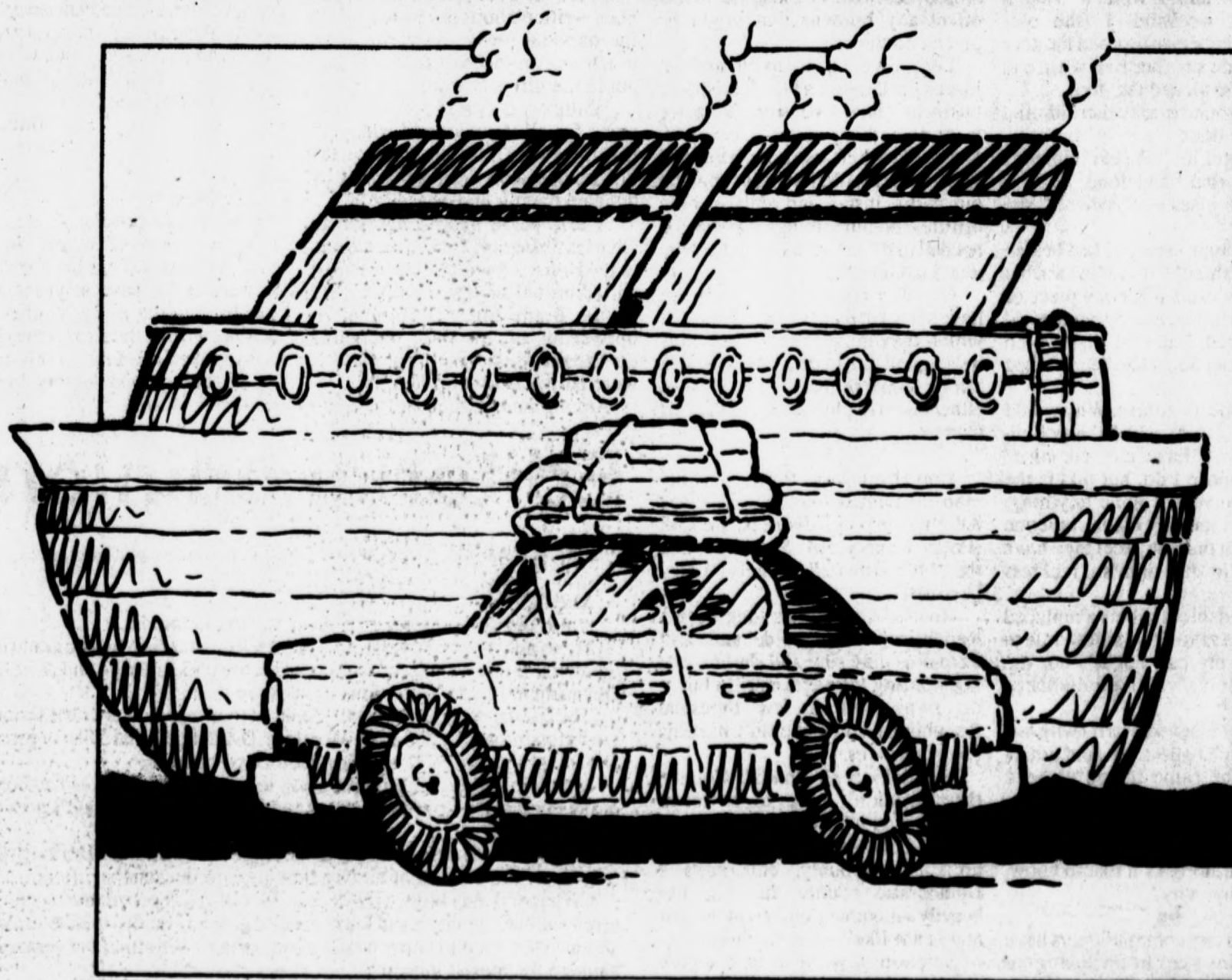

## Accent on Health

According to health officials, Texas women are less likely to use tobacco during pregnancy than are American women in general.

A recent study of Texas women who gave birth in 1989 shows that some 12 percent (compared to 20-25 percent nationally) reported using tobacco during their pregnancies, according to Tom Pollard at the Texas Department of Health (TDH). Pollard is director of the Statistical Services Division, TDH Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Part of the reason why fewer Texans smoke during pregnancy may be linked to Texas' proportionately large Hispanic and black populations. "Forty-four percent of all Texas births occur among these two groups, and Hispanic and black women are less likely to use tobacco during pregnancy than are white, non-

Hispanic women," Pollard said. "Only 17 percent of white mothers in Texas reported using tobacco during pregnancy. But black and Hispanic women in Texas use tobacco even less. Only 11 percent of black and five percent of Hispanic mothers reported using tobacco during their pregnancies," he said.

Pollard added that Hispanic women who smoked used fewer cigarettes per day during pregnancy than did either white or black women. On average, he said, Hispanic women smoked five cigarettes a day while blacks or whites smoked 10.

Tobacco use during pregnancy is known to cause problems for both mothers and babies. In 1989, Texas mothers who used tobacco were twice as likely as non-users to have low-birthweight babies (less than 5 pounds, 8 ounces). They also were more than twice as likely to have previously borne a premature infant.

Low birthweight is a major cause of infant death. In 1987, for example, eight percent of Texas' babies with low birthweight died within the first year of life, while only 0.3 percent of babies with normal birthweight died.

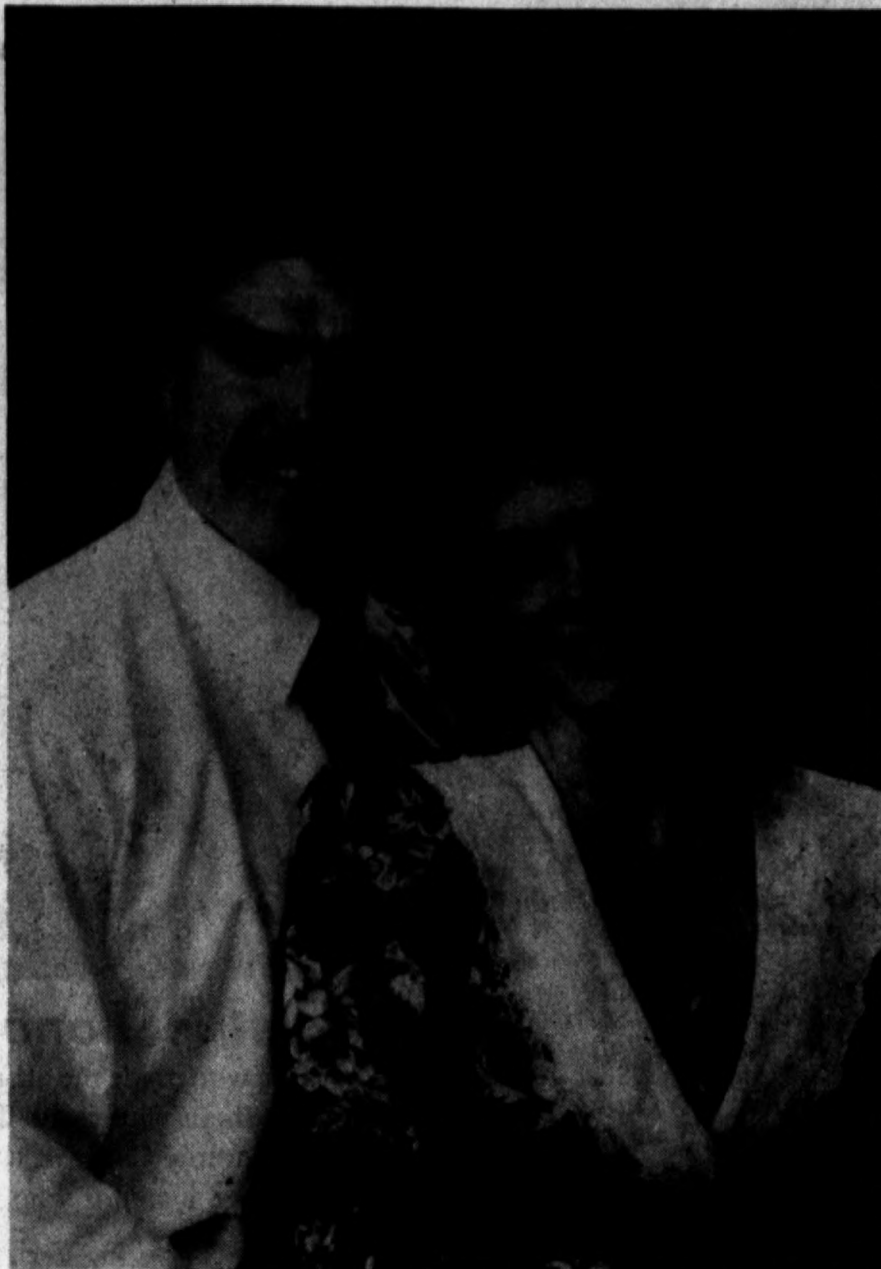
Pollard said, "Our data further showed that women who reported tobacco use while pregnant also were more likely to have other health factors which placed their pregnancies at risk. They were more than twice as likely as non-users to have acute or chronic lung diseases."

MINDY ROWTON, PAUL WOODEN

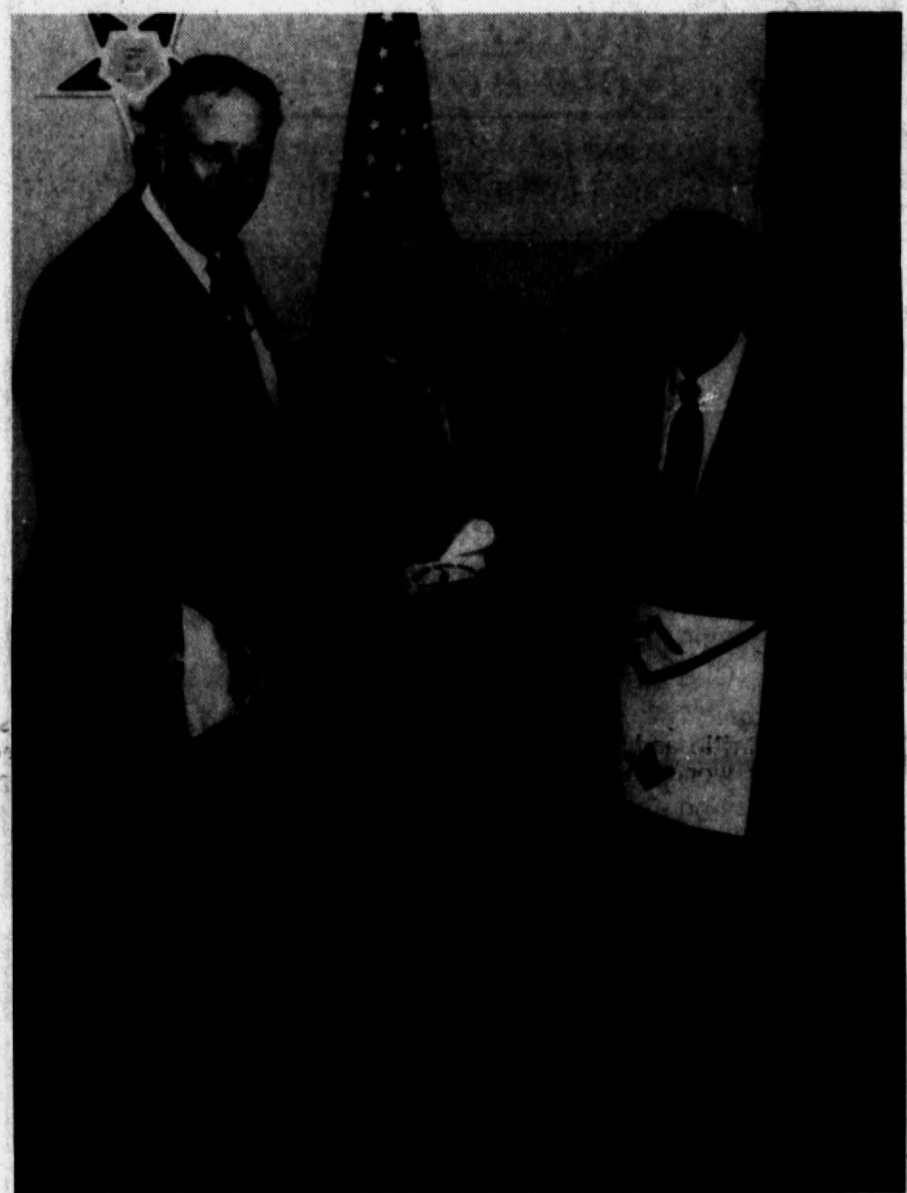
## Couple to wed

## How to prepare for a family emergency plan

If an emergency struck your area, you would be the first line of defense for your family. Government and volunteer agencies would provide fast and effective support, but in those first critical moments or hours, you must be prepared to act decisively to ensure the safety of those you love.

Taking a little time for advance planning today would make the difference in saving or losing a life.

### SIX STEPS TO SAFETY

The first and most important measure you should take to prepare for any emergency is to create a family emergency plan.

1. Evaluate and prioritize the disasters that could threaten you.

2. Draw a floor plan of your home, noting escape routes, locations of emergency supplies and utility shutoffs.

3. Map out evacuation routes for different types of disasters, such as fire or flood.

4. Ask an out-of-town friend or relative to serve as your family contact person. Choose an alternate location where you can meet if family members become separated during or

before a disaster.

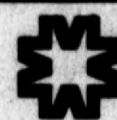
5. Stock emergency equipment such as a flashlight; first-aid kit; battery-operated radio; clothing; and a 72-hour supply of food and water.

6. Devise plans for those with special needs, such as infants, the elderly or the chronically ill.

Keep your family emergency plan in a handy place, and review it at least once a year with your family. In addition, drill your family regularly on proper actions for various emergencies.

## Herd's Mungia makes all-district first team

Hereford second baseman Max Mungia was named first team All-District 1-4A and three other Hereford baseball players made the second team, Coach T.R. Sartor said.

Senior shortstop Amado Lopez, senior first baseman Matt Bromlow and sophomore pitcher Sammy Casarez were the Whitefaces on the second team.

No one team dominated the lists, but Randall placed the most players on the two teams. Eight Raiders made it, including four first-teamers, plus sophomore Corey McAllister was named newcomer of the year.

District champion Pampa put six players on the lists, two on the first team, and the Harvesters had the Most Valuable Player, Quincy Williams, and the Coach of the Year, Rod Porter.

The coaches for the district's six teams vote on the all-district teams using the players' performances and statistics from district games only.

Mungia's offensive stats (12 hits for a .387 batting average and six RBI all led the Herd in district play) were on par with the district's other top second basemen, Sartor said, but what stood out was his defense. His 33 putouts and 24 assists in district play were far more than any other second baseman. In addition, Sartor said, the district's coaches, who do the voting, remembered Mungia diving to make

spectacular plays. "He had one (diving play) about every game," Sartor said. "He was a memorable player."

Casarez, a lefthander and one of only four sophomores honored, had a 1-4 record but a 2.55 earned run average in district. He had 27 strikeouts and only 12 walks in 33 innings.

Bromlow batted .310, stole seven bases and scored six runs in district play, and he had only one error after making the switch to first base from centerfield because of a shoulder injury.

Lopez batted .321, and of his nine district hits, three were doubles and one was a triple. That triple was one of the biggest hits of the season, coming in the first game against Randall at Whiteface Field. After the triple, he scored the winning run to break the Herd's losing streak.

The man who bunted Lopez home on that play was George Jowell, a senior who earned honorable mention at catcher, Sartor said. Jowell batted .313 with five RBI in district.

## Pistons eliminate Celtics

AUBURN HILLS, Mich. (AP) - They used to play games filled with passion and hate. Now the Detroit Pistons and Boston Celtics have great respect for one another. And the games somehow keep getting better and better.

The Pistons, trying to become only the third team to win three consecutive NBA championships, got an eight-point lift from Isiah Thomas in overtime Friday night and ousted the Celtics 117-113 in Game 6 of the Eastern Conference semifinals.

Detroit, making its fifth consecutive appearance in the conference finals, will open against the Bulls in Chicago on Sunday afternoon.

The game was tied at 105-105 after

regulation and Boston took a quick four-point lead in overtime. Then Thomas took over, although he claimed to be aided by divine intervention.

Thomas, who finished with 17 points, began his crunch-time run by banking in a 3-pointer as the 24-second clock expired. He had two more baskets and a free throw, all at the expense of Boston rookie Dee Brown, in overtime.

But it was the 3-pointer that broke the Celtics' hearts, wiping out their hard-earned lead.

"Somebody lied. I didn't call bank," Thomas said. "I was basically trying to get it up on the rim. I was trying to make the shot, but God picked up the ball and put it in."

The Celtics weren't buying any of that. But they clearly appreciated the fact that Thomas was gracious.

"Even though Isiah said his 3-pointer was all luck and no skill, you don't have to tell me that," Ed Pinckney said. "Those things just happen. He hit a real tough shot down

the stretch. He just came through for them. That's what they expect of him. That's his job. He did what he had to do to win the game. He took over."

The two teams, both plagued by injuries to key players throughout the series, made up in emotion what they lacked in healthy bodies. In Game 5, the Celtics overcame an 18-point lead only to see the Pistons pull out a 116-111 victory in Boston Garden. In Game 6, the Celtics trailed by 17 points late in the third quarter but refused to give in.

"I guess these last two games would have to rank as two of the better games I've ever seen in the NBA," Detroit coach Chuck Daly said.

Boston guard Brian Shaw called Game 6 a microcosm of everything that has happened to the Celtics this season.

"It was a heckuva season, and we went down with a fight," Shaw said. "We just came up a little short and nobody should feel bad."

# Good things predicted for Texas racing

WILLOW PARK, Texas (AP) - The van waits. Boxes are piled high. Joe Weaver packs and loads. Soon he'll be moving his family, his employees, his belongings and his 32 horses from Phoenix, Ariz., to the Fort Worth area.

Weaver is a racehorse trainer - the winningest trainer at Turf Paradise in Phoenix on five occasions, he might proudly point out. Consistently he has ranked, as he says, "one-two-three" in the trainers' standings wherever he has bedded down his horses, be it Santa Fe or Ruidoso in New Mexico or northern California.

But "if things work out," he said, he'll make Texas his new base, purchase a home here and maybe even buy "a little horse setup," or training center, near the Trinity Meadows Racetrack that opens May 24 in Willow Park, a few miles west of Fort Worth in eastern Parker County.

Like most people closely connected to horse racing, Weaver envisions a bright future for the sport in Texas and embraces its potential as an encouraging sign for an otherwise troubled industry.

Horse racing is struggling nationally. It struggles for a share of an increasingly competitive market and struggles in some cases just to survive.

For 20 years, as racing failed to package itself for television and failed to meet new competition from lotteries and from fast, glitzy entertainment, the industry heard, although often ignored, its own death rattle. Bowie Race Course, Suffolk Downs, Narragansett Park, Lincoln Downs, Miles Park, Shenandoah Downs, Wheeling Downs, Dover Downs, Liberty Bell Park - they all closed unceremoniously, retreating into nostalgia.

Recent failures have outnumbered successes. The Birmingham Race Course started out five years ago as an ambitious project, but quickly became an \$84 million white elephant when it went bankrupt. And now it could go to the dogs, literally, for its only future might be as a greyhound track.

When Garden State Park in New Jersey was rebuilt in palatial style and reopened in 1985, it was said to be the "racetrack of the 21st century." And now the worst fear is that it might be. It grinds out its survival by offering simulcasts of harness races in addition to its live racing.

Last year, the average daily attendance at America's racetracks dipped to an all-time low of slightly more than 6,000.

The troubles that began at the tracks have leavened the breeding industry. The average price of a yearling at public auction dropped from \$41,396 in 1984 to \$29,377 last year, and the average price of the blueblood yearlings offered at the Saratoga and Keeneland summer sales dropped from \$456,902 in 1984

to \$294,982 a year ago. Several major breeding farms, as a result, have teetered on the edge of financial disaster. Even famed Calumet Farm in Lexington, Ky., which has bred a record nine Kentucky Derby winners, including Strike the Gold this year, had to sell 80 of its 830 acres in an effort to reduce its debt, which is said to approach \$65 million.

And then there's Texas. "Wherever I've gone in the country over the last 10 years," said Neal Guilfoyle, Trinity Meadows' director of racing, "the future of racing (as perceived by those in the business) is going to be in Texas. In New Orleans (at the Fair Grounds Racetrack) I was bombarded with trainers who said, 'Give us a good quality meeting, and we'll be there.'...The national feeling is that it's finally here. They know Texas racing is going to be a success."

The industry, to be sure, is struggling here, too. But it's struggling, said Guilfoyle, as a talented youngster struggles, to realize its promise and potential. In horse racing these days, optimism is as rare a commodity as a sure-thing winner, but when talking about Texas, people in the industry freely toss around such metaphors as "last frontier" and "promised land."

Horse racing in Texas is generally viewed as a growth industry, as a possible boom industry, and when Trinity Meadows opens, the state's racing could take the next step in becoming just that.

"I think it's going to be a real plus for racing," Weaver said, having visited Trinity Meadows last week. "I wouldn't be going there if I didn't think so. I have horses that I can go anywhere with, but I can see real good things happening there, and I want to get in on the ground floor."

His horses can race elsewhere for more money, Weaver said, but there's a future in Texas.

Among those in the Weaver stable are Breezin Lad, a multiple stakes winner of more than \$130,000, and Courageous Cas, a stakes winner the trainer described as "the best mare" in Arizona. They're better horses than might be expected at a track that's going to offer \$35,000 a day in purses, or prize money.

Money attracts quality racing, and Texas racing at the moment, with a 5 percent parimutuel tax, has little money.

Louisiana Downs in Bossier City, La., averages \$135,000 a day in purse distribution. Last year Remington Park in Oklahoma City offered \$100,000 a day; Oaklawn Park in Hot Springs, Ark., \$166,000. The country's most successful tracks - Saratoga in New York, Santa Anita in California -

average as much as \$375,000 a day in purses.

But Bandera Downs near San Antonio, Texas' most successful track to date, last year offered \$6,293 a day in purses for thoroughbreds, to rank 99th among the country's 104 race meetings.

"Texans want to be able to see their horses run at home," Guilfoyle said, explaining why Trinity Meadows may attract better horses than its purses would warrant. "For years the best Texas horses left the state. Now we have to draw them back....If the people of the Metroplex will work with us and grow with us, our purses will become as good as anybody's....I wouldn't be surprised if we're giving away \$225,000 a day in five years."

Many of the horses racing at Trinity Meadows will be Texas horses, and many will come here from New Mexico, Arizona, Oklahoma, Florida and Louisiana, Guilfoyle said.

Growth and improvement, Guilfoyle said, depend in part on a reduction of the tax - and there's legislation in the state Senate to do exactly that - and on the gradual progress of the state's racing industry.

According to a study prepared for the American Quarter Horse Association by D.J. Slottje and Kathy Hayes of the SMU economics department, horse racing already is a billion dollar industry in Texas, responsible for 47,552 jobs, and it could grow dramatically in the next few years.

"I think a lot of people are going to be watching us," Rick Callaway, Trinity Meadows' general manager, said. "I think this track will be a signal."

Trinity Meadows is going to be a small track. At least at first. Its cost, after its lights are installed, will be about \$14 million, track president Jimmy Bradley said. But the track is planning continued improvements, Bradley said: "We're going to be upgrading all the time."

The track will have outside seating for 3,500 people and indoor seating for nearly 5,000, as well as a members-only Jockey Club for 1,000 people. The barn area at present can accommodate fewer than 600 horses, but about one barn will be added each month, Guilfoyle said, until there are 1,500 stalls.

"This is going to be a wonderful facility," said David Freeman, executive secretary of the Texas Racing Commission, after he toured Trinity Meadows recently. "It's good for Texas, for Texas horsemen and for Texas horse racing, and located in a major market it's going to be an added boost. Although we're regulators, we're pulling for them."

So apparently are many people in North Texas. Since the track's official ground-breaking in March, telephone

inquiries from North Texas to the Texas Thoroughbred Breeders' Association have doubled, spokesman Jeff Hooper said.

"People are enthused about Trinity Meadows," Hooper said and later predicted success for both the track and the industry. "We have a large horse population and many horsemen already in Texas. Horses are intertwined with our heritage. We have a core fan base that will support racing from day one. And people here are not as jaded as they are in other states by things like the lottery. It can

really be a growth industry in Texas, and the racing is just the tip of the iceberg. The underlying industries, the breeding and all the attendant industries it touches, are going to prosper."

That's what Weaver is counting on.

"I'd like to make Texas my home," he said.

Horse racing, of course, would like to make Texas its home, too. Out at Trinity Meadows, the boxes and crates are piled high. Workers unpack and unload. And Texas waits.

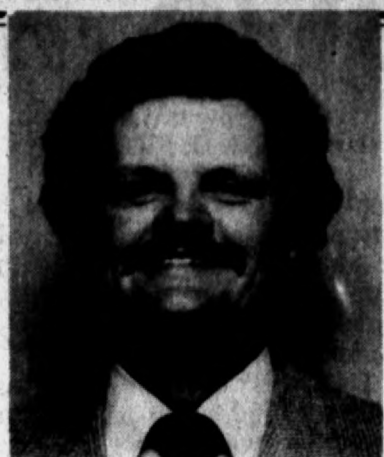

### Poppy sale

Mayor Tom LeGate signed a proclamation recently declaring Wednesday, May 22, as Poppy day in Hereford. The Ladies Auxiliary to the American Legion Post 192 will be selling poppies. Proceeds from this event are used for the benefit of disabled and needy veterans, and widows and orphans of deceased veterans.

### Poppy Day Wednesday

American Legion Auxiliary Post 192 in Hereford will be distributing poppies on Wednesday. Wearing the poppy is a personal statement which simply says, "I remember."

Poppy day has become a familiar tradition in almost every American community. This distribution of the bright red memorial flower to the public is one of the oldest and most widely recognized programs of the American Legion Auxiliary. The poppy, as a memorial flower to the war dead, can be traced to a single individual, Miss Moira Michael. World War I was over but many of America's sons would rest forever in Flanders Fields.

In 1921, the poppy was adopted as the American Legion's official flower. The resolution read: "Resolved that the poppy be made the

memorial flower of the American Legion Auxiliary, and the wearing of it by all citizens on Memorial Day be encouraged; and resolved, further, that contributions be promoted for the sole purpose of aiding in veteran's relief work."

American's veterans, living and dead, deserve to be honored, remembered, and helped when in need. The poppy is a tribute to the deceased veterans and an honor to the living veterans.

The auxiliary poppy is made of crepe paper with each petal affixed by hand by a hospitalized or disabled veteran. The tag which carries the auxiliary and legion emblems clearly states that it was made by a veteran. The Texas poppies are made in Temple.

Juliette Gordon Low founded an organization in 1912 in Savannah, Ga., called the Girl Guides, which later became the Girl Scouts of America.

Every savings account can stand a boost now and then, especially in difficult economic times. Families can increase a feeling of financial security by adding to their savings. Money is often hard to come by. How do you find "extra" money for

savings? Listed below are some short-term ideas to help your family add to savings:

- \* Stage a family fundraising contest. Specify a short time (maybe a week or so) during which each family member will contribute to savings. The one who contributes the most wins a prize. Choose a prize without cost, or you will defeat your purpose. The prize might be something like getting to pick supper menus for a week, skipping family chores, or being allowed extra telephone or television time. Everyone in the family can contribute. Children can earn money by taking care of neighborhood pets, doing yard work, starting a neighborhood newsletter, or holding a car wash. The entire family can participate in collecting recyclable materials or contributing items to a garage sale. Children and adults can make crafts and sell them on consignment at craft shops. Short-term jobs may be available through temporary employment agencies.

Bread can be bought at thrift stores for lower prices. Food made from scratch usually costs less than convenience foods. Startling new evidence suggests Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs) may be real.

New evidence and testimony indicate the U.S. Government recovered a crashed UFO in New Mexico 43 years ago. Officials at the Roswell Army Air Field announced they found a "flying disc" in the desert and the story was sent around the world; however, higher authorities at the Pentagon in a kind of "cosmic Watergate" cover-up quickly changed the story to indicate the material was just a weather balloon radar target.

A retired U.S. Air Force Brigadier General says officials at the Pentagon ordered the cover-up in order to

divert the interest of the press. Other witnesses say they were harassed and intimidated by military officers, who ordered them to keep silent about the real story.

The Fund for UFO Research, a non-profit scientific organization in Washington, D.C., is sponsoring a major effort to investigate the New Mexico case and to bring it to the attention of the American people.

## 'Reason for Living' is family's story

### Jill Clayburgh lands role in family drama

*Reason for Living: The Jill Ireland Story* is not about the actress, says Jill Clayburgh. The TV movie, airing Monday, May 20, on NBC and starring Clayburgh in the title role, is about families.

Actress Jill Ireland made 35 films in her long career. Almost one year ago to date, she died of breast cancer. But before her death, the actress penned two novels: *Life Wish*, chronicling her battle with cancer, and *Life Lines*, depicting her adopted son's heroin addiction, overdose and death.

*Reason for Living* is based on *Life Lines* and Ireland's determination to help her son beat the monkey off of his back.

"I think she felt strongly about what she learned from having dealt with her cancer," said Clayburgh of Ireland. "She felt she could help her son deal with his flirtation with death. She felt she knew something about death, and, therefore, she had a way to communicate with him."

The film is really about what you do and where you turn when you have tried everything you can think of to help a loved one. "It's not about her as a celebrity or as an actress," said Clayburgh. "It's a very passionate story about a woman and her feelings for her family, her children, her parents, her own life and her own mortality. People might turn it on because it's Jill Ireland, but I think the book's success is because of its originality. It's not a self-serving book about 'how great I am' and 'how wonderful I am.' It's a pretty soul-searching look."

Originally, Ireland had planned to play herself in the telefilm. She is, in fact, executive producer of the production. When she realized it would be impossible to do so, she made a list of those actresses who she would want to see in her role. Clayburgh, nominated twice for an Oscar (*An Unmarried Woman*, *Starting Over*) and once for an Emmy (*Hustling*), made the list and won the part.

Ireland's husband, Charles Bronson, reportedly hasn't read either of his wife's books and was opposed to the making of *Reason for Living*. His role will be played by Lance Henriksen (*Aliens*). "It's something that she jokes about in her book and, in fact, the movie," said Clayburgh, noting it was her understanding that things had been worked out with Bronson.

Clayburgh has never met Bronson or Ireland. The materials she used to prepare for her role were Ireland's books, tapes she had made with the show's producers and TV interviews. It is the second real-person role she has played. In 1976 she played Carole Lombard in the biographical film *Gable and Lombard*. Such a role demands certain responsibilities, but she looks at it as a challenge.

"I think that the film is about her very human struggle to find an answer, and then to have to try something else," concluded Clayburgh, herself the mother of three. "Parents feel so helpless when these things happen and so inadequate and sort of that feeling that 'Anybody could do it (parenting) better than I could.' I hope that you walk away seeing that nobody does it all that well, but everybody does it as well as they can, and that's sort of all you can ask of yourself." © TV Listing Inc.
