Hereford native starts Bangladesh relief fund

The disaster in Bangladesh recently devastated the small country. Although the typhoon happened thousands of miles away, it hit close to home for one Hereford resident.

Charlet Herr-Chowdhury's husband, Haider, runs a garment factory in Dhaka, Bangladesh and was there during the storms.

"When I heard about the typhoon, my first reaction was, 'I hope he's alright,'" Chowdhury said. "After I found out that he was OK, I began to worry about all the people the storms left homeless."

Chowdhury recently visited Bangladesh and noticed the large numbers of beggars and homeless people.

"It is so different being in a safe environment and going to a place where you see people begging on the street and children standing around with no clothes on. There are a lot of people there who do not have homes. Many live in shacks and those (shacks) were destroyed during the storm."

"When I visited there I wanted to help, but there is only so much one person can do."

"The homeless situation was bad when I was there visiting, but it is 10 times worse now. There is not much left in the coastal city of Chittagong. It was the worst hit. The people who

have homes were not hurt, but the people who lived in shacks were hit hardest."

Because Bangladesh's government has limited funds, it doesn't have the resources to help all the victims.

"Many of the families now only have one or two members."

Chowdhury wasn't able to speak to her husband until 14 days after the disaster.

"The phone lines were down and when I finally talked with him. We only got to talk for three or four minutes. I didn't get the full story until his mother came to visit."

After her concerns with her husband's safety were calmed, she began to seek relief funds for the homeless.

"Through the American Red Cross we have set up a fund," Chowdhury said. "We want people to save their aluminum cans and the money raised will go to the disaster victims. All someone has to do is save their cans and call the Red Cross and we'll come pick them up or bring the cans to the Red Cross."

Not only must Chowdhury cope with her husband being in a country plagued with disaster, she must also cope with raising her family away from her husband who lives in a different country.

"It is difficult being away," she said. "We have a certain closeness."

Because we can spend only three to four minutes on the phone, we learn to say only important things and cut out the unimportant things. I think having two children makes it harder."

Chowdhury doesn't know when she'll be able to see her husband, who has been away for one and a half years.

"I might be able to see him sometime this month. I've seen him twice since he has been gone. I spent three months in Bangladesh and he spent five weeks here when my second child was born."

Being married to someone from a foreign country, one faces several cultural differences.

"Their culture, of course, is different than ours," Chowdhury said. "They dress different, but they are adaptive to the American culture. Most speak English."

"The Bangladeshi people are very religious. They are strong Moslem. I understand being religious because I am Catholic."

"Our differences don't bother either one of us. I think if you love each other differences shouldn't matter."

Being far apart, they have learned to write letters as their main means of correspondence.

"We write lots of letters," she said. "They are usually about 10 pages."

Area sets new fed cattle mark

Deaf Smith County continued its ranking as the No. 1 cattle-feeding county in the nation in 1989, according to the 1991 Fed Cattle Survey released Friday by Southwest Public Service Co.

The SPS service area, which includes the Texas Panhandle and a few counties in Oklahoma and New Mexico, fed a record 5.5 million head.

Fourteen feedyards in Deaf Smith County fed out 834,930 head of cattle in 1990 as Hereford retained its title as "Cattle Feeding Capital of the World." That total was about 50,000 head less than 1989, but Deaf Smith County had recorded an increase of more than 100,000 head last year and a record 885,563 last year.

Both Castro and Parmer counties had increases this year, pushing the three-county "Golden Triangle" total to a record 1,935,000 head. The three had a total of 1.86 million on last year's report, or almost 40 percent of the Texas Panhandle total. Deaf Smith accounted for about 17 percent of the Panhandle total.

Castro showed a slight decline on the '89 report, but rebounded with a

102,000 increase in '90 for a total of 591,349 head of fed cattle. Parmer's total was 508,752, a slight increase over the '90 report.

Deaf Smith is listed with 14 feed yards of 5,000 or more capacity, while Castro had 13 and Parmer had 8. The one-time lot capacity of all the feed yards in the area is at all-time high of 2.88 million. The survey included all feed lots of 5,000 head or more capacity, or a total of 107. The survey shows 14 yards under 5,000 capacity.

The survey shows the area has 13 beef packing plants with an annual slaughter capacity of 5.1 million. Fat cattle slaughtered in the SPS area last year was 4.66 million head.

Deaf Smith County led the 1990 totals with 834,930 head. The annual SPS survey reflects that the "Golden Triangle" of Deaf Smith, Parmer and Castro counties had almost 40 percent of the Texas Panhandle total.

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Annual wheat day showcases crops


AMARILLO -- A full day of activity--showcasing the latest research on wheat production and use and stressing safe handling of pesticides--is planned for the annual Wheat Field Day here and at Bushland Thursday. Two new wheat varieties will be shown.

Registration and the morning session begins at 8:15 a.m. at the Texas A&M Research and Extension center, 6500 Amarillo Blvd. West. The afternoon program begins at 1:00 p.m. at the USDA-ARS Conservation and Production Laboratory, three-fourths-mile west of Bushland on the I-40 access road.

The theme for the morning program is minimizing exposure to pesticides and safe disposal and recycling of pesticide containers, said Dr. Brent Bean, Texas Agricultural Extension agronomist and field day chairman. Participants in the morning program can qualify for three continuing education units needed for renewal of pesticide applicator certification.

An update on pesticide amnesty days, container recycling and pesticide safety will be presented by Dr. Denise McWilliams, Extension pesticide safety specialist, College Station. Don Lang of Dow-Elanco and Chris Cole of FMC will review industry programs and products.

Changes in food labeling should benefit consumers

Manufacturers of products marketed as "fresh" learned last month that the U.S. Food and Drug administration is getting serious about food labeling.

By November, the FDA will propose sweeping regulations that amount to the first major changes in food labeling in 20 years.

Products with labels that make glib claims using such terms as "light," "lite," "reduced," "low-fat" or "cholesterol-free," among others, will have to start backing them up when the FDA rules become final, likely by November 1992.

The new regulations, mandated by the Nutrition Labeling and Education Act of 1990, should benefit consumers the most, said Dr. Mary Kinney Bielamowicz, nutritionist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The new law requires that virtually all packaged foods contain nutrition information on the labels.

The FDA signaled in April that it will enforce the few food label rules on the books by seizing more than 2,400 cases of Citrus Hill fresh Choice orange juice. The FDA complained that the product's manufacturer, Proctor & Gamble, violated its policy that prohibits using "fresh" to describe processed orange juice.

Until now, nutrition labeling has been largely voluntary, Bielamowicz said. The FDA required only that a label contain the name and address of the manufacturer and a list of all ingredients in descending order of weight. Calorie information was optional.

"Once FDA regulations are implemented, consumers will be able to make better food choices, especially if they are on strict diets relating to health problems," she said.

Required nutrition information will focus more on macro-nutrient data such as fat, calories and protein rather than on such micro-nutrients as vitamins and minerals, Bielamowicz said. Labels will list serving size,

First aid tips for boo-boo's

All active youngsters are prone to scrapes, cuts and bruises, but they can be less frightening to children if they know how to take care of them.

Dr. Geraldine Shepperson, 1990 School Nurse of the Year, has worked on a booklet that helps youngsters learn how to care for their own minor injuries. You might want to go over these tips with your own child.

-Remain calm. When you know what to do, you'll be able to take the hurt away faster. If there are grownups around, let them know you hurt yourself so that they can help.

-Wash the scrape or cut with some soap and warm water to clean it, making sure there's no dirt left behind. If there is a grown-up around, ask him or her to put some antiseptic cleaner, such as hydrogen peroxide, on the boo-boo.

-Cover the boo-boo with a bandage so it will stay clean.

CURB APPEAL

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number of servings and total calories, total fat, cholesterol, sodium, carbohydrates, sugars, fiber and other ingredients in each serving.

High-fiber claims would be prohibited under the law unless the food is also low in total fat, Bielamowicz said. A health claim also is forbidden unless it is authorized by FDA regulation based on "significant, scientific agreement" supporting the claim.

For the first time, fresh fruits, vegetables and seedfood will be labeled. Regulations will allow nutrition information to be provided at a single location at the point of sale and permit the information to be expressed as an average, or range per serving.

Under the new law, FDA may allow a statement of the absence of cholesterol in a product, but only if it would help consumers maintain healthy diets. However, claims of "no cholesterol" won't be allowed in products that do not contain cholesterol to begin with, Bielamowicz said.

Fire Chief Russell Sanders said the scripts were written by the National Fire Protection Association, a free-lance writer and a local substance abuse organization.



Dear Editor:

As one of your readers, I want to urge you to increase your coverage of the fact that for every new dollar that Congress has raised this year in new taxes, it has increased spending by \$1.78. As Reader's Digest reported, the budget and new taxes were a "sham."

To put it bluntly, last year

Congress conned the American people and the news media. They told us we should go along with their "deficit reduction package" which included tax increases for every American because we had to get the deficit under control. But in the end, they just wanted to take more of our income in taxes.

In the name of deficit reduction, they enacted the second largest tax increase ever and then turned right around and increased spending by \$11 billion—pushing the deficit to a new record.

It was the clearest case ever of false advertising. And, as Congress demonstrated when they destroyed Gramm-Rudman and the other controls on spending, they never intended to reduce the deficit or control wasteful spending.

We bought this budget agreement story hook, line and sinker and now we are paying the price in higher taxes and higher deficits. I urge you to expand coverage and report other important facts such as: Congress enlarged the deficit by \$100 billion to an all-time record of \$320 billion for FY 1991 alone; Congress pushed the national debt to a new record and increased the annual interest payment on the debt to a staggering \$254 billion.

As Citizens Against Government Waste has pointed out repeatedly, we have this skyrocketing deficit today not because of the recession but because Congress refuses to stop its wasteful spending. Unless we get Congress' runaway taxes and spending under control, we will all be in very serious trouble very soon.

May 13

Amarillo Daily News on damaging Texas tourism:

Texas may become as effective in increasing tourism as a dog chasing its own tail if lawmakers continue to follow Texas Parks and Wildlife Department recommendations to increase fees...

The latest assault on the pocketbooks of tourist and outdoor enthusiasts is a bill sponsored by Sen. John Montford, D-Lubbock, that calls for permit fees ranging from \$12 to \$30 on motorized boats.

Montford says his bill provides a way to grant titles to boats and outboard motors and will help remove parks and wildlife from the state's general fund budget...

Hikes in the fees are likely to discourage use and that, in the long run, will lower the amount of money flowing into the state's coffers.

On paper it may reduce the dependence of the department on general revenues, but in reality it will lower revenues, unduly burden middle-income Texans who want to enjoy boating and outdoor activities and seriously damage the tourist industry.

The Houston Post on life sentences:

It's understandable, as bad as crime is these days, that many people want to lock up criminals and throw away the key - if not execute them.

The Texas Senate has paid homage to that feeling by approving a bill that calls for real life sentences - life sentences without the possibility of parole - for capital murderers who do not get the death penalty. The House more moderately has approved a bill that would require capital murderers who are not executed to serve at least 30 years in prison before they could be considered for parole.

... The House plan is the better one The Senate measure, by taking away from convicts all hope of ever being released, would make life very difficult and more dangerous for the people guarding them. The less an inmate has to live for, the more trouble he will be.

The Senate plan would also be far more expensive than the House plan, since it costs about \$13,500 a year to keep a prisoner, not counting prison construction costs. The Senate plan would force the Department of Criminal Justice to operate a big, expensive geriatric unit for elderly convicts.

Even the House's 30-year-minimum-time plan would be mighty expensive, costing at least \$405,000 for each capital murder inmate not executed.

But it would be worth the cost if it would keep capital murderers off the

streets, which the public is demanding.

There are some criminals who just will not be rehabilitated, and the criminal justice system must quit acting like a revolving door for them, at least until they pass the middle or old age at which people are less inclined to commit violent crimes. Holding unexecuted capital murderers for at least 30 years should keep most of them locked up until that age.

May 13

San Antonio Light on consolidating state organizations:

As separate reviews of state spending and taxation proceed toward a July showdown with the Texas fiscal crisis, it has become more important to consider the possibility of merging state agencies, both to save money and to do a better job of delivering state services.

There are two moves afoot that deserve attention now. The first is a bill to consolidate the state's environmental protection agencies under a single department of natural resources.

Environmental and consumer groups would like to see this because they hope a unified agency will strengthen and streamline the state's approach to pollution control. The bill, which has passed the Senate and awaits House action, would combine the Texas Water Commission and the Texas Air Control Board and parts of the Texas Department of Health that deal with municipal solid waste. ...

The second idea - yet to be put in bill form - involves combining certain programs of the departments of Human Services and Mental Health-Mental Retardation. These two areas take up an enormous chunk of the state budget and potential savings could be substantial.

Just as important, some centralizing of functions could improve delivery of services to Texans who use the agencies' service. ...

The performance review headed by Comptroller John Sharp will be giving these ideas a good hard look during the next two months as it reviews all state spending and operations. A state that is talking about a major tax increase - in whatever form - should exhaust possibilities for saving money, particularly when it could result in greater efficiency in the delivery of services.

If time is too short to consolidate state functions this year, the least that should be done is to set up an interim committee to make specific recommendations to a special session of the Legislature. Better, however, to strive for more immediate action.

The performance review headed by Comptroller John Sharp will be giving these ideas a good hard look during the next two months as it reviews all state spending and operations.

Accent on Health

According to health officials, Texas women are less likely to use tobacco during pregnancy than are American women in general.

A recent study of Texas women who gave birth in 1989 shows that some 12 percent (compared to 20-25 percent nationally) reported using tobacco during their pregnancies, according to Tom Pollard at the Texas Department of Health (TDH). Pollard is director of the Statistical Services Division, TDH Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Part of the reason why fewer Texans smoke during pregnancy may be linked to Texas' proportionately large Hispanic and black populations. "Forty-four percent of all Texas births occur among these two groups, and Hispanic and black women are less likely to use tobacco during pregnancy than are white, non-

Hispanic women," Pollard said. "Only 17 percent of white mothers in Texas reported using tobacco during pregnancy. But black and Hispanic women in Texas use tobacco even less. Only 11 percent of black and five percent of Hispanic mothers reported using tobacco during their pregnancies," he said.

Pollard added that Hispanic women who smoked used fewer cigarettes per day during pregnancy than did either white or black women. On average, he said, Hispanic women smoked five cigarettes a day while blacks or whites smoked 10.

Tobacco use during pregnancy is known to cause problems for both mothers and babies. In 1989, Texas mothers who used tobacco were twice as likely as non-users to have low-birthweight babies (less than 5 pounds, 8 ounces). They also were more than twice as likely to have previously borne a premature infant.

Low birthweight is a major cause of infant death. In 1987, for example, eight percent of Texas' babies with low birthweight died within the first year of life, while only 0.3 percent of babies with normal birthweight died.

Pollard said, "Our data further showed that women who reported tobacco use while pregnant also were more likely to have other health factors which placed their pregnancies at risk. They were more than twice as likely as non-users to have acute or chronic lung diseases."

NEW YORK (AP) - A nationwide theater chain says it won't show comedian Andrew Dice Clay's latest movie because it degrades women.

A buyer for Loews Theatres found "Dice Rules" to be "on a non-stop basis, odious, repulsive and repugnant to women," Loews chairman A. Alan Friedberg said Tuesday.

Loews, based in Secaucus, N.J., owns 200 theater complexes, with 866 screens, in 16 states.

The movie, consisting of his stand-up routine, comes out Friday.

How to prepare for a family emergency plan

If an emergency struck your area, you would be the first line of defense for your family. Government and volunteer agencies would provide fast and effective support, but in those first critical moments or hours, you must be prepared to act decisively to ensure the safety of those you love.

Taking a little time for advance planning today would make the difference in saving or losing a life.

SIX STEPS TO SAFETY

The first and most important measure you should take to prepare for any emergency is to create a family emergency plan.

1. Evaluate and prioritize the disasters that could threaten you.

2. Draw a floor plan of your home, noting escape routes, locations of emergency supplies and utility shut-offs.

3. Map out evacuation routes for different types of disasters, such as fire or flood.

4. Ask an out-of-town friend or relative to serve as your family contact person. Choose an alternate location where you can meet if family members become separated during or

before a disaster.

5. Stock emergency equipment such as a flashlight; first-aid kit; battery-operated radio; clothing; and a 72-hour supply of food and water.

6. Devise plans for those with special needs, such as infants, the elderly or the chronically ill.

Keep your family emergency plan in a handy place, and review it at least once a year with your family. In addition, drill your family regularly on proper actions for various emergencies.

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

Herd's Mungia makes all-district first team

Hereford second baseman Max Mungia was named first team All-District 1-4A and three other Hereford baseball players made the second team, Coach T.R. Sartor said.

Senior shortstop Amado Lopez, senior first baseman Matt Bromlow and sophomore pitcher Sammy Casarez were the Whitefaces on the second team.

No one team dominated the lists, but Randall placed the most players on the two teams. Eight Raiders made it, including four first-teamers, plus sophomore Corey McAllister was named newcomer of the year.

District champion Pampa put six players on the lists, two on the first team, and the Harvesters had the Most Valuable Player, Quincy Williams, and the Coach of the Year, Rod Porter.

The coaches for the district's six teams vote on the all-district teams using the players' performances and statistics from district games only.

Mungia's offensive stats (12 hits for a .387 batting average and six RBI all led the Herd in district play) were on par with the district's other top second basemen, Sartor said, but what stood out was his defense. His 33 putouts and 24 assists in district play were far more than any other second baseman. In addition, Sartor said, the district's coaches, who do the voting, remembered Mungia diving to make

spectacular plays.

"He had one (diving play) about every game," Sartor said. "He was a memorable player."

Casarez, left-hander and one of only four sophomores honored, had a 1-4 record but a 2.55 earned run average in district. He had 27 strikeouts and only 12 walks in 33 innings.

Bromlow batted .310, stole seven bases and scored six runs in district play, and he had only one error after making the switch to first base from centerfield because of a shoulder injury.

Lopez batted .321, and of his nine district hits, three were doubles and one was a triple. That triple was one of the biggest hits of the season, coming in the first game against Randall at Whiteface Field. After the triple, he scored the winning run to break the Herd's losing streak.

The man who bunted Lopez home on that play was George Jowell, a senior who earned honorable mention at catcher, Sartor said. Jowell batted .313 with five RBI in district.

Pistons eliminate Celtics

AUBURN HILLS, Mich. (AP) - They used to play games filled with passion and hate. Now the Detroit Pistons and Boston Celtics have great respect for one another. And the games somehow keep getting better and better.

The Pistons, trying to become only the third team to win three consecutive NBA championships, got an eight-point lift from Isiah Thomas in overtime Friday night and ousted the Celtics 117-113 in Game 6 of the Eastern Conference semifinals.

Detroit, making its fifth consecutive appearance in the conference finals, will open against the Bulls in Chicago on Sunday afternoon.

The game was tied at 105-105 after

regulation and Boston took a quick four-point lead in overtime. Then Thomas took over, although he claimed to be aided by divine intervention.

Thomas, who finished with 17 points, began his crunch-time run by banking in a 3-pointer as the 24-second clock expired. He had two more baskets and a free throw, all at the expense of Boston rookie Dee Brown, in overtime.

But it was the 3-pointer that broke the Celtics' hearts, wiping out their hard-earned lead.

"Somebody lied. I didn't call bank," Thomas said. "I was basically trying to get it up on the rim. I was trying to make the shot, but God picked up the ball and put it in."

The Celtics weren't buying any of that. But they clearly appreciated the fact that Thomas was gracious.

"Even though Isiah said his 3-pointer was all luck and no skill, you don't have to tell me that," Ed Pinckney said. "Those things just happen. He hit a real tough shot down

the stretch. He just came through for them. That's what they expect of him. That's his job. He did what he had to do to win the game. He took over."

The two teams, both plagued by injuries to key players throughout the series, made up in emotion what they lacked in healthy bodies. In Game 5, the Celtics overcame an 18-point lead only to see the Pistons pull out a 116-111 victory in Boston Garden. In Game 6, the Celtics trailed by 17 points late in the third quarter but refused to give in.

"I guess these last two games would have to rank as two of the better games I've ever seen in the NBA," Detroit coach Chuck Daly said.

Boston guard Brian Shaw called Game 6 a microcosm of everything that has happened to the Celtics this season.

"It was a heckuva season, and we went down with a fight," Shaw said. "We just came up a little short and nobody should feel bad."

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

AUSTIN (AP) - University of Texas basketball coach Tom Penders sees peanut vendors hitting fungsos and salaried staff replacing volunteer assistants as a result of some NCAA cutbacks.

The cutbacks, ordered by the National Collegiate Athletic Association's last convention, came at the urging of school presidents.

Penders said presidents need to be involved, but they also should use common sense.

"It's almost like running a

newspaper, if the publisher is going to be involved in every decision in writing every column, I think you've got a problem," Penders told a meeting of Associated Press Sports Editors recently.

"I think some of the rules changes that came out this year were knee jerk reactions. They could be toned down and streamlined. Some affect basketball and others will affect other sports."

Trimming an assistant coach and two scholarships from Division I basketball programs may not be in the best interest of the student-athletes,

Penders said.

"Basketball, I guess you could say we were hit pretty hard in that we're losing one member of our staff next year, one scholarship initially and then two afterward," Penders said.

"I say the 14th and 15th position now are for kids that have a chance or are projected as a player. It gives us opportunity to sit a kid out that's struggling academically. There'll be less of that in the future."

Noting the Texas baseball program will lose two coaches, Penders said "We'll have peanut vendors hitting fungsos to the outfielders."

Nor does Penders buy the contention that cutting scholarships will be a competitive equalizer for large and small Division I schools.

"No team has 15 players that are highly recruited," Penders said. "Most teams reserve those positions for persons who could develop."

Cutting staff may not be cutting costs, Penders said. The coach he'll lose next year is an unpaid assistant who runs the Longhorn study hall.

"The University of Texas will have to find someone to do the same things that person is doing and probably pay him \$15,000 or \$20,000, so we'll have another administrator and one less coach," Penders said.

"I do think the presidents have to be involved but the key is hiring good people. You hire a good athletic director who hires good people to work under him and you have your checks and balances."

Penders says he's heard that the presidents will recommend that coaches cannot have contracts with shoe companies.

"I could talk about that for hours," Penders said. "They don't tell professors they can't do things on

the outside. A lot of professors have outside businesses.

"Now to tell coaches they can't do that I think is a mistake. You open a whole can of worms there."

Penders is concerned that the loss of Arkansas will hurt the SWC as a whole, not the Longhorns in particular.

"I feel good about our future but it could hurt overall," Penders said. "The name of the game is television. If you can get on television, it means tremendous exposure; it helps the recruiting process. It makes money for the university."

The loss of Arkansas will mean one less lure to the networks, he said.

"Every time we've played Arkansas the last two years it's been on national television," Penders said. "Who's going to replace that in the conference?"

"The window for possible television exposure has decreased. They (networks) are going to the conferences that can bring money to them. So I'm not enthusiastic about that right now."

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SWC moves to responsible recruiting

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - One of the most perplexing sports problems in the state of Texas has to be the recruiting of high school athletes, particularly those who can pass and run for touchdowns.

There is enough cheating, double-dealing, broken promises and intrigue for several Matlock episodes.

But the good news in the Southwest Conference is that the cheating has ground down to minor violations.

"There's nobody in this league I'm worried about," is the way Texas A&M coach R.C. Slocum put it in a recent Associated Press Sports Editors meeting. "We've come light years."

But there still are plenty of things to worry about for high school athletes trying to earn their way to

college on an athletic scholarship. It's more than deciding where they want to go play football or dodging alumni fat cats with a big fist of C-notes.

As of Sept. 1 in the SWC, partial qualifiers will no longer be accepted.

You can be Earl Campbell reincarnate and if you can't qualify on the entrance exams, you won't be able to enroll right away in a conference school.

An athlete who doesn't make at least 700 on the Scholastic Aptitude Test or have a "C" average in high school core courses will have to spend time in junior college building up his grades.

Previously, a partial-qualifier could enroll in an SWC school on scholarship, miss a year while he improves his grades, and play the

next season. The academic standards have been raised in the SWC and soon all the other colleges will follow," Slocum said. "It's going to make it tough on the kids who don't make their grades."

Slocum said the rule will make it tough on minorities in Texas. He cited statistics that said 68 percent of all Proposition 48 students in Texas are black. Proposition 48 is the proposals that initiated the tougher academic standards.

He said Texas high school students need better education and suggested that teachers get paid more, saying "if we want a quality education we're going to have to pay for it."

Slocum advocated a one-shot chance for all Texas high school students with low grades and poor qualifications.

"Every student should get a one

semester shot at the school of his choice, say Texas A&M or Texas, to see if he could make it even though he didn't have the high school grades," Slocum said.

Jim Davis, football coach at LBJ Austin for 11 years, said there should be leniency toward high school graduates.

"There's a very smart young man down there in Waco who is the best running back I ever saw who can't pass the test," Davis said. "I say let 'em go one semester no matter what - pass or fail."

Davis said sometimes he gets so mad at the restrictions "that I want to go fishing without a worm."

Dr. James W. Vick, president of the SWC and associate dean of the College of Natural Sciences at the University of Texas, said he has been surprised at the lack of media

coverage on the decision to get tough with partial-qualifiers.

"It's the strongest policy in the NCAA now on the eligibility of partial qualifiers," Vick said.

The SWC will lose partial qualifiers now to the Big Eight Conference, the Big Ten Conference, and other leagues who can promise them a scholarship while they sit out a year and build up their studies.

But one coaching source in the SWC has this answer: "Have you ever noticed that the most trouble you have is with partial qualifiers. You're giving them a free ride into college when they haven't earned it. And they'll always want a free ride."

The spotlight in the SWC has now switched from illegal recruiting to academics. A player's SAT and core score is as important as his 40-yard time.

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Good things predicted for Texas racing

WILLOW PARK, Texas (AP) - The van waits. Boxes are piled high. Joe Weaver packs and loads. Soon he'll be moving his family, his employees, his belongings and his 32 horses from Phoenix, Ariz., to the Fort Worth area.

Weaver is a racehorse trainer - the winningest trainer at Turf Paradise in Phoenix on five occasions, he might proudly point out. Consistently he has ranked, as he says, "one-two-three" in the trainers' standings wherever he has bedded down his horses, be it Santa Fe or Ruidoso in New Mexico or northern California.

But "if things work out," he said, he'll make Texas his new base, purchase a home here and maybe even buy "a little horse setup," or training center, near the Trinity Meadows Racetrack that opens May 24 in Willow Park, a few miles west of Fort Worth in eastern Parker County.

Like most people closely connected to horse racing, Weaver envisions a bright future for the sport in Texas and embraces its potential as an encouraging sign for an otherwise troubled industry.

Horse racing is struggling nationally. It struggles for a share of an increasingly competitive market and struggles in some cases just to survive.

For 20 years, as racing failed to package itself for television and failed to meet new competition from lotteries and from fast, glitzy entertainment, the industry heard, although often ignored, its own death rattle. Bowie Race Course, Suffolk Downs, Narragansett Park, Lincoln Downs, Miles Park, Shenandoah Downs, Wheeling Downs, Dover Downs, Liberty Bell Park - they all closed unceremoniously, retreating into nostalgia.

Recent failures have outnumbered successes. The Birmingham Race Course started out five years ago as an ambitious project, but quickly became an \$84 million white elephant when it went bankrupt. And now it could go to the dogs, literally, for its only future might be as a greyhound track.

When Garden State Park in New Jersey was rebuilt in palatial style and reopened in 1985, it was said to be the "racetrack of the 21st century." And now the worst fear is that it might be. It grinds out its survival by offering simulcasts of harness races in addition to its live racing.

Last year, the average daily attendance at America's racetracks dipped to an all-time low of slightly more than 6,000.

The troubles that began at the tracks have leavened the breeding industry. The average price of a yearling at public auction dropped from \$41,396 in 1984 to \$29,377 last year, and the average price of the blueblood yearlings offered at the Saratoga and Keeneland summer sales dropped from \$456,902 in 1984

to \$294,982 a year ago. Several major breeding farms, as a result, have teetered on the edge of financial disaster. Even famed Calumet Farm in Lexington, Ky., which has bred a record nine Kentucky Derby winners, including Strike the Gold this year, had to sell 80 of its 830 acres in an effort to reduce its debt, which is said to approach \$65 million.

And then there's Texas.

"Wherever I've gone in the country over the last 10 years," said Neal Guilfoyle, Trinity Meadows' director of racing, "the future of racing (as perceived by those in the business) is going to be in Texas. In New Orleans (at the Fair Grounds Racetrack) I was bombarded with trainers who said, 'Give us a good quality meeting, and we'll be there.... The national feeling is that it's finally here. They know Texas racing is going to be a success."

The industry, to be sure, is struggling here, too. But it's struggling, said Guilfoyle, as a talented youngster struggles, to realize its promise and potential. In horse racing these days, optimism is as rare a commodity as a sure-thing winner, but when talking about Texas, people in the industry freely toss around such metaphors as "last frontier" and "promised land."

Horse racing in Texas is generally viewed as a growth industry, as a possible boom industry, and when Trinity Meadows opens, the state's racing could take the next step in becoming just that.

"I think it's going to be a real plus for racing," Weaver said, having visited Trinity Meadows last week. "I wouldn't be going there if I didn't think so. I have horses that I can go anywhere with, but I can see real good things happening there, and I want to get in on the ground floor."

His horses can race elsewhere for more money, Weaver said, but there's a future in Texas.

Among those in the Weaver stable are Breezin Lad, a multiple stakes winner of more than \$130,000, and Courageous Cas, a stakes winner the trainer described as "the best mare" in Arizona. They're better horses than might be expected at a track that's going to offer \$35,000 a day in purses, or prize money.

Money attracts quality racing, and Texas racing at the moment, with a 5 percent parimutuel tax, has little money.

Louisiana Downs in Bossier City, La., averages \$135,000 a day in purse distribution. Last year Remington Park in Oklahoma City offered \$100,000 a day; Oaklawn Park in Hot Springs, Ark., \$166,000. The country's most successful tracks - Saratoga in New York, Santa Anita in California -

average as much as \$375,000 a day in purses.

But Bandera Downs near San Antonio, Texas' most successful track to date, last year offered \$6,293 a day in purses for thoroughbreds, to rank 99th among the country's 104 race meetings.

"Texans want to be able to see their horses run at home," Guilfoyle said, explaining why Trinity Meadows may attract better horses than its purses would warrant. "For years the best Texas horses left the state. Now we have to draw them back.... If the people of the Metroplex will work with us and grow with us, our purses will become as good as anybody's... I wouldn't be surprised if we're giving away \$225,000 a day in five years."

Many of the horses racing at Trinity Meadows will be Texas horses, and many will come here from New Mexico, Arizona, Oklahoma, Florida and Louisiana, Guilfoyle said.

Growth and improvement, Guilfoyle said, depend in part on a reduction of the tax - and there's legislation in the state Senate to do exactly that - and on the gradual progress of the state's racing industry.

According to a study prepared for the American Quarter Horse Association by D.J. Slotje and Kathy Hayes of the SMU economics department, horse racing already is a billion dollar industry in Texas, responsible for 47,552 jobs, and it could grow dramatically in the next few years.

"I think a lot of people are going to be watching us," Rick Callaway, Trinity Meadows' general manager, said. "I think this track will be a signal."

Trinity Meadows is going to be a small track. At least at first. Its cost, after its lights are installed, will be about \$14 million, track president Jimmy Bradley said. But the track is planning continued improvements, Bradley said: "We're going to be upgrading all the time."

The track will have outside seating for 3,500 people and indoor seating for nearly 5,000, as well as a members-only Jockey Club for 1,000 people. The barn area at present can accommodate fewer than 600 horses, but about one barn will be added each month, Guilfoyle said, until there are 1,500 stalls.

"This is going to be a wonderful facility," said David Freeman, executive secretary of the Texas Racing Commission, after he toured Trinity Meadows recently week. "It's good for Texas, for Texas horsemen and for Texas horse racing, and located in a major market it's going to be an added boost. Although we're regulators, we're pulling for them."

So apparently are many people in North Texas. Since the track's official ground-breaking in March, telephone

inquiries from North Texas to the Texas Thoroughbred Breeders' Association have doubled, spokesman Jeff Hooper said.

really be a growth industry in Texas, and the racing is just the tip of the iceberg. The underlying industries, the breeding and all the attendant industries it touches, are going to prosper."

That's what Weaver is counting on.

"I'd like to make Texas my home," he said.

Horse racing, of course, would like to make Texas its home, too. Out at Trinity Meadows, the boxes and crates are piled high. Workers unpack and unload. And Texas waits.





Stinging honey bee gets it in the end

Spring is swarming season for honey bees, a time when people are more likely to find bees building hives in new places -- an encounter punctuated occasionally by a sting. But if you think you feel bad after a honey bee sting, consider the bee.

There's a reason honey bees sting only once, and it's not that they become peace activists. After stinging, the honey bee bleeds to death, usually within two hours.

But it's not insect martyrdom, this bee's death in defense of her hive.

"The honey bee loses her stinger because it is barbed. When she tries to withdraw the stinger, the barbs catch and pull her guts out," entomologist Dr. John Thomas says pointedly.

A stinger left behind is the telltale sign of a honey bee, said Thomas, who handles bee programs for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. No other insect loses its stinger; nor the yellow jacket, wasp, hornet or bumblebee.

Thomas said the "business end" of the female honey bee has three parts: a needle-like shaft, or hollow tube, that allows the venom to flow into the victim; and two barbs that are hinged under the venom sac and attached along the shaft's length.

The sac pumps like a minuscule heart, about the size of a straight pin head. As venom flows, muscles attached to the stinger alternately contract, digging the shaft deeper into the victim.

Those muscles also are attached to the honey bee's intestines. So, when a honey bee forcefully frees herself from the sting, the action rips away part of her body.

"Insects have no veins for blood," Thomas explained. "Blood flows openly in the cavity. If you break an insect's body, it bleeds."

As the bee's agony ends, the victim's misery begins.

The bee-less venom sac continues to pump poison, taking some 10 minutes to empty if not removed. (Don't tweeze it out, Thomas cautioned, because that squirts the remaining venom straight into the victim. Slide it out from the side).

Venom causes either a local or systemic reaction in the victim. That's because it is made of acids (which cause pain) and complex proteins, to which some people are allergic.

Most of us -- about 99.6 percent, according to Thomas -- have a local reaction: pain and swelling.

The others -- about four in 1,000 -- have a systemic allergy that requires medical treatment, he said.

"Allergic reactions differ for the stings of bees and, say, wasps, because venom has different proteins," Thomas noted. "It's rare to be allergic to both. It makes as much sense to say that because you are allergic to bees you also are allergic to milk."

Systemic reactions to bee stings cause tingling on the palms, soles, lips and tongue. The throat may

tighten, and the victim may have difficulty breathing or experience dizziness and nausea.

For that person, one sting is as likely as 3,000 to cause death, Thomas said. Plus, allergies may change so that one who never has been allergic becomes so, or vice versa.

Liz Greeley at the National Center for Health Statistics in Washington, D.C., said 87 people died in the United States from bee, hornet and wasp stings in 1987, the most recent data.

On average, less than one death occurs from honey bee stings in Texas each year, Thomas said. Including hornet, wasps and other stinging insects, the average is less than three deaths a year.

Bobby Davis, a spokesman for the Texas Department of Health, said 98 people died from bee stings in Texas between 1950-89. Wasp stings caused 66 deaths in Texas between 1950-87, he said.

"For most of us, the risk is on getting too many stings at one time," Thomas said, noting the arrival of the more defensive Africanized honey bee (AHB) in the United States last October. More than a dozen additional AHB and the domestic honey bee produces the same allergic reaction, Thomas noted.

"Those muscles also are attached to the honey bee's intestines. So, when a honey bee forcefully frees herself from the sting, the action rips away part of her body.

"Insects have no veins for blood," Thomas explained. "Blood flows openly in the cavity. If you break an insect's body, it bleeds."

If that makes you want to run like mad, good. Thomas said bees usually aren't as fast as humans. Running could save your life and the bee's.

Nutrition labels planned

USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service is working on plans to require nutrition information on meat and poultry labels.

"We think consumers deserve more nutrition information on labels so they can make choices which will help them follow a healthy diet," explains Margaret O'K. Glavin, FSIS Deputy Administrator for Regulatory Programs.

FSIS will propose that nutrition labeling be mandatory for processed meat and poultry products but voluntary on fresh and frozen products.

Nutrition labels for meat and poultry products are intended to be similar to those established by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), which is developing nutrition labeling requirements for all other products.

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
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Poppy sale

This distribution of the bright red memorial flower to the public is one of the oldest and most widely recognized programs of the American Legion Auxiliary. The poppy, as a memorial flower to the war dead, can be traced to a single individual, Miss Moina Michael.

World War I was over but many of America's sons would rest forever in Flanders' Fields.

In 1921, the poppy was adopted as the American Legion's official flower. The resolution read: "Resolved that the poppy be made the

memorial flower of the American Legion Auxiliary, and the wearing of it by all citizens on Memorial Day be encouraged; and resolved, further, that contributions be promoted for the sole purpose of aiding in veteran's relief work."

Reduce travel risk

Most people, whether preparing for business or personal travel, spend much time and effort planning even the smallest details of their trip.

The physicians and staff at travel clinics are trained together personal data that will enable them to make recommendations specific to your trip. These details will include information on your lifestyle, what you expect to be doing in a specific location at a specific time (your potential exposure to disease is in part determined not only by the country you visit, but by the time of year and whether you are in a rural or urban setting), countries you will be traveling through (as well as your final destination) and your medical history.

savings? Listed below are some short-term ideas to help your family add to savings:

* Stage a family fundraising contest. Specify a short time (maybe a week or so) during which each family member will contribute to savings. The one who contributes the most wins a prize. Choose a prize without cost, or you will defeat your purpose. The prize might be something like getting to pick supper menus for a week, skipping family chores, or being allowed extra telephone or television time. Everyone in the family can contribute. Children can earn money by taking care of neighborhood pets, doing yard work, starting a neighborhood newsletter, or holding a car wash. The entire family can participate in collecting recyclable materials or contributing items to a garage sale. Children and adults can make crafts and sell them on consignment at craft shops. Short-term jobs may be available through temporary employment agencies.

* Reduce unnecessary expenses for a limited time. For example, go without soft drinks for two weeks, contributing the amount you normally would have spent to your savings account; or cut back on entertainment costs, long-distance phone calls and hobbies for a specified time and contribute all savings to the account.

* Plan menus for a "recession week" of meals. See how little you

can spend on meals while keeping nutritional value high. Nutritious and filling meals can be made using low cost foods such as beans, rice and seasonal vegetables. Bread can be bought at thrift stores for lower prices. Food made from scratch usually costs less than convenience foods. Shopping the sales, buying generic brands and using coupons can lower costs even further.

If done for short, specified lengths of time, these activities can be approached as fun family projects rather than deprivation. Meanwhile, make sure all savings are deposited to your savings account. You will be surprised how much it grows!

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YOUR EYES

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Each year, there are more than 170,000 serious eye injuries—and almost 90 percent of them could be prevented by wearing protective eyewear. Is your child adequately protected at play and sports? Racquetball is especially dangerous; the high speed of the ball in play causes many eye injuries to the unprotected player. The best goggles for the sport have sturdy frames and shatter-resistant polycarbonate lenses. Frames for sports often have padded bridges for comfort and a headband to keep them in place.

Those with corrective lenses have two options: prescription lenses can be put into the toughest sports goggles; or, one can wear an eye or face-guard over regular contact lenses or glasses. To encourage a younger's cooperation, point out what professional athletes wear.

Don't neglect sun protection, too. Children who spend many hours playing outside may be at risk from the sun's ultra-violet radiation. Supply quality sunglasses or, if too young for sunglasses, a hat with a protective brim.

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Undoing unseen damage

Carpenter ants, termites and other wood destroying organisms damage nearly \$2.5 billion in property each year. Fortunately, they can be defeated.

Though often undetected and not very susceptible to do-it-yourself treatment, these pests can be destroyed by professionals. Here are signs of a problem:

- Piles of wood splinters; or patches of eggshell-thin paint on baseboards.

- Mud tunnels on the ground near the property.

- Large black or black and red ants in the kitchen, pantry, etc.

- Swarm of winged insects in the house.

- Obvious damage to wooden timbers.

- A distinct, dry rustling sound heard behind walls under very quiet circumstances.

To discourage infestation, never stack wood near the house, keep wood siding and decking from touching the ground, remove any tree stump near your house, rectify any moisture problems that usually attract termites, and be aware of swarms in your neighborhood and if your neighbor had a wood destroying insect problem. The reasoning is that although termites are weak fliers, they can be moved considerable distances by wind currents; and if your neighbor corrects his problem and cuts off their food supply, these insects will soon be foraging for a new food source.

Would I take her back if she were my daughter? You bet I would -- in a minute. When our daughter was 15, she disappeared. For two weeks we didn't know if she was dead or alive. It was the worst ordeal I have ever experienced, worse than the death of my parents. Yes, she was having problems at school and there were problems at home, too, but we never dreamed that she would run away.

After 14 days the phone rang. My heart dropped to my knees. It was our daughter, calling from Covenant House, a home for runaways in New Orleans. She was sorry that she left the way she did. No, she'd had no idea we would be so upset. Yes, she'd like to come back home if we would accept her. I was so thrilled that she was alive I could barely speak.

She is home now -- subdued and well-behaved, but still unable to understand why we were upset. All I could say was, "Wait till you have children of your own." To every runaway I would like to say, "Go back home where you belong. You'd

be surprised how much parents can forgive. Their love is unconditional."

DEAR MOTHER: Thank you for an extremely moving letter. Read on and see what it's like from the eyes of a runaway.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: After reading that letter from "Too Late For Me," I knew I had to write. I was 18 when I got into some trouble at home. My parents were on vacation, and I was afraid to face them so I took off for California because it was warm there and seemed glamorous.

I lived on the streets of Los Angeles, panhandled for change, ate once a day in soup kitchens and lost 35 pounds. I didn't shower for weeks at a time and slept in alleys and abandoned buildings. I'm lucky I wasn't killed.

I'll never forget my 19th birthday. It was the most depressing day of my life. I decided to go home and beg my folks to take me back. It was easier than I thought, and that's where I am now. Thank God. Call me -- Lucky in La Crosse

DEAR LUCKY: Thanks for sharing your experience. Here's another one:

DEAR ANN LANDERS: I was 15 when I decided it would be great to be free of school and the rules laid down by my parents, so I took off for the West Coast.

It was lousy. I was hungry a lot, begged for handouts and was scared of being robbed for small change, beaten up or raped. I was lucky that none of those things happened to me. It was a miracle.

I ran into a girl I knew from home and she must have phoned my family because two days later when I was walking on the street my uncle and aunt pulled up. I started to run when a prostitute grabbed me and said, "Are you crazy, girl? Go with your folks. Do you want to end up like me?" Then she showed me the needle tracks on her arms. I knew she was right and went home to my family.

I'm in college now, working at a part-time job and feeling terrific. I owe my life to that prostitute. -- Luckier Than I Was Smart

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MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

Keeping Your Dollars

There was a time when I preferred playing softball to eating. For several years, I led our fast-pitch team in batting average and RBI's. One of the first lessons I learned as a hitter was to keep my eye on the ball. In the world of fast-pitch softball, if you look away after the pitcher has started his wind-up, you're an easy out.

In the world of small business, the same principle applies. You must stay alert so that you can take your best swing in any situation.

This is especially true in the area of keeping and managing the dollars you've earned. We frequently counsel business owners and managers whose businesses are profitable. However, they often complain that there is never enough cash. The money came in during the month, but now it's gone.

The first step in getting a handle on where the money goes is to examine your expenses. Cost control keeps your

dollars working for you, but it is only one part of a good fiscal management policy.

Financial management is a process that uses the numbers generated by the businesses for making business decisions. These numbers come from accounting records and financial statements. Good recordkeeping is a prerequisite to good financial management.

Keep Your Eye on the Ball

Even if you have good records and financial statements, it is hard to stay alert. Cost control is an especially difficult area for the small business owner.

The most common reason that costs rise is that we relax and look away. We let up in financial management to pay some attention to our marketing program. We take our eye off the costball -- strike one.

Costs have a way of growing unnoticed. Several years ago, I worked as an independent consultant for a small business. The owner was concerned because money was short. The company was growing, but there was very little available cash after the monthly bills were paid.

A close examination of the records showed that several costs had risen for no apparent reason. Janitorial expenses had doubled, supplies had nearly tripled and the telephone bills were out of sight. Within a week, the owner and I chopped nearly \$3,000 from the monthly operating budget.

The expenses had grown unnoticed. The janitorial service company had proposed cleaning more often and the

owner had agreed. It was neither needed nor justified, so we reduced the level of service.

Next, we reduced the use of supplies. The employees pitched in when they realized it was their potential raises they were wasting.

Finally, we analyzed the telephone bills. The owner had been guilty of making lengthy, primetime, long-distance calls. We found ways to cut his telephone time by 80 percent. As a result, he could spend more time solving other problems before they became critical.

Pay What You Owe

Another area with which small businesses struggle is the payment of taxes. My philosophy here is to pay what you owe, but not a penny more. Many business owners are guilty of letting deductions and write-offs slip through their fingers. If you take your eye off the taxball, it's a sure strike two.

Unless you are a CPA or a tax specialist, you need to involve a professional in this area. Don't mess with the IRS. Have someone who is a business tax specialist do your returns.

Get advice early. You cannot always accomplish tax reduction at the end of the year. Careful consideration of purchases, leases and expenditures at the beginning of the year can result in considerable tax savings.

Don't strike out because you took your eye off the financial ball. In the areas of cost control and tax reduction, Ben Franklin was right. A penny saved is a penny earned.

89 YEARS AGO

Limitations gathering steam

A relative handful of angry citizens in three states last fall touched off what has become a grass-roots fire.

While the public gaze was turned to guns and trumpets, the fire has crept largely unnoticed across the land, feeding on the dry tinder of discontent. Some see it today as a cleansing torch, purging the nation's barns of rats; others as an insidious evil, burning down the barns in the process.

For good or ill, it began when the citizens of Oklahoma, California and Colorado voted on their own initiative in last fall's elections to limit the terms of their state legislators. Since then, bills to do likewise are now pending in no fewer than 35 additional states.

That's as of March 1. According to the National Conference of State Legislatures, bills are likely to be introduced in nine of the remaining 12 states during current legislative sessions. That leaves only three, Alabama, North Carolina and Kentucky. And according to Americans to Limit Congressional Terms - the crusaders even have their Washington base - don't count out those three either.

All 50, then. And two major cities, Kansas City, Mo., and San Jose, Calif., brought the issue to the basic forum of government, limiting terms of mayors and city councilmen. San Antonio will vote on a similar measure on May 4.

But the ultimate goal of term-limitation advocates is at the highest forum of government, the U.S. Congress.

"That will take a constitutional amendment, of course," says Timothy Lukes, a political science professor at Santa Clara College in California. "I don't think it stands much of a chance."

So Americans, in their frustration, are going after their local and state legislatures where they can make it happen on their own citizen initiatives. "It's almost a venal response to a feeling that we just ought to punish politicians in general."

Oklahoma limited its legislators to 12 years in office, Colorado to eight. California voters not only limited legislators to eight years (two terms) in the Senate and six (three terms) in the Assembly but also stripped them of nearly 30 percent of their staffs and cut off their pensions.

"They were saying," said Lukes, "that they just don't like these people and think they should suffer."

Just so. Citizen initiatives - sort of do-it-yourself legislation - are themselves a reflection of grass-roots frustration, people throwing up their hands over what they perceive as feckless legislatures. In the last election 67 initiatives sprung up in 43 states, the most since the nation's Progressive Era back in 1914.

Congress is in deep trouble all across the American landscape.

Public approval reached a low point last year when the budgetary fiasco threatened to shut down the federal government, at least briefly. A proposal that gained currency on some radio talk shows was to throw all the rascals out. Every one of 'em. Elect a whole new Congress.

Most registered voters, however, about 75 percent, favored the less drastic remedy of term limitation. The number remains the same in most additional states.

"Term limitation," says Thomas Cronin, a widely published political scientist at Colorado College, "will be the Proposition 13 of the '90s." That was the California property tax initiative in 1978 which spread eastward like blown pollen.

"It will be a hot issue in '92, all right. If I were in the minority party or challenging an incumbent in my own party I'd campaign for term limits. I sympathize with the feelings of the American people thoroughly. Something has to be done."

The limitations most often proposed are for 12-year tenures, two terms for the Senate and six for the House.

Advocates see that as the most obvious and direct way to give challengers a fighting chance against the advantage of incumbents. Simply remove a given number of incumbents and open up their seats.

The Congress would thereby gain a steady infusion of new blood and fresh ideas, the argument goes, and dilute the power of seniority. Wouldn't that bring it closer to the democratic ideal of a citizens' legislature?

The Articles of Confederation limited House terms, but when they wrote the new Constitution the Founding Fathers rejected limitations, the so-called Virginia Plan.

Today's advocates of limits contend that the legislators who would be periodically purged would be, by and large, those who represent entrenched sloth and self-interest, those who have been there so long they have become mud stuck in the good-old-boy swamp.

"Wrapped in its cocoon of lobbyists and administrators," says former Yale political scientist James L. Payne, "Congress cannot conceive of addressing any problem, even its own failures, with anything except more government."

Whoa, now, say opponents. They say term limits would produce just the reverse.


Inexperienced legislators, they insist, are babes in the woods. They are far more susceptible than veterans to the wiles of slick Washington lobbyists and far more dependent on hired professionals who know their way around but are accountable to no constituent voters.

"Is it wise," asks Charles R. Kesler, editor, with William F. Buckley Jr., of "Keeping the Tables: Modern American Conservative Thought." He says the answer plainly is no.

"What is needed," he says, "is not a gimmick to stir up political competition" but simply a good reason to vote for change. If people want to vote incumbents out of office "they can do so with the flick of a lever."





Hints from Heloise

Q. I have to wear a tie every day. It seems that no matter how hard I try, I still need to replace them continually. Any hints on how to make them last longer? — Mike R., Flagstaff, Ariz.

A. Here are a few quick hints:

- Always undo the tie before removing it. Just sliding the knot or leaving it tied can cause it to lose its shape.
- Be careful when applying cologne; it can cause the color to fade.
- Hanging ties up can keep them from wrinkling badly.
- If you must press a tie, don't press the face. It can cause it to become shiny, so press it from the back.
- If you do get a stain on your tie, blot the stain and let it dry. Putting water or club soda on it could leave a water spot, especially if the tie is silk.

Find a good dry cleaner. It can be your tie's best friend. Tell them where the stain is and what it is; it increases the chances of removing it.

Ties can be so expensive that making them last as long as possible is just good business sense. — Heloise

FABRIC GLUE

Q. I used two-sided iron-on interfacing to hem my daughter's dresses. Now that she's taller, I need to lengthen them.

When I pulled the material apart and removed the interfacing I was left with the residue from the glue. Any suggestions on how I can remove this? — Mrs. Mark Jones, Metairie, La.

A. Try spraying it with a petroleum-based pre-wash spray. Rub until the glue disappears then wash and dry as usual. You'll be ready to re-hem and get that extra wear. — Heloise

Dear Heloise: For years I have just about worn out my arm scrubbing the rubber safety mat from the bathtub. Here's a fantastic way to get the job done!

'Reason for Living' is family's story

Jill Clayburgh lands role in family drama

Reason for Living: The Jill Ireland Story is not about the actress, says Jill Clayburgh. The TV movie, airing Monday, May 20, on NBC and starring Clayburgh in the title role, is about families.

Actress Jill Ireland made 35 films in her long career. Almost one year ago to date, she died of breast cancer. But before her death, the actress penned two novels: *Life Wish*, chronicling her battle with cancer, and *Life Lines*, depicting her adopted son's heroin addiction, overdose and death.

Reason for Living is based on *Life Lines* and Ireland's determination to help her son beat the monkey off his back.

"I think she felt strongly about what she learned from having dealt with her cancer," said Clayburgh of Ireland. "She felt she could help her son deal with his flirtation with death. She felt she knew something about death, and, therefore, she had a way to communicate with him."

The film is really about what you do and where you turn when you have tried everything you can think of to help a loved one. "It's not about her as a celebrity or as an actress," said Clayburgh. "It's a very passionate story about a woman and her feelings for her family, her children, her parents, her own life and her own mortality. People might turn it on because it's Jill Ireland, but I think the book's success is because of its originality. It's not a self-serving book about 'how great I am' and 'how wonderful I am.' It's a pretty soul-searching look."

Originally, Ireland had planned to play herself in the telefilm. She is, in fact, executive producer of the production. When she realized it would be impossible to do so, she made a list of those actresses who she would want to see in her role. Clayburgh, nominated twice for an Oscar (*An Unmarried Woman, Starting Over*) and once for an Emmy (*Hustling*), made the list and won the part.

Ireland's husband, Charles Bronson, reportedly hasn't read either of his wife's books and was opposed to the making of *Reason for Living*. His role will be played by Lance Henriksen (*Aliens*). "It's something that she jokes about in her book and, in fact, the movie," said Clayburgh, noting it was her understanding that things had been worked out with Bronson.

Clayburgh has never met Bronson or Ireland. The materials she used to prepare for her role were Ireland's books, tapes she had made with the show's producers and TV interviews. It is the second real-person role she has played. In 1976 she played Carole Lombard in the biographical film *Gable and Lombard*. Such a role demands certain responsibilities, but she looks at it as a challenge.

"I think that the film is about her very human struggle to find an answer, and then to have to try something else," concluded Clayburgh, herself the mother of three. "Parents feel so helpless when these things happen and so inadequate and sort of that feeling that 'Anybody could do it (parenting) better than I could.' I hope that you walk away seeing that nobody does it all that well, but everybody does it as well as they can, and that's sort of all you can ask of yourself." © TV Listing Inc.

Special recognizes quality filmmaking career

Kirk Douglas is recognized for his contributions to filmmaking on *The American Film Institute Salutes Kirk Douglas*, airing Thursday, May 23, on CBS.

"We have criteria that is for someone whose work has advanced the art of film and whose work has withstood the test of time," said the show's producer George Stevens Jr. "Over 45 years Kirk Douglas has made 79 movies. A number of them are classics."

The actor was born Issur Danielovitch (later changed to Isidore Demsky) on Dec. 9, 1916, in Amsterdam, N.Y. He wrestled professionally to support his studies at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts. Douglas made his Broadway debut in 1941, but World War II delayed his film debut until 1946, when he starred in *The Strange Love of Martha Ivers*. Three years later he emerged as a top-notch star with his role in *Champion*.

In the 1950s, Douglas formed his own production company, which turned out quality movies such as *Paths of Glory*, *Spartacus* and *Lonely Are the Brave*. Still playing leading men in the 1970s, he began directing his films as well.

Following closely in Douglas' footsteps is his son Michael Douglas, who serves as host for the AFI salute. The father-son celebration made for a personal evening, Stevens said.

"Kirk was seated with his wife and his other three sons and his grandson, and so there was an element of generations to the evening," Stevens added.

Stevens' own involvement with the AFI spans generations. The son of director George Stevens (*Giant*), the producer of the *AFI Salute* has had a lifelong fascination with filmmaking.

"I have a custodial instinct about preserving films and the history of motion pictures," Stevens said. "And when you look back over the 19 years of producing this program, starting with John Ford, Jimmy Cagney, Orson Welles, Bette Davis, Henry Fonda and Fred Astaire and on and on, those 19 videotapes contain a significant part of the history of American filmmaking."

Donna Pescow's career is swinging from a star as she successfully takes on the role of a single mother raising her extraterrestrial teenage daughter in *Out of This World*.

After gaining back the Brooklyn accent she had worked so hard to lose and auditioning for two different directors, Pescow got the part. She was voted one of the top three supporting actresses by the New York Film Critics Circle in 1977 for her performance, and Hollywood's interest in her grew. She co-starred in telefilms and then met with Garry (*Happy Days*) Marshall, who cast her for the series *Angie*.

After *Angie* was canceled, Pescow appeared in popular television series, telefilms and miniseries. She also appeared on stage in starring roles in *Guys and Dolls*, *Isn't It Romantic* and *A My Name Is Alice* before going on to star in *Out of This World*, seen in syndication.

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Jean Smart and Peter Coyote co-star in the thriller *A Seduction in Travis County*, Sunday on CBS.

Q: I understand that only the important topics get put in your column and, of course, I hope mine is one of them. I would like some information on Red Skelton: where he lives, age, marriage, if he is still performing, etc. And where can I write him? —Betty Bowden, Marion, Tenn.

A: Richard "Red" Skelton was born July 18, 1910, in Vincennes, Ind. A brilliant comic and composer, he is semi-retired but still performs in clubs and theaters across the country. He made his screen debut in 1939 in *Having a Wonderful Time*. Having been successful in films and on television, he is also an unusually talented artist whose paintings consist largely of clowns and Samurai warriors. Red lost his 9-year-old son, Richard, in 1958 to leukemia. He and his wife reside in a desert home in Palm Springs, Calif. This is the latest address I have for him: 37-801 Thompson Rd., Rancho Mirage, CA 92270.

Q: I can't find in any video store anywhere *The Stolen Hours* with Susan Hayward. It was made in 1963 or '64. Also, if I remember right she died in real life the same as in this tear-jerker movie. No one out here has seen it or ever heard of it. I know there was such a movie 'cause I saw it! Can you help me? —Linda Willdean, Big Spring, Texas

A: Linda, you stand your ground! Of course there was such a movie. Released in 1963, it didn't fare as well as the original (*Dark Victory*) starring Bette Davis. Starring in the remake with Susan Hayward were Michael Craig, Diane Baker and Edward Judd. Hayward died of a brain tumor in 1975.

Q: While listening to some old Nelson Eddy and Jeanette MacDonald movies recently, I wondered what has happened to Nelson Eddy. I saw and heard him in person at a concert in the early '50s but haven't seen or heard much since. I would really appreciate knowing what has happened to him. —Virginia Hawkins, Burley, Idaho

A: Nelson Eddy died in 1967. His films are occasionally shown on TV, and some of the classics in which he starred opposite MacDonald are on videocassette.

Q: What can you tell me about Richard Widmark? I lived in Henry, Ill., back in the 1950s. I recently read that he came back to Henry to see his

old schoolteacher and that he was born there. I would love to know more about him. This would also settle a dispute between me and some of my friends. —Mrs. Walter Kutchma, Kewanee, Ill.

A: Every biography I have on Richard Widmark says he was born in Sunrise, Minn., on Dec. 26, 1914. He has been married since 1942 to the former Jean Hazlewood. He was educated at Lake Forest College in Lake Forest, Ill., where he later taught. He made his film debut in 1947 as a villain in *Kiss of Death*, winning an Oscar nomination as best supporting actor. Widmark rarely performs today. "Nowadays I work once a year, and I like to enjoy it if I can," he says. The Widmarks have one daughter, Anne, born in 1945. They have homes in Roxbury, Conn., and Santa Barbara, Calif.

Q: Why can't I find tapes of Deanna Durbin and Sonja Henie films? —Emily Right, DeLand, Fla.

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



Golfers head to Texas to play at Colonial

Defending champion Ben Crenshaw will be taking on a field that includes nine former tournament champions this week when CBS Sports goes to Fort Worth, Texas, for third- and final-round coverage of the Southwestern Bell Colonial Golf Tournament.

Pat Summerall, Ken Venturi, Ben Wright and Gary McCord will bring live stroke-by-stroke coverage Saturday and Sunday, May 25 and 26, from Colonial Country Club, where Crenshaw shot an 8-under-par 272 last year to win his second Colonial title. The former University of Texas All-American also captured the 1977 championship when he posted an identical four-round total of 272.

The course at Colonial is legendary, with a special state-wide panel of experts recently selecting it as the best of the state's 648 courses for the third consecutive year. Colonial's par 4 fifth hole is the "most famous hole in Texas" and is rated as one of the top 18 holes in the United States.

Other former champions going after the \$216,000 winner's share of the \$1.2 million purse include Ian Baker-Finch (1989), Lanny Wadkins (1988), Keith Clearwater (1987), Dan Pohl (1986), Corey Pavin (1985), Peter Jacobsen (1984), Bruce Lietke (1980), Rod Carl (1974) and Dave Stockton (1967). The rest of the field includes such top names as Mark Calcavecchia, Tom Kite, Curtis Strange, Ray Floyd, Larry Mize and Scott Verplank.

Michael Keaton is Artie Lewis - a cop who is all things to all people. He's funny, intimidating, sympathetic, endearing. He's the best husband, lover, friend, partner, and father you could wish for. So, what's wrong? Why isn't *One Good Cop* one gosh darn good film? Well, for one, there's the script. Then, there's the direction. There is also a body count that's a little hard to believe. Latin dope-dealers, the movie's road-company, campy, caricature, comic players that look as if they needed balloons over their heads with dialogue in them. When Stevie, Artie's best friend and partner, is killed, Artie and his wife Rita, become temporary parents to Stevie's three adorable orphaned children. Now, Artie-The-Good becomes Artie-The-Father and Artie-The-Avenger. In his new role as Defender of the Faith, he is faced with so many unsurmountable problems that he finds himself straddling a fine line between his

ethical code and surrendering to the corrupt ways of the street to solve his problems.

Heywood Gould, who wrote the original screenplay, makes his 1942 version of this famous directorial debut with this film - and Rudyard Kipling tale. It shows. THE SHELTERING SKY: (1980) Starring Debra Winger and John Malkovich. If ever an "art film" was made for video, this is the one. The leisurely pace of *The Sheltering Sky* somehow is more acceptable on video. However, the sweeping grandeur of the desert of North Africa shrinks proportionally with the screen.

The film is Bernardo Bertolucci's (*The Last Emperor*) adaptation of Paul Bowles' classic, cult-favorite (semi-autobiographical) love story. Paul Bowles is an American composer, existentialist poet and novelist who, with his wife Jane, moved to Northern Africa in the '40s.

Filmed on location in the desert of North Africa, the film examines the disintegrating relationship between a married American couple who are lifelong travelers. Accompanied by a socialite friend, they journey to Tangier and the Sahara, where the ancient desert cultures transform the trio profoundly.

Debra Winger is Kit Moresby, a woman searching to rekindle the consuming love she and her husband once shared. John Malkovich is the strange and unresponsive husband; a once-promising composer whose career is now stalled. George Turner (Campbell Scott) is their friend - a man who aimlessly searches for amusement.

The real star, though, is the ancient culture of the desert, which inexorably transforms the three travelers under the spellbinding heat and light of the sheltering sky. This is a totally character-driven film, and the plot moves with such an excruciatingly slow pace that you will want to abandon it more than once. But, if you will be patient, not expect too much action, and remember that much of what is happening is from Paul and Jane Bowles' own life-experiences (he still lives in North Africa, Jane is now dead), you will be rewarded with a thought-piece held together with literate dialogue and brought to (semi) life by superb acting. Rated R for mature themes. Not for everyone, but still a good film for the thoughtful.
