## County will negotiate legal fees

A settlement will be negotiated on plaintiff's legal fees to close the book on the Gamez vs. Deaf Smith County lawsuit over redistricting of commissioner precincts.

During a meeting Monday, county commissioners authorized Judge Tom Simons to negotiate with the attorney, Rolando Rios of San Antonio. The county is obligated to pay legal fees as a result of a settlement approved by a U.S. District Court judge panel.

Commissioners authorized expenditure up to \$13,000 to settle the attorney fee issue.

The San Antonio attorney represented Trini Gamez in the lawsuit challenging the primary election for commissioner for Precinct 1 after the U.S. Justice Department denied preclearance of the boundaries.

Incumbent John Stribling won the Democratic primary election over Tony Castillo in March. The negotiated settlement of the lawsuit resulted in that election being declared void.

New primaries were held Sept. 19, with Stribling running on the Republican ticket and Castillo as a Democrat. Their face-off for the commissioner's position is on the ballot for next Tuesday's general election.

The county's cost in the redistricting process, mandated by federal law, started with a contract with an Austin law firm, Allison and Associates, to draw the lines and submit the boundaries to the Justice Department.

A fee of \$12,500 was charged by the law firm for the contract.

However, the contract did not cover litigation or expense incurred after preclearance was not obtained.

County Treasurer Vesta Mae Nunley said bills totaling \$4,391 have been paid to the Austin firm since the lawsuit was filed.

"We're current with all their bills, but I don't know if they've billed out everything," said the treasurer.

In September, the Justice Department approved the boundary lines negotiated to settle the lawsuit.

Commissioners spent about 20 minutes in executive session before returning to open meeting to adopt (See COUNTY, Page 2)

## Hispanic leaders say votes should go to Democrats

Hispanic leaders from South and West Texas campaigned for local, state and national candidates during a stop on a four-day bus tour here Saturday.

Sponsored by the local chapter of Mexican American Democrats of Texas, the local stop included an address by State Sen. Eddie Lucio of Brownsville.

"I think Hispanics are going to make the difference in this election," Lucio said. "I think Hispanics will make the difference for Gov. Clinton, Lena Guerrero and others in this election."

Lucio said Guerrero was overcoming the negative part of the campaign. Guerrero resigned her post as chairman of the Railroad Commission after she admitted she was not a graduate of the University of Texas at Austin. That claim had been made in her campaign material and had been asserted by Ms. Guerrero. Since

then, she has made charges against her GOP opponent.

"I believe she has made all of the apology she needs to make," said the state senator. "She acknowledged a mistake and apologized for it. She is ready to move on. She has also shown the shortcomings of her opponent. I think she has a very legitimate chance at election."

Lucio said the Democratic ticket of Bill Clinton and Al Gore was running strong in the state.

"These people here today are 'Bushed,'" he said. "We can't stand any more trickle-down economics because it never did trickle. I think Gov. Clinton has a program of change that will work for all of us."

About 150 persons attended the breakfast rally, according to Bernie Griego, chairman of MAD in Hereford. Lucio said the crowd was the largest breakfast rally of the four mornings on the tour.

## Bush 'amazed' by allegations

DALLAS (AP) - President Bush today expressed amazement at Ross Perot's report of a Republican plot to disrupt his daughter's wedding, and denied that there was any truth in it. He said Perot's massive spending of his own money in the campaign was "a little bizarre... strange, strange."

Perot in recent days had described his suspicions that the Bush campaign was preparing to smear his daughter's reputation and disrupt her wedding. He said he accepted the GOP denial, but did not rescind his charges.

Bush was asked on NBC's "Today" show today if he agreed with spokesman, who ridiculed Perot as a "crazy man."

"I agree this recent incident is crazy and the allegation that we would wittingly or in any other way try to break up a man's daughter's wedding... what in the world would

be the reason for that," Bush responded.

Perot first made his allegations to the Boston Herald and on "Sixty Minutes," and then repeated them Monday at a surprise appearance at a daily news briefing where he said he wanted to "get a few things straight" concerning why he shelved his campaign in July.

The Dallas billionaire expressed suspicions that Republican campaign operatives planned to embarrass his daughter with a fake photo and later considered tapping telephone lines used by his computers.

In the interview this morning, Bush said of Perot: "To his credit, he has accepted the fact that it didn't happen," Bush said. But he noted twice that Perot had done that only

## Aikman students favor president in mock elections

President Bush was re-elected by a narrow margin, defeating Bill Clinton on Monday.

Ross Perot didn't fare too well in the mock election conducted by students at Aikman Primary School. Bush edged Clinton, 196-166; Perot was a distant third with 46 votes.

Aikman students went through the whole election process on Monday. They had to register to vote, then their names were checked off on the voter registration list. The young voters picked up a special ballot that had the names and pictures of the candidates, then went into scaled down versions of actual voting booths to make their choice, and put their ballots into boxes. Students, aided by teachers, then counted the ballots.

The mock election was held so the young students (Kindergarten through third grade) could participate in an election just like their parents. The school is also one of the polling places that will be used next Tuesday for the general election.

## Cattle feeders celebrate 25th anniversary

Hundreds of area civic leaders and government officials joined cattlemen, bankers and persons from affiliated industries at the kickoff of the 25th Anniversary convention of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association in Amarillo's Civic Center.

Sunday's events began with an overview of TCFA using live actors and video. Much of the presentation was filmed at Bar G Feedyard southwest of Hereford. The presentation traced the history of TCFA from its roots in 1967, as the cattle feeding industry was beginning to blossom here, through the price freeze, boycott and crash of 1973 to today's market. Kevin Knapp of Amarillo sang two songs he wrote for TCFA.

A large part of the presentation was devoted to expressing the impact of the cattle feeding industry on the region. Over 5 million head of cattle are fed in the area, with well over 1 million head fed within a 50-mile radius of Hereford. That translates into a huge impact on every single person that lives in the area.

The presentation also focused on the leadership role TCFA has played in the industry. The beef checkoff was an idea that sprang from TCFA in response to problems in 1973. It didn't pass through the whole industry until 1988, but now is being used to fund advertising, education and other efforts. TCFA has also been a leader in developing environment, management and marketing information that has been the template for the rest of the industry.

TCFA members from Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico are in Amarillo attending convention activities through tonight.

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**TORONTO** - Canadians overwhelmingly reject a constitutional reform package that would have cooled Quebec secessionist passions and given wider powers to the provinces and Canada's natives. The rejection will shelve efforts to change the system for the immediate future but could revive separatist aspirations in Quebec.

**WASHINGTON** - After six quarters of sputtering growth, the economy finally is climbing back to production peaks reached before it plunged into recession more than two years ago.

**DALLAS** - Ross Perot turned his back on his issues-oriented approach to campaigning, spinning a web of accusations of Republican dirty tricks that he said drove him from the race last summer. **WASHINGTON** - Former and current Bush administration officials say they won't be able to testify before Congress on a politically sensitive issue: exports of advanced U.S. technology to Iraq prior to the Gulf War.

**NEW ORLEANS** - Four-year-old Eric Boyd died the way so many tenants of the St. Thomas Housing Project die each year - from a bullet wound.

**BOSTON** - The barbarians have crashed the gate at Bartlett's Familiar Quotations. Dirty Harry's "Go ahead, make my day" and the Cookie Monster's "Me want cookie" are among the pop culture quotes included in Bartlett's 16th edition along with wise sayings from the Bible, dead poets, philosophers and statesmen.

## Chiles may be a hot crop

**LUBBOCK** -- A potentially "hot" alternate crop for High Plains cotton growers, the chile pepper, will be explained in detail during a workshop here Thursday at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center.

Farmers' heightened interest in growing chiles--or non-bell-peppers is related to the increased demand and higher prices being offered for the crop, explained Dr. Roland E. Roberts, vegetable specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The workshop will be from 8:30 a.m. until 4 p.m. The \$10 registration fee includes lunch and workshop materials. The center is just north of Lubbock International Airport on FM

1294 at the Shallowater exit of Interstate 27.

"Many cotton farmers are interested in growing chile peppers to diversify, but have never grown peppers," he said. "They want to learn chile management from seed through harvest, processing and marketing as members of a grower-owned, professionally managed cooperative." Oct. 8, 45 farmers met in Slaton to discuss such a cooperative.

"Our goal with this workshop is to present information on peppers that will equip the farmers to profit from producing and marketing chile peppers," Roberts said.

A multitude of food and commercial uses for different types of chiles

has pushed the demand beyond the capacity of traditional growing areas in New Mexico, Roberts said. Cayenne peppers are in strong demand by processors in Louisiana. Jalapenos are used in picante sauce. Paprika and red chile are used for red, yellow and orange pigment in food and clothing, and in seasoning food.

"As with any alternative crop, the non-bell or chile type pepper may offer a limited opportunity for some people who have irrigation and can adjust their farming methods to this intensively grown crop," the Extension Service vegetable specialist said. "Farmers must study marketing opportunities, too. A cooperative may offer some help in this area."

As for Perot's spending of perhaps \$75 million of his own funds on the campaign, Bush said: "I find it a little bizarre."

On Monday night, Perot telecast a new half-hour campaign commercial in which he dispensed advice for running a business. The ad, which was finished just a few hours before being broadcast, emphasized Perot's status as a non-politician but stayed away from his dirty-tricks suspicions.

Perot also launched a new series of 30-second and 60-second commercials in which he personally delivers arguments against the "wasted vote" notion that often vexes longshot candidates.

Perot on Monday said he withdrew from the race after key Republican

sources, whom he has declined to name, separately informed him of the plan to disrupt his daughter Carolyn's wedding in August.

"I decided it was a risk I should not take, could not take, did not have to take," Perot said. "I adore her. And I would not risk ruining one of the most important days of her life, and I didn't."

Perot also charged that Republican operatives tried to wiretap his Dallas office. But an FBI "sting" operation against Texas Bush-Quayle chairman Jim Oberwetter turned up nothing. Oberwetter says he sent packing the undercover agent who offered to sell him, for \$2,500, a purported audio tape and documents from Perot's office.

Oberwetter said he told President Bush about that incident, and Bush assured him he would review the FBI's conduct after the election.

FBI Director William Sessions said the wiretap allegation "was investigated and no evidence of criminality was found."

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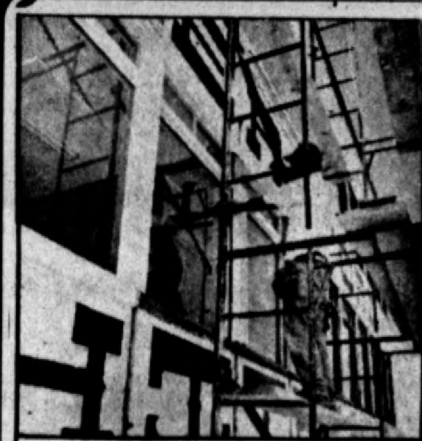

The Hereford volleyball team clinched a trip to the playoffs with a 15-6, 15-9 win over Borger Saturday in Whiteface Gymnasium.

The win gave Hereford a record of 7-2 in District 1-4A (17-9 overall) and dropped the Lady Bulldogs to 5-4. A win for Borger would have forced a playoff between the two for the second playoff spot.

Hereford has one regular season game left at 6:30 Thursday in Pampa. It was moved from Tuesday because of the TAAS testing going on at HHS.

"I don't think it's hit yet," Erin Bullard said of the Lady Whitefaces making the playoffs. "It won't until after Pampa."

"I don't think I'll realize it until we start warming up against Lamesa," Jill Robinson said.

Lamesa is Hereford's probable first round opponent. The match is tentatively scheduled for Tuesday at Coronado High School in Lubbock.

Hereford will face either Lamesa or Snyder, whichever ends up as the first seed out of District 2-4A. Lamesa leads District 2-4A at 5-0, but Snyder is one game behind at 4-1. They play Thursday, and if Lamesa wins, Hereford plays Lamesa in the first round. If Snyder wins, the two will have a playoff Saturday, and Hereford will get the winner.

Against Borger, Hereford fell behind 6-2 in both games but came back to win going away. Hereford coach Brenda Reeh said Borger may have felt the pressure of a big game.

"We just approached the match from the standpoint that it would be better for us if we beat them," Reeh said. "The pressure was on Borger. Borger was in a definite must-win

situation. "We talked about how we wanted to whoop it up when something good happened. We wanted to win the warm-up--anything that would make

Borger feel the pressure a little more." Reeh said she thought it worked. "They missed five or six serves which is uncharacteristic of Borger,"

she said. "They're usually a very strong serving team."

Reeh said the Herd made very few mistakes: only two service errors and only two service reception errors. The defense of Angie Jowell and Jessica Evers was good: Jowell had 12 serves passed to setter and nine digs, and Evers had 11 digs and seven serves passed to setter.

Bullard led the team with six kills and two stiffs, several of which came in a run that gave Hereford the lead in the first game. Jowell and Robinson each added five kills.

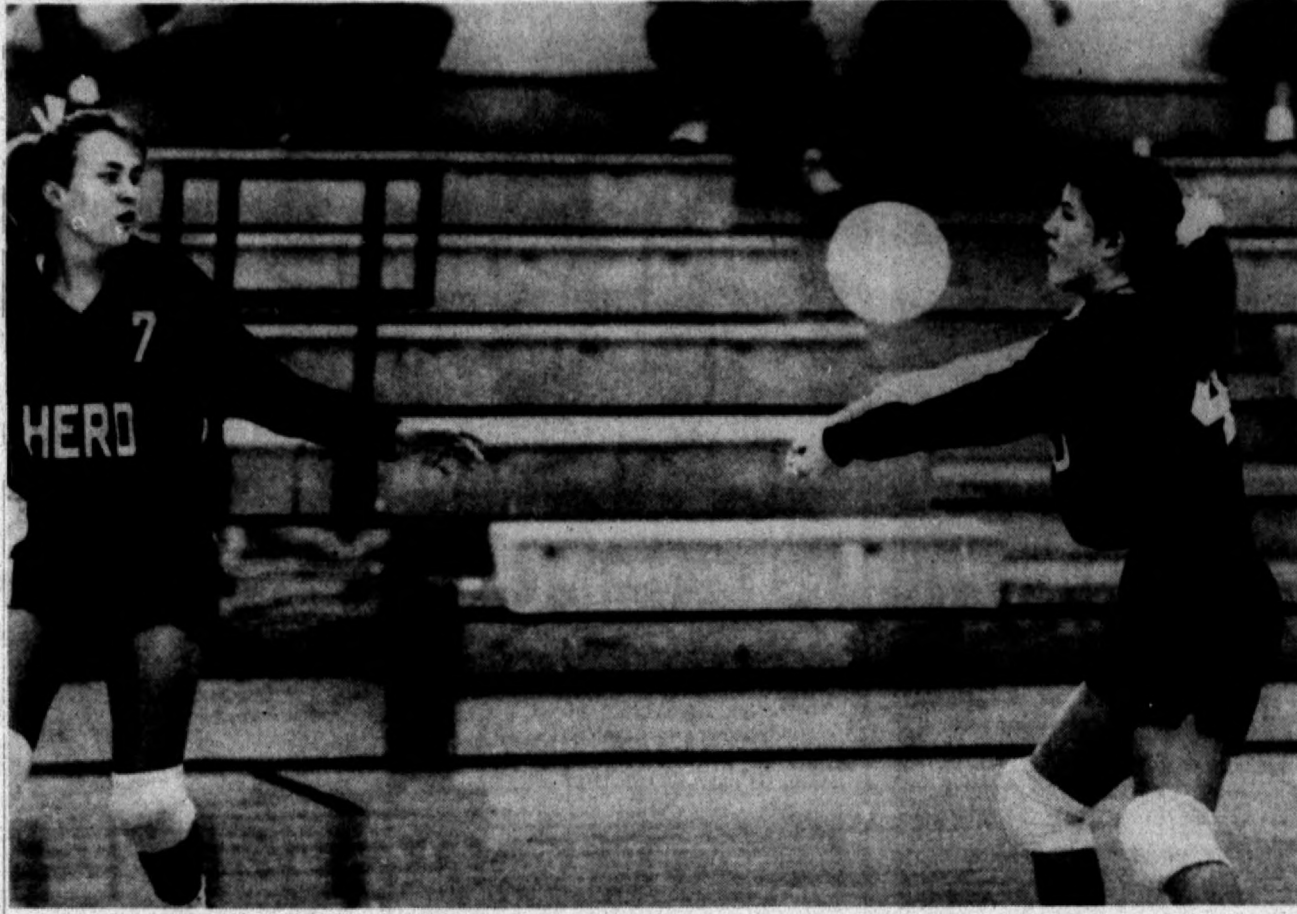
"I'm proud of this bunch of kids

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# Jets gave Kelly too much time

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — The Buffalo Bills actually were rooting for the New York Jets to score. It was all about time.

The Jets obliged, taking a 20-17 lead but leaving 1:50 on the clock. That was enough, as it always is when these teams meet, for Buffalo to rally.

"If they were going to score, I'm glad they scored on the first time," Jim Kelly said after leading the Bills 75 yards in seven plays in the final 1:50 to the winning touchdown and a 24-20 victory Monday night. "We didn't have to waste our timeouts. Overall, everybody stuck in there."

And the Bills stuck it in the end zone on a play Kelly basically made up at the 12-yard line.

"I don't even think we have that in the playbook," the AFC's leading passer said of his touchdown pass over the middle to Thurman Thomas with 51 seconds to go.

"In the five years I've been here," added Thomas, who also rushed for 142 yards, "he's read it right every time."

In the last five years, the Bills have read the Jets just right. They've won 10 in a row against New York, which also has fallen six straight times on Monday night, three times to Buffalo.

"I know they were lucky to get out of here alive," Jets tackle Irv Eatman said. "We kicked their butts, but we didn't get more points than they did."

They came close, thanks to a 77-yard drive to Brad Baxter's 1-yard TD run for the lead. Ken O'Brien replaced injured starter Browning Nagle (shoulder, arch) and took the Jets the final 55 yards. Rob Moore dropped a long pass in the end zone on which James Williams was flagged for interference just before Baxter scored.

"I didn't think they would get any points there, especially after we sacked Kelly on the first play," Jets safety Lonnie Young said about the winning drive. "We're pros, like everybody else, and we've got to make the plays."

"There are all kinds of great quarterbacks and wide receivers, and we see them each week. He took their team and marched them down the field and put points on the board and we came out losers again."

For the sixth time in seven games this season, the Bills, meanwhile, snapped a two-game slide in which their muddled no-huddle scored just 13 points. They are 5-2.

The Bills, losers of two in a row after a 4-0 start, didn't get going offensively until the second quarter. Cary Blanchard's 42-yard field goal gave New York a 3-0 lead after one period.

Ken Davis dived in from the 2 for Buffalo's first touchdown 54 seconds into the second quarter. Blanchard made a 40-yarder, but the Bills took a 14-6 halftime lead with a 62-yard drive in 43 seconds. James Lofton scored on a 16-yard pass from Kelly with 18 seconds to go in the half.

"This type of victory is a big boost for us," Thomas said. "No matter what the circumstances, the Jets will play us tough. But we've got a lot of character."

Which they showed by scoring immediately after all but one of New York's scores. In the third period, the Jets went 84 yards in 10 plays and Pat Chaffey ran in from the 1, making it 14-13. The Bills came back with Steve Christie's 33-yard field goal.

Then the Jets took the lead, only to leave too much time for Kelly and his arsenal.

# Rangers hire manager

ARLINGTON (AP) — Kevin Kennedy knows the Texas Rangers are a power team. He also wants them to learn to run the bases and play defense.

"I'm aware there is a lot of talent on the team, but you can have power and still make things happen on the basepaths," Kennedy said. "And I will stress fundamentals from day one in spring training."

Kennedy, bench coach of the Montreal Expos, on Monday was given two years to do what 12 managers ahead of him have never done: get the Rangers into the playoffs.

"I think being No. 13 is a good omen," Kennedy said. "I'm about winning. I expect to win."

Kennedy of Tarzana, Calif., succeeded Toby Harrah, who was 32-44 after replacing the fired Bobby Valentine in July.

Harrah was offered another job in the Rangers organization but general manager Tom Grieve said Harrah has yet to say whether he will stay with the club.

Kennedy immediately went to work on assembling a staff. Texas pitching coach Tom House could be on his way out with Claude Osteen, who has worked with Kennedy, as his replacement.

"That's the task at hand right now," Kennedy said. "I need to get a staff together."

Grieve said Kennedy won't be given time to rebuild.

"Our goal is to win the American League championship," Grieve said. "It's important to me to win next year."

Kennedy was a successful minor league manager in the Los Angeles Dodgers organization, posting a 534-373 record in eight years from 1984 to 1991. Kennedy was a catcher in minor league baseball at the Triple-A level.

"I've been in the game 18 years and I haven't felt like a rookie since 1976," Kennedy said. "There's no question I'm prepared for this opportunity. I've served my apprenticeship. There was nothing left to do in the minors."

He becomes the eighth current major league manager with a catching background, joining Rene Lachemann, Gene Lamont, Jim Leyland, Johnny Oates, Buck Rodgers, Jeff Torborg and Joe Torre.

# Cowboys' Smith proves '91 no fluke

IRVING (AP) — Emmitt Smith is proving 1991 was no fluke.

Smith is run, run, running ahead of last year's totals when he led the NFL in rushing.

Smith scored three touchdowns and rushed for 152 yards on 29 carries, both season highs, in the Dallas Cowboys' 28-13 victory over the Los Angeles Raiders.

Smith has rushed 170 times for

733 yards and nine touchdowns. Last year at this time, Smith had carried 147 times for 701 yards and five touchdowns.

In training camp, Smith said his goal was 2,000 yards.

"I've got to average 125 yards per game and with the offensive line I have I think I can do it," Smith said. "My offensive line is vastly underrated. None of them have made

any of the All-Pro teams but they are good."

Smith said he had giant holes to run through against the Raiders.

"This was not my best day, but it will do," Smith said. "These were the biggest holes I've had to run through all year. We were able to mix the run and pass well and when we do that I can be more effective."

Smith shook off a blow to his back during the game to get more action.

"I was ready to let Emmitt rest awhile but the next thing I knew he was tugging on my shirt wanting to get back in there," said Dallas coach Jimmy Johnson. "If Emmitt says he's ready, I'm going with him."

On one touchdown run, Smith took a vicious hit from linebacker Riki Ellison, regained his balance, and scored on an amazing 4-yard touchdown run.

"I just saw a blur," Smith said. "He was flying in the air at eye level but I kept my balance and held the

ball over the goal line to score."

It was Smith's sixth consecutive 100 yard game on grass.

"I like grass," Smith said. "I'm able to cut more sharply on it. I can change directions quicker."

In 39 NFL games, Smith has rushed for 100 yards or more on 14 occasions. Dallas is 21-0 when Smith carries the ball 20 times or more.

"Emmitt is so tough," said Dallas quarterback Troy Aikman. "He always gets extra yards after he is hit."

But there's still something Smith has never done — gain 100 yards against Philadelphia. Smith gets his chance again on Sunday in Texas Stadium at 3 p.m.

Smith gained 67 yards against the Eagles earlier this year. His best day ever against them was 75 yards on 25 carries Dec. 15.

"It's always a challenge to go against the Eagles defense," Smith said. "They pursue real well."

# Bonds, McGwire, Sierra among new free agents

NEW YORK (AP) — Barry Bonds, Mark McGwire and Ruben Sierra are free, and Toronto told World Series hero Dave Winfield he can be, too.

Greg Maddux, Doug Drabek, Wade Boggs, Benito Santiago, John Smiley and Chris Bosio were among the 26 players to file for free agency Monday as baseball's business season began. There are 166 players potentially eligible to file by the Nov. 8 deadline.

Just 90 minutes after a triumphant parade through the streets of Toronto and rally inside the SkyDome, the Blue Jays said they wouldn't offer salary arbitration to Winfield and Candy Maldonado and declined to exercise 1993 options on pitchers Dave Stieb and Mark Eichhorn. That allows them to file for free agency, an early indication that teams will take a more bottom-line approach to negotiations this winter.

"It's a tough thing to do an hour-and-a-half after celebrating with 50,000 people," Blue Jays general manager Pat Gillick said. "It's not

very pleasant, I'll tell you."

Toronto wants its players back, but at lower prices. Winfield, following a 26-homer, 108-RBI season, could have possibly doubled his \$2.3 million salary in arbitration, and Maldonado, after hitting 20 homers, could have gotten a large raise from his income of \$1,375,000.

Bonds, who is unlikely to re-sign with Pittsburgh, put his house in Coraopolis, Pa., up for sale on Monday.

Several teams didn't wait until Thursday's deadline to offer salary arbitration to 35 potential free agents, players covered by the restriction against repeat free agency within five years. Among the players whom teams declined to arbitrate were Willie Randolph, Kevin Bass and Barry Jones of the New York Mets and Edwin Nunez of Texas. In addition, Baltimore said it would not exercise its \$600,000 option on pitcher Mike Flanagan.

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

America's First Woman Warrior

The first time she squandered her money in a tavern and failed to report for duty the next day. A few weeks later she joined the 4th Massachusetts Regiment under the name of Robert Shurtliff. While serving on the front lines Deborah was shot in the thigh. She removed the musket ball herself for fear of having her identity discovered. After being dispatched to Philadelphia to put down the soldiers riot, Deborah contracts a fever. A physician discovers Deborah's secret but remains discreet. While at the hospital a rich young girl fell in love with Deborah and showered her with gifts before Deborah explained why the romance could advance no further. After a few more years of service and many more adventures Deborah became the first woman in U.S. History to receive a soldiers pension.

## Headache facts, fallacies

Migraine headaches still attack and bedevil millions of Americans.

Federal health statistics indicate that about 11 million Americans suffer from this condition. The cause of migraine headaches is not known. No cure is available either, although significant symptom relief can be achieved with pain-relieving drugs.

A migraine headache can continue from several hours up to several days--even the better part of a week. Recently a unique, new metered-dose nasal spray form of a pain reliever was introduced containing butorphanol tartrate, available by prescription only. The usual recommended dosage for initial administration is one spray in one nostril. A second dose may be repeated in one hour if needed. Onset of pain relief begins within 15 minutes and the duration of pain relief experienced is approximately four to five hours.

Eighty percent of all migraine sufferers are women. Migraine headaches also tend to run in families. The intense pain of a migraine attack tends to be focused in a particular area, usually on one side of the head.

Bottled mineral water consumption in Mexico has shown annual growth of approximately 10 percent between 1987 and 1990, the most recent year for which figures are available.

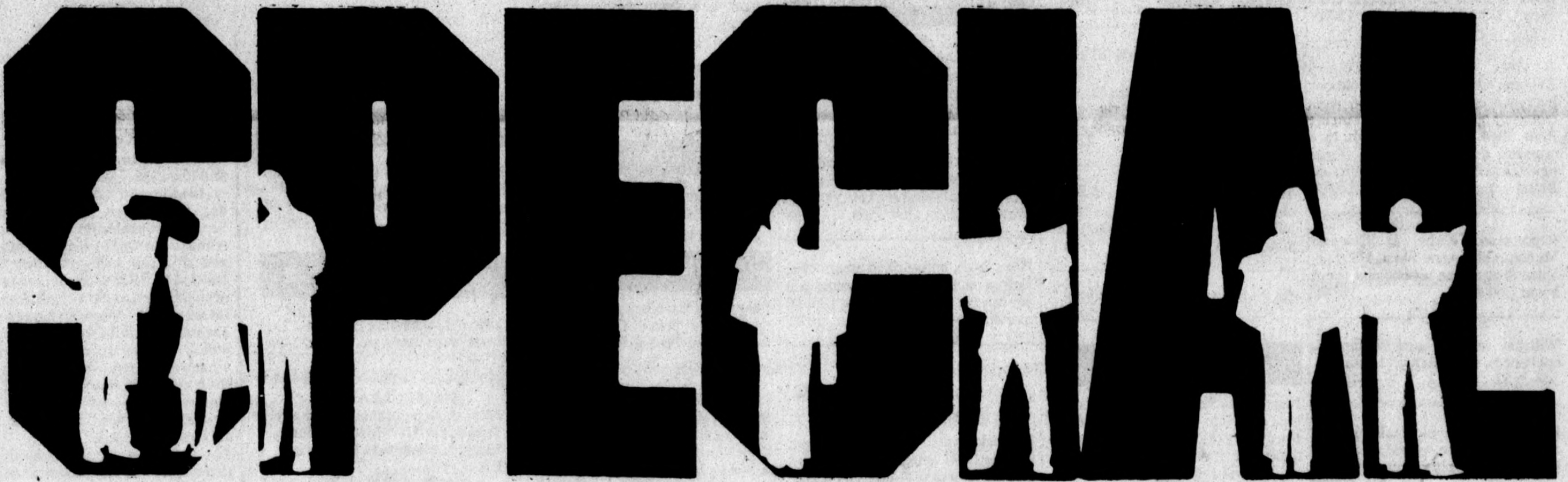

The problem is with family members and friends. We are constantly asked, "So when are you going to have children? How many children do you want? Why don't you have children, you would be the perfect parents."

Ann, this intrusive questioning bothers me. How should I respond? My HIV status is no one's business but must I always end up with a stone in the pit of my stomach whenever these questions are asked?—Disconcerted in D.C.

**DEAR D.C.:** I am amazed at the number of people who feel an

obligation to respond to nun-ur-yeer-bizznizz type questions that only a clod would ask. Prime examples: "How much money do you make?" "Did you get pregnant on purpose?" And the one you are getting, "When are you going to have children?"
