From Awards to Zaniness

Local headlines reflect '90 events

The year 1990 may not have started the new decade off with a big bang for Hereford and Deaf Smith County, but the headlines from **The Brand** reflect another eventful year.

Some community leaders tried to help shape the future by asking voters to approve a half-percent sales tax for industrial development. Voters rejected that idea by a big margin, but Hereford still had some good news in industrial development.

Holly Sugar held a groundbreaking for a \$12 million plant; Poarch Bros. and Hereford Industrial Foundation announced plans late in the year for a new plant to manufacture and assemble and new cotton stripper head; the Senior Citizen Center was involved in a big expansion of that facility, and Amistad Housing Corporation opened a 39-unit project for low income ag workers.

The "Hustle Hereford" series continued in the newspaper through the year and continued to draw attention both here and out of town. Attorney James Witherspoon initiated the program through a group of business leaders and **The Brand**.

The summer was hot and dry, with no appreciable moisture for 78 straight days. Kerrville tried to steal way our Cowgirl Hall of Fame, but the local board vowed to keep the museum here.

Some of the award winners of the year included Speedy Nieman, citizen of the year; George Warner, ag man of the year; Bettye Owen, C of C Women's Division woman of the year; Gina Alley, Miss Hereford; Daphne Roddy, HHS valedictorian; Bill Devers and Kevin Hull, "Seven Who Care" honorees on Amarillo Channel 7; Betty Henson, Grant Hanna and Ruth McBride--Bull Chip winners; Heather Hodges, county spelling bee champ.

Other newsmakers included Doug Josseland, C of C president; Lupe Chavez, first Hispanic to be elected as a county commissioner; the HHS Mighty Maroon Band, which went to the state marching contest and is invited to march in the governor's inaugural parade; Justin McBride, Realtor of the Year; Noe Rodriguez, policeman of the year, and Marvin Gatty, fireman of the year, among others.

So, there were many highlights and a few lowlights during 1990. Here's a look at the headlines for the year:

JANUARY

3--Deadline ended for filing for county offices with two contests set in the Democratic Primary--Margaret Perez, Eileen Behunin and Betty Martin for tax assessor-collector, and Austin Rose and Lupe Chavez for Commissioner of Pct. 2. Three Republican candidates are unopposed and will challenge in the general election--Kyla McDowell for county treasurer, Larry Malamen for Pct. 2 and Ken Rogers for Pct. 4, county commission.

5--Bettye Owen was honored as the C of C Women's Division "Woman of the Year."

9--Building permits for the city dropped over \$1 million from 1988 to a total of \$2,208,730 for '89. Gene Brock, Hereford educator, was honored at an open house by Kiwanis International.

10--Nolan Butler was named executive director of United Way of Deaf Smith County, and Jeryl Baker was elected as the new president.

12--Roy Rector was recognized as

Hereford Police Officer of the Year. The Christmas Stocking Fund, after reaping a record \$20,718 in donations, helped 261 adults and 427 children at Christmastime. Local clubs observe Kiwanis International's 75th birthday.

17--Hereford school board members to appeal many of findings of a Texas Education Agency accreditation team report. Vegetable growers in for more rules and restrictions, officials warned at the annual West Texas Vegetable Conference here. Deaf Smith Hospital District trustees agreed that building a new hospital at another site should be a long-range goal.

19--A storm dumped five inches of snow on Hereford by 7 a.m. with more in the forecast. Doug Josseland was formally installed as the new C of C president during a board retreat.

21--Holly Sugar president Roger Hill praised efforts of local sugarbeet producers during the Texas Sugarbeet Growers annual conference Friday.

23--George Warner was named "Ag Man of the Year" at the annual Sugarbeet Banquet, while James Witherspoon and Bill Cleavinger also drew special recognition from Holly Sugar.

28--A Kerrville proposal to relocate the National Cowgirl Hall of Fame to that city was announced by Margaret Formby. The Hereford Young Farmers 25th annual Livestock Show completed another successful run. Delight Williams, veteran receptionist at **The Brand** died Jan. 26 at the age of 80.

FEBRUARY

1--Mayor Wes Fisher stressed fiscal responsibility while making a "State of the City" address to the Lions Club. Olney S&L here had a name change, becoming AmWest Savings Association. Hereford police and Texas Department of Human Services are investigating allegations that some Hereford boys may have been molested by an adult.

6--Hereford City Commission voted to put a sales tax proposal for industrial development on the city ballot. The news was mostly bad when the Texas Corn Growers Association held an annual meeting in Dimmitt.

8--The Hereford Area Food Council, a coalition of food manufacturers in the Hereford area, was formed to help promote development of more local industries. Feedyard officials around the area heard ways to save energy and cut costs during a seminar here.

9--Groundbreaking for an expansion project at the Senior Citizen Center was set for Saturday. Groundbreaking for the Amistad Housing Project was held.

13--City Manager Darwin McGill defended the city commission's action in taking a low out-of-town bid, even when the local bid is very close. A study committee from the Cowgirl Hall of Fame visited in Kerrville to learn more about that city's proposal to move the museum.

18--Apollo 14 astronaut Ed Mitchell, who was born in Hereford, was named as the C of C Banquet speaker in March.

21--Libby Kosub and Benny Gonzales were named Miss and Mr. HHS at the school's annual Kooberay Assembly. Cowgirl Hall of Fame board looking for ways, funds to keep museum in Hereford.

22--Betty Henson, local Red Cross chapter director, was presented the Bull Chip award at the chamber Fun Breakfast.

23--The Cowgirl Hall of Fame will remain in Hereford and make plans for permanent financing, it was announced by president Margaret Formby.

27--Dolores Brorman was named the Extension Homemakers Club Woman of the Year for 1989. Wednesday will be Gene Brock's last day at school, retiring after 24 years in the local system.

MARCH

6--City to seek support of local agencies for industrial development sales tax. Mike Manchec won the regional Citizen Bee at Amarillo.

9--(O.G.) Speedy Nieman, **Brand** publisher, was named "Citizen of the Year" at the annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet. Doug Josseland took over the chamber president's gavel from Rocky Lee. Anna Witkowski, 11, won the junior spelling bee title.

14--Heather Hodges, 12, won the Deaf Smith County Spelling Bee championship and Chris Lyles was runnerup. Hereford recorded .85 of an inch of rain after a storm came through Friday.

14--Democrats elected Margaret Perez, tax assessor-collector, and Lupe Chavez, Commissioner, Pct. 4, as their party primary winners in the only contested county races. Hereford School Board adopted a stadium expansion plan, asking football fans to contribute \$25,000 of the expected \$75,000 project.

27--Deaf Smith County Commissioners voted not to extend a "freeport" tax exemption here for goods-in-transit.

APRIL

1--Dr. Tim Revell, who told the hospital board he would leave by July 15, said he would consider staying "if some changes were made in hospital policies." Herb Vogel turning a profit with his hobby of raising llamas.

3--Hereford City Commission accepts donation of slightly more than an acre of property from Mr. and Mrs. N.E. Tyler. Marilyn Culpepper is new president of C of C Women's Division. Seven HHS students qualify for UIL Region Academic contests.

4--Teacher Appreciation Banquet honors service pins and retirees--Bill and Billie McDowell, Gene Brock, Ruby Williams and Betty Volkman. County Extension Service office holds meeting to study longrange plans and goals.

Lewis will seek re-election

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas lawmaker Gib Lewis will seek an unprecedented fifth term as House speaker despite Friday's misdemeanor indictments that charge him with violating state law in his dealings with a powerful law firm, his attorneys said.

"I don't think there has been any discussion but continuing with the process and submitting his name to the membership for election, and I don't think there is any indication that he won't be elected," attorney Bill Willms said.

"I don't see any legal reason or otherwise why he shouldn't be elected to the speakership," he said.

The 150-member House will elect a speaker Jan. 8, the first day of the regular legislative session.

A Travis County grand jury returned two indictments against Lewis, alleging he solicited and received a gift from the San Antonio-based law firm of Heard Goggan Blair & Williams, and then failed to report it.

"Although these crimes are misdemeanors, they are among the most serious crimes that a public official can be charged with," Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle said.

Non-aligned nations try peace initiatives

The world's non-aligned nations are trying to mediate the Persian Gulf crisis as U.S.-Iraqi talks remain on hold and war preparations forge ahead. Britain has joined the United States in planning to inoculate troops against biological weapons.

Yugoslavia, current head of the 102-nation non-aligned movement, sent its foreign minister to Iraq on Friday, 18 days away from the U.N. deadline for Iraq to end its occupation of Kuwait or face possible war.

Previous attempts at mediation have failed but this new initiative had at least one advantage: both Iraq and Kuwait belong to the movement, which rejects any formal military alliances with East or West.

Vice President Dan Quayle was scheduled to leave late today for a New Year's visit to U.S. troops sent to the gulf region since Iraq invaded Kuwait nearly four months ago. Quayle's itinerary included trips to military outposts in the Saudi Arabian desert.

Iraqi media reported up 300,000 paramilitary troops in the Kurdish region have been reactivated to shore up the country's northern border with Turkey, part of the multinational coalition against Iraqi President Saddam Hussein.

Lloyd's shipping intelligence has advised vessels off Saudi Arabia's northern gulf coast to use "extreme caution" after two drifting mines were found earlier this week near the Zulfu oil field. The Friday report did not say who detected and destroyed the mines.

Shipping industry executives, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the mines could have been placed by Iraqis off Kuwait and broken free. But there are also mines left over from the 1980-88 Iraq-Iran war.

In Baghdad, Yugoslav Foreign Minister Budimir Loncar planned to represent the non-aligned movement in talks with his Iraqi counterpart, Tariq Aziz, to discuss the gulf situation, Yugoslavia's official Tanjug news agency reported.

Tanjung said Loncar left for Iraq on Friday, but there was no immediate word on when the talks were scheduled in Baghdad.

Last month, Loncar visited Iran, the United Arab Emirates, Syria and Jordan for talks.

The United States and Iraq remain at an impasse over dates for talks. Iraq had invited Secretary of State James A. Baker III to visit Jan. 12, but the Bush administration say the cutoff for a Baker trip is Thursday.

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Texans deem Persian Gulf crisis most important in '90

DALLAS (AP) - The Persian Gulf crisis' effect on the price of oil, which powers cars and planes and machines and the Lone Star economy, was the most important event for Texans and their money in 1990.

Insolvent banks and thrifts continued to be a black eye for the state and several large Texas companies filed for bankruptcy. A new trade agreement loomed with Mexico as did more federal taxes.

But the surge in oil prices touched everyone every day of the last five months of the year.

It recharged the sagging energy industry, added some change to the coffers of state government and took some more out of consumers' pockets. It helped drag the nation slowly into a recession while Texas was expected to follow.

The state's economy is becoming more diverse and oil no longer can make Texas buck the nation's economic trend, as it did twice in the '80s. Several Texas economists forecast a downturn in 1991, but they say it won't be as harsh as in other parts of the nation.

Some economists predict oil will settle at about \$25 a barrel when the Persian Gulf crisis is resolved, a level that would dilute its inflationary effect and allow the energy industry to grow.

The industry had started a rebound before the Persian Gulf crisis. A technology called horizontal drilling, first used last year, began paying big dividends and a state agency projected it would increase the estimated recoverable oil in Texas by a third.

The number of working oil and gas rigs in Texas jumped from about 250 in 1989 to more than 350 this year. Profits of several Texas energy companies, particularly oilfield service providers, showed hefty jumps after the price surge.

For every \$1 jump in oil prices, the state treasury swelled \$50 million while a \$10 jump resulted in an extra \$86 a month for the average Texas royalty owner.

The surge could not be counted on to last, though, making energy companies wary of expansion and

throwing a kink into the financial planning of many others.

For most Texans, though, the jump was felt in higher prices at the gas station. The average price of unleaded gasoline at the end of 1990 was 36 cents higher than a year ago.

Jet fuel doubled to about \$1 a gallon because of the gulf crisis, hobbling commercial airlines. Fort Worth-based American Airlines Inc. forecast fourth-quarter losses that would be big enough to wipe out the profits of the first three quarters.

But the cash-laden carrier also took advantage of fuel-induced woes to scoop up assets of weaker competitors, including lucrative international routes from Continental Airlines Inc. and Trans World Airways Inc.

Houston-based Continental Airlines Inc. cited the higher fuel cost as one of the reasons it filed for bankruptcy in December. Continental's sister carrier, Eastern Air Lines Inc., remained in bankruptcy protection it entered in March 1989 after its machinists went on strike.

A strike by 6,000 drivers ultimately forced Dallas-based Greyhound Lines Inc., the nation's only inter-city bus service, to file for bankruptcy protection this year. The drivers went on strike in March over wages and benefits and there were several incidents of gunfire and rock-throwing at buses during the following weeks.

About 600 drivers later crossed the picket line and the company hired 3,000 more replacements and was serving 95 percent of its pre-strike routes by July. Greyhound filed a bankruptcy reorganization plan in November.

The bankruptcy filing made by Dallas-based Southland Corp., parent of 7-Eleven convenience stores, in October was "prepackaged," a buzzword that means it carried the approval of most of its creditors. Southland, which was forced to reorganize by the debt burden it took on in a 1987 leveraged buyout, hoped the new prepackaging tool would get it out of bankruptcy sooner.

Financial services stayed shaky in 1990. Texas was blamed for the savings and loan crisis as more Americans understood the magnitude

of thrift insolvencies that will cost the government hundreds of billions of dollars.

More than 100 banks failed in Texas for the third straight year and dozens of thrifts also were taken over by regulators.

Government investigators continued their pursuit of former executives of the financial institutions who are suspected of fraud.

THE VISUAL DEMANDS OF TARGET PRACTICE

The use of a deadly weapon in target practice calls for good vision. To hit a target with accuracy, an individual must have excellent hand-eye coordination and be able to distinguish detail at considerable distance and against various backgrounds. The sportsman is expected to focus clearly on near and distant objects and switch focus quickly from one to the other. Distances, movement and difficult light and weather conditions may confuse the "picture."

Safety is another issue; in the case of hunting, a Minnesota study found that 77 percent of those who wounded fellow hunters had defective vision -- and 50 percent of them were not aware of it. In addition, it is estimated that 15 percent of the male population -- 850,000 of the 17 million hunters -- are colorblind and can't distinguish colors properly.

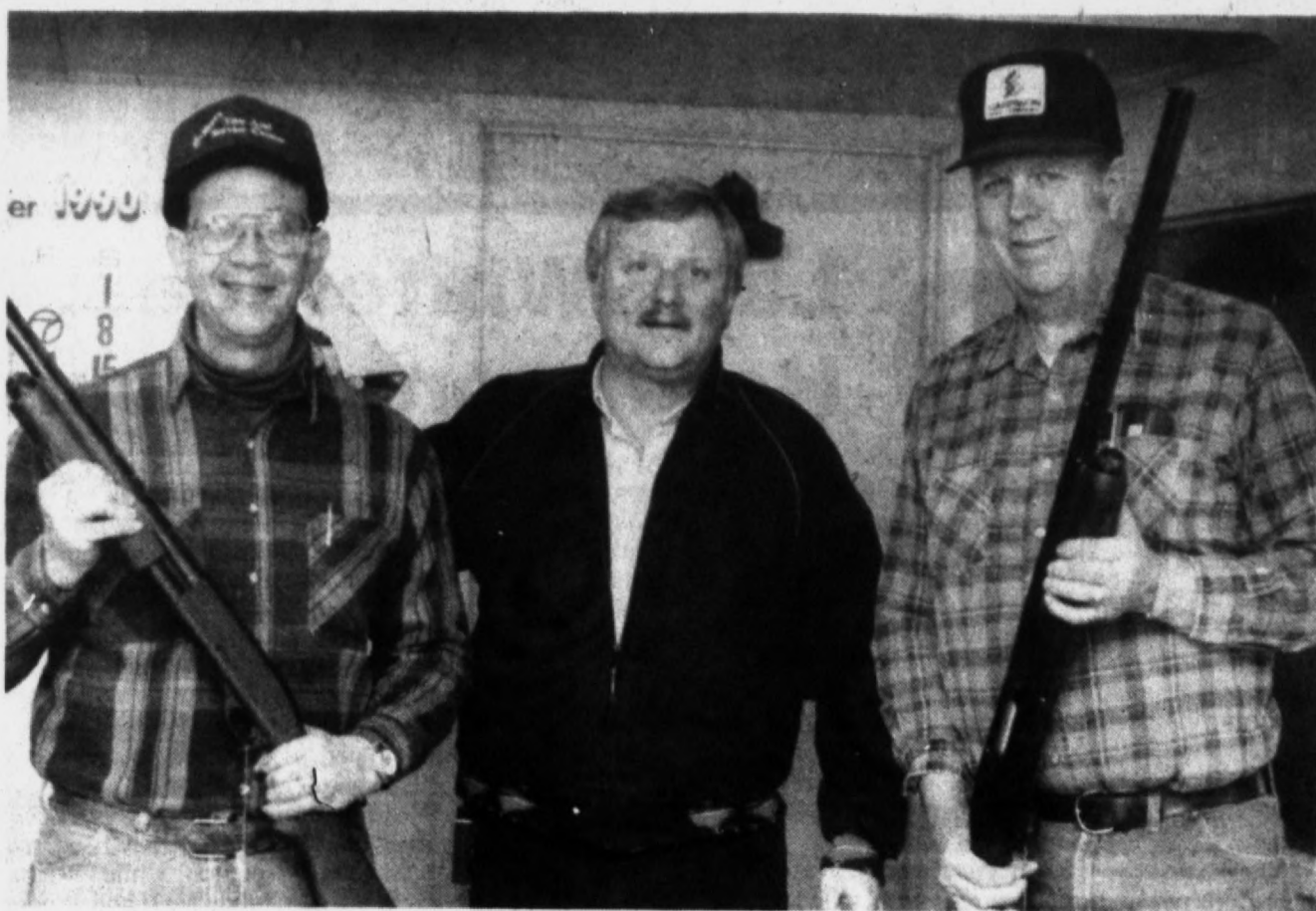

Politics marred by mud

AUSTIN (AP) - Mud, money and mayhem marked politics in 1990.

Ann Richards won big. Clayton Williams lost big.

The Texas GOP won more statewide offices than ever, but it failed to elect the key players in the biggest political game of 1991 - redistricting.

It was a gubernatorial election year that saw candidates talking about everything from drug use to their personal roles in executions to visits to prostitutes.

Attack ads dominated TV airwaves in races from the courthouse to Congress. Former Austin S&L owner Stanley Adams ran for governor after listing his occupation as "alleged white-collar racketeer." A state Senate candidate held a news conference hooked up to a lie detector.

"You can relax - 1990 is over," declared Texas Monthly magazine as it celebrated the end of an election year by awarding its "Bum Steer of the Year" title to Republican gubernatorial candidate Williams.

Williams spent a record \$22 million on his bid, some \$8 million of his own money. He built a double-digit lead in the polls over outspent Democrat Richards. But the gaffe-stricken candidate just kept talking.

When the multimillionaire admitted four days before the election that he had paid no income taxes in 1986, his own staff saw the handwriting on the wall.

It read: Richards 1,921,895; Williams 1,825,148.

Richards' victory not only returns the Governor's Mansion to a Democrat, it gives her the opportunity to appoint some top state officials and name her choices to the more than 200 boards and commissions that direct state agencies.

Already, Richards has tapped state Rep. Lena Guerrero, D-Austin, for the Railroad Commission, making her the first Hispanic and first woman ever to serve on the panel that regulates the oil, gas and transportation industries.

The bitter governor's race captured most of the headlines, but down the ballot other things were happening, too.

"The doors are open to everyone, and they're not going to be closed again," Richards says.

After making big advances in their war with Democrats during the 1980s, the GOP found itself falling back on some fronts while pushing forward on others.

Republicans captured the most statewide offices they've held since Reconstruction.

Come January, Republican Rick Perry will be agriculture commissioner; Republican Kay Bailey Hutchison will be state treasurer; and Republican Tom Phillips will remain chief justice of a Texas Supreme Court where the Democratic edge was narrowed to 5-4 from 6-3.

But the GOP slipped in the Legislature. Democrats held their 23-8 margin in the Texas Senate and picked up three seats in the House to expand their edge to 93-57.

"The November election was good for Texas Republicans but not great," said state party Chairman Fred Meyer of Dallas.

He noted that Republican U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm was re-elected carrying 221 of the state's 254 counties, and GOP ranks grew from 692 elected officials to 803.

But it wasn't all he had hoped for. "We lost a lot of very, very, very close races around the state," Meyer said. "We made progress. But we had the opportunity of a century, the absolute opportunity of a century."

The Democratic command of the Legislature is particularly important.

The 1991 session will get the first chance to draw the new district lines for Congress, the state House and Senate and State Board of Education. Those lines will last until 2001.

The governor wields veto power over any legislative plan, and Republicans had been counting on Williams to be wielding the pen. But that won't be the case, either.

"Certainly, I believe that there will be a disadvantage" for Republicans, says outgoing GOP Gov. Bill Clements, who held the governor's office the last time lines were drawn.

"I'm not optimistic. But neither am I pessimistic... You have a check-and-balance point in the House: And you also have another one in the courts. I would suggest that in all likelihood

neither the Republicans nor the Democrats are going to get everything they want," Clements said.

SPORTS 1990 Herd teams enjoy successful year

1990 provided several ups and downs for Hereford Whiteface and Lady Whiteface athletic teams.

The Herd had participants in the postseason of both fall and spring tennis, track and field, golf, football and volleyball.

But the biggest sports story of the year came off the field on Feb. 1 when the University Interscholastic league released its biennial realignment. The Whitefaces remained in District 1-4A, but the league was cut in half geographically with being the at the extreme southern end.

The move divided what had been a nine-team district into two six-team loops with the addition of Amarillo Caprock to Hereford, Canyon Randall, Pampa, Borger and Dumas in District 1. Former district foes Dunbar and Estacado of Lubbock, Levelland and Wolfforth Frenship were placed in the new District 2 along with Snyder and Lamesa.

The new district assignments were hailed by Herd coaches on two fronts. With six teams in the league, the start of district play in most sports was pushed back as much as six weeks compared to the 1989 schedules.

And it didn't hurt anyone's feelings to have four 200-mile round trips removed from the road schedules of basketball, volleyball and baseball.

Among the other top stories in Herd sports were:

FOOTBALL

The Herd overcame a 1-4-1 start to win the district title with a 4-0-1 record in league play. Hereford advanced to the area playoff before falling to Big Spring for the second year in a row.

PRETTIEST SISTER: Hereford's two ties in a 5-5-2 season were not only two of the best games of the year, they were just as good as a pair of wins.

The Herd opened district play with a 24-24 deadlock at Pampa, but held the tie-breaker edge over the Harvesters and went on to claim the top playoff seed when both teams won their next four games. Hereford overcame an early 14-0 deficit by scoring 17 straight points and came back with an 83-yard drive at the end to tie the game.

In the first Herd playoff game at Whiteface Stadium in 17 years, Hereford tied former district nemesis Lubbock Estacado 14-14, but advanced on penetrations.

The Herd trailed at 7-0 and 14-7, but touchdown catches by Art Allemand and Chad Brummett kept the Herd close before a final drive reached the Matador 5-yard line.

BEST COMMAND PERFORMANCE: Reserve quarterback Chris Blair came off the bench after starter T.J. Head was literally knocked out of the Pampa game. On his first play, Blair connected with Leo Brown for a 20-yard touchdown with 29 seconds left in the game and Jesus Gonzales added the PAT for the tie.

WHAT A CAREER TO END: Herd tailback Matt Bromlow finished his season with 1,363 rushing yards for a two-year total of 2,913. Bromlow broke the school career rushing mark in the seventh week of the season and his final total was more than 300 yards ahead of Paul Bell's previous mark.

IT WAS WORTH THE WAIT: Herd quarterbacks entered the last game of the regular season without a rushing touchdown between them, but Borger was so intent on stopping Bromlow that starter T.J. Head ran for 107 yards and two scores. Backup Chris Blair got into the act with a third score in the Herd's 35-10 win.

VOLLEYBALL

BEST RELOADING JOB: With only one returning varsity player and the slogan 'We don't rebuild, we reload,' the Lady Whitefaces put together the most successful season in school history.

After tying defending state champion Dumas for the district title, Hereford knocked off top-ranked Lamesa for the first playoff win ever.

Three more wins brought about the fourth meeting of the year with Dumas in the Region I finals. The Demonettes took a three-game win on the way to their third state championship.

DEJA VOODOO: For the second year in a row, Hereford and Dumas traded two-game sweeps on the other's home floor. The split forced another district playoff at the end of the season, and for the second straight year, Dumas won in three games.

CROSS COUNTRY

Teresa Castillo capped her career by placing second at the state meet to

defending champion Melony Patterson of Crowley.

Castillo won five races on the year, including her second district title and never finished lower than third place at any meet. Her time of 11:59 at the 1-4A meet was not only a personal best, it was only the second time a Hereford girl has broken the 12-minute barrier for two miles in cross country or on the track.

BASKETBALL

BEST WAY TO START A NEW YEAR: The Herd boys started 1990 off on the right foot on Jan. 2 with a 55-54 overtime win against Lubbock Dunbar.

Hereford came back from a 17-point deficit to force the extra period and Dee Nall's three-pointer with 31 seconds left sealed the win.

PUTTING IT ALL ON THE LINE: On a Jan. 12 trip to Borger, both varsity contests were decided in the final seconds at the free-throw line.

The Lady Whitefaces pulled out a 50-48 win when Bricenna Townsend hit a pair with four seconds left on the clock, but the boys lost out when Russell Backus' second attempt rolled off the iron in a 55-54 loss.

Backus hit the first shot with no time on the clock, then waited more than five minutes as an argument raged over putting three seconds back on before attempting his second.

TENNIS

Hereford continued to rule both spring and fall seasons, claiming five of eight regional tournament berths in April and putting together a fifth straight undefeated district mark in the fall.

At the 1-4A Tournament in the spring, Kristie Allison defeated teammate Brenna Reinauer for the girls' singles crown while Jeff Eades and Randy Robbins edged top seeds Eric Cortez and Torcy Sellers in the boys' doubles finals. Gina Alley and Misty Reed added the girls' doubles.

Allison posted the spring's best finish by placing third at the Region I-4A Tournament to qualify as a state alternate.

In the fall team season, the Herd posted its best finish ever, reaching the Region I-4A championship round before losing to Wichita Falls High.

The win placed the Herd (3-10) in Saturday's consolation finals against Floydada. The game was scheduled for a 4:30 p.m. start.

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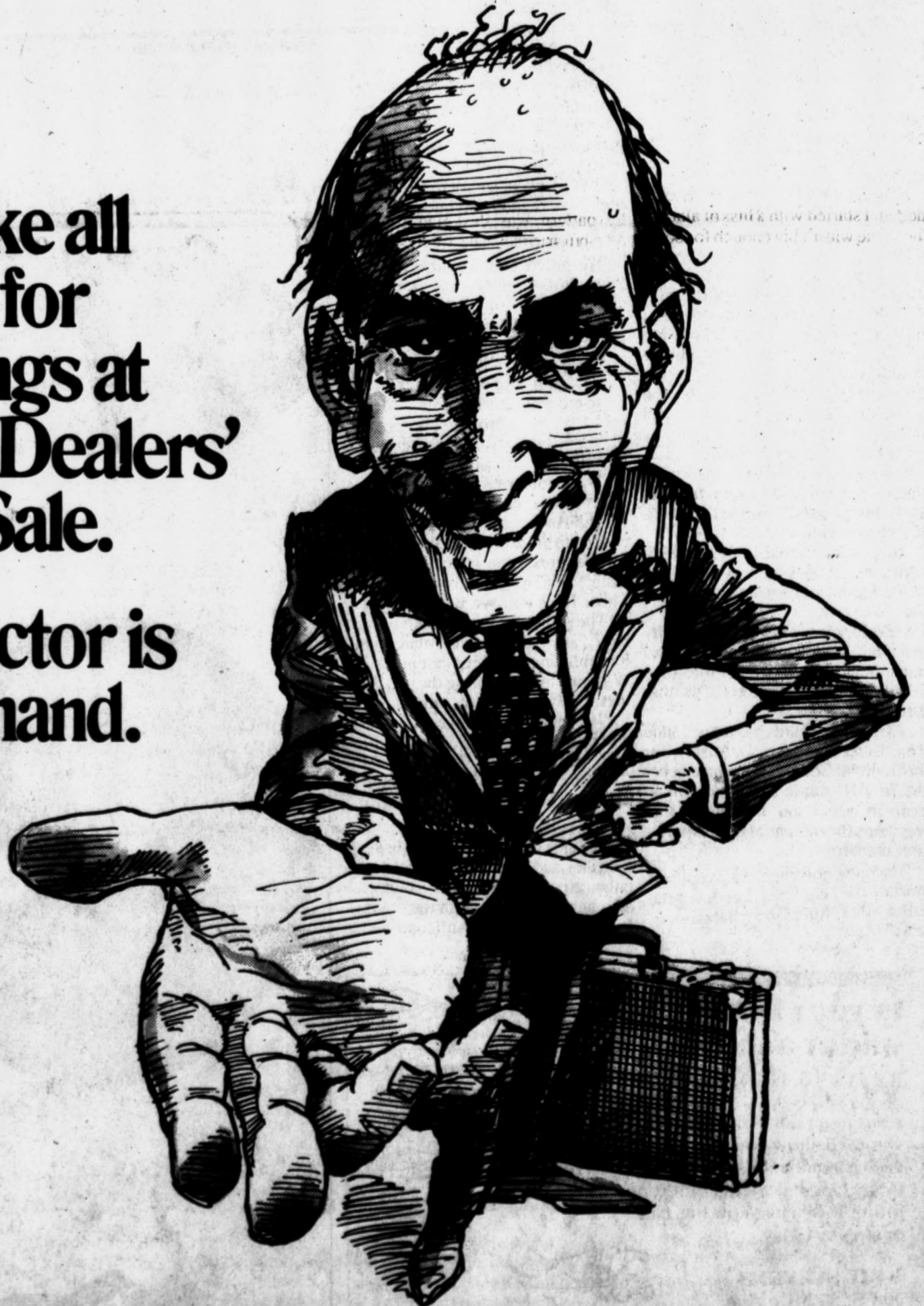

New camo design works for hunters

HOUSTON -- A warm south wind was whipping over the ridge. The late-November afternoon was a poor draw for whitetail deer hunting in the Hill Country - or any other country. Bucks do not move well against unseasonable heat and uncertain gusts.

I eased over the open ridge and stepped inside an oak motte. The scraggly clump of isolated trees was the only defined cover amid the sweep of grass and scattered brush. I stood against a shadowed trunk and gripped the rattling horns and peered left and right. The antlers twisted and grated, imitating the clash of two bucks in territorial combat.

The sounds rang true but the effort was uninspired. Four previous attempts in different locations with partner Rick Stovall had yielded resounding blanks. Too hot, too windy.

I rattled and watched a brush line about 100 yards to the north. The experts agree that a buck usually leads with his nose, circling downwind before closing to the horns. If a deer showed, he would pop out right about - Ooops!

A young eight-point buck was standing in the motte. I mean, he was right there, bristling and glaring and ready to fight, five measured steps from my nose. He had come from straight upwind. His nearness was so sudden, I started with a hiss of alarm. The motte wasn't big enough for both of us.

The rattled deer and rattled hunter exchanged a significant stare - what a weird and wild moment! The agitated deer saw me but didn't see me. He stood for several heartbeats, uncertain what was happening, then trotted through the motte and broke to the left, pausing in the open at about 50 feet. It would have been a ridiculously easy shot.

That encounter which occurred two weeks ago on Camp Verde Ranch in Kerr County illustrated the importance of concealment in deer hunting. I was standing erect but utilizing a shadowed tree trunk to diffuse the silhouette.

Most important, I was wearing full camouflage, including a cap and face mask.

The clothing was the new Bushlan South Texas camo (introduced at this year's SHOT Show), which I am convinced is among the finest available for deer hunting in Texas.

The pointblank standoff was a dramatic demonstration but, granted, a rut-juiced buck charging the horns can display reckless behavior. Perhaps a better test occurred the next morning.

While still-hunting, or slipping on foot through the brush, I closed within 30 paces of a half-dozen feeding deer. One was a mature nine-pointer. The full camo blended with a broken screen of cedars and I maneuvered into popgun range. During most of the stalk, portions of several of the animals were visible through the bushes and branches; it is reasonable to assume, therefore, that I was vulnerable to a wary eye.

I watched the casual deer for several minutes and withdrew undetected.

That was an impressive interaction with wild animals on a game-hunted ranch and the record might show that nobody has accused me recently of being a blood descendant of Daniel Boone. I can break a twig and bumble a sneak with the best of them.

Good camouflage helps the average hunter. The Bushlan pattern, conceived and designed by game biologist Steve Warner and Camp Verde Ranch owner Bobby Parker, does a remarkable job of bleeding into available surrounding foliage.

Unlike other camos that utilize impressionistic blobs or stripes, the Bushlan pattern is a realistic design of leaves, stems and twigs. Frankly, the clothing appears unconvincing on the shelf. It looks, well, too cute, as if fashion designers Donna Karan or Louis Vuitton decided to make a splash in the outdoor market.

But Bushlan is not a "haute" interpretation of hunting from New York City or Paris. It came from Cotulla and Carrizo Springs and the heart of the South Texas deer country. Bushy leaves of dark green and light green blend with frilly mesquite fronds of yellow-green. Stems of light gray and darker shadows stand against a broken background of brown.

The floral flourish may look like the overkill on the rack, but step into the brush and watch it fade. What impressed me was that even though the pattern was designed for the thorn-brush terrain of deep South Texas, you can take several steps through the Hill Country and become a rambling cedar bush or a shuffling shin oak clump. It makes the most of what is available.

Bushlan represents the cutting edge of serious deer-hunting camouflage. Certainly, other quality camos are available, including patterns intended for specialized or regional use. Among these are Pine Tree and TreBark with pine bark patterns (excellent for Texas), and Mossy Oak for heavy, shrouded hardwood terrain of many southern states. Predator and ASAT patterns target barren winter woods of browns and grays.

Numerous camouflages are available and the deer hunter on foot certainly can improve his potential by obtaining a suitable set for his region. Bow hunters are tuned to the importance of full camo, but many rifle hunters in Texas do not give proper respect to blending in; this lax attitude is the result of time-honored sessions in box blinds and hunting vehicles (legal on private land).

Whenever a hunter is on foot, either horn rattling or still-hunting, or utilizing an open tripod swivel seat, he is ahead of the game, blending as much as possible with the natural surroundings. (This is assuming that he is on a private ranch or lease with regulation on hunting pressure; the hunter on public forest land should wear a splash of bright hunter-safety color.)

Yes, deer are color blind, but a monotone shirt or pair of pants stand bold against the varied backdrop of deer-hunting terrain. Partial camo is better than no camo, and keep in mind that the upper body deserves more attention than the legs. Masking the

face is a critical part of full-dress awareness.

A bright, excited face complete with a pair of glittering predatory eyes can trigger alarm even from an otherwise concealed hunter - a fact that the box blind hunter peering from a port or window might consider. Head nets are, to me, uncomfortable and confining.

Camo paint is a bit extreme for the rifleman this side of a survival training camp. The classic bandanna pulled over the face is OK, but the pressure across the bridge of the nose is uncomfortable during a prolonged session.

Here again, Bushlan has developed a quick and comfortable alternative. The mask of the same pattern covers the entire face and secures with a Velcro strap across the back of the head. It features eye holes and a nose vent and a totally blank stare. The aforementioned buck can attest to that from five paces. He knew something was not right but could not "make" me as I stood in full but shadowed view. His upwind approach blocked my scent stream and he had nothing to key on.

Hands also demand cover. Remember that the hands must move, either when rattling or glassing or raising a rifle. The flash of movement can blow a privileged secret in a trice. Camouflaged gloves are not a must, but dark brown or green can save a

hunt against a sudden or incautious gesture.

The best and most complete set of camo cannot overcome lousy field judgment. The cardinal rule of still hunting - no matter what you are wearing - is to be aware of game before game becomes aware of you.

The ghost of Hiawatha, would be hard-pressed to sneak a whitetail deer that gains the downwind position and reaps a full bouquet of streaming scent. You have had it, pro.

There is no substitute on any sporting goods rack for basic still-hunting skills. These include moving upwind or cross-wind and keeping the low sun on your back whenever practical. The hunter clinging to screening cover and shadows can move with much less chance of detection than his brash

counterpart striding across a sunlit opening.

Walking, itself, is overrated. This is not a 10K exercise. The success of a day is not measured by distance covered; it is gauged by the unalarmed animals sighted within shootable range.

The idea is to pick a prime area and slip slowly, moving a few yards or to the next likely cover, then pausing to wait and watch (or rattle). Do not be too quick to leave a good spot. In fact, a still-hunting session could be described as a series of stand hunts as the hunter eases from one observation point to another.

Full camouflage allows you to hide with minimal cover, especially if you stay in the shadows and keep hand

movements low and tight and use a backdrop of brush to break your silhouette. Avoid, also, the beginner's mistake of skylighting against a ridge. Position just below the crest so your head doesn't bob and weave like a tardy jack-o'-lantern against the December sky.

The art of hiding is a skill that more deer hunters should take seriously. A blend of proper clothing and basic woodsmanship literally can take you out of the picture. This was illustrated on the Camp Verde Ranch when I decided to photograph Stovall in full Bushlan ensemble. I walked to the vehicle and returned with a camera.

"Hey, Ricky, where are you?"
"Right here, stupid."

Top pitcher Russell Backus hung a spike sliding home with the go-ahead run in the top of the seventh inning, breaking the femur in his right leg.

The break wasn't diagnosed until later and Backus tried to pitch the last inning as the Herd suffered an 8-7 loss.

BEST COMEBACK: After being

expected to miss the rest of the season, Backus returned from the injury on April 24 to pitch a complete game with 10 strikeouts and drive in the winning run in a 12-11 decision over Berger.

WINNING UGLY: Chad Brummett picked up his first win of the season March 27 in a wild game at Berger. Despite allowing 15 runs on 10 hits and 11 walks, Brummett went the distance on the mound as the Herd benefitted from eight Bulldog errors in a 19-15 victory.

TRACK & FIELD

Shot putter Benny Gonzales and sprinter Daphne Roddy along with the Lady Whiteface 4X200-meter relay team reached the state meet in Austin. Gonzales and Roddy both finished sixth at the meet while the relay was seventh.

Gonzales broke his own school record April 8 at a meet in Plainview with a put of 56 feet, 6 1/2 inches.

DOWN TO THE WIRE: At the District 1-4A meet in Wollforth, four teams had a shot at the girls' team title entering the final event, the 4X400-meter relay, with the winner of the race assured of the trophy.

Hereford finished second to Levelland in the race and wound up third in the team standings, just four points out of first place.

Defense has Steelers in picture

HOUSTON (AP) - Pittsburgh would not be in contention for its first division title since 1984 without the Steeler defense, which ranks No. 1 in the NFL in total defense and No. 1 against the pass.

But there is a dark, steel shadow that won't allow the current group of defenders to shine on its own.

"You get tired of hearing about the old Steelers even though it's a great tradition," cornerback Rod Woodson said. "This is a new team that is playing with new talent. We're trying to play tough, physical football and in that sense it's real good."

The Steeler defense will try again Sunday night to live up to the reputation of the "Steel Curtain" defense that helped the Steelers to win four Super Bowls when they face the Houston Oilers in the Astrodome.

Pittsburgh (9-6) would win the AFC Central Division with a victory plus a Cleveland victory over

Cincinnati. The Steelers could lose and still get in the playoffs if both Cincinnati and Seattle lose their games.

The Oilers (8-7) would be the division titlist with a victory, coupled with a Cincinnati loss. A loss puts the Oilers out of the playoffs.

Pittsburgh had been absent from the playoffs after 1984 until last season when the Steelers lost twice to the Oilers in regular season and then beat them 26-23 in overtime in the AFC wild card playoff game.

Steelers coach Chuck Noll isn't concerned about his team's lack of big-game experience.

"Sometimes winning the big game is overrated and you get yourself all pumped up and out of control," Noll said. "We've had some guys who are susceptible to that type of thing. Winning the big game is just being very efficient and doing the things you know how to do."

The Steelers weren't expected to reach their first Super Bowl either, Noll said.

"Nobody gave us a chance because we had never been there before," Noll said. "Columbus was never there before either."

Sunday's game will match the NFL's top defense against Houston's No. 1 ranked offense, although the Oilers will be without quarterback Warren Moon, who dislocated the thumb on his right throwing hand in last week's 40-20 loss to Cincinnati.

Pittsburgh's defense is allowing 245.9 yards per game and the Oilers are gaining 386.3 yards per game.

The Steelers have been especially effective in the second half. They've allowed only two passing touchdowns in the last 34 quarters. They have seven second-half shutouts this season including six of their last eight games.

Pittsburgh leads the AFC with 23 interceptions and they've allowed a league low six touchdown passes this season.

The Steelers defense jelled in time for the playoffs last season.

"Our defense has played real well the whole year," Woodson said. "Last year, we had a new system and didn't understand it at all until the last couple of games."

The Steelers defense has been on-target this season, including a 20-9 victory over the Oilers in the second game of the season when the Steelers won without an offensive touchdown.

Woodson returned a punt 52 yards to a touchdown. David Johnson returned an interception 26 yards for a touchdown and Gary Anderson kicked field goals of 31 and 27 yards.

Houston four starting wide receivers are among the top eight receivers in the AFC in receptions. Drew Hill with 70 catches, Ernest Givins and Haywood Jeffires with 69 each and Curtis Duncan with 63 catches, are the first quartet in NFL history to each catch 60 passes in a season.

The Oilers receivers need 29 combined receptions to break the NFL record 299 set last season by Washington's Art Monk (86), Ricky Sanders (80), Gary Clark (79) and Earnest Byner (54).

Excitement builds for Cotton Bowl

DALLAS (AP) - Not since the 1978 Notre Dame-Texas game has there been such excitement during Cotton Bowl week.

The matchup between No. 3 Texas (10-1) and No. 4 Miami (9-2), with the winner holding an outside shot at the national title, has drawn more fan and media interest than the 55-year-old bowl has seen in over a decade.

"Hoss, we could have sold, and I'm being conservative, over 100,000 tickets," said Cotton Bowl executive vice president Jim Brock. "We haven't had this much national focus on our game since 1978. We had our best presale in history."

The media response has been such that more than 100 credentials have been issued for seats in the stands.

"Needless to say CBS is ecstatic about the matchup," Brock said. "It's good for both of us to get such a big game with national implications."

The Texas-Miami matchup comes at an ideal time for the Cotton Bowl, which is negotiating a new contract with CBS that Brock hopes will carry the game into the mid-1990s.

"We've got a handshake deal with 'em right now," Brock said. "I think we'll get things worked out. We'd like to have a contract that carries us into the mid-90s."

Brock said the game which begins at 12:30 p.m. CST on New Year's Day could be a ratings blockbuster.

"We think we can carry the daytime TV slot ratings," Brock said. "Of course, it's hard to beat what the Orange Bowl can do in that primetime nighttime slot."

The Florida Citrus Bowl between No. 2 Georgia Tech and No. 19 Nebraska begins at 12:30 p.m., the same time as the Cotton Bowl.

Other days games on New Year's Day include the Gator Bowl between Michigan and Mississippi at 10:30 a.m. in Jacksonville, Fla., the Hall of Fame Bowl in Tampa, Fla., between Illinois and Clemson at noon, the Sunkist Fiesta Bowl between Alabama and Louisville at 3:30 p.m., and the Rose Bowl between Washington and Iowa at 4 p.m.

"There's just a ring about our game having Texas back for the first time in seven years, and, of course, the great Miami team, the defending national champions," Brock said. "It's got everybody fired up."

Brock said the Cotton Bowl didn't have to do much courting to get Miami to visit the bowl for the first time in history.

"I'd rather be lucky than good," Brock said. "When it became obvious Notre Dame was going to play Colorado in the Orange Bowl, then things just fell our way."

Texas bought over 20,000 tickets and Miami purchased some 10,000.

"Everything will be just great if we can get this bad weather cleared out," Brock said. "I promised UCLA I would take care of it two years ago and it was 70 degrees at kickoff. I may not make that promise this year. Looks like it could be a little nippy."

Long range forecasts call for near freezing weather by next Tuesday.

Miami was a touchdown favorite in only the fourth meeting between the two schools. Texas has a 2-1 edge.

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Farm and Ranch

Irrigation conference planned

Timely information on the availability, quality, cost and proper management of irrigation water will be presented in Amarillo Jan. 8 at the annual High Plains Irrigation Conference.

The conference will be at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, 7600 Amarillo Blvd., West, at 8:30 a.m. It is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and its Panhandle Economic Program.

Of keen interest to both agricultural producers and urban dwellers is the supply of water in the Ogallala Aquifer which sustains this area, said Leon New. He is an agricultural engineer and irrigation specialist with the Extension Service and conference

coordinator.

The quantity of water, factors influencing well capacity and prospects for the future will be discussed by Wayne Wyatt and Ken Carver, manager and assistant manager respectively, of the High Plains Underground Water District, Lubbock.

Making the most of money spent for water and fertilizer for corn, grain sorghum, wheat and other crops will be discussed by Tom Koranck of Servi-Tech, Ulysses, Kan. Planning, managing and evaluating irrigation will be the topic of Rex McCloy, Stinnett producer.

Major changes in irrigation systems are expensive, but so is continued use of inefficient systems,

says Dr. Steve Amosson, Extension Service economist and management specialist. He will compare costs of typical systems and show how producers can decide if changes are needed.

After lunch, the conference will focus upon safe use of irrigation systems to apply chemicals to a crop and maintain safe water supplies.

Two continuing education units (CEUs) are being offered to private and licensed commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicators who complete the conference training. Such applicators are required by the Texas Department of Agriculture to obtain five CEUs a year for recertification.

European farm trade uncertain

WASHINGTON (AP) - Trade analysts in the Agriculture Department say it is still unclear whether Eastern Europe will emerge as a long term, thriving market for U.S. farm products.

In fact, there is a possibility Eastern Europe will develop into a competitor of American grain products.

Mike Dwyer of the department's Foreign Agricultural Service said many people hope these countries will experience rapid growth as they move toward market economies.

But it is possible that Eastern Europe may show economic decline in the short run. If so, he said, that could mean some U.S. export opportunities as the countries try to make up the gap between supply and demand.

Dwyer, whose comments appeared in the January issue of AgExporter magazine, said he was "less optimistic" about U.S. sales to Eastern Europe over the long haul.

"Over the next five years, there is a real possibility that Eastern Europe (excluding the Soviet Union) could become a significant net exporter of some bulk agricultural products, such as grains, and thus emerge as a competitor with us," he said. "Until recently, they have been only marginal net exporters of grain."

Dwyer said he thinks certain sectors will emerge sooner than

others as the Eastern European countries retool their economies and global competitiveness.

"I believe agriculture, primarily grain and livestock, will be among the region's first sectors to emerge from this transition," he said. "Light industry, such as textiles and leather, also should do well."

Many of the countries already have fairly substantial farm economies and fertile land, Dwyer said. Consequently, some may emphasize grain and livestock products for export.

"While over the long run this does not bode well for expanding U.S. grain sales, it does offer opportunities for oil seeds (soybeans) and meal as a livestock feed for East European herds, which I expect will increase," he said. "Herd increases, in turn, may also boost sales of U.S. genetics."

But Eastern Europe's desire to export should also create some demand for U.S. cotton and cattle hides for the manufacture of textiles and leather.

"Over the very long term, as their economies really start to grow and their incomes rise, these East European countries may develop into markets for U.S. high-value products" that have already been processed, Dwyer said. "But that is going to take a while and we can expect intense competition from Eastern Europe itself as well as the European Community."

Vegetable safety, topic at meeting

A longstanding commitment to producing and handling vegetables in ways that ensure safety for growers, workers and consumers will be re-emphasized in the annual West Texas Vegetable Conference here Jan. 15.

The conference begins at 8:30 a.m. at the Hereford Community Center. It is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, High Plains Vegetable Growers and Shippers Council, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Tech University, Deaf Smith County Extension vegetable program development council and Texas Department of Agriculture. The \$25 registration fee includes lunch.

"Consumer safety is a basic component of the production and marketing of vegetables," said Dr. Roland E. Roberts, Extension Service vegetable specialist. He has coordinated the annual conferences since 1971.

"Grower and consumer safety has

been part of these educational programs since the conferences began in the 1960s," Roberts said. "Speakers this year will present research-based information which will enhance our farm productivity, conserve the natural resources of the Texas High Plains and emphasize safe production and a safe product."

Private applicators and licensed commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicators can obtain five continuing education units, required annually by TDA for recertification.

Capturing rainfall to save water and dollars will be addressed by Dr. David Bender, associate professor of horticulture with the Experiment Station, Lubbock, and Dr. Frank Dainello, Extension Service horticulturist, College Station.

Profitable market windows for High Plains vegetables and the impact of the 1990 federal farm bill will be explained by Dr. Charles Hall, Extension Service economist and horticulture marketing specialist,

College Station.

Levon Harmon, TDA pesticide specialist at Amarillo will explain pesticide applicator licenses, laws and regulations. Safe transportation of chemicals will be explained.

Ways to manage spinach diseases and weeds will be presented by Dainello and Bender.

An update on the Texas A&M University potato improvement program, Texsprout and the Texas pinkeye pea will be given by Dr. Creighton Miller, professor of horticulture at A&M, College Station. He will be assisted by Doug Smallwood, Experiment Station senior research associate at Lubbock, and Doug Scheuring, A&M, College Station.

Dr. Richard Zartman, associate professor of soil physics at Texas Tech, will report on development of summer-planted potatoes for fall harvest.

Consumer safety in High Plains vegetables and the Texas Food Safe

program will be discussed by Roberts and Dr. Al Wagner, A&M food technology specialist from College Station.

Dr. Charles Macharia and Dr. Ellen Peffley, Texas Tech horticulture faculty, will report on use of members of the onion family to control careless weeds.

Proper harvesting and handling of pinto beans will be shown in a videotape presentation by Roberts and Joe Bryant, Extension Service communications specialist, Lubbock.

Bob Cartwright of Oklahoma State University will present a global view of efforts to manage the diamondback moth. Work toward a control program for potato early blight will be reported by Dr. Harold Kaufman, Extension Service plant pathologist at Lubbock, and Bender.

Pesticide safety and the environment will be covered by Tony Pardo, Extension Service pesticide safety agent in Lubbock.

Commodity prices vary

WASHINGTON (AP) - Crop plantings and commodity prices will show some variations in the coming year as farmers settle down with the new farm law, an Agriculture Department report says.

Globally, the output of grain, oilseeds and meat is rising in 1990-91, the report said. But consumption is showing a more moderate growth, meaning that some

year-end inventories will be larger.

In the United States, the average prices in the 1990-91 marketing years for various crops will show a variety of reactions.

The average prices of wheat, milk, barley, oats and rice are expected to be lower than a year earlier, while the prices of corn, soybeans and most meats will hold about steady or rise slightly, the report said.

Meanwhile, the mix of crops farmers plant in 1991 will probably change more than in recent years, it said.

"Farmers will be reacting to the planting flexibility provisions of the new farm (law) and will be more responsive to changing market prices," the report said. "If yields revert to trend and planted acreage remains steady, foreign grain output could decline as well, perhaps lending some support to prices."

USSR searching for natural pest repellent

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Soviet Union has signed a new cooperative agreement with the Agriculture Department to continue looking for natural enemies of insect pests. And Moscow sent along hundreds of parasitic wasp eggs to help seal the pact.

Richard Soper of the department's Agricultural Research Service said the eggs - which were laid in larvae of the apple codling moth - were turned over to the agency recently by Nikolai Popov of Kishinev, Moldavia.

Popov is vice director of the All-Union Institute of Biological Methods in Plant Protection. He gave the larvae to the USDA agency on Dec. 20.

The USDA scientists hope the infested larvae can help conquer the codling moth, a major pest of apples in the United States.

"This pest is the proverbial worm in the apple," Soper said in a report issued by the agency. "But parasitic wasps lay their eggs on or inside the worm. Young wasps that emerge from the eggs then feed on the worm."

Soper said the wasps don't sting people or animals. He is the agency's national program leader for research on natural or biological pest controls.


The new cooperative agreement signed by Popov and USDA officials calls for further scientific explorations next year in the Soviet Union and the United States.

Food stockpiled

WASHINGTON (AP) - Reserve stockpiles of frozen food going into the holiday season were generally larger than they were a year ago, according to an Agriculture Department report.

Frozen beef was up 17 percent on Nov. 30 from year-earlier levels. Other inventory increases from a year earlier included: butter, up 37 percent; cheese, 29 percent; eggs, 29 percent; fruit juices, 17 percent; chicken, 14 percent; turkey, 29 percent; vegetables, 18 percent; and potatoes, 7 percent.

Inventories of frozen fruit, however, were down 7 percent, the report said. Total red meat supplies were down 3 percent because of a sharp decline in pork inventories.

Nearsightedness can be corrected by lens implant

Here's a sight we may be seeing in the not-too-distant future: A world where no one has to wear glasses or contact lenses! If that day ever comes, it will be partly because of an amazing eye operation that recently took place here in the United States, with the help of a surgeon from the Soviet Union.

Technically known as a high myopia intraocular lens implant, the surgery had been performed only abroad, until it came to the Neumann Eye Institute in central Florida.

In late October 1990, Dr. Albert Neumann, institute founder and medical director, assisted the pioneering Soviet ophthalmologist, Dr. Svyatoslav Fyodorov, in implanting the silicon lenses into the eyes of three Florida women. Before surgery, all three patients had vision worse than 20/400—"finger-count-only" visual acuity. That means they could count their fingers held 12 inches in front of the face—and that's about all. One day after surgery, vision was measured as 20/30 in two cases and 20/40 in the third—meaning the patients can now legally drive a car in Florida without glasses or contact lenses.

Intraocular lens implants have existed in this country for more than three decades, but to date have been performed only on cataract patients. In these cases, the cataracts—which cloud the natural lens and occlude the passage of light—are split up and flushed from the eye before the synthetic lens is implanted.

The new lens implant is intended at this point for patients with severe myopia, says Dr. Neumann. "With

the addition of this procedure, the Neumann Eye Institute now has 14 different kinds of eye surgery that can reduce or diminish a person's need for glasses or contacts.

Patients with milder myopia, or mild farsightedness (hyperopia), or astigmatism, would usually receive a treatment such as radial keratotomy or thermal radial keratoplasty developed by Professor Fyodorov in the Soviet Union and practiced by Dr. Neumann and others in the U.S.

Neither RK nor TRK involves a lens implant. Rather, radial patterns of incisions are made in the cornea, flattening the myopic eye or steepening the farsighted eye so that the visual image focuses on the retina, not before or behind it.

The future of the high myopia IOL procedure looks very promising. As Emily Torres, the 22-year-old Neumann patient from Daytona Beach says, "I've had to wear thick glasses since I was a kid. It's great to really see without glasses."

Viewers make 'home videos' successful

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Mailbags stuffed with fainting brides, singing dogs, polka-dancing chickens and maids into the privacy of the shower arrive daily at the busy shop that produces ABC's surprise hit, "America's Funniest Home Videos."

Programmers - and analysts of what the television audience wants to see - are agog at the reaction to the half-hour Sunday show, which has host Bob Saget introducing and narrating clips from home videos sent in by viewers.

Network television, which has lost viewers steadily over the past decade due in part to the advent of videocassettes, has found a way to bite back.

The midseason replacement series reached No. 1 in the A.C. Nielsen ratings for the second week of March, and a one-hour rerun special knocked venerable "60 Minutes" out of the Top 10 slot. It also has mugged "Murder, She Wrote."

In the cramped warren of rooms at ABC where "America's Funniest Home Videos" is made, executive producer Vic Di Bona oversees a hustling young staff of 70.

They have learned, this weary-eyed crew, some amazing trivia about America:

- There are still plenty of outhouses in this country, just waiting for someone with a Camcorder to kick open the door and astound the occupant. And spouses like to surprise each other in the shower with a video camera.

- There also are more folks than you realize who can make their bunched-up bellybuttons whistle out a tune.

- Nearly every kid in the nation sticks their face and hands into their first birthday cake.

The mailbags, bringing up to 1,800 tapes a day, are "America's Funniest Home Videos" lifeline.

"This is a show that is truly hard to mouth," said Di Bona. "If the country ain't funny, I ain't funny."

Di Bona said his weekly show costs around \$400,000. His material is free, but he claims his staff and equipment costs are considerably higher than other half-hour shows.

He estimates, for example, that the video machines purchased a few months ago are about to wear out. And because the tapes are of private events, clearances have to be obtained from featured characters before it can run.

But the cost still is about half the estimated \$800,000 a week needed to produce a Top 10 series like "The Cosby Show" or "Cheers," even with the \$10,000 awarded to the funniest home video each week.

ABC's censors have so far squelched just two of the clips Di Bona submitted. A youngster applying the nozzle of a running vacuum cleaner to his face was nixed, as was one of a baby crawling with a clear plastic mixing bowl over his head - too close to the eyes and nose, censors said.

Efforts to stage events are so poorly done that they have always been spotted, staff members claim.

A clip gets on the show after being viewed by a screener, who grades it on a scale from one to 10, with those with a five or below eliminated. The others are viewed by an assistant producer and move up the line before being selected. Most segments zoom along with pratfalls, snaky garden hoses, upchucking babies and brides tossing wedding bouquets into the twilight zone, but the producers are trying to pace the show with some longer pieces.

Bluster, bluff & brilliance balance new CBS hopeful

LOS ANGELES (AP) - In flawless English, Edward Woodward combines bluster, bluff and brilliance while he cons his way to finding killers in his new CBS series, "Over My Dead Body."

Woodward's character, Maxwell Beckett, is often pompous but also a touch nervous that the fraud about his actual Scotland Yard background will be discovered. However, he continues the charade in hopes that getting entwined in murder mysteries will revive the inspiration of his writing career.

Woodward previously spent four years in New York for "The Equalizer," a series that won him a devoted following. It inspired the publication of a number of newsletters and turned Woodward, now 60 and white-haired, into an unlikely sex symbol.

"Thank God my wife has a sense of humor," he says. "Me, too. I thought it started as a bit of fun, then it got picked up by the magazines. I must say it caused a great deal of mirth among my friends in England."

The new mystery-comedy is on Friday nights prior to "Dallas" in the CBS lineup. Woodward has his character fully defined:

"Maxwell pretends that he was a Scotland Yard detective, but actually he was in the criminal analysis department. It's a lie he has to live with. When we meet him he's moved to America, running out of mystery plots and in the middle of a messy divorce.

"He's irascible, short-fused, inclined to be pompous and feeling guilty about conning people. But he does have a talent for analyzing crime and what makes people tick. He has a terrible writer's block, and it makes him a very prickly individual."

On the set, Woodward's Beckett is trying to intimidate a woman into giving him information about a

murder. But he's halted in the middle of his bullying by Jessica Lundy, his co-star.

Woodward and Lundy are odd associates - far apart in age but well-matched in using each other in hopes of advancing their separate careers. She has the role of Nikki Page, a newspaper obituary writer. He hopes she'll bring him fresh material, and she sees him as her ticket to the big time.

"Over My Dead Body" brings the British actor to Los Angeles for his first dramatic work here. He won an Emmy in September as host-narrator of the documentary series "Remembering World War II."

He says there are no similarities between Maxwell Beckett of "Over My Dead Body" and Robert McCall of "The Equalizer."

"Maxwell is a physical coward," he says. "In every way he's different, except that he does have a good analytical mind."

Woodward suffered a heart attack three years ago and was reluctant to appear in another one-hour television series.

"I didn't want to do another series. I found the work unbelievably hard," he says.

But he consented to do "Over My Dead Body" because the series would bring him home to England in two years.

"The main problem is that I have a 7-year-old daughter who was in pre-school in New York, school in England and now Los Angeles. It's a great experience for a child to move around, but when she turns 9 I want her to have a consistent education."

Woodward negotiated a contract that the show will move to England after the first two TV seasons. That will allow his daughter, Emily Beth, to attend school there - while he and his wife, Michele Dotrice, move back into their home in Cornwall. He has three grown children by a previous marriage.

"If we're successful and move to Great Britain I'll twist arms to shoot in Cornwall. But we'll probably stay around London. The story will be that Maxwell moves back home and Nikki follows."

Woodward also keeps a home in London, where he was born.

During his break between "The Equalizer" and his new series, Woodward stayed busy playing Sherlock Holmes in England and making "Mr. Johnson" in Africa.

The movie "Mr. Johnson" is due out in January. Like two of his other films, "Breaker Morant" and "King David," it was directed by Bruce Beresford.

"The title character is a 17-year-old African," he says. "I'm Sgt. Gollup, who runs a shop in Nigeria in 1926. Mr. Johnson is his clerk. He was left behind by the British Empire and retires in Nigeria. He's a most astonishing bigot. He thinks he's a great gentleman to the African."

While in school, Woodward had planned to become a journalist, but participation in a series of college productions changed his mind. He studied at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts. He made his stage debut in London, then joined the Royal Shakespeare Theatre Co. in Stratford-On-Avon. He also performed Shakespeare on tours of India, Australia, South Africa and the Soviet Union.

"The Russians know the plays, but it's interesting to watch the audience hearing Shakespeare in its native tongue for the first time. Shakespeare is played quite differently in Russia. We had three Americans in the company and they were absolutely mobbed by the audience. They were starved for contact with Americans. We Brits said the Americans and the Russians were alike. They each have a passion for their country, love outdoor pursuits and have an enormous involvement with the arts."

Religious freedom top religion story

NEW YORK (AP) - The wave of religious freedom sweeping over Eastern Europe and the efforts of Western religious groups to bring the church in from the cold was the top religion news story of 1990, according to a poll.

Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev, who won the 1990 Nobel Peace Prize for his role in introducing democratic changes in Eastern Europe and easing East-West conflicts, also was selected as religion newsmaker of the year for the second year in a row in the voting by 45 members of the Religion Newswriters Association. Evangelist Billy Graham finished second.

In the Soviet Union, official tolerance for religion has increased greatly since Gorbachev came to power in 1985. In the last two years, many churches have been reconsecrated and Soviet citizens have flocked to services in record numbers.

The Soviet legislature this fall approved a freedom of conscience bill that forbids the government from interfering in the practice of religion, formally ending decades of repression.

With the door to evangelism opened, many Western churches are sponsoring missionary efforts in Eastern Europe, bringing in teachers,

preachers, equipment, building funds and Bibles.

Sex scandals took second place in the poll. Roman Catholic Archbishop Eugene A. Marino resigned July 10 after revelations of an "intimate relationship" with a young woman, and the Rev. Allen Boesak resigned Aug. 10 as president of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches after admitting an extramarital affair with a married television producer. The Rev. Bruce Ritter left the Covenant House organization he founded amid accusations by male youths of sexual affairs. He has denied wrongdoing.

The continuing conflict in the nation's largest Protestant denomination, the Southern Baptist Convention, ranked third. Conservatives elected a fundamentalist to the presidency and fired the two top editors of the denomination's press service, and moderates withheld some funds from convention agencies.

In fourth place was the suspension of two Lutheran congregations in San Francisco by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America for ordaining and installing acknowledged homosexuals. Presiding Episcopal Bishop Edmond L. Browning reprimanded Bishop John Spong of Newark, N.J., for ordaining a declared homosexual, the Rev. Robert Williams. Spong later suspended Williams for making public remarks disparaging monogamy and the celibacy of Mother Teresa.

A historic conference of South African black and white churches condemning the policy of racial separation known as apartheid ranked fifth. Anti-apartheid leader Nelson Mandela, released from prison Feb. 11, received financial and moral support from U.S. religious leaders on a summer tour.

A Supreme Court ruling upholding the denial of unemployment benefits to two drug counselors fired for using peyote, an illegal, hallucinogenic drug, in an American Indian religious ceremony ranked sixth. Religious leaders expressed concern the ruling overturned past precedent that the government must show a "compelling state interest" to force compliance with a law that conflicts with a religious practice.

In seventh place was the efforts of U.S. religious leaders to urge non-military solutions to the Persian Gulf crisis. The assassination of Rabbi Meir Kahane, an anti-Arab militant, ranked eighth.

In ninth place were Catholic guidelines on theologians and church-affiliated universities. The decision by U.S. Catholic bishops to hire a public relations firm to oppose abortion rounded out the top 10.

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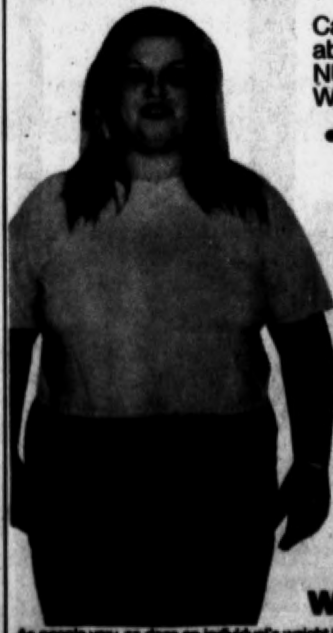
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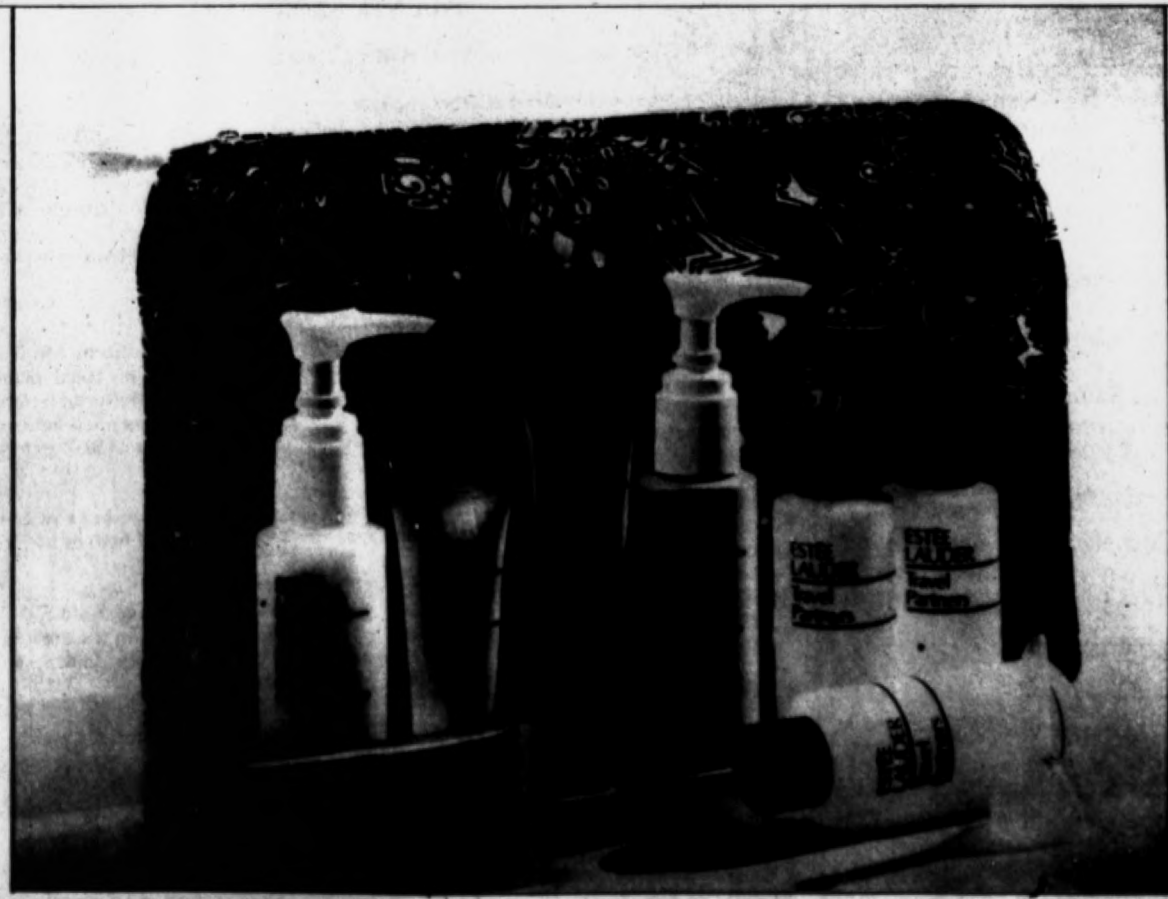

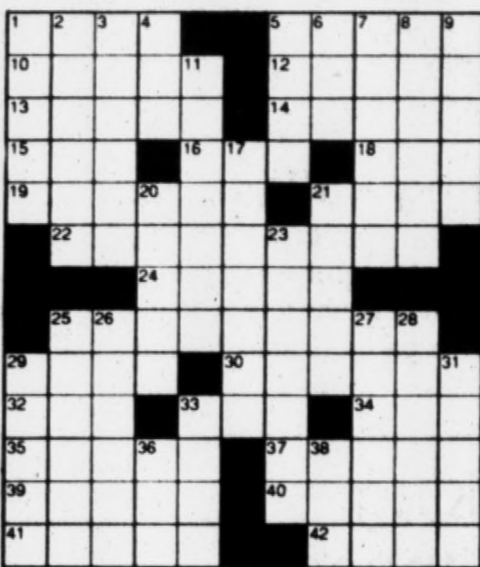

Are you a DES daughter?

Between 1941 and 1971, three to six million pregnant women in the United States took DES (diethylstilbestrol), a drug doctors prescribed to help prevent miscarriages. Then in 1971, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration banned the use of DES during pregnancy based on research findings that the daughters of women who took the drug had a higher risk of developing a rare form of vaginal cancer, called clear-cell adenocarcinoma.

Women who were exposed to DES in the womb are at greater risk of this rare form of cancer and of other reproductive system problems. Fortunately, however, after several decades of studying DES daughters, we now know that the chance of these women developing clear-cell adenocarcinoma is very small--about one in 1,500. And other reproductive system problems that can develop as a result of DES exposure are generally not dangerous and often can be successfully prevented or treated.

One unfortunate consequence of exposure to the drug, however, has been pregnancy problems experienced by DES daughters. Some of these women have shortened fallopian tubes or an abnormally shaped uterus which can lead to tubal pregnancy, miscarriage, premature birth, and possible infertility.

One of the most common conditions found in DES exposed women is adenosis, the presence of a type of tissue in the vagina that is not usually found there. DES daughters should be sure to have regular Pap tests so the doctor can monitor these abnormal areas for changes that could lead to cancer.

Because DES daughters may have unique health problems requiring special medical care, it is important for all women to find out if they were exposed to DES. The first step is to ask your mother whether she took any drugs to prevent miscarriage when she was pregnant with you. Often it is possible to obtain medical records from the clinic where your mother had her prenatal care to help determine if she was prescribed DES in any form.

If you suspect that you were exposed, you should have a special screening examination by a doctor who is experienced in examining DES daughters. This exam will help detect the presence of any abnormalities that might be caused by the drug. If the doctor finds signs of exposure, he or she will probably recommend regular exams every six months to a year.

In most cases, being a DES daughter won't change your life in any significant way. Try to look upon it simply as part of your medical history which you and your doctor will discuss and follow closely.

Hints for mothers-to-be

Even before a child is conceived there are a number of things a mother-to-be can do to prepare for pregnancy and increase her chances of giving birth to a healthy baby.

First, you should try to get as close to your ideal weight as you can. Your drinking should be limited and you should stop smoking. Beyond the obvious health hazards, cigarette smoking affects the nutritional status of a young woman. For example, there's evidence vitamin C levels are lower in the blood of cigarette smokers than in non-smokers, suggesting that smoking depletes this vitamin.

VITA program offers free tax help to some

The Internal Revenue Service's volunteer income tax assistance program is beginning its 21 year. The VITA program provides free tax help to lower-income elderly, non-English speaking and handicapped individuals.

If you enjoy helping people and working with them to make a difficult

task easier, VITA may be for you.

VITA volunteers include college students, members of professional business organizations, members of retirement, religious and civic groups. Generally, volunteers learn how to prepare a simple tax return by successfully completing a special training course in basic income tax

return preparation.

VITA instructors and training materials are provided free by the IRS. A training class has been scheduled for Jan. 14-16, 1991 at the Hereford Senior Citizens Center located at 426 Ranger.

Upon successful completion of the training class, volunteers will be able to fill out form 1040EZ, form 1040A and basic form 1040, including schedule A, which is used for itemizing deductions. They also will be familiar with such credits as child care credit, credit for the elderly and earned income credit. Assistance is provided at community locations such as libraries, churches and community centers.

Volunteers are used in many different ways. For example,

volunteers help set up and organize sites, while others do the local publicity for a site. IRS says, "if you have a talent and would like to help, VITA can find a way to involve you in the program." Last year nearly 65,000 VITA volunteers assisted taxpayers at over 7,400 sites in numerous communities across the country. 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Nutrition Notes

EAT HEALTHY

The "goodies" that we all enjoy during the holiday season are traditional but can complicate our "diets."

One needs to remember that healthy eating can be summed up in a few words: balance, variety and moderation. The foundation of good health is a well-balanced, variety and moderation make it happen.

These facts are very important to each and every person and need to be kept in mind when we are tempted to indulge, especially to an excessive degree in the holiday cheer delicacies.

Balance in the diet is achieved by getting the right amount of nutrients in the right proportions and not taking in more calories than you use.

More than 40 nutrients are needed for good health and no one food has them all. To get all the vitamins, mineral, fiber, protein, carbohydrates and essential fats required, one's food plan should include selections from

all the daily food choices which insure variety.

To keep calories in check, watch portion sizes. Moderation also means keeping an eye on fat, sugar and salt intake. If you love hamburgers, french fries and ice cream, you don't have to give them up—just eat smaller amounts less frequently.

Good nutrition starts with healthful thinking one needs to separate fact from fiction. Several examples:

1. You adore hot fudge sundaes. If you eat one, just balance the next few days with foods lower in fat and calories.

2. Vegetables in creamy sauces can be loaded with saturated fats. Choose plain vegetables more often.

3. You splurge on a piece of chocolate cake and think you should go without dinner. Never skip meals to compensate for extra calories—it's important to establish a regular eating pattern. Three balanced meals a day aren't always possible—well-planned, healthful snacks in between smaller meals will provide the nutrients you

need without going overboard on calories.

* The exception to this advice is that if you have a health problem and you need a more structured daily intake, always adhere to those guidelines.

4. You eat oat bran cereal everyday so do not need to worry about saturated fats or cholesterol in your other meals. No one type of soluble fiber is a magic cure to lower cholesterol—it's your total diet that counts.

Good eating habits are just one of the variables that can maximize health. Exercise is another factor; diet and physical activity work hand in hand to maintain a fit, healthy body.

The Beach Boys will sing two of their biggest hits, "Kokomo" and "Good Vibrations;" Bell Biv DeVoe offer their current chart hit, "B.B.D.," and "Let Me Know Something," a cut from their debut album, *Poison*; The Kentucky Headhunters will be doing their top-15 hit of 1990, "Dumas Walker," and "My Daddy Was a Milkman" from their platinum *Pickin' on Nashville* album; Nelson, headed by the twin sons of the late rock 'n' roller Rick Nelson, will sing their two current hits, "Love and Affection" and "After the Rain;" The O'Jays will world premiere their new single, "Don't Let Me Down;" and Sweet Sensation will offer their No. 1 hit of the past year, "If Wishes Came True." The group will also perform the Supremes' classic "Love Child."

While Clark's segments are live, if only on the east coast, Blackwood and Wagner's are taped. In fact they've already finished shooting.

In a recent interview, Blackwood commented that she first met Dick Clark while working at MTV. It was as if she already knew him: "We grew up with Dick Clark, right? And I thought

to myself, 'You're the guy that really started this music on TV.'

"I feel very proud when I do get to work with him because he's a little icon of pop history," she continued. "And doggone if that guy doesn't look younger every time I see him!"

On the cutting edge herself, the former VJ with the distinctive do

dabbled with music video-making prior to MTV's existence. After having VJ-ed a couple of music video projects that didn't see air time, she responded to MTV's want ad in the classifieds and was the first VJ hired. In November, the original group of VJs got together for an "MTV Reunion Weekend."

We were careful to ask Blackwood the most important questions about the special like, "What did you wear?" "Who did you kiss at midnight?" and lastly, "What's your favorite club?" Blackwood said she wore a burgundy velvet dress ("tasteful and comfortable — the two prerequisites of my wardrobe") and Wagner wore a black velvet suit. At midnight the co-anchors kissed each other ("a Hollywood kiss, of course"). As far as her favorite night spot, Blackwood says it would have to be the China Club in New York City — next only to Vertigo. At the China Club you never know who might show up to perform — David Bowie or perhaps Julian Lennon.

Despite having kissed hunky Jack Wagner at midnight, Blackwood said that just before they began taping the special she felt compelled to call her husband: "I said to him, 'You know, this sounds really silly, but this really feels like New Year's, and I want to wish you a Happy New Year before I wish anybody else.'" © TV Listing Inc.

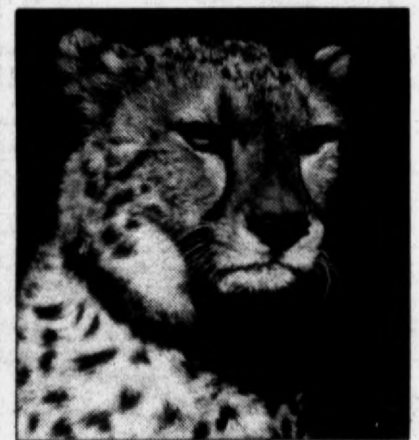

For the 102nd year, a ribbon of floats and bands will adorn the streets of Pasadena during the 1991 Tournament of Roses Parade on New Year's Day.

The gala affair will kick off the 77th Rose Bowl, the granddaddy of all bowl games, with Washington and Iowa as contenders.

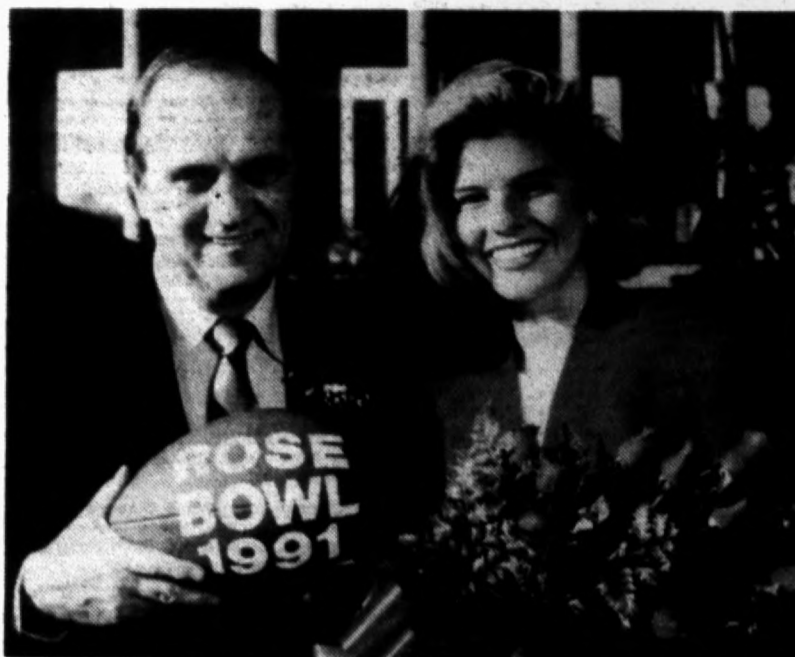
ABC will carry both the parade and the game. CBS and NBC will broadcast the parade only.

Sixty floats, 22 musical units and over 275 equestrians will line the 5-1/2-mile parade stretch. At its head will be this year's grand marshal, Bob Newhart. Accompanying the popular comedian will be his wife of 27 years, Ginnie, daughters Jennifer, 19, and Courtney, 13, and sons Rob, 27, and Tim, 24.

Newhart said his clan was a little nervous about the upcoming event: "They're not used to being in the spotlight. But I'm sure it will be something they never forget." There was a bit of a quiver in Newhart's voice when he described his numerous duties as grand marshal — from leading the parade, to appearing at teas and dinners, to the coin toss at the game, and pictures with the Rose Queen.

1991's Rose Queen is 17-year-old Cara Payton Rullman from San Marino High School.

Newhart was accorded his honor after having been selected by tournament president Roy L. Coats. "It's a salute to comedy. It's not so much a salute to me," said Newhart modestly, explaining this year's theme is "Fun 'n' Games." Newhart now stands among former grand marshals and comedians Bob Hope, Danny Kaye, Edgar Bergen and Harold Lloyd.

Football bowls viewers over

It happens every year. The battle lines are drawn over who is No. 1 in college football.

However, the controversy over which college football team should be anointed the finest in the land rages particularly strong in this season that has seen five different pretenders toppled from the heady heights of No. 1.

Someday in the foreseeable future, the traditional college bowls will be scrapped in favor of a playoff system. But until that time, the mythical national champion will continue to be crowned by a fickle combination of the country's coaches and sportswriters.

With bowl invitations being unofficially extended earlier and earlier each year, several of 10 bowls being aired by the three major networks ended up shooting themselves in the foot. However, at least three bowls should garner big numbers in the ratings game.

NBC has the big winner in the New Year's Day prime-time Orange Bowl game between top-ranked Colorado and Notre Dame, ranked fifth after two trips to the top of the polls. If the Irish knock off the Buffaloes, the winner of the CBS Cotton Bowl clash between No. 3 Texas and No. 4 Miami will have a legitimate claim to No. 1. A win by second-ranked Georgia Tech over Nebraska in the Citrus Bowl on ABC could further cloud the No. 1 debate.

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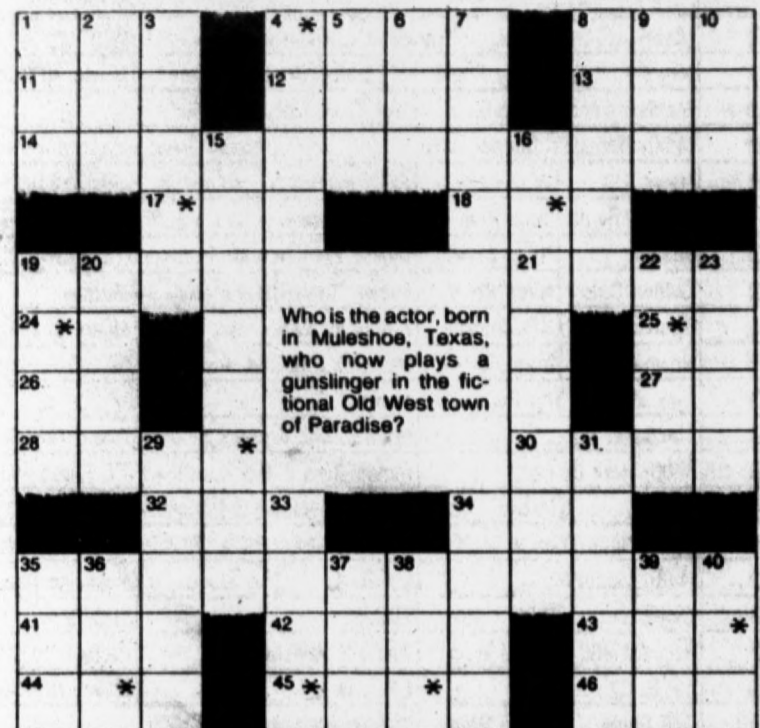

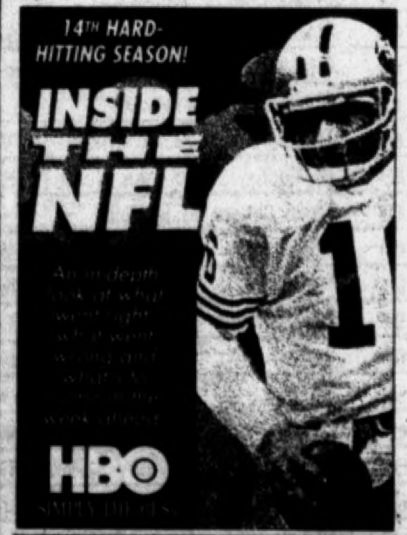

Parades, specials provide good fun

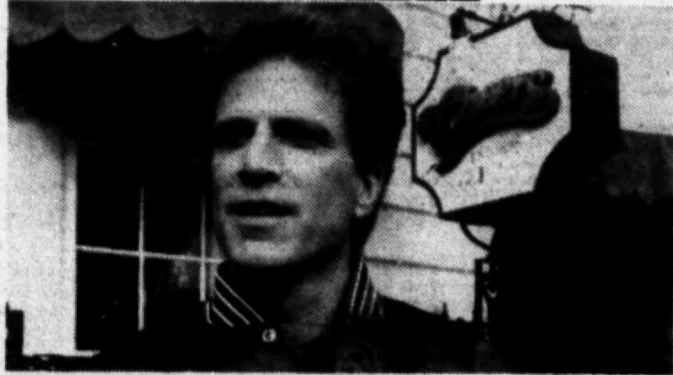

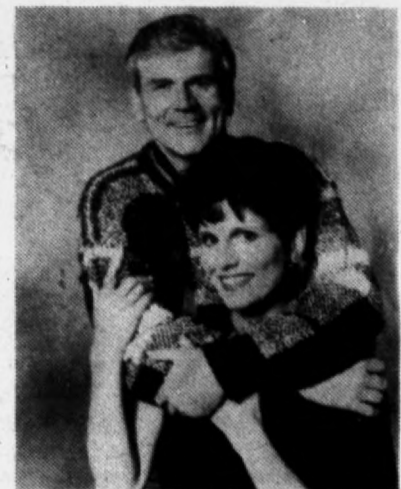
