Student enjoys chance to 'practice' on English

Birgitte Kjaersgaard does not consider herself a world traveler, but after visiting 13 different countries and living in three, she has seen a lot of countryside and experienced several cultures.

Kjaersgaard is a foreign exchange student from Denmark at Hereford High School. She is staying with Gene and Cynthia Streun and is in the United States on the International Educational Foreign Exchange program.

"I was born in Denmark, but our family moved to Saudi Arabia when I was five," said the 18-year-old. "I started school in Saudi Arabia at an American International School."

Since that time, she has moved back and forth between Denmark and Saudi Arabia.

Kjaersgaard has had a strong English-speaking educational background that contributes to her fluency.

"One of the reasons I wanted to come to the U.S. is to learn to speak English better," said Kjaersgaard, whose favorite subject in school is English. "I went to an English school and an American school in Saudi Arabia. The main difference between all the schools is discipline."

Kjaersgaard said the American school was the most fun and the English was most strict.

"In Denmark, we go to school at 9 a.m. some days and 10 a.m. some days and we aren't punished for being tardy," she said. "Here, we are required to call the teachers by their last names and punishment for tardiness is very harsh compared to Denmark."

"I like going to school in Hereford. I enjoy being able to get involved in

activities, we didn't do that in Denmark.

"Denmark is much more free in general than the U.S. or Saudi Arabia. I was surprised when the Hereford police came in during a party. Police don't do that where I'm from. I guess that's because the drinking age is different."

Kjaersgaard said travel is easier in Denmark. "We can catch a train or a bus to go to town or anywhere, here you have to have a car and since I can't drive while I'm here I have to have someone take me everywhere."

Saudi Arabia was different from any other place she has lived because of the Arab culture.

"When I lived in Saudi Arabia, we lived in a compound. Your friends were kids who lived in the compound with you," she said. "Women are not allowed to drive or work. The Arab men treat European women nasty and they say nasty things to them when they see them on the street."

"In Saudi Arabia we were not allowed to go to parties or to movies." As a part of her travels, the traveling Kjaersgaard wanted to come to the U.S. and the exchange program was a good way for her to get here.

She was in the U.S. with her family when she was eight but wanted to return after watching American teenage movies.

"I wanted to see what the U.S. teens' life was like," she giggled. "I wanted to go to a prom and football games."

"I love it in Hereford and in Texas," she said. "The town was totally different than where I'm from. It's so spread out and there are so

many cows. The people here are very friendly, too."

Living in Hereford has given Kjaersgaard opportunities she didn't have anywhere else.

"I've always wanted to be an actress. Here I take theatre arts, which wasn't offered in Denmark." Kjaersgaard hopes to get cast in school plays.

Like most teen-aged girls, she enjoys shopping, going to movies and hanging around with friends.

While she is in the U.S., Kjaersgaard hopes to visit the mountains in Colorado and see her sister in Connecticut over Christmas.

After returning to Denmark in June, Kjaersgaard will finish her education as an apprentice in an office. She would also like to continue her travels by visiting Australia.

Tragedy sparks help in Pampa

PAMPA (AP) - On July 20, 1989, a gunman's bullet forever changed the lives of the Spurrier family. If Bill Spurrier has his way, that bullet will have a direct impact on violent crime victims throughout the nation.

Sometime between 1 p.m. and 2:18 p.m. that day, a person entered One Hour Photo in this Texas Panhandle city. The owner, E.P. "Pete" Spurrier, was alone. His wife, Dolores, had left the business for a brief period to buy flowers.

Only two people know what happened while Mrs. Spurrier was gone. One never will be able to tell his story. The other one hasn't so far.

Shortly after 2 p.m., a customer found Spurrier lying behind the counter. A cash drawer was sitting on the counter - empty. Spurrier had been shot once in the back on the head. Police suspected robbery was the motive for his slaying. There has been no indictment in the case.

Greg Francis Braun, 29, of Garden City, Kan., has been charged in four similar slayings in Oklahoma, Kansas

and New Mexico that occurred in the same week as Spurrier's killing. Braun has been linked to the Spurrier case through a gun in his possession at the time of his arrest in New Mexico.

District Attorney Harold Comer of Pampa said ballistics tests show a .25-caliber shell casing found near Spurrier's body was fired from the gun Braun had when he was arrested, but there were no fingerprints, and the bullet that killed Spurrier was too fragmented to be used as evidence.

The cold facts of Pete Spurrier's killing hit television stations, radio and newspapers within hours after his death.

But none of the news stories could describe what Dolores Spurrier and her three children were going through.

No one reported that the bullet that ended Pete Spurrier's life also ended Dolores Spurrier's life as she knew it.

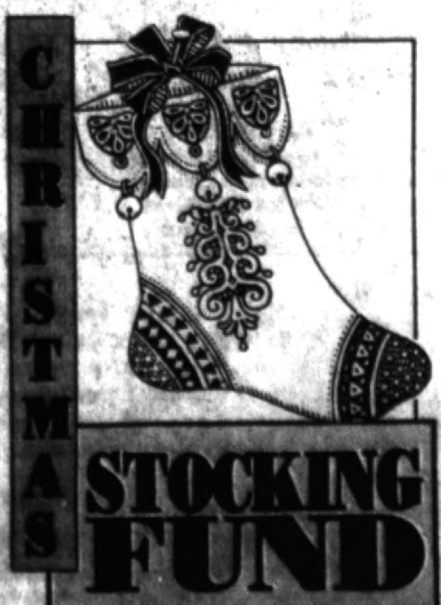

She had to find thousands of dollars for funeral expenses. She found she could not run the business her source of income - alone in the immediate aftermath of her husband's death. She closed it for two months, as the bills piled up. When she reopened the store, she lost many former customers who apparently found it too awkward to face her or to return to the scene of a murder. She could not run the store without help, but she could not afford to hire anyone. Her car was repossessed.

"Financially, she was devastated," said her son, Bill. "She didn't have time to grieve. The bills didn't stop just because my dad died. If she had a good financial advisor, she would have been told to file bankruptcy and shut (the business) down."

Bill and his family, who live 40 miles from Pampa in Fritch, had their own emotional battles to fight after his father's murder. "I am not the same person I was before July 20, 1989," he said. He

and his wife, Janet, constantly battled the grief, anger and fear caused by Pete Spurrier's death, while trying to help his mother.

They wrote letters to congressmen, state representatives and senators seeking some sort of financial aid for their mother. They researched all they could find about groups to provide counseling and emotional support for victims of violent crimes.

Most inquiries drew a blank. The state's victim compensation plan did help, but the available aid was much less than the losses. Mrs. Spurrier received approximately \$3,000 toward the funeral - still far short of the cost. She was paid \$120 a week for lost wages during the two months her business was closed. Meanwhile, her payments for photo processing machines alone were \$1,426 a month.

Eventually, on the advice of a good friend and church pastor, Bill decided to turn his anger to action to help others.

He formed the E.P. "Pete" Spurrier Foundation for Victims of Violent Crime Inc. He is in the process of obtaining tax exempt status for the organization.

"My reason is that there are so many victims asking for help, and they don't know where to get it," he said.

The foundation will provide both financial assistance and emotional counseling to victims of violent crimes and their families, and also help them find competent legal and financial advice.

Spurrier also hopes to educate the general public about the depth of emotional and financial trauma caused by violent crime.

"The general public does not realize what victims go through," Bill said. "Ninety percent of the time when I start talking about it, they stop me and say 'You should get counseling,' or 'That is really terrible,' and walk away. In other words, (they're saying) 'Don't burden me with your problems.' ...

The family requests memorials be to a favorite charity.

"The most heartbreaking thing for any victim is for someone to come up and say 'I understand' when they don't," he said.

Bill says he worries that employers don't understand what victims and their families go through.

He says he sometimes even worries about his own job.

"I'm wondering if I'll blow up at work and get fired for it. They wouldn't take (his traumatic experiences) into consideration. But I try to prevent that by trying to dedicate so much time to doing this," he says. He spends 30 or 40 hours a week on his foundation, in addition to working full time.

"I know the company I work for doesn't know how to handle me," he said. "I'm not going to take what I took before without saying anything. I've learned that if I don't speak up, no one else will. Maybe through this, they can learn to cope with the victim and try to help them get through the rough times."

Janet Spurrier supports her husband's efforts. She says she feels as victimized as the others in the Spurrier family.

"I've had to sit and watch it basically destroy my mother-in-law and my husband," she said. "I'm angry because it took Pete away from me. It also took away our Christmases and Thanksgivings and mine and Bill's comfort of being here and an anger I have never known. It has made me not trust. It has made me scared."

"I think the foundation is wonderful. I've watched so many times when Bill and Dolores tried to talk to someone and they say 'You need help,' but wouldn't listen to what they had to say," she added.

"We were living a normal life and suddenly it's torn apart. And we didn't do anything. We know what we've been through is unimaginable and we want to be able to help other people get through this," Janet said.

"I want the victims to know there is someone they can call. I may not be able to offer anything but talk, but I'll sure do that," Bill said.

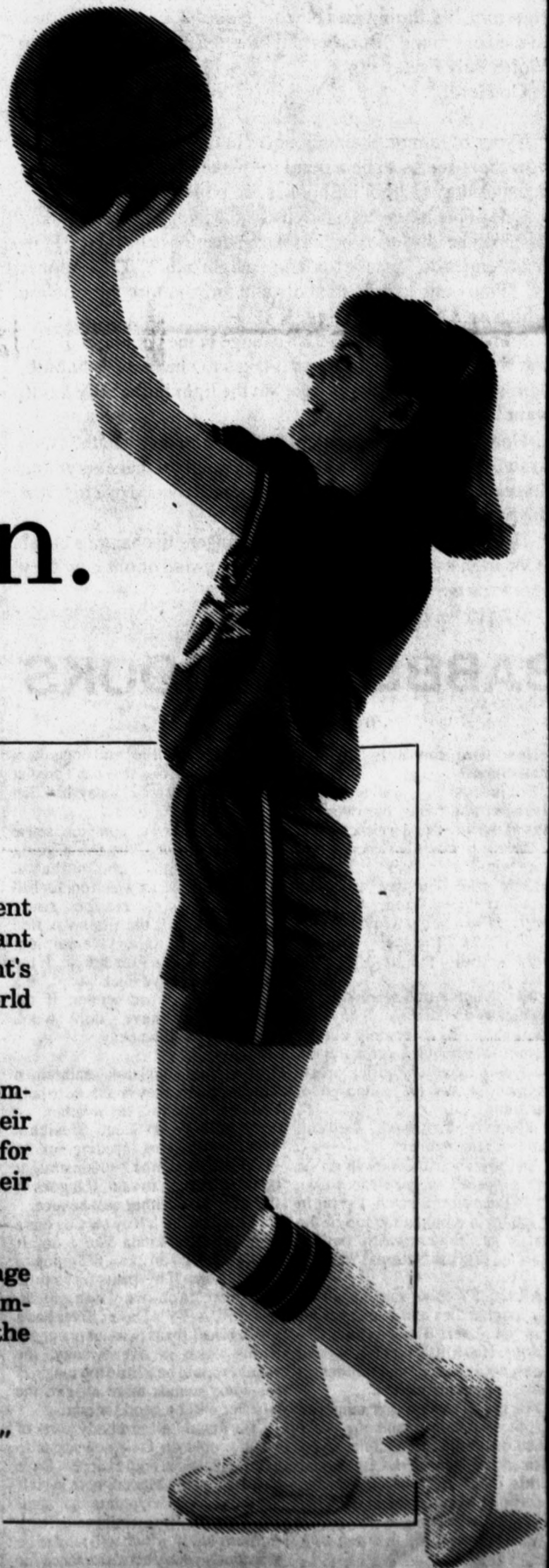

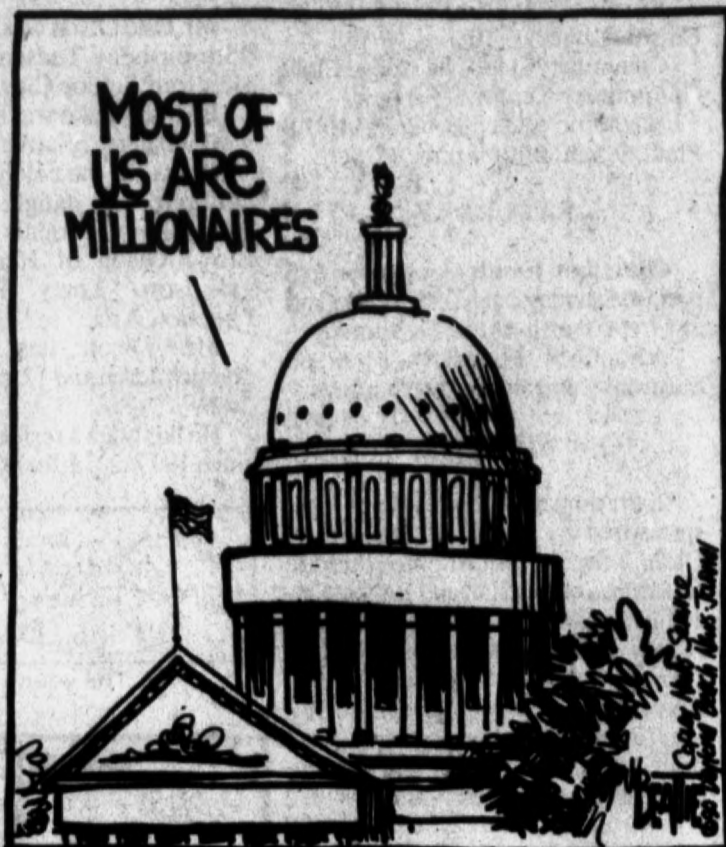
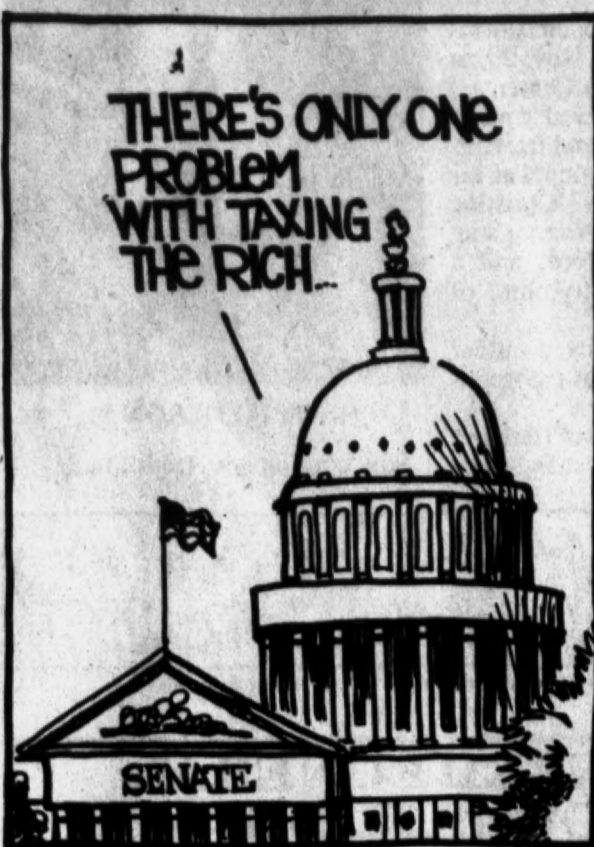
All of our television weathermen have attributes they could use to help them better predict the weather.

Democracy sometimes is messy

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Bush's Persian Gulf policy is being tested on the home front in Senate hearings this week and next, forums for debate and defense of the course that threatens war with Iraq.

Force, at least the threat of it, is an option Bush wants strengthened, not put into question. To that end, he needs solid, not slipping support in Congress and the country.

Congressional policy questions could serve his aim, but only if the administration can deliver answers that rally political support for the president's course.

And there also is the risk that policy hearings will reinforce doubts. That's happened before: Senate hearings became an early rallying point for opposition to Vietnam War policy a generation ago.

Since debate is inevitable in a prolonged confrontation, the administration task will not be easy. As Secretary of State James A. Baker III observed, democracy can sometimes be messy.

That's a special problem in the 16th week of a crisis in which the threatening message is crucial, but the public support behind it appears to be

fraying. The White House has said the administration welcomes a national discussion of the U.S. role in the Persian Gulf - but that differing views should signal no lack of will or purpose in confronting Iraq.

The Senate Armed Services Committee opens three days of hearings on Tuesday. Baker is to testify before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on Dec. 5, as part of a two-day policy review there. House hearings are likely, too.

While Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney has spoken approvingly of public hearings and the debate they will bring, he is not on the witness list for next week's sessions. He had been invited to lead off, but neither he nor other administration officials were on the schedule issued Wednesday.

That yields the first phase of the public review to statements by former Cabinet and defense officials, some of them critical of administration policy.

Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., the committee chairman, has raised critical questions about it, too, since Bush's Nov. 8 order that U.S. forces in Saudi Arabia be doubled to about 400,000. In inviting Cheney to testify, Nunn said he wanted to ask about the rationale for that move.

Nunn, the Democrats' leading man

on defense matters, has said that if those forces are to be used in an offensive operation, Bush must get congressional approval in advance. He says the reinforcements represented a chance in policy, from the original mission of deterring any Iraqi move against Saudi Arabia and enforcing the United Nations economic embargo.

Nunn also has questioned the wisdom of a course that could lead to a ground war in the desert, suggesting that air power could be used instead if it comes to combat. In addition, he has asked how the administration would meet U.S. military responsibilities elsewhere in the world with so large a force committed to the Middle East.

Cheney and Gen. Colin Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, have appeared twice before at open congressional hearings on the Persian Gulf operation. So has Baker. And all of them have been back to the Capitol to brief groups of senators and House members in closed sessions. Bush says he has been consulting with Congress, too, "more than any other president in history."

But that process didn't work to the congressional satisfaction before Bush announced the increase in troop strength. There was advance notice

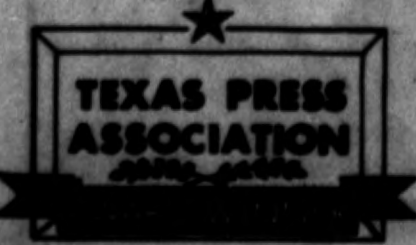
If his experience discourages other would-be candidates with few qualifications except fat bank accounts from entering future races, Williams will have performed a valuable public service.

SHOULDER INJURIES

NEW YORK (AP) - Space science techniques are being used to study new ways of treating shoulder injuries.

Dr. Louis Bigliani of New York's Columbia University Medical Center is creating computerized models of the shoulder's anatomy and functions from three-dimensional photographs of shoulder joints, a method originally developed to map the earth from space.

The research, funded by Bristol-Myers Squibb, has shown new ways to manipulate ligaments, muscles and tendons for improved stability and flexibility through surgery or exercise, Bigliani says.

An estimated 180,000 shoulder injuries occur in the United States each year.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: I'm having a big problem with my mother. She was married to my father for 18 years. They had four daughters. I am 27, the oldest. Our parents' divorce was bitter and they put us girls in the middle.

I don't have the time or energy to see her through the never-ending brawls, knowing that as soon as her lip heals and her eyes get back to normal, she will go back to her crazy husband.

I have begged Mom to get counseling but she says she doesn't believe in "that stuff." How do I let her know I can't handle a relationship with her as long as she insists on staying with her husband? -- Bewildered in Washington

DEAR WASHINGTON: I recommend you not give your mother safe harbor after Dean has knocked her around, even though it may sound cruel.

You are being an "enabler" by providing your mother with a place to go after each beating. The Whitefaces led by only 12-10 after the first quarter, but scored 22

in the second stanza and posted a 34-18 halftime lead.

In the Gruver game earlier Friday, Cornelius tallied 20 points and Grotegut chipped in 13. Hereford was down by 12-11 after one period, but rebounded for a 24-18 lead at

intermission. The Whiteface pulled away with 22 points in the third quarter to take a 45-39 advantage.

A cold second quarter spelling the difference as Hereford bowed to Sudan in the opening round by a 44-36 count. The score was knotted at 10

after one quarter, but Sudan outscored the Whitefaces by 18-7 in the second period. Hereford outscored Sudan by three points in the second half but couldn't regain the lead. Cornelius was high for Hereford with 14 points in that game.

Crosby wins thriller Friday

Down 30-21 when Crosby quarterback Jeff West scored for the third time with just 2:17 remaining, Athens roared back behind Class 4A's leading passer in a Class 4A high school football playoff game.

But Hornets' kicker Chris West missed a 27-yard field goal with 1 second to play at Kyle Field in College Station Friday night, enabling Crosby (7-2-2) to hold off Athens, 30-28.

Jeff West rushed for 184 yards on 28 carries, including TD runs of 20, 3 and 4 yards, but his fumble preceded a 30-yard touchdown pass from Athens quarterback Blake Armstrong to Marcus Whitehead with 58 seconds to play, and Athens pulled to within 30-28.

An onside kick try failed, and Crosby had only to run out the clock. But West fumbled again, and after a 60-second conference, officials awarded the ball to Athens. Armstrong took the Hornets to the Crosby 11 in five plays, but the field goal try with 1 second left was no good.

In another high school thriller, Schulenburg ran its record to 12-0 in a Class 2A game, beating Mason, 13-12. Mason drove 87 yards in 24 plays for a touchdown with 1 second left in the game. Trailing in penetrations, Mason went for a 2-point conversion, but Schulenburg's Kelvin Thompson intercepted to seal the victory.

Groveton, the defending Class 2A state champion, won its 12th game of the year and extended its winning streak to 28 games with a 42-12 pounding of Overton. Rodney Thomas, the state's leading rusher with 2,779 yards and 218 points in 12 games, scored on runs of 70, 1, 31 and 75 yards.

Also in 2A, Joaquin was unbeaten, but couldn't handle Alto, whose only loss this season was to Groveton. Alto's Yellowjackets ran up 570 yards, with Derrick Blakemore rushing for 223 yards, Chad Pope 134 yards and Arthur Bruton 105 yards in a 57-0 rout.

In a big school Class 5A game, Humble Kingwood had its eye not on the goal line but on the first down chain in the closing moments of its battle with Galveston Ball at Rice Stadium in Houston.

The score was tied, 14-14, and Ball had possession with time running out in the game. With penetrations tied at two apiece, Ball had a 10-9 lead in first downs and could advance in the playoffs by just using up the rest of the clock.

Coaches like to play them "one game at a time" - and one game is all the 10-0 San Francisco 49ers and 10-0 New York Giants have left before their mammoth collision Dec. 3.

The would-be spoilers are the Los Angeles Rams (3-7), who visit the 49ers on Sunday, and the Philadelphia Eagles (6-4), who entertain the Giants.

And coaches being coaches, both George Seifert of the 49ers - who have tied an NFL record by winning 18 games in a row, including playoffs - and Bill Parcells of the Giants claim they are not looking any farther ahead than this week's games.

"I don't think you can take anything for granted," Seifert said. "I don't think the players do."

"I just don't understand people who talk about that," Parcells said. "We have just so far to go against good competition."

Nevertheless, the pressure is building.

"There's a natural kick-in as the importance of the games come," Seifert said. "It's almost unconscious."

In other Sunday games, Atlanta is at New Orleans, Chicago at Minnesota, Indianapolis at Cincinnati, Miami at Cleveland, Tampa Bay at Green Bay, Kansas City at the Los Angeles Raiders, New England at Phoenix, Pittsburgh at the New York Jets and Seattle at San Diego. Buffalo visits Houston on Monday night.

In Thanksgiving Day games, Dallas beat Washington 27-17 and Detroit defeated Denver 40-27.

Atlanta (3-7-0) at New Orleans (4-6-0)

The Saints had won six straight from Atlanta until the Falcons' 28-27 victory earlier this season as Chris Miller capped a 366-yard, three-touchdown performance by hitting Andre Rison with a 3-yard TD pass with less than two minutes remaining.

Chicago (9-1-0) at Minnesota (4-6-0)

Chicago has won six straight and owns the NFL's No. 1 rushing offense, led by Neal Anderson, second in the NFC with 758 yards. Minnesota's Herschel Walker had his best day since his first game as a Viking with 99 yards on 16 carries last week, including a 58-yard TD, against Seattle.

Indianapolis (4-6-0) at Cincinnati (6-4-0)

The Bengals took over sole possession of first place in the AFC Central with a 27-3 victory over Pittsburgh last week. The Colts' offense is 28th - dead last - but improving behind rookie quarterback Jeff George and running backs Eric Dickerson and Albert Bentley.

Miami (8-2-0) at Cleveland (2-8-0)

Miami ended a six-game winning streak and dropped out of a first-place tie in the AFC East by losing to the Raiders 13-10 Monday night. Cleveland lost its first game under

new coach Jim Shofner and fifth straight overall 35-23 as Houston's Warren Moon threw for 322 yards and five TDs.

Tampa Bay (4-7-0) vs. Green Bay (5-5-0) at Milwaukee

Tampa Bay has lost five straight since beating Green Bay 26-14 in Week 6 as Steve Christie kicked four field goals and the defense intercepted Don Majkowski five times. The Bucs managed only 180 yards against San Francisco last week.

Kansas City (6-4-0) at Los Angeles Raiders (7-3-0)

Three weeks ago, Kansas City won 9-7 as Nick Lowery kicked three field goals. The Chiefs are one game behind the AFC West-leading Raiders, who held Miami to a club-record low 14 yards rushing on Monday night. KC's rushing attack, on the other hand, is No. 7 in the NFL.

New England (1-9-0) at Phoenix (2-8-0)

These teams haven't met since 1984 when the Cardinals, then based in St. Louis, easily won 33-10 as Otis Anderson rushed for 136 yards. New

England has lost eight in a row.

Pittsburgh (5-5-0) at NY Jets (4-7-0)

This game marks the return of Joe Walton, Pittsburgh's offensive coordinator after being head coach of the Jets for six years. The Steelers have dominated the series, winning 10 of 11, and they didn't do much for Walton last year, recording their first shutout in four years in beating the Jets 13-0.

Seattle (4-6-0) at San Diego (5-6-0)

Three weeks ago, Billy Joe Tolliver threw two TD passes and the San Diego defense recorded two TDs in a 31-14 victory. The Chargers' have the NFL's No. 4 rushing offense as well as the No. 4 overall defense.

Buffalo (9-1-0) at Houston (5-5-0)

Last season, Jim Kelly's fifth TD pass, a 28-yarder to Andre Reed in overtime, gave Buffalo a 47-41 victory. Last week, Thurman Thomas rushed for 165 yards and both scores in the Bills' 14-0 win over New England while Houston's Warren Moon threw for 322 yards and five TDs in a 35-23 victory over Cleveland.

ATTENTION DUCK HUNTERS: Rules for the 1990 waterfowl season now outlaw all use of lead shot in Castro, Deaf Smith, Moore and many down-state counties. Before you go duck or goose hunting anywhere, better check the steel shot-only requirements. Next year the entire state will be steel shot-only. Watch out for sale prices on shotgun shells this year. A bargain on lead shot may not be such a bargain. The use of non-toxic shot will help stop the lead poisoning of large numbers of waterfowl. This measure is surrounded by controversy but it is the law of the land. Texas game wardens WILL be strictly enforcing this and all other hunting regulations, so check the rules before going on this year's first duck hunt.

Prediction of the Week -- Anglers will soon be replacing their lead fishing weights with non-toxic weights. It will cost more to replace lead weights but no more than I lose on a normal fishing trip won't break the bank.

Extension News

As the holiday season arrives, consumers are bombarded by advertisements. Advertisements are designed to sell a product or service, and their effects are felt by children, teens and adults.

Exposure to an effective advertisement can make it difficult for a consumer to approach the purchase of a product from an objective, analytical perspective.

Advertising serves many beneficial purposes for the consumer. It may introduce consumers to a new product or sale price, increase competition, help lower prices, encourage merchants to stock new products, spur the marketing of new products, support free press, or help ensure consistent product quality. And it is often entertaining.

Along with positive impacts are possible negative influences of which a consumer should be aware. Advertising can add dollars to the cost of a product. It may also use persuasion to convince a consumer to spend money unwisely or purchase a product without appropriate investigation. Advertisements, especially those directed at children, may be camouflaged as information or impartial entertainment.

Advertisement often uses appeals to emotions. It may appeal to the need to belong or the desire to be the best one can be; it may play on insecurities or fears; it may aim directly at the desire for happiness or physical pleasure; it may use sex appeal to sell products, or it may emphasize costs or quality when appealing to the consumers desire to get a bargain.

By being aware of which emotion an advertisement is tapping, consumers can be better prepared to decipher the actual information being provided. Actual information covers facts such as style of the product, color, size, weight, shape, quantity in a set, where the item is available, who makes the product, price and purpose. Analyzing the ad for emotional appeal versus factual information will provide a basis for decision making.

Critical viewing of advertising involves asking questions like these:

- * What does the advertiser want me to think? Is that true?
 - * Is the ad intended to be factual or emotional?
 - * What is it about the ad that makes me want to buy the product?
 - * Do I need the product?
 - * How does this ad help me?

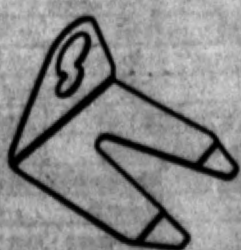

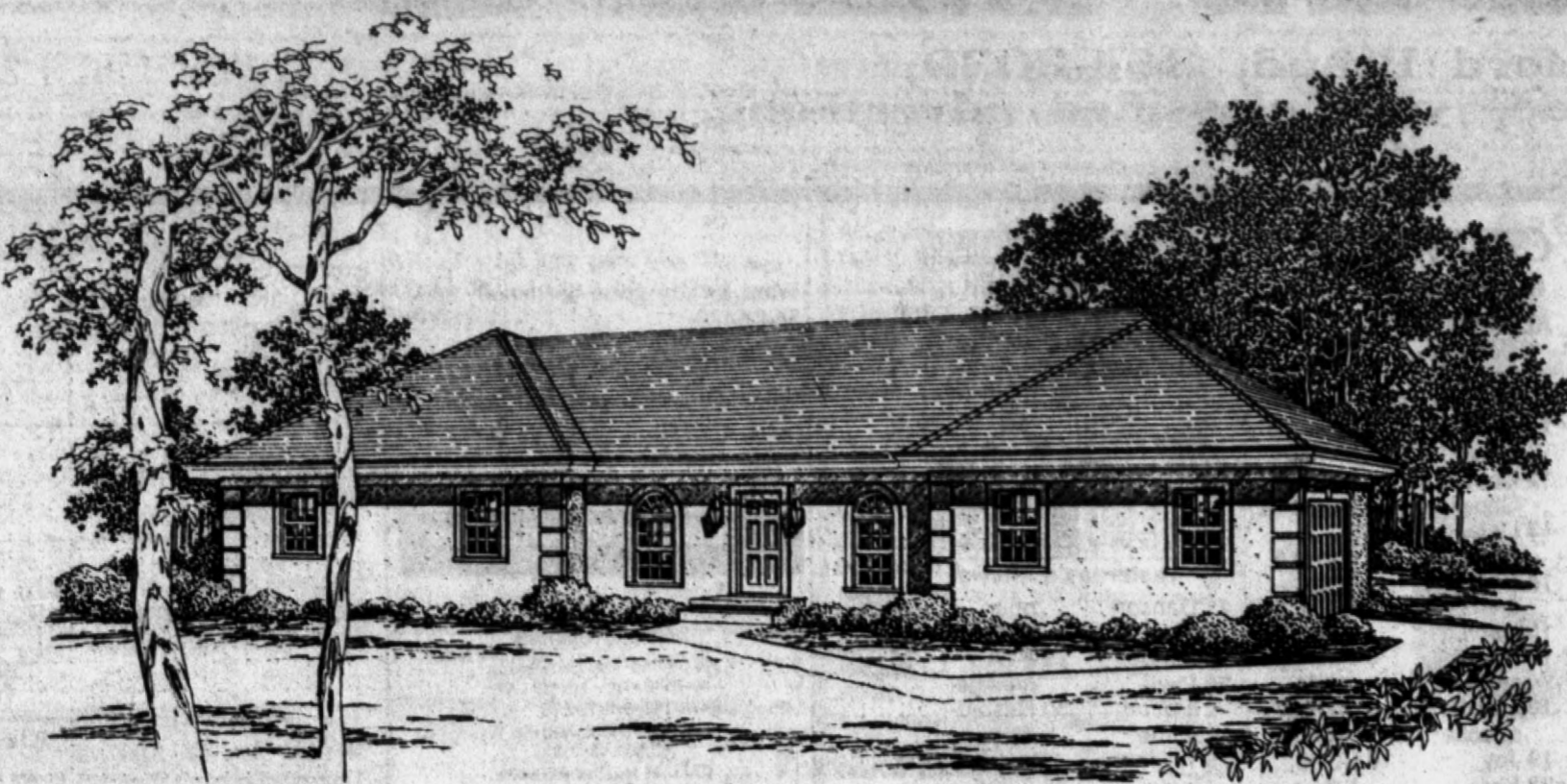

PROVINCIAL DESIGN BOASTS ADJOINING SCREEN PORCH AND SUN DECK

The recessed central segment of this plan allows a stoop entry to the full front to back great room. The screen porch access and fireplace highlight the room. The kitchen and formal dining room have immediate passage to the central great room and the

breakfast area is shown with a bay window into the sun deck with direct access too. Laundry facilities are behind bi-fold doors and the garage is handy from the breakfast area.

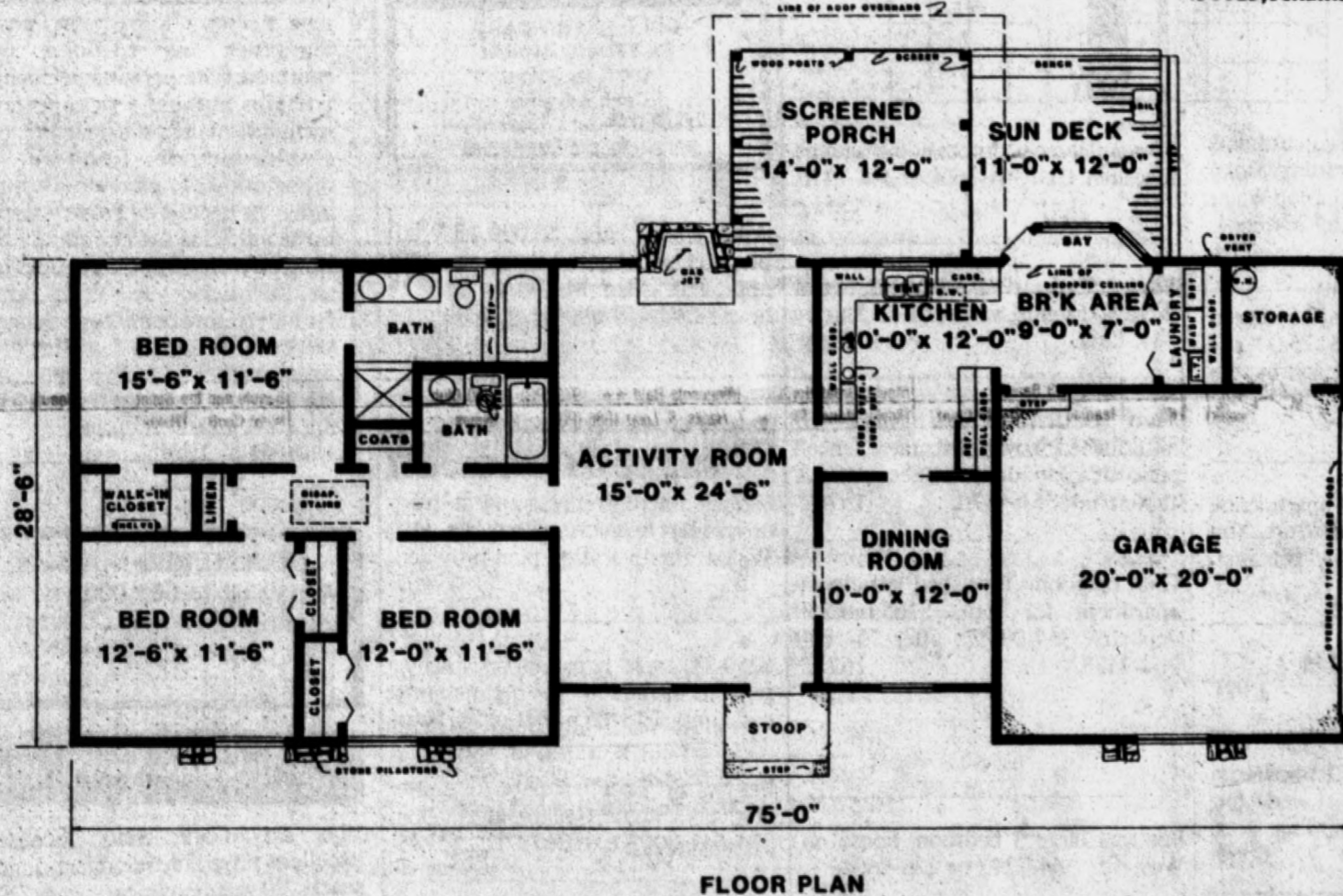

Questions, answers about homes

Q. - Dark brown spots are appearing in areas of my concrete deck. They don't wash away with soap and water. What causes these spots?

A. - The type of discoloration you describe occurs when tricalcium alumino-ferrite - the agent that gives portland cement its gray color - has not reacted thoroughly with the other chemicals in concrete. To remove the dark spots, try pouring on undiluted household vinegar. If that doesn't work, try a solution of 1 part muriatic acid to 30 parts water.

Q. - Two years ago, I had a porch slab and an adjoining concrete sidewalk replaced. The porch slab was poured on a 4-foot-deep foundation of blocks and concrete. The walk was poured in one continuous piece with the slab, without a space being left between the walk and the slab. Now the walk has cracked badly near the slab after just one winter. Was the sidewalk installed correctly?

A. - Apparently there is no isolation joint where the slab and sidewalk meet. This would accommodate the slight movement that takes place between them. The slab has a foundation down to the frost line and

is not affected by freezing temperatures.

However, the sidewalk is on grade, so any dampness in the base below the sidewalk will freeze and expand, resulting in some frost heaving during the winter. When this movement - or movement caused by settlement or shrinkage - is restrained, the concrete will crack.

There are two basic types of joints used in walks, patios and slabs: isolation joints, often called expansion joints, and control joints, often called contraction joints. Isolation joints between dissimilar

concrete placements prevent cracking caused by frost. They include joint strips to separate the two sections so each can move independently of the other. Control joints in walks and driveway are grooves in the surface that allow cracking but control its location.

Isolation joints permit slight vertical and horizontal movement along lines that separate dissimilar concrete placements. They include joint strips of asphalt-impregnated composition board to separate the two pieces and make minor movement relatively easy.

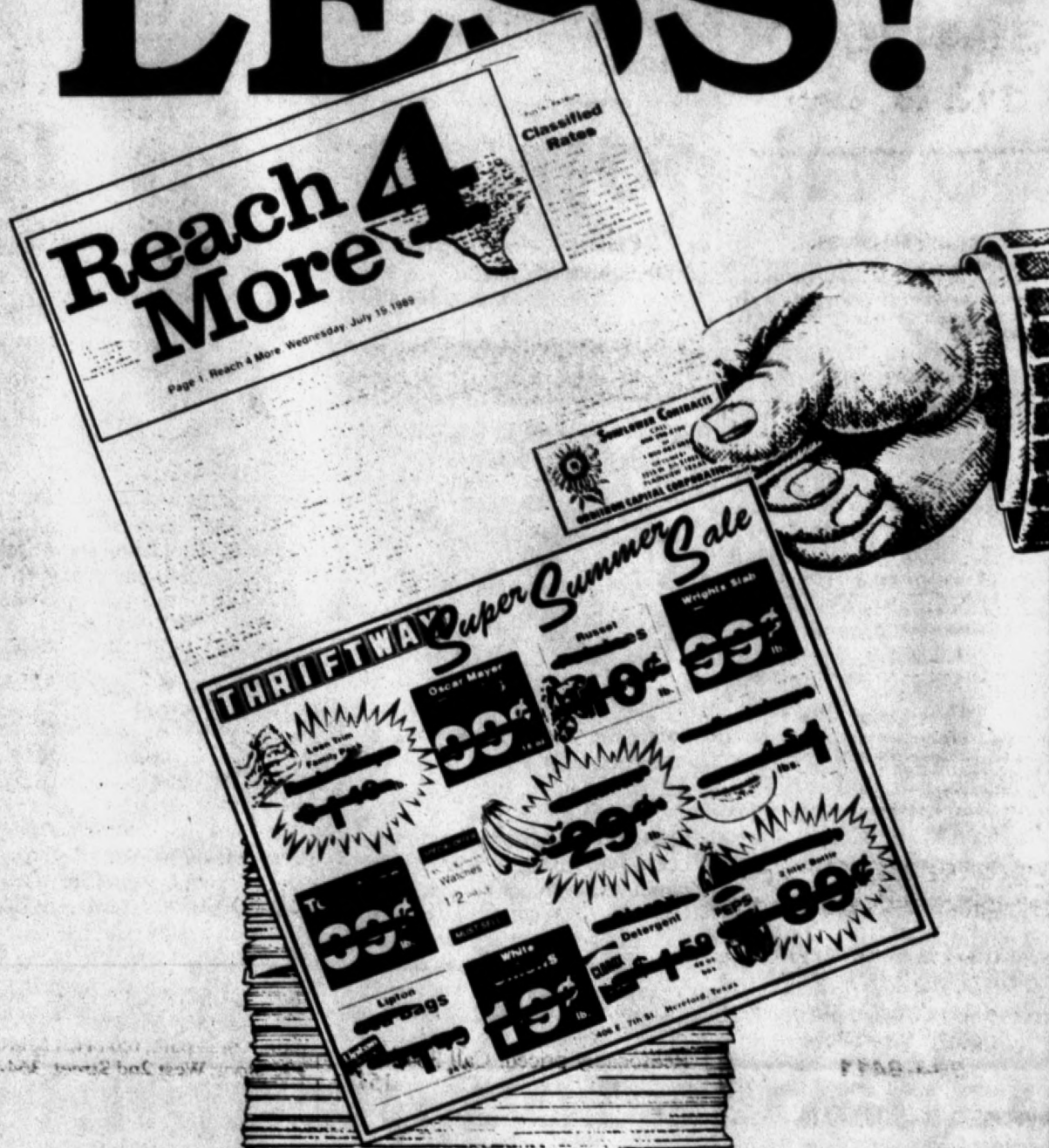

Loan program underway here

Mr. and Mrs. Lazaro G. Lopez were the recipients of the first socially disadvantaged loan in Deaf Smith County offered by the Farmers Home Administration.

This is a new loan program that is designed to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, acquire land for farming, according to Ross W. James, county supervisor for FmHA.

The Lopez's have farmed for several years, raised cattle and now have an opportunity to own their own land. They plan on establishing a vegetable farm and beef operation.

This loan was feasible to the Lopez family due to the new loan

program initiated by FmHA, designed to assist minority farmers who meet the eligibility criteria and quality for a loan for the purpose of buying farm real estate.

Under the program, FmHA will try to help families who are interested in farming and can qualify for a FmHA farm ownership loan. FmHA can also provide other loan and technical assistance, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

Socially disadvantaged population groups are Hispanic, Native Americans, Blacks, Asians and Pacific Islanders.

According to James, persons who

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Rural population dwindles

WASHINGTON (AP) - Urban sprawl and long-distance commuting have helped boost population growth in rural America, but new government figures show the number of farm people continues to dwindle.

The farm population dropped by 150,000 to an estimated 4,801,000 in 1989, a decrease described as "not a statistically significant difference" from 1988.

Last year's farm population was reported at 1.9 percent of the U.S. total of more than 248.2 million people, the smallest share on record.

In 1980, the 6.05 million living on farms represented 2.7 percent of the 221.7 million people in the United States. At the turn of the century, the 1900 census showed 29.9 million living on farms, 39.3 percent of the population of 76 million.

The annual report was released Wednesday by the Census Bureau of the Commerce Department and the Economic Research Service of the Agriculture Department.

Overall, the rural population was estimated at more than 66.2 million, up from just under 64.8 million people in the 1988 survey.

The rural population includes those in living in the open countryside and small towns. Large cities and their suburbs, plus towns of 2,500 or more, are considered urban.

As used in the report, the farm population consists of those living on farms in rural areas, but does not include the relatively few who live on farms in urban areas. A farm is defined as a place that sold agricultural products worth \$1,000 or more in the previous year.

The farm population definition is based on residence only. Many people reside on farms but do no agricultural work, and many farmers and farm employees do not reside on farms.

Felicia LeClere of the Economic Research Service, one of the report's authors, said there were no real surprises in this year's figures.

"The things that have come out have been long-term trends, and none of them has been surprising," she said in a telephone interview.

LeClere cautioned that all the figures are subject to revision when the official 1990 census results are available next year. She is confident

that the annual figures are on track, however.

Officials have noted the increase in rural population - rising by 12 million people since 1950 - and point out that urban sprawl and a willingness of city workers to commute greater distances have been important factors.

One possible effect of the 1990 census is a reclassification of some of these distant areas from rural to urban. That could show up later as a slowdown in rural growth.

The report said the largest share of the rural population, about 44 percent, continues to be in the South. That has been the case since the first U.S. census was taken in 1790.

"Although the regional distribution of the rural population changed only slightly in the last 40 years, the regional distribution of the farm population shifted markedly," the report said.

In 1950, one-third of all farm people lived in the Midwest and slightly more than half in the South.

"A rapid decline in the Southern farm population, rather than growth in the Midwest's farm population,

reversed the regional rankings," the report said. "Half of the total farm population now lives in the Midwest, and less than a third lives in the South."

Other observations in the report included:

-Farm people continue to be older than the non-farm population in general, with a median of 38 years in 1989, compared with 32.5 years for non-farm residents. A median age means half of the people are older, half younger. Non-farm refers to urban plus rural non-farm people.

-Last year 97.4 percent of farm residents were white, and 1.8 percent were black, compared with 84 percent white and 12.5 percent black in the non-farm population. The remainder were described as of other races.

-Only 2.9 percent of the farm residents were of Hispanic origin.

-Nearly 69 percent of the farm residents 15 years and older were married and living with spouses in 1989, compared with 55.4 percent of the non-farm people.

Japan is top customer

WASHINGTON (AP) - Japan will continue as the No. 1 customer of American farmers at least through the turn of the century, maintaining its lead over the European Community, Agriculture Department trade analysts say.

In the fiscal year that ended Sept. 30, Japan once again topped foreign buyers of U.S. agricultural products at an estimated \$8.3 billion, compared with the EC's imports of \$7 billion. Emiko Miyasaka of the department's Foreign Agricultural Service said she expects Japan to maintain its lead over the 12-nation EC "at least in the 1990s."

Miyasaka said Tuesday in a telephone interview that Japan's top ranking as a foreign buyer of agricultural products appears solid through the turn of the century despite the EC's plan to unify economically by the end of 1992.

Beyond the 1990s, however, the situation is too uncertain for predictions now, she said.

Miyasaka was asked to elaborate on a report by her agency last week that said Japan "is likely to be among the strongest export growth markets" for U.S. farmers.

"This optimism is based on the expectation that Japan's economic growth, while slowing, is expected to be the strongest of all industrialized countries, fueling consumer demand," the report said.

Further, it said, there has been some liberalization of Japan's agricultural imports through the

current Uruguay Round of negotiations under the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, or GATT.

"Since 1964, when it emerged as Asia's first billion-dollar market for U.S. farm products, Japan has steadily expanded its agricultural imports," the report said.

Japan moved in front of the EC as the top U.S. farm market in 1988.

Bulk commodities such as corn, soybeans, wheat, cotton, tobacco and logs are the big-ticket items, but Miyasaka and other analysts believe there are greater market opportunities for high-value products like beef, vegetables, citrus fruit, fruit juices and processed wood products.

In 1988, the U.S.-Japan Beef Agreement opened the door to growing sales of beef - from a value

of \$556 million in 1987 to \$1 billion last year.

U.S. exports of fresh, frozen and prepared vegetables rose to \$253 million by 1989, the report said. Sales of french fries, for example, rose to \$79 million from \$37 million in 1983.

A thorn in this trade development has been Japan's rice policy, which effectively bars imports, part of a national policy to protect domestic growers.

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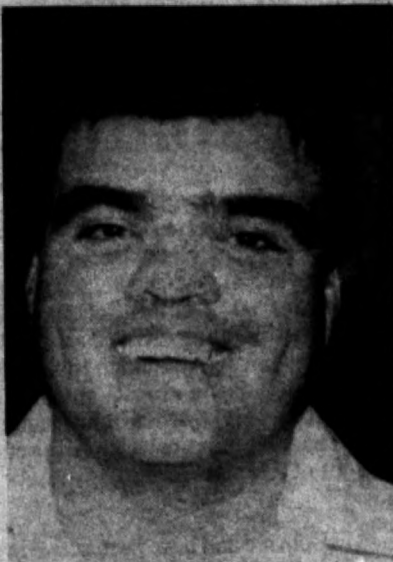

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Right diet provides all necessary nutrients

"DO YOU HAVE A BALANCED DIET?"

It has become more apparent that many of us want our bodies to be all that they can be. As a result, we are learning to eat Low Fat, Low-cholesterol foods that are also vitamin and mineral rich.

Unfortunately, many people feel that if a little bit of something is good, a lot must certainly be better. From 30% to 40% of the adults in the country take some kind of vitamin supplement in addition to the nutrients they receive from foods. Many also turn to pills on a regular basis for additional minerals, fiber, and fish oil. Are nutrient supplements a good idea, and if so, for whom?

Food First

Health experts agree that a varied diet consisting of selections from the four food groups will provide all the nutrients a healthy person needs to stay healthy. The Recommended Dietary Allowances (RDA/s) were established to help build awareness of how diets measure up. These guidelines define the daily amounts of essential nutrients considered to be adequate to meet the

known nutritional needs of practically all healthy persons. These levels are calculated over the needs of most individuals so that nearly everyone's needs will be met without adverse health effects.

Weight-Loss Diets

When calories are cut to keep body weight down, it sometimes is difficult to meet all your vitamin and mineral needs on less than 1200 calories per day. In this case, a basic multiple-vitamin/mineral supplement may be recommended. In cases of chronic, very-low-calorie dieting it may prove hazardous in health of some individuals, and taking vitamin/mineral supplements will not make them less so.

If an individual cannot eat 100% of the RDA for each nutrient, then vitamin and mineral supplementation that brings the level of each nutrient up to 100% may be a choice for you.

Taking excessive amounts of supplements may hurt your health rather than help it. There are many vitamins and minerals that can cause toxicity symptoms at high levels or

perhaps metabolic disturbances at lower doses.

Special Needs Do Arise

Not everyone is able and willing to eat a balanced diet on a regular basis. People with demanding lifestyles, those on a very low-calorie or unbalanced weight-reduction diets, strict vegetarians who eat no animal products at all, and pregnant women may have trouble meeting the RDA's for vitamins and minerals.

Demanding Life-Styles

For many people today, demands of life make it hard to find the time and to apply the effort needed to prepare carefully planned meals. Some people eat out or bring home processed foods more often than cooking at home from scratch. Commercially prepared meals

usually supply substantial number of calories; however, if food choices are not varied and distribution across the food groups not followed, the diet may fall short of the RDA's. A multiple-vitamin/mineral supplement not exceeding 100% of the RDA for any nutrient may be advisable.

Help or Hindrance?

Instead of eating a balanced, low-fat

diet as recommended for general health, many people focus on one or a limited number of health concerns and supplement their diets with only these concerns in mind. For example, some individuals take calcium supplements to protect against osteoporosis, taking fish oil pills to avoid heart disease, and sprinkling fiber on their food to reduce the risk of cancer.

Calcium

Most experts agree that the most critical time to increase calcium consumption is during the years of bone formation and growth from 11 to 24 years of age. However, we must not neglect the calcium intake for rest of our lives. The effects of insufficient dietary calcium becomes evident later in life.

Since it is relatively easy to find low-fat calcium sources that occur naturally in food, calcium supplementation through pills or inappropriate fortification of certain foods has not found widespread approval among health professionals.

Skim milk, low-fat yogurt, low-fat cheese, spinach, and water-packed sardines and salmon with bones are all good food sources of calcium.

Fiber

There is still need for more research and data being collected before conclusive evidence and claims can be proven concerning fiber and the beneficial health effects of fiber. The question is whether it is the fiber or whether it concerns the other food

components in reaction to fiber that is doing the job.

A wide variety of whole-grain products, fruits, and vegetables including beans, peas, berries, pears, bananas, whole-grain cereals, breads, crackers and popcorn are good food sources of dietary fiber.

Fish Oil

Fish oil capsules containing omega-3 fatty acids are quite popular but very expensive. Depending on the type of blood lipid disorder involved, these capsules may raise or lower your cholesterol. Too much fish oil can cause Vitamin E deficiency. Some capsules have excessively high levels of Vitamins A and D which can cause toxic reactions. Some capsules are high in dietary cholesterol. Good marine sources of these oils are sockeye salmon, anchovies, mackerel, tuna, and swordfish.

Food "Fortification or Enriched"

Enriched foods are foods in which the food industry have added vitamins and minerals to their products that have lost nutrients during the processing stage below their original amounts.

Foods in which nutrients are added well above and beyond the amounts normally found in their ingredients and can supply 100% of the RDA are said to be "fortified."

Nutritionists generally approve of enrichment programs as they maintain the nutritional value of a class of ingredients and products.

Fortification may be done to appeal to consumer's insecurities about getting a balanced diet from among the various food groups.

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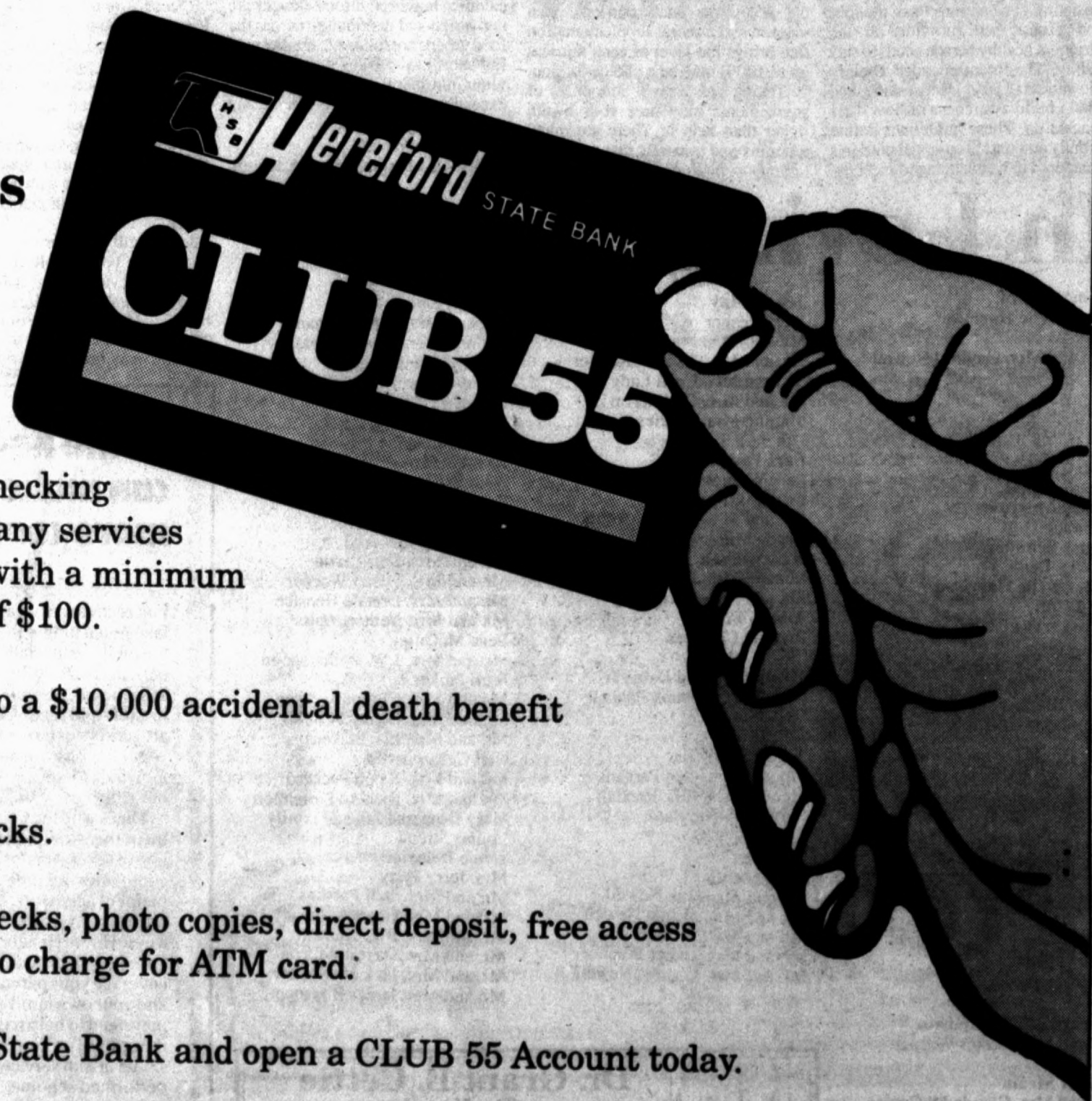

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Eye Openers

A basic treatment for this problem is the use of artificial tears to reduce a person's natural tears. These are available without a prescription and are used as eyedrops to lubricate the eyes and replace the missing moisture.

Dry eyes occur when the tear glands do not produce enough tears. This can result in stinging, burning, scratchiness, stringy mucus and excess irritation from smoke. A layer of tears over the eye makes the surface smooth and optically clear, resulting in good vision.

The aging process can be one cause of dry eyes. Although dry eyes can occur in both men and women at any age, women, especially after menopause, are most often afflicted. Dry eyes are often associated with arthritis and can be accompanied by a dry mouth. Tear secretion can also be reduced by some drugs and medications.

An individual can take steps to prevent the evaporation of tears during the winter. When the heat is turned on, the use of a humidifier or a pan of water on the radiator can add moisture to dry air. Excessively warm rooms, hair dryers and windy days can make a person with dry eyes more uncomfortable. Smoking can be especially bothersome.

Extreme dryness can cause serious damage to the eye. An examination and diagnosis by your ophthalmologist is suggested. Remember, sight is the most precious of our senses.

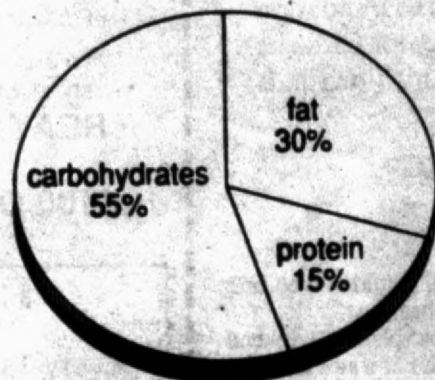

A nutritious diet contains a variety of foods. You do not have to stop eating all foods which are high in fat (more than 30% of the total calories). For example, fruits, vegetables, and grains contain no fat. These help balance foods such as margarine, peanut butter, and mayonnaise which are high in fat.

Is your diet within the recommended guidelines for fat?

Divide calories eaten each day by 30 to get the grams of fat recommended not to exceed.

Jackson stars in emotional movie

Marc Blackburn, a Vietnam War widow, was shopping in a rural Minnesota grocery store and was distracted for only a few minutes. During those crucial moments her 3-year-old son was kidnapped.

Sixteen years later on Halloween night, a 19-year-old stranger knocks on Blackburn's door — claiming to be her son.

So begins the plot of the CBS thriller *A Stranger Within*, airing Tuesday, Nov. 27, on CBS. The movie stars Kate Jackson as Blackburn, Chris Sarandon as Dan Vance, Blackburn's boyfriend, and Rick (don't call him Ricky) Schroder as Blackburn's son.

"I think the movie is going to be pretty scary," commented Jackson in a recent interview. "It was written by John Pilmeier, who wrote *Agnes of God*. He (Pilmeier) is such a magnetic presence and he's a wonderful writer. He was on the set, and when you got finished with a scene you would look, wherever he was in the room, to see if he approved. Tom Holland (*Fright Night*, *Psycho II*) directed and he is also very talented.

"We filmed on location in Minnesota about 40 miles from Minneapolis," Jackson continued. "My character is a woman who feels you just don't get second chances in life. She has pretty much shut down emotionally. She was married to a man who was killed in Vietnam, and then her son was kidnapped. I think at that point she decided it is better to just not feel anything rather than get hurt."

In the flashback scene in the beginning, the makeup artist had to make Jackson look like a 22-year-old. The beautiful actress joked about the fact that 15 years ago she would have been working on *Charlie's Angels* and it all

seemed kind of weird. "There were some days when I was so tired there was no way they were going to make me look younger. I think they probably shot the whole thing through a bunch of gauze or maybe a Navajo blanket to make it work."

The filming was a positive experience for the actress, although the conditions were a little frigid, and it was a very physical film. "It wasn't the easiest possible movie to do. It was a tough schedule and we worked through the night a few times. But I think the hard work is going to pay off. Rick has grown into a very solid actor. Chris is just wonderful. He never has a false moment," said Jackson.

After an award-winning performance at age 7 in the feature film *The Champ*, Schroder went on to star in the TV series *Silver Spoons* for five years and in several made-for-television movies. Sarandon is an Oscar nominee for *Dog Day Afternoon* and appeared in the feature films *The Princess Bride* and *Fright Night*.

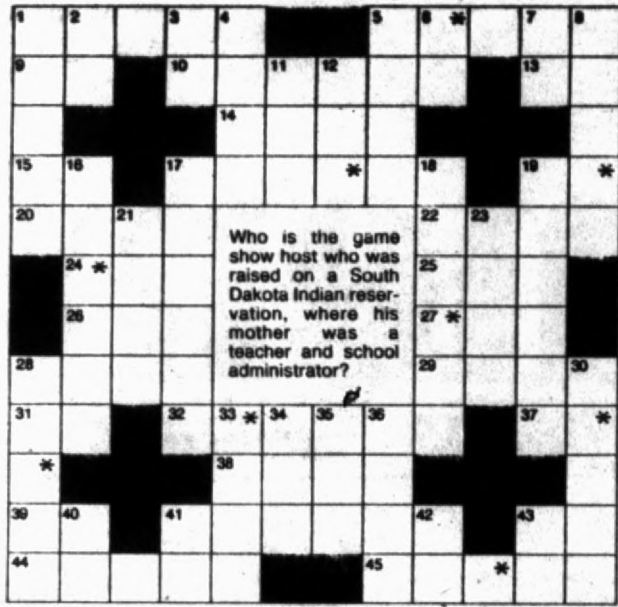
When Jackson isn't working, she tries to spend time at her farmhouse in Virginia. "The house was built in 1845, and we're trying to get everything back up to snuff. It's beautiful," she said.

Jackson has let go of her A-type personality to pursue a more relaxed lifestyle. Her surgery a year ago has given her a different perspective on life and a message to pass on to others: "My personal experience isn't as important as getting the message out that early detection can be the key to a complete cure of breast cancer. Every woman over the age of 35 should have a baseline mammogram. I know it's scary, but they just have to do it."

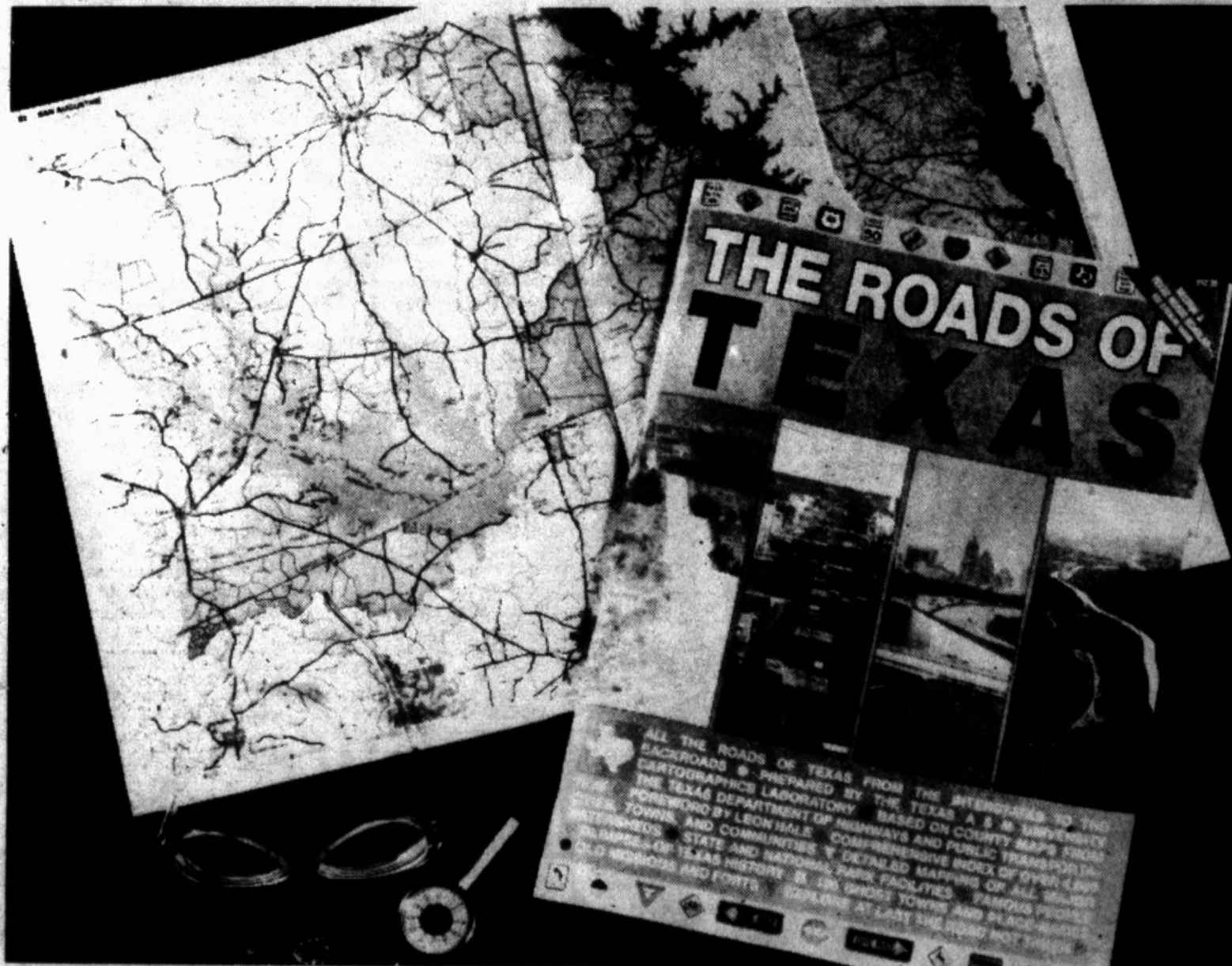

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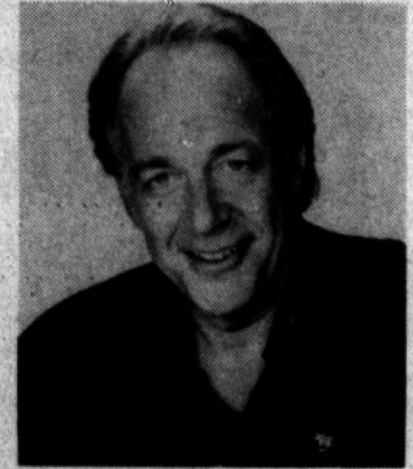

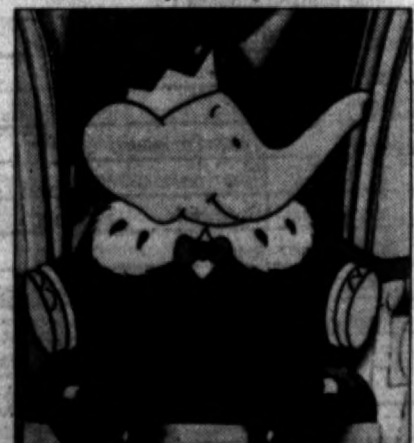

Mother must make amends for showing favoritism

Michele Greene plays Rue McClanahan's daughter

Parents often have no idea that they are treating their children differently from each other, yet that inequity many times can cause deep wounds that are difficult to heal.

The emotional hurt of parental favoritism is explored in *To My Daughter*, airing Monday, Nov. 26, on NBC. Rue McClanahan stars as a divorced mother of three older children who must come to grips when her first and favorite child is diagnosed with a terminal brain tumor.

Michele Greene (*L.A. Law*) stars as the oldest daughter, a successful writer. But her unexpected death devastates her mother, who must recognize the fact she has virtually ignored her other two children, played by Ty Miller (*The Young Riders*) and Samantha Mathis (*Pump Up the Volume*).

"It's not so much about her death as it is about living with her repercussions afterward. The mother has to get through her grief to sort of deal with it slowly. She hasn't given the other two

children as much of her attention, and she is unable to see that. She's never seen that. She has to repair the damage that had been done," Greene said.

Greene has a close relationship with her own mother. The actress was born in Las Vegas, and her father died shortly before she was 2 years old. With two children to raise (Greene has an older brother, Roland), her mother took the family to Los Angeles and moved in with her parents.

Greene was enrolled in a drama class to overcome shyness when she was a child. That early exposure to acting fostered an interest in the craft that has now garnered her an Emmy nomination for her continually evolving role as lawyer Abby Perkins on *L.A. Law*.

But Greene said if someone were to tell her she had to start over and she could not be an actress, she would become a veterinarian.

"I'm just a sucker. I have, like, cat radar," Greene said, explaining how while on a date she spotted an injured cat in a sewer and picked it up. "I notice every animal, every stray animal, every day, everywhere I go." © TV Listing Inc.



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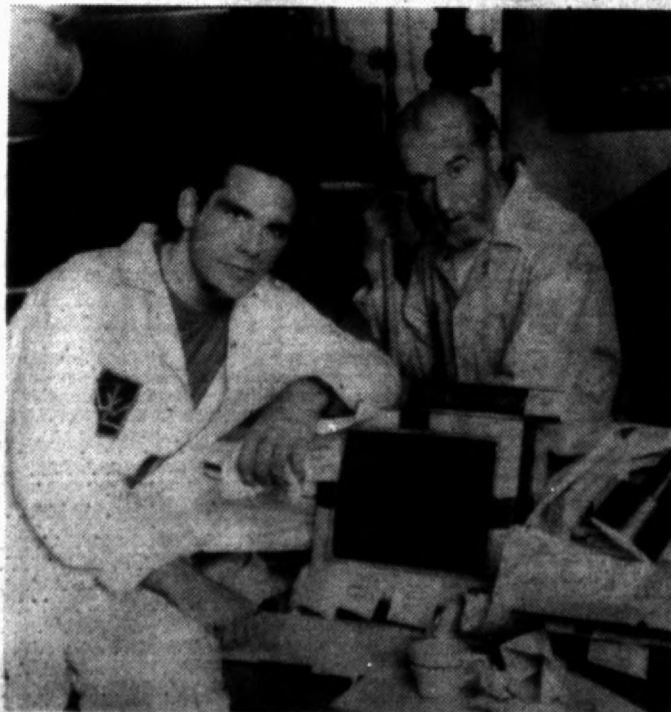
