The American declaration against the two axis powers followed within 70 hours the declaration of war against Japan following the Japanese attack Sunday on American bases at Hawaii, the Philippines, Guam and Midway Islands and made the official lineup for World War II as follows: The United States, Great Britain, the Soviet Union, China and the refugee governments of Europe against Germany, Italy Japan, and the axis satte-

The war declarations in both house and senate today were passed without a dissenting vote; though in the house, one member, Miss Jeanette Rankin of Montana, who yoted against the Japanese War was reported present but not voting. In the Senate the vote was 90 to 0 in favor of the separate declarations against Germany and Italy.





Jones, hearing of this, stepped up with his counter claim, which in effect is that by treaty in 1819, the United States and Spain decreed the western bank of the Sabine river as the border between Louisiana and Texas, then part of Mexico, which in turn belonged to Spain After Texas entered the Union, Congress in 1856, passd an act stating that Texas would own to the middle of the Sabine River, Lake and Pass.

Jones said his present claim was based on a Supreme Court decision of about 1910 which held in the case of Louisiana va. Mississippi that the Congress had he right to fix boundaries, and later litigation between Oklahoma and Texas in which the Supreme Court upheld validity of boundaries fixed by the Treaty of 1819 which John Quincy Adams, Secretary of State under President James Madison, had negotiated with the King of Spain.
