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## Angry truckers call for strike to protest diesel fuel increases

WASHINGTON (AP) - Angry independent drivers are calling for a nationwide truckers strike next month to protest rapidly rising diesel fuel prices.

Large trucking organizations and companies, as well as the Teamsters union, oppose an interruption of truck traffic, but fliers have been circulating at truck stops across the country urging drivers to park their rigs on Nov. 11.

Some truckers have opened a network of toll-free telephone numbers to coordinate the planned protest against fuel rises of up to 40 cents a gallon.

"Anybody in trucking right now has heard about this. These fliers have been showing up everywhere," Todd Spencer, executive director of Owner-Operators Independent Drivers, a group that represents 20,000 truck operators, said Monday.

While not directly involved in the protest effort, Spencer said his Missouri-based group was "trying to stay on top of the situation" to advise member drivers.

It's unclear how many of the

nation's estimated 4.5 million truck drivers - including as many as 500,000 independent owner-operators - might participate. In the past, such wildcat attempts to bring truck traffic to a halt have gained only sparse and sporadic support.

Spokesmen for the American Trucking Associations, which represents major trucking companies, and the Teamsters, which represents about 100,000 long-haul drivers, said they expect few - if any - employee drivers to take part.

But some truckers organizing the protest say thousands of independent operators, who account of much of the long-haul truck traffic, are expected pull their rigs off the road for a few days.

"This is going to be a nationwide shutdown," asserted Mary Pearman, a former driver who has been answering one of the toll-free number established to coordinate the protest.

Mrs. Pearman, who said her brother and husband helped organize the protest as part of an organization called Truckers Across America, said the independent drivers have a range of grievances. They're especially incensed by a sudden increase in fuel prices.

"Somebody's really lining their pockets, and it sure ain't the truckers," she said, adding that her husband, Jim, was on a run from

Michigan to Massachusetts and dropping protest fliers at each truck stop.

In a telephone interview from Beaumont, Texas, Mrs. Pearman said she has been getting hundreds of calls from drivers asking about the protest after seeing the fliers at truck stops.

Although large trucking companies said they opposed an interruption of truck traffic, they too have complained to the Interstate Commerce Commission about the sudden jump in diesel prices.

The increases supposedly reflect the new 4.3-cent-a-gallon increase in the federal fuel tax and the additional cost of producing a cleaner-burning, low-sulphur diesel required by environmental laws that took effect this month.

Adding to the price spiral have been shortages in the supply of the new low-sulfur fuel and distribution problems, including an interruption of flows through a major pipeline because of the Midwest flooding, the American Petroleum Institute said. The oil industry group said refiners have had to spend \$3 billion to retool refineries to produce the cleaner-burning diesel.

According to the Interstate Commerce Commission, the average price of diesel increased from \$1.14 a gallon on Sept. 28 to nearly \$1.28 a gallon on Oct. 18, with much steeper increases in parts of the West.

## Jury seated in attempted murder trial

A jury was seated Tuesday morning in 222nd District Court to hear evidence in the attempted murder trial of two brothers, Edward Martinez, 23, and Joe Martinez, 27.

Edward Martinez has been indicted on two charges of attempted murder but is being tried on only one at this time. Joe Martinez is under a single indictment.

In the aftermath of a near collision between two vehicles, Edward Martinez allegedly shot two persons, Consuelo Avila, 49, and Ruben Avila, 29. Joe Martinez is accused of shooting Alfredo Avila, 27.

The incident occurred after the near accident at about 1 a.m. on Jan. 18. Drivers of the vehicles reportedly were Edward Martinez and Alfredo Avila.

Police report a chase ensued and ended at the Avila residence in the 700 block of South Texas. Members of the Avila family came out of the house to break up a fight.

Gunfire erupted and Consuelo Avila was shot in the face. Alfredo Avila reportedly was shot in the leg and Ruben Avila in the arm.

## Clinton wants to ease rules on government purchases

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Clinton wants billions in savings by easing government purchasing rules and other procedures, but conservative lawmakers will seek even larger cuts, perhaps including a pay freeze for Congress.

Administration officials planned to unveil some of their proposals today as the White House returns to the battle over spending cuts that dominated the political scene earlier this year.

Clinton planned to ask Congress to boost to \$100,000 from \$25,000 the size of contracts the government may award without complicated paperwork and auditing procedures, said administration officials who spoke on condition of anonymity. They said he would seek authority to require agencies to buy off-the-shelf, not custom-made, goods when possible.

Clinton also was ready to sign an executive order allowing companies to bid by computer for the 20 million contracts the government awards every year, in hopes of streamlining the process.

Officials said the ideas were aimed at improving federal efficiency and increasing competition among private companies for government contracts. Much of the plan was expected to come from Vice President Al Gore's National Performance Review, which was released Sept. 7.

The effort stems from promises Clinton made to conservative Democrats to ensure their support when Congress approved his deficit-reduction bill in August. He promised then to propose additional spending cuts, and today's package is the major part of his blueprint for delivering on that pledge.

## Mattox plans 1994 Senate run

AUSTIN (AP) - After sitting out the special U.S. Senate election earlier this year, former attorney general Jim Mattox says he's ready to run now.

Mattox said Monday he has filed papers to seek the 1994 Democratic Senate nomination.

Mattox, who lost his 1990 bid for

governor in a primary runoff with Ann Richards, said he plans a formal announcement of his candidacy in the near future. But he said he is eager for the race.

"I want to win this Senate seat for the people of Texas," Mattox said.

"We need a strong voice in the Senate - someone with a law

enforcement background who's tough on crime, someone who can tackle the critical issue of health care reform head-on and feet-first," he said.

Republican Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, who won the seat in a special runoff election June 5, has said she plans to seek a full, six-year term in 1994.

Mattox had considered running for the Senate in the special election, which was called after Sen. Lloyd Bentsen was appointed U.S. Treasury secretary.

But he sat out that race after Richards named Democrat Bob Krueger as interim senator and Democratic Party leaders rallied behind her appointee.

Mrs. Hutchison, who claimed two-thirds of the runoff vote, was indicted by a Travis County grand jury last month on charges of conducting personal and political business out of the state treasurer's office that she held for 2 1/2 years. She has denied any wrongdoing.

Her spokesman, David Beckwith, said Monday that Mrs. Hutchison would welcome a challenge from Mattox.

"I think it would be an excellent matchup. The voters would have a crystal clear choice of entirely separate philosophies. If you were an ultra liberal you would say his (philosophy) was the good one," Beckwith said.

Mattox said that he had filed his statement of candidacy and a statement of campaign organization with the Federal Election Commission and Secretary of the U.S. Senate.

He said he has received "overwhelming encouragement to run from Democrats, small business owners, working folks and citizens fearful over escalating violent crime."

Mattox, 50, began his political career as a Democratic Party precinct chairman in Dallas.

From 1968 to 1970, he served as an assistant Dallas County district attorney.

## County nixes plea to maintain private road

A request that Deaf Smith County assume responsibility for maintenance of a privately-built roadway was turned down Monday by Commissioners' Court.

Marvin Weber asked that a road built in a subdivision north of the Hereford city limits be included in county road maintenance.

County Judge Tom Simons read from the road policy to explain that no roads may be added to the county system unless certain population requirements are met.

"There are no homes in the subdivision," he observed.

In other business, commissioners: -- Heard a report from Sheriff Joe Brown that indicates a fulltime jail

staff member must supervise meal preparation at all times.

-- Approved a request from Brown to advertise for bids for three vehicles for the sheriff's department.

-- Approved appointment of Birdine Huff as election judge for election precinct two and Alice Rice as alternate for precinct five.

A report on upgrading the computer system used by several county offices was given by County Clerk David Ruland. An expenditure of approximately \$3,000 will be required, he told the commission.

Formal action was not taken on the report although commissioners agreed, by common consent, to the proposal from Ruland.

Villalovos said he was hit on the head at the time. He was transported to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, where he was listed this morning in satisfactory condition.

Michael said reports about the incident are incomplete, because Villalovos was allegedly intoxicated Saturday and would not cooperate with police.

However, he had been named as a suspect in a criminal trespass case earlier in the evening Saturday that occurred in the 400 block of Avenue E.

Michael said it is uncertain what exactly happened to Villalovos, but said the incident is still under investigation.

But they may go to waste now that legislators have voted to spike the \$11 billion project to try trimming the federal deficit, a decision Gilbert calls shortsighted.

Gilbert said he is hoping others will see how valuable the site is - and can be - and they'll join him in trying to make sure there's enough money to continue the experiment.

"Perhaps, just perhaps, over the four years that will be required to fully close out the collider, public opinion and political will could again reverse themselves and the project, or one like it, will be restored."

Gilbert said the collider could be resurrected with financial backing from international or private supporters.

"Certainly that remains a possibility if there is leadership within governments and the scientific community to pursue that," Gilbert said. "Right now, I think everyone is a bit shell shocked from the impact of the recent events."

Many of Gilbert's sentiments were echoed in Austin by Gov. Ann Richards, who left for Washington Monday afternoon to try salvaging the jobs of some of the thousands of Texans put out of work by the killed project.

# State says Hutchison 'legal trick' won't work

**AUSTIN (AP)** - The latest move by U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison's attorneys in her ethics charges case was called a "legal trick" by prosecutors.

On Monday, Mrs. Hutchison's attorney fought to keep the charges against her in place rather than having the allegations presented to a second grand jury.

Attorney Dick DeGuerin of Houston said this would allow Mrs. Hutchison's trial to start as scheduled on Nov. 29.

"We want to go to trial right away. I feel certain that when we go to trial, a fair jury will find that Sen. Hutchison didn't do anything wrong," he said.

But Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle called it "a legal trick to delay proceedings while giving the appearance of seeking a quick trial."

Prosecutors said Mrs. Hutchison's lawyers will delay proceedings by continuing to attack other parts of the state's case, such as evidence secured by the grand jury that indicted her.

Lynch said he would rule on DeGuerin's request today.

Mrs. Hutchison, 50, was indicted last month by a Travis County grand jury on charges of using her previous office of state treasurer for personal and political gain, then destroying records as part of a coverup.

She denies any wrongdoing, and claims the allegations are the result of a Democratic plot to discredit her.

Her case - along with about 500 others - was called into question because one grand juror faced an outstanding theft charge. State law prohibits someone facing a theft charge from serving on a grand jury.

Although DeGuerin raised the initial questions about the improperly seated grand jury, on Monday he proposed that those indictments against Mrs. Hutchison be replaced with charges filed directly by the district attorney.

Early in the hearing, Lynch said he was ready to dismiss the indictments. But then he held off to allow the district attorney's office time to respond to DeGuerin's latest move.

Mrs. Hutchison's case was already being presented to another grand jury, Earle said.

# Lotto winner to take trip to introduce wife, children

**AUSTIN (AP)** - Pedro Quezada's parents have never met his children or his wife of five years. But after claiming his \$12.6 million share of Saturday's lotto jackpot, Quezada is planning a trip to Mexico to introduce them.

Quezada, a 32-year-old Mexican national from Chihuahua who has been in Texas for 10 years, said his family will make the jaunt "as soon as possible."

He has been a waiter at El Fenix for three years and before that worked on a West Texas ranch.

His ticket was one of three pick-six winners for the estimated \$40 million lotto jackpot. The other two tickets also were sold in the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex - Dallas and Arlington - but Quezada was the first to claim his part of the prize.

"I always knew I was going to win," said Quezada, who got a first payment of \$632,079.60 Monday. He will get \$632,000 annually for 19 more years.

Quezada also matched three numbers in the same drawing for a \$3 prize. When he got his big check, he asked about also collecting the smaller prize.

With the money, Quezada said he plans to "construct my own home from the bottom up," although he's not yet sure where. He added, "Now I can make sure my son and daughter go to good schools."

Until Saturday, the Houston area had produced the most lotto jackpot prize winners. But the three new winners make it a tie, with the Dallas-Fort Worth and Houston areas each producing 15 of the 77 winners since lotto started last November.

On the other hand, I live in fear that one day Dad is going to be seriously injured or worse. --Scared in N.Y.

**DEAR N.Y.:** Not a day goes by that I don't hear from an anxious son, daughter, grandchild or friend who is worried sick about an older family member or acquaintance who is a terrible driver.

To both the young and the old, driving represents independence. Once experienced, it's difficult to give up. However, there comes a time when it must be done to protect the public as well as the driver and his or her passengers.

In Illinois, drivers over 75 are given

vision and driving range tests every four years. Between ages 82 and 86, it's every two years. After age 87, it's every year.

In New York, however, the driving test is given only when a person applies for a license. There are no special requirements for seniors. If, however, a driver has three accidents within an 18-month period or if the Department of Motor Vehicles gets a complaint, a driving test may be requested.

If you believe a person of any age has a driving problem, a request for retesting can be made by court order or by the driver's physician. For you, I suggest the latter. Good luck.

**DEAR ANN LANDERS:** I certainly identified with the senorita who found most American men to be poor dancers. Most American WOMEN can't dance either.

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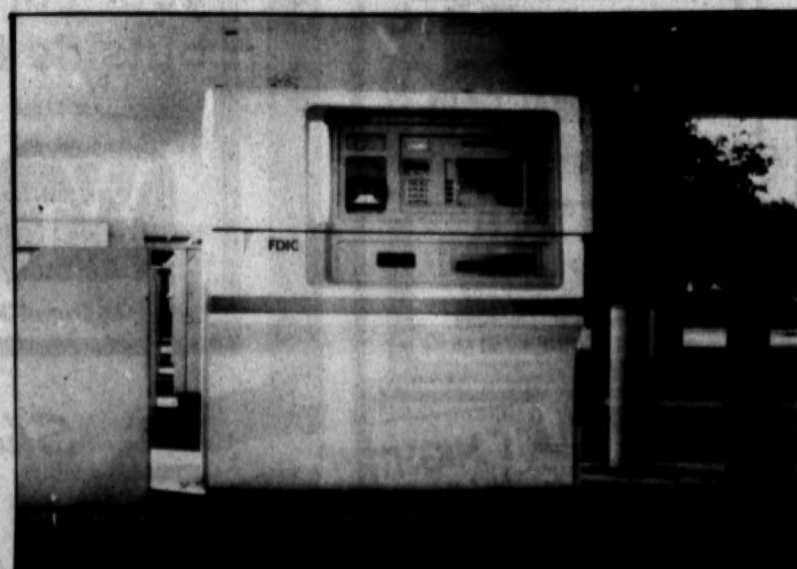

## Herd spikers clinch playoff berth

Dumas will meet either Snyder or

Levelland. This is the sixth straight year that Hereford and Dumas are the district's two playoff representatives. Borger was thought to be a contender going into district play, and Pampa was tied for second well into the district schedule. Borger and Pampa ended up 0-4 against Hereford and Dumas. "In one sense, it's a relief because this district is tougher this year than it's been in a while," Hereford coach

Brenda Reeh said. "We were fortunate to win the ones we had to win to get in." Senior setter Kara Sandoval, who's been a member of two regional finalist teams and one state semifinalist, has higher expectations. "It's not really exciting because I've been every year," she said, though admitting it's probably exciting for the several underclassmen on the team. "It'll be exciting

when we get to the state tournament and win that." "Our goal was to get first in district, to beat out Dumas," Sandoval continued, "but after (losing to Dumas) we just concentrated on one game at a time." "We were inconsistent in the first game," Reeh said. "I didn't feel like we had a hot hitter or an outstanding defensive player in the first part of the match. By the time the second game rolled around, everybody was making a better effort. We only went four rotations in the second game: Michelle Brock served for eight points on her serve, Aimee Alley had three and Melissa Berend had three."

Katie Young led the Herd with eight kills in the match, and Danielle Cornelius added four kills. Brock totaled 11 service points and had 11 digs. Jessica Evers had 10 digs.

Hereford closes out the regular season by hosting Pampa at 6 tonight in Whiteface Gym.

The Hereford junior varsity will start tonight's double header looking for a perfect district record. The JV beat Borger 15-2, 15-8 on Saturday, getting eight service points from Jennifer Rampley in the first game.

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## Astros' Portugal to test market

HOUSTON (AP) - Mark Portugal has done his job and now it's his agent's turn.

Portugal, finished off possibly his last season with the Houston Astros with a 12-game winning streak and an 18-4 record, was among 21 players who filed for free agency on Monday.

"I obviously filed because it's time to do that stuff," Portugal said. "I've never been through this so I'm just going to let my agent do what he has to do and listen to him."

He outpitched high-salaried free agents Doug Drabek (9-18, 3.79 ERA) and Greg Swindell (12-13, 4.16) and now expects to move closer to their price bracket.

"I'm not going to speculate how much it (contract offer) might be but I don't think Barry Bonds has anything to worry about," Portugal said. "I'm not going to pass him up making money but it will be interesting."

Portugal led the NL with an .818 winning percentage and his 2.77 ERA was the third best behind Atlanta's Greg Maddox and Cincinnati's Jose Rijo.

With Drabek and Swindell earning

contracts worth a combined \$36.5 million, the Astros may not be able to afford Portugal's new status.

Portugal's big season came after an injury-filled 1992 season when he was placed on the injured list twice before undergoing surgery to remove chips and a bone spur from his pitching elbow.

Portugal still made it back and started one game and relieved in two others before the season ended.

It gave him a head start for the 1993 season.

"Getting hurt at the end of '92 definitely motivated me to work harder and get ready for '93," Portugal said. "I'd never been injured before. The big contributing part of my success was my off-season."

Portugal wanted to pitch at the end of the 1992 season instead of waiting throughout the off-season to see if his arm had healed.

"That was for my own personal confidence," Portugal said. "I didn't want to be messed up thinking about what my arm would do the entire off-season."

Obviously, the strategy worked.

Portugal started his winning streak on July 7 and was steady the rest of the season. He was 1-2 on April 25 and went 17-2 the rest of the season. For the season, Portugal allowed three runs or fewer in 29 of his 33 starts.

In other action, the Astros announced they would not offer salary arbitration to infielder Jose Uribe and outfielder Kevin Bass. They will be eligible to file for free agency beginning Friday.

Bass, 34, began his second stint with the Astros this year after signing with the club as a free agent last January. In 11 games this season, Bass batted .284 with three homers and 37 RBIs and led the team with 14 pinch hits in 52 at-bats. Bass previously played with the Astros from 1982 to 1989.

Uribe, 32, also signed with Houston as a free agent in January. In 45 games this year, he had a .245 batting average with no homers and three RBIs.

The two were covered by the restriction against repeat free agency within five years. In the five days following the World Series, teams may offer arbitration to players in that group.

## Vikings' D dominates Bears

CHICAGO (AP) - What was billed as a battle of the defenses had a definite purple hue.

The Minnesota Vikings' defense set up one touchdown, scored another and then knocked the Chicago Bears' offense cockeyed by sacking quarterback Jim Harbaugh eight times Monday night on the way to a 19-12 victory.

It was somewhat of an awakening for the Bears, whose three-game winning streak came to an end.

"We got whipped in areas we thought we had made improvements in," said coach Dave Wannstedt. "Overall, the guys played hard, but the two turnovers resulted in two touchdowns, and that was the ball game."

But there was more. The ferocious front four of the Vikings never really gave Harbaugh a chance to get the team into more than field position for four field goals by Kevin Butler, including a 55-yarder, the longest of his career.

Minnesota coach Dennis Green summed it up well.

"I think our entire defensive line was very good," said Green. "We exploded off the ball with John Randall, Henry Thomas, Chris Doleman and Roy Barker. To do that, our linebackers had to stop the run."

They did. The Bears rushed for only 87 yards.

The heralded matchup between Harbaugh and Minnesota quarterback Jim McMahon never really developed.

Harbaugh was rushed too much to be effective as he completed 20 of 31 passes for 202 yards and was intercepted twice. McMahon was 14 of 27 for 90 yards and one interception. He left in the fourth quarter after getting kicked in the head by one of his teammates.

The big interception Harbaugh threw came in the third quarter when Audray McMillian picked it off and raced 22 yards for a touchdown and a 19-9 lead.

The two teams traded field goals before the first big turnover made an impact.

Harbaugh completed a 5-yard pass to Chris Gedney, who fumbled after being hit by Jack Del Rio, with Carl Lee recovering on the Chicago 26. Rookie Robert Smith went around left end for his first NFL touchdown and the first rushing touchdown this season allowed by Chicago.

That made it 10-3, Minnesota, and Chicago never caught up.

Butler kicked field goals of 55 and 39 yards, and Fuad Revez countered with a 25-yarder with 13 seconds left in the half as the Vikings took a 13-9 lead.

Another key situation developed early in the third quarter after Mark Carrier intercepted a McMahon pass and returned it to the Minnesota 38. Butler later attempted a 48-yard field goal, which was wide. But a penalty gave the Bears another shot.

This time they faked a field goal and holder Chris Gardocki threw a perfect pass to Butler, which would have been a first down and maybe a touchdown. Butler dropped the ball.

The Bears didn't convert a third-down play until the fourth quarter, and that's probably because the Vikings had read them well.

"Based on watching film, we knew they like to throw slants on third-and-5," said McMillian. "We happened to get a tremendous pass rush on Harbaugh and he got rid of

the ball real quick and we were in the right coverage. I couldn't believe he threw it when it came my way."

Randle, who had three of the sacks, said, "Harbaugh was trying to do the little things because we were coming down on him."

Harbaugh really never had a chance, and Wannstedt noted, "They blitzed more than we anticipated they would."

In Sunday's games, it was Atlanta 26, New Orleans 15; Buffalo 19, New York Jets 10; Houston 28, Cincinnati 12; Green Bay 37, Tampa Bay 14; Cleveland 28, Pittsburgh 23; Detroit 16, Los Angeles Rams 13; Seattle 10, New England 9; San Francisco 28, Phoenix 14; and Miami 41, Indianapolis 27.

The eight teams with open dates were Dallas, Philadelphia, Washington, Denver, Kansas City, San Diego, the Los Angeles Raiders and the New York Giants.

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## Astros talk with Bowa

HOUSTON (AP) - Philadelphia third-base coach Larry Bowa, who formerly managed the San Diego Padres, is the latest candidate to interview for the Houston's Astros' vacant managerial position.

Bowa interviewed with General Manager Bob Watson on Monday in a meeting arranged shortly after the Phillies lost the sixth game of the World Series to Toronto on Saturday.

Bowa told The Houston Chronicle he learned from his experiences with the Padres. He was manager there in 1987 and part of 1988.

"I said in the meeting (with Watson), I did some things I wouldn't do now," Bowa said. "When I took that job in San Diego, I didn't ask any of the questions that I asked today (Monday)."

Bowa had an 81-127 record as Padres manager. He admitted he had problems in dealing with the players, front office and the media.

"I've learned a lot in six years," Bowa said. "The main thing I believe is that you have to have good rapport with your boss."

Bowa says he's ready for a second chance.

"I know the National League by heart," he said. "I've played on five division winners, been to the World Series as a player and as a coach. I just feel I'm ready to manage again."

"Whether it's with the Houston Astros or with someone else, I feel the time has come."

Astros owner Drayton McLane and Watson started the interviewing process Friday by talking to at least three candidates, former Texas Rangers manager Bobby Valentine, Astros coach Matt Galante and Bob Boone, a former major league catcher, now a minor league manager.

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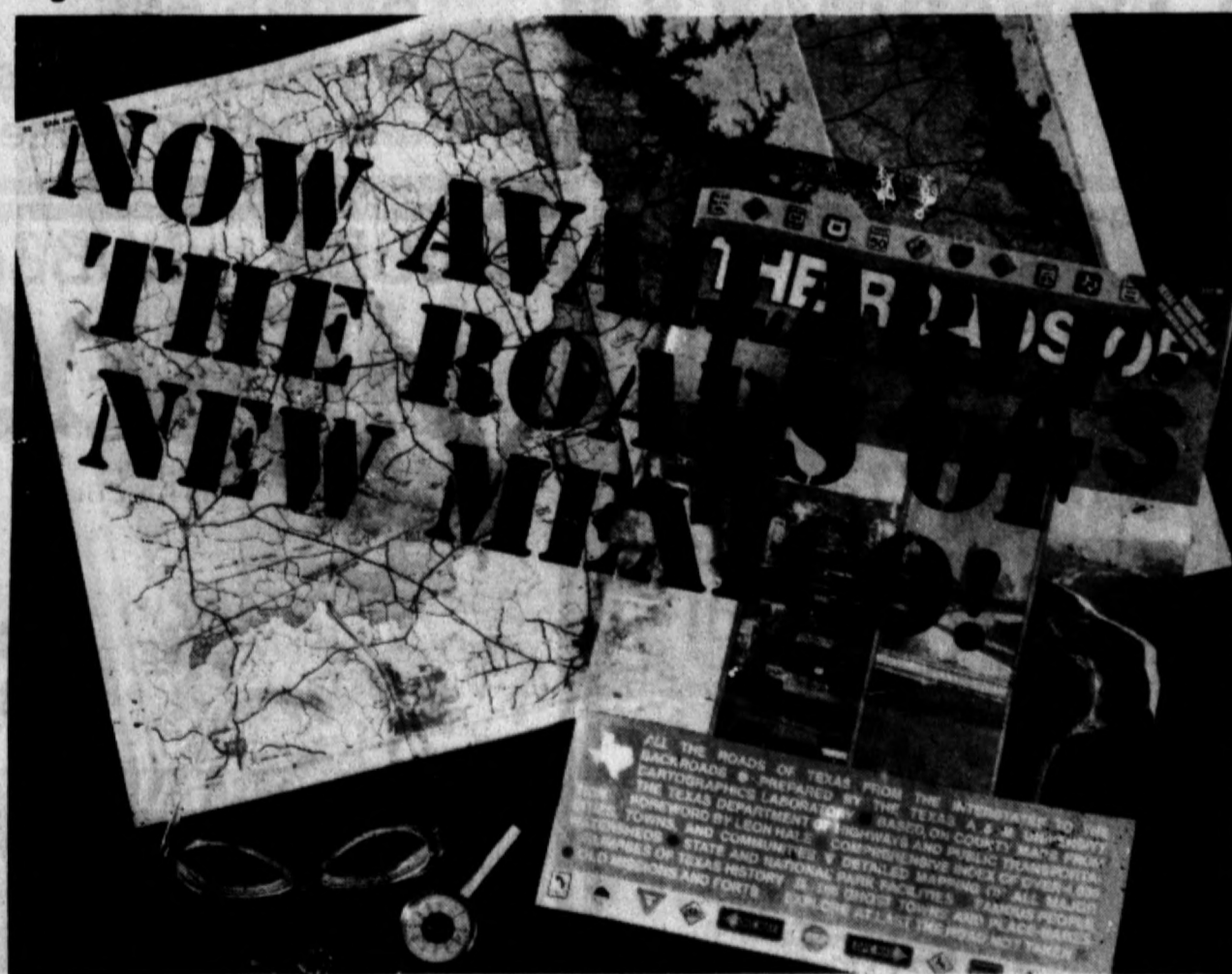
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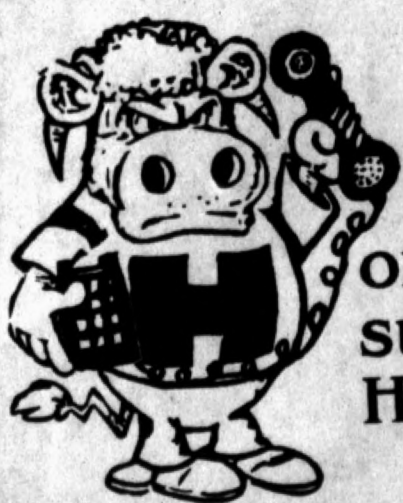

 The child was taken Oct. 1 by a kidnapper described as a bearded man armed with a knife.

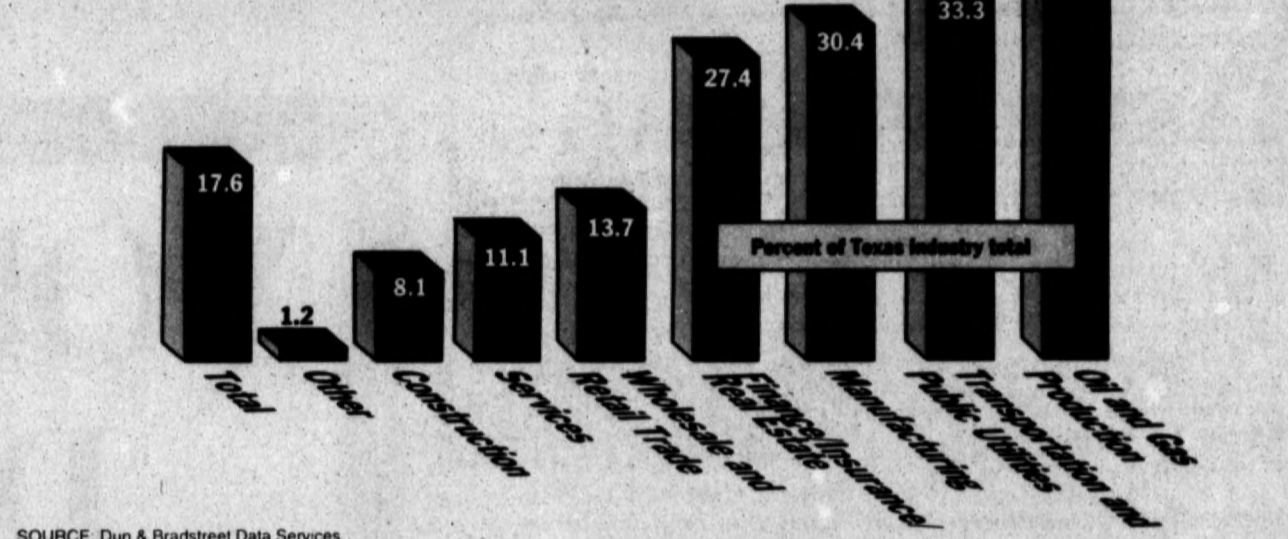
**Where do the Texas 100 call home?**

## Spook show actor Vincent Price dies of lung cancer

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Vincent Price, whose gaunt face and creepy voice put chills in such thrillers as "The Raven" and "House of Wax," was a modern-day Renaissance man who dedicated his life to the arts, friends and relatives say.  
 Price died Monday night at his Hollywood Hills home after a five-year struggle with lung cancer. He was 82.  
 "I think it's going to be a big loss because he gave so much through all the characters he played," said comedian Milton Berle, who knew Price from the actor's appearances on Berle's Texaco Star Theater in the 1950s.  
 "He was one of the finest actors, besides being one of the most charming gentlemen I ever met," Berle said.  
 Price was amused by his reputation as the perfect villain.  
 "I'm not the least bit disappointed that I'm remembered primarily for my horror roles," he said in 1985.  
 From the beginning of his film career in 1938, Price appeared in a variety of films, from the sublime ("Laura," "The Ten Commandments") to the ridiculous ("Dr. Goldfoot and the Bikini Machine").  
 Price exploited his reputation as a villain by contributing a ghostly voice to Michael Jackson's hit record, "Thriller," playing the creator of "Edward Scissorhands" in the 1990 film and hosting the PBS series "Mystery" during the 1980s.  
 But family members and friends remembered Price as a warm man who cared passionately about the arts.  
 "Some people remember him for the horror movies or the television shows, but his mission in life and the thing he believed in was the power of the arts," the actor's daughter, Victoria Price, said from a Los Angeles-bound airplane to join her family.  
 "He was just a wonderful man, a wonderful father, and a wonderful friend," his son, V.B. Price, said from his Albuquerque, N.M., home.  
 Price wrote several art books ("I Like What I Know") and wrote about cooking ("A Treasury of Great Recipes"). During the 1960s he

served as art-buying consultant for Sears, Roebuck and Co., which was selling original art. He also founded a college art gallery.  
 Born May 27, 1911, Price was the son of a St. Louis candy manufacturer. His father's wealth shaped his childhood, with art-viewing tours of Europe and a Yale University education. Price graduated with a degree in art history and English.  
 While studying at the University of London, he took a dare from a friend and auditioned for a role in the play "Chicago" starring John Gielgud.  
 He got the role and was then cast in "Victoria Regina," his 6-foot-4 frame and precise speech just fitting the role of Prince Albert. Producer Gilbert Miller invited him to appear opposite Helen Hayes in the New York production.  
 Price performed in several plays at Orson Welles' Mercury Theater. In 1938 he married his first wife, actress Edith Barrett, on the theater's stage.  
 That same year, Price moved to Hollywood, and he remained thereafter. Under contract to 20th Century Fox, he proved a valuable character actor in such films as

"Song of Bernadette," "Wilson," "The Eve of St. Mark," "Leave Her to Heaven" and "Dragonwyck."  
 As a free-lance actor he appeared in a wide variety of films, including "Up in Central Park," "Abbott and Costello Meet the Invisible Man," "The Three Musketeers," "Curtain Call at Cactus Creek" and "Son of Sinbad."  
 His reputation as a scare merchant was established in the 1953 3-D thriller, "House of Wax."

## Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: I am a 74-year-old male and have suffered from incontinence after a radical prostatectomy three years ago. I understand there is a stop or check valve between the bladder and the urethra. When the bladder fills, it sends a message to the brain, and if all is in order, the brain sends a message to open the valve and empty the bladder. This works OK for me and the signals get through. But the valve leaks in between times.

If doctors can repair or replace a heart valve that opens and closes 60 to 80 times a minute, why can't they fix a leaky bladder valve that opens and closes four to six times a day?

DEAR READER: There is a major difference between the valve that opens and closes to drain the bladder and heart valves that open and close. In the heart, the valves simply work mechanically, related to whether there is pressure on one side to cause them to open, like pushing open a door or pressure on the other side to close the door. No nerve signals are necessary.

The sphincter for the bladder outlet is stimulated by nerve fibers, rather than responding simply to pressure. If the nerve doesn't work right, as it may not after a prostatectomy, the valve doesn't function properly.

Incontinence for a short time after a prostatectomy is fairly common. The muscles in the bladder that contract to expel urine are over-developed from contracting forcefully to empty the bladder. This cause usually resolves itself within six months. Or the sphincter itself may be weak, particularly in the first few days after the catheter has been removed. This persists in only about 1 percent of patients who have had a prostate operation. A clot may also prop the sphincter open. Since you have had a problem for three years, it sounds rather permanent.

For persistent significant incontinence, an inflatable cuff can be placed surgically around the urethra at the outlet of the bladder. When it is inflated, it prevents leakage, and when deflated, the bladder can be drained.

DEAR DR. LAMB: I read in your column about the danger to pregnant women or their unborn babies when there are cats around. What can happen and how? I have two granddaughters who are pregnant and both have cats. Does the cat have to be ill to cause problems? I wish now I had saved your columns.

DEAR READER: The fear of cats during pregnancy is greatly overdone. Toxoplasmosis is a parasitic disease, and the cysts are excreted by the cat. The parasite can cause serious birth defects to a child. BUT this does not happen if the mother does not contract the disease DURING pregnancy.

Antibody studies show that 20 to 70 percent of American adults have already been infected. These mothers cannot transmit the disease to an unborn baby. If the mother-to-be also avoids any contact with cat litter, that will help. Accidental ingestion of the parasite from the litter is how it is spread. And a cat that is not allowed to roam and eats prepared food will not get infected either.

A more common source of the parasite is undercooked meat. The parasite is in the fibers of the meat. But if a woman has antibodies to toxoplasmosis, none of this is important.

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## Value of organizing wardrobe explained by extension agent

"Organizing Your Life--Through Your Wardrobe" was the program presented during the Oct. 19 meeting of Xi Epsilon Alpha Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi Sorority. Site of the meeting was The Gift Garden as guest speaker, Beverly Harder, Deaf Smith County Extension, agent gave tips on proper closet management.

Harder noted that large companies spend a lot of money sending employees to seminars that teach them to evaluate and organize their clothes and closet, hoping employees will feel more in control of their time and feel better about themselves.

The speaker said that four basic principles presented by experts include: (1) Be honest with yourself; are you a slob, a medium slob or a neat freak?; (2) Clear the clothes closet of everything, painting the inside a glossy white for best lighting and decorating with scented items, shelf paper or wall paper. Vacuum it, clean the baseboards, and sprinkle bay leaves around to repel clothes damaging carpet beetles; (3) Ask a

friend over to critique each garment, trying on one garment at a time. Create throwaway or give away stacks and "keeper" stacks; (4) "Break" your closet up by hanging like items together, as jackets, blouses, skirts, slacks. Use padded or plastic hangers and use a tie rack for belts.

Harder also provided other tips about revitalizing clothes; properly packing for the fewest wrinkles; and how to pack a suitcase.

Following Harder's presentation, President Linda Arellano conducted the business meeting. In attendance were Deann Harris, Melinda Henson, Carol Kelley, Ruby Lee, Connie Matthews, Gaye Reilly, Susan Shaw and Melinda Whitfill.

## AMENDMENT 1

### Wording on the Ballot

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$50 MILLION OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS FOR THE RECOVERY AND FURTHER DEVELOPMENT OF THE STATE'S ECONOMY AND FOR INCREASING JOB OPPORTUNITIES AND OTHER BENEFITS FOR TEXAS RESIDENTS THROUGH STATE FINANCING OF THE START-UP COSTS OF HISTORICALLY UNDER-UTILIZED BUSINESSES.

### Explanation

Article 16, Sec. 6 of the Texas Constitution prohibits any appropriation of state money for private purposes, unless authorized by the constitution. Article 3, sec. 49 prohibits the legislature from creating state debt without specific authorization in the constitution. Voters have approved a number of amendments to Sec. 49.

This proposition would add a new Sec. 72 to Art. 16 of the Texas Constitution to authorize the legislature to issue up to \$50 million in general obligation bonds to aid in the start-up costs of historically under-utilized businesses. The Government Code defines "historically under-utilized businesses" as those owned by one or more persons who are socially disadvantaged because of their identification as members of certain groups, including African Americans, Native Americans, Asian Pacific Americans, Hispanic Americans, and women.

The proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to establish a Texas historically under-utilized business capital growth and start-up fund to be used solely for the start-up costs of historically under-utilized businesses. The fund would contain a program account, an interest and sinking account, and other accounts authorized by the legislature. The legislature would be authorized to require review and approval of the issuance of the \$50 million in bonds, of the use of the bond proceeds, or of the rules adopted by an agency to govern the use of the bond proceeds.

### Supporters Say

- Long-standing prejudice has prevented many minorities and women from obtaining the necessary funding to start their own businesses in this state. The proposed amendment would correct historic injustices and encourage the development of business by providing the financial backing the owners need to get started.
- The state should promote economic development in many areas. The jobs that would be created by this proposition would be an important part of a healthy, diversified economy.

### Opponents Say

- It is not fair for the state to provide financial assistance to certain businesses just because they are owned by minorities or women. This would give those businesses a competitive advantage.
- The language in the amendment does not indicate whether the \$50 million in bond money would be lent or given in the form of grants to minority- and women-owned businesses. Until we know what we are voting on we should not support this proposal.

## AMENDMENT 2

### Wording on the Ballot

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO PROMOTE THE REDUCTION OF POLLUTION AND TO ENCOURAGE THE PRESERVATION OF JOBS BY AUTHORIZING THE EXEMPTION FROM AD VALOREM TAXATION OF REAL AND PERSONAL PROPERTY USED FOR THE CONTROL OF AIR, WATER, OR LAND POLLUTION.

### Explanation

The Texas Constitution requires that taxation be equal and uniform and that property be taxed in proportion to its value unless it is specifically exempted by constitutional provision. This proposed amendment would permit the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation all or part of property used, constructed, acquired, or installed wholly or partly to meet federal, state, or local regulations for the prevention, monitoring, control, or reduction of air, water, or land pollution. The exemption would apply only to real property acquired after January 1, 1994, and to other property that would otherwise be taxable for the first time on or after January 1, 1994. Determination of the percentage of property eligible for the exemption would be made by the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission. Property used for pollution control subject to a tax abatement agreement executed before January 1, 1994 would not be eligible for the exemption authorized by this provision.

### Supporters Say

- A property tax exemption for pollution control devices would promote voluntary compliance with environmental regulations.
- It is unfair to tax businesses on property they are required by law to purchase. The amendment would rectify this injustice.
- Enactment of the amendment could result in an increase in net tax collections because businesses that might have found it economical to move to one of the 32 states that already offer similar tax incentives would remain in Texas. The exemption would also encourage relocation and development of new businesses in Texas, thus adding to the tax base.

### Opponents Say

- Business does not have a right to pollute. Laws that require installation of pollution control equipment are intended to prevent harm to the air, water, or land. It is not appropriate to offer tax incentives to encourage companies to operate clean businesses.
- While it is difficult to estimate the precise fiscal implications of the proposition, it is clear that school districts, cities, counties, and other taxing entities could lose substantial revenue on a long-term basis. Local taxpayers would be forced to subsidize the cost of all new pollution-control equipment. This type of tax exemption skews the balance of the tax system.
- While some businesses might leave Texas if they were not granted this tax break, most businesses choose their locations for other reasons than property taxes, such as proximity to raw materials, transportation links, and availability of a skilled workforce. Such considerations would provide continuing incentives for remaining in Texas. In any case, many businesses that have made large capital investments in local plants could not afford to close or move.

## AMENDMENT 3

### Wording on the Ballot

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROVIDING FOR THE CLEARING OF LAND TITLES BY THE RELEASE OF A STATE CLAIM IN A FRACTIONAL INTEREST, ARISING OUT OF THE VOIDING OF AN INTEREST UNDER A MEXICAN LAND GRANT, TO THE OWNERS OF CERTAIN PROPERTY IN FORT BEND AND AUSTIN COUNTIES.

### Explanation

The proposed amendment is designed to clear the titles of landowners in the Shelby-Frazier-McCormick League grant by releasing all claims by the state to the property, including surface rights and mineral rights. Recently it was discovered that the state has a claim to the one-third interest in this 428-acre tract that was originally granted to John McCormick, one of three men who received a grant from Stephen F. Austin in 1824. The state maintains that McCormick abandoned the land although the state never declared the land available for re-grant, the normal practice in cases of abandonment. The state also maintains that the McCormick grant reverted to the Permanent School Fund in 1900, along with all unappropriated land in Texas. Assets of the Permanent School Fund can be disposed of only by receiving fair market value in exchange. The proposed amendment would require the state to surrender its claim and grant a clear title to the current owners.

### Supporters Say

- It is not fair to penalize the current landowners who purchased the land in good faith. Because of a legal dispute over events that occurred many years ago, the current owners lack clear title to the land and cannot sell or mortgage it.
- The cost to the state of legally pursuing its claim would far outweigh any benefit that would be gained from the property.

### Opponents Say

- It is inappropriate to ask the voters of Texas to judge individual and technical land title disputes.
- We need another mechanism for settling such cases without the trouble and expense of a constitutional amendment. Similar amendments to settle land disputes involving only a few citizens have been presented to voters in recent elections. These cases will continue to arise and should be resolved by other means.

## AMENDMENT 4

### Wording on the Ballot

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROHIBITING A PERSONAL INCOME TAX WITHOUT VOTER APPROVAL AND, IF AN INCOME TAX IS ENACTED, DEDICATING THE REVENUE TO EDUCATION AND LIMITING THE RATE OF LOCAL SCHOOL TAXES.

### Explanation

This proposed amendment would restrict the power of the Texas Legislature to enact a personal income tax. Art. VIII, Sec. 1 (c) of the Texas Constitution provides that the legislature "may also tax incomes of both natural persons and corporations." This is one of the original provisions of the constitution as enacted in 1876. The proposed amendment would require prior voter approval in a statewide referendum

before the legislature may effectively impose a tax "on the net incomes of natural persons, including a person's share of partnership and unincorporated association income." The referendum would also specify the rate of tax that would be imposed on personal incomes.

The proposition also provides that any legislative increase in the rate of a state personal income tax would be subject to voter approval, again in a statewide referendum.

Further, the legislature, in implementing a personal income tax, could provide for taxation of income in a manner consistent with federal law.

In addition to requiring a statewide referendum for the imposition of a personal income tax, the proposed amendment would restrict the use of revenues generated by such a tax. At least two-thirds of the net revenues must be used to reduce local property taxes imposed for the day-to-day operations of public schools. The remaining income tax revenues (about one-third) "shall be used for the support of education" at the direction of the legislature.

Having dedicated two-thirds of income tax revenues to the reduction of local school property taxes, the proposition provides that the maximum rate of property tax that a school district could impose for day-to-day operations would be reduced as revenues are generated from the income tax. (The maximum rate allowed under the Texas Education Code would be reduced by an amount equal to 1¢/\$100 valuation for each 1¢/\$100 valuation that the school operations tax is reduced by income tax revenues.) Local voters could, however, increase the maximum school operations tax in a subsequent election.

### Supporters Say

- It is appropriate to give voters the opportunity to decide whether the state may impose a personal income tax. The amendment would require that Texas voters directly approve such a tax and at a specified rate before such tax goes into effect. Any increase in the income tax rate would also be contingent upon voter approval.
- This proposed amendment, by placing restrictions on the enactment of a personal income tax, would guard against adoption of an ill-advised income tax in a time of state fiscal crisis.
- The property tax relief provision of this amendment would benefit business in Texas by shifting the tax burden from the local school property tax, which all businesses pay, to the personal income tax. The same provision would also benefit homeowners with modest incomes who are burdened by high local property taxes.
- The dedication to education provision of this amendment would benefit education (public school and/or higher education, at the direction of the legislature) by providing a stable source of funding and the potential for additional state funding for education.
- Dedicating a portion of income tax revenues to education may free up revenues from the sales and other state taxes for use in other needed areas of state government.
- Legislators would more likely take political risks to adopt a state income tax, which is a broad-based, progressive tax reaching presently under-taxed portions of our economy and population, if voters approve this amendment endorsing the concept of a limited personal income tax.
- This amendment would perhaps authorize a graduated income tax system, allowing the tax-

tion of higher incomes at higher rates as in the federal system.

### Opponents Say

- A constitutional prohibition against the income tax without prior voter approval is unnecessary. The present constitution gives the legislature the power to enact an income tax, yet Texas does not have a personal income tax.
- This amendment promotes government by referendum. Direct voter approval for the power to tax personal incomes would be required, whereas such power now rests with the legislature under our representative form of government. Placing this ballot issue before the voters allows the legislature to duck responsibility assigned to it by our state constitution.
- This amendment would create a rigid and inflexible system of taxation by making any tax restructuring involving the personal income tax subject to voter approval, and by dedicating personal income tax revenues chiefly to local property tax relief. Texas is in critical need of an overhaul of its antiquated tax system, and the adoption of this proposition would make it that much harder for the legislature to do the restructuring that is required.
- Because local school property tax relief would be attractive to many, voters may be persuaded to vote for an income tax under this amendment. Opponents insist that what is needed, instead, is a constitutional amendment unconditionally prohibiting a personal income tax.
- This is a highly technical amendment. Its provisions are open to various interpretations, and passage may result in litigation.
- While this amendment provides for relief from one tax considered regressive and rigid, the local school property tax, it brings no relief from a second regressive tax, the sales tax.
- This amendment may bring relatively few new dollars for education and other state needs. At least two-thirds of any income tax revenues would be dedicated to local property tax relief. The overall effect would be tax neutral because income tax revenues would mainly replace revenues previously generated from local school taxes.

## AMENDMENT 5

### Wording on the Ballot

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO ALLOW THE LEGISLATURE TO PRESCRIBE THE QUALIFICATIONS OF SHERIFFS.

### Explanation

Article V, Section 23 of the Texas Constitution creates the elected office of county sheriff and authorizes the legislature to prescribe the duties and remuneration of those holding this office. As currently worded, the constitution does not authorize the legislature to prescribe qualifications or standards that must be met by those seeking election as sheriffs.

Sheriffs in most Texas counties function as primary law enforcement officers. Many sheriffs are heads of agencies overseeing the operations of county jails. Sheriffs are not required to be commissioned as peace officers, and are not subject to the requirements of the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education (TCLEOSE). These standards include 400 hours of training, a licensing examination, and 40 hours of in-service training every two years.

The proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to prescribe qualifications for sheriffs. If the amendment is approved by voters, enabling legislation that was enacted in the 1993 legislative session would take effect. Under this legislation, sheriffs must obtain licensing by TCLEOSE within two years after taking office or be subject to removal from office on grounds of incompetency. The legislation would also establish requirements for the revocation, suspension, or cancellation of a sheriff's license and would set the following qualifications for sheriffs: minimum age 21, high school education, no felony convictions. Those elected or appointed before the effective date of the legislation would be exempt from these qualifications.

### Supporters Say

- Sheriffs have heavy responsibilities but are the only officials in the state who are not required to meet qualifications before taking office.
- Sheriffs who are commissioned peace officers would be more effective as supervisors of deputies who are required to be commissioned.
- Sheriffs who are not trained as commissioned peace officers may not know constitutional law regarding civil rights and law enforcement and are thus more likely to violate the law and abuse their police power.

### Opponents Say

- Voters should be allowed to make their own judgements as to which candidates are qualified to be sheriffs.
- Sparsely populated rural counties may have difficulty finding candidates with the required qualifications.
- Although the qualifications that would be set under the 1993 legislation are not overly restrictive, approval of the amendment would mean that future legislatures could impose other standards that would be difficult for many who are willing and able to serve as sheriffs to meet.

## AMENDMENT 6

### Wording on the Ballot

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ABOLISHING THE OFFICE OF COUNTY SURVEYOR IN JACKSON COUNTY.

### Explanation

The Texas Constitution requires each of the 254 counties in the state to elect a county surveyor. This proposed amendment would abolish the surveyor's office in Jackson County. In amendments already adopted, the county surveyor's office has been abolished in Denton, Randall, Collin, Dallas, El Paso, Henderson, Cass, Ector, Garza, Smith, Bexar, Harris, and Webb counties. This amendment does not require a separate vote by Jackson County residents. If this proposition passes, the records would be transferred to the county clerk, and the powers, duties, and functions of the office would be transferred to another county officer or employee designated by the commissioners court.

### Supporters Say

- The office of county surveyor has become largely a record-keeping position and is unfilled in many counties. Its duties could easily be transferred to another office, thus increasing the efficiency of county government.
- Commissioners courts are required to provide an

office for the county surveyor. If the post were abolished, taxpayers would not have that expense.

### Opponents Say

- Every time an office like county surveyor or treasurer is abolished, more power is placed in the hands of county commissioners who then decide who will perform the duties of the abolished office.
- The county surveyor's office is not obsolete. County surveyors can act as impartial judges to resolve disputes among private surveyors or disputes between counties over boundaries.

## AMENDMENT 7

### Wording on the Ballot

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT REPEALING CERTAIN RESTRICTIONS ON THE ABILITY OF CORPORATIONS TO RAISE CAPITAL.

### Explanation

This proposed amendment would repeal Art. XII, Sec. 6 of the state constitution that provides: "No corporation shall issue stock or bonds except for money paid, labor done, or property actually received, and all fictitious increase of stock or indebtedness shall be void." This provision, part of the original constitution adopted in 1876, was designed to protect stockholders and corporate creditors from stockwatering and other abusive practices. The proposed

amendment would repeal the quoted provision that prevents enactment of the type of stock issuance legislation adopted in other states.

### Supporters Say

- Repeal of Art. XII, Sec. 6 is required in order to permit passage of modern legislation giving more financial flexibility to corporations in raising capital and creating executive financial packages.
- Protection from the types of abuses that occurred in the last century and that Art. XII, Sec. 6 was intended to prevent is now provided by federal securities regulations and by Texas law governing business associations and securities.

### Opponents Say

- A constitutional provision provides the safest protection against securities abuses.
- Since Texas corporations have become successful while operating under the present provision, repeal of the constitutional provision is not necessary or advisable.

## AMENDMENT 8

### Wording on the Ballot

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO ABOLISH THE OFFICE OF COUNTY SURVEYOR IN McLENNAN COUNTY.

### Explanation

The Texas Constitution requires each of the 254 counties in the state to elect a county surveyor. This proposed amendment would abolish the surveyor's

office in McLennan County, provided a majority of qualified voters approve at an election called by the county commissioners court. In amendments already adopted, the county surveyor's office has been abolished in Denton, Randall, Collin, Dallas, El Paso, Henderson, Cass, Ector, Garza, Smith, Bexar, Harris, and Webb counties. If McLennan County voters subsequently approve abolishing the office of county surveyor, the records would be transferred to the county clerk, and the powers, duties, and functions of the office would be transferred to another county officer or employee designated by the commissioners court.

### Supporters Say

- The office of county surveyor has become largely a record-keeping position and is unfilled in many counties. Its duties could easily be transferred to another office, thus increasing the efficiency of county government.
- Commissioners courts are required to provide an office for the county surveyor. If the post were abolished, taxpayers would not have that expense.

### Opponents Say

- Every time an office like county surveyor or treasurer is abolished, more power is placed in the hands of county commissioners who then decide who will perform the duties of the abolished office.
- The county surveyor's office is not obsolete. County surveyors can act as impartial judges to resolve disputes among private surveyors, or disputes between counties over boundaries.

## VOTERS INFORMATION

### - VOTING CERTIFICATE -

- After you register, you receive a voter registration certificate which you should present at the polling place in order to vote.
- The current voter registration certificate is blue.
- If you have lost or misplaced your certificate, notify the voter registrar of your county in writing, and he or she will issue a replacement certificate.
- You may vote without your certificate by signing an affidavit at the polling place stating that you do not have your certificate and are a registered voter.
- You will receive a new certificate every two years as long as your registration is not canceled.

### - MOVING WITHIN THE COUNTY -

- After moving, notify the county voter registrar in writing of your new address. You should transfer your registration to your new address as soon as possible.
- You may vote at your previous precinct for one year after you move (or until your registration is transferred, whichever comes first).

### - MOVING FROM ONE COUNTY TO ANOTHER -

- If you move from one Texas county to another, you must re-register in the county of your new residence.
- You may be eligible to vote a limited ballot for 90 days after you move if your new registration is not yet effective. However, the limited ballot is available only during early voting, not on election day.
- Contact the county clerk or elections administrator in your new county for information.



## AMENDMENT 9

### Wording on the Ballot

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO MODIFY THE PROVISIONS FOR THE REDEMPTION OF REAL PROPERTY SOLD AT A TAX SALE.

### Explanation

This constitutional amendment would limit a former owner's right of redemption for land or other property sold at a tax sale to pay back taxes. Art 8, Sec. 13 of the Texas Constitution currently allows the former owner to redeem such land within two years. In the first year, the former owner can reclaim his or her land by repaying the amount paid at the tax sale plus 25 percent. In the second year, the former owner can reclaim the land by repaying the amount paid at the tax sale plus 50 percent.

The proposed amendment would change Art. 8, Sec. 13. The amended section would allow the current two-year period for redemption only for residence homesteads and agricultural land. For other property (such as commercial property and non-homestead residential property), the legislature could limit the right of redemption to six months.

The proposed amendment would also remove a constitutional provision requiring the legislature to establish a procedure to provide for tax sales without a court suit. (This provision has been in the constitution from the first, but the legislature has never established such a procedure, and tax sales still require a court suit.)

The proposed amendment would take effect January 1, 1994. It includes a temporary provision to continue the current law for property sold at a tax sale before January 1, 1994.

### Supporters Say

- This change would encourage investors and developers to purchase property at tax sales. The current law, requiring the purchaser to wait two years for a secure title, discourages such purchases and makes it hard for local governments to sell the property.
- Former owners of such property get plenty of notice before it is sold. They have to be sued, taken to court, foreclosed upon, and notified of the tax sale. Under this law, they would still have six months for redemption after that.
- Since residence homesteads and agricultural property are exempted, the proposed change would affect primarily rundown apartment buildings and crack houses.

### Opponents Say

- Small taxpayers may be deprived of their property if this right of redemption is decreased.
- Personal financial problems or the poor state economy may cause taxpayers to fall behind in their taxes. The current law gives them a chance to recover and should not be changed.
- This extra layer of protection from government tax sales has been a part of our constitution for decades and we should not give it up now.

## AMENDMENT 10

### Wording on the Ballot

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF \$750 MILLION IN GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS TO AUGMENT THE

VETERANS' LAND FUND AND THE VETERANS' HOUSING ASSISTANCE FUND AND TO FUND THE VETERANS' HOUSING ASSISTANCE FUND II.

### Explanation

Existing provisions in the Texas Constitution authorize the Veterans Land Board (VLB) to sell more than \$2 billion in general obligation bonds. Proceeds from these bonds are used to provide low interest loans to eligible veterans for land and home purchases. The VLB is nearing the current constitutional limit on the amount of its general bonding authority. The proposed amendment would authorize the VLB to issue an additional \$750 million in general obligation bonds, of which \$250 million would be used to finance the land program and \$500 million to finance the housing program. A new fund, the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II, would be created to receive the proceeds of the housing bonds. The VLB has statutory authority to issue revenue bonds, but the proposed amendment would also grant the VLB constitutional authority to issue revenue bonds that could be secured by mortgage loans made through the land and housing programs. (Revenue bonds are bonds that have a specific source of payment dedicated to repay them. General obligation bonds, on the other hand, are general obligations of the state that must be paid from general treasury funds. The issuance of general obligation bonds must be specifically authorized in the Texas Constitution.)

### Supporters Say

- It is appropriate for the state to continue to make low interest land and housing loans available to Texas veterans who have served and sacrificed for their country.

## THE VOTER'S BILL OF RIGHTS

*WHEREAS*, the right of American citizens to vote is the fundamental right that defines our democracy . . .

*AND WHEREAS*, the strength of that democracy is dependent on the informed and active participation of its citizens . . .

*AND WHEREAS*, that strength is weakened when the electoral system fails to facilitate and encourage this right of citizen participation . . .

*THEREFORE*, I join with the League of Women Voters in proudly asserting and supporting this Voter's Bill of Rights as we move together as citizens to make these principles a reality.

### WE FIRMLY BELIEVE . . .

EVERY VOTER HAS THE RIGHT to a simple and straightforward system of voter registration and elections that accommodates citizens' needs rather than bureaucratic convenience . . .

EVERY VOTER HAS THE RIGHT to political campaigns that are vigorously contested but fairly conducted, free of character assassination, innuendo, and half truths . . .

EVERY VOTER HAS THE RIGHT to know political candidates' views, opinions, and records on substantive issues . . .

EVERY VOTER HAS THE RIGHT to hear candidates debate the important issues facing the nation in open forums, free from campaign manipulation and partisan control . . .

EVERY VOTER HAS THE RIGHT to elections conducted under a system of campaign financing that enables challengers to compete effectively with incumbents and reduces the undue influence that special interest group money can exert on those elected . . .

EVERY VOTER HAS THE RIGHT to know that his or her vote has the same weight as every other person's vote and is not diluted by the partisan gerrymander of election district boundaries . . .

AND, FINALLY, EVERY VOTER HAS THE RIGHT to know that the principles of democratic government enumerated in the Voter's Bill of Rights will be upheld by every individual elected to serve in that government.

## Amendment 10

- These loans are not a financial risk for the state. The land and housing programs are designed to be self-supporting and have never relied on general revenue for payment of debt service on the bonds.
- The revenue bonds that the amendment would authorize are already authorized in the implementing legislation enacted in 1993 which also provides that these revenue bonds can be used to refund general obligation bonds and reduce the state's outstanding debt.

### Opponents Say

- Veterans already have access to many benefits, including federal government-subsidized mortgages at lower than market rates. It is unnecessary to increase the state's indebtedness to add to these benefits.
- It is fiscally irresponsible to add to the state's indebtedness at a time when the rate of increase of general revenue collections is not keeping pace with the rate of growth of debt service. The legislature should undertake a comprehensive evaluation of overall state debt before voters are asked to add to it.
- Government borrowing, such as that proposed in the amendment, puts the state in competition with private enterprise to obtain funds in a limited market. This competition inflates interest rates and slows economic growth.

## AMENDMENT 11

### Wording on the Ballot

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROVIDING THAT THE TRUSTEES OF A LOCAL PUBLIC PENSION SYSTEM MUST ADMINISTER THE SYSTEM FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE SYSTEM'S PARTICIPANTS AND BENEFICIARIES.

### Explanation

This proposition would amend Article 16, Sec. 67 of the Texas Constitution to establish rules for trustees of local public pension systems for running their systems. The trustees would have to administer the system, hold the assets of the system for the exclusive purposes of providing benefits to participants and their beneficiaries and paying reasonable costs to administer the system, select legal counsel and an actuary, and adopt sound actuarial assumptions to be used by the retirement system.

### Supporters Say

- By specifying in the constitution the duties of trustees of public pension systems that are not affiliated with statewide systems, this proposition would protect the members of these systems.
- While Texas has not experienced problems with local public retirement systems, other states have. This amendment would help Texas avoid problems in the more than 300 such systems in the state.

### Opponents Say

- The duties of trustees of pension systems are laid out in other regulations. We do not need a constitutional amendment to make these clear.
- If it is necessary to specify the duties of trustees of local public retirement systems, this can be

done by law. We should stop cluttering up the constitution with language that more properly belongs in statute.

## AMENDMENT 12

### Wording on the Ballot

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PERMITTING THE DENIAL OF BAIL TO CERTAIN PERSONS CHARGED WITH CERTAIN VIOLENT OR SEXUAL OFFENSES COMMITTED WHILE UNDER THE SUPERVISION OF A CRIMINAL JUSTICE AGENCY OF THE STATE OR A POLITICAL SUBDIVISION OF THE STATE.

### Explanation

Article 1, Section 11a. of the Texas Constitution gives courts discretion to deny bail pending trial to those accused of certain non-capital felonies. Bail may be denied only after a hearing in which substantial evidence of guilt has been presented. Currently, this constitutional provision is applicable to the following categories of defendants: those accused of a felony after two successive felony convictions, those accused of a felony committed while on bail for a prior felony, and those accused of a felony involving use of a deadly weapon after a felony conviction. The proposed amendment would add several categories of defendants to the list of those for whom bail may be denied: those accused of certain violent or sexual offenses while under supervision of a state or local criminal justice agency for a prior felony. Violent offenses are defined as murder, aggravated assault, aggravated kidnapping, and aggravated robbery. Sexual offenses are defined as aggravated sexual assault, sexual assault, and indecency with a child. "Under supervision" means probation, parole, or mandatory supervision.

### Supporters Say

- Recent heinous crimes committed by parolees and probationers free on bail after being charged with other offenses demonstrate the need for this amendment. The existing law, which provides for the issuance of a warrant under which a parolee arrested for a new crime cannot be freed on bail until after a parole revocation hearing, does not provide sufficient protection to the public: A warrant must be withdrawn if a hearing is not held within 70 days, and warrants are not always issued or accepted because of jail overcrowding.
- The proposed amendment, by extending current law to allow denial of bail to probationers and parolees accused of violent and sexual offenses that do not involve deadly weapons, would also provide extra protection to children and elderly and disabled persons who are the most frequent victims of these types of crimes.
- Under the amendment, defendants would be entitled to due process of law, including a hearing that must show substantial evidence of guilt, and the right to have the order denying bail set aside if trial is not held or a continuance granted at the request of the accused within 60 days.

### Opponents Say

- This form of preventive detention would prevent few offenses and would place more of a burden on already overcrowded jails.
- This change in the law would unnecessarily expand the authority of judges to keep people in jail for protection against crimes that may never occur. Currently, those on conditional release can be detained in jail for violating the conditions

of their release, or bail can be set at higher amounts when circumstances warrant.

- The problem addressed by this proposed amendment affects only a few people, and does not warrant adding another detailed provision to the Texas Constitution.

## AMENDMENT 13

### Wording on the Ballot

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT RELATING TO THE AMOUNT AND EXPENDITURE OF CERTAIN CONSTITUTIONALLY DEDICATED FUNDING FOR PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION.

### Explanation

The Higher Education Fund (HEF), created in 1985, is distributed to 25 institutions of higher education to buy land; construct, equip, repair, and rehabilitate buildings; and buy capital equipment and library books and materials. The legislature determines how HEF monies will be allocated among the institutions. Every five years the legislature may adjust the amount of the appropriation for the following five years, and the 73rd Legislature increased the annual funding through the year 2000 from \$100 million to \$175 million.

Proposition 13 would extend HEF funding to the Texas State Technical College system (TSTC) and its four campuses, but not to its extension centers or programs. The proposition would also allow HEF monies to pay for buildings or facilities used jointly for educational and general activities and for auxiliary enterprises, such as student housing and athletic facilities, to the extent these are used also for educational and general activities. The proposition would limit TSTC funding to 2.2% of the total allocation.

The proposed amendment would clarify when the legislature can increase funding for the HEF, and that it may only *increase* the HEF beyond the original \$100 million.

### Supporters Say

- TSTC provides unique college-level programs in highly specialized technical and vocational fields, critical for the preparation of Texas's future work force.
- Unlike a junior college or community college, TSTC has no independent tax base. It is in fact the only Texas institution of higher education without a dedicated source of revenue for capital expenditures.
- The comptroller estimates that adding TSTC to the HEF would save some \$1.6 million general revenue funds annually, beginning in fiscal 1996.

### Opponents Say

- TSTC is not an academic four-year college with the same structure and mission as those now funded by HEF.
- TSTC officials originally chose *not* to be funded through the HEF because at that time TSTC received greater funding through the appropriations process.
- As the need for economic development in Texas places greater demands on TSTC's training of skilled occupational workers, the 2.2% of the HEF monies allocated to TSTC may be insufficient.

## AMENDMENT 14

### Wording on the Ballot

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF UP TO \$1 BILLION IN GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS PAYABLE FROM THE GENERAL REVENUES OF THE STATE FOR PROJECTS RELATING TO FACILITIES OF CORRECTIONS AND MENTAL HEALTH AND MENTAL RETARDATION INSTITUTIONS.

### Explanation

Article III, Sec. 49 of the Texas Constitution prohibits the legislature from creating state debt without specific authorization in the constitution. Since 1987, voters have approved a total of \$2 billion in bonds to construct or renovate adult and juvenile corrections facilities and mental health and mental retardation institutions. Amendment 14 proposes to add an additional \$1 billion for the same general purposes. The new Texas Penal Code, to take effect September 1, 1994, creates a new class of felonies for some non-violent crimes. Persons convicted of these felonies may not be sentenced to traditional penal institutions, but may be sentenced to a new type of institution - a state jail - for up to two years with the remainder of the sentence served in community corrections.

Legislation enacted in the 1993 legislative session creates a new State Jail Division to construct and operate these facilities and authorizes the building of 22,000 state jail beds. Ten thousand of these can be built with existing funds from prior bond sales; the additional 12,000 beds can only be built if voters approve this amendment. An additional 20,000 beds must be built to meet a legislative mandate to accept all "paper ready" inmates backlogged in county jails by September 1, 1995.

### Supporters Say

- A system of state jails would allow non-violent offenders to spend meaningful time in corrections facilities offering rehabilitation and other programs. More beds would become available in traditional prisons for violent offenders to serve greater portions of their sentences behind bars.
- Because state jails would be cheaper to build and operate, they would be a more efficient use of taxpayer money. In addition, funding facilities for felons currently backlogged in county jails is a better use of money than court-ordered fines or payments to counties for emergency overcrowding relief.
- It makes good fiscal sense to borrow money to finance capital investments such as prisons and state jails. Use of bonds stretches the payment period over many years, allowing the state to avoid a massive tax increase to pay for these projects out of current revenues.
- By authorizing a bond issue of this size, voters would give the legislature needed flexibility to meet future corrections demands.
- The state can afford to incur additional debt for a justified purpose without risking financial jeopardy. Texas ranks ninth among the ten largest states in terms of overall state debt per capita. State bond debt is still substantially below the five percent cap imposed by the 72nd Legislature.

### Opponents Say

- The state should not continue trying to build its way out of its prison capacity problem. If this proposed amendment passes, the state will have incurred \$3 billion in debt for corrections and

mental health facilities alone. No amount of money for additional construction will ever meet the potential demand: the more prison beds are added, the more prisoners will be sentenced to fill them. A better use of state funds would be to spend more on community-based programs that have the long-term goal of rehabilitating offenders to become law-abiding members of society.

- The fiscal note on \$1 billion of general obligation bonds estimates that the debt service (interest) which would be paid from general revenue would amount to about \$90 million per fiscal year. Over the life of the 20-year bonds, taxpayers would pay a total of \$1.8 billion in interest - almost twice as much as the face value of the bonds.
- Operating costs are another hidden cost of the bond proposal. The estimated operational cost of one 2000-bed state jail is somewhere between \$10.3 and \$19.8 million per year.
- It is difficult to justify authorizing bonds for state jails and prisons when the state does not adequately fund public education and when voters recently rejected a constitutional amendment increasing state debt to help local school districts pay for school facility needs.

## AMENDMENT 15

### Wording on the Ballot

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO PERMIT THE VOTERS OF A COUNTY TO DECIDE, AT AN ELECTION CALLED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT, WHETHER TO ABOLISH THE OFFICE OF COUNTY SURVEYOR IN THE COUNTY.

### Explanation

The Texas Constitution requires each of the 254 counties in the state to elect a county surveyor. This proposition would provide a mechanism for the voters of any county to abolish the surveyor's office in that county by a majority vote of the qualified voters of that county at an election called by the county commissioners court. After a vote to abolish, the records would be transferred to a county officer or employee designated by the commissioners court of that county. Under current law, the surveyor's office in a particular county cannot be abolished without a constitutional amendment approved by a majority of voters statewide. The county surveyor's office has been abolished in Denton, Randall, Collin, Dallas, El Paso, Henderson, Cass, Ector, Garza, Smith, Bexar, Harris, and Webb counties by constitutional amendment.

### Supporters Say

- The office of county surveyor has become largely a record-keeping position and is unfilled in many counties. The duties can easily be transferred to another office, thus increasing the efficiency of county government. The amendment provides a simplified means of abolishing the office.
- It is desirable to allow voters to decide, by local option, whether or not to abolish the county surveyor's job in their county of residence. The current requirement for a statewide vote is wasteful and expensive. Passage of this amendment would eliminate the need for more constitutional amendments abolishing the surveyor's office in individual counties.

### Opponents Say

- It is undesirable to make it easier to abolish this office. Every time a surveyor's job is eliminated, more power is placed in the hands of county

commissioners and of an appointed employee who is not accountable to voters.

- While the county surveyor's office may be antiquated, passage of this amendment would set a precedent for abolishing other offices that are currently constitutional. Because there is a lack of understanding of the jobs involved in county government, voters would be unable to make informed choices on whether to abolish.

## AMENDMENT 16

### Wording on the Ballot

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING UP TO A TOTAL OF \$100 MILLION IN BONDS AND NOTES TO BE ISSUED OR SOLD TO FINANCE THE TEXAS AGRICULTURAL FUND FOR PROVIDING FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO DEVELOP, INCREASE, IMPROVE, OR EXPAND THE PRODUCTION, PROCESSING, MARKETING, OR EXPORT OF CROPS OR PRODUCTS GROWN OR PRODUCED PRIMARILY IN THIS STATE BY AGRICULTURAL BUSINESSES DOMICILED IN THE STATE.

### Explanation

The Texas Agricultural Finance Authority (TAFA) was created in 1987 to encourage the expansion, development and diversification of production, processing, marketing, and export of Texas agricultural products. TAFA makes loans to agricultural businesses to buy land, construct buildings, install machinery, and do research and development to reach the goals of the program. The constitution currently limits TAFA to issuing \$25 million in general obligation bonds and \$500 million in revenue bonds. This proposed amendment would increase the amount of general bonds and notes (commercial paper) TAFA could issue to \$100 million.

### Supporters Say

- The Texas Agricultural Finance Authority has created a successful program and needs this infusion of capital to respond to the numerous requests for financial assistance from agricultural businesses.
- As a loan program, the proposal would not divert taxpayer dollars for debt service as the agricultural fund pays for itself.
- By encouraging the processing of Texas' agricultural products within the state, TAFA financial assistance to agribusiness creates jobs and helps the economy.

### Opponents Say

- This is a four-fold increase in the amount of general obligation loans TAFA is authorized to issue and will add \$100 million to a state debt that is already \$3 billion and growing.
- If borrowers default on loans, taxpayers could be left to retire the bond debt.
- These loans are not going to needy farmers but to agribusinesses. Why should the taxpayers of Texas support the expansion plans of a small segment of the business community?
