

# Police arrest teen for weekend slaying

A 58-year-old Hereford woman who had been stabbed more than 20 times in the abdomen and chest was found Sunday evening by her daughter.

The body of Angeline Lindeman was found lying naked in a bedroom of her residence. Lindeman had apparently been dead for 36 hours before she was discovered.

Police have arrested 17-year-old Isia Benitez in connection with the murder. Benitez is being held in the Deaf Smith County jail under a \$50,000 bond.

According to police accounts, Lindeman was attacked late Friday night. The killer then apparently tried to set the house on fire in

order to cover up the murder. Fire investigators found evidence of four different fires being set in the house.

According to Hereford Fire Marshall Jay Spain, the fires burned themselves out after the oxygen in the house expired. The fires were contained to the living room.

Spain said the temperature in the house could have exceeded 1,000 degrees. "The house was equipped with a flame retardant sheetrock," Spain said. "That sheetrock kept the fire from spreading throughout the house."

Spain added that there was no doubt that arson was to blame for the fires.

District Attorney Roland Saul said that the assailant was apparently a friend of Lindeman's, and that the two may have been in a

fight earlier that evening.

Saul said that Benitez will be tried as an adult for the murder. Benitez turned 17 on Friday.

Police, working on a tip, picked up Benitez while he was at a friend's house Sunday evening. Formal charges were brought around midnight Sunday.

"The first thing I thought is that we had some kind of psychotic killer on the loose," Saul said. "But now we feel very confident that we have the killer in custody and there is no reason for the community to be alarmed."

Criminal Pathologist Ralph Erdmann of Amarillo stated that Lindeman died when her aorta was cut.

### Gentry trial starts jury selection

Two men charged with conspiring to defraud Hi-Plains Savings & Loan Association of millions of dollars were scheduled to go on trial today in U.S. District Court in Amarillo.

W.W. "Doc" Taylor and James Gentry are accused of setting up Gentry as a member of the Hereford institution's board of directors, then misapplying \$3.8 million of the association's funds in actions between September 1982 and February 1983.

Taylor, 59, is president of Southwest Mortgage Service Corp. of Dallas. Gentry, 42, of Quinlan, is a real estate broker and was a partner in the former First Realty of the Southwest in Hereford. A longtime resident of Hereford, Gentry was active in civic and church work and is a former president of the Hereford school board.

Each man faces a maximum possible prison term of 30 years and a fine

of \$35,000, if convicted on all charges. U.S. District Judge Mary Lou Robinson announced Monday that jury selection would begin at 9 a.m. today.

The two were charged Jan. 8 in a six-count indictment returned by a federal grand jury convening in Amarillo. The first count accuses the pair of conspiring "to fraudulently obtain money" from Hi-Plains.

The other counts allege that Gentry, acting as a member of the savings and loan board, wired a total of \$3,838,494 from Hi-Plains accounts in Hereford banks to accounts under the control of Taylor's Dallas business, Southwest Mortgage Service Corp.

The government has filed a witness list containing names of 21 individuals and a 28-item exhibit list. Taylor is free on \$25,000 cash bond, and Gentry is free on \$20,000 unsecured bond.

### TRLA to be funded monthly

Legal Services Corporation has begun funding Texas Rural Legal Aid on a month to month basis - instead of annually - with each month's payment hinging on review and approval by LSC.

LSC officials Monday told the Brand that the new funding arrangement began with the check for May.

Today, a receptionist at the Hereford TRLA office said Randall Marshall, local director, was out of town.

Daryl Borgquist, manager of public affairs for the LSC, said a letter was sent to TRLA on April 30 which said LSC had approved TRLA's 1986 refunding application for the term of one month, beginning on May 1, and thereafter would review and approve any refunding application for an additional month or any other term.

"As for TRLA, specifically, the corporation has received information which provides reasons for concern as to whether TRLA is, or has been, in compliance with all applicable laws and grant conditions," the letter said.

LSC expects to complete an analysis of that information soon and if there appears to be sufficient reason for concern, the corporation will request that TRLA respond to those concerns. According to a spokesman from the office of Larry Combest, who has been active in an investigation of TRLA affairs, said TRLA has "cashed that check" and is in so doing agrees to those terms.

### Rain, sleet, snow, hail reported

Rain, sleet, light hail and snow fell in Deaf Smith County Saturday when a productive cloud and cold front passed through the Panhandle, leaving up to an inch of moisture in the far northwest corner of the county.

Mrs. Clint Homfeld, who lives in northwest Deaf Smith County, said three forms of precipitation fell on her family's property to measure an inch of moisture.

At Westway, Mrs. Johnny Jesko reported that sleet was thick enough to "whiten the ground" with a dusting. Westway received .9 of an inch of rain.

In Walcott, light hail was reported. Precipitation measured .7 of an inch there.

Boottleg received .9 of an inch and in downtown Hereford .78 of an inch fell Saturday.

Dawn received only .2 of an inch.

The last measurable rainfall in Hereford was May 4 when .02 of an inch was recorded at KPAN.

## Future scope of Affirmative Action undecided

WASHINGTON (AP) - The future scope of affirmative action in the American work place is still to be decided by the Supreme Court, with the court's latest ruling on the issue being welcomed by supporters and opponents of racial preferences.

The court, with two key affirmative action cases remaining on its

agenda this year, threw out a plan Monday that preserved the jobs of black school teachers at the expense of whites with more seniority.

But in five separate opinions - none of them commanding a clear five-vote majority - the justices expressed strong support for the principle of affirmative action.

The Reagan administration has been leading the drive to curtail affirmative action, and ironically, Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, President Reagan's lone appointee to the court, could prove the pivotal vote later this year.

She voted with the majority Monday, but indicated some layoff policies based on race may pass constitutional muster. And she said there is "unique importance" in having government employers ease the effects of their past discrimination.

The mixed signals Monday prompted enthusiasm on all sides.

"Affirmative action is alive and well," said Eric Schnapper of the NAACP Legal Defense & Educational Fund. He said the decision "is something we and people who believe in affirmative action can live with."

The Reagan administration said its campaign is still alive to scale down affirmative action to benefit only actual victims of past discrimination.

Justice Department spokesman Terry Eastland said, "The court doesn't really go deeply into" that issue, a hallmark of the administration's drive for what it calls "a color-blind society."

The Mountain States Legal Foundation, a conservative organization, hailed the ruling as a major victory for foes of racial preferences.

"It really is a landmark decision in the best sense of the word," said staff attorney Diane Vaksdal. "The Supreme Court has finally given us

some concrete rules in handling affirmative action plans."

Monday's 5-4 ruling invalidated a Jackson, Mich., plan protecting from layoffs black public school teachers with less seniority than whites.

But the justices did not retreat significantly from a series of rulings beginning in 1978 supporting the concept of affirmative action - giving racial minorities extra help to make up for past discrimination.

Also, the ruling applies only to layoffs, not hiring and promotions - areas in which the justices said they

might be more receptive to preferential treatment for minorities.

In other action, the court ruled 5-4 in a case from Santa Clara, Calif., that police do not need court warrants before conducting aerial searches for marijuana growing in fenced-in residential yards.

By a separate 5-4 vote the court ruled that federal regulators who do not first get court warrants may use aerial photographs of manufacturing facilities to help enforce clean-air laws.

## State

### Witness could have escaped

KERRVILLE, Texas (AP) — Defense attorneys in the organized crime trial of a Hill Country rancher and two others accused of kidnapping drifters and forcing them into slavery have challenged the implication that a prosecution witness was held at the ranch against his will.

On trial are Walter Wesley Ellebracht Sr., his son, Walter Wesley Ellebracht Jr., and former ranch worker Carlton Robert Caldwell. They are accused of conspiring to commit aggravated kidnapping and murder in connection with the death of Anthony Bates at the Ellebracht Ranch in March 1984.

Daryl Hunsacker, a prosecution witness who has been on the stand since last week, has testified about alleged torture sessions at the ranch. He has said he was forced by the Ellebrachts to stay at the ranch.

Defense attorneys implied that Hunsacker could have escaped from the ranch if he had wished.

The junior Ellebracht's attorney, Ray Bass, introduced a receipt that the elder Ellebracht got when he and Hunsacker went to a large San Antonio store to have a chainsaw repaired.

"It was a big warehouse and weren't there a lot of people inside?" Bass asked. "It was easy to get lost in there — lots of people, lots of machinery to hide behind."

Hunsacker said he was too scared to tell anyone about his ordeal or to try to escape.

Bass played several short segments of recordings of alleged torture sessions, some using electric cattle prods, at the ranch that Hunsacker admitted taking part in. Hunsacker was asked to identify the voices on the tape, which was filed with screams, threats and sexual references.

## National

### Search continues for four

BALTIMORE (AP) — The Pride of Baltimore's captain, who dived repeatedly into the sea to release the life raft that saved eight of his crew, remained lost today with three other crewmembers, and officials said the search would continue "as long as there's hope."

Officials learned of the sinking on Monday after a Norwegian freighter rescued eight crewmembers who had drifted nearly five days on a life raft made for six people. The Pride, a 97-foot replica of 19th century clipper ship, was used to promote the city, and sank Wednesday in the Caribbean.

A search by the Coast Guard, Air Force and Navy was to continue today for Capt. Armin E. Elsaesser III, 42, of South Dartmouth, Mass., and the others.

"It's a tragedy for all of us," said Mayor William Donald Schaefer. Rep. Barbara Mikulski, D-Md., who had christened the clipper in 1977, said the U.S. military was determined to search thoroughly for any survivors. Four Coast Guard planes, one Navy plane and a Coast Guard cutter were dispatched to the area about 300 miles north of San Juan, Puerto Rico.

In addition, Ms. Mikulski said Monday, ships in the area would be on the alert for signs of possible survivors clinging to debris or the dinghy that was seen to break free of the sinking ship.

"As long as there's hope, the search will continue," she said. "All that can possibly be done is being done. I think this is an enormous shock."

### Students nervous about return

COKEVILLE, Wyo. (AP) — Pupils who spent three hours as hostages before a bomb blast that burned scores of children and adults still dream of the attacks and say "it's gonna be scary going back" when school reopens this week.

"When the school building, the teachers and the students are ready, that's when we'll open the school," Cokevill Elementary School principal Max Excell said Monday night. Teachers were to begin planning today for classes.

Three hundred to 400 family members of the former hostages attended the meeting as local psychologist Dr. Nohl Sandall and nine specialists discussed the trauma of the incident that left David and Doris Young, who held 150 pupils and teachers for \$300 million ransom, dead.

"What we're expecting is changes in patterns of sleeping, unusual dreams, or a preoccupation or fear associated with the school building," Sandall told the families, who applauded the courage of the teachers involved.

Children who had the day off from school Monday rode their bicycles and played in the streets, but they hadn't forgotten the blast Friday that killed Doris Young and burned 78 people, or the suicide of David Young.

## Holiday traffic increases

## Senators at opposite ends of spectrum

WASHINGTON (AP) — Texas freshman Republican Sen. Phil Gramm received two guns last year as gifts, one of them a hand-made .45-caliber revolver worth \$1,000, according to his financial disclosure report.

The pistol came from Mexican-American Republicans of Texas. Gramm also reported receiving a 12-gauge shotgun valued at \$778 from the Alice-Jim Wells County Master Planners Association, and a \$200 barbecue grill from Tony Salinas of Hebronville.

Senators are required to report gifts worth more than \$250. Democrat Lloyd Bentsen reported none.

Yearly Senate financial disclosure reports were released Monday. House reports are due out later this week.

Gramm reported his income went up during his first year in the Senate, though he still has nowhere near the wealth of millionaire Bentsen.

Bentsen appeared to have made a little less and owed a little more in 1985 compared to 1984, according to his reports. The bulk of his holdings and income was in investments and real estate, including capital gains on a blind trust worth at least \$100,000.

He reported his 1985 income in a range from \$491,666 to at least \$682,247, including his \$75,100 annual Senate salary. In 1984, he reported a range of income from \$719,810 to \$1,145,000.

Members of Congress are required only to report ranges of income, assets and liabilities, with an open-ended top category of \$100,000 and up for income and \$250,000 and up for assets and liabilities.

Though their financial situations differ dramatically, Bentsen and Gramm were not at the extremes in the Senate.

John D. Rockefeller IV, D-W.Va., likely the richest Senator, is estimated by Forbes magazine to be worth about \$150 million, while James Abdnor, R-S.D., reported a \$144 loss from farming.

Gramm improved his income in 1985 by between approximately \$20,000 and \$35,000, according to the reports.

His reported income in 1985 ranged from \$114,304 to \$145,800, most from his Senate salary, which was the same when he was in the House. Much of the rest of his income came from rental property.

Gramm, an economist and sponsor of the Gramm-Rudman budget-balancing law, reported fees for speaking engagements of \$22,500. He charged from \$500 to \$2,000 per appearance. He also reported receiving \$700 for articles for the Wall Street Journal and the New York Times.

Gramm also reported 19 reimbursements for trips, mostly from local GOP committees and universities.

Bentsen reported no remuneration for speaking engagements and listed one reimbursement, round-trip air fare from Washington to Abilene

from an oil and gas association.

Bentsen's holdings ranged from an estimated \$1,288,019 to \$2,160,000 or more in 1985. In 1984, his holdings were estimated to be worth between \$1,102,500 and at least \$2,055,000.

Gramm reported holdings worth \$217,000 to \$680,000 or more, mostly rental property.

For 1984, Bentsen listed liabilities, all mortgages, ranging from \$120,000 to \$315,000. In 1985, he reported, his liabilities ranged from \$365,000 to \$560,000 or more.

Gramm listed owing on mortgages ranging from \$51,000 to \$170,000.

Both senators reported having individual retirement accounts worth between \$5,000 and \$15,000.

## DR. GOTT Medication can ease dizziness

thritus sufferers, lupus can affect the skin and kidneys, in addition to the joints.

DEAR DR. GOTT — After tests were done, my neurologist told me I had benign positional vertigo and that I'd get over it in one or two years. That's a long time to go around so dizzy you can hardly walk. I take two Zantac and 12 sodium bicarbonate pills a day (for kidney stones). Is there anything else I can do?

DEAR READER — Benign positional vertigo is a self-limited condition that causes the victim to experience temporary, often violent episodes of spinning and whirling. It is said to be due to an imbalance in the vestibular apparatus (balance mechanism) of one or both ears, possibly caused by a virus infection. It is usually related to head position — that is, it will flare up when you are lying down but may disappear when you sit up. There are medicines, such as Antivert, that you can take to control your dizziness until the condition runs its course.

DEAR DR. GOTT — Is it true that one gets arthritis in the heart or lungs as well as in the joints?

DEAR READER — No. Arthritis, by definition, affects only the joints. However, certain forms of inflammatory arthritis, notably rheumatoid arthritis, are associated with abnormal substances in the bloodstream. Therefore, other organs — as well as joints — can be affected by the disease. For example, rheumatoid lung is a medical condition sometimes seen in ar-

DEAR DR. GOTT — More than a year ago, I saw a psychiatrist who gave me a treatment of Xanax. I'm now down to one pill a day, but am still depressed. My family wants me to stop the medication. Does Xanax have any bad side effects?

DEAR READER — Xanax, a mild tranquilizer, is recommended by the manufacturer for use in short-term anxiety disorders, both with and without depression. Xanax is not an antidepressant.

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# 'Cosby' rearranges primetime

NEW YORK (AP) — Almost singlehandedly, without a six-shooter or a screeching tire, Bill Cosby has changed the face of prime time, raising its comedy consciousness and reducing its violent streak.

Two years ago, Cosby said he was returning to prime time because television's mayhem level had become dangerous to his family's health. TV, he said, had degenerated into a barrage of cars, guns, hookers and pimps, and he wanted to offer a positive alternative.

Success breeds change, and the networks' 1986-87 schedules seem to reflect more of Cosby's attitude and approach to programming. Sitcoms are up, shoot-'em-ups are down.

Led by "The Cosby Show," which is so popular that even its repeats, if compiled separately, would be TV's No. 2-ranked series, situation comedies averaged a 17.6 rating in 1985-86, up from 15.4 in the previous campaign.

Action-adventure, meanwhile, fell

from 15.9 to 14.7 (percent of the nation's 85.9 million TV homes.) So it's no surprise that sitcoms, pronounced dead the season before Cosby arrived when none made the Top 10, will dominate this fall.

ABC will have 10 comedies, CBS six and NBC 13 for a total of 29, nine more than began 1985-86. There are sitcoms every night, including three nights when they'll go head-to-head on two networks.

On Monday, NBC's "ALF," starring a wise-cracking, furry extraterrestrial, will compete with CBS' "Kate & Allie." ABC and CBS have opposing comedies on Wednesday, including ABC's "Perfect Strangers" against CBS' new "Together We Stand."

On Saturday, NBC's "Facts of Life" is scheduled against Lucille Ball's "Life With Lucy" on ABC. Then, NBC's "227" goes against "The Ellen Burstyn Show."

Clearly, the networks think home is where the laughs are. Next season, you'll see several variations on

Cosby's nuclear-family theme.

In "Together We Stand," Elliott Gould and Dee Wallace Stone will be parents to a color-coded collection of natural and adopted kids: a blonde girl, red-haired boy, black girl, Eurasian boy. Alf, the alien next door, will live in semi-harmony with Ma, Pa, the two kids, but not the family cat, which Alf eyes for his next meal.

With comedy on the rise, the bottom has fallen out of the hard-action market. Each network will introduce only one bullet-riddled series.

NBC has "Crime Story," which is about crime-stoppers battling Chicago's Mob in the 1960s. ABC's hard-action entry is "Cold Steel and Neon," in which a sensitive detective juggles dangerous police work with raising two teen-agers. CBS has "Downtown," about a cop saddled with four parolees.

After screening the "Downtown" pilot for ad agency types, CBS said the violence in future episodes would be toned down.

Even that noted male chauvinist "Mike Hammer" will show a softer side next season, CBS said.

As will ABC's "MacGyver," a Mr. Wizard-inspired daredevil who uses everyday items to extricate himself from sticky situations.

Most incoming dramas are softer, examining professions and people that don't wear badges. They include a female surgeon (CBS' "Kay O'Brien, Surgeon"), an alien who returns to Earth to raise his orphaned son (ABC's "Starman") and a country lawyer (NBC's "Matlock.")

"Our House," a family drama, stars Wilford Brimley as a grandfather who opens his home to his widowed daughter-in-law and her three kids.

ABC's Thursday lineup next season will have "Our World," "The Colbys" and the news magazine, "20-20."

At CBS, "Cosby" has chased "Magnum, P.I." to Wednesday. In its place, CBS will sacrifice the slipping "Simon & Simon."
