Four injured when airplane landing gear fails at DFW

GRAPEVINE, Texas (AP) - At least four people were injured today as they were evacuated from an American Airlines jet whose landing gear collapsed shortly after touchdown at Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport.

'Apparently the aircraft touched down in a stable condition," said American spokesman Al Becker, but the plane came to rest just off a high-speed taxiway.

"We don't know what caused the problem, or why the aircraft ended up where it did," Becker said. All the injuries came during the evacuation, Becker said.

The DC-10's nose gear collapsed after landing, said FAA spokesman Roger Myers. The nose of the plane and the left wing could be seen sitting on the ground.

"We had a bolt of something that hit us when we were airborne," said passenger Faye Evans of Baltimore. "And then as we landed it was like we weren't going to stop. And then the flames started."

Hank Lindsaey of Honolulu said he saw flames coming from the left wing area.

"I was near the wing on the right side, the wing was tilted way up" said Hank Lindsaey of Honolulu. "At first the people who rushed out were afraid to go off the wing on the slide ... it was too steep. When we saw the fire we said 'It's not.""

In the Panhandle, high winds have intensified the problem of inadequate soil moisture. Wheat, however, continues to make good progress, especially if it is irrigated, said Paul Gross, district Extension director.

"First of all, the ewes didn't breed well. Some lambs have died at birth, and other weak lambs and ewes didn't survive," he said.

HTFCU holds annual meet Tuesday

Joe E. Kerr of Hereford and Dr. W.J. Hill of Dimmitt were unanimously re-elected to the Hereford Texas Federal Credit Union board of directors Tuesday in a fast-paced annual meeting that took a mere 40 minutes to conduct.

Also elected to the board was Dan Warrick, a certified public accountant who moved from the credit union's supervisory committee to the board.

The meeting was the 56th annual meeting following the chartering of the institution in 1937.

During the meeting, the credit union's financial report was presented, as was a summary of the report in Kerr's President's Report.

In that, he reported that the credit union's net profit for 1992 was \$360,512.29, with total assets of \$26,448,638.26.

At the end of last year, Kerr said, the credit union had 7,413 members, which was above the 1990 and 1991 levels, but "we get to the number of loans and the number of loans grew from 1990 to 1991, but you get to 1992, the number of loans fell to below the 1990 level."

As a result, he lamented, even

though the 1992 profits are "by far the highest in the history of the credit union ... this revenue is going to decrease substantially" as the number of loans decreases.

Part of the cause for the decrease in loans, he said, is due to federal regulations.

In the past, Kerr said, a customer would establish his accounts over a period of time and, at the same time, demonstrate his character to credit union officials.

That character would then be considered when writing a loan.

No longer is that allowed, he said, and loan officers are only allowed to look at the loan documents when considering an application.

Credit union manager Bob Baker told the 110 members in attendance that one thing the institution is working on this year is trying to get an automatic teller machine for members.

Entertainment for the evening was provided by Kristi Lytal, a physical education teacher and coach at Hereford High School, and Natalie Sims, who teaches English and coaches tennis at Hereford Junior High School.

Cancer specialist may lose license because of fees

DALLAS (AP) - A Dallas area He testified against Birenbaum during cancer specialist accused of billing a three-day hearing in 1991 that the several patients more than \$1,000 per day for hospital visits faces revoca-

tion of his license by a state board. The order by the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners to revoke Dr. Dennis Birenbaum's license was scheduled to go into effect Friday.

But the Farmers Branch oncologist, who blames the action on a guarrel with one consultant, said he would continue to treat his patients at least through Friday.

Birenbaum's attorneys were then expected to ask a state district judge in Austin to block the board's order.

Some board members argued that excessive fees charged by Birenbaum ustify what state officials said could be an unprecedented step.

To look at his billing records was just an outrage," Cynthia Jenkins, a board member, said. "These were people at the most desperate stage of heir lives, and taking advantage of them was the worst of all deeds."

But Birenbaum, 46, said the state's case hinges on complaints from an insurance company consultant who has a vendetta against him.

He said the consultant, Dr. Douglas Whitley of Aetna Life and Casualty, simply disagrees with his

Late postmark set for returns

Income tax returns that are mailed in Hereford will be postmarked up to midnight Thursday, reports Postmaster Charles Britten.

Mailing as early as possible will help postal workers in their job, said Britten, encouraging residents to deposit their returns in mail boxes as early as possible.

Britten also reminded postal patrons to use the correct postage and have a legible return address when mailing tax forms.

Postage is 29 cents for the first ounce, then 23 cents for each additional ounce up to 11 ounces.

The Internal Revenue Services will not accept postage due mail and this mail will be returned to sender," he said. New SWC commissioner faces tough challenge

DALLAS (AP) - Testimony to Steve Hatchell's congeniality begins with a six-hour car ride with former **Big Eight Conference commissioner** Chuck Neinas.

They made the trip to Kansas City, Mo., from Stillwater, Okla., in the mid-1970s while Hatchell worked as Colorado's sports information director.

You get to know someone pretty well under those circumstances,' said Neinas, now executive director of the College Football Association. "I didn't know Steve until then. If you still like someone after that, you remember them."

Neinas remembered Hatchell enough to hire him in the Big Eight office and push along Hatchell's rise through college athletics. The next step begins as Hatchell takes over as Southwest Conference commissioner.

Hatchell, 45, has built a reputation for friendliness and fairness without hiding his ambition.

Friends and associates cite his ability to combine big-picture plans with dotting-every-"I" thoroughness. Hatchell, executive director of the Federal Express Orange Bowl the past five years, can cite script sequences for elaborate halftime shows or recount the steps to helping the Orange Bowl secure a multimillion-dollar title sponsor.

From the time former Colorado football coach Eddie Crowder talked Hatchell out of taking a job with a New York advertising firm, Hatchell has developed a network of associates that includes Neinas, Crowder, New Orleans Saints coach Jim Mora, University of Washington coach Don James, University of Texas athletic director DeLoss Dodds, and Jim Haney, the president of the American Basketball Coaches Association.

"Steve can call a group of people in the morning, discuss a lot of topics and get a lot of ideas," Dodds said.

Hatchell takes over the SWC at a critical time in the league's 78-year history. Hatchell's plan for solidifying the SWC will rely heavily on stressing the league's strengths and developing a better image. Since being named in January, he has been fond of saying the SWC was "robbed of its personality during the 1980s" and that his job is to help "burnish the stone.'

He'll look hard at an affiliation with the Big Eight and might support expansion. Hatchell, a former Metro Conference commissioner, has ties to Metro members such as Louisville and Memphis State that could help forge a basketball alliance with several schools to boost the SWC's national basketball reputation. SWC officials, while not yet endorsing expansion, have already held informal talks with Louisville and Memphis State about their joining the SWC or establishing a scheduling agreement.

Hatchell's background has prepared him for a wide variety of tasks. He started his college athletics career as a volunteer student football manager at Colorado under Crowder. "I can put a facemask on a helmet

with the best of them," Hatchell said.

He fetched and broke down film for Mora and James, then Colorado

assistants. He planned the details of moving equipment and players for football trips. He officiated Colorado intrasquad scrimmages and admits he often favored the offense - much to the chagrin of James, the defensive coordinator.

'He used to get on me pretty good," Hatchell said. "He'd ask, 'How did you get into college?' We still talk about it when we see each other. He tells me, 'I don't yell like that anymore.'

A journalism major, Hatchell said he put up with the long hours and lowly status as a football manager by reminding himself, "Things will be different when I'm running the New York Times."

Although most athletic directors have lengthy coaching backgrounds, Hatchell's hopscotching through a variety of positions is typical of major conference commissioners. For example, Gene Corrigan - the Atlantic Coach Conference commissioner and former Notre Dame athletic director - was Virginia's lacrosse coach for a short time before moving into administration as Virginia's sports information director. Pacific-10 Conference commissioner Tom Hansen started out in the league's public relations office.

Hatchell was about to leave for a New York advertising job after graduation when Crowder offered him

a position as Colorado's director of equipment and grounds. Hatchell already had an eye on Colorado's sports information office. A developing relationship with his future wife, Patty, Colorado graduate student, also helped persuade him to remain at Colorado a while longer. Within two years, Hatchell was out of equipment managing and into Colorado's sports information office as planned.

After joining the Big Eight administration as an information officer, Hatchell helped turn a perennially popular Christmas basketball tournament into a successful post-season tournament. That helped him build his strong reputation in basketball administration and, in 1983, become commissioner of the Metro Conference, which doesn't sponsor football.

During Hatchell's tenure, Memphis State went to the Final Four in 1985 and Louisville won the 1986 NCAA championship at Reunion Arena. He also guided the league through a gambling scandal at Tulane, which temporarily dropped basketball.

Hatchell's move to become director of the Orange Bowl reunited him with the Big Eight. He viewed it as a chance to learn another important facet of college athletics at one of the country's most prestigious bowls.

With the Orange Bowl, he used his broad base of relationships to forge successful deals. Hatchell's ties to Memphis State helped seal a title sponsorship with Memphis-based ederal Express.

This expertise in building and reshaping athletic events, plus a stint

running a Division I conference made Hatchell a highly speculated candidate to become the next SWC commissioner even before Jacoby, 65, announced last summer he would retire from full-time duties in June. Texas officials, led by Dodds,

ushed to name Hatchell immediately ast November when Jacoby formally announced his resignation. SWC presidents decided to pursue a formal interview.

Hatchell swept the SWC search committee off its feet with his enthusiasm. SWC officials tried to keep their search secret, but Hatchell was unanimously reported as the front runner.

"Steve is not afraid to lead," Haney said. "He can't win games, but he can create and structure a league and help it move on."





"She needs some rest," said Alexander Likhotal, a spokesman for the former Soviet leader. "The situation is not dangerous."

Likhotal gave no details on Mrs. Gorbachev's illness but said she would receive prolonged treatment when the couple return to Moscow.

Gorbachev received an honorary degree at Virginia Commonwealth University on Monday, then canceled appearances scheduled for Monday night in Charlotte, N.C., and

Wednesday at the Rochester Institute of Technology in Rochester, N.Y. The Gorbachevs still planned to appear in Charlottesville today for the 250th anniversary of the birth of Thomas Jefferson.

Colored ribbons debated as tool for making political statements

By JOHN HORN AP Entertainment Writer LOS ANGELES (AP) - There are red ribbons for AIDS awareness, pink ribbons for breast cancer, purple ones for urban violence and green for the environment. About all that's missing is a ribbon to protest ribbons. The boom in political ribbons has spired merchandisers, prompted Miss Manners to hold forth on ribbon etiquette - and divided homosexuals. Since their national debut at the 1991 Tony Awards, AIDS ribbons have become empty symbols, many say. Like Malcolm X paraphernalia, what was intended as a bold proclamation has deteriorated into mere marketing, these critics say. "Ribbons have become obsolete," said Jeff Yarbrough, editor of The Advocate, a gay magazine that examines the controversy in an upcoming issue. "People need to leave the ribbons at home and start with some action." Hollywood especially loves ribbons. At last month's Academy Awards, almost every guest wore a ribbon of one color or another. Geena Davis wore a hybrid red and pink ribbon for AIDS and breast cancer wareness. Denzel Washington, referring an anti-violence message, added a purple band to his tuxedo. Other ribbons spotted in recent weeks include blue for child abuse awareness, black against the death penalty, and rainbow, against civil unrest. Comedian Garry Shandling joked at this year's Grammy Awards that he should have worn a ribbon "for those suffering in the 36 percent (tax) racket." Not wearing a ribbon is itself eason for comment. Right-wing oundit Rush Limbaugh praised Oscar ost Billy Crystal's bare lapels, saying his ribbon restraint made him 'the bravest man in Hollywood." Others have been denounced for vearing ribbons and doing little else for the cause, such as volunteering ime, donating money or writing Congress to support AIDS legislation.
