Bailey County Shares Travel Dollars Spent

Bailey County received \$1,649,000 of the state's \$7,032,369,000 travel receipts in 1978, a national study commissioned by the Texas Tourist Development Agency has disclosed. The 1978 figures reflect an increase of 11 percent in travel receipts over 1977 for Bailey County.

In addition to gross receipts, the study found that Bailey County in 1978 had 61 of the state's 243,887 travel-related jobs, with an annual payroll of \$369,000.

It is also estimated \$68,000 in state and \$10,000 in local taxes were paid by county visitors in 1978.

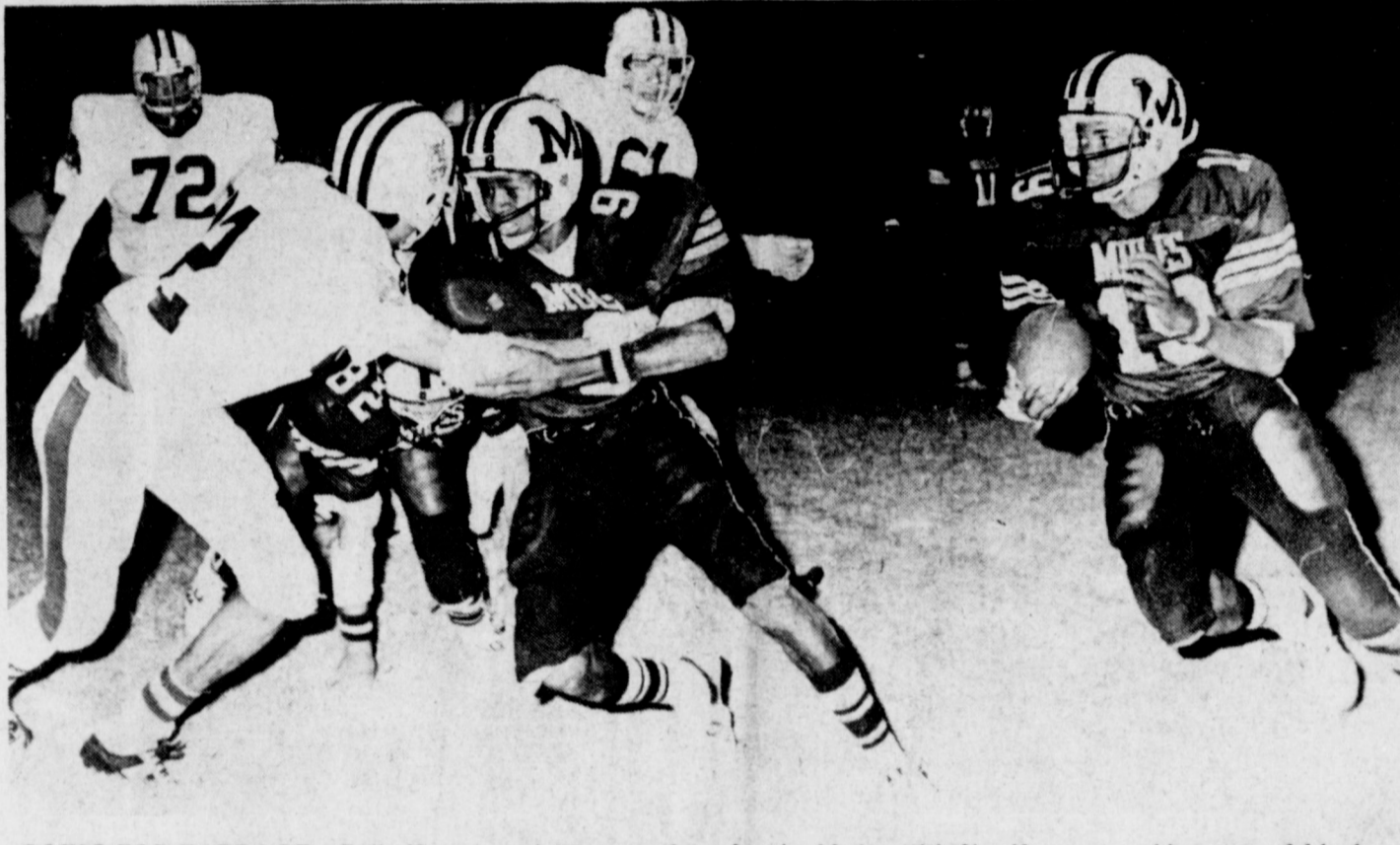
Three Way Eagles Defeat Panthers

Whalin's high scoring performance keeps district record spotless

If there is one person in Muleshoe that will never be invited to Dimmitt, then most likely it will be Sam Whalin.

Whalin, who sees double duty both as a tightend on offense and as a linebacker on defense almost single handedly led the Muleshoe Mules to the 34-0 whitewash of the Dimmitt Bobcats Friday night in Muleshoe.

All this 190-pound senior did was score two touchdowns, one on a 53-yard pass reception from quarterback Mike Northcutt, the other on a 28-yard interception, kick four extra points and caught four passes for 104 yards.

The win upped the Mules record to 7-1-1 overall and a spotless 4-0 record in district. The Mules have just one more district game remaining that being next

Friday night against Morton. For the first eight minutes of the ball game, it looked like the Mules would be in for a fight against the 2-6 Bobcats. But a fumble recovery by the Mules' James Atwood at midfield changed the atmosphere of the contest.

From the 45-yard line of Dimmitt, the Mules needed just eight plays to finally get on the scoreboard at the 10:44 mark of the second quarter. After letting his backs due most of the work, Northcutt, on a first and goal at the five ran right up the middle untouched for the score. Whalin added the conversion and the Mules led 7-0.

It did not take the Mules long to change that score to 14-0 as on the next series, Whalin picked off a pass from Dimmitt's Robin Ryan at the 28-yard line and raced down the right sideline for the score at the 10:37 mark. Whalin split the uprights and the Mules were on their way to a romp.

Dimmitt, which was limited to just 22 yards in the first half and 151 yards for the game were forced to punt again after the Mules' Mike Henry stopped Jimmy Stewart for no gain on a third down play. Gus Ortiz's punt traveled into the endzone and the Mules had their worst field position of the first half.

From the 20, the Mules continued to grind out the yardage on the ground. After three plays gained 12, Northcutt went to the air and found Jim Norman for eight. Northcutt carried the ball for eight more to Dimmitt's 47 before unloading a 53-yard bomb to Whalin.

Whalin, who came from his tightend position on the right side all the way across the field, grabbed the pass at the Bobcats' 20 and easily outran the coverage for the touchdown. He added his third conversion at the 3:24 mark and the Mules took that 21-0 lead into the locker room at the half. Following the ensuing kick off, Dimmitt penetrated to the Mules' 15 yard line, thanks to a pass interference call against Mike Mills. But the Mules defense led by Clifford Watson and J. Norman forced the Bobcats back to their 25-yard line where they took over and ran out the clock.

With both teams in the locker rooms, the band from Dimmitt, and from Muleshoe, gave the Mule supporters a fine halftime show.

1 cup firmly packed brown sugar

1/2 cup white sugar

1 egg, slightly beaten

1 cup unsifted flour

Highway department workmen were also on the accident site within a short time to repair huge gouge marks in the highway left by the tandem disk after it was hit by the truck.

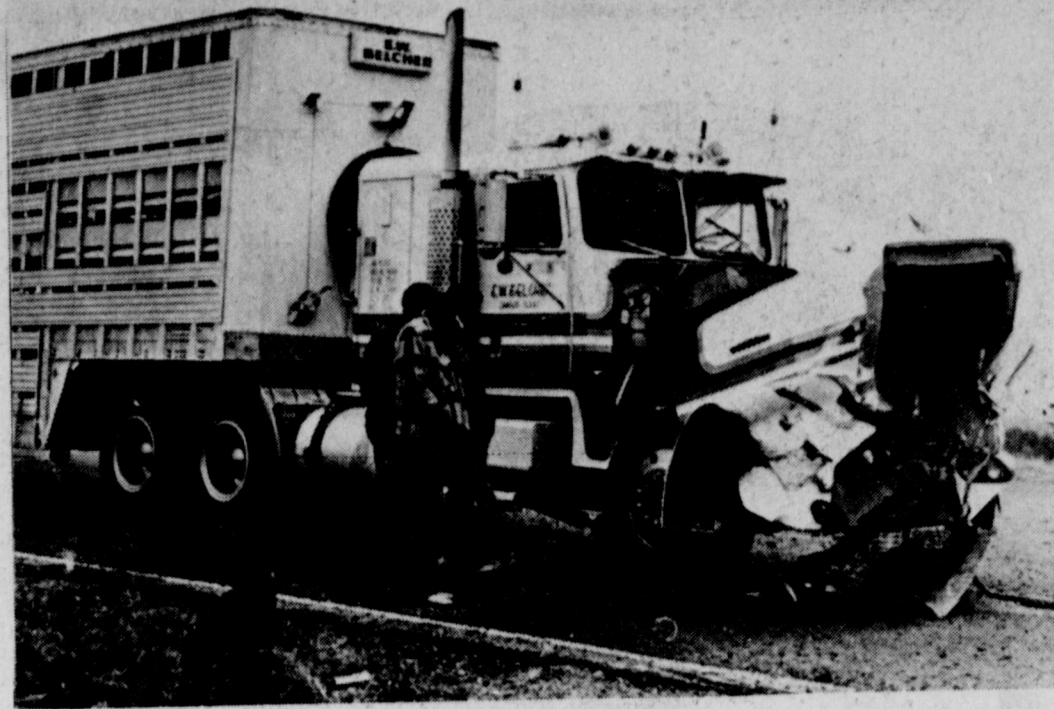

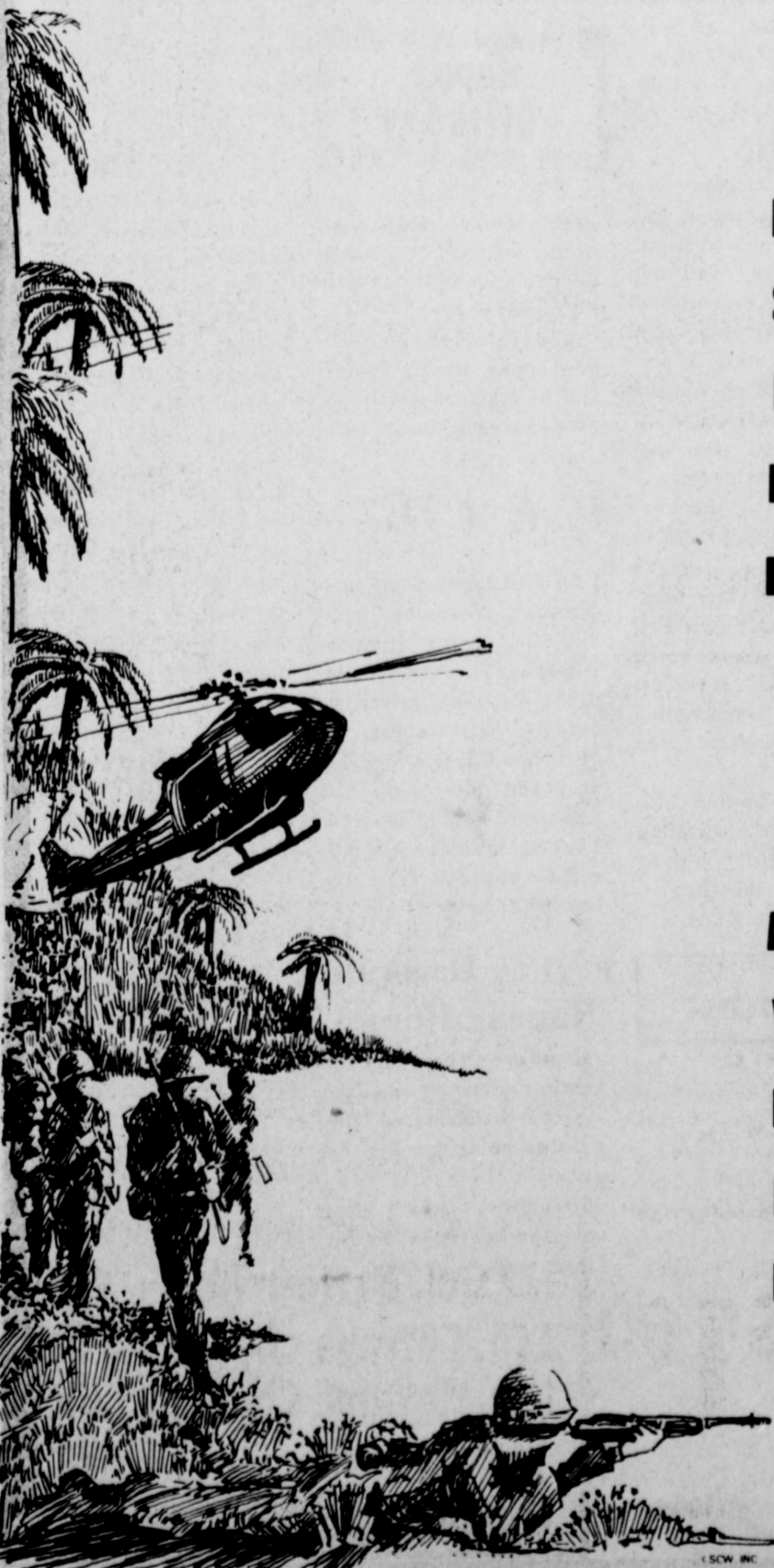

National Honor Society Guidelines

The guidelines for selection of members in the Muleshoe Chapter of the National Honor Society have been revised to conform with the standards for membership in the National Honor Society.

Policies and procedures used in selection and election of members to the National Honor Society are:

I. The MHS faculty will elect qualified students to membership in the National Honor Society. Nominations will be made by the High School Activities Committee, and each faculty member will have a part in the selection of members. This will be done in a professional manner and will not require a unanimous vote.

II. Members will be elected on the basis of four attributes.

A. Scholarship
1. A student must have a 90 average in all academic subjects for his high school years.

2. A student may be elected after the second quarter of either the Junior or Senior year.

B. Leadership
C. Character
D. Service

III. When selecting candidates, complete information on all possible candidates will be available. All potentially qualified candidates will be given just consideration, and only those students who deserve the high honor and who meet the responsibilities of National Honor Society will be elected.

Students transferring to Muleshoe from another school who have been members in a National Honor Society will be accepted. In order to retain membership, a transfer member is required to maintain the standards for membership in the Muleshoe Chapter of the National Honor Society.

A member of the National Honor Society must maintain the same standards used as a basis for his election in order to retain his membership in the Society. Once a member has been dismissed for any reason, he is never again eligible for membership. Also, a former member is not eligible to retain his membership card or emblem, nor is he eligible to be considered for a National Honor Society Scholarship.
