
Public Invited To Visit Local Schools

The theme for this year's observance is "Teach All the Children'' and a printed brochure highlighting the programs, activities and curriculum of the local schools will be distributed




Bailey County Shares Travel Dollars Spent

Bailey County received \$1,649,000 of the state's \$7,032,369,000 travel receipts in 1978, a national study commissioned by the Texas Tourist Development Agency has disclosed. The 1978 figures reflect in travel receipts over 1977 for Bailey County.

In addition to gross receipts, the study found that Bailey County in 1978 had 61 of the state's travel-related 243,887 jobs, with an annual payroll of \$369,000.

If there is one person in Muleshoe that will never be invited to Dimmitt, then most likely it will be Sam Whalin.

Whalin, who sees double duty both as a tightend on offense and as a linebacker on defense almost single handedly led the Muleshoe Mules to the 34-0 white wash of the Dimmitt Bobcats Friday night in Muleshoe.

All this 190-pound senior did was score two touchdowns, one on a 53-yard pass reception from quarterback Mike Northcutt, the other on a 28-yard interception, kick four extra points and caught four passes for 104 yards.

The win upped the Mules record to 7-1-1 overall and a spotless 4-0 record in district. The Mules have just one more district game remaining that being next



Calvin Mason At Art Show In Muleshoe

Calvin Mason was reared on a farm in Parmer Co., and spent his adult life working on the Plains of Texas, Kansas, and New Mexico.

¥¥¥ *** National Honor **Society Guidelines**

The guidelines for selection of members in the Muleshoe Chapter of the National Honor Society have been revised to conform with the standards for membership in the National Honor Society. Policies and procedures used in selection and election of members to the National Honor Society are:

I. The MHS faculty will elect qualified students to membership in the National Honor Society. Nominations will be made by the High School Activities Committee, and each faculty member will have a part in the selection of members. This will be done in a professional manner and will not require a unanimous vote. II. Members will be elected on the basis of four attributes.

A. Scholarship

1. A student must have a 90 average in all academic subjects for his high school years.

2. A student may be elected after the second uarter of either the Junior or Senior year.

V. Student nomination of, voting on, or other participation in membership selection in any manner is not permitted.

The major change in the guidelines is that students will be nominated and that students cannot apply for membership. However, all students who have the 90 average will be given consideration for nomination on the attribute of scholarship.

Students transfering to Muleshoe from another school who have been members in a National Honor Society will be accepted. In order to retain membership, a transfer member is required to maintain the standards for membership in the Muleshoe Chapter of the National Honor Society.

A member of the National Honor Society must maintain the same standards used as a basis for his election in order to retain

his membership in the Society. Once a member has been dismissed for any reason, he is never again eligible for membershin. Also, a former member is not eligible to retain his membership card or emblem, nor is he eligible to be considered for a National Honor Society Scholarship.
