Briscoe Favors Glenn for VP

HERSHEY, Pa. (AP) - Gov. Dolph Briscoe of Texas says his choice for a vice presidential running mate for Jimmy Carter would be Sen. John Glenn, D-Ohio.

Briscoe, attending the National Governors Conference, said Monday he would support any running mate recommended by Carter. This includes Sen. Henry Jackson, D-Wash., an outspoken critic of the oil and gas industry.

Bombs Planted in S.A.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - The terrorist New World Liberation Front says it has planted three time bombs to go off by Saturday at two Pacific Gas & Electric Co. sites in the San Francisco Bay area.

A communique, revealed Monday and signed by the NWLF Central Command, warned PG&E employees to stay away from work until after July 10 so they won't be hurt.

Soviets Launch Spaceship

MOSCOW (AP) - The Soviet union has launched a spaceship, Soyuz 21, piloted by two men, Tass announced today.

Israel Gives Hero's Funeral

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) - Israel gives a hero's funeral today to American-born Lt. Col. Yonatan Netanyahu, the only Israeli commando killed in the rescue of more than 100 hostages held at Uganda's Entebbe Airport. Two of the three Israeli civilians killed in the gun battle Saturday night were buried Monday with military honors. Threats of retaliation from Palestinians in Lebanon and from Uganda's President Idi Amin did nothing to diminish the pride and rejoicing of the Israelis.

U.S. Mercenary Hopes for Reprieve

WASHINGTON (AP) - The lawyer for Daniel Gearhart, the American mercenary sentenced to die in Angola, is hopeful the president of Angola will spare Gearhart's life. "I am encouraged by the atmosphere in Angola as I left it," attorney Robert Cesner of Columbus, Ohio, told reporters at Dulles International Airport on Monday after flying from Angola via Paris. Gearhart, 34, of Kensington, Md., and three British mercenaries were sentenced on June 28 to face a firing squad.

School Events Violate Sex Ruling

WASHINGTON (AP) - Federal officials have decided that public schools may no longer sponsor father-son or mother-daughter events because they violate new rules against sex discrimination. That's the word quietly passed to school administrators in Scottsdale, Ariz., last week, more than five months after the officials asked if such activities were still lawful under regulations approved by President Ford last summer.

As Harvest Concludes

**'Better Than Expected'
Wheat Yields Recorded**

Deaf Smith County's 1976 wheat harvest is at an end, and according to spokesmen for local elevators, what the crop lacked in quantity, it made up for in quality.

MOST ELEVATORS reported that harvesting was completed over the weekend, although "stragglers" were reportedly still bringing in a small trickle of wheat as they finished up early this week.

"The wheat was exceptionally good overall quality-wise," commented a spokesman for Pitman Grain. "We were just short on acres and yields, but with all of the dry weather we had during the fall and winter, we came out fairly well," he added.

The spokesman reported yields ranging from 35-70 bushels per acre. Harvesting ended July 1 at the Easter community, according to Gene King of Easter Grain.

"THE CROP was just about what we'd

expected after taking all of the dry weather we encountered into consideration. Moisture averaged 11-12 per cent and test weights averaged about 61, with the wheat of good quality," said King. Bill Cornett of Dawn Co-Op reported that the last load of wheat was received at the Dawn facility Saturday, and that most of the wheat in that area yielded 40-50 bushels per acre.

"The grain was good and heavy, testing 61 and 62 pounds per bushel, and the yields were actually better than we had expected, Cornett commented.

Similar yields and test weights were reported by a spokesman for Hereford Grain Corp., who also indicated that there were scattered reports of a few yields over 60 bushels.

OVERALL, YIELDS this year were down from those reported in 1975, when wheat growers enjoyed the benefits of some timely late winter and early spring moisture.

An extended drought which began in October of 1975 and extended into the spring of this year decimated the dryland wheat crop locally, cutting drastically into the county's overall wheat output.

The drought followed an ideal year for dryland wheat farmers, in 1975, when dryland yields of 30 bushels per acre were common.

**Carter to Seek Out
Mondale for VP Spot**

HERSHEY, Pa. (AP) - Jimmy Carter said today he will interview Sen. Walter Mondale of Minnesota as a possible vice presidential running mate Thursday.

Mondale is the second vice presidential possibility with whom Carter has met. The former Georgia governor talked with Sen. Edmund Muskie of Maine at his Plains, Ga., home Monday.

The man who is virtually assured of winning the Democratic presidential nomination next week has said he plans to meet with at least five vice presidential prospects before and during the convention.

Carter made his announcement about Mondale at a news conference held with Democratic governors at the National Governors Conference here.

After his meeting with Muskie, Carter said he found no incompatibility with the 1968 Democratic vice presidential candidate.

He also said that "Sen. Muskie and I

both had a clear understanding that neither one of us was under any obligation" to make a decision immediately.

Carter was asked if Muskie remained on the finalists list for the vice presidential slot. "That's certainly right," Carter said.

Muskie said after the session that the vice presidency in the past has been "a mixed bag," adding he would not lightly decide to abandon the Senate for the vice presidential nomination.

Muskie said he would "not be interested in any circumstances in simply occupying a chair. I'd be interested in a job...with at least as great a potential as the Senate has."

Carter declined to name the others on his list of possible running mates and said he might expand the list before the Democratic National Convention begins in New York City July 12.

Muskie, 62, ran as the vice presidential candidate with Democratic presidential nominee Hubert H. Humphrey in 1968, an election won by Richard M. Nixon.

**Reagan Hopes To Woo
GOP Delegates With TV**

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Republican presidential candidate Ronald Reagan says he hopes his appearance on national television tonight will persuade uncommitted GOP delegates to vote for him.

"It's an important speech," the former California governor said Monday before taping the half-hour talk at a Hollywood studio.

He said President Ford's television exposure at Bicentennial events Sunday

and Monday had nothing to do with his decision to present his nationwide message.

"We decided a long time ago to do this," Reagan said.

"Kansas City is drawing close and there are a lot of uncommitted delegates. I would have liked to have made the taping closer to the convention, but we had to take the time when it was

**Law Agencies Report
Quiet July 4 Weekend**

The long July 4 weekend was a relatively quiet one for Hereford law enforcement agencies.

CITY OFFICERS are currently investigating the theft of a CB radio which occurred Saturday.

Jerry Whitley of 133 Mimosa reported that a CB was stolen from a vehicle parked at Sugarland Mall.

An estimated value of the radio was not available.

Charges were pending at presstime in connection with a firecracker throwing incident Sunday, according to city police.

ROY POWELL of Elm Courts No. 27

reported that he was turning into an alley near Taylor & Son Grocery Sunday night when a vehicle passed him and a firecracker was thrown from that vehicle into his own car. The firecracker struck a passenger in the Powell vehicle in the stomach, inflicting burns.

Deaf Smith County Sheriff Travis McPherson indicated that there were no major occurrences reported to his office over the long weekend, though there were a few more routing arrests made, due to the extended holiday.

"There were several arrests for drunkenness and DWI, but we had extra officers working and there weren't any major incidents," said McPherson.

**Libyan Airliner Hijacked
By Foes of Col. Khadafy**

PALMA DE MAJORCA, Balearic Islands (AP) - A Libyan airliner hijacked on a flight within Libya today landed here with 86 persons aboard and the hijacker surrendered, airport sources said.

The hijacker, identified only as a man opposed to the Libyan regime of Col. Mommar Khadafy, gave up to airport police and turned-over two toy pistols and two knives to the chief of the airport, the sources said.

They said nobody was injured and the passengers were being looked after by airport authorities.

Officials in Algiers said the hijacked Boeing 727 jetliner had landed previously at Boufarik air base, 20 miles south of Algiers, after being refused permission to land at the Tunis and Algiers airports. The base is the headquarters of the

Algerian air force. Algerian authorities said the plane stayed at Boufarik only about 10 minutes, then flew on to Palma de Majorca. There was no information on whether it refueled in Algeria.

The plane was hijacked on an early morning flight between Tripoli, the Libyan capital, and Benghazi, in eastern Libya. It was assumed that most or all of those aboard were Libyans.

The pilot tried first to land at Tunis airport, but Tunisian officials refused permission and barricaded the runways.

Tunisian officials said a man aboard the plane told the Tunis control tower he had taken over the aircraft and was a member of a Libyan underground movement called Vigilant Youth that is opposed to Khadafy's regime.

**Holiday Death Toll
Higher Than Figured**

An upsurge in accidents on streets and highways sent the violent death toll even higher than expected in Texas during the extended July 4 holiday weekend.

There were 50 traffic fatalities in an over-all total of 79, which also included 14 drownings and eight shootings, plus others from assorted causes. The toll was recorded between 6 p.m. Friday and midnight Monday.

Traffic deaths occurring during a homeward bound rush of travelers sent the number climbing above a pre-holiday prediction by Texas Department of Public Safety experts of 42 from that cause.

Traffic deaths on the nation's highways during the Bicentennial weekend totaled 474, falling short of the prediction of the National Safety Council.

The safety council, noting a greater tendency by drivers to break the

55-mile-per-hour speed limit, had forecast that as many as 630 persons

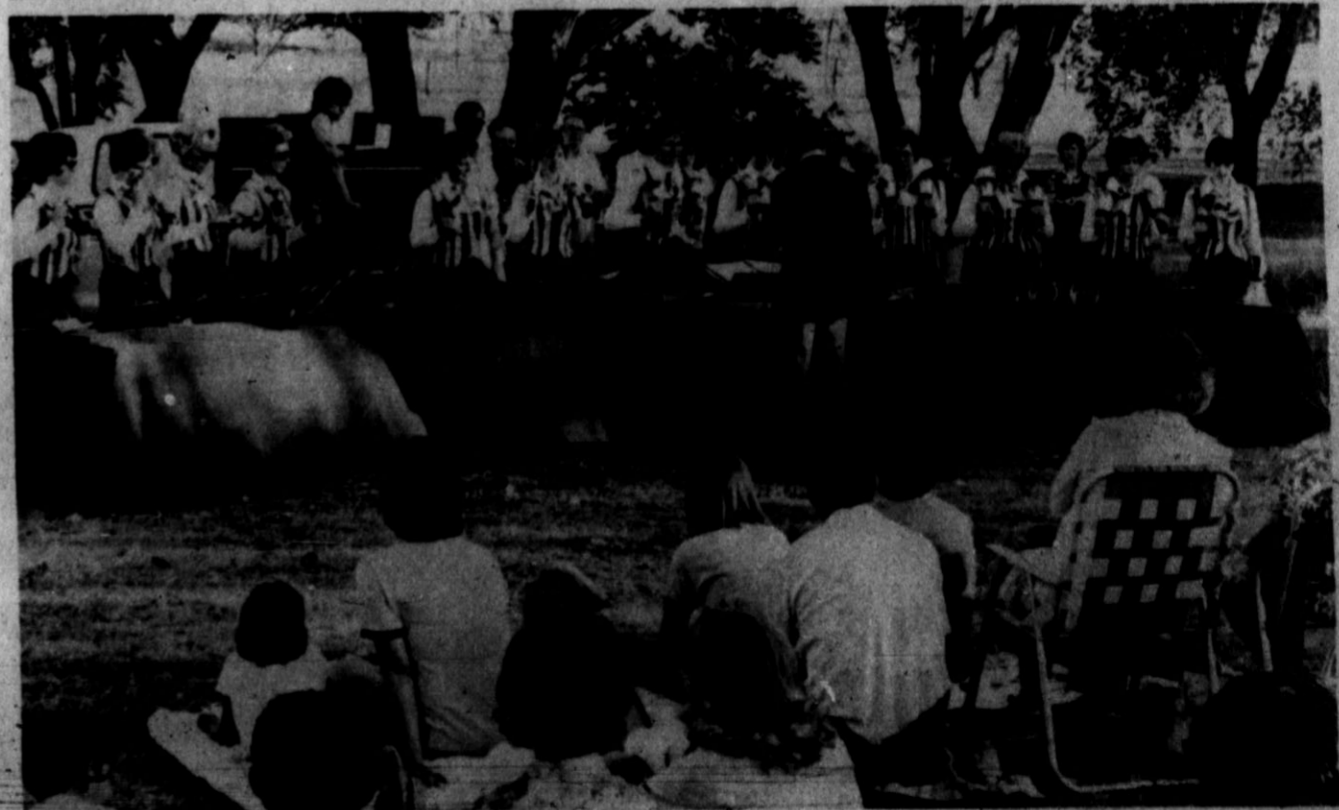

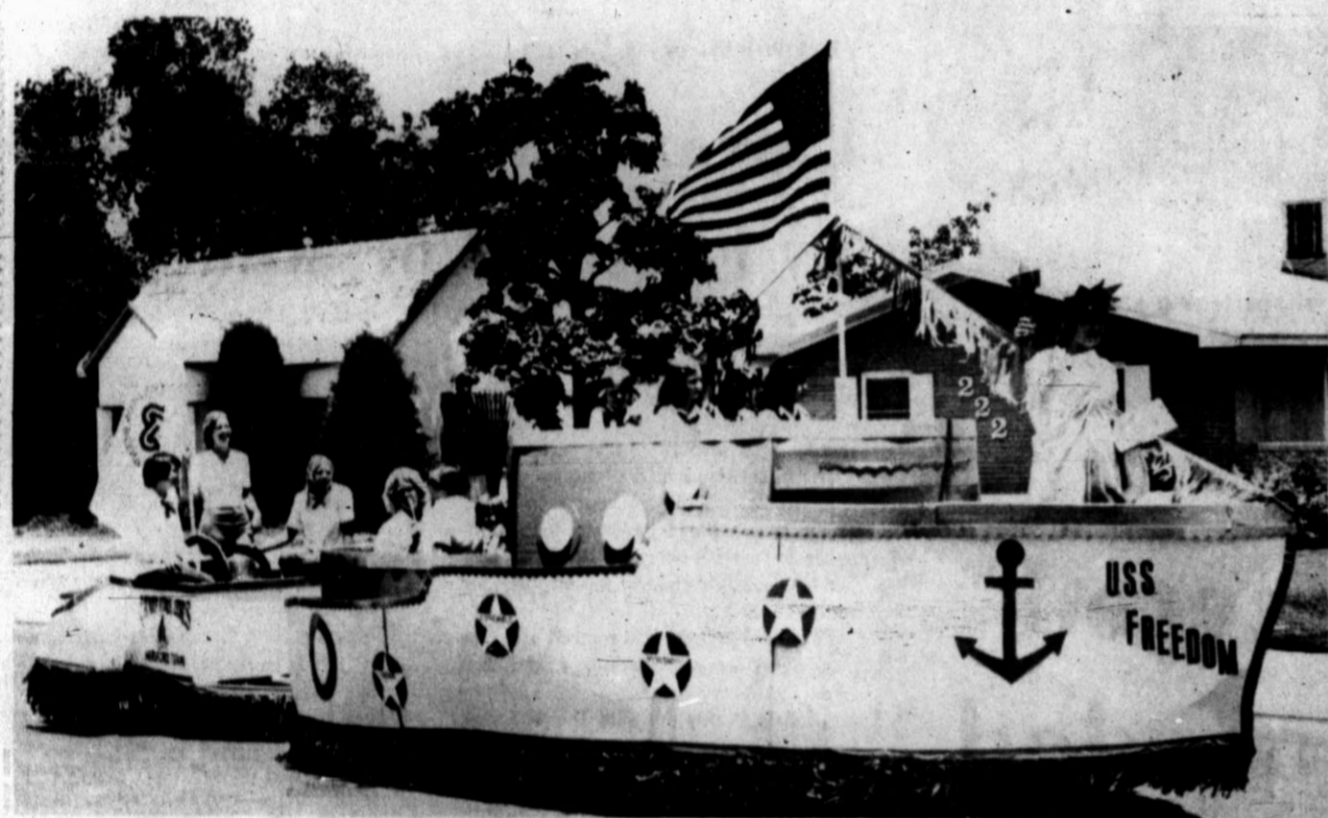

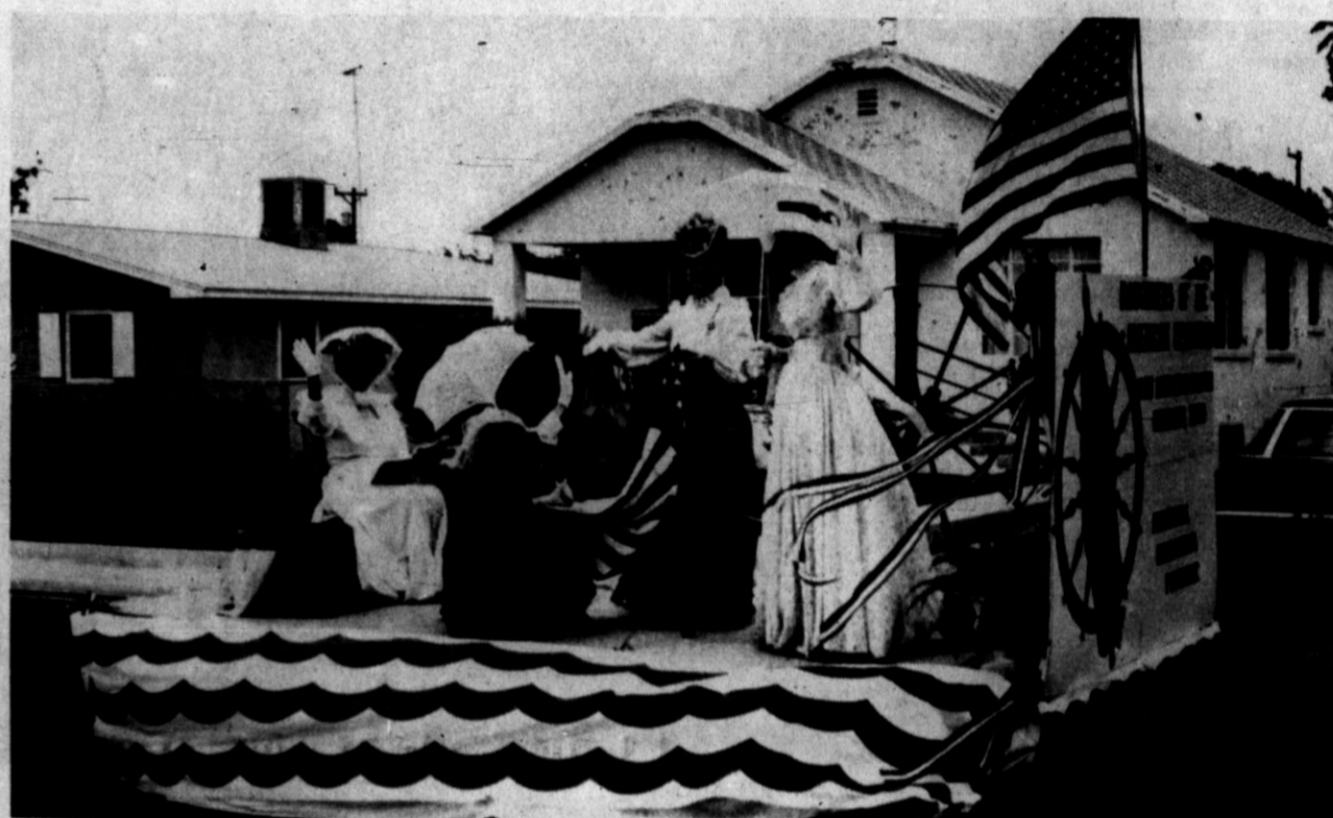

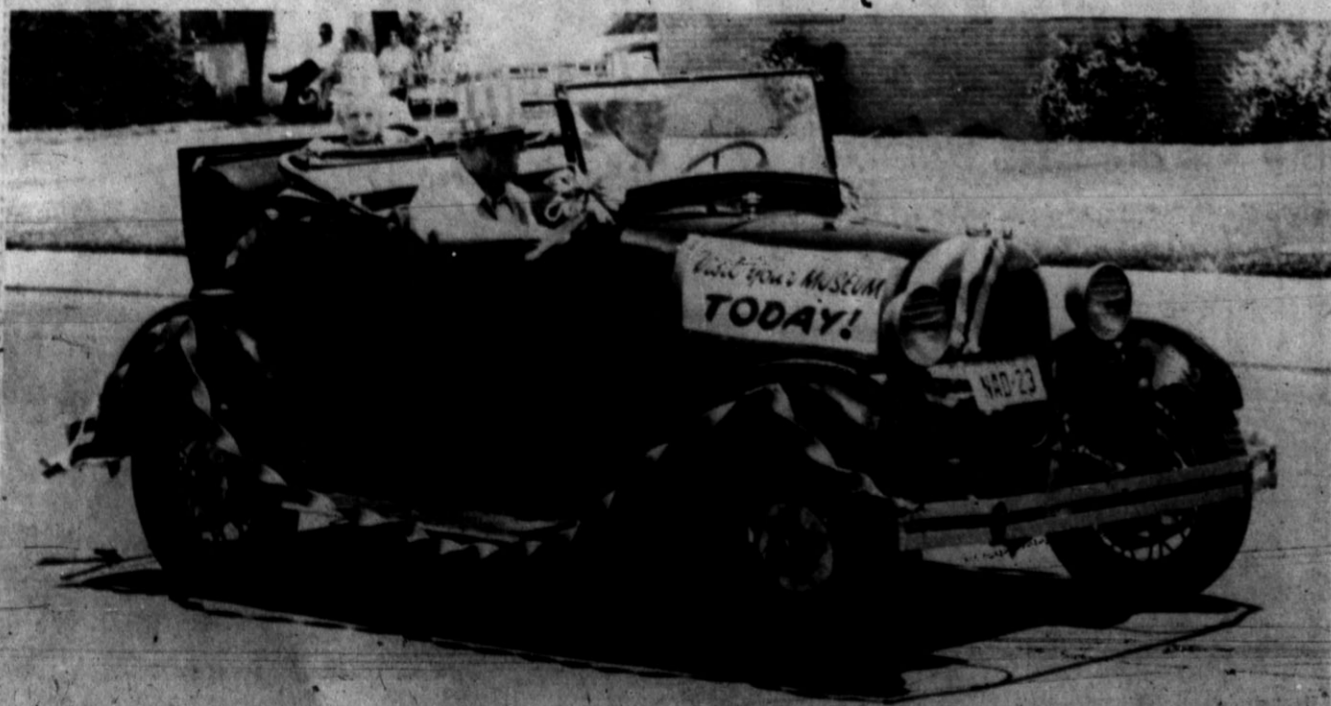

Borg Passes Up Grand Slam Meet

MYRTLE BEACH, S.C. (AP) — Officials of the first Grand Slam of Tennis tournament in Myrtle Beach were notified Monday that Bjorn Borg, the winner of this year's Wimbledon championship, will not play in the tourney.

He will be replaced by Jimmy Connors, who agreed Monday to compete in the three-day event that gets underway Friday.

Tourney officials said Borg aggravated a stomach muscle strain he had at Wimbledon and would be unable to compete. He has been ordered by doctors to rest.

Designed to pit the winners of

the game's most prestigious tournaments against each other, the four-man competition will bring together on the clay composition court 1975 Wimbledon champion Arthur Ashe, 1975 U.S. Open winner Manuel Orantes, Masters champion Ilie Nastase and Connors.

In future years, the tournament field will be made up of the previous year's Wimbledon, U.S. Open, French Open and Grand Slam winners. If any player should win more than one of the tournaments, the winner of the Italian or the Australian Open will be invited to compete. The tournament is expected to become an annual

event held each January at different locations.

The tournament is being sponsored by the Pepsi Cola Co.

The three-day event offers a total purse of \$150,000, with the winner claiming \$75,000. Second place will be worth \$40,000, third place \$20,000 and fourth place \$15,000.

One match a day is scheduled for Friday and Saturday. A consolation match will be played Sunday, followed by the championship, which will be televised live. Pairings are to be determined at a drawing later this week.

WIMBLEDON, England - Bjorn Borg became the first Swede ever to win the men's singles title at the Wimbledon Tennis Championships with a 6-4, 6-2, 9-7 victory over Ilie Nastase of Romania.

BAASTAD, Sweden - Top-seeded Corrado Barazzutti of Italy advanced to the second round of the \$100,000 Sweden Open tennis championships with a 7-5, 6-1 triumph over unseeded dutchman Rolf Thung.

GSTAAD, Switzerland - Italy's Paolo Bertolucci upset No. 7 seed Ivan Molina of Colombia 6-2, 6-7, 6-2 in first round action at the Swiss International Tennis Championships.

Olympic Chief Silent On Taiwan

MONTREAL (AP) - Lord Killanin, president of the International Olympic Committee, was noncommittal Monday on a Canadian-government proposal that Taiwanese athletes come to the Montreal Olympics on the same basis as they attended 1960 Rome Olympics.

The head of the Olympic governing body answered questions at a news conference after arriving from his European headquarters in the midst of a controversy as to whether—and under what name—Taiwan should be allowed to take part in the Montreal Olympics due to open next week.

In the Commons earlier in the day, Prime Minister Trudeau and External Affairs minister Allan MacEachen called on the IOC to extend Canada the same rights given Italy in 1960 when the Taiwanese were told by the IOC they could participate only as Taiwanese and not as the Republic of China.

would die during the four-day week-end that began at 6 p.m. Friday and ended at midnight Monday in each time zone.

The record death toll for an Independence Day weekend was 758 in 1972, also a four-day holiday.

Concern over that situation prompted Col. Wilson Speir, the DPS director, to appeal to motorists for added caution in driving as the weekend drew near a close.

Speir, expressing "great personal concern that the traffic death toll has risen to such tragic proportions," ordered all state troopers on duty until midnight Monday to remove unsafe drivers from the highways.

These were among the latest deaths: Ralph W. Rost, 52, of Pearland was killed Monday as two cars collided near

there in Brazoria County.

Dr. Judge E. Page, 55, a cofounder of the first all-black Medical center in Dallas - Forest Avenue Hospital, was found shot to death Monday in a roadside ditch in the city's Oak Cliff section. Police said he often carried a large amount of money and robbery was the apparent motive.

Gayla Yvonne Williams, 19, of Kilgore died Monday night in a two-car crash on Farm Road 848 south of Tyler. Three other persons were injured.

Martha Jane Walton, 35, of Longview was shot to death with a rifle Monday, officers said, at a rural spot north of the city. A man was charged.

Five-year-old Victor Reddic burned to death and his brother and two sisters were injured Saturday when fire swept a house in the East Texas community of Pirtle, about four miles south of Kilgore. Firemen said the injured children - Randy, Tonja and Rena Reddic - were lying on a shoulder across the road from the burning house.

Dallas police said the mother of 7-year-old Yolanda Michelle Drayton found her daughter strangled Monday in an alley in the Oak Cliff section of the city. Investigators said they had no suspects.

Kevin L. McConnell, 16, died in a Dallas hospital Monday of injuries suffered two days before when a car hit the back of a truck on U.S. 75 at Allen, in Collin County.

Ronny Jennings, 32, drowned Monday at Lake Whitney in Central Texas.

available."

According to an Associated Press survey, Reagan has 976 delegates to Ford's 1,004 with 179 uncommitted and 98 delegates yet to be selected. A total of 1,130 delegate votes are needed to win the Republican nomination.

Reagan again predicted he would win the nomination on the first ballot at the August GOP convention at Kansas City, Mo.

Before the taping, Reagan would say only that the TV talk would emphasize his idea of "what America is, and what I believe it should be," but a campaign aide said that Reagan concentrates on his theme of excesses in government and inflation.

Reagan said Ford's Bicentennial exposure was "what would be expected of a president."

"If it helps him, it hurts me," Reagan said. "If it hurts him, it helps me."

Reagan said the stunning Israeli commando raid to rescue 100 airline passengers and crewmen from Palestinian terrorists reminded him "of the way Americans used to act."

"The tragedy of it is that we still live in a world where countries will not join in and make it plain that they will not put up with that terrorism."

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City Woman Injured Sunday In Rollover

A 19 year-old Hereford woman was taken to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo Sunday night after she was injured in a one car rollover east of the city.

Cynthia Cooper of 441 Ave. B was injured at about 7:30 Sunday night when her car apparently blew a tire and rolled over once, 3.6 miles east of Hereford on farm road 1259.

Two passengers in the car, Jerry Harrison, 19, of 505 East Third and Johnny Ramirez, 18, of Bluewater Gardens apartments, both suffered minor injuries in the accident.

They were taken to Deaf Smith General Hospital for treatment and released.

According to DPS reports, the vehicle was eastbound at the time of the rollover. It landed upright.

No citations were issued at the accident.

Landing Site Still Same

A giant radar dish in Arecibo, Puerto Rico, aimed at the spot chosen for Viking 1's landing on Mars, has so far failed to turn up anything that might reverse the decision.

As scientists at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory went through the data from Arecibo Monday, Project Manager Jim Martin said: "I have heard no data that would shake our belief in the Northwest area."

The Northwest area is the flat plain - probably an ancient basin or dry lake - that became Viking's destination when the spacecraft's cameras found the original site to be inhospitable.

The cameras show the new site to be relatively free of mounds or boulders. But radar examination from earth can sometimes spot smaller hazards.

On Thursday, if the good news continues, Viking 1 will be ordered to adjust its orbit to bring it over the landing point. The landing is scheduled for July 17.

"There is no question that the robber came here strictly for those wines," said Leonce Picot, co-owner of the tavern.

"He ignored the money in the cash registers and in the safe upstairs. He took strictly the best."

Picot said an inventory of the wine cellar showed that two bottles of 1899 Chateau Margaux, each valued at \$1,000 on the tavern's wine list, and a 1900 Chateau Margaux, were missing.

Picot said he believed the burglar was "a wine nut" or a thief who had already lipped up a wine collector to buy the hot grape.
