There is no mystery to the problem. The program has been so liberalized with benefits that the outgo is more than the income.

We read another editor's column, and he figured that if a person started paying the maximum amount of social security taxes in 1937, the year it started, and paid the maximum every year through the end of 1976, he would have payed in a total of \$7,763.

The maximum social security benefit payable to a man retiring at age 65 this year is \$437.10 monthly, which means it would take less than 18 months to get back the \$7,763 which was paid in over a total of 40 years.

Atex Motion Overruled

State District Judge Pat Boone Monday overruled a motion for change of venue filed by Atex Oil Co. in its defense against a lawsuit filed by six owner-operators of diesel trucks.

Atex asked for a change of venue after. The Brand ran a copyrighted article on the lawsuit Oct. 2. Barney Evans and Roger Key, attorneys for Atex, tried to convince Judge Boone Monday in Judge Wesley Gulley's 222nd District Court that publicity concerning the case would make it impossible for Atex to receive a fair trial in Deaf \$mith County.

Judge Gulley had excused himself for hearing the case on the grounds he was a member of the plaintiffs' law firm when the case was filed in the spring of 1976.

Plaintiffs are Elgin Moore, G.R. Smith, Preston L. Ryan and Doyle King of Hereford, Marian E. Guarnier of LaCrescenta, Calif., and Tommy L. Hicks of Chicago III.

Three Hijackers Killed - During Blitz of Airliner

BONN, West Germany (AP) - A West German commando force was flying home in triumph from East Africa today after a blitz raid on a hi-jacked Lufthansa airliner in which they rescued all 86 surviving hostages and killed three of the four hijackers.

Later in the night after the failure of the hijacking was announced, three of the imprisoned West German terrorists whose freedom the hijackers demanded committed suicide. A fourth terrorist on the list also tried to kill herself and was in critical condition.

The Entebbe-style rescue operation early today at Mogadishu, the capital of Somalia, provided "a very serious lesson / for some people around the world on how to deal with terrorism," said a West German government spokesman.

President Carter congratulated the Bonn government for the "courage of their decision" to end the 4½-day hijacking without giving in to the hijackers' demands. Japanese Justice Minister Mitsuo Setoyama, whose government met the demands of Japanese hijackers two weeks ago, said the West German action "showed how to prevent hijacking."

Somali officials said nine passengers and one commando were slightly injured in the 10-minute raid and the terrorist who survived, a woman, was badly wounded. Lufthansa, the West German airline, said one other passenger was hospitalized "in a state of collapse." But all the hostages left Mogadishu this morning for home, Radio Somalia reported.

Most were Germans, but two Americans were reported among them. They were Christine M. Santiago, 44, of Santee, Calif., and her 5-year-old son, Leo. Mrs. Santiago has a heart condition.

The surviving hijacker, the lone woman in the Arabic-speaking gang, remained in a Mogadishu hospital, officials said.

The identities and nationalities of the terrorists remained in doubt. But Somali Information Minister Abduqaldir Salad

indicated that the three bodies were being sent to Germany.

The hijackers demanded the release of 11 imprisoned West German terrorists and two Palestinians in Turkish jails, along with \$6 million in ransom. The couple who headed the list, Andreas Baader and his mistress, Gudrun Ensslin, committed suicide during the night.

Carter Won't Stop in Denver For Farm Talk

Arliss Edwards, an advocate of the American Agriculture farm strike movement in the Deaf Smith County area, informed The Brand Monday afternoon that President Jimmy Carter will apparently cancel a stop in Denver during a westward swing across the country Friday and Saturday.

"I was in touch with the Springfield, Colo. office of American Agriculture, and they informed me that the President has canceled his plans for a stop in Denver." Edwards reported.

The American Agriculture movement was planning to muster a force of farmers angry about current economic conditions in agriculture to protest to the President during his Denver stop.

The Denver Presidential visit was to serve as another opportunity for the agriculture movement to rally support for its cause.

The cancellation by the President comes on the heels of a massive farm strike rally held in Amarillo Friday, where some 5,000 farmers turned out to voice their disapproval of current farm legislation.

Issue Remains Mystery

GI Forum Seeks Action from City

Representatives of the American GI Forum in Hereford added a tense touch to an otherwise unexciting and routine city commission Monday night when they became angry at commissioners for refusing to take action on an unknown

Rumaldo Garcia, Hereford chairman of the American GI Forum, refused to say what the issue was but hinted that it dealt with certain city laws. He said he would only discuss the issue if commissioners were willing to take some action on it.

Earnest Langley, city attorney, explained to Garcia that since the American GI Forum was not on the agenda, commissioners legally could take no action.

Garcia, in turn, angrily said he had tried to find a place on the agenda but was told on Thursday that he needed to notify the city of his intentions by Thursday morning. Garcia said he had tried before—on a Friday—but was told

to notify the city by Thursday, according to the law.

The group's president said that the second time he tried to have the discussion placed on the agenda he had been unaware that he needed to contact

City Hall before noon Thursday.

"The commission would be glad to discuss this thing with you," Langley said concerning the still unknown issue.

"We don't want to discuss. We want action," said Garcia, who led his group of approximately 15 members from the meeting room.

Commissioners discussed the city's franchise with Southwestern Public Service and unofficially agreed to delete a line in the contract which would allow the city to raise or lower the street rental tax paid by SPS.

SPS, represented by Hereford manager Jake Webb, wanted the line deleted to establish a firm contract, which would keep the gross receipt tax at 2 percent for street and alley rental.

Bob Price Seeks Hereford Support

Bob Price, former U.S. Congressman from Pampa, was in Hereford Monday morning to seek support of his candidacy for the office of state senator from the 31st District.

A special election is scheduled Nov. 8 to fill the vacancy created when Max Sherman resigned to become president of West Texas State University. Absentee voting in the election starfs here Wednesday in the county clerk's office

and continues through 5 p.m. on Nov. 4.

Price. who spoke to a group of interested citizens at 10 a.m. Monday in the Community Center, also made appearances in Dimmitt and Friona Monday and continued on to Tulia for a night session with the other four

candidates in the race.

Stressing his experience in the U.S. Congress for eight years, Price said "the people of the Panhandle allowed me to gain that experience and I feel it would be a waste not to put that knowledge to work for this district."

While he believes it is a "good sign" to have five candidates in the race. Price said he was "appaled" at the lack of interest shown by voters. "I dare say that only 20 percent of the registered voters will go to the polls. Many people are just not willing to give their time and get involved in things that have made this country great-both on the government level and the community level," added Price.

"If you believe in me, I need your help." Price told the group. "If you are for another candidate, he needs your help. If you don't like any of the candidates, get in the race yourself." he continued.

Price pointed out that he was the only candidate outside of Amarillo, "and the only one who has made a living out of farming and ranching." He said he strongly supported a longrange water importation plan for Texas and that he would work for a state committment on such a plan.

"Like the Alaskan pipeline for oil, we will see the day when the necessity of importing water will be justified," claimed Price.

Price claimed none of the other candidates were offering "any new ideas," but that he has proposed several things he would work for as a state senator. Posing his own question as to what a state senator could do for agriculture, Price said he thinks the state should call for a review of the taxes placed on agricultural land. He also spoke in favor of 100 percent parity for farmers, claiming that "everyone in the nation would benefit."

Price, too, advocated a tax cut at the state level by using the surpluses currently being realized by the state legislature. He called for higher salaries for teachers, along with a study to determine why the schools are failing to

teach the basics.

He added that a tax cut along with increased teacher pay might be accomplished by "making a choice on our priorities." Price noted that "we have fine football and basketball teams with great equipment, but do we put as much emphasis on our curriculum?" He added that he was a sports fan but if it came down to a business decision, he would stress education over sports.

In answer to some questions, Price also said he favored retaining the state's right-to-work law, favored some type of counseling and training program to make productive citizens of widows and divorcees and favored protection of senior


I knew at that moment I would have to try a new approach. It would have to be picked up and shoved immediately into the wall with no time for measuring or hesitating.

AMARILLO, Tex. (AP) -Lawyers for millionaire murder 11-230-tfc defendant Cullen Davis resurrected a mystery gun Monday and sought to tie it to slain Fort Worth police character Horace Copland.

The gun was first mentioned Saturday and it is not the one 11-78-tfc originally brought up in testimony a few weeks ago.

Prosecutors labeled the issue a "red herring" and said the weapon in no way was linked to a 1976 shooting spree at Davis' \$6 million Fort Worth mansion. The murder weapon was never recovered.

Fort Worth crime lab director Frank Shiller testified he conducted tests on the .38 caliber pistol and determined test bullets were similar to those

recovered from the mansion. But Shiller told defense lawyer Richard "Racehorse" Haynes during cross-examination he halted testing at the instruction of Dist. Atty. Tim Curry, chief prosecutor in the Davis trial.

Two died and two were wounded in the midnight gunfire. Davis, 44, is on trial for his life in the slaying of his 12-year-old stepdaughter Andrea Wilborn.

The defendant's estranged wife Priscilla, 36, was wounded and her lover Stan Farr was killed in the carnage that also left a young mansion visitor crippled.

Cowboys Could Be Great Harris Says

DALLAS (AP) - The unbeaten Dallas Cowboys, springing such surprises as rookie running back Tony Dorsett throwing passes. are threatening to run away with the National Conference Eastern Division if they can stay healthy.

The Cowboys learned Monday that cornerback Aaron Kyle will be lost five weeks because of a wrist fractured in two places in Sunday's 34-16 battering of the rival Washington Redskins.

"Barring injuries this could be the greatest of the Cowboy said safety Cliff Harris. Boy, I tell you it looks strange to see all these young players in our offensive line out there with old man (right tackle Ralph Neely) playing like veterans."

Harris said Monday the defensive line was playing so well that "I didn't even get much contact against the Redskins. I feel pretty bad today but it was because I stayed up late last night celebrating.

"I certainly felt sorry for Washington's quarterbacks in the fourth quarter the way our front four was storming in there. I wanted an interception but they couldn't get the ball off."

Harris said the Cowboys went through the "toughest off-season conditioning program we've ever had. That's bound to have some effect in the fourth quarter. This team just has the ability to maintain pressure until the other team breaks. The defense never lets down."

Dallas at 5-0 is one of three unbeaten teams remaining in the National Football League and the only one in the NFC. The Cowboys are two games ahead of Washington and three in front of St. Louis in the usually wild, wild NFC East.

2. SOURDOUGH BREAD STICKS

- 1 cup warm water (105° to 115°)
- 2 cups all-purpose flou

a). Mix dry milk, water. Sourdough Starter and 2 cups flour in nonmetallic bowl, cover loosely. Let stand in warm place until mixture is coarse and bubbly, at least 8 hours.

b) Mix oil, salt, sugar and baking soda into sourdough mixture. Stir in enough of the remaining flour to make dough easy to handle Knead dough lightly on well-floured board, about 2 minutes

c) Roll dough into rectangle, 15 x 10 inches, on well-floured board Cut into fifteen 1-inch strips. Roll each strip into even round strand. about 14 inches long. Double strand over and twist to form bread stick. Place bread sticks on greased baking sheet, brush with melfed butter Cover with plastic wrap. Let rise in warm place until double.

d) Heat oven to 375° Bake bread sticks until golden brown, 30 to 35
