## Local man sought in morning kidnapping

A Hereford man is facing kidnapping and other charges today after taking the two young children of his live-in girlfriend.

Rudy Salinas, 25, of 215 Ave. K, took the four-year-old son and five-year-old daughter of Kathy Rios, 22, also of 215 Ave. K, at about 2:15 a.m. today from a friend's house at Grand and Ave. J in Hereford.

Ms. Rios told police that Salinas assaulted her, then took her two children.

Mrs. Rios told police Salinas told her, "If you want your kids, we'll be in Plainview."

Salinas then took Ms. Rios 1989 Dodge Shadow. She called Hereford police a few minutes after Salinas left, and police immediately issued a bulletin for the car. It is red with gray striping, and has four doors, tinted windows and a black luggage rack. Special notice was sent to authorities in Dimmitt, Plainview and Hale Center, but the car, Salinas and the children had not been found this morning.

The children are Derrick Rios, 4, who was wearing a red shirt and red shorts, and Tiffany Rios, 5, who was wearing a pink and black polka dot shirt and white shorts.

A Fiestas Patrias queen has been named in Hereford for 37 years. Fiestas Patrias marks Mexico's dec-

laration of independence from Spain in 1810. The current queen is Consuelo Castillo.

Rachel Alaniz and Bobby Jo Borday will give programs on topics relating to the Mexican-American community. A panel of five out-of-town

judges will assess their presentations. Alaniz's presentation will be on the past, present and future of Mexican-American families; Miss Borday will talk on the past, present and future Mexican-American heroes.

## Iraq delays embassy closing deadline

Iraqi troops today deployed near at least six embassies in Kuwait where diplomats were defying orders to shut down, and the skeleton staff at the U.S. mission braced for possibilities ranging from a takeover to a supply cutoff.

In other developments in the Persian Gulf crisis, Iran today said for the first time it would enforce U.N. sanctions against Iraq despite a recent warming in relations with Baghdad, and Austrian President Kurt Waldheim set off for the Mideast on a peacemaking mission that was to include a meeting with Iraqi president Saddam Hussein.

Saddam's troops, who invaded Kuwait Aug. 2, today patrolled around the British, Japanese, Norwegian, Swedish, Romanian and Hungarian embassies, officials said.

"We don't know how many soldiers there are, their intentions, but there must be a lot, enough to completely surround the entire building," said Bjorn Blokhus, a Norwegian Foreign Ministry spokesman commenting on the situation at his country's embassy in Kuwait.

There was uncertainty about the Iraqi deadline for the shutdown.

The Iraqi News Agency has said foreign governments have until 9 p.m. (1 p.m. EDT) to vacate the 60 embassies in Kuwait. Diplomats in Washington, however, said the deadline was extended to midnight.

Spain's ambassador to Jordan, Ramon Armengol, told a news conference in Madrid today that Iraqi authorities were saying foreign embassies had until 8:30 a.m. Saturday (12:30 a.m. EDT), to close, or they would be removed by force.

U.S. Ambassador Nathaniel Howell and perhaps a dozen other Americans stayed at the palm-shaded American compound in Kuwait City. Concrete barriers and steel spikes are among the security at the U.S. Embassy complex on Arabian Gulf Boulevard.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater told reporters Thursday at President Bush's summer home in Kennebunkport, Maine, that U.S. diplomats will remain in Kuwait "as long as there are Americans that they can assist."

Most U.S. diplomatic personnel were evacuated Thursday. Marine guards were among 33 carloads of Americans who drove to the Iraqi capital of Baghdad.

"A few Marine guards aren't

going to fight off the entire Iraqi army," a senior government official said Thursday in Washington.

In addition to the United States, those countries ignoring Iraq's shutdown order included Japan, the 12 European Community nations, Switzerland and Austria.

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About 3,000 Americans are among the 21,000 Westerners stranded in Iraq and Kuwait, kept from leaving by Saddam and threatened with being used as human shields around Iraqi targets.

In another development Thursday,

a U.S. intelligence source reported that Saddam's elite Republican Guards, which led the attack into Kuwait, are being replaced on the front lines of his defenses by other troops.

But the source, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the Guards - numbering perhaps more than 50,000 according to NBC News - could still be used in an Iraqi attack on Saudi Arabia from Kuwait.

### World, National

**UNDATED** - U.S. and other Western diplomats defiantly stay in their embassies in Kuwait despite Iraq's deadline today demanding they close. Saddam Hussein tells captive Westerners on TV that their presence ensures there will be no war.

**KENNEBUNKPORT**, Maine - The Bush administration is steeling itself to defy today's Iraq-imposed deadline for closing the U.S. Embassy in Kuwait by evacuating Marine guards and all but a dozen staff members.

**WASHINGTON** - Most U.S. reserves sent to help defend Saudi Arabia won't be driving tanks or digging foxholes. But they will tackle two of the most important tasks in desert warfare: getting water and protecting against chemical attacks.

**UNDATED** - The drop in U.S. stock prices in the past month exceeded the Black Monday crash of October 1987 and the price of oil matched an all-time high as a Persian Gulf showdown loomed today.

**WASHINGTON** - The Mideast crisis has people talking about conservation again. But few are actually doing anything about it. Phone lines started ringing at energy conservation advice lines right after Iraq invaded Kuwait on Aug. 2, as consumers fearing higher prices sought tips to cut their consumption.

**WASHINGTON** - The financially suffering Postal Service is asking for "constructive restraint" in wage demands when contract talks open today, but union leaders say their members shouldn't pay for management mistakes.

**NEWARK, N.J.** - Andrew Voros walked out of a jail in war-torn Liberia last weekend with a pair of jeans and his life. Voros, who spent the last four years documenting the destruction of the last virgin rain forest in West Africa, saw his work looted and friends tortured and killed.

**PHOENIX** - Reports of the political demise of ousted former governor Evan Mechem may have been premature. The feisty former car dealer's campaign to reclaim the Arizona governor's office is very much alive and he remains in the thick of the five-way race for the Republican nomination.

**HOUSTON** - Federal investigators today resumed their probe into the fiery crash of a business airplane that killed three and injured 12 during takeoff at Houston Intercontinental Airport.

**FORT WORTH** - The man who ran the Miss Texas Scholarship Pageant for two decades steps down, saying he was unfairly depicted in a magazine article and news stories as a "dirty old man" who allowed some contestants to buy their way into the pageant.

**UNDATED** - Prison Board Vice Chairman Jerry Hodge has taken to the national talk show circuit to defend his participation in an exercise where he and two friends accompanied prison dogs to pursue inmates in what became known as the "Ultimate Hunt."

**DALLAS** - Jurors who recommended a life sentence for a man convicted of aggravated sexual assault said they were sickened by a 72-minute videotape of the rapist made of the attack.

**HOUSTON** - The GOP convention committee has a visit to the Astrodome on its agenda today as the group tours the last of four cities vying for the 1992 Republican National Convention.

**HENDERSON** - A prosecutor was in the middle of his opening statement at the cocaine delivery trial of a Rusk County man when a key witness disclosed that the defendant was not the person who had delivered the cocaine.

**HOUSTON** - A wealthy businessman killed by a shot to the head had feared for his life after being arrested trying to sell \$17 million in stolen treasury bills, an associate says.

**PASADENA** - Federal investigators plan safety inspections of 26 petrochemical plants in the wake of last year's deadly explosion at a Phillips Petroleum Co. plastics plant near here.

**UNDATED** - Trainloads of Army equipment have arrived at the Port of Beaumont, and Air Force officials say planes and people from Kelly Air Force Base in San Antonio have headed to the Middle East.

## Texas wheeler-dealer dealt out

HOUSTON (AP) - A wealthy businessman killed by a shot to the head had been negotiating with federal officials in an attempt to gain protection through the Federal Witness Protection Program because he feared for his life after being arrested trying to sell \$17 million in stolen treasury bills, an associate says.

Mark L. Osborne, 47, was shot execution-style in the back of the head and his body dumped in the back seat of his leased 1990 Lincoln Town Car, which was found in a Houston mall parking lot Tuesday. He had been missing since Aug. 16.

Osborne, described by friends as a wheeler-dealer who made and lost several fortunes, had been arrested in New York City on July 31 after he tried to sell an undercover FBI agent \$17 million in stolen British treasury bills.

The FBI says the bills were part of about \$600 million in financial instruments taken at knifepoint from a security courier in London on May 2.

Osborne believed he had been set up by the people who had provided him with the bills, said an associate who asked to remain anonymous because he feared for his safety.

The source told The Houston Post that Osborne believed the bills he was

given had been stolen from the London-based organized crime figures behind the May 2 heist.

Osborne had sought protection from the FBI through its Federal Witness Protection Program and that negotiations were under way with federal authorities when Osborne was slain, the source said.

"Just the fact he was dealing with the FBI made some other people real nervous, and made him (Osborne) even more afraid," the man said. "He knew a lot of things about a lot of people."

Houston-based private investigator Clyde Wilson, hired by Osborne's widow, Mary Osborne, also said he believes the slaying was connected to the treasury bills.

"There's no question it (the killing) was professionally done," Wilson said. "And the magnitude of the situation he was involved in would certainly indicate the involvement of organized crime."

The London robbery eclipsed Britain's infamous Great Train Robbery of 1963, when hijackers of Glasgow-to-London mail train got away with 2.6 million pounds in cash. The May 2 robbery netted securities valued at 291 million pounds, or about \$556 million. Since then, about 180 million pounds' worth have been recovered.

Over the years, Osborne had more than his share of legal troubles, including being barred from the securities business by the federal Securities and Exchange Commission after a series of violations between 1976 and 1983.

Osborne also was sued for \$35 million for allegedly defrauding Galveston millionaire Robert L. Moody and Moody-controlled National Western Life Insurance Co., and settled out of court for an undisclosed sum. He also had been charged by federal prosecutors with lying to a bank to obtain \$1.25 million in personal loans, but had been acquitted.

## Lt. Gov. candidates hurl muddy accusations

AUSTIN (AP) - Two politicians who want voters to give them one of the most powerful jobs in state government, lieutenant governor, are calling on one another to quit their current state posts.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock, the Democratic candidate, said Republican Rob Mosbacher should quit as chairman of the financially troubled Department of Human Services.

"It is past being a question of money. Even if the agency were given every dollar it could ask for, it obviously could not deliver its needed services under Mosbacher's inept management," Bullock charged Thursday.

Mosbacher defended his performance on the welfare agency's board, accusing Bullock of padding his state payroll with political workers and said Bullock should quit as tax collector to campaign full time.

"So many of Bob's top state employees are working on his campaign, a taxpayer with a question is better off calling the campaign headquarters than the comptroller's office if he wants a straight answer," Mosbacher charged.

Bullock has served as comptroller since he was first elected in 1974. Mosbacher was appointed by Gov. Bill Clements to be chairman of the

board that oversees the human services department.

That agency has been battling budget deficits that earlier this month caused a temporary halt in Medicaid payments.

The Legislative Budget Board will consider shifting \$76 million to the agency on Friday to cover its current budget, and lawmakers have been told the agency now estimates a \$314 million deficit for 1991. Agency officials blame an increased caseload for the budget problems.

Bullock, however, blamed

Mosbacher.

"The welfare crisis has gone from critical to life-threatening to thousands of needy and sick Texans," Bullock said.

Mosbacher wants 10,000 new state employees and more than \$2 billion in new state tax money for the next budget - but he has not properly managed the 16,000 employees he has now," Bullock said.

Mosbacher said Bullock's only angry because the welfare agency is doing its job.

"Bob just can't stand the fact that the agency continues to serve the public, that no benefits have been cut," Mosbacher said.

"He continues to play political games with the lives of vulnerable

Texans. I'm afraid he is more interested in creating panic among the needy than he is in telling the truth," Mosbacher said.

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

## A&M, UT presidents say schools to stay in SWC

AUSTIN (AP) - The presidents of the University of Texas and Texas A&M University said today their schools will remain in the Southwest Conference and "are committed to doing everything possible to strengthen the conference and make it successful."

With the announcement that Arkansas would leave the SWC for the Southeastern Conference there has been speculation that Texas and Texas A&M would follow the Razorbacks or join another conference.

Most SWC observers agreed that the loss of Texas and A&M would destroy the 76-year-old league.

Presidents William Cunningham of Texas and William Molley of A&M issued a joint statement saying, indeed, problems exist within the SWC that "require immediate attention and action."

The presidents said essential changes within the conference include:

- An improvement in fan support throughout the conference.

- Flexibility in scheduling of men's and women's basketball and the addition of non-conference games in football.

- A more "competitive environment" for women's athletics.

- A firm commitment to developing a first-class program in men's and women's basketball.

- Possible conference expansion or alliances with non-SWC institutions "which substantially enhance televised coverage of football games."

"Without these and other changes, the Southwest Conference cannot be a viable organization for excellence both in academic pursuits and in athletic competition," the presidents said.


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## Bucs, LA do each other a big favor

eighth with a single off Dave Stieb, Mike Greenwell tied the game by hitting relief ace Tom Henke's first pitch over the right-field fence for his ninth homer.

"I didn't realize it (could) be a 59 until my caddy told me," he said. "I never thought I was even close to 59 because I was thinking that par was 72."



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



## Ask Dr. Lamb

**DEAR DR. LAMB:** I was fascinated by some news stories a few months ago that whether you were fat or not depended on your genes — if you were born to be fat, you would be fat. I have tried diets and exercise but cannot really control my weight. Now I'm wondering if all my effort is really useless if I have inherited the genes to be overweight.

Both of my parents were overweight as were my grandparents. My brothers and sisters all have a weight problem. Most doctors have told me it was because I ate too many calories, but Dr. Lamb, I have literally starved myself and not lost weight. I would like to know more about the role of genes in being overweight and if I should diet or not.

**DEAR READER:** There is a lot of evidence that people do inherit genes that have a major influence on whether they are going to be fat or thin, and at what stage in life. These recent studies are not the first ones to show this, but they are well-done studies that show about 70 percent of the problem of being overweight is more related to your genes than your diet.

But don't throw caution to the wind. You can help to avoid the problem even if you have genes that call for you to be overweight. Think of this way: Some people inherit a form of diabetes, but that doesn't mean it should not be treated. The question of whether being overweight needs to be treated or not depends a lot on what it is doing to your health, in terms of blood pressure and total cholesterol.

In another study of twins done in Canada, the twins were fed 1,000 calories a day more than they needed. Each twin was similar to the other twin. But there were large differences between one set of twins and another set of twins. Some gained very little

while others gained a lot, despite being carefully supervised on the same program. For those who are familiar with horses — some were "hay burners" and others were "easy keepers."

Read the details in my discussion of More About Body Weight and Heredity. I'm sending you a free copy. But stick with a sensible diet and good exercise program and your weight will adjust to what your genes intended for you to weigh.

**DEAR DR. LAMB:** I am a 35-year-old male. For some time I have considered taking female hormones. Most of the time I am quite content within the frame of my gender, but at other times I think it would be nice to be female.

My wife has suggested that I take her birth control pills, but I am not one to experiment with medications like that.

If I were to take female hormones, what changes could I expect, and what side effects would there be?

**DEAR READER:** The effects would depend somewhat on what kind of birth control pill your wife uses. She probably uses the combined pill that contains both estrogen and progestin. That would mean you are apt to have a significant decrease in sex drive and could become impotent.

You might expect weight gain, depression and breast swelling. I couldn't recommend that you try this approach.
