## City accepts vehicle bids

Wayne Winget, recently appointed commissioner replacing R. W. "Bud" Eades, was sworn in at the City Commission meeting Monday by Hereford Mayor Wes Fisher.

Winget took his first action as commissioner and voted along with the others to accept a five foot alley easement from Hereford State Bank.

The property had been surveyed recently and it was determined that a five foot strip which had been used for alley purposes for many years had never been officially conveyed to the city.

Commissioner Terry Langehenning abstained from the vote as he was responsible for drawing up the deed to the land.

John Chandler Ford in Amarillo was awarded the bid for four police vehicles. The commissioners accepted John Chandler Ford's low bid of \$31,992.

Whiteface Ford in Hereford bid \$39,754, Stevens Chevrolet in Hereford bid \$42,933.16 and Plains Chevrolet in Amarillo bid \$45,663.

The commissioners awarded Plains Chevrolet in Amarillo, for \$11,816.

.05, the bid for a pickup for the city inspector.

Other bids submitted were from Stevens Chevrolet, Hereford, \$12,351.34; Whiteface Ford, Hereford \$12,979 for a Ford and \$12,192.50 for a Dodge and John Chandler Ford, Amarillo, \$12,448.

In order to proceed with the grant to replace the runway at the Hereford Municipal Airport, the commissioners authorized the mayor to execute the contract between Hereford and the Texas Department of Aviation.

Darwin Mc Gill, Hereford city manager, was authorized to prepare specifications and request for bids on a T-box mower and a greensmower for the park department.

The commissioners went into executive session to consider appointments to the Planning and Zoning Commission. When they reconvened, Gilbert Arellano Jr. was appointed to replace Tony Cortez, whose term had expired, and Harley Daniel was reappointed.

John Stagner, Bartley Dowell and Herb DeLaRosa were all reappointed to the Board of Adjustments.

## AO Thompson buys company

A.O. Thompson Abstract Co. has purchased the assets of Deaf Smith County Abstract Co., Inc. from Joe Reinauer and will combine the two into one firm at the Schroeter Building on the southeast corner of the courthouse square, it was announced Monday by Margaret Thompson Schroeter.

Thompson Abstract is one of the oldest firms in Hereford, having been established in 1906 and purchased by A.O. Thompson in 1929. An early community leader, Thompson was Mrs. Schroeter's father.

After Alex Thompson's death in 1956, Margaret and her late husband, A.J. (Major) Schroeter, ran the business for Mrs. Thompson, then bought it in 1962. Mrs. Schroeter, a 1926 graduate of Hereford High and 1930 graduate of Hardin-Simmons University, worked at the office off

and on before she and her husband took over the business.

Thompson will expand its operations with the purchase of the Deaf Smith County Abstract, which has been located at 304 W. 3rd St. Mrs. Schroeter announced that Carolyn Maupin and Nancy Hollingsworth, longtime DSC Abstract employees, will join the Thompson firm.

Mrs. Mauphin, who worked at DSC Abstract since 1968, said the business was started by James W. Witherspoon in 1930. Elizabeth Womble, who later became Elizabeth Witherspoon, purchased the firm in the 1940s. After 1969 the owners included J.W. Robinson, Tubb & Easterwood law firm and G.W. Payne. A new office was built at 304 W. 3rd under the ownership of Payne in 1978. Reinauer purchased the business in 1980.

## UWDSC gets closer to goal

The United Way of Deaf Smith County has almost reached the halfway point toward its goal of \$125,000 for the 1990-91 campaign, but there's less than three weeks left in the planned drive to reach the goal.

At the weekly report meeting Monday, volunteers reported a total of \$59,590 in pledges and donations. The funds raised will

benefit 12 UWDSC member agencies in 1991.

Making a big jump this week was the Pacesetters division, chaired by Pat Newton. The division has received \$18,331 toward its goal of \$24,000. Most of the divisions are ahead of last year's campaign at the same time.

Only 400 of the 2,489 accounts that could contribute to the

campaign have been reported so far, with 64 new accounts added to the list.

Several volunteers who attended the luncheon, held each week at the Ranch House, received gift certificates from Mr. Burger and Bob's Hickory Pit. Receiving certificates were Newton, Boyd Foster, Mary Edwards, Geneva Summers,

## Bush wants Hussein tried

President Bush has suggested that Saddam Hussein could face a war-crimes trial for atrocities Iraqi forces are said to have committed in Kuwait, and his defense secretary says U.S. troops could be in Saudi Arabia for years.

Also Monday, hundreds of prominent Kuwaiti exiles in Saudi Arabia vowed to return home with the al-Sabah rulers and liberate Kuwait from Iraq.

Since Iraq seized Kuwait on Aug. 2, refugees have reported numerous

cases of brutality, including the torture and killing of suspected resistance fighters.

There also have been reports that babies have been removed from incubators and dialysis patients from their machines so the equipment could be shipped to Baghdad.

"Hitler revisited," Bush said in Dallas.

"But remember, when Hitler's war ended there were the Nuremberg trials, he said. "Every day now, new word filters out about the ghastly atrocities perpetrated by Saddam's forces."

The United States and other countries have massed nearly 300,000 troops in Saudi Arabia and elsewhere in the Persian Gulf region to deter any further aggression, and the United Nations has imposed a land and sea embargo.

The Soviet Union has not joined the multinational force, but has supported its deployment and the embargo.

Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze on Monday told Soviet lawmakers that the Kremlin had no plans "for participation in a military operation."

## Budget, taxes will hurt Texas

WASHINGTON (AP) - There is some sugar in the medicine Texans will swallow to help reduce the federal budget deficit. But not nearly enough.

Texas, the nation's third most populous state, will bear a huge share of the \$500 billion deficit-reduction burden, particularly if the gasoline tax is raised 9 1/2 cents per gallon.

The proposed federal tax increases by 1995 are designed to hit hardest at cigarette, alcohol and gasoline consumption. And, University of North Texas economist Bernard Weinstein notes, "Texans tend to smoke, drink and drive more."

But there is some good news for Texas in the separate tax packages of the House Ways and Means and Senate Finance committees.

Both contain a bigger tax break for the working poor. That will particularly help poor Hispanic families in southern Texas and along the Mexican border, an advocacy group says.

The packages also raise Medicare payments to rural hospitals by gradually eliminating an allowance to urban hospitals.

The plan with the broadest political support, the Senate's, has tax breaks for energy companies when oil begins dipping below \$34 a barrel. Those are designed to stimulate exploration and drilling and should help Texas oil companies.

The government plans to save \$13 billion over five years by cutting back payments to farmers. In recent years, Texas farmers have collected between \$725 million and \$750 million in crop payments. In its broadest form, that total will be cut by 15 percent in 1992 and 1993, 20 percent in 1994 and 25 percent in 1995. The cut will be diminished some by farmers switching to other crops.

### World, National

**WASHINGTON** - If you're a college student, your school may no longer be eligible for certain government-backed loans. If you're a wheat farmer, your federal subsidies will shrink. If you're a veteran, your benefits will be less generous.

**WASHINGTON** - At a recent House Democratic leadership meeting, lawmakers were asked to raise their hands if they were eager to adjourn and hit the campaign trail back home. Nobody did.

**WASHINGTON** - Congressional proponents of the B-2 stealth bomber are breathing easier after the Senate narrowly rejected an attempt to stop production of the radar-evading aircraft.

**BAGHDAD, Iraq** - There is a strange sense of normalcy in Baghdad even as the men and machines of war mass along the Persian Gulf and across the desert in readiness for a showdown with Iraq 11 weeks after its invasion of Kuwait.

**SALT LAKE CITY** - Residents downwind from where open-air nuclear tests were conducted in the 1950s and '60s said they felt vindicated by the government's decision to compensate people who may have gotten cancer from the fallout.

## MH/MR reprimanded in Lubbock case

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - A federal judge verbally reprimanded the state Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation for trying to hide the rape and pregnancy of a profoundly retarded woman at the Lubbock State School.

U.S. District Judge Barefoot Sanders said in his 15-page order Monday that the Department of Mental Health ignored terms of an agreement stemming from a 16-year-old lawsuit over conditions in the state schools for mentally retarded.

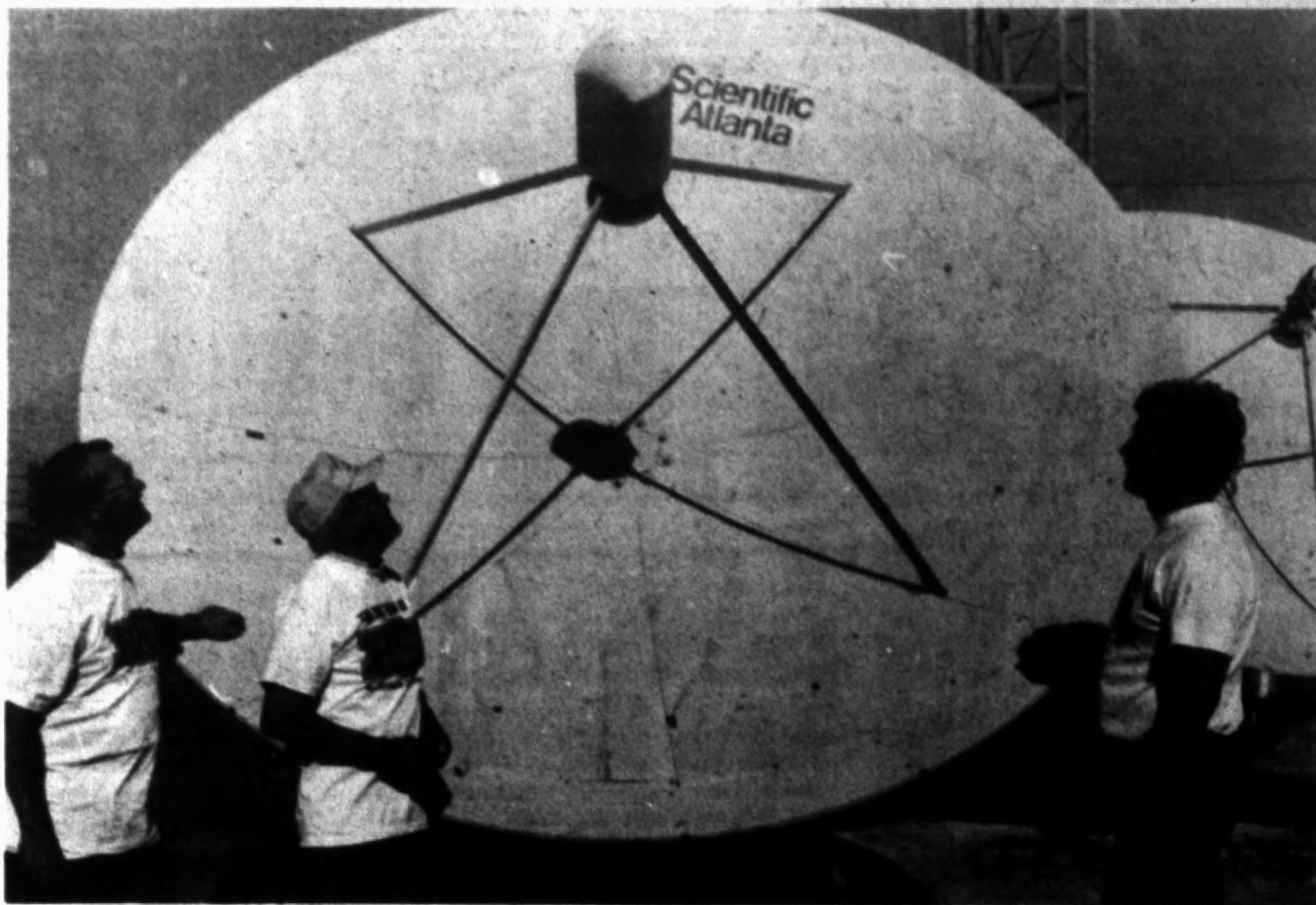
He charged that the state hid the woman's "tragedy" from sociologist Linda O'Neill, who is assigned to oversee the settlement agreement. The judge said he will decide later on the "appropriate remedy" for the

state's violation. Judge Sanders also empowered the victim's attorney to begin his own investigation into the rape and pregnancy.

The 32-year-old Lubbock woman, who has an IQ of 12, does not know how women become pregnant. She is so profoundly mentally retarded that she does not even know she is pregnant.

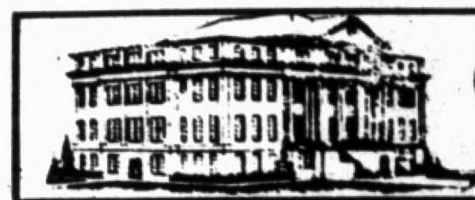
She apparently was raped sometime in late April or May, and is expecting to deliver a child in January. The woman remains in the care of the state school. The victim's sister has filed a writ of habeas corpus, seeking the victim's release from the facility.

A 1989 graduate of Hereford High School, he joined the Marine Corps Reserves in May 1990.

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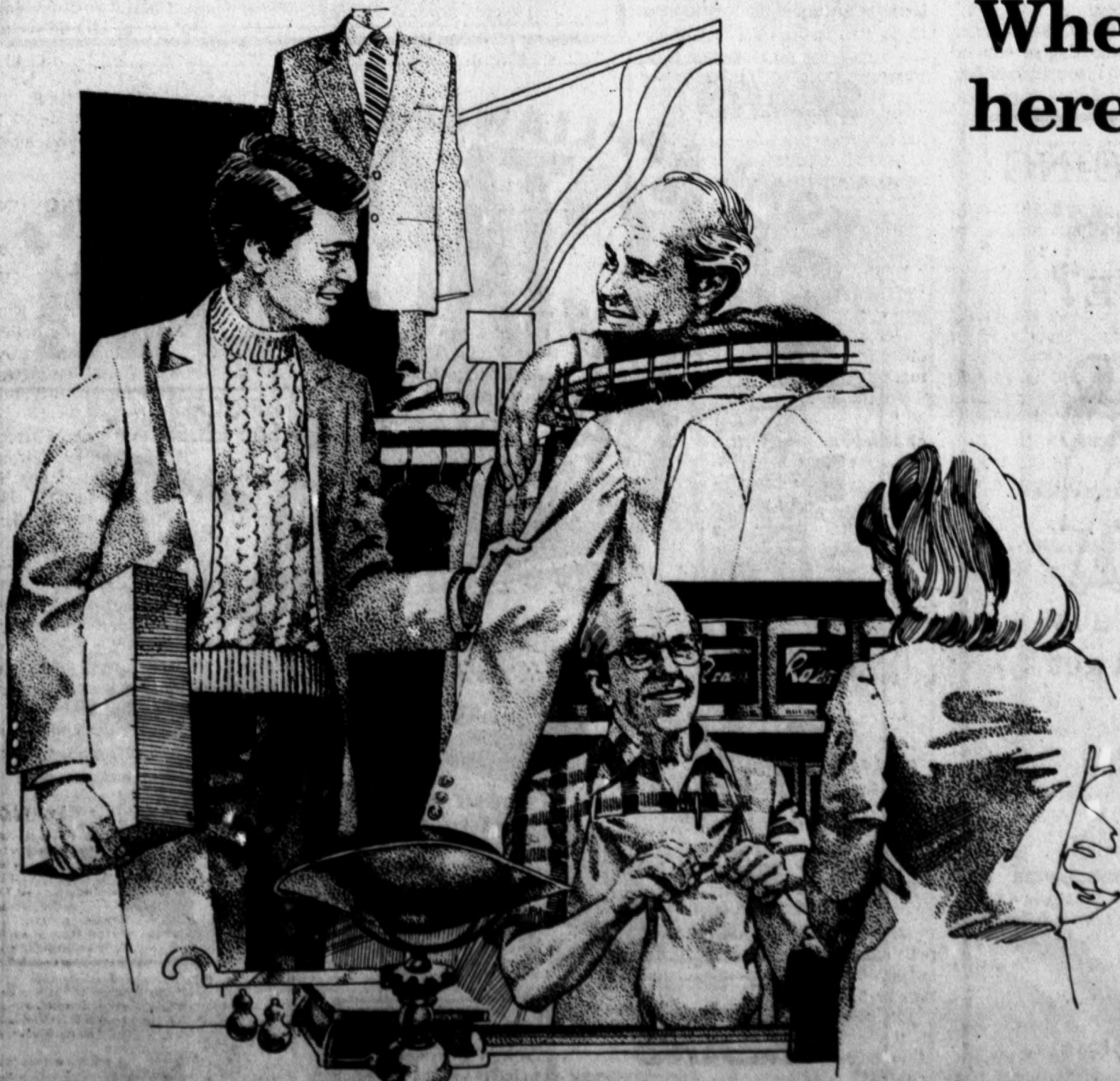

The win gives the Herd a 4-0 record in District 1-4A with one match remaining. The Herd, which has not lost a district match in five years, can clinch another 1-4A title in its final match Saturday at Borger.

"In think it helps us to qualify for regional this early," Coach Luis Zavala said. "This will give us time to work on specific areas before we go to Lubbock. And with seven seniors on the team, we should have a very good chance to do well there."

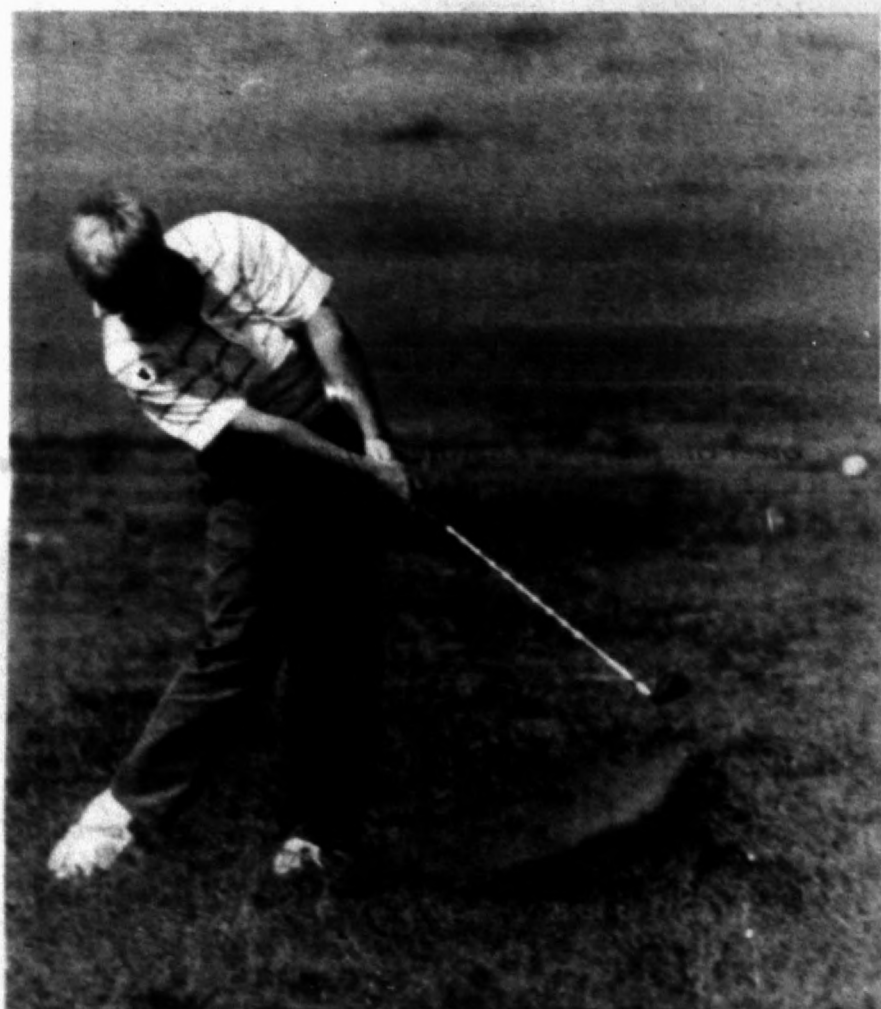

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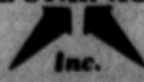
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# Spikers handle Borger

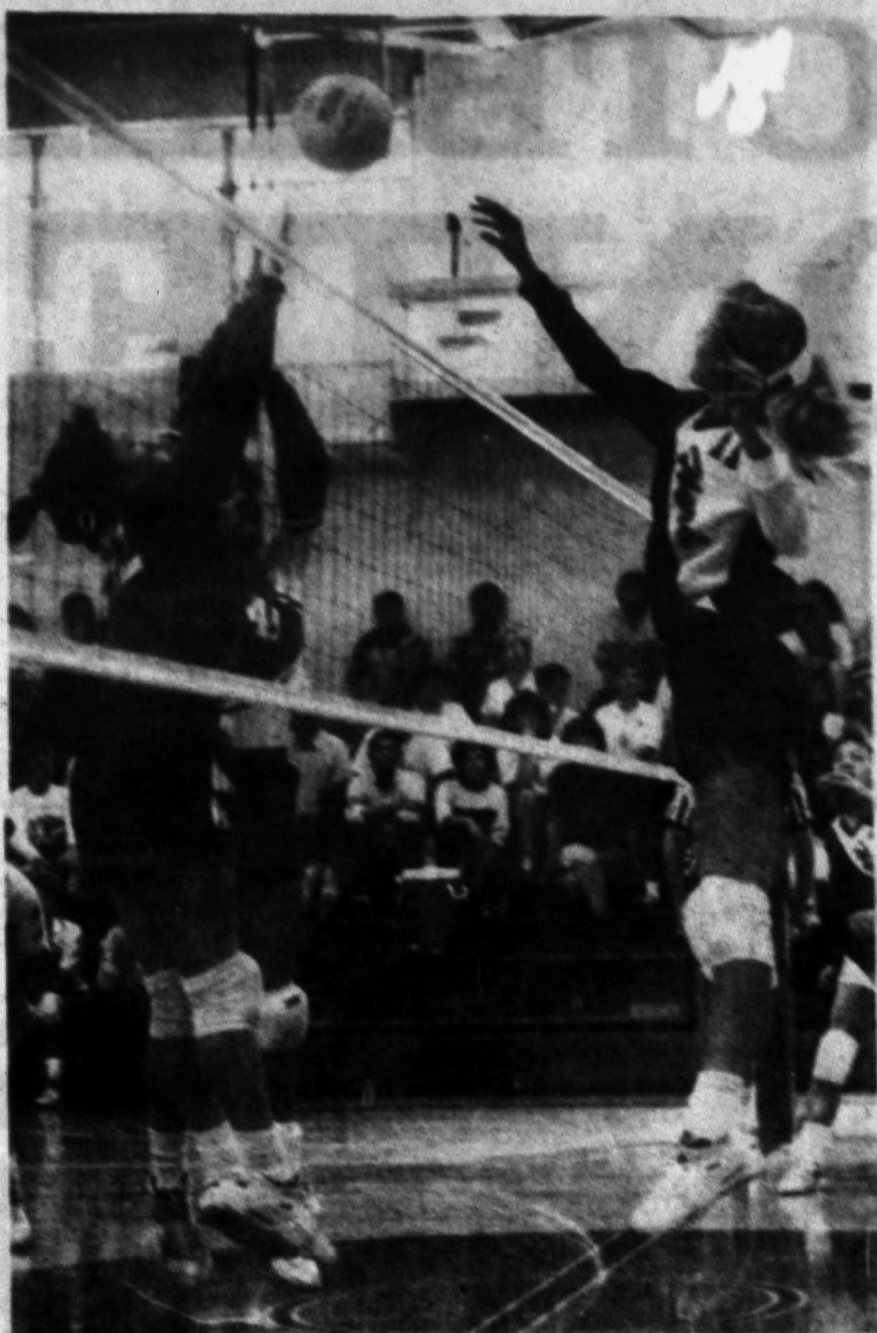

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# Game 1 hurlers go way back together

CINCINNATI (AP) - Dave Stewart and Jose Rijo go way back together.

Tonight, they will also be on the mound for Game 1 of the World Series between Oakland and Cincinnati at Riverfront Stadium.

"I was playing in the Dominican Republic in 1978 when I first met Jose," Stewart said. "He was too young to play, so he had to watch."

Pitching in big games is nothing new for Stewart. He is 5-1 lifetime in the American League playoffs and was the World Series MVP last season when he beat San Francisco twice.

The leaves changing color in October and Stewart pitching in the World Series are quickly becoming synonymous.

"Dave Stewart was one of the best teammates I've had in my short career in baseball," Rijo said. "He was one of the few guys to come to me when I struggled."

The A's haven't struggled too much since Stewart arrived. They have won three straight AL pennants and are trying to become the first team to win consecutive World Series since the 1977-78 New York Yankees.

This time, they will have to do it without sure-handed shortstop Walt Weiss. Weiss, as expected, will miss the World Series with a knee injury. But they do have Stewart for three games, if necessary.

Stewart signed with the A's on May 23, 1986, after being released by the Philadelphia Phillies. Six weeks later, Jackie Moore was fired as manager and Tony La Russa took over.

La Russa's first move as manager was to name Stewart his starting pitcher for a game at Boston against Roger Clemens. It seemed to set the tone for a very successful run.

"With Tony, my first conversation was by telephone when he was still in Florida," Stewart said. "He asked me if I knew who I'd be pitching against and I said, 'That's fine, I'll be ready.'"

Stewart has been ready ever since, too. He has won 20 games in each of the last four seasons, averaging 36 starts and 265 innings a season. Since La Russa asked him to make that start in Boston, Stewart has not missed a turn in the rotation.

Like teammate Dennis Eckersley, Stewart is building a Hall of Fame career after turning 30 and being placed on baseball's scape heap.

"After you win a couple of times, there's a greater determination," said Stewart, who pitched a no-hitter this season against Toronto. "It's a quiet determination, but more intense."

It's a feeling, a look, that can only be seen in Stewart's eyes when he's throwing the ball. A look, like his pitches, that Rijo hasn't quite mastered.

When Stewart is on, forget the left-handers, right-handers matchup stats. They mean nothing. But when he's occasionally off, Cecil Fielder will hit a home run out of Tiger Stadium.

"Several things have taken place since I've come to Oakland, and that's part of it," Stewart said. "My job is to go out every fourth or fifth day, and I've learned to be intense for each ballgame. I need to go out and get hitters out. As a pitcher, I concentrate, stay focused and think in key situations."

With Stewart, 27-game winner Bob Welch and Mike Moore, the A's have the edge in starting pitching over Rijo, Danny Jackson and Tom Browning. But this is a series that could very well be decided by the Nasty Boys - relievers Rob Dibble, Randy Myers and Norm Charlton.

"Oakland has a great closer in Dennis Eckersley and three great set-up men in (Todd) Burns, (Gene) Nelson and (Rick) Honeycutt," said Reds manager Lou Piniella, a high school rival of La Russa's. "We have three closers. I think they compare favorably. Our's is more of a power bullpen."

The Pittsburgh Pirates were powerless against the Nasty Boys, scoring one earned run in 15 2-3 innings. But to get to the bullpen, Rijo and friends will have to give Piniella five or six quality innings.

Rijo is still more of a thrower than a thinker. The A's, needing some left-handed power, traded him to the Reds along with pitcher Tim Lincecum before the start of the 1988 season for Dave Parker.

"I asked to be traded," Rijo said. "It worked out for both teams. Parker helped them win two pennants and I got a chance to pitch. Everybody was happy."

As Rijo's teammate for a short time, Stewart thought the right-hander might have been getting some bad advice.

"When he was with us, I saw a guy who was influenced by Joaquin Andujar, and it caused some problems," Stewart said. "But that was then and this is now. He's doing an outstanding job."

After years of unfulfilled promise, Rijo set career highs in victories (14), games started (29), innings pitched (197) and strikeouts (152) this season.

# Victory has Dykes pinching pennies

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - A penny saved is a season saved.

At least Spike Dykes hopes so. Dykes scooped up a penny after Saturday's 49-44 upset of Arkansas and isn't about to let go of it.

"When I was walking off the field at Fayetteville, I found a penny at the goal line. Nothing bad can happen from picking up a penny. I'm superstitious," Dykes said. "There is no telling what might happen to this team now."

Dykes said he will tuck the penny into his left shoe when the Red Raiders play at Rice Saturday.

A two-touchdown underdog heading into last Saturday's Southwest Conference game against Arkansas, Texas Tech used a relentless offensive attack to fend off the Razorbacks and improve to 2-4 overall and 1-3 in the SWC.

Trailing 49-20 in the fourth quarter, Arkansas (2-3, 0-2) scored 24 points and threatened to score a go-ahead touchdown. But a last-minute drive stalled at the Tech 15 after Quinn Groves threw an incompleteness on fourth down.

"All season long I have been saying the good teams figure out a way to win," Dykes said Monday. "We finally did it."

But Dykes said his team has no time to celebrate with a road game against pesky Rice (2-4, 0-3) looming.

"Rice is dangerous," Dykes said. "Houston beat us 51-35 and Houston beat Rice 24-22 on a last-second field goal. That will scare you. They have got a heckuva football team."

Tech barely escaped with a 38-36 victory over the Owls when the teams last met in Houston in 1988. Tech beat Rice 41-25 in Lubbock last year.

"Rice has always considered Tech one of the teams they have a good shot at beating," Dykes said. "They ought to have their ax real good and sharp for us Saturday."

Rice has conference losses to Houston, Texas (26-10) and Texas Christian (38-28).

Tech's defense, which is last in the SWC, giving up 430 yards a game, must contain Rice quarterback Donald Hollas and running back Trevor Cobb.

Hollas is averaging 226 yards of total offense a game, and Cobb is second among SWC rushers with 105 yards per game.

"Our defense is not playing up to expectations," Dykes said. "We have given up a number of big plays and we can not afford to do that against Rice."

Jamie Gill, who made his first start since injuring his kneecap Sept. 22 against New Mexico, completed 15 of 18 passes for 337 yards and three touchdowns without an interception against Arkansas.

"I don't know if I have ever seen a quarterback play as well as Jamie did," Dykes said. "He had great blocking the whole game and made good things happen."

After watching his team rack up 582 yards of total offense against the Hogs, Dykes said his young offensive line, which doesn't have any returning starters from last year, has come of age.

"Those guys have really come a long way," Dykes said. "We played one of the best offensive games ever played at Texas Tech."

Tech's Anthony Lynn led all rushers with 116 yards, his third 100-yard performance so far.

Dykes said defensive back Sammy Walker and wide receiver Lloyd Hill, both the victim of a sprained ankle, are questionable this week.

Dykes said he will continue to rotate Gill and freshman redshirt quarterback Robert Hall, who was 6-for-12 for 91 yards with one interception.

## Vision disorders increase with age

As people age, they are at increased risk for common, and sometimes serious, vision conditions. Most adults are unaware of two pervasive conditions: presbyopia and dry eye.

This information gap is striking because millions of baby boomers are at risk for, or already experiencing, these age-related conditions.

Millions of baby boomers now need bifocal vision correction—many for the first time. The reason is presbyopia, also known as "aging eyes" or the "short-arm syndrome." Presbyopia, which inevitably appears at around age 40, is caused when the eye loses the ability to switch focus between near and distant objects.

Presbyopia does not cause blindness, but it does effect daily activities, such as driving, typing, reading, or ordering from a menu.

Though an estimated 75 million adults now have presbyopia, most Americans do not understand the reason for their changing vision. Nearly 177 million people—97 percent adults—are unfamiliar with presbyopia.

Although study respondents were overwhelming uninformed about presbyopia, millions of them appear to have been diagnosed for presbyopia. Ironically, these respondents report wearing bifocal contact lenses or eye glasses—the most common correction methods for the condition.

"Adults must become more aware of presbyopia, because everyone will experience 'aging eye' changes," says Curtin Kelley, M.D., member of The Bausch & Lomb InVision Institute and associate professor at The Ohio State University. "It's important that adults age 40 and over have an annual eye exam because presbyopia symptoms appear gradually. Patients

may not recognize a subtle vision change, or may attribute the symptoms to other eye problems," Dr. Kelley adds.

Early detection and prevention are critical to the health of aging eyes and experts recommend annual eye exams for adults entering their 50s. Dry eye, a common condition which is easily detected and treated, is signaled by an itchy, burning sensation, the feeling of having sand in the eyes.

Dry eye occurs when the eye loses the ability to lubricate itself, and it can inhibit visual performance. A projected 33 million adults may be undiagnosed but at risk for dry eye. And, a projected 15 million of them are over age 50—the population at highest risk for the condition.

Dry eye is easily treated with over-the-counter artificial tears. However, a study found the majority of people at risk for dry eye do not regularly use eye drops. And, many of those who report using eye drops, incorrectly rely on decongestant eye drops to remove redness, aggravating the condition.

RADNOR, Pa. (AP) — William Conrad of "Jake and the Fatman" says the change of venue for the CBS show has him at odds with its producer, Dean Hargrove.

"He loves shows that I don't. I look for human emotions, human involvement," Conrad said in the Oct. 20 issue of TV Guide. "I don't like car chases. I don't like gunfights. I don't like fights that are unnecessary."

Conrad predicted the show will be more violent because of Hargrove's decision to move the show's setting from Hawaii to Los Angeles for the third year of the series.
