Clinton administration eyes deals to salvage free trade agreement

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Clinton is conducting his own version of "Let's Make a Deal" in an attempt to rescue the free trade agreement with Mexico and Canada, but opponents contend his efforts are too little and too late to save the pact.

The administration, heeding demands from unhappy lawmakers, has trotted out proposals to help sugar, citrus and vegetable growers and manufacturers of everything from brooms and plate glass to appliances.

But opponents said the flurry of deal-making was coming too late. They claimed they still had the votes to defeat the proposed North American Free Trade Agreement, which would create the world's largest free trade zone linking the United States, Mexico and Canada.

"The administration is so desperate to get votes that it is not clear what they may be willing to give away," said Lori Wallach, with the Citizens Trade Coalition, an umbrella group of NAFTA opponents. "But nothing they have done so far will deliver any significant

votes." Clinton gave a far different assessment when he summoned congressional leaders to the White House on Wednesday for the send-off of the legislation, saying, "We don't have the votes today, but I think we are getting there."

In an effort to meet various objections, U.S. negotiators bargained with Mexico until 4 a.m. Wednesday on new side deals.

U.S. Trade Representative Mickey Kantor proclaimed the negotiations a success and said Mexico had: - Pledged in a side letter not to switch to corn syrup sweeteners for soft drinks. Sugar producers in the United States had feared Mexico would use this back-door approach to free up sugar for export to the United States.

- Accepted a U.S. proposal that exports of citrus and vegetables be subject to higher tariffs if either the shipments of those products suddenly surge or the price changes dramatically. Previously, NAFTA would have allowed reimposition of higher tariffs

to protect against sudden increases in the volume of shipments but would not have been triggered by price changes.

- Agreed to begin negotiations as soon as NAFTA goes into effect on a quicker reduction in Mexican tariffs than the agreement currently stipulates for flat glass, used primarily in autos, wine bottles and small appliances. U.S. producers had complained that American tariffs on these products were being reduced much more quickly than Mexican tariffs.

Under the rules by which Congress is considering NAFTA, the implementing legislation cannot be amended now that it has been submitted by the president.

The administration's efforts to craft implementing legislation that would win over the opposition met with mixed reviews. Sugar, citrus and flat glass interests voiced approval but Florida vegetable growers said they were still opposed.

Mexican beet agreement not sure, Combest says

WASHINGTON--U.S. Rep. Larry Combest (R-Texas) cautiously welcomed reports Wednesday that Mexico has given assurance to sugar beet growers regarding the North American Free Trade Agreement.

Congressman Combest cautioned that whatever assurances the Mexican government may have made on sugar beets will require close scrutiny.

Before making a decision on NAFTA, Combest said he wants to continue to address its impact on stemming illegal immigration from Mexico, as well as the 19th Congress-

sional District's many economic concerns.

"I am pleased, but sugar beet concerns are not yet signed, sealed and delivered. Questions remain unanswered and I intend to cast the 19th District's vote based on facts," Combest said.

More than half of Texas sugar beets are produced in the 19th District. The region's sugar beet producers asked Combest to address their concerns that Mexico would swap cheaper corn sweeteners for

domestic use and then export their surplus to compete with U.S. production.

Bill Cleavenger, Texas Sugar Beet Growers Association president, echoed Combest's caution regarding word of Mexico's response to critical sugar beet concerns.

"We have learned over the last six months that until you see it in writing and it is signed, then you cannot depend on anything because this is not the first time we have been through this," said Cleavenger.

16-year-old opposes assistant Student suing high school to remain sole drum major

SANTA ROSA, Texas (AP) - The Santa Rosa Warriors have only one regular season football game left.

But Iris Rodriguez says her legal battle to be the high school's lone drum major will go on.

"I'm just going to follow the advice of my lawyer. Because we already started, and we can't stop now," the 16-year-old junior says.

In an unsuccessful request for a temporary court order, she contended that Principal Andres Contreras broke the school's criteria for picking the drum major. She says she won a tryout in April, but then Contreras

allowed another girl to work with her as assistant drum major.

"If attorneys keep saying there's no such thing as a frivolous lawsuit, look at this one," said Bill Summers, president of Citizens Against Lawsuit Abuse, a business-backed organization.

"The people who pay the school taxes ought to be mad as hell to have to pay to fight litigation such as this," Summers said.

But Ms. Rodriguez's attorney, Larry Warner, said his case would be frivolous only if it were not based in fact.

"Sixteen year olds have rights, too," Warner said. "The fairness of the government is judged by how it treats the least of us."

"We are not talking about one person arguing with another over five bucks. We are not talking about a lollypop. We are not talking about an ice cream cone. That's what I would consider frivolous."

Warner said being the lone drum major might help his client win a college scholarship.

A.E. Garcia, superintendent of the 1,100-student district in the South Texas town, said Ms. Rodriguez never was told she would be the only drum major.

"I find it amazing," Garcia said. The school has had assistant drum majors in the past, he said.

He added that Ms. Rodriguez didn't appear at a school board meeting to hear her grievances in early September.

"The board wanted to listen to her, but she didn't show up," Garcia said.

Ms. Rodriguez did show up for a TV talk show.

She and Warner appeared Tuesday on the Fox network's "Mo Show," hosted by comedienne Mo'Nique. The episode, featuring oddball lawsuits, aired only in Chicago and New York markets.

Warner argues that the school deprived his client of property and liberty without giving notice or

allowing her an opportunity to be heard, as he said was required under the equal protection amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

At a hearing on Sept. 13 in Brownsville, Warner alleged favoritism by presenting testimony that the assistant drum major, Melissa Salinas, was dating the principal's son. District Judge Rogelio Valdez dismissed Warner's request for a temporary restraining order.

Principal Contreras referred questions to the superintendent. Members of the Salinas family politely declined interview requests, saying they didn't want to join a public debate.

Despite the controversy, Garcia was hopeful the football season wouldn't end with the home match against Riviera on Friday.

"If we win, we go to the playoffs," the superintendent said.

Subcontractor indicted on 13 counts

Firm, employees accused of bilking space agency

HOUSTON (AP) - A NASA subcontractor and seven of its employees have been indicted for bilking the space agency and federal government out of more than \$5 million.

The 13-count indictment, announced Wednesday by the NASA Office of Inspector General, accused Houston-based Omniplan Corp. and some of its executives of money laundering, false claims, mail fraud, embezzlement, theft from the employees' benefit plan, obstruction of a federal audit, contempt of court, false statements, false claims, conspiracy and theft.

The indictment, handed down Tuesday by a federal grand jury in Houston, also named Omniplan Chief Executive Officer Ralph Montijo Jr., his wife, President Guillermina P. Montijo; Joyce Martin, administrative assistant; Phyllis Thompson, bookkeeper of Mercury Trust; Nancy Montgomery, trustee of Mercury Trust; Thomas M. Brown, president

of Benefit Administration Service; and Donald Meede, former vice president of Omniplan.

"The indictment alleges that Ralph Montijo and Joyce Martin made false claims to NASA in the approximate amount of \$4 million and diverted an additional \$1 million from federal programs," Bill Colvin, NASA inspector general, said.

The indictment also accuses Montijo of stealing more than \$255,000 from the Omniplan employee benefit plan.

The company, with offices near Johnson Space Center, had a contract to provide technical information and support services at the center during the 1980s. From 1986 until April 30, 1993, Omniplan had two NASA subcontracts with Rockwell Space Operations Co. to create graphic designs and to provide support services for Rockwell and NASA on the space shuttle program.

Those named in the indictments were to appear Nov. 10 before a

federal magistrate, Richard B. Kuniansky, Omniplan attorney said.

"Omniplan vigorously denies that any improper costs were passed on to NASA, and if they were, it was after obtaining legal advice from a large and well respected civil law firm that it was proper to pass on such costs," Kuniansky said.

"Let me assure you, they (the government) have bitten off more than they can chew in this case."

He said while the company had not filed for bankruptcy, "operations are at a virtual standstill." Telephone calls to its offices Wednesday were answered with a recording indicating the number had been disconnected.

"Basically, Omniplan was put out of business without merits," Kuniansky said. "I'm blasting the government for what we contend is an ill-founded prosecution."

Montijo, reached at his home, referred all comments to Kuniansky.

According to the indictment, Omniplan over 12 years submitted

invoices that were inflated and included inflated costs, submitted fraudulent invoices and set up companies that were used to lease property and equipment from Omniplan.

The indictment also alleges that Montijo fraudulently moved money from NASA contracts into Mercury Trust, a company he owned and tried to keep secret from government auditors.

Other companies involved in the alleged conspiracy were Texas and Arizona pizza shops known as Papa Primo's, owned by Montijo.

In addition, the indictment alleges two other companies, Space Industries Leasing and Space Industries Properties, were set up to launder money taken from Omniplan's NASA contracts.

Colvin said conviction on the charges could force Montijo to forfeit assets valued at more than \$2.3 million.

Republicans claim Richards reneges

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas Republicans are accusing Gov. Ann Richards, a Democrat, of reversing field on the issue of school vouchers.

In her 1990 campaign for governor, Richards said she opposed using state funds to send students to private schools.

On Wednesday, Richards said she is open to consideration of a pilot project for just that.

Karen Hughes, executive director of the state GOP, called the change "an extraordinary flip-flop."

"The governor's education policies have clearly been a failure

and she is becoming concerned that it could cost her her job," she said.

But Chuck McDonald, a spokesman for Richards, said the governor's comments about vouchers did not represent a reversal of policy.

Republicans, he said, "have their game face on. The election is a year away."

The flurry over vouchers started when Richards spoke to the Texas Association of Taxpayers.

There she said she was interested in a voucher pilot project that was pushed earlier this year by state Rep. Hugo Berlanga, D-Corpus Christi.

But after her comments to the TAT, Richards said she did not want to send state dollars to private or parochial schools, and declined to talk about details of the program.

"I wasn't laying out a full proposal this morning," Richards said. She advised reporters to ask Berlanga about his plan.

Berlanga said the plan called for a pilot project in which state funds would be used to help poor and disadvantaged students attend private schools.

"All we're asking for is an opportunity to see if it works," Berlanga said. "We have tried everything else. We need to give this one a chance."

Later in the day, Richards accused the news media of making a big deal about nothing.

"If we can use vouchers as a tool to improve the quality of the public schools in a very limited way and prove that it works, I'm very happy to do that," she said. "My mind is completely open on the subject."

State Rep. Kent Grusendorf, R-Arlington, said that Richards' stand is a far cry from the last legislative session.

"She single-handedly killed a pilot program during the last session. We had the votes in the House and Senate to pass it," the lawmaker said.

McDonald said Richards was against the proposal then because she was concerned about passing a school finance bill.

"Malarkey," said Grusendorf. "They either like the concept or they don't. This really smells like a flip-flop for election purposes."

George W. Bush, who is expected to seek the Republican nomination to challenge Richards, has been telling supporters that he favors a pilot program for vouchers, according to published reports.

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Settlement reached in fuel tank lawsuit

MARSHALL, Texas (AP) - Thousands of Texas truck owners will receive a voucher worth \$1,000 in a settlement with General Motors concerning side-mounted fuel tanks.

Under the settlement, Texas owners of 645,000 Model CK light-duty trucks built between 1973 and 1987 with side-mounted tanks will each receive a voucher toward the purchase of a new GM pickup.

Judge Bonnie Leggat, in a statement issued late Tuesday, called the settlement "fair and reasonable in my opinion." The judge in Harrison County also granted plaintiffs' attorneys their requested \$9.5 million in fees and expenses.

"I am extremely pleased with the judgment. It was great," plaintiffs attorney Sam Baxter said Wednesday.

"There was no evidence that the settlement was anything other than reasonable, and no credible testimony presented that the trucks could be repaired."

Owners may either apply the voucher to any other dealer's incentives for the purchase of a new truck, sell the certificate or trade it in along with their Model CK pickup on a used truck.

The lawsuit, first filed in 1992 on

behalf of Marshall policemen Tommy Dollar, became a class action for every Texas owner of a GM truck. A similar lawsuit, filed in U.S. District Court in Philadelphia, will affect GM truck owners in the other 49 states.

U.S. District Judge John Yohn has not yet issued his opinion.

The settlement was reached July 19. Each truck owner had three months to comment before the fairness hearing held Oct. 27. Only 1 percent of Texas truck owners objected to or opted out of the final settlement.

Plaintiff's lawyers would have had trouble proving GM pickup trucks were less safe than Ford or Dodge trucks of the same manufacturing period with fuel tanks mounted inside the frames.

Statistics compiled by the federal government's fatal accident reporting system indicated that GM, Ford and Dodge trucks have roughly the same number of fatalities in side-impact crashes.

A settlement will not absolve GM from liability if a 1973-87 truck is involved in an accident. Nor will the settlement have any effect on current consideration by National Highway Traffic Safety Administration to recall the vehicles.

Check your risk for having diabetes

Each year, the number of Texans who have diabetes increases, yet half are unaware that they have this disease.

"November is National Diabetes Month, the perfect time for people in high-risk categories to get a diabetes check-up with their physician," said Dr. Mary Kenney Bielamowicz, a registered dietitian and nutritionist specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "If left untreated, this disease can lead to blindness, heart disease, kidney disease, limb amputations and even death."

Awareness of this debilitating disease is a key to treating it, and this is a good month to learn about it, said Bielamowicz, professor in human nutrition at Texas A&M University.

Statistics from the center for Disease Control and the American Diabetes Association reveal that:

-More than 14 million Americans have diabetes.

-Mexican Americans are three to five times more likely to develop diabetes than Anglos, and Blacks experience a 33 percent higher rate of diabetes than Anglos.

-More than 700,000 cases of diabetes are diagnosed each year nationally.

-At least 150,000 persons die each year due to diabetes and its complications.

-830,000 Texans have diabetes—one in 14 adults in the general population and one in nine adults in the Hispanic population. Half of these have not yet been diagnosed.

-About 90 percent of the people with diabetes develop the disease in adult hood and are not insulin-dependent. However, their disease can lead to as many complications as insulin-dependent diabetes.

"Most people with diabetes have non-insulin diabetes mellitus or type II, Bielamowicz said. "The pancreas produces some insulin, but the body is unable to use it properly, which causes glucose to build up in the blood, leading to the high blood-glucose or blood sugar levels that are characteristics of untreated diabetes."

Type II diabetes usually occurs in adults 35 or older, she said. Symptoms are blurred vision, excessive tiredness, weight gain or loss and wounds or scratches that will not heal properly, she said. In most cases, symptoms can be controlled by weight loss, good diet and exercise.

Fewer people have insulin-dependent diabetes mellitus or type I diabetes, which usually occurs in early childhood. The pancreas does not produce enough insulin to meet the body's needs, and insulin injections allow the body to use glucose with the body produces from foods for energy. However, the type of insulin taken must be balanced with food and activity.

"Symptoms in children include extreme thirst, fatigue, frequent urination, nausea and vomiting," according to Bielamowicz. "Under these conditions, a child can go into a coma, if not diagnosed and treated soon enough."

Since the body produces glucose from food eating right is the first step in controlling diabetes, Bielamowicz said.

"Because the majority of people with non-insulin diabetes are overweight, most are advised to lose extra pounds," she said. "Even slight weight losses have dramatically improved blood-glucose levels by helping the body use its own insulin more efficiently."

People without diabetes stand a greater chance of developing the disease if they are overweight, according to the Texas affiliate of the American Diabetes Association. On the other hand, people with diabetes who are overweight may be able to improve their diabetes control, prevent or delay complications—even increase life expectancy—if they lose weight.

"It doesn't matter whether your diabetes is insulin-dependent or non-insulin-dependent," Bielamowicz said. "The important thing is that you check with a physician, dietitian, nurse or certified diabetes educator who can help you understand and practice such self-care as glucose monitoring, nutritional management and exercise to improve your quality of life."

Herd concentrates on beating Dumas

The Hereford football team has a chance to make the playoffs, although a slim one. Pampa has to beat Randall; Caprock has to beat Borger; and Hereford has to beat Dumas.

Hereford coach Danny Haney said his team can only worry about one-third of the equation.

"The thing we've got to do--and this is what I've talked to the players about--we've got to take care of our end of it; we can't worry about that other deal," Haney said. "If we don't beat Dumas, it doesn't matter."

Hereford is 2-2 in District 1-4A and 3-6 overall. Dumas is 1-3 in district, 2-7 overall. They meet at 7:30 p.m. Friday in Whiteface Stadium in what is likely the last game of the season for both.

"Dumas comes in with a great defense, but they're a little suspect on offense," Haney said. "They're a lot like us: they've had some misfortune and lost some close games that put them out of this race."

Their district losses include an 18-11 loss to Pampa and a 20-15 loss to Borger. Randall beat them 29-0.

Last year's Demons had a strong offense and a weak defense. They've turned that around after graduating most of their offensive skill players. Fortunately for the Demon defense, all-district linebacker Alfredo Medrano didn't graduate.

"Defensively, they're big, and they've got a great linebacker in

Alfredo Medrano," Haney said. "and they play extremely hard. They come at you."

"Everybody's had a hard time running against them," he said. "We've got to throw the ball, keep them off-balance up on the front to open it up for us for the running game."

Dumas' offense has struggled. "They just haven't been able to sustain anything--penalties and turnovers have hurt them more than anything," Haney said. "We've got to have a good defensive game from us. We can't let them have long, ball-control drives. We're going to have to have the ball quite a few times to get the ball in the end zone, I feel, because they're that good on defense."

Injury report: None.

Players of the Week: Robert Jimenez was moved to defensive tackle from linebacker a few weeks ago, and apparently has found his home. He had 14 tackles against Caprock, and was named the defensive player of the week.

Offensive guard Chris Williams got the honor on offense for grading out at 95 percent.

For the sub-varsity teams, the players of the week were: linebacker George Cox for the junior varsity; strong safety Steven Wright for the sophomore team; and linebacker

Adam Jimenez and receiver C.J. Kubacak for the freshmen teams.

If Caprock were to beat Borger, thus helping Hereford into the playoffs, it would be a major upset. Borger is favored at home by 26 points by the Pigskin Prep rating service.

Furthermore, events this week in Pampa might make it difficult for Pampa to win at Randall. Nine Pampa High School students, all reportedly football players, were arrested for setting fire to a wrecked car on the PHS campus. All nine pleaded guilty to unlawful burning of junk inside the City of Pampa; each was fined \$250 and ordered to serve 100 hours of community service.

Two of the players have been suspended for Friday's game, but Pampa officials have not named which ones.

The names of five of the nine were released, and they include the entire starting offensive backfield: quarterback Tony Cavalier, tailback Greg Moore and fullback Matt Garvin. Justin Smith and Jeff McCormick were the other names released; the names of four juveniles were not released.

Hereford's sub-varsity teams will play their last games today. The ninth grade A team will host Tascosa at 6 p.m. in Whiteface Stadium in the only game to be played in Hereford.

The junior varsity goes to Dumas

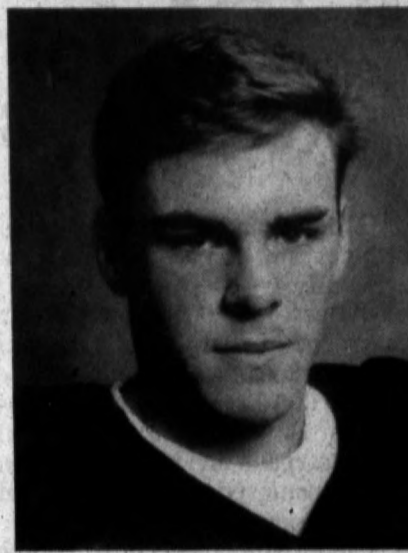
for a 7:30 game, while ninth grade B team will play at 5:30 in Dumas. The sophomores will play Springlake-Earth at 5:30 in Springlake.

The Pampa-Randall was called even, but that doesn't take into account Pampa's problems this week.

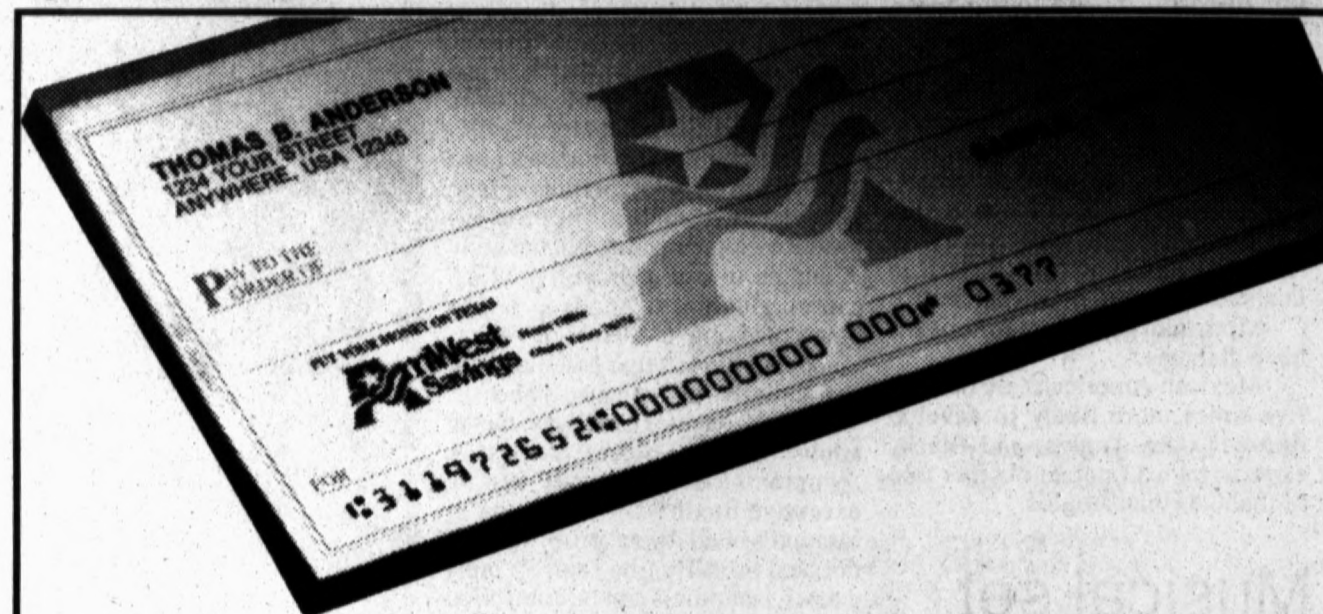

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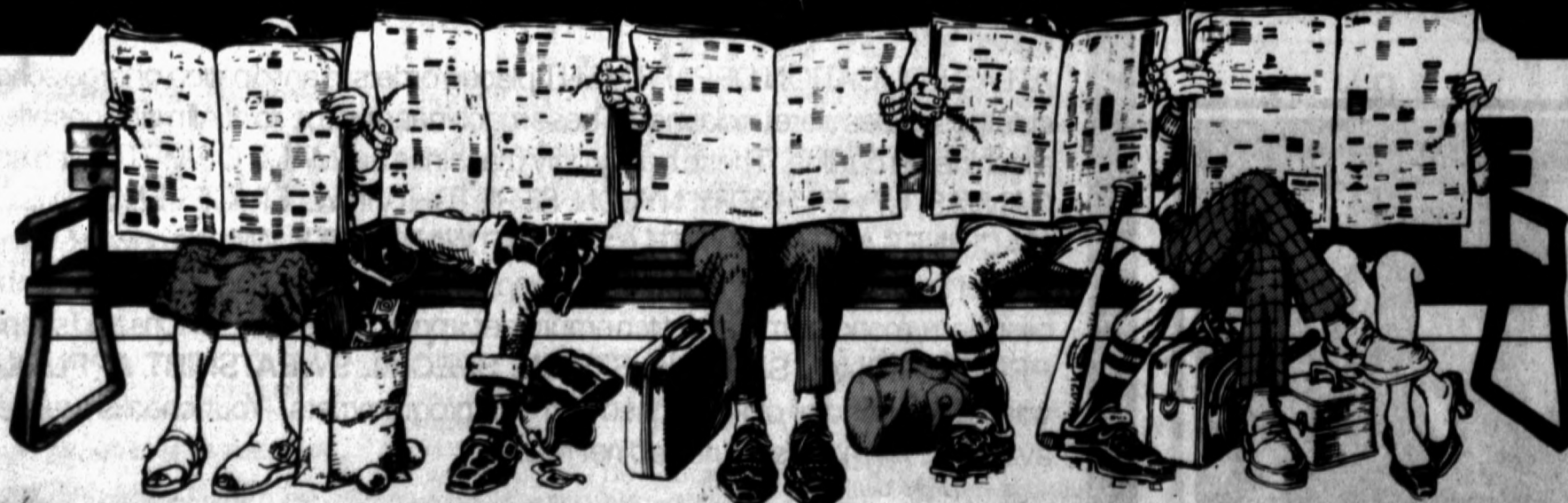


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Maddux picks up 2nd straight Cy Young award

ATLANTA (AP) - Greg Maddux says winning his second straight NL Cy Young Award helps ease the sting of missing the World Series.

Maddux was 20-10 with a major league-leading 2.36 ERA in his first season with the NL West champion Atlanta Braves. He won the 1992 Cy Young with the Chicago Cubs.

On Wednesday, he became the first pitcher to win the award in consecutive years with different teams.

"Not too many of us have an opportunity to win two, and that means a lot to me personally," he said. "You change teams and you want to make a good first impression.

I feel like I've done that. And now I want to have a chance to pitch in a World Series."

Maddux said he became a free agent after his 20-11, 2.18 ERA Cy Young year in Chicago because "I just felt I had a better chance to get into a World Series if I changed teams."

The Braves signed him to a five-year, \$28 million contract and made him the No. 1 starter in a rotation that includes 1991 Cy Young winner Tom Glavine, who finished third in the voting for the 1993 award.

"I didn't really pitch this year to win another Cy Young," Maddux said from his home in Las Vegas.

"The main goal of everyone on the Braves was to get to the World Series, and this time win it. But we came up short."

Maddux, just 7-8 a week before the All-Star break, won 13 of his last 15 decisions in leading the Braves' surge to their third straight NL West championship. The right-hander made 36 starts and pitched 267 innings, led the league with eight complete games and was third with 197 strikeouts.

Maddux won his first start of the playoffs against Philadelphia, but lost Game 6 when the Phillies clinched the pennant. Maddux gave up five earned runs in 5 2-3 innings in that loss. He was hit in the right leg by a

line drive in the first inning and never got into a groove.

Maddux received 22 of the 28 first-place votes in balloting by the Baseball Writers Association of America. He easily outdistanced San Francisco's Bill Swift and John Burkett and Glavine - all with more victories but higher ERAs.

Maddux, 27, is the top winner in the majors in the last six seasons with 107 victories. He has won three straight Gold Gloves and has been one of the best-hitting pitchers in baseball.

Maddux finished with 119 points in the voting. Swift, who was 21-8

with a 2.82 ERA, got two first-place votes and was second with 61 points.

Glavine, who won the Cy Young in 1991 and was runner-up in 1992, was 22-6 with a 3.20 ERA. He got four first-place votes and had 49 points.

Burkett, 22-7 with a 3.65 ERA, got nine points. Jose Rijo of Cincinnati was fifth.

Maddux earned a \$250,000 bonus for winning the award on top of his \$5 million salary, and now gets a \$500,000 bonus if he wins it again during the remaining four years of the

contract. Glavine received a \$75,000 bonus for finishing third and Mark Portugal got \$50,000 for his sixth-place tie.

No pitcher was named on all 28 ballots. Jack McDowell won the AL's Cy Young winner Tuesday and was the only pitcher listed on every ballot.

Sandy Koufax was the only other National League winner in the honor in successive seasons. Koufax won the award in 1965 and 1966 with the Los Angeles Dodgers, when only one Cy Young was presented. Koufax also won in 1963.

Haley: Pokes need to toughen up vs. run

IRVING, Texas (AP) - What the New York Giants need to understand is that Charles Haley is angry.

Forget coach Jimmy Johnson being annoyed with the Dallas run defense. What gets the attention of the Cowboys faster is the ramblings of Sir Charles.

And when Haley, a dominating defensive end, is upset, his teammates listen. Haley's hot about other teams running the ball on the defending Super Bowl champions, who led the NFL in defense last year.

"It's upsetting to me when teams

take the ball and run it into the gut of your defense," Haley said. "In fact, it's alarming. Everybody's doing it. Until we put out the fire, we can expect every team to try it."

The Philadelphia Eagles ran for 139 yards in losing to the Cowboys. Now, the New York Giants come to Texas Stadium on Sunday with the best power-running attack in the league aimed first place in the NFC East up for grabs.

"Looking at Danny Reeves' offense, it reminds me of the Giants under Bill Parcells," Bill Bates said.

"It's the offense that took them to the Super Bowl.

"They run at you and we know they'll try it. It's important for us to stop them on first and second downs so we can get them into third and long."

Bates said Haley's frustration was understandable.

"We keep giving up long runs and that's got to stop," Bates said. "I know this, New York will be jacked up to play. We'd better get fired up, too."

Defensive coordinator Butch Davis

knows the heat is on.

"We're taking a long look at what's happening, to see if it's the scheme or if it's individuals," Davis said. "You have to be able to stop the run in this division.

"If you don't, you're going to get hurt. We've been allowing too many long runs so we have to tighten things up. The Giants will test us; that's for sure."

As if the Cowboys don't need enough incentive, they were given some bulletin board material to consider.

"I feel sorry for the team that has to play us next," Giants safety Greg Jackson said after last Sunday's 10-6 loss to the New York Jets.

The quote has been taped to the exit door at Valley Ranch where no Cowboy can miss it.

"This has all the feel of a championship game," Bates said. "Words won't hurt us. We just want to make sure the Giants' running game doesn't either."

Oilers experience restful week

HOUSTON (AP) - The Houston Oilers spent their off week smiling and healing.

Linebacker Wilber Marshall's knee, quarterback Cody Carlson's hamstring and wide receiver Curtis Duncan's foot have all had valuable healing time during the AFC Central Division's bye.

"We've had our quota of distractions this year," coach Jack Pardee said. "Since training camp, we haven't really had our team together. You're talking about a lot of players we're getting back."

The Oilers (3-4) host Seattle on

Sunday before playing road games at Cincinnati and Cleveland.

"This is a very important game for us," quarterback Warren Moon said. "It gets your record back even. It gives you three wins in a row and helps good things happen."

Marshall said he's ready to play and Pardee stopped just short of saying Marshall would play against the Seahawks. Marshall has missed four games because of arthroscopic knee surgery. He also developed an ankle injury.

"It's been very frustrating," Marshall said. "I've never been hurt before. I'm just trying to fight through it. I put in more than a full day's work trying to get ready to play."

The Oilers obviously benefited from their off week. Wednesday's post-practice locker room was lighthearted compared with the past two weeks of controversy surrounding tackle David Williams.

Williams skipped the Oilers Oct. 17 game against New England to be with his wife and newborn son. The Oilers docked his \$111,111 weekly pay check setting off a nationwide debate.

"It's a lot different coming in here without all the controversy that we've been having to answer questions about," Moon said, surveying the jovial locker room after practice.

There still were a couple of lingering problems.

Moon wants a meeting with Pardee concerning his status as the starting

quarterback, and defensive tackle Ray Childress' contract was disapproved by the league.

The NFL would not approve Childress' four-year, \$8.9 million deal because it contains a right-of-first refusal clause, league sources told The Houston Chronicle.

The league informed the Oilers and Childress that under the new collective bargaining agreement, a right-of-first refusal clause is invalid unless the player's contract has expired. Childress was in the final year of his contract when he got the renewal.

"Hopefully it can be worked out without a problem," Childress said. Pardee met briefly with Moon last week after Moon said he didn't know where he stood in the Oilers' plans. He apparently still wants more discussion.

"I'm here early in the morning until late," Pardee said. "I'll meet with any player who wants to talk."

Chiefs to start Krieg

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) - To the surprise of nobody, Dave Krieg and not Joe Montana will quarterback Kansas City against Green Bay Monday night.

How long Montana's re-injured hamstring will keep him out is anybody's guess. At least the 37-year-old quarterback was able to leave his crutches at the stadium when he went home Wednesday.

"Dave Krieg will start," coach Marty Schottenheimer said. "I don't know what Joe's status might be. He's listed as doubtful, and that accurately reflects his status as of today."

Montana, who has appeared in only half of the 28 quarters the Chiefs have played, last week re-injured the left hamstring he hurt Oct. 3. Montana sat out practice Wednesday and the Chiefs signed rookie quarterback Alex Van Pelt to their practice squad.

Montana was off crutches but limping noticeably.

Krieg, a 14-year veteran, started every game last season for the Chiefs and led them to a 10-6 record. He is 1-1 this year in relief of Montana, who has also missed time with a wrist injury.

Nevertheless, the Chiefs' offense has been much more efficient behind Montana than Krieg, who was unfamiliar with the new San Francisco offense the Chiefs put in. The two have played an almost equal amount of time through the first seven games.

"We in this business have always recognized that you have to win with whoever's available," Schottenheimer said. "Nobody's ever heard me get discouraged about losing a player. You're spinning your wheels and wasting your energy. We have won with Dave Krieg before and we can win with him again."

In another key move Wednesday, the Chiefs confirmed a shakeup in the defensive secondary. Ten-year cornerback Kevin Ross is moving to free safety and Martin Bayless will start at strong safety, putting Charles Mincy and second-year man Doug Terry on the bench.

The cornerbacks will be Dale Carter and former All-Pro Albert Lewis.

Ross, a Pro Bowler in 1989 and 1990, had suggested in training camp that he move to safety, but the coaching staff did not consider the idea because Ross had no experience at the position.

"I have watched Kevin the last couple of weeks and I have more confidence in him," Schottenheimer said.

Cavs could win NBA title in Jordan's absence

 Michael Jordan is gone from the Chicago Bulls. Coach Lenny Wilkens is gone from the Cleveland Cavaliers. It's a trade the Cavs can live with. Wilkens, the second-winningest coach in NBA history with 869 victories, left Cleveland and moved to the Atlanta Hawks. The Cavs responded by hiring NBC analyst and former Hawks coach Mike Fratello.

"It's going to be almost like starting over for a lot of us," point guard Mark Price said. "We have new coaches. We have to learn new plays. So right now our focus is just trying to get some cohesiveness with our new coaches and team, and then go from there."

The Cavaliers, who play host to Milwaukee Friday night when the NBA season starts with 13 games, have a more realistic chance to

challenge for the Eastern Conference and NBA titles because of Jordan's surprise retirement.

"I think a lot of people's expectations will be up," Price said. "You don't know who the favorite is right now. I think it does open things up for a lot of teams. There's not one team that stands out now like Chicago did with Jordan."

In other openers, it's New York at Boston, Washington at Philadelphia, Indiana at Atlanta, Portland at the Los Angeles Clippers, Orlando at Miami, Chicago at Charlotte, Minnesota at Detroit, New Jersey at Houston, Golden State at San Antonio, Dallas at Utah, Phoenix at the Los Angeles Lakers and Denver at Sacramento.

Seattle is the only team that will have to wait until Saturday night to start its season. The SuperSonics are

in Inglewood, Calif., to face the Lakers.

Price is one of three Cleveland All-Stars, along with center Brad Daugherty and forward Larry Nance, who are in their seventh season together.

Despite the loss of free agent Craig Ehlo, the Cavs could be improved, with Tyrone Hill acquired to provide rebounding help, Terrell Brandon challenging Price for playing time and rookie forward Chris Mills likely to crack the starting lineup soon. Gerald Wilkins will start at shooting guard, backed up by John Battle, who played for Fratello at Atlanta.

Portland made two major deals in the offseason in an effort to catch Phoenix in the Western Conference. The Blazers sent disgruntled center Kevin Duckworth to the Washington Bullets for forward Harvey Grant,

then traded swingman Mario Elie to Houston to open a salary slot that allowed them to sign center Chris Dudley.

The departure of Duckworth and the arrival of Dudley, whose strengths are defense and rebounding, have the Blazers hoping to run more this season.

"I think it's going to be more exciting," said Cliff Robinson, who last year won the NBA Sixth Man award for his play off the bench at all three front-line positions. "We'll be able to get up and down the floor more and really defend, and get back to the type of things that we've done in the past."

Dudley's weakness is on offense - in the preseason he shot 28 percent from the field and 58 percent from the free-throw line - while Grant was obtained for his shooting ability. He averaged 18.2 points for the Bullets last season.

"We can be a good shooting team at times, but it's not something that's going to be there night after night for us," Blazers coach Rick Adelman said. "The defensive end, the ball movement and the player movement, that has to be there night after night."

For the seventh straight year, Clyde Drexler and Terry Porter will

be Portland's starting guards. Rod Strickland, who spent much of the summer working on his outside shot, will come off the bench in a three-guard rotation.

The Clippers - Portland's opening night opponent - made few offseason changes, but it wasn't for lack of trying.

A deal that would have sent unhappy All-Star Danny Manning to Miami for Glen Rice and Willie Burton fell through at the last minute. So the Clippers' nucleus of Manning, guards Ron Harper and Mark Jackson and center Stanley Roberts returns, although the team has a new coach in Bob Weiss.

UT needs win to stay in bowl race

HOUSTON (AP) - The Texas Longhorns still have Cotton Bowl dreams and they still have their confidence despite a 2-4-1 record. They'll have to beat the Houston Cougars in the Astrodome tonight, beginning a must-win four-game stretch against Texas Christian, Baylor and No. 10 Texas A&M on Thanksgiving night that would put them in the Cotton Bowl.

"This team has the potential to beat A&M," Longhorn wide receiver Mike Adams said. "I think we can beat A&M and I think everybody else (on the team) does too."

Texas leads the series with Houston 10-7-2, but the Cougars have won four of the last six games and the last three in the Astrodome. Texas won last year's game 45-38 after blowing a 28-0 lead.

It was a short work week following losses by both teams on Saturday but neither Houston coach Kim Helton nor Texas' John Mackovic is complaining.

"Sometimes when you have a setback in life, the best thing for you to do is to just get up and go right back to work the next day," Mackovic said. "Our guys have come out and responded well."

Helton was ready to play on Sunday.

"They're going to have a chance to play against bigger and faster and better people in front of the whole world and have a chance to redeem themselves," Helton said.

Texas Tech dampened the Longhorns' bowl aspirations with a 31-22 victory in Austin last week, and the Cougars played their worst game of the season in a 28-10 loss to Texas Christian.

Texas (2-4-1, 2-1 in SWC games). At 1-5-1, 1-2-1, Helton is just trying to get some momentum going into his recruiting program.

"Texas is going to watch the film and say, 'If TCU can blitz them and cover them, the University of Texas can,'" Helton said. "They sure are

big. I don't know where they get all their guys from, but I need to start shopping there."

By the numbers, it could be a high-scoring game. Houston ranks 96th among the 106 NCAA Division I-A schools in scoring defense and the Longhorns are 92nd.

But both offensive teams have been erratic. Texas hasn't won consecutive games all season and the Cougars have been hard-hit by injuries, especially at running back. Houston quarterback Jimmy Klingler may play against Texas, but he has a bruised shoulder and sore ribs.

"We're sitting at the back of the roller coaster right now trying to push our way to the front," running back Rodrick Walker said. "The people in front of us, we're going to have to push them out of their seats."

Dear Heloise: How do you remove oil or grease from a new driveway? — E. McDermott, Douglasville, Ga.

A hint that has been passed on for years is to sprinkle cat litter or dry cement over the grease stain and let it sit. This will absorb the fresh surface grease, but it really doesn't remove the old brown stain, though it may lighten or camouflage it somewhat.

Of course, there are concrete cleaners or degreasers, found at most automotive stores, that will remove the grease also. But the brownish stain usually remains. Household bleach sometimes works and is worth a try.

If the brown stains are in a large area and are driving you up the wall, you can rent a pressure washer that should remove the remaining stain. They can be quite expensive, but worth it if you want the driveway to look nice. — Heloise

Holiday health tips

This holiday season, before you reach for Aunt Sophie's special Christmas cookies, you may want to ask her for the recipe and find out just what the secret ingredient is—especially if you're prone to food allergic reactions.

For those individuals who suffer from severe allergic reactions, or anaphylaxis, the wrong ingredient can be quite dangerous.

Anaphylaxis is a severe allergic reaction that occurs when a person is exposed to an allergen to which they have previously become sensitized. Commonly triggered by insect stings, anaphylaxis is caused by food as well—the most common food allergies being milk, eggs, nuts and shellfish. "Food allergies can be tricky," says Dr. Susan Wynn, allergist, Fort Worth Allergy and Asthma Associates, "especially because they are not always obvious. Some foods and spices used as ingredients can be hidden dangers to certain individuals even in the smallest doses."

According to Dr. Wynn, a "true" food allergy can manifest itself in many ways, from an upset stomach to hives to an anaphylactic reaction. Delayed onsets are possible when it comes to food allergies, as the offending ingredients work their way through the digestive tract.

When in doubt, look for these symptoms of severe allergic reactions:

- itching of the skin, raised rash, flushed skin;
- swelling of the lips, throat and tongue;
- wheezing, shortness of breath, coughing and hoarseness;
- headache;
- nausea, vomiting and cramps;
- sense of impending doom, perhaps of loss of consciousness.

It is important to know your food allergies. However, if after checking out the buffet items at the office Christmas party, you discover that you've eaten something to which you're allergic, be prepared to immediately take the proper steps. Because anaphylactic reactions can be fatal if not treated right away, those with known life-threatening allergies should consult their physician ahead of time about carrying the drug epinephrine, the medication of choice for the treatment of anaphylaxis.

Working directly on the cardiovascular and respiratory systems, epinephrine is able to counter the effects of anaphylaxis within seconds.

The media is saturated with messages concerning teenage sex and pregnancy, but instead of telling teens to use a condom, parents should remind their kids that even what may seem like harmless foreplay or "fooling around" can lead to an unwanted pregnancy. — Buffalo, N.Y.

DEAR BUFFALO: YOU told them-- and very effectively. Thank you.

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Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: My husband, age 56, has just been diagnosed with prostate cancer. A biopsy with six samples indicated 40 percent of the cells were cancerous. He is now scheduled for chest X-rays and bone, abdominal and pelvic scans to see if the cancer has spread.

We were told if there was no spread he would be treated with surgery or radiation. If the cancer has spread, he must be treated without surgery.

Now we have read that some doctors believe the risk of side effects from treatment are far worse than the risk of living with prostate cancer, since the vast majority grow so slowly. We read that the vast majority grow so slowly that there are no symptoms, the cancer does not spread and men eventually die of something else. Also that there is no evidence that lives are saved by early diagnosis or any available treatments: surgery, radiation or testosterone-blocking drugs. Can you give us your opinion?

DEAR READER: It sounds like you have misinterpreted something you have read. You probably read that in "elderly men" a small cancer that has not spread may not cause any problems during his lifetime. In this instance, many urologists would agree that surgery, radiation or even hormones are not needed. But that does not apply to all of your young husband. Without cancer of the prostate, he might live another 15 to 20 years, or even more. So the decision may well be different if a man is 80 rather than 56.

Even in older men who already have spread of prostate cancer, castration or the use of medicines to eliminate the stimulation of the cancer with testosterone is of great value. It may hold the cancer in check until a man does live out his lifespan. And in a young man, if the cancer has spread, it may also hold his cancer in check for many years.

Don't believe that a man won't have symptoms from cancer of the prostate if it spreads. It can involve the bone, causing pain, and if the tumor mass in the prostate grows, it can cause urinary obstruction.

DEAR DR. LAMB: My mother insists that vitamins can prevent cervical cancer. She is after me to take all these vitamin preparations. I have read that cervical cancer is caused by wart viruses. Would you please explain this to my mother?

DEAR READER: Mothers are always right. There is strong evidence some strains of wart viruses invade the cells of the cervix, take over their genetic material and convert the cells to cancer. Not all wart viruses do this. The wart viruses believed to cause cervical cancer also occur in women who do not develop cervical

cancer. What is the difference?

Dr. C.E. Butterworth of the University of Alabama studied folate levels in women who had cervical cancer and those who did not. Women with the cancer-causing viruses and low folate levels were five times as likely to have cervical cancer as those who had normal folate levels. Folate may help maintain cervical cells, as it does with other surface cells, making them more resistant to the cancer virus.

Here you see again the dual action of two factors, not one, that may influence the risk of cancer. But taking excess folate could be harmful. So it should not be overdone. Folate is in foliage — so eat your salads.

DEAR DR. LAMB: I would appreciate your comments on "white coat hypertension." I am a 75-year-old female, 5 feet 7 inches and weigh 124 pounds. My only medication is 80 mg of Inderal daily to control skipped heartbeats. This dosage has been very effective.

My concern is that I have high blood pressure at the doctor's office. When it is checked at home, it is 138/72. This pressure is constant, but when I get to the doctor's office, it will spike at anywhere from 180/100 to 200/104. Is this a cause for alarm, or is there any way of controlling this?

DEAR READER: Spikes in blood pressure are not desirable, but if they are only with a specific occasion, as just in the doctor's office, they are of little clinical significance. The Inderal you are taking for your skipped beats is also good at controlling your blood pressure.

The one thing you need to be sure about is that your blood pressure readings at home are accurate. You need to have your instrument checked against the one in the doctor's office to be certain of this.

Such situational increases in blood pressure have been well known for years. Individuals with this reaction were previously called vascular hyper reactors. The observation has simply been dramatized and called "white coat hypertension." It is from apprehension or anxiety at having a medical person check your pressure.

The isolated spikes and the rise in the top blood pressure all suggest a simple increase in the amount of blood your heart pumps when you are excited. But you do need to keep a regular check of your blood pressure, and if it becomes elevated at home, you may need additional medicine.

Pointers for parents

More than 10,000 reports of alcohol ingestion by children under age six who swallowed mouthwash were recorded in a recent five year period, according to the American Association of Poisons Control Centers. Only one ounce of a high alcohol-content mouthwash can seriously affect a 22-pound child and only five ounces can be fatal.

Fortunately there are two things you can do to keep your youngsters out of such statistics.

1. Keep mouthwash, along with all other potentially poisonous substances, such as cleaning materials, medicines, paint, kerosene and the like, locked away where children can't reach them.

2. When you can, use products that are not potentially poisonous in the first place. For instance, Clear Choice mouthwash from Bausch & Lomb contains no alcohol. Some popular brands have a far higher alcohol content than beer or wine.

"Children's curiosity and attraction to brightly colored products like mouthwash, as well as their propensity

to mimic their parents' behavior, can put them in danger," says Simon Cheirif, DDS, Associate Clinical Professor, Department of Pediatric Dentistry, New York University. "Children are more susceptible to alcohol poisoning than adults because of their lower body weight and different metabolism."

Because of the danger associated with alcohol-containing mouthwash, a petition was filed with the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission by attorneys general of 27 states and several other organizations. The petition calls for child-resistant packaging on all mouthwashes containing more than five percent alcohol. In addition, the American Dental Association (ADA) passed a resolution requiring manufacturers of mouth rinses with more than five percent alcohol that want the ADA seal of Acceptance to place child-proof safety caps and warning labels on their bottles.

"Until child-resistant packaging and warning labels are available, parents should keep mouthwashes out of the reach of children, or consider using an alcohol-free mouthwash such as Clear Choice," says Dr. Cheirif.



QUESTION: "How do plants make food?" was asked by a student visiting the Ozmobile.

ANSWER: In one of the past articles I mentioned that animals cannot live without plants because plants make food. The process of making food is called photosynthesis.

Plants are very special. Most of the food factories are in the leaves, but some plants also have factories in the green stems, like in tomatoes.

The factories must have certain ingredients for them to work. Sunlight provides the energy to run the factories. Water is pulled up from the roots, through the stem, to the leaves. Carbon dioxide is taken into the leaves and some stems through small openings. In leaves, these openings are usually on the bottom and are called stomas.

The factories break the water molecules into oxygen and hydrogen atoms. The oxygen escapes through the stomas, mixes with the air and animals breathe to take it in. The hydrogen is used to help make food.

The carbon dioxide molecules are broken down by the factories into carbon and oxygen atoms, which are also used to make food. The food is a simple sugar, called glucose. Each molecule has six atoms of carbon, 12 atoms of hydrogen and six atoms of oxygen.

There are always some hydrogen and oxygen atoms left over, which combine to make water molecules. These water molecules then escape through the stomas into the air.

So, the next time you walk by a plant, stop, pet it and compliment it for doing such a good job. Without plants, we could not live.

Spotlight on health

Here come some sound facts about ultrasound.

Diagnosing the health of a fetus and measuring blood flow and its patterns in your body are just two examples of the fascinating science of sonography. Another lifesaving area is neurosonography. Used primarily in newborns, it allows doctors to view the brain without harm or discomfort to an infant.

Why is ultrasound so useful? First, ultrasound is safe; it emits no ionizing radiation. Test after test has shown that there are no known harmful side effects with ultrasound.

It also provides clear and accurate

images. Ultrasound works on the same principle as sonar. Instead of sound waves bouncing off the ocean floor, they bounce off organs and tissues beneath the surface of the skin. Pictures are then sent back to the ultrasound machine.

The third reason is cost. Ultrasound is usually less expensive and takes less time than other imaging methods.

Who performs these ultrasound examinations? Most are performed by sonographers, not physicians. Although sonographers are not licensed, they can choose to prove their competency by becoming certified. Since 1975, over 20,000 sonographers have passed these competency tests.

LOS ANGELES (AP) - TV veterinarian Steve Kritsick returned to "Good Morning America" to get personal, revealing that he is gay and has AIDS.

The former staff member of the show appeared Friday, gaunt cheeks and lack of hair showing the effects of chemotherapy he receives for AIDS-related cancer.

"I'm not just going to sit around waiting to die," said Kritsick, who was animal science editor on ABC's "Good Morning America" from 1987 to 1989 and contributed stories as recently as August.

"I have a burning passion, a compelling need to express honestly things about me and my life very few people would know, and for which I'm afraid people... would judge and not understand," he said.

Kritsick said fear of rejection kept him in the closet, but now he knows better and wants to help others.

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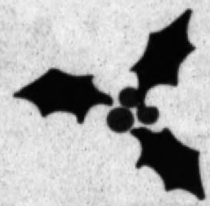
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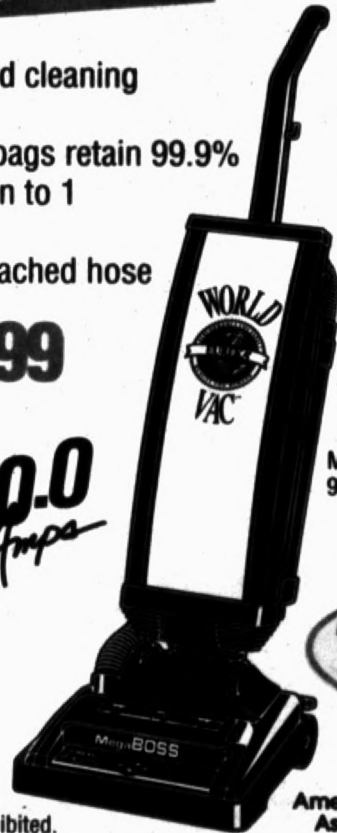
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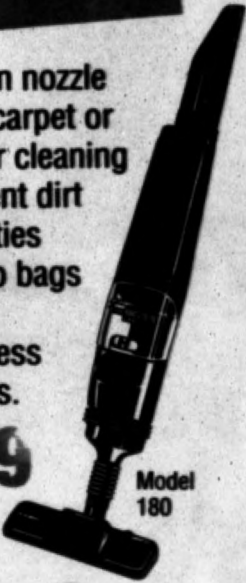
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
