Gene discovered that makes some people act impulsively

Fickle? Quick-tempered? It could be in your genes. Scientists say they've taken a

step doward unraveling the genetics of personality by discovering a gene that could influence how excitable and impulsive you are. The discovery - made in two

separate studies - provides the first confirmed association between a particular gene and a normal personality trait.

Previous studies have shown more generally that genes influence personality, as do a person's life experiences.

As scientists discover more individual genes that affect particular traits, it might open the door to identifying people at risk for such problems as drug abuse and counseling them on how to lower their risk, said researcher Richard Ebstein.

It might also add a twist to the issue of who's entitled to know about a person's genetic makeup.

An insurance company might want to know that "genetically you're a thrill-seeker and enjoy jumping out of airplanes in a skydiving club, and taking risks in general," said Ebstein, director of research at the Sarah Herzog

Memorial Hospital in Jerusalem. Ebstein is the lead author of one study of the gene in the January issue of the journal Nature Genetics. The second study

reproduced Ebstein's results in a different population.

"This is major news," said psychologist Brian Gladue, who studies the biology of behavior at the Institute for Policy Research at the University of Cincinnati. "This is going to open up a

whole new field of molecular personality research," he said. The discovery provides "the

first missing link" between genes and personality by implicating a particular communication system in the brain, Gladue said.

In that communication system, brain cells signal each other with a chemical messenger called dopamine. Dopamine is secreted by signaling cells, and delivers its message by binding to receptors on the surface of receiving cells.

The gene identified in the study tells cells how to make one kind of dopamine receptor.

The studies found that, on average, people with a particular version of the gene score about 10 percent higher on personality tests for a trait scientists call "novelty seeking.'

People who are above average on novelty-seeking are impulsive, fickle, excitable, quick-tempered and extravagant, while those scoring below average tend to be reflective, rigid, loyal, stoic, slow to anger and frugal.

About 15 percent of people in Israel, Europe and the United States carry the novelty-seeking form of the gene. But just why it would encourage novelty-seeking

is still a mystery, Ebstein said. About half the novelty-seeking

variation between people is thought to be due to genes, and the gene in the study accounts for about one-fifth of this genetic component, Ebstein said.

The gene's effect is too small to help an insurance company or prospective employer judge an applicant, said Dr. Jonathan Benjamin, lead author of the second study. And he said he believed they shouldn't have access to such information.

Richard Coorsh, spokesman for the Health Insurance Association of America, said health insurers don't intend to require any genetic testing for coverage. But if people who seek coverage as individuals rather than through a group plan get such tests on their own, the results would be part of their medical records that would be available to insurance companies, he said.

Ebstein's results came from 124 adults in Israel who filled out a personality questionnaire and gave blood samples so their genes could be analyzed.

Ebstein's findings were reproduced in a study of 315 Americans by Benjamin and colleagues at the National Institute of Mental Health and the National Cancer Institute in Bethesda, Md. Benjamin is now assistant director of psychiatry at Soroka Hospital in Beersheba, Israel, and a lecturer in psychiatry at Ben Gurion University in

NATO stays on schedule despite weather, mines

AVIANO AIR BASE, Italy (AP) -"We probably saw the worst of it \NATO forces, nagged by landmines and bad weather, remain on schedule to meet the big challenge of separating the warring armies in Bosnia, Defense Secretary William Perry said today.

With an Army pontoon bridge over the flooding Sava River now carrying U.S. tanks and armored vehicles, about half the 20,000-member American force should be in Bosnia by Jan. 19, when Bosnian government, rebel Serb and Croatian forces must withdraw behind designated

"That's when we need to have enough troops on the ground to enforce compliance," Perry told reporters en route to his first visit with U.S. and allied forces in Bosnia. "We're on that schedule."

Perry and Gen. John Shalikashvili, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, stopped off at this air base in northern Italy that has been the backbone of NATO air operations in Bosnia. From here they will travel to Hungary and, on Wednesday, will fly into Sarajevo, the capital of Bosnia, and then to Tuzla, base of U.S. operations, for meetings with commanders and troops in the field. In Sarajevo they will meet with U.S. Adm. Leighton NATO operation, and with Bosnian deadline.

President Alija Izetbegovic and Prime Minister Haris Silaidic.

While they painted a bright picture of the U.S. and allied effort to date, Perry and Shalikashvili warned that complacency could lead to unnecessary casualties. And they said the warring parties have not yet begun to work with each other.

"The operation has progressed much better up to now than we had a right to expect," Shalikashvili said. But he tried to keep his optimism

in check. "I must tell you that we have to take this a day at a time. The weather will continue to pose us challenges and if we're not careful we'll have unnecessary accidents," Shalikashvili said. "The thing we need to watch out for is to make sure that we don't

get lulled into a false sense of security." Perry said the factions have already laid to rest one of his greatest worries - that they would not honor their own peace agreement reached

last November in Dayton, Ohio. "It is clear that they do want peace," Perry said, noting the warm welcome given the arriving U.S.

Estrogen and exercise prevent osteoporosis

ST. LOUIS (AP) - Shirley Johnson no longer takes those long waits at the doctor's office sitting down.

Instead, the 64-year-old woman goes for a walk. And if she's feeling particularly energetic, she'll climb the stairs a couple of times, too.

It helps relieve the stress from delayed appointments, but more importantly it helps strengthen her

Johnson gave up being a couch potato after participating in a study at Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis. Researchers there found that replacement therapy with the female hormone estrogen combined with exercise can effectively prevent bone loss in post-menopausal women.

seeking to reduce their risk of. osteoporosis.

Osteoporosis affects some 25 million Americans, 80 percent of whom are post-menopausal women. The disease causes progressive bone loss and is linked to more than 1 million fractures of the hip, spine and other bones each year.

The prevailing opinion was that exercise affects bone density in older women, but there was little scientific support for the theory, said Wendy Kohrt, an exercise physiologist at Washington University who conducted the study.

Past studies of the effects of exercise on bone density in older women produced mixed results, Kohrt said. They have shown that

hormone replacement combined with exercise increases bone density, but exercise alone does not.

Kohrt and her co-workers attempted to settle the issue by studying the separate and combined effects of estrogen and exercise in post-menopausal women.

'We hypothesized that estrogen only maintains bone mass, it does not increase it, at least not after a one- to two-year period," Kohrt said. Exercise promotes bone formation. Therefore, we believed that combining estrogen and exercise was more effective than either done alone."

Researchers divided 32 women who ranged in age from 60 to 72 into four groups. None of the women had exercised regularly, Kohrt said.

One group received daily estrogen That is good news for women and participated in a regimented exercise program at least three times a week. Two other groups either received estrogen or participated in the exercise program. The fourth group, which served as a comparison, neither received estrogen nor exercised.

> The exercise program consisted of two months of flexibility training, such as stretching and modest weight lifting, to improve the women's range of motion, Kohrt said. That was followed by nine months of more vigorous exercise, such as walking, jogging and climbing stairs.

The initial goal was for the women to walk for 30 minutes at moderate intensity, Kohrt said. Participants programs were individualized and updated weekly.

AGropolis created for growing nature newbies

As the nation's population becomes increasingly urban -- 75 percent urban according to the U.S., Census Bureau 1990 census -- folks may not have grown up knowing certain things about nature, such as how to turn kitchen and yard waste into valuable compost for the landscape. Texas A&M University -through its research, Extension Service and teaching efforts -- has volumes of information that can help, but the challenge has been finding new ways to deliver the information to the changing population. Taking the city of the World Wide Web, in the form of AGropolis, is helping meet that goal, developers believe.

"AGropolis is not bland, like people tend to think university information is," said Lynette James, Texas Experiment Station communications specialist and AGropolis creator. "We've made it easy for nonagriculture people to find informa-

Point Communications Corp., a New York-based World Wide Web site reviewer, agrees.

"This friendly site from Texas A&M University promises family farmers and gardeners science-based information that is Aggie reliable," the reviewers wrote. "There's

COLLEGE STATION -- Before probably something for everyone at this resource."

Point Communications ranked AGropolis in the top 5 percent of Web Pages.

Welcoming visitors to the home page is a map of AGropolis. The visitor's center, in the middle, is surrounded by caricatures of a food mart, a garden, an animal pasture, a farm, a family home, a pest control company, a nature trail and Texas A&M's Agriculture Program building.

Clicking with a computer mouse on any of those sites, will open new links relating to that portion of AGropolis.

In the food mart, for example, food safety and nutrition get top billing. On the "shelves" are information ranging from how to enjoy poultry meat safely to nutritional needs of preschoolers.

Much of the information is available in both English and Spanish, James pointed out.

"AGropolis also is interactive. If a person doesn't find the information needed, the questions and comments link on every page allows e-mail messages to be sent," James said. 'We then find the information and email it back.

"We're tired of hearing about Northwestern," said Daylon McCutcheon, who returned a fumble 53 yards for a first-half score. "Everyone thought Northwestern was going to win this game, and we had a lot to prove - especially after that UCLA loss.'

Brad Otton, who usually alternates quarters with Kyle Wachholtz, played the whole game and completed 29 of 44 passes for 391 yards and two TDs for the No. 17 Trojans (9-2-1).

Steve Schnur completed 23 of 38 passes for 336 yards for the third-ranked Wildcats (10-2). Darnell Autry carried 32 times for 110 yards and three TDs.

In Monday's other bowl games, Penn State set an Outback Bowl record for points in its 43-14 rout of Auburn; Syracuse beat Clemson 41-0 in the Gator Bowl; Colorado topped Oregon 38-6 in the Cotton Bowl; Tennessee beat Ohio State 20-14 in the Citrus Bowl; and Florida State beat Notre Dame 31-26 in the Orange

In the Fiesta Bowl, the undefeated Cornhuskers shoot for their second straight national title, while the Gators (12-0) go for their first championship.

Nebraska (11-0) is trying to become the first team to win consecutive titles since Alabama in 1978-79, and the first champion with two straight undefeated seasons since Oklahoma in 1955-56.

"We haven't really talked about the history of it," coach Tom Osborne said. "These kids, in a few years they'll appreciate what they've done, if they do it. Right now, they think more about what happened last game."

it or not, Brett Favre isn't cocky, only candid. He may talk bold and he may be brash, but he's no braggart.

My personality, even though I don't say many things, is that I I can be the quarterback in the Super Bowl and in the Hall of Fame one day," Favre said. "I believe all those things. I think if I didn't I wouldn't be sitting here today."
