over the federal budget in Washington has left the nation's farmers uncertain what government programs they will be able to count when they plant their crops.

"Over the next few months, you have to make planning decisions," Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman told the American Farm Bureau Federation on Monday. "You will be buying seed and fertilizer. You need place to know what return to expect from your crops.

Unlike some past years when Congress acted on a separate farm bill, this year's measure is contained in the bottled-up budget.

Until Congress and President Clinton come to an agreement over the budget, Glickman said he would announce national and individual allotments for crops as provided in the Agricultural Adjustment Act, a 1949 measure under which the department operates in the absence of a farm bill.

"Each day that passes without a farm bill brings us closer to a crisis situation," he said.

Glickman said the 1949 law

requires that farm allotments be based on individual farm growing histories RENO, Nev. (AP) - Wrangling from the 1950s. "If you are now growing wheat or feed grains and your farm did not produce any in the '50s or if you are growing more, you may be directly affected by this decision," he said.

Witherspoon dies at age 89

James Winfred Witherspoon, pioneer Hereford attorney, former city and district attorney, district judge, and business and community leader died Saturday afternoon in Hereford Regional Medical Center at the Funeral services were scheduled at 3 p.m. today

in First Baptist Church with Doug Manning, worship leader for Fellowship of Believers, officiating. Burial was to be in West Park Cemetery under direction of Gililland-Watson Funeral Home.

Mr. Witherspoon was known as the founding father

of the sugarbeet industry in the Texas Panhandle and eastern New Mexico. He served as the executive secretary and legal counsel for the Texas Sugarbeet Association from its inception. Various members of the Texas sugar industry honored

Witherspoon in 1993 by sponsoring a Texas Agricultural Lifetime Leadership program participant in his name. He was named Hereford's Citizen of the Year for 1961, and he received the Bull Chip Award in 1987. He retired several years ago following a stroke and

had been a resident at Westgate Nursing Home. In addition to numerous honors in his law practice, Witherspoon was active in community affairs and the founding of a number of local businesses and organizations--including the original Hereford Feed Yards in 1961, and the West Texas-New Mexico Sugarbeet Growers Association. He had been chairman of the board of Prochemco Inc. He became a stockholder and director of First National Bank in 1934 and was chairman of the bank board for several years.

Mr. Witherspoon was active in many civic boards and organizations, serving as a director or officer in many of them. He was co-founder of the Christmas Stocking Fund.

Mr. Witherspoon was born in Indianola, Ok., Sept. 20, 1906. The family moved to Bellview, N.M., in 1907. His father, Ernest, farmed in that area and was later a county commissioner

Mr. Witherspoon graduated from Bellview High School in 1923, earned a degree from Montezuma College in Las Vegas, N.M., attended law school at the University of Texas, then transferred to the University of Oklahoma where he received his law degree in 1929. During his college years, he returned each summer to assist his father in farming operations in the Bellview

Mr. Witherspoon moved to Hereford in 1929 and set up his law practice. He formed a loose association

"Clearly, the first lady has some explaining to do," editors at The Washington Post wrote Monday.

"Whenever the White House pronounces the story dead, something else pops up to challenge the First Couple's credibility," wrote editors at The New York Times. "This has nothing to do with Whitewater but everything to do with honesty."

Hard freeze skips fruits, vegetables

HARLINGEN, Texas (AP) - The Rio Grande Valley's first hard freeze of the winter finished off the bell pepper season but caused little, if any, damage to other vegetables and citrus, according to area growers.

Residents flipped on their heaters and brought plants inside as temperatures plunged across the region early Monday. Lows ranged from 21 degrees in Hebbronville in northern Jim Hogg County to 35 degrees on South Padre Island.

The cold front sent shivers through citrus and vegetable growers, who still are recovering from crop-destroying freezes in 1983 and 1989. But the latest arctic blast caused little damage, they said.

Peppers, grown primarily in Starr and Hidalgo counties, suffered the most damage, but it made little economic difference because harvesting was almost completed.

"It was the tail end of the pepper harvesting season. This just brought it to an end," said Bill Weeks, executive vice president of the Texas Citrus and Vegetable Growers Association.

Other winter vegetables such as onions, carrots and cabbage probably weren't damaged by the freeze because they are cold-hardy. Weeks

With more than half the citrus crop still to be harvested, grapefruit and oranges also should come out of the freeze unscathed, said Ray Prewett, executive vice president of Texas Citrus Mutual.

'We know we didn't have any tree damage except possibly some extremely minor damage on some of the more tender growth," Prewett said. "We don't expect any damage occurred on the fruit."

Haley may return for Cowboys

AP Sports Writer IRVING, Texas (AP) - First the San Francisco 49ers were upset. Then the Dallas Cowboys played their best game of the year. Now Charles Haley is coming back.

Good news keeps following the Cowboys around in their quest for the Super Bowl.

The Cowboys may have defensive end Charles Haley back for Sunday's NFC Championship game against the Green Bay Packers to put some heat on the NFL's most prolific passer, Brett Favre.

Haley, who had back surgery five weeks ago, flew to Los Angeles Monday and got an excellent report from Dr. Robert Watkins.

Dallas trainer Kevin O'Neill said Haley had a "50-50 chance" of playing against the Packers.

"The report was very encourag"O'Neill said. "We could see boost for our pass rush."

"The defense played great," Switzer said. "We know the key to beating Green Bay will be controlling Favre. It will help to have Haley.'

Help Your Heart Recipes

This recipe is intended to be part of an overall healthful eating plan. Total fat intake should be less than 30 percent of your total calories for a day - not for each food or recipe.

Three-Bean Chili

- 28-ounce can no-saltadded tomatoes, cut up
- 15½-ounce can red kidney beans, rinsed and drained
- 15-ounce can garbanzo beans, rinsed and drained
- 15-ounce can no-saltadded pinto beans, rinsed and drained
- 12-ounce can light beer or nonalcoholic beer
- tablespoons chili powder teaspoons ground cumin
- cup plain nonfat yogurt Chopped fresh parsley

In a large saucepan, combine tomatoes, beans, beer, chili powder and cumin. Bring to a boil over high heat. Reduce heat and simmer, uncovered, for 10 to 15 minutes, depending on desired consistency.

Special doll among first contributions to museum

JERUSALEM (AP) - The doll was like a member of 7-year-old Claudine Rodel's family as they evaded the Nazis in occupied France. Her mother even used the doll to smuggle gold out of the country.

But most important, the greeneyed, brown-haired toy was a little Jewish girl's only friend, a friend she kept close over the years -through marriage and through immigration to Israel - as a reminder of the hardship and the horror.

Until now. A half-century later, Rodel is surrendering her lifelong companion to the Yad Vashem museum's new Holocaust memorabilia collection. She may be wracked by regret at "abandoning my child," but at the same time, Rodel knows the museum needs her memories as much as she does.

The doll is one of the first contributions in the museum's push to gather the paraphernalia of persecution from a generation of survivors that is rapidly disappearing.

"The survivors of the Holocaust are getting older every day. In the few years we have left, we have to go out and search for every piece of information, every piece of life," aid Yad Vashem spokeswoman Avital

The \$3 million project, supported by private donations, aims to collect personal artifacts, documents or correspondence from the Holocaust

Now 59, Rodel works for the museum, hiring French-speaking survivors to ask for contributions to the project. She decided to donate the doll to "better bring about an understanding of what happened to children.'

The doll was the Jewish girl's only friend during four years on the run with her mother and father.

Each time Rodel assumed a new identity, she changed the doll's name too, calling her "Colette," then "Francoise," then "Colette" again.

On Rodel's seventh birthday in 1943, as the family hid near Grenoble, in southeastern France, her mother sewed a doll's dress out of fabric torn from her own nightgown.

Rodel, her parents - and the doll survived the war. But most of their relatives were killed in the Nazi slaughter of 6 million Jews.

Claudine refused to part with the doll, taking it back to her native Paris. When she married a fellow French Jewish survivor, the doll was with them on the honeymoon. And in 1970, when Rodel immigrated to Israel, the doll came too.

"When my children were young, I would let them play with Colette, but she always had a special place to sleep in my room," Rodel said.

Rodel says she decided to donate the doll while writing a letter to survivors recently urging them to make a contribution.

"When I was preparing to give her (to the museum), washing her clothes and cleaning her, I was very excited," Rodel said. "But when I actually went and handed her to the lady in charge of collections, I felt like I was being a bad parent."

The museum is also seeking to purchase Holocaust era work by Jewish artists, such as Adolf Aussenberg, a German Jewish filmmaker forced to make Nazi propagandá films until he died, at age 26, at Auschwitz. His sketches of life about that. in the Theresienstadt camp in Czechoslovakia are on loan to Yad Vashem from their Dutch owners.

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

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

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
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Book suggests dancing ban in Anson was racially motivated

ANSON, Texas - The famous Cowboy Christmas Ball is over for another year and the once-heated controversy over any other dancing in Anson seems to have largely subsided.

But not quite.

Although the better part of a decade has passed since a segment of the community fought a town "no dancin' in Anson" ordinance, the issue has gotten footloose again, thanks to a book by a 46-year-old University of Texas psychology professor.

Not surprisingly, some townfolks aren't happy with conclusions reached by Dr. Ricardo C. Ainslie, particularly those suggesting that racial overtones colored the 1987 dispute over dancing regulations.

Although 67-year-old Mayor Ernest Spraberry showed up for a recent book-signing ceremony at Bea's Steak House, he quickly pronounced the idea of the controversy being rooted in racial politics as ridiculous.

Result: Few bother to have dances. A city official from whom dance permits must be obtained called dancing in Anson a "rare activity." Granted, students and others could hold more, but, to quote pro-dance mom Janie Rainwater, "there's just too many buttons to push."

Translation: It's not worth all the bickering and bad feelings.

So did the "dancin' in Anson" controversy really spark a sort of "rainbow coalition" to battle what Ainslie, in his book, contends were Bible-clutching, unbending white elders? That's one conclusion, but you'll find just as many spirited denials.

If there's anything good to say about all this, it's that people continue to treat each other with great courtesy in Anson. At Bea's Steak House - once the siteof pro-dance meetings - I watched members of various factions interact not just with civility but with utter cordiality.

Anson is also blessed with folks such as 79-year-old Jack Hornsby, who runs Bea's Steak House and tries to keep town controversies in wry perspective. He likes telling about the preacher who loudly condemned dancing in Anson on the grounds it would prompt a plague of unplanned pregnancies.

Jack Hornsby's response: "I told him that'd be the funniest thing to see on the dance floor!"




