Info Superhighway now has on-ramp in Hereford

Newsman samples tour of cyberspace

Managing Editor I believe the term for novice Internet surfers is "newbies" -- and that's wnat I was Friday when I visited West Texas Rural Telephone to talk to them about their new Internet home page.

Iom Hyer, WIKI manager and WIKI Computer Division programmers Allen Hyer and Heath Urbanczyk were more than willing to give me a quick primer in how to use the Internet.

Of course I've seen the "addresses" for companies, government organizations and other entities in advertisements and news stories, but paid no real attention to them because I had no way to use them.

Sitting down to one of several terminals in the WTRT offices, Tom Hyer gave me a quick walk-through how everything works.

It's easy to see how people get "hooked" on the Internet. Of course, their system is much faster than their customers will experience, because the computers at the WTRT offices are connected directly to

the "brains" of the home page, rather than going through a modem first. Simple clicks of the mouse button yield the way to vast sources of information -- stuff I barely tapped in about 30 minutes of surfing the

'Net on my own in their offices. Tom Hyer makes the point that the Internet is not going to be complete, because it grows constantly, as more people log on with pages of their

My few minutes of exploring took me to places both familiar and diverse -- a stop at the Baptist Bible Fellowship International home page to look over the independent Baptist organization, followed by a quick trip to New Mexico State University, my college alma mater.

Urbanczyk, with a few clicks of the mouse, took me deep into the files of NASA, where we located photos of a recent shuttle mission.

The color monitor lit up in dazzling beauty as we saw Earth from the cargo bay of the shuttle, or a Japanese satellite framed in darkness as it was hauled aboard.

Tom Hyer called up one of his favorite stops -- Texas Tech University -- where he played the fight song as played by the Goin' Band from Raiderland. Later, he found the U.S. Air Force and one of its web pages, this one

explaining the benefits of an Air Force career. We located a list of newspapers from literally the world over, but I didn't take the time to look over the top headlines from Bahrain, Brazil,

A stop in the entertainment and sports sections yielded current and recent headlines, while I never got to any of the "chat rooms," where Internet

users can actually converse with each other. In fact, said Allen Hyer, it's much like the CB radio craze of the 1970s, except that in this case, you communicate by typing, not talking.

Josh Urbanczyk, who came in for work after school, said he has experienced life on the 'Net, having been thrown out of a chat room because he failed to answer a riddle correctly in the proper amount of time.

In another room, a "cybercop" accusing him of trying to take over the

So Josh did what anyone else can do -- he set up his own chat room, where he can visit with anyone who comes along.

As for my first foray into cyberspace, it was interesting. I can see where it would be addicting, but can also see how being on-line could be informative, illuminating and educational.

"There's so many services providers in the world," he said. "Some charge by the hour ... some do a flat rate like we do."

He said highly-advertised services such as America On-Line and Compuserve are "fine if you're in Amarillo or Dallas or somewhere that has local phone access to those services.

Otherwise, he said, "you're going to spend those 10 free hours paying for a long-distance phone call."

Allen Hyer said he has known of people who spend anywhere from \$50 to \$150 a month on their on-line service charges plus long-distance phone bills.

Tom Hyer said he took WTRT into the computer age for one reason.

"The only reason I considered trying to do it was to make it available for the schools, for educational purposes," he said.

Once the company was established as a service provider, however, it was made available to anyone within the WTRT service area as a local call.

That means, he said, that individuals -- both WTRT customers and those affiliated with other phone services -- in the areas of Hereford, Friona, Bovina and the nine exchanges of WTRT can access the WTRT home page through the local

"I was really skeptical about the Internet turning out like it is," he said. adding that he was surprised by the interest WTRT's home page has generated through the area.

Hyer said once a customer has signed on to the WTRT service, he is given a user name, password and the access phone number to the system.

Technically, anyone can go on-line if they own a computer, a modem that operates at 14.4 or 28.8 kbs, a telephone line and at least 4 mb of RAM space.

Individuals who have the Windows 95 operating program in their computers are ready to go, while Allen Hyer said WTRT is in the process of getting set to accept customers operating on Windows 3.1.

"We're testing out software for Windows 3.1," Allen Hyer said, because special software must be loaded into those systems to allow access to cyberspace.

However, he continued, the company should be ready next week to recommend a specific software package to Windows 3.1 users that will allow them to "surf the 'Net" like

Surplus food program here discontinued

Funding for the Emergency Food Assistance Program will not be available this year. The program provided commodity surplus items to disadvantaged and elderly residents.

Martha Galvan, Panhandle Community Services center coordinator in Hereford, said notification in early February confirmed that the commodity surplus program, has been discontinued, at least for this

The last distribution of commodities was in August of 1995, she said, adding that Congress has not provided the Department of Agriculture with funding for the program.

Commodities distribution by Panhandle Community Services began more than 12 years ago, providing more than 8,000 families in the Panhandle with food items. Much of the work associated with distribution was performed by

volunteers, said Galvan. "Panhandle mmunity Services salutes each volunteer, county court and other agencies who donated so many hours to making the program one of the most successful in the

SILVER SPRING, Md. (AP)--A five "are fine." commuter train carrying Job Corps youths home on a snowy evening Friday was crushed by an Amtrak train bound for Chicago, leaving at least 11 passengers dead. Investigators picked through the wreckage for

Transit officials said there were only 17 passengers on the commuter train, and Job Corps officials said all were believed to be trainees from a West Virginia center, returning to the Washington, D.C., area for the

weekend. 'We recovered 11 bodies," said Montgomery County Police Sgt.

Wayne Jerman. It was not known immediately how the trains ended up on the same track in this Washington suburb. Maryland Mass Transit Administration officials insisted their commuter train was

Snow blasts East Coast

NEW YORK (AP)--Winter's wrath struck again with a mighty snowstorm that walloped the East Coast and parts of the South, causing traffic accidents from Maine to Georgia and blowing down records that had stood for a century.

Friday's blast made official what fed-up commuters and shovel-weary homeowners have been muttering for weeks: The winter of '96 is the worst they've ever seen.

The storm was expected to taper off Saturday, with the heaviest accumulations confined to a path along the East Coast. Cold air was expected to hover over the Southeast today, with northern Florida experiencing a freeze overnight.

Once a computer user has his hardware (the actual computer equipment), software (Windows 95 or Windows 3.1, plus other programs) and home page access information, he is ready to go surfing.

"If you've got Windows, you push a few buttons" and the WTRT home page appears on the screen, Tom Hyer said.

From there, users can call up specific addresses on the World-Wide Web by using the address, or can click the mouse on several directories that are maintained in the WTRT home page.

(For reference, the WTRT home page can be accessed by other on-line users by typing: http://www.wtrt.net/)

Tom Hyer said when his company put its home page on-line around the middle of January, he began testing the service with the help of people already on-line.

What we've tried to start with in our testing stage is connect some of those people who are using other providers," he said, then asking those individuals to compare what they see on the WTRT home page with what is on other such pages.

Like the Internet itself, the WTRT home page is growing, as officials find more and more information to make available to users.

The Internet, Hyer said, "is growing at a tremendous rate.'

Currently, the WTRT home page allows access to various subjects, including governmental entities -including the White House and NASA -- as well as venues for entertainment, sports, news, weather and other news.

By clicking on those directories, access to related areas are revealed, allowing users to "surf" their way from subject to subject, looking at pictures of space shuttle flights, reading jokes, visiting in "chat rooms," researching topics in libraries and universities around the world, or reading newspapers from any number of foreign countries.

Allen Hyer said the Internet was originally developed by the U.S. military as a backup system in case

The "backbone" of the system allowed backups of information to be placed at numerous locations. Then, if something happened to one site, information would be routed around it, but would continue uninterrupted.

In the early years, the Internet was limited to government agencies and institutes of higher education, which shared information among themselves.

When the government gave up control of the Internet several years ago, Allen Hyer said, the rules were changed and commercial applications were allowed.

State board tentatively approves new HS academic requirements

AUSTIN (AP)--The State Board of Education voted tentatively Friday to increase the number of courses needed for a high-school diploma but allow students to take more physical education classes to help meet the requirement.

The 9-1 vote came with just 10 of board's 15 members present and after Education Commissioner Mike Moses left the meeting early. Texas Education Agency spokeswoman Debbie Graves Ratcliffe said Moses was going on a family trip.

Board members emphasized that the vote was preliminary and that provisions are likely to change after more discussion. A March 26 meeting is planned on the issue, and a final vote could come in April.

Board Chairman Jack Christic of Houston insisted that the overall proposal strengthens graduation requirements by imposing new academic requirements.

"It's definitely a higher standard," he said.

"These would be major changes,"

Strong quake hits Indonesia

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP)--A powerful earthquake struck the Indonesian half of New Guinea Saturday, killing at least seven people and setting off 20-foot tidal waves that swept more than 600 houses into

The death toll in remote coastal areas was expected to rise from the quake, which struck at 2:59 p.m. (12:59 a.m. EST) with a preliminary magnitude of 7, the Indonesian government said.

Other monitors, including Japan's Central Meteorological Agency and the Pacific Tsunami Center in Honolulu, put the magnitude at 8.

The quake was centered under the ocean floor 68 miles east of Biak island, off New Guinea's northern coast, said Budi Waluyo of the government's meteorology and geophysics agency. In the town of Sopiori Selatan on

Biak island, waves swept 600 houses into the sea, but there was no immediate word on casualties, said Putu Puja, a meteorology official. "So far, we have received reports

that seven people were killed and 18 injured," said an officer at a police station in Biak, the worst hit town.

The officer, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said he was awaiting waiting reports from Sarmi, about 187 miles southeast of Biak, where the quake caused 20-foot

Tidal waves swept four residents of Biak town into the ocean; they were presumed dead. Collapsing buildings injured 18 people, said Bambang, a spokesman for Indonesia's meteorological department. Like many Indonesians, he uses only one

"More casualties are expected, because there were scores of houses swept away by tidal waves on Biak island," he said by telephone

Stevenson played Lt. Col. Henry Blake, the womanizing goof-off commanding officer of the 4077th Mobile Army Surgical Hospital, for the first three seasons of "M-A-S-H." The role won him a 1973 Golden Globe Award and a 1974 Emmy nomination.

In the series, Blake died when his plane was lost at sea as he returned to the United States.



The eloquence of leaving the race

WASHINGTON (AP) - For fallen presidential candidates, the exit lines are the hard ones, epitaphs to ambition, spoken through gritted smiles by losers conceding the rejection that haunts any politician.

So it was for Sen. Phil Gramm, a now relegated to running for re-election in Texas. "I have taken a licking in this race and I am eager to get back into that race," he said in becoming the third man out of the 1996 Republican field.

In a general election, one candidate wins, one loses and concedes. In a contest for presidential nomination, it is multiple choice, and Gramm was No. 5 in the Iowa None but the brain dead could miss that message, he acknowledged.

It was his second defeat; a week earlier Pat Buchanan had upset him in Louisiana's preview caucuses.

"I am today ending my campaign for president of the United States,' Gramm said Wednesday to the forlorn cheers of supporters in a crowded Senate hearing room. "When the voter speaks, I listen, especially when the voter is saying someone else's name.'

But the political ego that sends a man into presidential competition does not concede it at that; Gramm went on to say that he still believes he was the best candidate the Republicans could have chosen.

'My problem was an inability to convince voters that I was right," he said, diagnosing the affliction of all defeated competitors.

Gramm was the third man out of the 1996 GOP field, the best financed and, by his account, in the black when he quit. The other two, California Gov. Pete Wilson and the longer-shot Sen. Arlen Specter of Pennsylvania, both said they couldn't afford to keep going, and dropped out before the competition began.
"There should be no tears, as

much as your hearts and mine tell me It was no help to the ticket. to fight on," Wilson said when he withdrew. No excuses, no regrets, Specter said at his departure. But no one who puts himself

through the rigors of a modern

presidential campaign can withstand

early defeat unscathed by at least

some of the above. They just don't admit it.

Both have now endorsed Dole for the nomination. Gramm said he was not ready to endorse anyone, but he's likely to join the Dole camp, too. He had nettled Dole while they were campaign rivals, but Gramm said his mission now will be in the Senate, \$20 million presidential campaigner and aligning with the Republican majority leader will serve that purpose. Dole telephoned Gramm to wish him well.

Gramm had raised more campaign money than any other Dole rival, and spent more. He won a projected 10 delegates in his two caucus defeats. Hardly cost effective, but better, at least, than John B. Connally, who spent about \$10 million and got one delegate before quitting the 1980 Republican caucuses last Monday. race. Connally hedged his dropout enough to say that there might be a miracle that would put him back into competition. There was none, of course; Ronald Reagan was the nominee.

Gramm's pre-New Hampshire withdrawal recalls the exit of George Romney, ranked the early leader for the 1968 Republican nomination. He quit two weeks before a New Hampshire primary in which the polls showed Richard M. Nixon would have trounced him. "I wouldn't have missed it for the world," he said of his brief candidacy, adding the obvious, that he wasn't finding much rank and file support.

Buchanan, incidentally, was part of the Nixon campaign team that year, basic training for his candidacy now, as was his challenge to George Bush in 1992. He never won a primary against Bush, but his 37 percent share of the New Hampshire primary vote was an early embarrassment to the president, and Buchanan kept going all season, determined to get a prime time slot at the Republican National Convention. He did, only then endorsing Bush, in a speech that played to the GOP right, talking of "a religious war ... a cultural war for the values and soul of America.

In the lore of the dropouts, none outranks Lyndon B. Johnson's in 1968. although he never formally declared candidacy. Under Democratic challenge over his Vietnam war policy, Johnson got out two days before the Wisconsin presidential primary, where Sen.

Eugene J. McCarthy was about to defeat

Johnson announced U.S. bombing limits and hinted at peace overtures, and said partisan divisions should be no factor in those efforts. "Accordingly," he concluded, in an exit line that altered American politics, "I shall not seek and will not accept the nomination of my party for another term as your president."

Lubbock Avalanche-Journal on farm subsidies: Some farmers dislike it, but Congress does the right thing by moving to end farm subsidies. We may be witnessing the end of a support-happy era to enter one in which farmers produce more freely and more profitably

For 60 years the nation has endured policies growing out of the Depression that, among other things, paid farmers not to plant certain crops and underwrote the production of others.

The historic changes voted in the Senate do not really go far enough, but some change is better than none. Compromises must be made when the House takes up its version of the farm bill upon Congress' return from recess Feb. 26.

The Senate's "Free to Farm" bill is intended to give farmers flexibility to accommodate market forces not only at home but abroad. Farmers for the first time would be taken out of a system that supports their income with direct payments whenever market prices drop to unprofitable levels.

Producers are thus supposed to be weaned off years of dependence on subsidies. They would be given fixed payments instead of subsidies based on fluctuating market prices; payments would gradually decline over the next seven years.

Farmers would gain flexibility over what crops they plant and how many a acres they cultivate. The bill's backers say more land would be planted, meaning larger harvests and a rise in food exports if they are price-competitive. .. The Senate bill unfortunately retains a high degree of protection for

dairymen and peanut and sugar producers. Those protections should be thoroughly debated in the House. Washington currently lays out about \$11 billion a year in subsidies. Ending farm subsidies as we know them would benefit both farmers and

Alois Brunner, a senior Nazi SS officer who allegedly helped direct the deportation and murder of at least 100,000 Jews during World War II, was believed to have been living in Syria since 1954. Extradition requests were ignored or rejected.

But Cologne's chief prosecutor Wolfgang Weber said Brunner, an Austrian citizen, is believed to have recently moved to South America.

"Naturally he did not single-handedly kill 100,000 people," Weber said. "But he was one of those who organized the mass murder of the Jews.'

Independents hold key to NH primaries

NEWINGTON, N.H. (AP) Standing on the factory floor, carnestly evaluating this day's visit by Bob Dole, Vytas Cerniauskas and Mark Jones are the wild cards of the New Hampshire primary.

Young, well-educated and informed, the two, like their friends, have no strong ties to the political parties or their candidates.

"Few of the people I know are staunch Democrats or Republicans," says Cerniauskas. "Mainly, they're looking for the strongest candidate.'

In a state where nearly a third of voters are registered independents, the battle to win over Cerniauskas and Jones may be key to victory in Tuesday's primary and a harbinger

for November. Speculation about the independent vote has become a cottage industry among pundits in recent weeks following polls that had independents tipping the scales toward newcomer Steve Forbes and his promise of flat

A Boston Globe poll two weeks ago found Dole had heavy Republican support and that Forbes' 4-1 margin among independents was enough to make him a front runner.

Ardor for Forbes has cooled dramatically, but the speculation and stratagems over the independent vote have continued.

"There are more independents in New Hampshire than there ever have been," said Gerry Chervinsky, president KRC Communications Research, a Newton, Mass.-based polling firm. "My question is what is the percentage of those voting in the Republican primary will be independents."

The numbers prove to be a hard-to-hit moving target.

There are nearly 200,000 New Hampshire voters registered as independents, compared with about 211,000 Democrats and 259,000 Republicans. Those numbers are in constant flux as more voters register. And two new factors make it easier this year for independents to grab Republican ballots.


Tuesday will be the first time voters can register at the polls on Election Day. Also new this year: Independents may go in, re-register as Republicans then turn back into independents on their way out.

Chervinsky believes all this will add up to a 25 percent participation in the primary among independents, who are likely to opt for the high-profile Republican ballot.

While some estimates raise the figure as high as 40 percent, election officials put the numbers much lower. We guess that 12 to 18 percent of the independents that go in will

Moon took blame to protect his wife

RICHMOND, Texas (AP) Warren Moon chose to take the blame for a July 18 scuffle with his wife in order to prevent her "dark secrets" from being spilled into public, Felicia Moon said.

It was she, not her husband, who instigated the July 18 fight, she told jurors Friday in her husband's misdemeanor assault trial.

Alternately defiant and furious, Felicia Moon revealed her "dark secrets" about her sometimes-rocky marriage to the NFL quarterback and her own personal emotional battles.

Those secrets include a problem with overspending, credit card mania, a violent temper and past emotiona illness.

"My fear is some really dark secrets about myself being brought to life," she said, sobbing after more than three hours on the witness stand.

"We had marital problems that led to violence," she said of her 18-year-marriage to the stone-faced Minnesota Viking quartrback, who showed little emotion during her testimony.

But those violent episodes were ome 10 years ago, she said.



Extension Agent's Notes

By DENNIS NEWTON

County Extension Agent - Ag After last week's column, I have had several calls concerning the computer program "BudPro". If you will recall, "BudPro" is a software program developed by a group of Texas Agricultural Extension Service Agricultural Economist as a tool that allows producers to analyze their operations and examine the impact of management practices before implementation.

The program is a budget program that allows producers to vary income, expenses, faring and ranching practices and inputs to determine what the potential outcome might be in relation to potential income, the program is very user friendly and is very inexpensive.

BudPro has budgets for corn, grain sorghum, cotton, wheat, stockercattle and cow/calf. As I stated last week. I wold encourage producers to take a look at this program for their operations. It is a very fast and efficient way to put in many different variables and give producers the opportunity to see what might work for them.

The cost of the Program is \$100 and order forms are available in the Deaf Smith County office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Producers interest in the software program might also consider participating in a far budget training program using BudPro on March 14 at the Texas A&M Computer Training Center located at the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station in Halfway on Highway 70 approximately 14 miles west of Plainview. The course will run from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. with lunch provided. Cost of the training is \$40, but the software program is included in that cost.

Couples are encouraged to attend and are charged only one registration

fee. The course will be taught by Jackie Smith, Professor and Extension Economist located at Lubbock.

Smith has taught computer short courses to Texas farmers and ranchers for the last 11 years. He will be assisted by Bobby Stanaland, extension agent-1890, who is with FmHA borrowers.

Stanaland worked at the Mediation Center at Texas Tech as a graduate student and was a farmer in Kent

Registration forms are available at the Deaf Smith County office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in room 402 of the County Courthouse.

Other short courses taught at the computer center will be: QUICKEN for far accounting o March 28; TAMPRICE a marketing software program on April 11; CHEMICAL RECORDKEEPING on April 18; and, QUICKEN for farm accounting on April 25, June 13, June 20, and June 27. All of these courses are one day in length and cost is \$40.

The TAEX is also offering the first sessions of the Women in Agriculture: Business Management Program on February 21-23 at the Holiday Inn-Civic Center in Lubbock. The program is designed to help farm and ranch women develop their business management knowledge and abilities. The program is targeted for farm and ranch women working on or off the farm, as well as women who run their own farm or ranch business.

The subject matter will not focus on production topics, but will cover topics related to the business management end of production.

The topic to be covered are the family business, management issues, improving communication, forms for business organization, income tax

Many cattlemen will have the opportunity to expose their cattle to packers who may not have a buyer in the area. This will benefit small feedyards as well as the large yards. According to the article, the cattle

will be identified by quality. A pen of cattle are not necessarily uniform, so the bid grid allows differentiation between carcasses.

Prior to selling the cattle through the satellite, a description of the cattle

is required. Also, discrimination against buyers or sellers is possible. The program began in December

Extension News

By BEVERLY HARDER County Extension Agent - FCE

The last two week's columns have focused on the need for having a personal inventory and conducting the inventory. An inventory, once prepared, must be stored away from the facility that could suffer damage from fire or other natural disaster.

A lot of time and energy has been invested in the inventory preparation and the last thing one needs is for it to be lost or destroyed.

Keep a copy of your written inventory, photos and/or videotape at home filed with your other records restored in a fire resistant box. This will enable you to update it easily as you add to your belongings. Keep another copy of your written inventory, and all photo negatives and a second videotape in a safe deposit box.

While the preparation of the inventory is being conducted, one might wish to determine the disposal of property. No one likes to think about death occurring. But it is wise to plan ahead in the event of this occurrence.

Antiques or family mementoes need a history left with them. Most of us can remember stories told to us of certain family memorabilia, but will we remember to tell our children. Enclosed with the inventory, short descriptions or interesting facts can be left.

Others might wish to use a small engraved name plate with the name of the original giver or owner and a date of gift being received or date of origin on the plate. Most engraving or trophy shops have the plates and for a nominal cost this will help maintain history in the family.

Actual disposal of the property is another item that can be accomplished during the inventory. Depending upon age or family circumstances, some items tucked away may be given to one to whom the item would have great meaning.

It has been noted more than once that a medal or honor received by a parent, may have great meaning to a young child. Much better to have a child realize a sacrifice or achievement by their parent and perhaps adopt that aspiration also than to have the item collect dust in a trunk or have of a drawer.

A listing of items one wishes to leave family members can also be made during the inventory. Always remember to date the document, and if the list is not in one's own handwriting, then the document should be witnessed and notarized. It is a good idea in the event of expensive items to check with the attorney where one has their will and follow directions for that item.

More than likely we will have a few more cold blustery days. This is a good time to prepare a cup of tea and tackle the inventory and listings if you have not done so.



For those of you who don't know, a bread maker is a kitchen appliance used exclusively for (TA-DA!!)







Sexual assault clinic approved at HRMC

Center Sexual Assault clinic was approved recently by the board of directors and medical staff at the

hospital. The new service has been in the planning stages for several months after three HRMC nurses, Nancy Griego RN/BSN, Donna Kemp RN/BSN, and Rose Mary Barrett RN, completed training to become Certified Sexual Assault Examiners.

With the completion of the policies and procedures, and the approval of the board, HRMC is now able to assist sexual assault victims in Hereford.

Hereford had more than 120 cases of sexual assault and domestic violence in 1994 (the last year for which complete data is available), with most of the cases involving children.

Previous to certification, victims

The Hereford Regional Medical room and then transferred to Amarillo for examination.

This new service from HRMC will allow victims to be assessed and treated more quickly," said Jim Robinson, HRMC administrator. "The victim of a sexual assault has already undergone tremendous psychological trauma. By having the ability to examine victims here in Hereford, we hope to spare the individual added discomfort."

The training at Northwest Texas Health Care System covered adult and pediatric anatomy, nursing diagnosis and treatment of sexual assault victims, collection and gathering of history and information, head to toe assessment, and collection of the evidence for the FBI lab.

MINDING YOUR OWN **BUSINESS** Don Taylor

It's The Little Things

ave you ever been bothered by a fly? Have mosquitoes ever ruined a pleasant evening on your patio? Were you enjoying the cool summer breezes until these little pests found your bare arms and legs and drove you inside?

Now let me ask a bigger question. How many of you have ever been bitten by an elephant or butted by a rhinoceros? No one? See, it is the little things that bother us. It's the little details that spoil our plans and change our lives.

In the business arena, I've heard some speakers and consultants tell business owners not to sweat the small stuff. "Focus on the major issues and the details will take care of themselves," they say. I don't agree. The details never take care of themselves. Someone must pay attention to the little things if your business is to be successful.

The burger business

This "detail" philosophy may be best illustrated by looking at the hamburger segment of the fast-food industry. There are more than enough choices to satisfy all customers. And yet, in markets where there are already too many stores, someone often builds another.

I doubt that any of these stores are running close to peak production. Yes, they have a big lunch crowd and maybe a rush at breakfast or dinner, but most of them could do 20, 30 or even 50 percent more business.

I believe we have all these choices because few of these chains are totally focused on satisfying the customer. They rely on their brand name to bring customers into their stores. However, it takes quality products and caring service to bring customers back again and again. When someone figures out how to do this, they may do to hamburger chains exactly what Wal-Mart is doing to Kmart.

Customers come first

We covered a lot of territory while visiting at Christmas time. We found one of the dirtiest stores we've ever seen in national hamburger chain in North Kansas City, Mo. Tables were covered with litter, ketchup and crumbs. The floors were dirty with puddles of condiments and ice cream. The chairs, windows and window ledges were all in dire need of a good scrubbing.

The only thing dirtier than the store itself was the language of two employees who were on break. Their conversation was filled with four-letter obscenities that were both profane and vulgar. For my family, it created a very negative impression of the entire chain. I don't believe Dave would be proud.

Another incident happened a couple of days later in Trenton, Mo. We noticed two "national hamburger franchises" going head-to-head in this small rural market.

During the six days we stayed there, we noticed that one store was getting a much larger share of the breakfast business. We discovered why when we ate at the restaurant that appeared less busy.

As we went in, my wife and I realized that we were the only ones in the store. We were welcomed with a "what-doyou-want" attitude. No smiles, no friendly greeting, no desire to please.

We ordered our breakfast and then searched for a clean table. Four people behind the counter watched us wipe a table clean. When the food finally came-yes, we had to wait for it - part of it was very hot and part was already cold. Little things to be sure, but we took our business to the other restaurant for the remainder of the stay.

Old-fashioned English garden combines beauty with bounty

The beauty and bounty of an oldfashioned English flower and vegetable garden needn't cost a fortune nor require a professional landscaper. With a little inspiration and dedication, a lovely edible oasis can be created for \$150 or less.

· Price alone doesn't make this garden stunning: the combination of fragrant herbs with leafy salad greens, sweet peas with colorful pansies, plus the casual elegance of daisies, sunflowers, and zinnias, adds zest and romance to the suburban

Created by Design with Plants, Inc., the plan is organized on a fairly generous scale, but with a little ingenuity it can be easily adapted to smaller yards.

Preparing the Garden Bed


Before rushing out to buy the recommended plants, stop and consider the soil. Good soil is the root of all healthy plants, whether flowers or vegetables. Unfortunately, soil isn't usually born perfect; it must be nurtured to excellence. A good way to build up the soil is by working in a two-to three-inch layer of organic matter, such as Canadian Sphagnum Peat Moss.

Prepare a plot 12 to 14 feet in width x 18 feet in length, or proportionately smaller, by working in Canadian Peat Moss with a roto-tiller or light weight cultivator until it is churned into the soil to a depth of six inches. All-natural and environmentally safe, Canadian Peat Moss adds bulk to light sandy soils and helps aerate heavy clay. An added plus is that it holds up to 20 times its weight in water, then releases it to roots slowly, so that plants need less frequent watering.

Organize the Garden

The garden is organized into 10 triangular shaped beds measuring three feet on each side with a 12 foot fence at the north end. Each bed is arranged in four alternating rows of three and two triangles each. The rows are separated by 18-inch wide pathways. To adapt the plan for smaller properties, reduce the number of beds and maintain the 18-inch space between them. Vegetables and flowers are given equal prominence, occupying borders and beds alike. Follow the accompanying illustration, which clearly delineates which plant is to be placed where.

Next, off to the garden retailer to purchase materials, plants and seeds. \$150 should cover the cost of the whole garden; prices will vary, however, depending upon where you shop. Follow the directions for each plant and the backyard will be bursting with color, texture, and edible beauty.



"This was an old house and a young family that needed more space," says McKee Patterson, an architect in Southport, Conn. "The existing house was literally museum quality, so there was never any question about messing around with

Patterson suggested building an addition in a style compatible with the house and the detached gambrelroofed garage. Since the garage looks like a barn typical of the 1820s, he designed a gambrel-roof addition of about 1,500 square feet. The new stone building is attached to the garage by a breezeway and stands in the space formerly occupied by a small structure that had once housed a kitchen. The stone for the new building comes from the building that was taken down.

"Most old houses are small in scale, so a large addition can be out of scale and ruin the flavor of the old house," says Patterson. "In this project, the new structure is about 20 inches below the grade of the old house to keep the roof height low and yet permit rooms with fairly high ceilings of nine-and-a-half feet downstairs."

This stratagem and the low-profile gambrel roof create the illusion that the two-story addition is no more than

The new building houses three bedrooms, two bathrooms, a kitchen, a breakfast area, a laundry and mud room. There's also a small playroom for the family's two children.

Although stone construction is more costly than wood-frame construction, in this case it was a good idea.

'The clients wanted it, we had the stone, and a building of that period could easily have been built in stone," the architect says. "The stone gives the buildings a solid, sturdy anchored look."

In the new wing, exposed post-and-beam construction, oak plank floors, wood wainscoting in the hallway and plasterboard walls are in keeping with the historic period of the saltbox.

"We took a few liberties with Mexican tile for the kitchen and modern lighting unobtrusively mounted on ceilings and under the kitchen cabinets," the architect says. "A few old lanterns function as decorative and utilitarian lighting and set the mood."







State-of-the-art special effects help bring to life a popular band of mutant teen-agers in the movie Generation X. premiering Tuesday, Feb. 20, on Fox.

The live-action film, based on part of the best-selling Marvel comic book series The X-Men, was not available for review due to the extensive amount of post-production work required by the special visual effects.

A clips reel screened recently for TV critics, however, hinted at a lavish cartoon-like fantasy, with hilarious, deliberately over-the-top performances by Matt Frewer (Max Headroom) and Emmy winner Finola Hughes (General Hospital).

In the world of Generation X, in which the earliest signs of maturity can be accompanied by startling genetic mutations, becoming a teen-ager is even more tortuous than what Earth adolescents go through.

Fortunately, two experienced mutants - Emma "White Queen" Frost (Hughes) and Sean "Banshee" Cassidy (Jeremy Ratchford) - operate the Xavier Institute, a school where teenage mutants learn to harness their powers for benevolent purposes.

New Xavier arrivals include Jubilation "Jubilee" Lee (Heather McComb). who can't control the energy bursting from her fingertips, and Angelo "Skin" Espinosa (Agustin Rodriguez), who can stretch to almost any length.

Already at the Institute are "Mondo" (Bumper Robinson), who can absorb the properties of whatever he touches: Arlee "Buff" Hicks (Suzanne Davis). an insecure girl with unusual musculature; Kurt "Refrax" Pastorius (Randall Slavin), who has special optic powers: and Monet "M" St. Croix (Amarilis), a stunning beauty with an intellect to rival Einstein's

As the young mutants continue their training under Emma and Sean, corporate madman Russell Tresh (Frewer) embarks on a sinister scheme to manipulate society through mind control.

These dire circumstances force the still-inexperienced Generation X team to confront Tresh in a fantastic virtual dreamscape to foil his insane plan.

More than 75 special effects were implemented during filming, and some 400 hours went into creating three-dimensional computer-generated images. Particle animation was used to give Jubilee her mutant power to shoot fireworks out of her fingers. To help Skin stretch, technicians used computergenerated arms to create the effect of stretchable skin.

Among the executive producers of Generation X is Brandon Tartikoff, now chairman of New World Entertainment, a sister company of Marvel Comics. During his tenure as NBC entertainment president, Tartikoff introduced a famously unsuccessful variation on the Generation X formula, featuring a current NBC star, in 1985-86.

"Well, neither Courteney Cox (Friends) nor I list Misfits of Science on our resumes." Tartikoff acknowledges. "But I do think that one of the worst mistakes you can make in programming is, if you've been in an area once and you didn't execute it properly, you stay away from that area forev-

"Unlike Misfits of Science, which may have been ahead of its time or may not have been properly executed. I think that with (Marvel chairman and X-Men creator) Stan Lee at the helm. we're really in the hands of the master," he adds. "I think if you see the film, ... you can sense a different quality and a different investment of pro-





HBO's Late Shift chronicles bitter battle over Tonight

HBO revisits a show-biz event that played out like an incredible black comedy in *The Late Shift*, premiering Saturday, Feb. 24, on the premium channel.

Betty Thomas (Hill Street Blues) directs Bill Carter's own co-adaptation of his best seller, an account of the bitter battle between Jay Leno and David Letterman for Johnny Carson's Tonight Show throne.

Oscar winner Kathy Bates stars as Leno's hard-driving manager (and later, *Tonight Show* executive producer), Helen Kushnick. Two lesser-known actors, Daniel Roebuck (*Matlock*) and John Michael Higgins, star as Leno and Letterman, respectively.

For those who don't clearly recall what happened, Carson set off a media frenzy on May 23, 1991, when he announced he would retire in one year. Carter's book painstakingly and hilariously chronicled the infighting behind the scenes.

Among the highlights, re-created in the HBO movie, is Leno's admission that he hid inside a closet to eavesdrop on an NBC executive meeting that would decide his professional fate.

The Late Shift movie is a solid effort, but nonetheless uneven, especially given its large cast of characters who will be unfamiliar to many viewers.

The low point is reached by Rich Little, whose brief appearance as Carson is so rooted in Vegas shtick that it demolishes the movie's attempted realism. Less damaging is Roebuck's Leno; the actor makes a brave run at the part, but his strained mimicking of the comic's high-pitched, nasal voice and the severe fac. Il prosthesis he wears keep viewers at arm's length.

Higgins, on the other hand, is uncannily on target in his portrayal of the tightly coiled Letterman, assisted only by a wig and a fake gap between his teeth. The rest is skillful body English.

Still, most of the comic juice comes from Bates' Kushnick, playing Lady Macbeth to Leno's guileless Gumby. Viewers can judge for themselves whether this woman's tactics, many of them genuinely appalling, might have been regarded as acceptable if a man had used them.







LOS ANGELES (AP) - Rob Pilatus, half of the defunct pop duo Milli Vanilli, was held for investigation of making terrorist threats after allegedly trying to break into a car and a house, police said.

A witness saw the 31-year-old Pilatus trying to break into a car in Hollywood on Sunday and alerted the owner, who approached Pilatus, said Officer Eduardo Funes.

Pilatus ran to a nearby house and attempted to force his way in, Funes said. He made several "obscene and boisterous" threats, Funes said, and threatened to kill residents of the house. A struggle ensued, during which one of the residents hit Pilatus in the head with a bat. Pilatus was treated at a hospital and released. He was being held on \$150,000

Pilatus and bandmate Fabrice Morvan were stripped of their "best new artist" Grammy Award in 1990 following revelations that they hadn't sung a note on the best-selling "Girl, You Know It's True" album.

There was no telephone listing for Pilatus in Los Angeles, and a publicist with Milli Vanilli's record company, Arista, did not return a phone call Sunday.

Actress Beverly D'Angelo left home at the age of 16, studied art in Italy and once worked as a cartoon colorist at Hanna-Barbera Studios.
