

Early voting trickles to a stop in runoffs

Using early voting as a yardstick, the turnout for runoff elections Tuesday probably will be meager in Hereford and Deaf Smith County. Only 13 ballots were cast during early voting in the Democratic primary

runoff and two were marked in the Republican election. Voting precincts are being combined for the elections. All residents,

both Democratic and Republican, will cast ballots in the county courthouse. There are no county contests on either Democratic or GOP ballot. At the state level, interest is focused on the race for the Democratic nomination for U.S. Senator.

U.S. Congressman John Bryant and a political unknown, Victor Morales. are candidates for the nomination. The winner will face Senator Phil Gramm in the November general election.

Democrats also will choose a nominee for Place 2 on the Court of Criminal Appeals. Candidates are Charles Holcomb and Gary Taylor.

In the GOP runoff, three nominees for the Court of Criminal Appeals will be elected. Candidates for Place 1 are Sue Holland and James (Daniel) Boone; Place 2--Pat Barber and Paul Womack; Place 3--Tom Price and Cheryl A. Johnson.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday.

Bunnies may get the Easter glory, but it is chickens that actually do the work

PITTSBURGH (AP) - While bunnies get all the glory for Easter, hens do all the work.

U.S. farmers sell about 50 million dozen more eggs than average during the two weeks before Easter, but chickens can't just lay eggs according to the needs of the market.

"The hens don't listen when you tell them it's Easter," said Lee Shrader, professor of agricultural economics for Purdue University in West Lafayette, Ind.

No, the farmers don't talk to the chickens. To keep things moving, they simply manipulate

Chickens lay eggs almost every day at the beginning of an eightmonth laying cycle but may slow their rate to every other day by the end, Shrader said.

After hens shed feathers, they start producing more eggs again. Farmers can make the birds molt sooner by dimming the lights in the birds' sheds and by feeding them less.

Or they can delay molting - and keep the hens laying lots of eggs by giving them ample feed and keeping the lights bright.

To keep up with demand, eggs are also stockpiled, so they may not be as fresh as usual at Easter.

Hillendale Farms eggs typically are about two days old when consumers get them. Around Easter, they may be seven days old, said Gary Bethel, vice president of Hillendale Farms of North Versailles, Pa. The company also has farms in Ohio,

And what happens to the hardboiled, brightly colored eggs used for children's hunts on Easter Sunday? Most families - 64 percent - eat them, according to a national survey of 1,000 men and women by the H.J. Heinz Co. Another 22 percent toss them out.

Blue is the hue favored by 36 percent of families that dye Easter

eggs, the survey shows.

More than 20 percent said they usually hide the eggs outside near shrubs, bushes and trees, while 8 percent said the best place was in and around furniture.

One more thing: Be careful when putting on shoes after the holiday. Some people said an empty pair is a good hiding spot.

Network to host series of meets

Network(PIN) will host five regional meetings to discuss the cooperative development and operation of a regional integrated telecommunications network.

PIN is a consortium of educational, library, local governmental and interested other public non-profit organizations formed to plan and coordinate the developing information network.

A meeting will be held in Hereford from 7 to 9 p.m. on April 15 at the Deaf Smith County Library. Other meetings have been scheduled at Pampa, Clarendon, Dalhart and Amarillo.

"The success of the Panhandle Information Network is of utmost importance to the future of this region," said Linda Pitner, interim planning coordinator for PIN and West Texas A&M University grant

PIN began more than two years ago when Amarillo College, Clarendon College, Frank Phillips College, Oklahoma Panhandle State University, and WTA&M jointly applied for and received a \$50,000 federal planning grant.

Now that much of the planning

process has been completed, membership in the network has been expanded and organizers are preparing a proposal that, if awarded, will provide funds for development of a telecommunications infrastructure throughout the top 26 counties of Texas.

"It may be somewhat optimistic," Pitner said, "but if all goes as planned, Panhandle residents may begin to enjoy the conveniences and benefits of internet, videoconferencing and distance-education access within the next two years."

Rep. John Bryant of Dallas faces his constituent, high school government teacher Victor Morales, in Tuesday's runoff. The winner will try to keep Republican Gramm from winning a third term in November.

Their race is the highlight of a spirited runoff slate that includes a congressional primary between two party switchers and an appeals court race where a key issue is one candidate's alleged nickname.

"You're not talking David and Goliath. You're talking the Little Sisters of the Poor defeating Notre Dame in football."

Morales, 46, whose political Both Republican and Democratic resume is limited to the Crandall City

last month's primary. He got 36 percent in a four-man race.

But since then, he's faced questions about his wife's failure to repay a \$27,000 college loan and his repeated failures to meet campaign finance report filing deadlines.

Morales says that with no paid staff, he's been too busy campaigning to obey reporting laws.

He and his wife dispute repayment of the education scholarship, saying the government hasn't explained why they don't deserve a hardship waiver to forgive the debt.

Despite the controversies, Morales maintained a slight edge over Bryant in a recent opinion poll conducted by the Mason-Dixon Political/Media Research of Columbia, Md.

Regardless, some experts say he faces a much tougher challenge against one experienced Anglo

candidate than he did in the four-way primary where he was the only minority.

'There's not much room for him to expand his 30 some-odd percent," Polinard said. "Bryant will benefit from the Anglo vote. ... My hunch is the pickup turns into a pumpkin next

Others disagree, in part because Democratic runoffs in other races are being held in heavily Hispanic areas of the state, where Morales ran well and voters are more likely to return to the polls.

"I think Victor Morales is going to win,"said U.S. Rep. Jim Chapman, third-place finisher in the Senate race. "He's the Hispanics' Colin Powell."



Pilla works to help people get out of 'bondage' from tax penalties, interest

NEW YORK (AP) - More than 20 million Americans owe back taxes, and after April 15 there could be

Most are attempting to pay the principal owed, and penalties and interest. And interest on interest, which is compounded daily. The totals can mount into multiples of the original tax. Most owe more than \$10,000.

Daniel J. Pilla describes it in one word: "bondage." Those who falter can become indentured servants, accumulating bills for penalties and interest for past taxes that may make it impossible to pay current and future taxes.

Many tell Pilla, a tax litigation consultant who probably knows more about the Internal Revenue Service than the commissioner, that they could pay the principal if they could escape the penalties and interest.

Many can escape, but the IRS seldom lets them know that. The IRS takes in \$650 million a year in failure-to-pay penalties, Pilla says. He figures the interest on penalties probably matches that total. It's tough to give that up.

perfectly legal and available too, but Enforcement Administration and you're not likely to hear about them from the IRS. "They'll tell you," Pilla says, "that you cannot get an extension to pay. You can."

Who is Dan Pilla? He is the father of four young children living in a St. Paul suburb who has devoured so much of the IRS code (some of it he concedes was undigestible) that he advises tax attorneys and tax accountants.

He writes a newsletter, Pilla Talks Taxes, and has authored eight fact-filled, readable books on tax matters, the most popular of which, "How To Get Tax Amnesty," has sold more than 150,000 copies. He is a guest lecturer at tax conferences.

He is on a mission to inform and educate that began when his father was improperly challenged by the IRS and had nowhere to turn for help. Dan, a teen-ager, studied the IRS code and counter challenged.

The Marshall (Texas) News Messenger on line-item veto:

... The (line-item veto) vote last week is a bet. Republicans are betting that Sen. Bob Dole will be the next president and that they will retain House and Senate majorities to make a line-item veto stick - but of course, "President Dole" and the next Congress will spend money so wisely that there will seldom be any reason to use it.

President Clinton, betting on his re-election, realizes that anything Congress gives, it can take away. If Dole wins, it doesn't matter what Clinton thinks about a line-item veto. If Clinton wins, and if the Republicans retain control of Congress and cynically jerk the line-item veto away, the president is no worse off than he is now. And if Clinton wins, and the Democrats regain one or both houses, he'll still have the line-item veto until it's challenged in court the first time he uses it.

Voters should not allow themselves to be fooled. This "line-item veto" business, which will be touted as a great achievement in bipartisanship by both Dole and Clinton and any incumbent member of Congress, means nothing. It has been done only for show.

If Congress is really serious about giving the president line-item veto power - a power most state governors already have - it will submit a constitutional amendment to the states for ratification. The Supreme Court cannot overturn a constitutional amendment although it has considerable leeway to determine what it means.

Voters might ask their federal political leaders or candidates if they favor a real line-item veto power, written into the United States Constitution.

The Dallas Morning News on abortion revision:

Abortion is legal. But there is one abortion procedure that should not be. The procedure, the so-called partial birth abortion, performed after about 20 weeks of pregnancy, is so heinous that, unless there is absolutely no other option to save a woman's life, no doctor should be allowed to perform it.

A bill passed by both the House and Senate rightly seeks to ban the procedure. Unfortunately, the bill comes up short. Where it is specific, it may not be medically proper, and where it is vague, it may be on shaky constitutional ground.

Specifically, the bill would ban the third-term procedure "except where such an abortion is necessary to save the life of a mother endangered by a physical disorder, illness, or injury provided no other medical procedure would suffice." Pregnancy itself, in some cases, puts a woman's life at risk, and it doesn't fall under any of the categories listed as endangering

Not so specific, and the bill's weakest point, is the description of the procedure. It is defined as an "abortion in which the person performing the abortion partially vaginally delivers a living fetus before killing the fetus and completing the delivery." That, according to the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, is "terminology that is not even recognized in the medical community." Consequently, the bill's definition might also be applied to other abortion procedures, which makes it all the more constitutionally questionable.

President Clinton has expressed great personal unease with the procedure.

He previously stated that he could support the bill if the ban would not apply when doctors view the procedure as "necessary to preserve the life of the woman or avert serious health consequences to the woman."
He will likely veto the bill because it does not address effects on a woman's

But by doing so, he will give Congress a chance to come up with more appropriate language to outlaw this procedure while protecting a woman's

Four lives inextricably linked one year after OKC bombing Victim's mother, firefighter, photographers bound in one moment of tragedy

By JULIA PRODIS **Associated Press Writer** OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - A figure rushed out of the rubble of the federal building. "I have a critical infant! I have a critical infant!" He thrust the baby into the arms of

firefighter Chris Fields. Blood and dust covered the baby's head, her yellow undershirt and little white socks. It was a girl, a toddler not much younger than Chris's own

He checked for a pulse on the soft flesh under the baby's arm. Nothing. He listened for some sound of life, leaning so close his red helmet grazed the child's forehead. Nothing. He brushed his cheek against the baby's gray lips, hoping to sense even the softest of breaths. Nothing.

He pulled back a bit and gazed at the dead child cradled in his arms. This is somebody's baby, he thought. And if nothing else happens this day, somebody's baby has died.

At this very moment, two amateur photographers, standing just three feet apart but unaware of each other, focused their cameras and clicked.

Within hours, the image seared into the world's consciousness. Like famous photographs before it - the girl weeping over a body at Kent State, the lone protester defying a tank in Tiananmen Square - the photo defined a monumental moment in history. A moment one year ago, on April 19, 1995, when an act of domestic terrorism killed 169 people in the American heartland.

The photograph also inextricably linked the lives of the fireman, the two photographers and the baby's mother. And it changed each of them, in different ways, forever.

Each one has the picture, and where each one keeps it is revealing.

The mother, Aren Almon, keeps a poster-size painting of the image in a bedroom she has turned into a shrine to her dead daughter. It looms over the room like it does her life.

Firefighter Fields keeps a life-size version he received from a wellwisher tucked in the back of a coat closet behind a jumble of old shoes.

Charles Porter IV, a bank employee who sold his photo to The Associated Press, keeps his negative in a safe deposit box.

Lester "Bob" LaRue, a gas company worker whose photo appeared on the cover of Newsweek, has entrusted his negatives to lawyers.

LOSING CONTROL

Aren Almon awoke and rubbed her eyes, puffy and red from crying. It was morning in her grandmother's house the day after her baby was killed, and overnight, the lively 22-year-old with sparkling blue eyes and an athletic figure had turned

sallow and frail. Her own apartment, a block from the federal building, was filled with shattered glass. The blast had blown everything from the walls except the portraits of her baby.

Aren wandered into her grandmother's living room and picked up the Daily Oklahoman. There, on the front page, was a photograph of a firefighter holding a limp child. Much of the child's face was obscured, but she knew just the same. It was Baylee, who had just turned 1.

It was a sight she had avoided the day before, at St. Anthony's Hospital, when she asked her father to identify the body. Here it was on the front page of her local paper.

She collapsed on the couch. Her parents rushed to her side and sobbed

She sat up and looked again at the

omething soothing about it. The firefighter looked at Baylee so tenderly, held her so gently in his strong hands.

Aren needed someone strong, too. She couldn't count on the child's father, a summer love two years ago. They met at the Oklahoma State Fair. She was swinging on the Pirate Ship ride when she spotted the young, handsome Marine. A few months later, what she thought was an

appendicitis was a pregnancy.
"Thanks for trapping me!" he said when she called to tell him. "You're welcome!" she retorted

and hung up. He left town and she gave birth to Baylee alone.

Aren put the newspaper down and took a deep breath.

By mid-morning, the phone was ringing non-stop. Reporters from everywhere wanted interviews.

A local TV station arranged for Aren to meet the firefighter, an emotional meeting perfect for the evening news.

"Thank you," was about all she could say to Chris before breaking down

"If you need anything," he said, just call and I'll help.

Five days later, as her limo pulled away from the cemetery, she saw Chris and his wife through the window. Stop, she told the driver. She jumped out and hugged him. Chris made his promise again.

One night, when her sorrow was too great to bear, she called him. He rushed over to the hotel where she was staying, still wearing a baseball uniform from an intramural game. She collapsed in his arms as her parents stood in the

doorway, watching and weeping.
In the weeks and months to follow, Aren called Chris two or three times a week. The fire station dispatcher came to recognize her voice.

When Chris dropped by to check on her, he often would find her listless, medicated with prescription drugs for depression, anxiety and insomnia.

Aren found comfort in condolence letters. Many were addressed only to the mother of the baby in the firefighter's arms." More than 2,000 poured in from as far away as England, Australia and Guam. Some included poetry and Scripture, but nearly all contained money - more than \$50,000

She spent her days writing thank-you notes and was grateful to be busy. But sne tell out of control living in the hotel where nothing around her belonged to her, and where her parents, also displaced by the bombing, lived in the

adjoining suite. The money gave her the chance to take control of her life. With it, she paid cash for a \$28,000 house and a \$24,000 purple Ford Explorer. A two-door, she decided; four doors are for mothers.

She joined a gym and kept regular appointments at a tanning booth and manicurist. She went back to work for

a few days, but found she wasn't ready. She needed more time to grieve, to pull her life back together.

Every time she thought she could forget for just a day, just an hour, reporters called for her reaction to new developments in the case. And she could never escape the photograph. It was on magazine covers in grocery stores, on plaster statues in Fourth of July festival souvenir stands, on commemorative coins,

lapel pins, even phone calling cards. She had gladly granted some interviews and even given her blessing for some uses of the photograph, but now everything was reeling out of control. The photograph of her child was coming to symbolize the tragedy, and both she

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starting to resent it.

Aren isn't the only one who lost a child in bombing, she heard one woman say on TV. Why should Aren get all the publicity - and most of the donations?

At a gathering of victims' relatives, the mother of another dead child turned to Aren and said, "We don't have to write as many thank-you notes as you do."

had died in a car accident. At least there wouldn't be all this resentment, all this publicity.

Sleep became her sanctuary. Even the nightmares about someone stealing Baylee's coffin from the cemetery were better than missing Baylee when she was awake.

She doubled her medication seven bottles of pills and inhalers MONEY TALKS lined her nightstand. The drugs were making her paranoid, her parents thought. One night, she called 911 three times when she thought she heard a prowler outside.

One evening, she turned on the TV news and saw the picture again - this

photo, closer this time. There was and other victims' families were time on the front of a T-shirt. She grabbed her purse, jumped in her car and headed straight for the T-shirt shop. She pulled one off the rack and was sickened. The transferred image on the cotton shirt made the blood on Baylee's head appear all the more

She could just imagine it: 10 years from now seeing someone on the street wearing a faded shirt with a picture of her dead baby on it.

She went to the front counter, shirt Sometimes, Aren wished Baylee in hand, and demanded they be removed from the racks.

The store owner went to the back office and called the man who had made the shirts - the photographer, Lester LaRue. Then the owner walked back to the counter and told Aren: Lester wants to talk to you. He's on

Through the viewfinder he kept pressed to his face, Lester witnessed the entire tragedy. He saw the dazed, bloody victims with shrapnel wounds weaving down the streets of shattered glass, but he refrained from taking their pictures.

It was an issue of respect. He didn't want to invade their privacy and exploit their suffering. Instead, he took photos of the gaping federal building, firefighters putting out car fires, rescue workers setting up triage

Suddenly, in his viewfinder, a policeman handed a child to a fireman. As the fireman gazed down at the child, Lester took the picture.

It was the kind of intrusive picture he had been avoiding, but the amateur photographer's instincts took over. The image was imprinted on his mind as much as on the film. He was still thinking about it when he picked up his developed film at Moto-Photo that afternoon.


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
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

The next morning, he picked up the newspaper and saw what looked like his photo on page one. It was sharper than his. He hadn't even realized another photographer had been there!

Hours later, the Moto-Photo clerk called and said Newsweek wanted to see his negatives.

Newsweek? Until now, the only publication that cared about Lester's photos was the company newsletter, 'The Gasette.'

Starstruck, he sent them. All of

A few days later, the Monday that Baylee was buried, Lester's photo appeared on the cover of Newsweek. "I was probably talked into it."

he says now. He won't say what he was paid, but it was a lot more than the \$20 or \$40 he had won from the Ponca City Art Association photo contest for his picture of robins nesting in a pipeline.

Once the magazine hit the stands, the thin 57-year-old with the weathered face and military bearing became an instant celebrity. Co-workers seeking autographs crowded into his office with copies of the magazine.

Laid out before him was his single greatest achievement, but Lester could barely look at it. He was at once proud and ashamed. He signed every magazine cover in the lower right-hand corner, while covering the rest with his left hand.

For a while, he worried his picture might be upsetting the baby's mother. A couple of weeks after the bombing, he saw Aren on the evening news saying she was proud her daughter had come to symbolize the innocence of the victims.

Permission granted, Lester thought to himself. He started making deals.

A photo distribution company wanted to market the picture to other publications. Why not? A company wanted to sell 18-inch statues of the image. Done. His wife suggested T-shirts, with some of the profit going toward a downtown statue of the image. Sure.

The T-shirts had been in the store only a few days when the shop owner called. The baby's mother is here, he said, and she's livid.

Lester had been trying for weeks to reach her. He wanted to offer to pay for Baylee's funeral, or at least the headstone, but couldn't find out where Aren was staying.

He hung up, jumped in his van and raced to the store. When he got there, Aren was gone. When Lester finally saw her, it was on TV. She was complaining bitterly about Lester making money off her tragedy.

Gas company executives thought the controversy was bad for public relations, and they let Lester know it. What kind of unethical, immoral profiteer was he?

Lester was shocked. He had done a good job for this company for 32 years and now they were making him out to be a crook.

At 10 a.m. on Sept. 6, the boss dropped a document on Lester's desk and gave him a choice. Sign over the photo rights to the company, which would give all the money to charity, or get fired.

IT'S NOT MY FAULT

"How much do you want for these?" the Oklahoma City bureau chief of The Associated Press asked Charles Porter

It was less than three hours after the bombing, and the 25-year-old credit specialist had just picked up his photos from Wal-Mart. He hadn't realized what he had until the clerk at the photo counter shuffled through them, stopped

at the same one, recognizing its compelling news value. And that's when he brought up money.

No one had ever offered to pay Charles for his pictures before. Sure, he was pretty proud of some of the photos he had taken of the Bullnanza Rodeo at the Lazy E Arena, but that was just for fun.

Hours after the photo moved across the AP circuits, magazines, foreign publications and photo-marketing

companies were calling asking for rights. The baby-faced young man with the round, wire-rimmed glasses and straight, straw-colored hair didn't even know what that meant.

He was so overwhelmed that for a moment, he wished he had never taken that "stupid photo."

The next morning, he called two people: His lawyer and his minister.

Charles wasn't making much at the bank. His wife, Sherylynn, a piano teacher, didn't make much either. Their duplex was awfully small. Maybe this photo was their ticket. Finding opportunity in the tragedy of another made him uneasy.

God put you there with a camera for a reason, his pastor told him.

Perhaps some good will come of this.
Offers flooded in. Precious Moments wanted licensing rights for a figurine. A businessman wanted to make a commemorative coin. Another company proposed a calling

"People called thinking I was some hick they could take advantage of," Charles says now. He told them to call his lawyer to work out the

Sometimes, he called Aren to get her permission. Sometimes, he didn't. His face reddens when asked why. It's not his fault, he says. It's the companies. They promised to call

Aren and didn't. When the merchandise made its appearance, Charles started getting calls - angry people haranguing him about "blood money" and "profiteering." He never solicited anything,

he says now, the veins standing out

in his neck. "I haven't called a soul." He didn't ask to be nominated for a Pulitzer Prize, either. And he didn't seek the prestigious British Picture Editors Award. They called him, offered an all-expenses paid trip to London with his wife to pick up his

London! Charles had never been farther east than Arkansas.

How did you get an invitation into the Lord Mayor's mansion? the cabbie taking them back to the hotel wondered.

"Oh, my God," he said when Charles explained. "So you're the famous photographer."

When Charles got back to his bank job, his co-workers were talking behind his back. How much company time was he taking to collect awards and give speeches at a legislators forum in Tulsa, a bankers convention in San Francisco?

FRIENDSHIP AND DUTY

Capt. Chris Fields cringed when ne neard the oiting remarks. It was just a couple of guys from another fire station he didn't get along with

anyway, but it hurt just the same. "I did more rescues than he did,"

one fellow firefighter grumbled. It was Chris, not him, who got to have breakfast with Tom Brokaw and Barbara Walters, be on a first-name basis with the governor's wife and get free trips to New York and Los

Angeles for TV interviews. Chris was even invited to be grand marshal of a parade in the little town of Washington, N.C., where the Washington Daily News ran the photograph on page one for three weeks as part of a fund-raising

campaign for the bombing victims. Chris had not been aware of anyone taking his picture when he held Baylee in his arms. He first found out about it that night when a London newspaper called the fire department for help in identifying the

firefighter in the picture. Chris's first thought, when he saw the photograph on the front page of his newspaper the next morning, was for the baby's family. I hope, he said

firefighter, but reporters from around the world tracked him down that morning, calling for interviews and knocking on the station house door.

Chris had heard of firefighters who started believing their publicity. They were called heroes, supermen, for a little while. And then the attention would go away. Chris knew the story

of one fireman who had rescued a baby trapped in a Texas well and committed suicide years later when the publicity faded.

He was determined from the start that the publicity would not change him. No way. He was a good firefighter, husband and father and

nothing was going to change that. He couldn't think of himself as a hero either. How could he? Other firefighters had saved lives in the rubble of the federal building. Every victim Chris touched that day was already dead.

Chris, 31, was an extrovert, the station house clown, so the media spotlight didn't unnerve him. What terrified him was the prospect of meeting the baby's mother. Would she want him to tell her details about her baby's death? Would she just want to talk? How would he handle her tears?

As the last person to hold Baylee, Chris knew how important he was to the baby's mother. He considered it his duty to comfort and protect her.

When she was vilified on the TV news by resentful bombing victims, he defended her. When she wanted to stop the merchandising of the photo, he recommended a lawyer.

Through the weeks and months of phone calls and visits, duty turned to friendship. At first, he just held her have one," he says.

while she cried. Later, they didn't even talk about the bombing anymore. They just talked about

everyday things.

They also did a lot of interviews together. The press seemed to like them side by side.

A request from a British tabloid seemed no different until the reporter started getting personal. How often did they talk on the phone? Did Chris go to her house often? What did Chris's wife think about the time they were spending together?

Their fears were confirmed when the photographer asked them to kiss. They refused. It was too late. Soon, tabloid reporters and photographers were at Chris's house, asking his wife, Sherry, to pose alone.

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Fate brought Charles, Lester, Chris and Aren together. But once the picture was taken, each of them chose different path.

Charles Porter is still working at the bank, but he's not content there anymore. He longs to be a full-time photographer. He's getting paid for taking pictures of the Bullnanza Rodeo now, but he's still waiting for an offer from some big news organization.

What are his credentials? "I only

Lester LaRue refused to sign the rights to his photo over to the gas company. "It's my picture," he figured, "and I should decide what to do with it."

So his bosses confiscated his company credit card and car keys and showed him the door. Thirty-two years of loyal service had come to nothing but a silent drive home with a co-worker. All the way home, Lester's head was filled with a numbing roar.

Lester is suing the company for wrongful termination. While waiting for the case to come to trial, he spends his days making cabinets in his garage.

Chris Fields got the police to run the British reporters off his front lawn. He and Aren are still friends. When she telephones and Chris isn't home, his wife takes the messages and reminds him to call her back.

Chris is still giving interviews, but figures his celebrity will soon pass.
"If it doesn't," he says, "I'll just keep representing the Oklahoma City

Fire Department. Aren plunged into a deep depression over the holidays. Two days after the new year, she couldn't stop crying. based in Dallas.

She gulped her medication, but it didn't stop her from sobbing through her manicure in the morning and at her parents' barber shop in the afternoon. That night, she cried herself to sleep.

When she awoke the next morni her face stained by tears, she gathered up the white plastic bottles cluttering her nightstand and threw them away.

She has hired a lawyer to try to gain some control over the merchan of the photo and preserve the dignity of Baylee's memory. She plans to keep vigil at the bombing trial in Denver.

Aren wants to have another baby and has asked several doctors about artificial insemination. They have told her she's not ready.

"I'm trying to replace some of the love I have for her," she says, "I miss being a mom."

Someday, she says, she will be strong enough to put away her daughter's toys and take down the giant painting done from the photograph of Chris and Baylee.





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Houston tries to lure tennis events

Houston Chronicle HOUSTON - So you've had that listless feeling lately? Lying awake at night? Counting fuzzy yellow balls as they cross the net in an effort to lull yourself asleep?

You're not the only one. Sports enthusiasts in Houston have been suffering from tennis withdrawal. Right about now, Westside Tennis Club should be crowning women's champion. Steffi Graf should be testing her injured foot in Houston. Jennifer Capriati should be including Westside on her comeback tour.

But that's not going to happen this

For the first time since the birth of the women's tour in Houston in 1970. there will be no tour event in town. Even worse, there's no tour event anywhere in the state of Texas, a state that once boasted a men's ATP event in Dallas and women's tournaments in San Antonio and Houston.

"It's really a shame," said Terry St. John, who has been involved in promoting tennis in Houston since the first Virginia Slims of Houston in 1970. "there's just not all the money pouring in like there used to be and

Plano golf pro Weibring deals with Bell's palsy

PLANO, Texas - Golf's most infamous hole has never kept D.A. Weibring away from the Players Championship. Nor have gale-force winds, waste bunkers or any of the other instruments of torture scattered around the TPC at Sawgrass' Stadium Course.

But what the island 17th and the rest of Pete Dye's most diabolical design could not do, Bell's palsy has

Weibring has gone to the event in Ponte Vedra Beach, Fla, every year since 1979, finishing second to Calvin Peete in 1985. But he spent last week at home in Plano, where he continues to be sidelined by the mysterious neurological ailment that struck one month ago, leaving the

right side of his face paralyzed.
"I'm really disappointed,"
Weibring said. "I really wanted to get back for the Players Championship. It's one of my favorite tournaments. It's the best field in golf, and I've had some success there. I really want to be there. But I've got to keep being

Weibring said he has made some progress in the last two weeks. He is making plans to begin his comeback in two weeks at the Masters. But he's still battling the condition that descended on the heels of a case of walking pneumonia, which forced him to withdraw from two West Coast events in February.

"I'm making progress, but I'm not there yet," Weibring said. "My mouth is reasonably normal, but there's still a slight twist to the left. I'm able to close my right eyelid, but I'm still not blinking. The doctor took me off the steroids he had me on, and it's sort of like taking the batteries out of my body. I felt real rundown over the weekend, so I didn't do much."

Weibring has played only nine holes since late February, and he was discouraged after that experience. He began hitting practice balls two weekends ago, under the supervision of Royal Oaks pro Randy Smith.

Balance was a problem initially, but he has felt better lately. His biggest trouble lately has come from blurred vision.

When Weibring hits full shots, he doesn't always pick them up in flight. He has trouble lining up putts.

"I've still got some soreness in the cheekbone, which might be affecting the muscles that move the eyes,"
Weibring said. "Everybody says the
eye is always the last thing to clear
up. The good thing is, I see improvement. I've still got a long way to go."

Weibring, 42, is coming off one of the best years of his 21-year pro career. He won the Quad City Classic last year, and finished second in the GTE Byron Nelson Classic and third in the Colonial. He had four top-10 finishes in 24 starts, and ended the season 36th on the money list. So far this year he's 133rd in earnings, having played only the Mercedes Championships on Jan. 4-7.

Weibring refuses to feel sorry for himself. He has gotten to spend more time than usual with his wife, Kristy, and their three children. He's put in unexpected hours on a course he designed that is under construction in Flower Mound. And he's found out

how many people care about him.
"I've heard from a lot of people,"
Weibring said. "The response I've
gotten is unbelievable. Friends keep
calling and I've gotten lots of letters of support from people with similar experiences, suggesting things. It is touching. It really is."

we don't have a promoter here. I know that hurts.

But it's surprising for a city that has traditionally supported the sport.
Due to the moderate winter temperatures, Texas, like Florida and Southern California, has been a prime spot for athletes to train. One of the premier schools for developing talent, John Newcombe's Tennis Ranch, is just up the road in New Braunfels.

Zina Garrison-Jackson, Lori McNeil and Richey Reneberg were all raised on the courts of Houston. Pro Katrina Adams, a Chicagoan, now lives and trains in Houston.

Billie Jean King chose Houston as the site for her infamous "Battle of the Sexes" competition against Bobby Riggs in 1973. A handful of renegade women chose Houston as the site of their rebellion that led to the Virginia Slims pro circuit.

And Texans hope that pro tennis isn't just in their past. International Management Group plans to bring an event back to town next year, though it will be an exhibition rather than a

Westside Tennis Club, however, hopes to lure the ATP or WTA back to town. Jim "Mattress Mac" McIngvale and his wife, Linda, bought Westside last year with plans to turn it into a world-class facility. They are in the process of adding all professional surfaces. They brought in a French company to build authentic red clay courts similar to the ones used at the French Open. They brought in authorities from the Queens Club in London to consult on the building of grass courts.

"By the end of the summer, we expect to have all four Grand Slam surfaces," said Linda McIngvale, who is managing the tennis club. "Tennis was very popular 20 years ago, but a lot of clubs haven't done anything to update anything in the last 20 years.'

Last year, McIngvale's company, Gallery Furniture, bailed out the Houston Women's Championships at the last minute when it was without a title sponsor. It was that experience that prompted him to try to revive the sport in Houston.

'We've had some conversations with the ATP," Linda McIngvale said. "I think we'll get an event here not in '96, but I think we'll eventually get one. We'd ideally like to get two major events here each year, one men and one women, with

The McIngvales are less thrilled with the idea of reviving the IMG exhibition, which was formerly the Houston Women's Championships until that event was taken off the WTA calendar.

"We would prefer to bring a competitive ATP or WTA Tour event'," Linda McInvgale said. "Last year, we didn't really understand the difference. But now we feel people are more interested in a real points tournament, not an exhibition. We've discussed it (with IMG), but we haven't finalized anything. We're not going to commit to anything until we know we can't do (a WTA or ATP event) and right now we think we can."

The McInvgales are preparing to put in a bid for the Family Circle Cup, which currently is held at Hilton Head Island in South Carolina. The tournament owners are accepting bids to move the tournament for the 1997 season. That tournament is one of the premier clay court women's events in the United States. Many of the top players use it as a tune-up for the European circuit.

"They don't think they're getting what they want out of Hilton Head, so they're accepting bids," Linda McIngvale said. 'We're going to be one of the facilities to put a bid in."

The McIngvales also are bidding for the Davis Cup final that will be held in the United States next fall provided the U.S. team reaches the final.

"The USTA called us and asked us if we'd like to be involved in the bidding process," McIngvale said. "Our indoor facility will be able to seat 5,000. And the USTA feels we'd do a great job of promoting it. You know how Mac is about promotion."

Westside does have one new event already signed on the dotted line. It has contracted with Jimmy Connors to bring his Champions Tour to Westside in October. Besides Connors, Bjorn Borg, John McEnroe and other former champions regularly compete in that circuit.

Westside also will again host the women's Legends tournament May 17-19. That tournament regularly features such former greats as Chris Evert, Martina Navratilova, Billie Jean King and Rosie Casals. Evert, however, will not be at the May event.

And while it will take time for many of the McIngvales' plans to become reality, there is still plenty of tennis being played around town now. Houston

and future ATP pros.
Houston also hosts The Coca-Cola Open, believed to be the largest amateur competition on American soil. The Girls 16 Indoors, one of the four premier 16s events each year, is hosted by Chancellors Racquet club and the Senior Women's Clay Court Championships make their home at the Houston Racquet Club.

"On the participatory, grass-roots level, enthusiasm has never waned," St. John said. "The Houston Tennis Association has grown. Levels tournaments and other amateur tournaments have grown. The large contributors have fallen off as far as title sponsors, but we're getting a lot of middle-level contributors to support the sport."

The senior women's tournament has been in Houston since 1971. It is the only senior event with all five age divisions and is considered the world's premier event for players 35 and older.

'There are a lot of ex-Wimbledon and U.S. Open players there," St. John said. "If anybody wants to see really good players, ex-tour players,

they're still playing in Houston." The Coca-Cola Open has been played under different names and sponsors, but has been in Houston since the 1960s.

"This is a sport that provides great exercise and is a lot of fun," Linda McIngvale said. "There's a lot of people out there who used to play the sport and this is a great city for it. We want to help get people excited about tennis again.

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


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Ex-Longhorn track star has overcome hard life

asleep in her crib, all alone, when her father came home on that December night in 1966.

Everyone said Johnny Jones was a loving man, a gifted artist - and definitely wrapped around his 13-month-old daughter's long, lean baby fingers.

The U.S. Army recently had discharged Johnny Jones because of knee injuries. It was a race-charged, tension-filled winter of 1966.

He was 21, married and living in a two-room Third Ward apartment. find a job, and Christmas was around the corner.

"I've been told that he used to always draw pictures of me," Jolanda Jones said. "He used to take me everywhere he went. Apparently, he adored me." But on that fateful December

night, something led Johnny Jones to walk up to the side of his daughter's crib, draw a pistol to the side of his head and pull the trigger. He did not leave a note. Many in the family believe that before pulling

the trigger, Jones woke his daughter and spoke a few words to her. "My mother said that for months after that night, whenever I heard people talking about my father, I would point my finger to my head and say, 'Daddy go bang-bang,'" Jones said. "So I had to be awake.

Evidently, I saw him do it. "I like to think that maybe he said something to me, maybe he told me

that he loved me, before he did it." When the shot was fired, Jones' mother, Gwendolyn, who was nearby, rushed to the room. She found her baby daughter crying, spattered with blood, and her husband dying on the

An uncle and Johnny Jones' mother, who lived in the same fourplex, hurried to the apartment. They called authorities but were told ambulances would not come into the tough Third Ward neighborhood at that hour of night.

The frantic family then hurriedly wrapped Johnny Jones into their arms and began driving to Ben Taub emergency room, Johnny Jones took his last breath.

"I don't know how many times I thought, 'If you loved me so much, Daddy, and I was the last thing you wanted to see, then why did you abandon me?" Jones said. "I just always wondered. I always thought about him. 'Why did you do it? What did you say to me?"

But she never found the answers. Even as Jones was becoming one of the greatest all-around woman athletes in the history of Texas sports, she wondered.

Often, Jones contemplated being put under hypnosis and attempting to return subconsciously to that fateful December night. But always, she here."

"Everyone thought I had this great HOUSTON - Jolanda Jones was life because I made straight A's and leep in her crib, all alone, when her was good in sports," Jones said. "But I was miserable. Just misera-

> She never looked it. Wrapped in a track uniform, she

was a kind of mythical, magical athlete like few had seen.

But he was out of work and out of cleverly avoided having friends over to her house, because often there was no electricity or water there.

"I would make up all kinds of reasons not to come to my house," Jones said.

She told no one that she often despised her mother, because since He couldn't make a dollar, couldn't Gwendolyn Jones worked long hours at the post office, it was Jolanda who had to feed, clothe and tutor four brothers and sisters from her mother's second marriage.

Instead, Jones smiled for the teachers and yearbook photographers, eventually even earning a few modeling jobs and becoming one of the most popular girls on campus.

As a senior at Elsik High School in 1984, Jones not only graduated with a 3.83 grade-point average and established a Class 5A record for the high jump (6-1 1/2) that still stands, she single-handedly accounted for Elsik winning the state high school team championship by scoring 38

She went on to a dominating career at the University of Houston, winning an unprecedented three NCAA heptathlon titles in four years and graduating magna cum laude.

She qualified for the Olympic Trials as a teen-ager. She competed at the World University Games, Goodwill⁴ Games, Pan American Games and even had a "Jolanda Jones Day" in Houston in 1987.

But over and over again, as she was taking her place on medal platforms everywhere, showered with accolades and applause, she was looking for

"Nothing I did mattered unless someone told me that I did good," Jones said. "You would think that with the accomplishments I had, I wouldn't need approval from anybody. But that's all I ever wanted.'

It has taken 30 years. It has taken 30 years of trying to Hospital. But before reaching the properly stow away the mystery and circumstance of her father's death.

It has taken all these years to come clean publicly about sneaking to gas stations and filling milk jugs with water, or lighting candles around the house. because the bills weren't paid.

One of the 10 or 12 apartments the family rented during her high school years alone - she lost count - burned to the ground because candles started

"Growing up, I often said to myself, 'Man, it wouldn't be like this if Daddy was here," Jones said. "We were a landlord's worst nightmare. And my mother and I didn't have the best relationship. I always thought, 'Daddy would have taken care of me if he was

There were the times when she watched other parents peel off dollar bills to pay for their kid's pizza after a track meet, while Jones avoided the embarrassment of not having enough money by saying she wasn't hungry.

"You grow up and all your friends have stuff - and most of the time, the men are the head of the household," Jones said. "Well, we never had one.

"I've never been ashamed that my father committed suicide. I love him. But I felt a lot of anger for a long time." The last few years, Jones said, she

felt the pain more directly. Caught in an abusive relationship since 1990, from which Jones had her son Jiovanni in 1991, Jones finally

filed for divorce in 1995. It also was the year she finished law school, passed the Texas bar on her first attempt and returned to the track after more than a six-year

"I went through life wanting some male to take care of me," Jones said.

"Like my father was supposed to." Now, at 30, Jones competed in her first heptathlon since 1989 last week at Texas A&M and qualified for the Olympic Trials.

More, she doesn't care if anyone

"I used to want to be perfect for my husband, but I didn't care about myself," Jones said. "I let him take my life from me. I gave up this sport and gave up my dreams.

'I lived the first 30 years of my life like that, wanting everybody else's approval. But I don't play that game anymore."

She still thinks about her father.

"I always will," Jones says. There is a small black-and-white picture of Johnny Jones on Jolanda's desk at her downtown top-floor office at Brown, Parker & Leahy.

Occasionally, she'll pick up the picture with her long, lean fingers and look long and hard at it.

But then, she makes it clear: The second time around, the international track and field world belongs only to

"If I don't make the Olympic team, I won't consider myself a failure," Jones said. "If I hadn't come back, I always would have wondered, 'What if, what if.' I always would have been doing something for someone else.

"I'm not doing this for other personal. It has nothing to do with anybody."

DEAR READERS: A while back, a reader from Kelso, Wash., wrote to me extolling the virtues of her pet, an iguana. "Iggy," the reader said, "is paper-trained, has the run of the house, loves bubble baths and macaroni and cheese and sleeps with his own blanket, pillow and heating

She said she was proud to own and love "Iggy" and, if people were afraid to come and visit because of her pet, they should stay home. In spite of Kelso's glowing testimonial, I replied, "I'd rather have a cat."

I failed to appreciate the wisdom arrived a few days later. It came from Dr. Barbara A. DeBuono, commissioner of health in Albany, N.Y. Dr. DeBuono wrote, "Dear Ann

Landers: The iguana is a reptile. All reptiles carry the bacteria salmonella, which is a common cause of diarrhea, abdominal cramps and fever and can cause life-threatening infections in children, the aged and those with weakened immune systems."

I wondered, "How many people are aware of this?" I certainly wasn't.

Soon after I received Dr. DeBuono's letter, I was hit with a barrage of mail from readers in virtually every state in the union, accompanied by newspaper clippings. It seems a 3-week-old boy in South Bend, Ind., died of salmonella poisoning last October, but the cause of the child's

death was not disclosed by the board of health until recently.

Although health officials ar not

certain how the boy contracted salmonella, the most likely explanation is an iguana. The boy's parents owned an iguana as a pet, and the deadly infection was contracted soon after the boy was born. Fulton County health nurse Diane Jones said it could have been as easy as someone handling the iguana and then touching the boy. She added,"I don't know why pet stores sell these things."

Health officials say there's been a rise in the number of unusual strains of my choice until the following letter of salmonella corresponding to the reptiles, especially iguanas. People with immature or weakened immune systems, such as babies, the elderly of those with AIDS, should be aware that the bacteria can cause severe sickness, and if not treated immediately, it could be fatal.


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U.S. Border Patrol agents live in a world of their

SAN ANGELO, Texas - Theirs is a clandestine world of back roads and back alleys, shrouded by dark of night and defined by a mission.

They are the gatekeepers of U.S.

The mission is simple in concept:

To find and remove illegal aliens. A Border Patrol agent can observe a vehicle speeding through a headlight beam and know - almost know - if the driver is a smuggler and

its occupants are illegal aliens. An agent can hunt down an illegal immigrant desperate enough to walk for days through mesquite brambles and 100-degree heat for a subminimum wage job.

An agent can spot a false identification card instantly, can tell a tourist from an illegal after a single question, and can see through a cultural and language barrier.

They do it every day.

It's a Sunday night. Assistant Agent in Charge Jack Pool says Sunday is often the busiest night of all as illegal immigrants return from weekend excursions to their Mexico homeland.

Agents John Luck and Danny Perales are patrolling. Pool is following with two observers.

The first stop is the San Angelo bus terminal. "Three buses a day come from Del Rio," Pool says. "We catch aliens on them almost daily

Luck and Perales pull into the terminal and descend on a man at the telephone. They ask if he's a U.S. citizen. The man produces a work permit, commonly known as a green card. He's OK.

Then the pair go inside the terminal. There are several Mexican men sitting around. The agents check IDs. One man claims to have a tourist visa, but doesn't have it with him. Unfortunately for him, another man blows the cover, identifying him as a worker on a nearby ranch.

The agents take the man back to the ranch and find he has a tourist visa, but it's expired. The man is arrested and taken to the Border Patrol holding facility near Mathis

The following day this man and more than 20 other illegal immigrants aliens will be taken back to the border, compliments of a Border Patrol bus.

There are four highways the San Angelo agents commonly patrol. Normally two agents work each shift. They maintain three eight-hour shifts

This year 28 patrol agents, three anti-smuggling agents, three detention officers and one secretary run a San Angelo station responsible for 25 counties. Eleven agents are out of the office, training in California. The agents decide to patrol south on this Sunday. They check a small-town post office. Then it's off to another small town and a convenience store. The post office and store are frequent pick-up points for aliens.

"We know of a phone where they call a guide in Dallas," Pool says. "We've caught a few loads. To avoid the heavy Border Patrol presence in California and El Paso they cross at Del Rio or Comstock."

Reduce taxes with an IRA

Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) - It's not too late for a typical worker - with some spare cash - to reduce last year's tax liability by investing in a tax-deductible Individual Retirement Account.

If you qualify, you have until April 15 to make your contribution for 1995. President Clinton and members of Congress have debated expanding eligibility for IRA deductions but the improvements have fallen victim, so far, to the budget impasse.

If you or your spouse are covered by an employer's pension plan, you can take the full \$2,000 IRA deduction so long as your adjusted gross income income is no more than \$40,000 (married filing jointly) and

\$25,000 (single).

The deduction is phased out until it disappears altogether for employees with incomes of \$50,000 (married filing jointly) and \$35,000 (single).

Employees with no retirement plan at work automatically qualify for the full deduction. But, even if only one spouse is covered by a company pension, that limits the deductible

contributions of both. Partial deductions are equal to 20 percent of the difference between your income and the upper limit for your filing status. For instance, a married couple earning \$45,000 is eligible for a \$1,000 deduction - 20

"It seems to be the goal of aliens to get through us and get to Dallas where they can go anywhere," Pool says. "Most work here for six months to a year, then go back to their family and come back the next year."

Pool is seeing a new, younger

generation of illegal immigrants who seem more apt to bring their families

and become permanent residents.
"It used to be single males, transient workers," he says. "Now the breadwinner comes over, then pays a smuggler to bring family members over. They intend to stay here. That's the big difference over the last 20

language skills and 24-hour availability.
Not long ago, a half dozen aliens
embarked on a burglary spree, breaking

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
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
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

They instantly spot two illegal immigrants, apparently waiting for a late-night bus. The agents check them for weapons. These two seem to have a good grasp of English and are familiar with immigration laws, a sign they might be guides.

One of them is carrying a woman's Social Security card and ID, possibly of a girlfriend.
"I bet they have a group hidden

around here somewhere," Luck says. He searches a patch of tall grass and you'll hear the neighbors' dogs

inspects a nearby Dumpster to no avail.
"Those two are probably guides,"

Pool says. "They have a lot of stuff and they're from two different parts Pool patrols another familiar grassy

area, shining a large search light across the dry pastureland. He points out a fence, sagging from the number of people who have climbed through it. The agent drives slowly with his windows down. "If they're out there,

bark," he explains.

Luck and Perales take the two aliens to the nearby county jail. When their shift ends at midnight they'll take the pair back to San Angelo for processing, then on to the Del Rio bridge the next day.

Illegal immigrants have the right to request a hearing before an immigration judge. But that almost never happens. Most choose to be taken back to the border, where they often try to cross again.

Their vehicles are seized and sold by federal marshals at auction. Oftentimes alien smugglers purchase the vehicles, Pool says.

Sometime past 1 a.m., back in San Angelo, the agents will take a closer look at the alleged guides, checking for prison tattoos. There will be none.

Like all apprehended aliens, their names and other identifying information, including a computer image of their fingerprints, are entered into a national computer

The agents are surprised at the heavy traffic so late at night. They stop more than a dozen vehicles. The green-uniformed agents work like artists deciding which vehicles to

They choose to stop a large sedan because it's an older model car and is a little erratic on the road - a sign it could be loaded with people.

The agents' hunch proves valid -

the car's license plates are from Coahuila. The officers ask each passenger if they are U.S. citizens and ake a look at their IDs. They're legal.

A pickup with a camper is the next vehicle stopped. A vehicle check reveals the owner purchased the truck in Mount Pleasant east of Dallas, the most popular staging area for illegals.

After several more stops, the agents find a convenient place to park their cruisers where each passing vehicle must pass through their headlight beams.

"After a while you can tell when the car motor is laboring, and see when a car is close to the ground," Luck explains. "They're also all over the road."

With so few agents servicing such a sprawling area around the clock, the Border Patrol only disperses two agents per shift. That means they only patrol one of four well-traveled roadways at any given time.
"It's hit or miss," Pool says.
Border Patrol intelligence officers

gather information for the interior agents to help them decide which roads to patrol. But the enemy does the same thing.

Some alien smuggling rings include intelligence gatherers who pass along news stories about the Border Patrol and keep track of where agents patrol each night.

A big part of an agent's life is getting to know the terrain and using nature to his advantage. Pool says on a night when the moon is full, illegal immigrants will walk all night long.

As sun rays filter through a maze of dust, the future seems cloudy. Every agent wonders where he'll end up when the Immigration and Naturalization Service makes its decisions around mid-April about reshuffling agents. "I've been pleased with the

community support," Pool says. "Everything hinges on, 'Will the INS be able to provide the same service to the community (if agents are moved out of San Angelo)?" "There's a lot of speculation about

where we'll end up, what benefits we'll have," he says. "We hope to have some choice in the matter. 'One thing about it, I've seen

Standing alongside the highway, the pair of West Texas gatekeepers keep holding the line, and keep wondering if the sun is about to set on this second line of defense.

Pool and the other agents hope not. It's a beautiful night. A crescent moon hangs among a sea of stars.

The agents take the time to watch a clearly visible Comet Hyakutake stretch across the night sky into the unknown.

percent of the \$5,000 difference between \$45,000 and \$50,000.

When calculating a partial deduction, round it up to the next \$10. However, couples earning between \$49,000 and \$50,000 and single people between \$34,000 and \$35,000 can take a \$200 deduction.

Keep in mind, you generally can't contribute more than you earn. There's an exception for non-working spouses. In that case, a couple can establish two IRAs and contribute a combined total of \$2,250. The contribution can be split up in any way the couple desires so long as the larger contribution doesn't exceed \$2,000.

If both spouses have at least \$2,000 income, they each can contribute up to \$2,000 provided their combined income falls below the \$40,000 limit.

But even if you don't qualify for a deductible contribution, it may be worth your while to make a non-deductible contribution of up to \$2,000. That's because IRA earnings aren't taxed until they're withdrawn and that can represent a significant savings in the long run.

The first principle of investing in an IRA is never put in money you think you will need before retirement. There's a 10 percent additional tax for withdrawing funds before you reach the age of 59-1/2.

In general, contributions must stop and withdrawals must start when you reach age 70-1/2.

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


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
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


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

Arcane tax rules can complicate divorces

Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) - Life's messy enough for people going through divorce without the tax complications it can bring.

But, at the very time most people have their minds on other things, they must spend time and energy figuring out arcane tax rules. And, at the very time two spouses may not even be speaking civilly, they may need to cooperate to minimize their tax bills.

Divorced and separated people at least should review the rules in IRS Publication 504 before making such decisions as the timing of their divorce, custody and support arrangements and - for women whether to resume using their maiden

For instance, alimony is deductible for the payer and taxable for the recipient. Child support isn't deductible and it isn't taxable. So, it's better to pay alimony and better to receive child support.

Also, women who want to resume using their maiden name should get a new Social Security card. They should use their married name on tax documents until then.

Another consideration is filing status. A married couple usually pays more tax than they would if each spouse were single. So, if you have a choice of whether to get divorced in December or January, you may want to choose December.

That's because if you were divorced or legally separated under a court-approved decree of separate maintenance on the last day of the year, you're considered unmarried for the whole year.

There's a narrow exception. You can't divorce in one year and remarry the same person in the next simply to lower your tax bill. The IRS will consider you to be married the entire

As a divorced or legally separated person, your filing status will be either single or - if you qualify - head of household. Head of household status is for péople providing a home for children or another qualifying person. It has a lower tax rate and a higher standard deduction.

If you're planning a divorce but still living together, or living apart without a court-approved decree of separate maintenance, then you're married for tax purposes. Almostdivorced isn't good enough for the

Your filing status choices generally are married or married filing separately. However, you may be able to claim head of household status if you lived apart from your spouse for the last six months of the

Married-joint status generally, but not always, is preferable to married-filing-separately status, which limits many tax breaks. You may want to figure your tax both ways. In a few cases - if one spouse has high medical bills, for instance it may make sense to file separately.

But, the danger with married status is that each person who signs the return is responsible for the entire tax liability. If there's a problem later, and you're audited, the IRS can come after you for back taxes your spouse should have paid. With married filing separately, you're responsible only for your own tax.

In a rule new this year, the IRS at least promises to keep each spouse informed of its efforts to collect jointly owed taxes from the other spouse.

If you and your spouse use the married-filing-separately status, you can change your mind later and file jointly using an amended return, Form 1040X. But it doesn't work in reverse. If you file jointly, you can't change your mind later and file separately.

To qualify for head of household status, whether married or unmarried, you must pay more than half the cost of keeping up a home for yourself and your unmarried child (or other qualifying person who usually must be your dependent). The child or other person must live with you for more than half the year, unless the person is your parent. There's another rule for divorces before 1985.

A child can qualify only one parent for head-of-household status. The parent with custody gets to claim the

status. In cases of joint custody, the parent who has custody for the greater part of the year - even if for only one day longer than the other parent - is considered the custodial parent for tax purposes.

If each divorced spouse is the custodial parent of a child, then both can claim head of household status.

The principle is the same for other tax benefits aimed at households with children: the dependent exemption, the earned income tax credit, the child and dependent care credit.

ROME (AP) - It's back to the future for fashion in 1996, with Italian designers taking a new look at the mod styles of the 1950s and 1960s for their spring-summer collections.

Sometimes feminine, often funky, the oldies but goodies will all return shifts, shirtwaists, caftans, hip-huggers and hot pants.

These styles are updated mainly through technologically advanced fabrics - combinations of synthetics and silks, which create new textures.

The most futuristic is the super-stretch lurex in shimmering shades, which will positively blaze

in the summer sun. Just like in the heydays of Audrey Hepburn and Jacqueline Kennedy, Brigitte Bardot and Marilyn Monroe, Bob Dylan and the Beatles, the look is a combination of top-drawer chic

and counter-culture cool. Neat little suits with short belted jackets and proper mid-knee hemlines, country club shirt dresses and polo shirts will share the closet with bell-bottoms and wide-lapeled pantsuits, cropped lurex T-shirts,

caftans and pedal pushers. Waistlines are either demurely cinched, dropped or bared to hug the hip and reveal the navel.

1996 marks the year of the bejeweled belly button, a fad started by Naomi Campbell during the spring-summer showings in Milan last October.

Small shoulder purses, thick-heeled pumps or posh suburban footwear - loafers and buckskins and oversized plastic jewelry complete the vintage picture.

Hairdos range from the debutante page boy and ponytail to other-side-of-the-tracks wild and frizzy styles.

Speaking of debutantes, they will all be coming out again in 1996 in a series of dainty chiffon gowns and pretty floral printed petticoat dresses.

For the more aggressive set, the Italian designers unleash a myriad of spotted and striped prints. This, too, is a revival item, as are the shocking lime pink and yellow shades certainly not familiar in normally understated Milan.

The revival look when previewed in October was met with mixed reviews.

"Seeing it all over again reminded me of how awful the look was way back then," said Mary Lou Luther, a veteran U.S. fashion editor who

writes a syndicated fashion column. But the young set, which is now rediscovering the Beatles and lapping up such film favorites as "Breakfast at Tiffany's" and "Some Like It Hot" on TV, are sure to make the look their own.

Junior fashion followers have already shown their enthusiasm for past looks by snapping up all the thick-heeled 1940s pumps launched

The bad news for this spring is that curves, bosoms and bottoms are out again to return to a Twiggy ironing board silhouette. So now that the Christmas season is over, a rigorous diet is a must.

On the good side, local thrift shops are sure to have a wide selection of vintage apparel at affordable prices.

How Italian designers interpret the spring look depends largely on their trademark styles.

It is easy for Valentino, the late Jacqueline Kennedy's favorite designer, to revive the best in 1960s feminine chic. His second line Oliver collection features dainty prints, petticoat dresses and jumpsuits worn under short jackets.

Gucci, known for its classic styles, puts some new zing into a stuffy country club wardrobe. The horsy set will now sport see-through polo shirts, shirt dresses, rushes and lace for country club dinner dances.

Doing the 1960s for the first time are Milan's trendiest designers, Dolce and Gabbana, mere babes-in-arms when the Beatles first made music

Their strongest summer style is the pantsuit with low waisted bell-bottom pants and long, wide-lapeled double-breasted jacket. Ultra short shiny vinyl skirts worn with lurex T-shirts are also typical 1960s fare.

ball gowns. Gianni Versace offers the most modern version of the revival look. He does it with 1990s flair, which means gold buttons, fitted bodices and see-through skirts. At work, versatility is fine, but be aware what the boss wears

WASHINGTON (AP) - There's more versatility in office dress these days, but it's still important to watch what the boss wears, says a management specialist.

"Like it or not, we are often judged by what we wear, especially in a business setting," says Alyce Ann Bergkamp, a management organization expert at the Catholic University of America. Clothing reflects motivation, respect for the company and attitude toward

co-workers, she says.
"Each industry and company sets its own guidelines. Advertising executives and professionals in creative fields such as computer

designers and programmers have different clothing standards than corporate bankers and Wall Street traders do," Bergkamp says. She recommends taking cues from clothing styles of your supervisors; often managerial wear is connected to corporate identity.

And throttle the urge to show how creative you are by the way you dress. "If you want to impress a supervisor with creativity, don't rely on your clothing choice to do it. Show your boss your creativity through ideas and creative solutions,"she says.

If you must stray from the dress code, do so gradually, she advises. "Approach change slowly.

your column the letter from K.C., who had been told she had panic disorder. It reminded me of my own experience. I was told I had it, and went to two psychiatrists. I found out, though, that it was due to a thyroid condition. I had been on thyroid medicine for years. What I needed was an adjustment of the medicine. The gland was completely out of kilter. That was 25 years ago. I have not had a panic attack since. Please tell K.C. to check this out. -Mrs. J.C.

ANSWER: In our quest to find psychological answers for emotional changes we often overlook the physical causes. We often need to look beyond the mind to the body itself and its changing status.

You found your answer in your thyroid, and that's not surprising. I have pointed out on more than one occasion that among the many changes that occur with years are those related to medication dosages. Medication can sneak up on a person

with untoward psychological effect. Most often, it is overactivity of the gland that gets involved in things such as panic attacks. And once in a while the symptoms develop as the person's thyroid hormone dosage remains constant through times of lessening need. Usually the thyroid medication involved was for gland underactivity.

Other ills and other medications might subtly lie behind health problems of older patients.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: It seems two to seven days.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I read in the idea that we are what we eat is catching hold. Are there any foods that can prevent prostate cancer? It runs in my family. - L.H.

> ANSWER: It's a preliminary finding, but we are now told that tomatobased foods — with the inexplicable exception of tomato juice — do have some influence in preventing pros-tate cancer. In studies, it was found that to get the benefits from tomatobased dishes, the man has to eat 10 or more servings each week.

> It is always with hesitation that I offer such medical research insights. I would not go crazy about this one. I'd put more faith in regular prostate checkups, once a year after age 50.

> You also might decrease the amount of fat in your diet, for there is fairly good evidence that it predisposes a man to prostate cancer.

> Any person with a family history of cancer needs more close examination and caution.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My friends and I recently were discussing our menstrual periods. The topic was flow and what constituted normal. No one knew the answer, so we decided to turn to the oracle -you. Could a person be having abnormal flow and not realize it? - The girls.

ANSWER: The technical answer is that normal flow is about 60 milliliters - about 2 ounces. From a practical standpoint, a woman is having abnormally heavy periods if the daily flow soaks through a tampon or a full-size pad regularly for a

If abnormal flow continues, the woman should report it to her doc-

You didn't ask, but I suppose you would be interested to know that a normal menstrual period can last

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Just as a joke, I thought I'd demonstrate for my son the fine art of toe touching. I couldn't come close to save my life. Am I too old? Too out of touch? Can I regain the ability to touch my toes?

ANSWER: You're not too old. You can touch your toes, but first you have to reteach your muscles, which are too tight.

.Don't try to do the whole thing right off. Don't try to touch your toes with your knees locked. Bend them

a bit in the early going.

Here's a stretching exercise for starters: Sit on the edge of the bed, one foot on the floor, the other leg stretched out on the bed. Reach and grasp the leg on the bed with both hands. Bend your body forward, keeping your back straight. When you feel a comfortable stretch, hold it for six seconds. Gradually work up to a 30-second stretch. In a matter of weeks, you should be able to work up to a two-minute stretch.

Remember, I said the stretch should be comfortable. You would not want to hold a painful stretch any length of time.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I play volleyball, and am very interested in improving my jumping ability. In fact, my lack of jumping holds me back. How can I get my feet off the ground? - F.K.

ANSWER: I've answered the same question many times for young aspiring basketball players. The same

advice applies to volleyball. Yes, you can improve your jump. You do it by strengthening your leg muscles - all of them, upper and lower. If I could choose one exercise for your purpose, it would be the

squat Squats are performed with a barbell across the shoulders behind the salt and fluid intake.

head. In that position you lower your body until your thighs are parallel to the ground. Then you slowly stand up straight.

When you have thus built up your strength and flexibility, plyometrics should do the rest. In one plyometric exercise you leap up in place, and upon landing, recoil and jump as quickly as you can. When that feels comfortable, you can graduate to jumping down from a platform, using the same leap-recoil-jump tech-

Start out with a 12-inch-high platform; a sturdy box would do. In time, you can graduate to 18 inches or perhaps even 2 feet. Invest in a good padded mat for a landing surface.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I want to be a bodybuilder. It's something I think I could enjoy. My question is about nutrition. How do bodybuilders eat, and how do they diet before a competition? I hear they do. -

ANSWER: That's a tough question. Bodybuilders eat between 3,500 and 4,800 calories a day while in training. But you're right. Just before competition, they diet, and I have to say, diet to extremes.

Understand that the whole idea of competing is to have no fat hiding the muscles. Most professional bodybuilders cut their calories in half, at least, in the pre-competition period. And as competition gets closer, they cut down on salt and fluids. No hint of bloating should mar the muscle

definition they strive to achieve. I don't want to discourage you, but I cannot endorse the extreme measures many competitors feel necessary. At least one bodybuilder died, so severely had he cut down on his

There does appear to be a credibility gap between what some of our leaders say while running for election and what they do afterwards.

their promises as they serve our interests well. They are proof that in politics, honesty is still the best policy and promise keeping is important.

Earlier in the week it was the rental car company that didn't keep its promise. When I called they promised to pick me up "immediately." Two hours and two calls later I finally got a car. Take Enterprise in Dallas off the list of promise

keepers.

Every day, we encounter unkept promises. "I'll call you right back," "You'll get my check today," and "I'll get right on it," are all famous last words. **Three Main Causes**

I believe there are three main reasons businesses don't keep their promises. First, some don't care if they keep their word. Truth, integrity, and doing exactly as you promised doesn't seem to matter to some folks. These businesses deserve the negative consequences they will receive as a result.

The second major cause is that we really aren't thinking about what we're saying when we make a promise. When someone says, "I'll call you right back," they don't stop to think that the other party may staff off the phone anticipating a quick call back. It is wise to think before you speak. If what you're about to say isn't what

you mean, change what you say.

The third probable cause is that most businesses don't realize how very important this principle is. Competition is getting tougher and customers expect more. Promise keeping is a good way to hold market share.

Finally, remember that promises you make to yourself are as important as promises you make to others. Keeping all promises is a good step toward growth and prosperity.

'Kids' Corner' can give youngsters special place

"Installing a compact refrigerator under a counter is great for youngsters

in the kitchen," report Whirlpool home economists.

But in a recreation room or college dorm, it's a good idea to elevate the appliance by setting it on a platform or a sturdy box to put it at a more convenient height for taller users.

Install a microwave oven at countertop level, on a shelf, or in a cabinet, selecting a height that's easy for children to reach and works with available kitchen space.

"For today's busy families, incorporating a kid's corner into the kitchen not only is efficient space planning, but also a good way to encourage togetherness in the hours when everyone's at home," comment Whirlpool home economists.

Panhandle ranchers, farmers hoping, praying for moisture

By SHELLY SCHILLING Staff Writer

Panhandle cattlemen are joining farmers in hoping and praying for rain -- a good soaking rain to help withering fields of wheat and enable spring planting to proceed.

Low corn supplies and soaring prices are not helping the cattle feeding business.

Dave Hopper of Champion Feeders said it is very expensive to feed cattle right now and the open market prices are not favorable, although slaughter numbers have increased.

"Basically we (cattle industry) run in a 10-to 12-year cycle," Hopper said. "There are just too many fat cattle to support the market right now."

Favorable forage conditions and lower grain prices, however, would hold the herd to near last year's level. Making cattle prices

"The industry is killing a few more cows -- we are moving in the right direction," he said. "How rapidly we will recover is hard to tell."

In a recent crop report distributed by the Associated

Press, Dr. Ron Gill of Dallas extension livestock specialist, said the beef industry is in a liquidation process and the drought is only speeding it up.

He went on to say that the conservative manager is the producer that is going to prevail during the drought, even with the lack of supplemental feeding due to a decrease in precipitation.

"The worst wreck we have had in the industry happened in 1973-74," Hopper said. "If things don't change we may approach that same situation.


RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) - Tasty peanuts is a matter of good breeding, an Agriculture Department researcher

Harold Pattee, a USDA research chemist, has spent the last 12 years studying how peanut varieties pass on flavor traits, both good and bad, to their offspring. In addition to finding four flavor-makers from the 1930s, he found some lines have a consistently bad influence on taste.

"Now that the study's done, breeders will have real indications of which varieties to use for enhanced flavor," said Pattee, who is with the Agricultural Research Service. "When you're talking about a multibillion-dollar industry, where consumers demand high-quality flavor, you can see why it's important to know which genetic lines brought good taste to modern domestic varieties.'

Pattee evaluated 200 lines of peanuts for their effect on taste and found the four old varieties that consistently passed along top flavor: Dixie Giant, Small White Spanish, varieties 3x-1 and 3x-2, and Spanish

Pattee's initial tests, begun in the early 1980s, included samples from Florida, Georgia, Oklahoma, Virginia

WASHINGTON (AP) - U.S. farm exports hit a record \$5.5 billion in January as tight grain supplies pushed up prices sharply.

The value of farm exports was 3 percent higher than a month earlier and up 24 percent compared with January 1995, the Agriculture Department said. Agricultural imports rose 7 percent over December, to \$2.7 billion, leaving the nation's farm trade surplus at \$2.8 billion.

Exports for the first four months of the year that began Oct. 1 totaled \$21.2 billion, up 15 percent over a year earlier. "Beef, pork, poultry meat and fruit and nut exports continued to advance," the department's Economic Research Service reported.

Although the volume of wheat exports in January was only slightly higher than a year earlier, the value was up 39 percent at \$542 million. The average wheat export price for the first four months climbed to \$197 per ton, 37 percent higher. The biggest markets for wheat were Egypt (346,000 tons), Pakistan (302,000 tons) and Japan (229,000 tons). Four-month shipments totaled 11.4 million tons.

Corn exports in January increased 21 percent over the year-earlier period. The average export price for the four months ballooned to \$140 a ton, also 37 percent higher than a year earlier. Volume for the four months was up 11 percent, at 20.5 million tons. Japan bought 1.4 million tons; South Korea 792,000 tons and Taiwan 615,000 tons.

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

TNT's Old Testament dramas continue with Moses

TNT introduces its latest biblical epic, *Moses*, in time for the Jewish and Christian holidays of Passover and Easter.

The film airs in two parts, Sunday and Monday, April 7 and 8. Ben Kingsley (Gandhi) plays the title role.

Part 1 begins with the circumstances of Moses' birth in Egypt during a time of persecution; it ends with the words "To Be Continued" emblazoned across the screen as the prophet and his people stand on the banks of the Red Sea.

In between is the story of the first Passover, rather hurriedly told, when God struck down all the firstborn men, women, children and even beasts among the Egyptians, while sparing his people, the Israelites.

Part 2 depicts the crossing of the Red Sea, the beginning of the chosen people's 40 years in the wilderness. Included are the miracle of the manna and quail, the covenant with God and the giving of the law, the worship of the golden calf and the construction of the tabernacle.

The film's creative team – screenwriter Lionel Chetwynd, director Roger Young and producer Gerald Rafshoon – all are veterans of TNT's religious epics.

Besides Kingsley, the cast includes Frank Langella and Christopher Lee as the pharaohs of Moses' time; David Suchet (*Poirot*) as Aaron, Moses' brother; and Geraldine McEwan (*Mapp & Lucia*) as their sister, Miri-

Those who know this story by heart may be dismayed at the many changes and omissions in *Moses*. Perhaps the greatest is God's wriving the commandments on the second set of tablets himself. And Kingsley's Moses is much younger than the 80 years the Bible attributes to him at the time of his call.

Bright spots include the depiction of the miracles – especially the manna and the burning bush.

Moses is the fourth of TNT's Old Testament sagas, joining the patriarchal dramas Abraham, Jacob and Joseph. The next film, Samson and Delilah, is already in production.




