Deaf Smith County Commissioners Monday continued to look for places to cut the proposed 1996-97 budget, but still were looking at a deficit of \$218,79.

The latest budget figures prepared showed general fund revenues of is required. \$3,384,515and expenses totaling \$3,63,305.

# Park reopens as agents continue hunt for bomber

ATLANTA (AP) - Thousands flocked to Centennial Olympic Park today, reclaiming the festive heart of the Summer Games - even as the FBI pressed ahead with its hunt for the terrorist who bombed it.

As the gates opened at 8 a.m., a big cheer went up and the crowd of several thousand whistled and applauded. But many carried flowers, a reminder that along with the gaiety, they were there to pay tribute to those who were killed or wounded in the blast early Saturday.

There was no visible electronic screening, but a large red-and-white sign spelled out some new rules: By entering the park, visitors agreed to random searches of their packages. It also warned against leaving packages unattended and asked visitors to report any suspicious

'We're down here because we believe there's no need for fear, because we trust in God," said Sylvia Berends of Auckland, New Zealand, who was part of a hymn-singing religious group. Once inside, they placed yellow, red and white carnations on a hill near the lighting tower that took the full force of the

'History leads me to believe we will make an arrest. We will continue working the case, and we will make an arrest," bureau spokesman David Tubbs said.

The Washington Post reported today that the bomb was made using a simple clock or kitchen timer and low-grade explosive powder that is easily obtained. The shrapnel that sprayed from the bomb included masonry nails packed in a plastic food container, the newspaper said.

In attacking the park, the bomber struck a place that had quickly come to symbolize the Atlanta Olympics in all their joy and commercial excess. Centennial Park is essentially a vast grass and brick plaza, large portions of which are given over to the corporate sponsors of the Olympics accident Friday for exhibits and sales.

It was between two of these commercial structures, the Swatch Deaf Smith County Friday afternoon Pavilion and the stage of the AT&T Global Olympic Village, that the bomb went off.

The decision to reopen the park was met with nearly unanimous approval here. The bombing has elicited feelings of outrage and defiance - an almost protective sense of passion for the Olympics.

"It's got to go on," said Susan Hayman, a Canadian who arrived from Toronto last Friday and went straight to Centennial Park. She had left the park less than two hours before the bombing.

Tubbs, the FBI spokesman in Atlanta, said the FBI had prepared composite drawings of "individuals who may have been seen in the area about the time of the explosion." But he stressed that they were not considered suspects.

"I'm not willing at this time to label anyone a suspect," he said.

## Two police officers hurt in incidents

Two Hereford police officers suffered minor injuries in an incident which began late Sunday when an officer was on his way home from

The incident began when Officer Randy Agan was on his way home at about 11:15 p.m. Sunday.

Agan reported that he witnessed two vehicles run stop signs on 13th Street at Avenue K and Star Street.

On Star Street, Agan reported, a man got out of one of the vehicles and approached the second one, which began driving in reverse toward Agan's private vehicle, causing the officer to swerve to avoid a collision.

Agan said he began chasing the car and man down Star Street, at which point the car swerved across a yard and fled the scene.

The officer stopped the man and attempted to arrest him for evading arrest, the man swung at Agan, then deflected the officer's arm as Agan attempted to spray him with "Cap-Stun," causing the chemical to temporarily blind Agan, allowing the suspect to flee.

In his report of the incident, Agan said he called for help from residents who were watching the incident, but nobody gave him assistance.

Agan was treated at Hereford Regional Medical Center and released with no lasting effects from the chemical spray, which is non-toxic. He also suffered a minor injury to his right wrist.

Warrants for the arrest of the 27year-old man were issued, charging him with assault on a police officer. evading arrest and resisting arrest.

On Monday, officers received information that the suspect was being hidden at a home in the 400 block of Avenue G.

Agan, accompanied by Lt. Esrael Silva, Cpl. Noe Rodriguez and Deaf Smith Sheriff's Deputy J.D. High responded to the scene, where a 36year-old man refused them permission to search the residence.

He later allowed officers in, but the suspect was not in the home.

However, Agan and High spotted the man in the back yard of the

The suspect jumped a fence and fled from Rodriguez and Silva, who

were waiting in the alley. Silva, attempting to stop the suspect, grabbed him by the shoe as he jumped over a fence.

However, police reports indicated, the suspect allegedly kicked Silva in the hand, causing him to lose his balance and jam his left wrist into the top of a picket fence, causing a minor

The suspect led police on a chase across two yards, but was apprehended when Rodriguez cut him off with his patrol vehicle. The suspect was arrested on the

returned to the home on Avenue G and arrested the man there for hindering apprehension.

Neither man had been arraigned as of press time Tuesday and were being held in Deaf Smith County Jail.

Consumer prices have been rising at a 3.5 percent annual rate during the first six months. They rose 2.5

percent during 1995. The employment cost index is regarded as the best measure of labor costs, which represent two-thirds of the price of a product. The index indicates whether payroll costs are rising so fast as to force consumer

Although pay represents about three-fourths of total compensation, many analysts contend the index provides a better gauge of inflation pressures than the monthly average hourly earnings report because it also includes benefit changes.

Average earnings for the first month of the third quarter will be released Friday with July's employment report. Many analysts expect earnings to be unchanged after spiking up 0.8 percent in June.

### Still more rain possible

Hereford recorded a high temperature of 96 degrees on Monday, with an overnight low of 66 degrees, according to KPAN Radio. HOUSTON - More than a dozen maps redesigning Texas congressional districts are before a three-judge federal court panel working to ensure the legality of new boundaries for three districts that were found to be racially gerrymandered.

DENVER - Former Colorado Governor Richard Lamm and Texas billionaire Ross Perot were the only two people officially running for the Reform Party presidential nomination, and now the two men are the only nominees.

WORTHAM - Mayor Frederick Covert and his wife don't have to haul their laundry eight miles to the next town anymore. Water from a reservoir 20 miles away began gushing into almost-dry Wortham Lake on Monday. Like towns all over Texas, Wortham has been withering in

WASHINGTON - Texas would be the state hit hardest by new regulations if the Senate ratifies the Chemical Weapons Convention, according to an analysis released Monday by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. 

# Republicans predict Clinton will sign welfare reform bill

WASHINGTON (AP) - Republican congressional leaders predict President Clinton will sign the send him by Friday. Religious groups and advocates for the poor are urging him to veto the legislation.

"We have every reason to believe that the president will sign this," House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., said at a Capitol news conference Monday. "I don't know that it will take care of all of his concerns, but I believe it will fit within a framework that he will find signable.'

And Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott, R-Miss., said House and Senate conferees putting the finishing touches on a compromise bill had very few to veto it."

Clay Shaw, R-Fla., who chairs the Ways and Means panel that oversees welfare.

The president won't get his wish, however, on letting states use federal welfare block grant funds to provide non-cash assistance to children whose parents have exhausted their welfare eligibility, Lott said.

The bill will "insist that in America, you will have to work,' said Gov. John Engler of Michigan, a possible running mate for GOP nomince-in-waiting Bob Dole. "If there's a job available, you'll have to take it. If you refuse to take it, you'll lose benefits."

Of the maps submitted Monday, one version of the Bullock-Laney plan would affect nine districts and four counties, with Dallas and Harris counties seeing the most change. The plan would eliminate fingers of the 30th District that reach into Tarrant and Collin counties.

The map also would maintain black voting strength, the attorney representing Bullock and Laney contends. For example, the population of the 18th District, now 50.9 percent black, would be 44.8 percent

The second Bullock-Laney plan would alter 12 districts and 10 counties, with the major changes occurring in Harris, Dallas, Tarrant, would be made in Brazoria, Fort Bend and Collin counties.

Under that plan, the 18th District's population would be 46.2 percent

women who die due to pregnancy, the government reported today. time, near one-fourth of all deliveries involve serious complications, according to a report compiled by the Health and

Human Services Department. The report suggested the actual rate of mortality for mothers was close to 23.5 women per 100,000 live births, compared with 10 deaths per 100,000 as reported by the federal Centers for Disease Control and

Prevention in 1990. "This study cracks the conven-

tional wisdom that pregnancy is a -commissioned the report.

collection methods used by France and other developed countries where there is more uniform reporting.

Pregnancy-related deaths include all deaths during or within one year of pregnancy caused by pregnancy or its complications.

To compensate for underreporting in the United States, the report extrapolated French statistics to the U.S. population to conclude that the U.S. mortality rate was more than twice as high as has been reported.

## Bride, family members are arrested after nuptial brawl



HOUSTON (AP) - Gabe Muoneke was disappointed he didn't win the dunk contest but his most valuable player plaque helped soothe his disappointment.

Muoneke, bound for the University of Texas, scored 15 of his 24 points in a breakaway third quarter Monday night, leading the North to a 127-95 victory over the South in the Texas High School Coaches Association All-Star basketball game. Hereford's Randy Dean coached the North.

"I was disappointed at first," Muoneke said, "but then I thought about it and it's not too many people who get to be the MVP,"

"Dunking is my thing. I love to dunk. But I'm happy with how it turned out," the Cypress Falls graduate said.

Muoneke appeared to be the crowd favorite in the halftime slam dunk contest until D'Aundree Dickson of Houston Scarbrough, brought the crowd of 3,717 to its feet with an under-theleg and back over the shoulder

Muoneke's dunks almost pulled down the backboards at Hofheinz Pavilion, drawing gasps from the crowd.

"I thought that was what they wanted to see but you can't take anything away from D'Aundree," Muoneke said. "I can't do that."

The North won its fourth straight victory in the annual game sponsored by McDonald's and evened the series at 26-26 but they didn't pull away from a 52-41 halftime lead until Muoneke exploded on the South in the third

"It just kind of happened, it wasn't set up for me to do the scoring," Muoneke said. "We wanted to get inside and let our big guys take over. I think they kind of lost confidence and we took advantage of them inside."

Muoneke was named the North's most valuable player and Quincy Sims of West Oso, the smallest player on the court at 5-6, scored 19 points and got the South's vote as MVP.

ATLANTA (AP) - Lewis, Johnson and Miller. Americans with common names came up with uncommon performances on one of the most memorable nights in Olympic history.

Carl Lewis ended his glorious Olympic career with a fourth straight gold in the long jump, and Michael Johnson moved halfway to history with a dominating victory in the 400 meters Monday.

Another Johnson, Allen, won the 110-meter hurdles in an Olympicrecord 12.95 seconds despite knocking down most of the 10 hurdles along the way. And gymnast Shannon Miller, who wept over her mistakes in the all-around and vault, bounced back to win the gold in the balance beam.

Lewis leaped 27 feet, 10 1/4 inches on his third attempt, and nobody could catch him in the final three

"I don't see how I can top this," said Lewis, who took home a souvenir bag of plastic sand from the long jump pit after hugging the Rev. Jesse Jackson during his victory lap.

The 35-year-old Lewis joined discus throw Al Oerter as the only track and field athletes to win the same event in four consecutive Olympics. By winning his ninth overall medal, he also tied the Olympic record shared by U.S. swimmer Mark Spitz, Finnish distance runner Paavo Nurmi and Soviet gymnast Larissa Latynina.

"I'm not disappointed," he said. "I'm extremely pleased with my win. I'll have other opportunities to set the world record.'

Now it's on to the 200, where he should get a strong challenge from Frankie Fredericks of Namibia, who beat Johnson in the 200 during a meet in Norway on July 5. The 200 heats begin Wednesday, with the semifinals and final on Thursday night.

"I've got 48 hours to get ready, and I'll be ready in about two hours," Johnson said.

The glamorous duo of Michael Johnson and Lewis overshadowed Allen Johnson's sizzling show in the 110 hurdles.

The "other Johnson" crossed the finish line 2 meters ahead of runner-up Mark Crear of the United States, then took a victory lap with his 3-year-old daughter, Tristine.

Miller overcame a major psychological hurdle to win her second gold of the games. After stumbling in her two previous individual events, she came through with a near-flawless routine on the balance beam.

"I don't know what else to say, but it feels great," said Miller, who got her first gold when the American women won the team title. "It was a great note to end on."














# Rocks stop hitting when they hit road

Once again, the Colorado Rockies hit a roadblock when they left Coors Field.

The Rockies, baseball's biggest shers at home, looked positively feeble Monday night in Montreal, losing 4-1 to the Expos.

It's a pattern Colorado manager Don Baylor has seen all to often, but still can't figure out. The Rockies are 38-18 at home, batting .347 and averaging 8.25 runs per game; on the road, they're 16-33, hitting .222 and scoring only 3.53 runs per outing.

"It's the most frustrating thing I've ever witnessed," he said. "You see guys hit dramatic home runs and then we go on the road and it stops.'

The Rockies managed eight hits, seven of them singles, as they started a stretch in which they'll play 18 of 21 games on the road.

'I see the numbers. They're right there. You can't argue with the facts," he said. "I try not to talk about playing 18 on the road. If we don't turn things around, we could play ourselves right out of

In the only other games, New York beat Pittsburgh 5-0, Houston defeated Cincinnati 2-1, and San Diego stopped Florida 5-3. There were no games scheduled Monday in the American League.

While Dante Bichette, Andres Galarraga and the rest of the Rockies' big hitters struggled, Expos pitcher Rheal Cormier did just fine at the plate. He went 2-for-2 with a two-run triple, and also reached base when Colorado misplayed his sacrifice bunt.

Cormier (6-6) highlighted a three-run fourth inning with his first triple in the majors. A career .180 hitter, he followed a two-out intentional walk to Shane Andrews by hitting the first pitch from rookie Jamey Wright off the right-field wall.

"Shane's definitely a better hitter than me," Cormier said. "When they walked him, I thought he'd probably throw a first-pitch fastball. I hit it and it went further than I thought."

Cormier gave up one run on seven hits in 6 1-3 innings. He struck out six and walked one.

# Lasorda retires after 20 seasons, two World Series championships

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Dodger scout Tom Lasorda and his wife were relegated to the cheap seats for the World Series against the Yankees. Peering down at the third-base dugout, he predicted he would be there one day, managing in the Fall

Thirty-three years after making that brash promise, and 19 years after first fulfilling it, Lasorda is moving back upstairs with the Dodgers,

Lasorda announced Monday that he was ending his run of nearly 20 years as Los Angeles' manager. After a half-century on the field, he will be moving up and into a team vice president's office.

Bill Russell, 47, who played shortstop for the Dodgers under Lasorda in the late 1970s and early 1980s, is the new manager. A bench coach, he was the interim manager during Lasorda's absence during the past month.

The 68-year-old Lasorda, who underwent angioplasty in June to clear a clogged heart artery, said health concerns and the desire to spend more time with his family were significant in his decision.

"I thought about Don Drysdale and Don McMahon and John McSherry, and I thought about that wonderful family over there," he said at a Dodger Stadium press conference, gesturing toward his wife, Jo, their daughter and her husband, and his 9-month-old granddaughter.

"That was the influence. I was more concerned about my family than anybody.'

Former Dodger pitcher Drysdale, former Los Angeles pitching coach McMahon, and umpire McSherry all died of heart attacks.

Dodgers owner Peter O'Malley said if there was one word to sum up Lasorda, that word would be enthusiasm. And Lasorda, fully realizing how emotional he gets during games, said that also was a factor in his decision.

For me to get into a uniform again - as excitable as I am - I could way I am," Lasorda said.

Dodger blue anymore, Lasorda promised to still bleed Dodger blue. "I've been with them for 47 years and I'm hoping that maybe 50 years

from now I'll die a Dodger."
Said O'Malley: "Tommy's contributions to the Dodgers and to the baseball world are of Hall of Fame proportions. I am delighted that Tommy will continue to play a vital role in the Dodger organization. ...

"His biggest contribution is enthusiasm, for the whole organization - whether it's young players, old players, fans, city, pride, enthusiasm. That's the word I use to sum it up."

Lasorda entered the hospital June 24 complaining of abdominal pains. Tests revealed that he had had a mild heart attack at some point, and the angioplasty was performed two days later.

He said Monday that he was in great shape, a statement echoed by one of his physicians, Dr. Michael Mellman.

That was good news for Mike Piazza, who has been around Lasorda since Piazza was a kid. The Dodger catcher's father is a longtime friend of Lasorda, who is godfather to Piazza's brother.

Now he (Lasorda) can recover from this and rehabilitate. From all indications, he's going to live a very long life after this, and that's great," said Piazza, leading the NL in hitting at .361. "For him to go on and make the tough decision he had to make to get on with his life, it's a positive thing. It's not a negative thing."

First baseman Eric Karros, one of eight Dodgers who won NL Rookie of the Year honors during Lasorda's tenure, said he's happy Lasorda will remain with the team.

"I'm excited about him still being with the organization and the fact that he is going to take care of himself; he's going to get healthy and to know that it was his decision," Karros said. "It's a choice that he made."

Although Lasorda had said as recently as last Friday that he was fit and ready to return to the dugout, he changed his mind over the weekend. He met several times with O'Malley not go down there without being the and executive vice president Fred Claire, who never said publicly during

O'Malley said Lasorda phoned him Monday morning to tell him he was stepping down.







Ladyman's hope is that the results of the class will be long-term \_ that the students will connect the fun of Learning Clubs to a lifelong excitement for reading.

# **To Your Good Health**

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I have pain in my left buttock and running can continue activity as permitted. down my left leg. I've had several tests. My doctor calls it "sciatica" and gives me medicine. I take Naprosyn, but the pain gets worse. Could you tell me about sciatica? -

ANSWER: The sciatic nerve begins in the lower back, emerging from spinal cord rootlets, which eventually intertwine to form a single nerve, by far the longest in the body. Irritation anywhere along its length down to the lower leg can represent I wonder how long your sciatica

has lasted. You don't say.

Sciatica can begin at any point along the nerve, the back being favored, with compression of a spinal disk or bony growth heading the list of immediate causes.

The unpleasant symptoms can include leg-muscle weakness.

Rest permits calming of the irritation. Pain usually responds to rest. If pain is great, two days of bed rest might be needed.

With minimal pain, the patient cates something amiss. Naprosyn - naproxen - and like anti-inflammatories counter nerve

One look at Johnny Posas' hands foreman is tough. Leathery and weather-beaten, his 51-year-old hands

are worn from work - not age. "It's hard because you get busted ranches. and twisted around (on the young horses)," he said. "Riding is the best exercise. I work muscles I didn't even

know I had. "You have to remain tense because you need to be ready when the horse bucks. When you're tired, that's when most (accidents)

Once he was thrown off his horse hile trying to rope a cow. Johnny, the cow and the horse were all thrashing around in the pit trying to

get out. 'One of my ranch hands was

yelling, 'Get out of there,' "he said.
"But I was thinking, 'How?'
B.J. has cuts and scrapes on his neck and arms from a recent fall off

'You never know what's going to happen," he said. "Yesterday I was college, he claims such skills as working this colt, and he just decided to buck and he threw me off."

Father and son listed several broken bones they've each suffered. B.J. remembers breaking his collar bone from a horse fall when he was just 5 or 6 years old.

"You can't be afraid," Johnny said about being a cowboy. "You have to be half crazy - maybe even three-fourths crazy. It's a real dangerous job."

The job is more than riding horses and herding cattle.

"I'm on call all the time," Johnny Posas said. "I live here on the ranch. I'm responsible for anything that happens. If something goes wrong, the boss comes to me first."

It's an 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., 5-1/2-day-a-week job for the most part. But if any works needs to be done in the evening or on Sunday, Johnny takes care of it.

"It's something you've got to love," he said. "The money isn't that good and it's hard work.

"We're up long hours when we're working cattle, sometimes from sunup to sundown. There is no overtime pay."

Johnny and B.J. begin the day at Yturria Ranch checking the fence line along the freeway.





AUSTIN — A legislative panel is expected to recommend that the responsibility for child-support collections be taken away from Texas Attorney General Dan Morales and given to a newly created "freestanding state entity."

The Senate Interim Committee on Juvenile Justice and Child Support has been reviewing the collections program for a year.

"The mothers and children of Texas cannot afford to keep this thing going," committee chairman Sen. Chris Harris, R-Arlington, told the Dallas Morning News.

A similar House panel, headed by Rep. Toby Goodman, R-Arlingis studying the issue. Goodman said there is some sentiment among Democrats and Republicans on his committee for moving child support collections to another agency.

Morales, a Democrat, defended his handling of the child support collections program and said, "It wouldn't surprise me if maybe some politics are involved here. If that's the case, I think it's a shame because the children of Texas should never be used as political pawns."

#### Wife Resigns As Lobbyist

Diane Allbaugh, the wife of Gov. George W. Bush's executive assistant, Joe Allbaugh, announced her resignation last week as a lobbyist for AT&T and . Texas Utilities — corporations that have issues to be considered in the 1997

Mrs. Allbaugh said she was resigning to avoid any appearance of influence-peddling, the Dallas Morning News reported.

Her announcement came after Bush said he was troubled by the appearance of a conflict of interest. Bush also said he may initiate a policy to deal with such situations.

Joe Allbaugh said his wife's work did not conflict with his responsibilities in the governor's office, and Ray Sullivan, a spokesman for Bush, said the governor did not ask Diane Allbaugh to resign.

In a letter to Bush's general counsel, Mrs. Allbaugh wrote: "I regret that my effort to resume my professional life has caused such distractions, and trust that this action on my part will address fully any possible concerns."

Mrs. Allbaugh recently registered with the Texas Ethics Commission and Texas Utilities as a lobbyist, as required by law. AT&T was to pay her \$50,000 to \$100,000 a year, and Texas Utilities was to pay her \$25,000 to \$50,000 a year, the Austin American-Statesman reported.

Mr. Allbaugh's annual salary is \$125,000.

Sharp to Push for Tax Relief

Texas Comptroller John Sharp said last week he is confident Gov. Bush will address property tax relief during the 1997 legislative

If, however, Bush decides not to go forward with a plan, Sharp said he "would sure look at it then" because he's convinced that the tax burden shouldered by property owners is a problem - and besides, it's his job to help Bush find a way to fix it.

"I don't need public opinion polls or a set of hearings to tell me that the public is severely upset about what they see as trends in property taxes," Sharp said.

A special committee appointed by Bush and headed by Texas Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer is conducting hearings around Texas to gauge support of an alternative to local school property taxes - about \$10 billion a year.

Bush and lawmakers are to decide what to do after Bomer's panel concludes its work in the fall. **Cancer Society Lauds Demos** 

The American Cancer Society praised the Texas Democratic Party for its decision last month to no longer accept contributions from tobacco companies.

"It's not easy to turn away money. They are very courageous, and we'd love to see lots of other states follow," American Cancer Society spokeswoman Jerie Jordan told the Associated Press last week. California Democrats banned the acceptance of tobacco money over two years ago.

Lester Van Pelt III of the Republican Party of Texas said the state GOP plans no ban on tobacco donations, the AP reported.

The \$50,000 the Texas Democratic Party received from Philip Morris last year made up about one-fourth of the state party's corporate account donations, according to reports filed with the Texas **Ethics Commission.** 

Last spring, Attorney General Morales, a Democrat, filed a \$4 billion federal lawsuit against the tobacco industry seeking reimbursement of Medicaid money spent on treating tobacco-related illnesses.

■ U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, R-Texas, has been named chairwoman of the Subcommittee on Surface Transportation and Merchant Marine. She moved into the post after Majority Leader Sen. Trent Lott, R-Miss., relinquished chairmanship. The post is her first subcommittee chairmanship since she came to Congress in 1993.

For the first time in two: decades, the number of state government jobs in Texas has declined, the Wall Street Journal reported last week. The decrease is 1.1 percent, or 2,919 positions for the first six months of the fiscal year, reducing the total payroll to 258,536 as of Feb. 29. Comptroller John Sharp estimated the reduction has saved taxpayers \$40 million.

# Pipeline directs water to dry lake in Wortham

By CHARLES RICHARDS

**Associated Press Writer** WORTHAM, Texas (AP) - Mayor Frederick Covert soon will be able to point to the middle of Wortham Lake three miles east of town and say, "I've walked out there before."

Monday, the 82-year-old mayor walked along a lake bottom that was dry and parched, as his town of 1,200 residents was down to just one week's supply of water.

But he was smiling.

Nearby, new water was gushing into the lake, piped 20 miles from Navarro Mills Lake, 15 miles west of Corsicana.

"It's looking great," Covert said on the first day of what has been dubbed "Operation Waterfall."

Wortham, about 80 miles south of Dallas, was spared silent taps by Corsicana, which sold it 60 million gallons.

The water was directed to Wortham from Navarro Mills Lake through a Chevron Inc. pipeline that had lain unused for three years.

Corsicana owns rights to the water, for which Wortham will pay \$1 per 1,000 gallons - a total of \$60,000.

A larger pump installed Monday will move water at the rate of 4 million gallons per day until 60

million gallons - a year's supply for the town - has been moved into Wortham Lake.

At that rate, it would take about 15 days to supply the town's lake with enough water for residents' needs.

The state approved the operation since the pipeline hadn't been used for petroleum products in two years.

We will continue day and night, seven days a week, until we get 60 million gallons," Covert said. "They've told us we can use the pipeline for 30 days.

That should take the pressure off while Wortham completes drilling of four wells south of town to supplement its water supply. Several good rains also would be appreciated.

Signs imploring "Pray for Rain," are in windows all over town and on church marquees.

Because of the shortage, the City Council imposed harsh restrictions on water consumption last month, and Covert said the town would have had to truck in water if Chevron hadn't offered the pipeline.

'We would be hauling water in 8,000-gallon tankers - 20 a day," he said. "We would bankrupt the city in 30 days. It would take every penny

the city has.' The City Council imposed restrictions on water consumption last month, such as a ban on watering

lawns or washing cars.

"No outside watering of any kind is allowed, absolutely not for any

reason," the mayor said. What happens to lawns?
"They just die. My lawn has

died," Covert said. Even with the prospect of a lake almost full again by mid-August, the ordinance will remain in place for some time, Covert said.

Most people have cut their water usage 50 percent or more, he said. 'Sure, it's tough, but people are

doing all sorts of things to conserve water," Covert said. "We use the dishwasher once a week. We will absolutely not use it more than once a week regardless,'

he said. "We buy paper plates, and our menu is planned so we don't use so many pots and pans. His wife drives eight miles to

Mexia to do the laundry. Water in the mayor's home is recycled. "Any water that goes down the

kitchen sink is caught in a plastic pan below," Covert said. "We use that to water the shrubs outside or to flush the commode if necessary.'

Some Wortham residents are showering only every other day. Even then, they plug their tubs so the water can be used later in flower beds.

"It's difficult, yes, and it is a different way of life and it takes a little doing, but it's possible," Covert said. "People are cooperating and there really have been few complaints."

# Republicans say convention to be 'festival of GOP ideas'

WASHINGTON (AP) - Republicans promise an "unconventional convention" when the GOP faithful gather next month. So far that's meant open turf battles among convention officials - and a speakers lineup that has Pat Buchanan claiming "shabby treatment" of conservatives.

Trying to gin up excitement for the Aug. 12-15 convention, Republican National Committee Chairman Haley Barbour promised Monday it would be a "festival of Republican ideas" featuring presentations by "real people, in the real world" rather than elected officials.

Without specifying their roles, Barbour released what he called a partial list of 44 convention speakers - all party luminaries, including seven senators, 10 House members and 10 governors.

Scheduled for prime-time speeches on the convention's second night, Republican sources said, are three abortion-rights supporters: New Jersey Gov. Christic Whitman, Texas Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, and New York Rep. Susan Molinari, the keynote speaker. Retired Gen. Colin Powell, another abortion-rights supporter and proponent of affirmative action, is to speak opening night.

Although conservatives also will have prime-time roles - House Speaker Newt Gingrich and Wisconsin Gov. Tommy Thompson on Day Two, for example - it is the spotlight on abortion-rights backers that has rankled Buchanan and his top advisers.

They claim that Dole, in a calculated appeal to women voters, is shafting Buchanan and the anti-abortion, anti-affirmative action platform he championed in the primaries.

As evidence, the Buchanan camp points not only to the prominent convention roles given to GOP moderates, but also Barbour's weekend call to Buchanan extending the same offer made to Dole's other primary rivals: a short video presentation to the convention and a spot on stage with Dole after his final-night acceptance speech.

Buchanan's sister and top political adviser, Angela "Bay" Buchanan, called the decision not to give her brother his own speech "an affront to the millions who believe in Pat and the 3 million who voted for him."

She portrayed the handling of Buchanan as "a continuance of the shabby political treatment that Pat and the conservatives have received from those running the San Diego convention.

Sources said Buchanan declined to make the convention video but did

not object when Barbour indicated the - and some other conservatives - is something would cobble together from snippets of Buchanan campaign footage.

Barbour, whose overture to Buchanan had Dole's blessing, said there would be no better offer.

"I think Pat Buchanan should be treated like the other losing candidates for the Republican nomination," Barbour said. "In presidential elections there's no prize for second. or third, or fifth or ninth place."

Dole aides took pains not to create more controversy, calling B :hanan's position "unfortunate."

"We remain confident he'll be part of the fight to defeat Bill Clinton after San Diego," said campaign spokesman Nelson Warfield.

Buchanan, who plans his own rally near San Diego on the eve of the convention, finished a distant second to Dole and won only the New Hampshire primary. How far Buchanan plans to carry his feud might become clearer on Wednesday, when Buchanan plans to meet with reporters.

Bruised egos and turf fights are common in convention planning and the assignment of speeches, but a host of Republicans interviewed in recent days said this year's bickering appears more acrimonious than in years past.

Much of the anger from Buchanan and his "heartland values."

directed at Paul Manafort, the veteran GOP lobbyist and campaign operative who is Dole's convention manager.

For weeks, Manafort and his staff had insisted that Buchanan would be denied any role unless he first endorsed Dole. Barbour overruled Manafort's objections to extending the video offer to Buchanan without conditions.

Manafort also has strained relations with Illinois Rep. Henry Hyde, Dole's choice to head the convention platform committee. Hyde has threatened at times to quit because he believes Manafort is trying to limit his powers to draft

the platform and run the committee. 'This is going to be the unconventional convention," Barbour said in outlining the four-day meeting that combines podium speeches with pre-taped video presentations and satellite broadcasts from remote sites.

Barbour said the first day would celebrate "average" Americans with "first-hand experience about the effectiveness of Republican ideas." Day Two, was set aside to critique President Clinton's record, while the third and final days were slated to spotlight Dole's agenda, his record of military and government service,
