Pre-trial hearing held in Reid murder case

By GEORGIA TYLER Staff Writer

An attempt to restrict media access to pretrial hearings, motions and arguments in the case of a woman accused of killing her daughter in 1984 was squelched Monday by District Judge David Wesley Gulley.

During a 3 1/2-hour pretrial hearing in 222nd District Court, the attorney for Tanya Thaxton Reid, 36, claimed information, if made public prior to trial, could "subvert" the defense case.

Reid was indicted for murder last television shows. March by a Deaf Smith County grand jury, alleging she caused the death of eight-month-old Morgan Reid in February 1984.

is described as a disorder in which a person induces or fabricates illness in children for psychological gratification. A witness in Iowa alleged that Morgan and Robert Reid both were victims of Munchausen Syndrome by Proxy.

In Iowa, the case was heard by a judge, with no jury involved, who found Reid guilty of the endangering Hereford in August to stand trial on Reid was convicted of endangering the murder charge. If convicted here, she must return to Iowa to complete that sentence before beginning the Texas sentence.

Morgan Reid, then eight months old, died in 1984. She reportedly stopped breathing on Feb. 7, that year, was admitted to Deaf Smith General Hospital, then transferred to an Amarillo hospital where she died the next day.

Hutchison former aide calls probe outrageous

AUSTIN (AP) - A former top aide to U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison emerged from a grand jury appearance and called the investigation of the senator "outrageous."

Alicia Fechtel said Monday, "To my knowledge Kay Bailey Hutchison has done nothing illegal. I think it's outrageous. We are being attacked for things that we didn't either do, or things that we did do (which) were totally proper."

Ms. Fechtel was general counsel of the state Treasury under Mrs. Hutchison.

Mrs. Hutchison was indicted in September on charges that she used her previous position as state treasurer for personal and political gain, and then destroyed records as part of a coverup.

The charges were later dismissed after her defense team discovered a grand juror who was ineligible to serve because of a pending theft charge.

Prosecutors are seeking to have a second grand jury re-indict Mrs. Hutchison.

Ms. Fechtel's attorney, Ron Woods, said prosecutors are trying to trap Ms. Fechtel into making a statement before the grand jury that is different than her testimony before the first grand jury.

Then they will indict her on perjury charges "to destroy her credibility as a witness because they know she is going to be one of the main witnesses for Kay at trial," Woods said.

Travis County First Assistant District Attorney Steve McCleery said Ms. Fechtel was summoned before the second grand jury because we thought that she had some additional information that she could

McCleery would not elaborate. The district attorney's office has in the past defended its investigation as being fair.

Ms. Fechtel's testimony was at the center of a dispute last week between prosecutors and Mrs. Hutchison's defense team.

State District Court Judge Bob Perkins approved an order preventing Ms. Fechtel from revealing to Mrs. Hutchison's attorneys anything about the grand jury. AUSTIN (AP) - Freddie Reeves has moved back to Texas in a big

Twenty-eight years after leaving the state for an Army career overseas, Reeves moved back to Texas last month and is now the state's latest millionaire - thanks to Lotto Texas.

Reeves and his wife, Ora, on Monday claimed a \$3.9 million lotto jackpot drawn Saturday by matching the winning numbers 2, 3, 9, 10, 37 and 38.

Reeves, 48, collected his first installment of a 20-year payoff in the form of a check for \$199,082.97 on Monday. He will receive a check for \$193,000 each of the next 19 years. Meanwhile, no one has claimed a

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

Herd halted by Northwest in regional finals

The Hereford volleyball team's season ended Saturday just one step short of a repeat trip to the state

Justin Northwest, the No. 1 team in Class 4A, pulled off a 15-3, 7-15, 15-7 victory in the Region I-4A finals played Saturday in the Vernon High School gym.

Hereford played flat in the first game, came back strong to win the second game, then led 6-4 in the third game before falling.

The end of the third game was marred by referees's whistles. Hereford scored the first four points of the third game quickly, but Northwest came back with four point just as quickly. After five sideouts Hereford scored twice more, then couldn't score for some time.

Northwest got occasional points among the many sideouts, and a Mandy Tankersley ace put the Lady Texans ahead 7-6. Hereford's Heather Hodges used two hands to block down an overset (a ball that is accidentally hit barely over the net), but was called for a lift, and Northwest led 8-6.

Northwest continued to get

Coach Brenda Reeh said the calls were upsetting, but didn't blame the referees for the loss. She didn't call the calls wrong, but she admitted they affected the Herd.

"They (the calls) were certainly questionable," she said. "I believe there was one time Danielle (Cornelius was called earlier)--it was very obvious to us that Danielle was over the net trying to block the set.

"Three or four other times, when the setter tried to dump or tried to tip, I thought it (Hereford's plays) looked clean. But then we don't have the view the officials have; we're not up in the air like they are.

"Some of those calls--there's no doubt--took the wind out of our sails.

Hereford came out flat in the first game. Northwest had a six-point run early for an 8-2 run, and the Lady Texans never looked back.



Hereford adjusted too late to win the first game, but came on strong shortly after the beginning of the second game.



Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: My son is losing his hair. I cut his hair and am aware of what it is like. It started thinning on the top of his head when he was 13. Typical early male pattern baldness occurs on both sides of his family, but none started at age 13. His is not just a receding hairline or over the back, but it is thin all over.

I have taken him to a pediatrician and a dermatologist. He does not have a fungus infection and is in good health. He is going through a growth spurt. He is almost 15 now and is 6 feet 1 inch tall. I called Upjohn about Rogaine, but they do not recommend it for anyone under age 18. What could be the cause?

DEAR READER: I'm glad he saw a dermatologist because seborrheic dermatitis is often involved in early male pattern baldness in young men. Sebum, with is the oil secreted by glands in the skin and causes acne, contains squalene, oleic and linoleic acids that are powerful hair removers in experimental animals. One application of these fatty acids will cause hair loss to begin in 10 to 20 days in animals. Treatment of dandruff and seborrheic dermatitis in important in managing hair loss and may help limit the changes from male pattern baldness in young males.

Diet may make seborrheic dermatitis worse, including a high- ing of something else when someone fat intake, including whole milk, butter, cream, cheese, peanut butter, bacon and chocolate. If there is any indication of seborrheic dermatitis in your son, vigorous treatment may help his hair.

Heredity is an important influence in causing hair loss, particularly male pattern baldness. It is caused by secretion of male hormone, and while age 13 is young, that is well within the time frame when acne and seborrheic dermatitis, along with male pattern baldness, occur. Male pattern baldness also occurs frequently in females and is a general thinning of the hair. Rogaine is particularly useful for baldness at the top of the head, but is less likely to be helpful with generalized thinning or a receding hairline.

With his growth spurt, he may need more calories and protein. A dietary deficiency can contribute to hair loss.

DEAR DR. LAMB: I am a 20-yearold male, 5 feet 10 inches and weigh 150 pounds. Recently I had appendicitis. After the operation, I asked the doctor what caused it and he said too much sex with my girlfriend and that she would be the next one to have appendicitis. How can sex cause appendicitis? I never heard anything like this before. DEAR READER: Perhaps he was

kidding you and you didn't realize it. No, too much sex does not cause appendicitis. There is no relationship at all. Appendicitis is usually caused by enlargement of lymph glands in the appendix or small fecal particles being impacted in the appendix. That causes obstruction which also affects circulation to the appendix and an infection results. The swollen, infected appendix may then rupture. Some worldwide studies suggest sufficient bulk that improves bowel function decreases the incidence of appendicitis.

Incidentally, appendicitis is com-mon in children too young to have an active sex life.

DEAR READER: I would think from your letter you do not have Alzheimer's disease. Memory loss is not the same thing at all. However, true memory loss as you describe is thought by some investigators to be the forerunner of Alzheimer's disease 15 to 20 years later. Changes in memory are common as people get older, but it is not definitely established that all of this is simple aging. In some cases it is caused by disease. More often it is related to lack of use. The brain isn't all that different from muscles. If you don't exercise your brain, it becomes less and less effec-

The usual problem is a decrease in retrieval of information that is stored. For very complex reasons, the information stored in the brain early in life is the last to be lost and the most recent information is most easily lost.

Often, memory problems are related to lack of concentration. Another aspect is not really listening. If you are thinkis telling you something, you are not apt to remember it, because you really didn't hear it.

DEAR DR. LAMB: My brother is 37 years old and overweight. His blood pressure is 140/90. He thinks this is normal and refuses to do anything about it. Could you please tell him he needs to do something now before he has complications?

DEAR READER: Actually 140/90 has been accepted for years by many doctors as the upper limit of normal and nothing to be concerned about. However, that is not true. The lower your blood pressure, both the upper and lower readings, the less likely you are to have heart attacks and stokes. An optimal reading is really 115/75. But most people are not treated unless their pressure exceeds 140/90. Pressures of that level or slightly above may double or triple a person's risk of a stroke.

Your brother's best approach at this state of life is to make a major effort to eliminate any excess body fat. That often significantly lowers blood pressure, and begin a sensible exercise program. This may enable him to avoid needing to take medi-cines to control his blood pressure now or at a later age.



AUSTIN --- Republican George W. Bush launched his campaign for governor last week by pledging to end parole for sex offenders, slow the growth of state government and abolish most of the Texas Education Agency.

Bush, 47, managing partner of the Texas Rangers baseball team, said he must establish his identity and trust among Texans before he has a chance to defeat Democratic Gov. Ann Richards.

"If I'm not able to step out of the shadow of a great man or come away from a baseball team, I'm not going to win," he said.

"But I'm going to," said the oldest son of former President George Bush. "I want Texans to see a person who has got heart and cares and has some good ideas." Stumping the state, Bush out-

lined his education proposals: The state should define the basic mission of education and how

much it costs. The courts should get out of the school finance process, and the state should pay for a basic, adequate education. School districts

wanting "extras" should fund them: Education should be funded by the state but governed by local school boards. "Red tape, paper-work, regulation and top-down direction" should be reduced.

· All regulatory functions of the Texas Education Agency should be abolished.

Bush said the goals for education should be "literacy in basic courses and good citizenship, not condom distribution or social engineering."

Defense Funds on Hold Contributions to a legal defense fund for Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison are being held in a state account while attorneys for the senator determine whether they are legal, a spokesman said last week.

"We want to make sure that it's fully researched and done legally so that you don't run into conflict between state and federal law," said David Beckwith, a spokesman for Hutchison.

A letter has been sent to the senator's supporters soliciting contributions to combat "the political inquisition in Austin."

Nearly \$50,000 has been collected in recent weeks, Beckwith

Meanwhile, the grand jury investigating Hutchison subpoenaed two new witnesses, including the Austin lawyer who kept the books for her 1990 race for state treas-

The lawyer, David Herndon, who also oversees Hutchison's state officeholder account, was questioned by grand jurors last week. Mike Toomey, an Austin lobbyist and former member of the House of Representatives, also appeared before the panel.

Two college students murdered, may have been fleeing drug debt

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - Two college students shot execution-style in a vacant lot may have been fleeing a \$6,000 drug debt, police reports indicate.

One of the victims, Channing Elizabeth Freelove, 19, earlier in the week had asked her parents for \$6,000 to pay her drug dealer, according to police reports released Monday. She told them she had been dealing narcotics and that 10 pounds of marijuana had been stolen from her apartment. Her parents did not give her the money, the reports said. A week before her death, Freelove

went to a friend and asked for help in getting the marijuana back.

"If I don't come up with the money or pot in two weeks, he's going to kill me," the 20-year-old woman, who asked not to be identified by name, recalled Freelove saying. "He's not joking; he's serious. This is my life."

The friend told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram that Freelove told her she had to come up with \$5,000 or

"She said there was no way she could come up with the money in time," the friend said. "She was real anxious but she wasn't crying or yelling. She was just real serious about it."

"She wasn't sure what she was going to do. She was talking about moving to California," the friend

WFAA-TV in Dallas reported that a friend of the victims told police she heard Freelove on the telephone with

her drug dealer, pleading for her life. Freelove and her best friend Melanie Golchert, 18, were last seen alive Friday night when they told

friends and relatives they were going out to celebrate Freelove's birthday.

But they apparently were moving instead, said officers. Freelove was dressed in jeans and a T-shirt and Golchert wore shorts. In the car that their bodies were found next to was clothes and a television. Tucked in the waistband of Freelove's jeans was a handgun, police said.

At Golchert's apartment near Texas Christian University detectives found 2(pounds of what was believed to be marijuana, \$1,090 in cash and narcotics paraphernalia.

"We are still investigating the extent of the victims' involvement in police spokeswoman.

Friends of both victims said the two had experimented with illegal drugs. Some former classmates said they might have also been involved with drug dealing.

Other police reports indicate Freelove had been robbed at gunpoint Wednesday night and reported her apartment burglarized Friday morning.

Freelove, a freshman pre-med student at Texas Christian University, and Golchert, a student a Tarrant County Junior College, graduated from Paschal High School in May.
