HHS Salutatorian overcomes rough beginning to rise to top of her class

By GARRY WESNER **Managing Editor** Selena Varner is just like any normal high school senior one

week away from graduation. She laughs with her parents, calls her dad "Tiny" and expresses embarrassment at displays of emotion by her mother.

She is looking forward to starting college this fall and to begin working toward an eventual degree in physical therapy.

Selena likes mystery stories, learned to read by doing her dad's word search puzzles and can whip him at Pac-Man.

All perfectly normal things. And that, says her mother, is the miracle of it all.

Eighteen years ago last October there was some doubt as to whether or not Selena would even live to see her high school graduation, much less what she would be capable of learning in

The story began at that time, when Pat Varner was struggling through a difficult pregnancy with Selena, her fourth child.

On Friday, Oct. 21 -- at least eight weeks before Selena was supposed to be born -- David Varner said, "she woke up ... and went to the bathroom and her water broke."

Labor did not begin, so Mrs. Varner was not too concerned.

However, she said, "the next day was Saturday and I wasn't at church so the ladies called" and were shocked she was not at the hospital.

Hospital, a probe was attached to the head of the unborn baby, causing a second sac of fluid to burst and triggering labor.

The second sac, Mrs. Varner said, is not unusual for women with a family history of twins.

After labor began, the premature delivery was fast.

"She rolled over to get in the stirrups and Selena vaulted out," David Varner said. "The doctor caught her when she hit the gurney."

"She started crying, then she stopped," Mrs. Varner said. "Then they said, 'David, out.'"

It quickly became apparent that the newborn had problems breathing caused by underdeveloped lungs.

In fact, hospital personnel

called for Medivac to transport Selena to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, but the helicopter was busy on anther call, so the 5 pound, 4 ounce baby was loaded on an ambulance and driven

"The only way they could keep her breathing was to poke her heel

with a pin," Varner said. It was a week before the couple

Work set to begin on recovering large pieces of jet that went down in Florida

the fringes of a murky crater that swallowed ValuJet Flight 592 as they prepared to yield to barges that will try to retrieve big chunks of the aircraft from its Everglades grave.

First, though, police divers planned to don new lightweight biohazard suits that will better protect them today from the skin-irritating jet fuel as they scour for wreckage and remains of the plane's 110 occupants. Search crews were still looking for

the fuselage and other parts of the DC-9, which a week ago today slammed nose-first into the swamp, leaving a scorched hole about 130-by-40 feet and 8 feet deep in spots. Less than 10 percent of the plane has been recovered.

"We're hoping the divers may shed some light on it," said Gregory Feith, lead investigator for the

Authorities are elated with even MIAMI (AP) - Workers cleared the few pieces of plane that have been recovered because they could explain what caused the crash, he said.

Investigators plan to compare the recovered parts to those of an intact sister plane of the DC-9, Feith said.

Meanwhile, with the area around the crater cleared, platforms can be installed as a base for efforts to recover the heavier material. That will begin next week, Feith said.

Experimental radar equipment that can detect items in the mud will brought to the crash site Monday. Navy sonar has failed to locate the plane's cockpit voice recorder.

"It's hard to believe there's an entire airplane out there with 110 people on board, very little of which can be seen," police pilot Mike Mann said Friday.

Investigators are focusing on the front section of the airplane where National Safety Transportation they think an explosion or fire might

have occurred.

Safety officials continued to investigate whether dozens of oxygen-generating canisters aboard Flight 592 were empty or filled with volatile chemicals that may have caused a fire before the plane went

The jet, which was carrying 50 to 60 of the canisters in a front cargo hold, crashed after the crew reported smoke in the cockpit and cabin. The canisters have not been recovered.

On Friday, the Atlanta-based discount airline appointed retired Air Force Gen. James B. Davis, an aviation consultant, to be its safety chief in charge of reviewing the airline's safety programs.

ValuJet also said it was cutting its daily flights by half - from 320 at most to about 160 - so it can stay on schedule while dealing with increased federal scrutiny in the aftermath of

The Federal Aviation Administra-

tion said two sets of government investigators independently recommended re-evaluations of safety on ValuJet within two days last February, possibly even a complete re-certification.

The Feb. 14 report, prompted by a string of problems on ValuJet planes, also cited flaws in the federal agency's monitoring of ValuJet. It noted that while ValuJet's fleet consisted mostly of aging planes, the FAA had made no structural inspections of the planes for two years, a "severe" oversight.

Meanwhile, security officers with bomb-sniffing dogs searched two ValuJet planes that received bomb threats as they were about to leave Miami International Airport. Both planes, like Flight 592, were bound for Atlanta; the passengers had not boarded either jet.

No explosives were found aboard one of the planes; the results of the other search were not known.

Education panel approves 4 new charter schools

AUSTIN (AP) - The State Board of Education on Friday approved four independent charter schools, including one that officials closely questioned about religious ties because it's named after the Blessed Sacrament.

"You have a constitutional provision over and above Senate Bill 1 (the education reform law) that says that state monies may not be spent for sectarian purposes," said Education Board member Carolyn Crawford of

She said she respects the work of the Blessed Sacrament Academy Second Chance High School in San Antonio, but wants a clear record in case legal challenges are raised.

Sister Odilia Korenek, a Roman Catholic nun representing the 70-year-old school, said it serves students of various religions and hasn't taught religion classes for

teach students to respect themselves

"If anything, that became our system. religion, and that is the religion now at work," she said.

WALTHAM, Mass. (AP) - Gov. William F. Weld collapsed today while receiving an honorary degree at Bentley College.

He was rushed to Waltham Deaconness Hospital, which would not immediately disclose his condition. Weld, who was to give the keynote

address at Bentley's commencement today, had just received his honorary doctorate of law and was having a ceremonial collar placed over his head when he grabbed at the podium and fell backwards. Some people caught him and

Weld was briefly unconscious, but was alert and waved at the college's graduates as he was taken to the ambulance, college spokeswoman Katherine Blake said.

The Legislature's 1995 education overhaul allows up to 20 of the open-enrollment charter schools.





Miss Venezuela receives crown as Miss Universe

Associated Press Writer LAS VEGAS (AP) - The new Miss Universe, Alicia Machado of Venezuela, said she planned to spend her first day of stardom enjoying some of life's most basic pleasures.

"I'm going to something I haven't been able to do in three weeks: eat, eat, eat and sleep," she said Friday night after beating out 78 contestants from around the world for the title.

Machado, 19, made a sign of the cross as she was crowned by her predecessor Chelsi Smith, a 22-year-old college student from Deer Park, Texas.

Machado, who is studying law and business management, described herself as a simple person and said she has no boyfriends. She told judges during her interview that she would rather be smart, than rich or beautiful.

"Venezuelans should be very proud, not of me, but of our country," she told reporters through a translator. "Intelligence is more

important than beauty."

The 5-foot-9 Machado said she would like to own her own restaurant someday. Her father owns two toy stores in her home town of Maracay, she said.

The first runner-up was Taryn Mansell of Aruba, and the second runner-up was Lola Odusoga of

The other finalists were: Milena Mayorga of El Salvador, Sandhya Chib of India, Vanessa Guzman of Mexico, Natali Sacco of Peru, Ilmira Shamsutdinova of Russia, Annika Duckmark of Sweden and Ali Landry of the United States.

Co-hosts for the 45th annual event were "Entertainment Tonight" weekend host Bob Goen and Marla Maples Trump. It was telecast on CBS to an estimated 600 million viewers, pageant officials said.

The last time the pageant was held in the United States was in 1991 in Las Vegas. Last year's pageant was held in Windhoek, Namibia.

was able to get to Amarillo and see their baby, although they got regular reports by telephone from doctors trying to save the life of the tiny girl.

While preparing to enter the neonatal Intensive Care Unit, Mrs. Varner said, she saw a pitiful-looking child that was strapped down, with tubes coming from mouth, chest, arm and leg.

She soon learned that "pitiful" baby was hers.

In the hospital, Selena was hooked up to a respirator to help her lungs function, but the air pressure punctured her lungs in two places, causing buildups of air in her chest cavity that caused her lungs to collapse three times.

X-rays finally showed doctors where the punctures were and tubes were placed through Selena's chest to vent the air and allow her lungs to inflate properly.

Once that happened, the holes had a chance to heal and her lungs were able to develop properly. But for 10 days, Mrs. Varner

said, "we never knew whether she would live or die.' One day the doctor called with

the somber report, "I'm afraid she took a turn for the worse." Then, because oxygen to

Selena's brain had been cut off each of the three times her lungs collapsed, the doctors had more bad news. "Then they said, 'The chances

of her having significant brain damage was 50-50," Mrs. Varner said, her eyes tearing up and her voice thick with emotion. "I asked the Lord, 'If she's going

to have brain damage, let her die. ... If she's going to live Lord, let her be a normal, happy child." The next night the phone rang.

After a brief argument over who would talk to the doctor, Mrs. Varner answered.

"He said, 'Good news. We found the problem and we feel like she'll be on the road to recovery.'

Once the air holes were healed, the couple said, Selena's lungs developed strength and she was taken off the respirator.

"My hand engulfed her head," Mrs. Varner said, while her husband noted that he could hold Selena in one hand with her head on his fingers and her bottom on his wrist.

She looked like a baby doll," Varner said. As a result, he gave her the nickname Baby Doll -- one he uses to this day.

But even as Selena grew, there was still concern about her mental abilities -- and more medical hurdles ahead.

At 18 months, Selena developed high fever while teething and started convulsions while choking on phlegm that had closed off her airway.

That lead to a two-day stint in the hospital while doctors tried to bring her fever down.

Mrs. Varner said nurses told her that Selena could have died had Mrs. Varner not reached her finger down her daughter's throat to dislodge the blockage.

Still there was doubt about Selena's mental abilities until she was about 4 years old.

One day, Varner said, he came home from work to find Selena sitting in the living room floor, calmly picking out the words in his word search puzzle clue list, then finding them in the puzzle.

"That just flabbergasted me."

For the next two years, Varner watched as Selena learned at a tremendous rate, grasping her colors, letters -- even mastering Pac-Man and other video games.

As Selena went through school, it became clear that she had suffered no long-term ill effects from her early birth.

She was accepted into the Hereford Independent School District's Pegasus program for gifted children in the first grade, one of few children to do so.

At Tierra Blanca Primary School, Selena said, kindergarten teachers were at odds what to do with her, as she had learned everything they had to teach before the started school.

Small asteroid to pass 'near' earth on Sunday

about a third of a mile in diameter will whizz past Earth at roughly 12:48 p.m. on Sunday, scientists said.

The object, the largest ever observed passing so close, will miss Earth by about 279,000 miles - a close call in astronomical terms.

There is no chance of an actual collision, scientists said. Since the asteroid was detected, astronomers at several observatories have carefully monitored its position and precisely calculated its four-year orbit from today. around the sun.

It will come closer to Earth than all but five other objects ever detected, but will not come as close as the moon, which is 240,000 miles

from Earth. Carl Hergenrother, a University of Arizona senior majoring in atmospheric sciences, and Timothy Spahr, an astronomy graduate who now attends the University of Florida,

made the latest discovery Wednesday. They were using a 16-inch diameter telescope on Mount Lemmon, just outside Tucson, and detected it on photographs each of the two previous nights.

The object, called 1996 JA-1, is traveling through space at about 10 miles per second, or about 36,000 mph, and will cross a distance about 18 times the width of the full moon in one hour.

Spahr, Hergenrother and other astronomers who have plotted its course since its discovery say that makes its approach the sixth-closest known.

"This asteroid wouldn't destroy civilization if it hit Earth, but it sure would mess things up," Spahr said.
If the asteroid struck land, it might

leave a crater several miles wide, devastating an area perhaps hundreds of miles across.

If it struck the ocean, it would produce tsunamis, or tidal waves, that could travel many hundreds of miles and devastate coastlines with waves towering nearly 200 feet high.

There is a chance that huge radiotelescopes could be used to bounce radio waves off the object,

But there may not be time to arrange for the use of the telescopes because the object is coming with little warning, said Steven Ostro, an astronomer who specializes in radar observations of asteroids.

Another recently discovered asteroid, perhaps three-quarters of a mile across, is expected to pass within 1.9 million miles of Earth a week

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Geologists uncover evidence of huge earthquakes centuries ago

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Geologists digging near Palm Springs have found evidence of one of the biggest displacements ever seen along the mighty San Andreas Fault: a 72-foot gap likely created by two major

The quakes probably rattled the earth along the fault's Mission Creek segment hundreds of years ago, the scientists said in interviews.

By digging trenches into soil and rock in the Coachella Valley south of Palm Springs, the geologists discovered evidence that the temblors may have sliced apart a stream channel, shifting the segments 72 feet apart.

At least two quakes - one about 300 years ago and another 250 to 400 years earlier - moved the earth that distance, said Thomas Fumal and Michael Rymer, geologists with the U.S. Geological Survey in Menlo

Each quake would have had to be powerful - magnitude 7.7 to 7.8 - to trigger such a seismic shift, they said. A magnitude 7 earthquake is major, capable of producing widespread, heavy damage.

Each earthquake would have had to displace nearly 36 feet, "about as large as we've seen before," in San Andreas quakes farther north, Fumal

Additional quakes also might have powered the 72-foot shift, Dan Ponti, another geologist with the U.S. Geological Survey, said Friday.

'We can see at least two. There may be another one or two in there,' he said, adding that the preliminary findings leave many unanswered questions about when another temblor might jolt the Mission Creek

The excavated area, about 150 feet by 50 feet, contains a series of intersecting trenches that cut across and parallel to the fault. Fumal and Rymer estimated the dates of the past quakes by analyzing layers of carbon-based peat at the site.

Ponti said there is good evidence that there was another quake along the fault before water cut the channel, which would means there were at least three quakes in the last 1,000 to 1,200 years. The new evidence suggests the

Mission Creek segment probably breaks in fairly large earthquakes somewhat regularly.

If more research suggests such a pattern, "we're probably looking at an average rate of recurrence of

around 400 years," Ponti said. With about 300 years since the last

one, the next "could be another hundred years or maybe tomorrow,"

Seismologists have long suspected that the communities of San Bernardino and Palm Springs are at significant risk of a San Andreas quake in the high magnitude-7 range, Ponti said.

The San Andreas fault stretches 500 miles from San Francisco to the Mexican border.

to keep us informed of every cloud and sprinkle. Maybe to a fault.

For instance, how many times has a local station interrupted a program at a critical point in the plot? Then, when the message has been delivered, there is a commercial break. Everyone knows the station can't afford to miss a commercial so the interruption had to come first.

Far be it for me to say that the population should not be informed, but isn't there a way to monitor the program in progress to avoid breaking in at a critical juncture? How many times have I missed an important piece of action in a drama or mystery? I quit counting.

Now, the other observation about weather reports is the repetitious nature of the interruptions. Over and over, the weather announcers tell us the five-day forecast, if not the 30the same thing. A storm moves two inches, they're back on the air.

surfer probably could go back and a continuous report on weather changes.

There's no intention here to suggest that weather cuts should be eliminated. Probably hundreds of lives have been saved or injuries warning of the progress of storms.

On the other hand, because the reports often are very repetitive, my question is whether TV viewers may develop lower attention levels. In other words, is it overkill?

Modern technology has given these weather reporters such a wide range of equipment, from Doppler radar to computer pictures of storms, that the danger, it seems to me, is that they become enamored with their own capabilities.

Sometimes a station will use a "crawl" across the lower part of the TV screen to alert viewers to weather verbiage. On occasion, I even go changes. While slightly distracting, this seems to me to be imminently what those guys are talking about.



agreements with public entities, and a double phooey on judges who agree.

Sealing those million-dollar deals is an assault against the First Amendment and an insult to taxpayers who have to foot the bill without every seeing the invoice.

Case in point is the secret deal between the owners of the SOuth Texas Nuclear Plant in Bay City and Westinghouse Electric Corp. Owners of the plant, including the City of Austin and City Public Service Board of San Antonio, sued Westinghouse for \$1 billion in 1990, claiming the company manufactured a faulty steam generator. In december 1995, the cities and Westinghouse agreed upon a settlement. Westinghouse insisted on secrecy because they said the deal contains proprietary information. The Associated Press reported that a Westinghouse spokesman said the settlement contains trade secrets that would hurt the company if made

Government agencies have long defended the importance of sealing financial settlements. They fear that revealing dollar-amount details would encourage lawsuit-happy copycats who figure tax-supported entities are easy marks with deep pockets.

This may be true, but nonetheless, taxpayers have a right to know whether their tax dollars are supporting governments which may be unintentionally causing lawsuits because of bad decisions or poor policies. Taxpayers also deserve to know whether the government body follows a pattern

Secrecy is rarely the right way to run an organization funded with public money. While it may be within legal limits to close meetings, issue gag orders and seal settlements, it violates the spirit of the First Amendment and it makes taxpayers very suspicious.

FDA approves implanted heart defibrillator

WASHINGTON (AP) - A surgically implanted device about the size of a cassette tape is able to calm a racing heart and may save thousands of lives under an expanded use approved by the Food and Drug Administration.

The FDA approval Thursday came just six days after the agency received a study that showed that a batterypowered defibrillator cut deaths by more than half among patients who were at risk of sudden cardiac arrest. Dr. Arthur J. Moss, professor of

medicine at the University of Rochester, N.Y., School of Medicine and director of the study, said the implanted defibrillator can constantly

monitor heart action in a patient and quickly correct any threatening, abnormal beat.

"People with this condition can be dead if they don't get outside help within four minutes," Moss said in an interview from a meeting in Seattle of the North American Society

of Pacing and Electrophysiology, where he presented his study results.

He said often people with this condition collapse and are dead long before any medical care is available. But with the automatic, implanted defibrillator, "these people can be

Moss said the surgically implanted device sends strong surges of electrical energy to selected parts of the heart to force the organ into the

proper rhythm. He said the effect is the same as with electrical paddles that emergency room physicians use to restart an arrested heart.

The implanted defibrillator had been approved previously for patients who had had at least one cardiac arrest or who had recurrent rapid heartbeat that had not responded to

Under the new approval, the device can now be put into patients who may have had a heart attack in the past but who are now without symptoms other than rapid or erratic heart rhythms detected on electrocardiograms. About 30 percent of patients in this group treated with traditional drugs die within two years of diagnosis.

Use of the implanted defibrillator, said the FDA, "could save the lives

of thousands of heart attack patients annually."

Moss said about 500,000 Americans could benefit from the new use of the device. He said most of these are people who have had mild heart attacks that left them with cardiac muscle scars that affect the heartbeat for reasons not now

"It is the unpredictability of the beat that is the reason for the defibrillator," said Moss. The device. he said, ensures that a patient will not die simply because his or her heartbeat sinks into a disorganized and inadequate pattern.

The FDA acted after evaluating a study directed by Moss that involved 95 patients treated with the implanted defibrillator and 101 treated with drugs. The patient group with the

heart device experienced 15 deaths, while 39 patients on drugs died of heart attack.

The study was halted early because of the significant differences in

outcomes for the two groups. CPI Guidant Corp. of St. Paul, Minn., submitted the study results to

the FDA last week. The Guidant defibrillator is implanted in the abdomen or on the chest wall near the collar bone and is connected by wires to the heart. The device can be programmed to send small pacing signals to restore proper rhythm to the heart if the beat becomes irregular.

Should the pacing signal fail to correct the beat, then stronger electrical shocks are sent. This shockwave is sent only if the heart requires it, said Moss.

Within the first year of the study, he said, the defibrillator automatically shocked the heart in 40 percent of the patients. At the end of two years, it

saved 60 percent of the patients, said "Without the defibrillator, these

people would have died," he said. Moss said it costs about \$20,000 to implant the defibrillator. Its battery has to be replaced every five to seven years, a procedure he said that is done in an outpatient clinic and "is about as much trouble (for the patient) as going to the dentist."

Philadelphia diners, by their own As for New York admissions, to be the most generous tippers of the lot - more generous by miles than New Yorkers and platefuls ahead of the diners in Los Angeles.

Almost half the Philadelphians surveyed said they tip 20 percent or more when they dine out, say the publishers of the Zagat restaurant

The tipping habits were revealed in the same questionnaires used to gather diners' reviews for the Zagat guides.

New Orleans ran a close second to Philadelphia when it came to tipping, followed by Boston, Orlando and Atlanta. Rounding out the list were Miami, Detroit, St. Louis, Chicago, New York, Minneapolis, Hawaii, San Francisco and Los Angeles.

New York, the self-proclaimed king of the restaurant scene, came in a miserly 10th place. Slightly more than one-third of New York diners said they left more than 20 percent.

But the real penny pinchers are on the other coast: One in four Los Angeles diners admitted to leaving he accepted amount for excellent service. That's dead last, according

to the survey.

The big shocker, at least to the

Zagat people, was Philadelphia, "We thought New Yorkers were the big tippers," said Allan Ripp, a spokeswoman for the company with the ubiquitous little books. "I can't really explain why Philadelphians are

so much more generous."

Neither could Fred Sampson, executive vice president of the New York City Restaurant Association, who was all too happy to criticize Los

Angeles. It was easier than defending his city's performance.

Flat tire caused Brayton's death

AP Sports Writer INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - It was called a rapid deflation. What killed Scott Brayton was nothing more than a plain old flat tire.

When Brayton, the Indianapolis 500 pole-winner, came through the second turn during practice on Friday, something caused his right rear tire to go bad. The tire appeared to be cut, and once the underbody of the car started skidding on the pavement, Brayton was helpless.

His race car crashed against the Indianapolis Motor Speedway's concrete wall at more than 230 mph. Brayton never regained conscious-

"Scotty just loved this place," car owner John Menard said. "He loved running fast here, he loved the

competition. He was so proud he had the pole. ... He died doing what he loved, I guess. And if I know Scott, right now he's probably telling God a joke."

The easy-going Brayton, one of the most glib and most popular drivers, was also one of the fastest. With the retirements in recent years of many of the old guard drivers such as A.J. Foyt, Al Unser Sr. and Mario Andretti, Brayton also was the most experienced Indy driver and had 14 previous starts at Indianapolis. He had driven in 150 Indy-car races overall.

Brayton, 37, of Coldwater, Mich., was driving a backup Lola-Menard, a routine practice for almost every team. He had just completed a lap at almost 229 mph when the tire went out. The car did a half-spin and went 420 feet backwards into the wall. It slid along the wall another 360 feet, then made a quarter-spin and traveled another 600 feet before coming to a stop in the back straightaway.

He was taken by stretcher to an ambulance, driven to the infield hospital and then taken to Methodist Hospital downtown, where he was pronounced dead 33 minutes after the 12:17 p.m. crash.

"Scott and I were great pals besides being competitors," said former teammate Arie Luyendyk, who broke Brayton's track record last Sunday but could not take the pole because it was on the second day of qualifications. "We just had a great time together last night. I wish we could turn back the clock, but we

Spurs players said the bitter taste of the Houston loss left them determined to make it even farther this postseason.



Baseball may force Schott out

NL president is tired of Cincinnati owner's antics

NEW YORK (AP) - When Marge Schott says people are trying to force her out as owner of the Cincinnati Reds, she might be right. Only it's not someone who wants to buy the team, it's other owners and top baseball officials.

Acting commissioner Bud Selig and NL president Len Coleman prefer that Schott step back from day-to-day operation of the Reds, two highranking baseball officials said this week, speaking on condition they not be identified.

Even before her controversial remarks this month to ESPN and Sports Illustrated, according to the officials, major league baseball was concerned with the way Schott was operating the Reds, especially her cutbacks in baseball operations and marketing. Baseball officials thought the empty seats in Cincinnati during last year's playoffs underscored that she was hurting the sport's bottom

Schott has until Monday to respond to a letter from Coleman in which he expressed grave concern over Schott's management of the Reds. Schott was sent the letter after her interview with ESPN, Reds spokesman Charles Henderson said today.

'She was invited to submit any response to the National League," Henderson said. "This. is not mandatory."

Schott did not return a call to her office this morning.

While current owners refused to be quoted about one of their colleagues, several past owners were willing to discuss Schott.

"I hope somebody will urge her to get psychiatric help to get over the notion why she doesn't like certain people and acts the way she does," former Orioles owner Jerry Hoffberger said.

"I wonder if she has the intelligence to be an owner, to decipher what's right and wrong," former Minnesota Twins owner Calvin Griffith said. "I don't know what baseball can do about her. She should be stifled for the good of the game."

Selig is continuing his investigation into Schott following her recent remarks about Adolf Hitler and Asian-Americans. While Selig won't say anything publicly, he is known to be angry that Schott has disrupted baseball's attempts to repair its image following the strike.

Schott declined to comment Thursday on possible moves against her and on criticism that followed her recent interviews.



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

grain fill. In late grain fill, the response to an inch of water is closer to two to three bushels an acre. These yield responses were recorded during normal springlike conditions, where rains occur and soil moisture has not been drastically depleted. "With this year's drought, we

essentially have no stored soil moisture and little prospects of a good rain," the specialist said. The results of a good downpour, or a full inch of water, would likely be higher.

Farmers can check for mid-grain fill by looking for a fully expanded wheat kernel, which still contains water. This generally occurs two weeks after flowering. A positive return should be gained from furrow irrigation at this stage. Once the grain endosperm obtains a soft dough consistency the benefits of a furrow irrigation become more questionable.

Producers using sprinkler irrigation should certainly keep watering wheat for an additional 10 days after mid-grain fill, especially if no rainfall is received.

The plant itself is the best indicator on when to quit irrigation," Bean said. Look for the stem, florets,

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and awns to start losing their color. lead to reduced yields.

"In most years, producers will start reducing the amount of irrigation water being applied to wheat around the middle of May," he said.

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
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Dry spell worst of century for Arizona ranchers

Indian tribe's cattle dying at rate of 10 per day as creeks, springs dry up

By CAROL SOWERS The Arizona Republic

PHOENIX (AP) - No one knows how many miles the parched Herefords walked before they found

But when they reached the all-but-dry Twin Hill Tank near Slaughter Mountain, it was too late. The three cows became stuck in the thick mud, too weak to pull themselves out, too mired to be pulled out by Apache cowboys.

They would die soon, joining the 10 or so cattle dying each day in the high desert of the San Carlos Indian Reservation.

Arizona is in the grip of one of its most severe dry spells of the past

Creeks and springs are drying up, and swimming holes are growing stagnant and warm. Major rivers, such as the Salt, have been reduced to trickles, discouraging rafters.

rip through Arizona's deserts and forests in the summer, instead started in April, scorching tens of thousands

In some rural communities, water no longer is running in some homes and businesses, and bottled water is being used to flush toilets.

As if that weren't enough, there is no rain in sight. No moisture is expected until the mid-July monsoon season, if it comes this year. The rains failed to materialize last year.

"We can expect things to get a little worse before they get better," said Dan Evans, a hydrologist for the U.S. Geological Survey in Tucson.

The rivers give some of the most dramatic testimony to the lack of rain and snow.

Flows on the upper Salt River, between U.S. 60 and Roosevelt Lake, peaked in February, and the river was so low recently that you could walk

Ferocious wildfires, which usually through it and barely get a chill.

In the Phoenix-area, the Salt River Project is expecting the lowest runoff ever into the Salt and Verde rivers. SRP officials are gearing up for a major water-conservation campaign in the coming months.

The creek through Tucson's Sabino Canyon ran dry in early April, two months ahead of normal.

The dry spell is especially unforgiving for Arizona ranchers, forcing them to haul water, sell livestock and look for better pastures.

Usually, the reservation's manmade earthen basins serving as water tanks are full. But at Twin Hill and dozens of other tanks, the water is gone, exposing foot-deep cracks in the hard earth.

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Like his five older siblings before him, Anthony Thuy Dinh, 21, will pick up a degree Sunday from the ville, two hours' drive from the family's home in suburban Washington. At Roosevelt Lake, where local officials recently celebrated the enlargement of Roosevelt Dam, the water level is 56 percent below capacity. The level is expected to drop to 25 percent by the end of June; said Scott Harleson, an SRP spokesman.

"The winter runoff season, January through May, is forecast to be the driest on record," Harleson said.

Seasonal runoff into the Salt and Verde rivers and their reservoirs is expected to be 129,000 acre-feet this year, well below the previous low of 135,000 acre-feet recorded in 1955. Average runoff is 650,000 acre-feet, enough water to serve all 2.5 million

people in the area for a year.

This year's dryness is in stark contrast to the record high runoff of 4.1 million acre-feet set just three years ago, when Arizona experienced statewide floods.

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Program lets users alter photographs

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Put a sneer on the Mona Lisa. Give Newt Gingrich one big eye and one small eye. See your Aunt Audrey with spiked hair.

A new \$50 piece of software, Kai's Power Goo, can do all that, enabling computer users to stretch and twist images like Silly Putty.

"We call this liquid imaging because we turn images into liquid, said John Wilczak, chief executive of Silicon Valley's Meta Tools Inc.

The program goes on sale next month for both Windows-based and Macintosh personal computers.

With Kai's Power Goo, the image changes right in front of your eyes. Click on the corner of the Mona Lisa's mouth, for example, and the smile will grow as you drag the corner upward.

With existing image-manipulation programs, you would have to click on the corner of the mouth, click on where that corner should go and then wait while the computer processed the change.

"It is real hot," said Matt Anghorn, an artist at Warner Bros.' digital studio who saw Power Goo during its debut at the Electronic Entertainment Expo this week. "It's the bargain of the century.'

Kodak plans to include Power Goo with its digital cameras, enabling people to load their snapshots onto a computer and then toy with the images.

Goo was designed by Kai Krause, who started Metal Tools with Wilczak.

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

Awareness month alerts citizens of allergy, asthma

Asthma Awareness Month, and the health professionals at Hereford Health Clinic are alerting local citizens to the symptoms of an

allergic reaction. Many people this time of year complain of what they think are cold symptoms like coughing, sore throats, sneezing, watering eyes and wheezing. A large number of them are actually suffering from an allergic reaction to the pollens in the air, said Jesse Perales, M.D. The warm months are usually the worst time for people

who suffer from this type of allergy. Dr. Perales explained that allergies can be treated in a number of ways and said the best way to combat the allergy is to remove the source of the allergy. However, that is not possible

for air borne pollens. Allergies this time of year usually come from pollens, but some people can exhibit allergy symptoms from pets, house dust, certain foods and some drugs. Simple reactions can probably be treated with over-thecounter medications, but chronic problems, especially asthma, must be treated by the physician.


While most allergic reactions are simply annoying, some can be life-

May is National Allergy and threatening. Reactions to insect stings or certain drugs can cause internal swelling that may lead to breathing problems. This type of reaction should be treated as an emergency, and the patient seek immediate help.

> One of the more serious diseases that can be caused by allergies is asthma. Bronchial asthma ranges from mild to sever, but is usually characterized by breathlessness, wheezing, a dry cough and general difficulty breathing, said Perales. A physician needs to diagnose this illness, and work with the patient to find a regular routine to control the

Dr. Perales said that attacks can helicopter. sometimes be prevented if the person takes certain precautions. Avoiding allergens is the best way to prevent problems. When that is not possible, the physician can choose from a wide variety of medications, including inhalers, that can prevent attacks or lessen the severity of an attack once it starts. Severe attacks may require





He said it is hard to imagine a world without 911, and where victims of medical emergences were transported by hearses.


This year marks the 30th anniversary of the landmark National Academy of Sciences report, Accidental Death and Disability: The Neglected Disease of Modern Society. The report that incited the creation of the EMS system as we know it today.

This report focused national attention on the problems throughout emergency care and revealed that Americans would have a greater chance of survival in the combat zone of Vietnam than on the average city street. That's how undeveloped the EMS system was. It was this report that helped crystalize public opinion on the critical need for an emergency response system.

The Hereford EMS trains

extensively on an on-going basis. Along with maintaining a regular schedule of skills practice and training, each year the Hereford EMS team participates in a mock disaster drill with other emergency services within the county in which mass casualties are expected in the most grueling circumstances.



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"Lightning" In Your Eyes




Sometimes, as the eyes age, the vitreous humor or gel that fills the inside of the eye begins to liquefy, adding tension to the gel's attachment to the retina. This stimulation of the retina may cause up-and-down flashing lights--not as serious as the sudden explosion of light, but still of some concern. If these flashes continue, if there is a decrease in the visual field or the sense of a veil" over the eye, an optometric examination is advised.

Extension News

County Extension Agent-FCS The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has joined with the Texas Department of Health and other agencies across Texas as a partner in prevention during Osteoporosis Action Month.

The campaign will attempt to educate Texans on this debilitating disease. Each year 95,000 Texas women are among 1.5 million American women who receive fractures caused by osteoporosis.

Osteoporosis can gradually develop with few warning signs stealing away strong bones. It affects more than 8 million Americans each year and another 17 million are at high risk. The good news is that osteoporosis can be prevented with a proper diet, proper exercise and a healthy lifestyle.

The occurrence of osteoporosis is well. apparent once it strikes in the elderly. costs more than \$10 billion to treat. As the life expectancy of people continues to grow, the incidence of osteoporosis is expected to triple

within the next 60 years.

Genetics plays a large role in determining who will be affected by osteoporosis. Women are more at risk than men because of smaller muscle and bone mass and because men get more general exercise than women. Men also tend to consume more calcium-rich dairy foods than women.

Family heritage also determines the risk factors for osteoporosis. Caucasians and Asians suffer from osteoporosis more than African-Americans and Hispanics. Also, the servings of milk or yogurt, or 3 onetraits that lead to the disease can pass and-one-half ounce servings of from one generation to another, meaning if a parent or grandparent was affected by the disease, the offspring may certainly be affected as

osteoporosis. A low calcium intake is the primary culprit for inflicting osteoporosis, but a low vitamin D It will affect one out of every two intake, a lack of exposure to sunlight, postmenopausal women or it will physical inactivity, smoking and excessive drinking can dramatically

No one single vitamin or nutrient

can prevent osteoporosis, but by consuming enough calcium-rich products, the risk can be dramatically lowered. The Recommended Dietary Allowance (RDA) for adult females is 800 milligrams of calcium per day. Young adults need 1,200 milligrams per day.

The National Institute of Health recommends an even higher dose with women receiving 1,000 milligrams and young adults receiving 1,200 to 1,500 milligrams. They recommend eating calcium-rich foods such as

dairy products.

Women can meet the RDA for calcium by consuming three 8 ounce cheese per day. More calcium also can be added to the diet by substituting milk, cheese or other dairy products into dishes that are eaten

Other ways to combat osteoporosis preventative measure. Weightbearing exercise such as walking, aerobics and strength training will help build stronger bones and muscular support.

Menopausal women also may consider estrogen replacement to combat bone strength loss.



The Big Boxes Game

ohn Horton stood on the corner of the lot. The building under construction there was going to be huge. This new super store would be four times as large as his own. How could he compete?

John wouldn't quit, he had always been a fighter. He had taken over his father's business when he was 22. He had worked hard, reinvested in the store and had enjoyed steady profits. His business was one the largest, best run in the entire trade area.

Five years ago, John had built a brand new, state-of-theart store. He sand every penny of his savings in it, and bet his future on it. Now, as he stood staring at the concrete foundation of his community's first super store, he felt fear. His livelihood would soon be under attack.

As he turned back toward his own store, John muttered to himself, "Why here, why now?" He didn't know where to turn to for

This story has a familiar ring doesn't it? Many newspapers and business publications have run stories just like this in the last

However, this story goes back a little further in history. Nearly 80 years in fact. Although fictional, John Horton's story has a basis of fact. As early as 1912, big boxes were invading the grocery industry. The media called these mega stores "Super Markets" and these big boxes brought unprecedented change and fear to grocers of the day. Piggly-Wiggly was one of the first self-serve supermarket chains. This aggressive competitor begin in 1916 and opened a whopping 2,700 stores by 1928!

Some independents barely survived, while others grew and prospered. Some threw up their hands and quit even before the supermarket opened. The same situation is still occurring today.

This year, on the average, five new superstores are opening every day. Companies like Wal-Mart, Home Depot, Auto Zone and Best Buy are rolling out hundreds of new stores and their actions are causing quite a stir.

A few weeks ago, I had the experience of appearing on the Phil Donahue television show opposite a group of anti-big-store, and anti-free-enterprise panelists. One of the group, a small business owner who went broke a few years after Wal-Mart opened in his community, blamed his failure on the world's largest retailer. "Wal-Mart put me out of business," he said. "No one can compete

While I have sympathy for any business owner who goes broke, this gentleman was wrong on both counts. Wal-Mart hasn't put anyone out of business and millions of small business owners are competing every day.

The Death of Small Towns

While Wal-Mart takes the media heat, those guilty of causing the death of many downtowns to go unrecognized. Actually, it was Henry Ford, President Eisenhower, Congress and the American consumer who changed this country's shopping

Ford built inexpensive cars while Ike and Congress invested heavily in interstates and better highways. American consumers became more mobile and suddenly had more choices.

Malls, supermarkets and later companies like Wal-Mart gave consumers better choices. It was these fickle, self-interested consumers who quickly put inefficient, poorly managed businesses out of business.

In the early 1900s, not all grocers failed when the supermarkets came to town. Many made changes and regained their competitive edge. The same is true today. Millions are prospering after the big boxes come to town.

Time has not diminished the deep, rich timbre of his famous and familiar

Walter Cronkite, who turns 80 in November, reported the remarkable public events of our lifetime as they happened. Now he is inviting viewers to share his own memories of the 20th century in Cronkite Remembers, airing Thursday, May 23, on CBS.

Historical film and tape clips from the CBS News library and other archives are interwoven with interviews, personal photographs and never-before-broadcast home movies of the Cronkite family.

During the two-hour special, Cronkite recalls the war in Europe, the international tribunal at Nuremberg, other wars - both hot and cold - since then, the civil rights struggle, the elections, deaths, triumphs and scandals of our presidents and our first exploratory steps into space.

Cronkite Remembers takes viewers from the newsman's early days as a print journalist in the 1930s to his time covering World War II for UPI. It spans his years as anchor of the CBS Evening News from 1962 to 1981 and his more recent work, writing and producing documentaries.

During his career, Cronkite reported stunning and shocking news - the truth about the Nazi death camps, the detonation of the first nuclear weapon, the assassination of one president, the resignation of another.

His objectivity in reporting those events is as widely recognized as his signature closing, "And that's the way

In a recent interview from his home in Manhattan, Cronkite spoke about the journalist's ethic and professional commitment to objectivity

"The prime objective is to be objective," he said. "We would be less than human, and certainly very poor journalists, if we didn't have opinions about almost everything."

But the journalist's responsibility is to cut through one's own prejudices and write around them, he says.

"It's built into the subconscious after years of practice, and editors telling you, 'You shouldn't say that,' 'You can't say that,' and, of course, the embarrassment of reading your own stories and realizing you have gone beyond the pale."

Cronkite says the major surprise during his career was the collapse of the Soviet Union.

"It has completely shaken our own plans for the future - for us and the (other) Western nations - and our plans and our assumptions of what the future was going to be like."

Although Marxism is not the answer to ensuring economic fairness, Cronkite says, he believes the most serious problem for the future is the growing chasm between the rich and the poor here and elsewhere.

"We're going to have to try harder, we capitalists, in assuring that everybody really does get an equal chance, and the basis of that is education. We've got to put a lot more not just into our effort to educate everyone, but in our attitude toward it, our understanding that this is a key social and economic issue."

Cronkite Remembers and an eightweek series, Walter Cronkite Remembers, scheduled to air on Discovery Channel in 1997, are the result of 25 hours of interviews in Cronkite's living room, as well as interviews with his family and public figures.

"I've gotten kind of tired, examining my navel here for the last year," he says with a chuckle.



Walter Cronkite, whose career spans six decades, recounts those years in *Cronkite Remembers*, a two-hour special airing Thursday on CBS. Using personal photographs, home movies and newsreels, Cronkite recalls his own life and his memories of the kings, queens, and presidents of our times.



-Margaret W., Prince Edward Island, Canada.



Seniors honored for academic achievements during ceremony in Whiteface Gymnasium

Members of the Hereford High School Class of 1996 sat on the floor of Whiteface Gymnasium for about 1-1/2 hours on the night of May 14 to honor their peers for academic achievements.

Watching on from the stands were numerous family members, teachers and friends who braved the sweltering conditions to cheer on their favorites who received scholarships, academic honors and class prizes.

The highlight of the night came at the very end, when Superintendent Charles W. Greenawalt took the platform for his annual duty of announcing the Valedictorian and Salutatorian of the class.

With cumulative grade-point averages figured to four decimal places to insure accuracy, the top students were named, then presented their gold honor cords and framed certificates of achievement.

Jeb Skiles earned a standing ovation from his classmates and the audience as he walked forward to claim the Valedictorian's title.

Skiles earned the top standing with a weighted grade average of 108.3000.

Selena Varner, was a mere 0.3261 of a point behind Skiles, having an average of 107.9737.

Preparatory to the announcement of the Valedictorian and Salutatorian, HHS principal Terry Russell announced the names of the top students of the class, recognizing those with a grade average of over 90 and -- with the assistance of assistant principals Ken Cole and Mary Ontiveros -- presenting plaques to those with grade averages over 100.

Senior Nathan Diller earned a standing ovation when U.S. Air Force Maj. Donna Medellin formally announced Diller's appointment to the U.S. Air Force Academy.

Medellin said 7,500 young people apply for the appointments, of which only 1,700 are awarded.

The appointment, she said, is the same as a four-year scholarship that pays all costs -- including a monthly stipend to the student.

All told, she continued, the award -- which also will allow Diller to study flying, as well as earn a college degree -- is worth an estimated \$257,000.



Questions abound when parents teach kids values

WACO, Texas - Parents who have tried instilling values in their children know how hard it is to follow through.

A student also must submit working drawings, a plan of procedure, which include photographs of step-by-step procedures; a research paper, including research on the history of the particular project and the wood used; and a bill of materials.

"In the bill of materials we can't use the cost of the wood that is wasted," he said. "It includes only the cost of the actual wood in the final piece."

Classification is determined by the amount of money used in the project so the students must try to be as accurate as possible.

According to Marnell, the paper work is 50 percent of the competition and the project is the other 50 percent. Beginning his woodworking career

in junior high, he has continued to do bigger projects each year. He has qualified for state competition for the last five years and

received best in regional and state for those five years. His projects include a walnut chest, a four-drawer filing cabinet with raised panels, a grandfather clock, a dining table and the roll top

Woodworking is not the only thing that occupies Marnell's time.

He is president of the Woodworking Club, treasurer of the HHS Student Council, and is a member of the National Honor Society.

He will graduate this month in the top five percent of his class. In his spare time, Marnell likes to

go to the lake, water ski, snow ski and take rides in his friend's airplane. Marnell plans to attend Texas A&M in the fall and major in

When asked how he came to decide on business he said with a laugh, "I've always had a fascination with money.

Curious girl grows into woman who authors experiment books

WACO, Texas - Janice VanCleave has always been curious about what makes things tick.

As a child, she remembers throwing a dead frog into a hot deep fryer to get its skeleton.

She also remembers using fingernail polish to print names on the backs of her turtles and taking household appliances apart to see how they worked.

Today, she's still experimenting. She creates things like Mr. Glob out of distilled water and borax (a water softener) and Bouncy Blubber out of distilled water and white glue.

The only difference - she gets paid

She has compiled the instructions for such creations in books and sold

The nationally known author does it all from her home in Central Texas. She has lived in Riesel for the last three years. Before that, she lived in a small town outside Marlin for about seven years. Marlin is her husband, Wade's, home town.

"People think that if you are an author or an actress that you should be in New York or Hollywood, but we prefer small rural areas for the peace and quiet and the trees," said

VanCleave, who is a Houston native. The author began writing about 10 years ago. A publisher asked her to write a science book for children after Slowly pour the colored glue into the seeing her teach an enrichment class to teachers in Fort Smith, Ark.

At the time she had no experience writing books, but she was able to catch on rapidly. Her first book was titled "Teaching the Fun of Physics." Since then she has written more than 30 books and created more than 1,800 experiments that turn household items into science magic.

"If we're not entertaining kids these days, then we're not teaching said VanCleave. "We're

competing with video games, television and the media.'

Although she is no longer a teacher, she still tests her experiments on students - her six grandchildren are willing guinea pigs.

Here are excerpts from VanCleave's "200 Gooey, Slippery, Slimy, Weird & Fun Experiments" and "202 Oozing, Bubbling, Dripping & Bouncing Experiments":

Purpose: To discover how a

Materials: A 4-ounce bottle of white school glue, 1 pint jar, food coloring (any color), a 2-quart bowl, a measuring cup, 1 pint of distilled water, 1 teaspoon of borax powder, a measuring teaspoon and a stirring

Procedure: Pour the glue into the jar, fill the empty glue bottle with distilled water and pour the water into the jar containing the glue. Add 10 drops of food coloring and stir well. Put one cup of distilled water and one teaspoon borax powder into the bowl. Stir until the powder dissolves.

bowl containing the borax, stirring as you pour. Take the thick glob that forms out of the bowl. Knead the glob with your hands until it is smooth and

dry.

Results: Kneading quickly dries the glob and results in a piece of soft pliable material that bounces slightly when dropped.

Purpose: To produce an elastic


Materials: 1 teaspoon of borax, 1 cup of distilled water, a spoon, a timer, a 4-ounce bottle of white school glue, tap water and paper

Procedure: Add the borax to the water. Stir and allow the solution to stand for five minutes. Hold the glue upside down above the cup of borax a thin stream of glue falls into the cup. Stir continuously. Stop the stream of glue when the spoon becomes covered. With your hands, pull the white mass off the spoon. Wash the mass in cold tap water. Dry your hands with a paper towel, then gently press and roll the bouncy blubber in your hands to dry and shape it into a round ball. Drop the ball on a table or hard floor.



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State graduation guidelines don't Congratulations! always teach what colleges want

AUSTIN (AP) - When state Rep. Paul Sadler's daughter began applying for admission to universities, he was surprised to find how many colleges around the country wanted three years of foreign language study.

Luckily, she had enough time left before high school graduation to fit in enough courses.

But Sadler, who heads the House Public Education Committee, says it shows that even involved parents can be caught by surprise.

"When I graduated from high school, two years (of a foreign language) was it," said Sadler, D-Henderson. "Parents and students ought to be aware if you intend for your child to go to college, it may very well be expected of them to have three years of a foreign language."

Those who simply follow state graduation guidelines also may be caught off guard.

Minimum graduation requirements approved by the State Board of Education require no foreign language credits.

And the board recently changed the more rigorous, "recommended" high school program to include two

for one-half credit of speech. Students get a half credit for each semester of work in a course.

Students who complete the recommended program, rather than only meeting minimum requirements, get a notation on their transcript and a potential boost in the eyes of universities and would-be employers.

The recommended foreign language portion was reduced in part because of concerns over students' crowded high school schedules, state officials said. They note that students still may take a third year of foreign language as an elective.

While some Texas public universities recommend three years of a foreign language, none require more than two, according to the **Texas Higher Education Coordinating** Board.

Still, the revision in the recommended high school program has raised concern among foreign language teachers who stress the importance of a second language in a rapidly changing world.

Many textbook companies have arranged their course of study in languages to stretch it over three years, said German teacher Beth Smith of Plano, president of the Texas Foreign Language Association.

"It takes a while to learn a language, and the amount of language that a student can actually use is increased tremendously by the third year of study," said Phyllis Nim-mons, a French professor at Houston Baptist University.

Rachael Gray, who teaches French and English at a Plano high school, said she believes the change will mean fewer students taking a third year of foreign language.

"That will spell a reduction in force for language teachers," said Ms. Gray. But she added that most of the language teachers she knows are certified to teach more than one subject, as she is.

Geoffrey Fletcher, associate state education commissioner for curriculum and assessment, said, "I think it's possible that fewer kids will be taking the classes."








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Santa Fe Indian School benefits tribes, families

By DEBORAH BAKER Associated Press Writer TESUQUE PUEBLO, N.M. (AP) -

A bunch of high school students hunkered down, intently examining a pile of goop they had just scooped from a small stream.

"Ooh, that's gross," one girl

Suddenly there were shricks of surprise, as a 3-inch brown trout was retrieved from the wet debris.

With admiring oohs and ahs the fish was sent gently on its way and the students went back to work, documenting the wiggly stone flies, caddis flies and other larval-stage insects that are indicators of stream

Learning environmental science along the Tesuque River is part of Santa Fe Indian School's new emphasis on community-based education.

The idea is to make the school's curriculum relevant to the needs of Indian communities.

That could not only help tribes, but also keep their members closer to home, says Joseph Abeyta, superintendent of the tribally operated boarding school.

"A lot of our very bright people were taking jobs and opportunities away from home, and that was a significant drain on our resources," he says.

Preparing tribal members for high-tech careers could allow them to live in their communities while working for private firms, government agencies, national laboratories -- or their own tribes.

"If these students learn the technology, they can then go back to their tribes and fill a role that ordinarily the tribe would have to hire an outsider for," says Glenda Moffitt, the school's director of planning and evaluation.

Santa Fe Indian School, run by a board appointed by New Mexico's 19 pueblo governors, has students in

grades 7 through 12. While many of the 500 students come from the pueblos, they also come from the Navajo, Mescalero, Jicarilla, Hopi and other tribes across the country. Most live at the school on a 100-acre

campus in the heart of Santa Fe. On the Tesuque project, SFIS students are creating a repository of information about the river - its flow, its aquatic life, its water quality - that will help both Tesuque Pueblo and

state fisheries managers.

It's part of a statewide program sponsored by the state Department of Game and Fish that is aimed at getting a handle on the health of

But the students' extensive data collection also will contribute to an environmental study Tesuque Pueblo is conducting.

And it could help the tribe assess its water-quality standards. The four-mile stretch of the river that runs through the pueblo north of Santa Fe is important not only for irrigation and recreation - it feeds a fishing pond - but for ceremonial purposes.

"It's fun," says Kimberly Sisneros, 16, a sophomore from Santa Clara Pueblo. "It's interesting seeing what's in the water. ... You're doing it, instead of imagining what it would

While Sisneros and her classmates did a low-tech search of the river water for insects one recent morning, Maya Torralba, 17, a Kiowa-Comanche from Anadarko, Okla., circled the area with a small, yellow, hand-held

The sophisticated instrument, which picks up satellite data, was being used to help map the area. Torralba, a junior, checked her progress on a portable computer

plopped down near the river.
In this experimental year, about 100 students have had some type of community-based instruction, Moffitt

A senior environmental science class, in conjunction with Los Alamos National Laboratory, studied the generation, use and disposal of nuclear waste. The students visited a restoration project at Laguna Pueblo, site of a former uranium mine.

Sophomores in a computer science class learned to be assistant systems operators; they have already helped set up computers, train other students and establish a computer network across the campus, Moffitt says.

"The computers are awesome, It's amazing to see some of the data that comes up," says Matt Perez, 17, a junior who is Picuris and Cochiti. Every single day you learn something

Next year, SFIS hopes to establish "school within a school," in which for some students the entire curriculum - Including science, math and language arts - would be community-based. Moffitt says.

SFIS has some powerful partners in its community-based education efforts: Intel, the world's largest computer chipmaker, and the U.S.

Department of Energy.
Intel has donated a \$285,000, top-of-the-line computer laboratory to the school and an additional \$215,000 in equipment and cash grants. It expects to pump \$100,000 more into the school by the end of 1997.


The Department of Energy has provided a \$150,000 grant.


Intel, based in Santa Clara, Calif., readily admits its self-interest: It wants a work force that better reflects the ethnic and cultural diversity of the population near its plants.

At its Rio Rancho plant near Albuquerque, 1.6 percent of its permanent work force is Indian, compared to about a 12 percent Indian population statewide.

Intel also is supporting curriculum and work-experience projects at the Gila River Indian Community near its Chandler, Ariz., facilities.

Possessive attitudes of teens often explained as 'protective'

The Monitor (McAllen) McALLEN, Texas - The stakes in

teenage romances can be high. Biological changes in a young person's body bring up exciting and sometimes confusing new feelings, experts say. The involved parties often are negotiating the terms of an intense relationship - and eventually its ending - for the first time.

Overly possessive or jealous behavior often is explained away by a young suitor who says he is just being "protective." "I see it here in these halls," said

Leo Ramirez, a criminal justice teacher at Edinburg High School. "A guy grabs his girlfriend by the arm, saying, 'What are you doing, talking to them?" "

"They say, 'It's just because I love you,' "Ramirez added.

Young women here can be just as jealous and overbearing, Edinburg High School Principal Herminia Martinez said.

But possessive behavior can lead to violence, and violence between partners still is overwhelmingly male against female, experts say.

Of all women in Texas who were murdered, 38 percent were killed by

a husband or boyfriend, according to 1993 statistics from the state Department of Public Safety.

Nationally, about 30 percent of murdered women ages 15 to 19 meet their death at the hands of boyfriend as well, according to statistics cited by Mujeres Unidas, a local women's

A teen's best defense against becoming a victim of a violent relationship is to recognize the warning signs and set boundaries acceptable to both sides, local experts said.

"For many teens, there is confusion between love and jealousy. There are big misconceptions about what love is," Mary Anna Guerra, a coordinator for Mujeres Unidas, said.

Mujeres Unidas is a shelter for battered women and children. The organization provides a telephone hotline and education center to deal with violence against women.



Its coordinators have been taking seminars to Rio Grande Valley schools to specifically address dating violence among teens.

Guerra passes out a "Relationship Contract," which asks boys and girls to set parameters for their relation-

will you spend every weekend and evening together? Are you free to continue other friendships, including with members of the opposite sex? Is there any situation in which it would be OK for your partner to boss you around? To push you? To hit you?

Many teens are too carried away by their rush of emotions to realize that they can - and should - consciously make these decisions, Guerra

"It's a revelation for a lot of students," she said. "They never realized that they have the right to say what they are and are not comfortable

with in a relationship."

Just because a relationship already has become intense or intimate does not mean either person is obligated to continue with it if they do not want



Last fall, Rhonda, 17, was learning how to walk, talk, eat and think again. Critically injured in an August car accident near the high school, Rhonda was in a coma for several weeks. The noontime accident was one of the reasons Corpus Christi principals voted to close school campuses during lunch.

Rhonda is now back in school and taking a full schedule of classes, including her favorite, law enforcement. She's very strong, Graham notes, but is still working on improving her coordination. He is amazed at the strides made by the junior, who, when she emerged from the coma in September, couldn't sit up on her own.

For Rhonda, the past few months have been filled with challenges, most notably problems with her memory. She has no recollection of some of the friendships she had before the accident and, at times, forgets what she did the previous day.

But those who know her say she has a strong spirit and sense of determination.

She has begun using her experience to help others by visiting with head-injury victims and their families. During these encounters, she shows them a videotape of her rehabilitation work from the early days of her therapy.

"We watch it, and I think, "I can't believe I went through that,' ' Rhonda said during a recent interview.

Rhonda is not the same person she was before the accident. Back then. she rarely spoke out in class, Graham said. He was pleasantly surprised when she began to participate in classroom discussions this spring. Then one day she really amazed him.

After she had been back in class about six weeks, she asked Graham if she could address the law enforcement students. That day, she spoke frankly about her injury to a group composed of about three classes, he said.

"She told them, "I'm different than I was. I don't remember things

from my past,' "he said.
Rhonda told the students that she had noticed that a few avoided her. "She said, 'The only thing different between me and you is I'm building a new life and personality."

The students gave her a standing ovation.

"Before the accident, I would never have expected Rhonda Garcia in her life to stand in front of 60 kids and do what she did," Graham said. "I couldn't get her to talk to me prior

to this. Now she has no problem meeting the public, conversing with classmates and voicing her opinion."

The students have started to coddle her less, Graham said, which has been evident in some recent soccer games with her classmates. "When the ball comes to her, they knock her down like the rest of them," he said.

Although she has a slight limp when she walks, Rhonda is still active. She lifts weights and is learning how to in-line skate, an activity she cherished before the accident. She watches television less and talks more since the accident, said her mother, Nora Gutierrez. "She used to be a couch potato," she said. "Now the TV is hardly ever on." Rhonda has a soft voice and, at times, speaks in a hesitant manner. Her conversations are marked with frequent smiles and laughter.

She spends a lot of her spare time with her mother and caring for her pets - a poodle, a pair of chihuahuas named Snickers and Chiquita, and an iguana. She had begged her mother to buy an iguana for years, and Gutierrez finally gave in this past

"I named him Mark, after my close friend," Rhonda said with a laugh. "He was so honored."

The iguana sits in the corner of what Nora has dubbed the "rehabilitation room."

Weight machines lie in the middle of the room. Over to one side is a stereo and a compact disc collection that covers a broad spectrum of artists.

"I like rock, mostly alternative, and classical. I just bought two new CDs - Beethoven and Mozart," Rhonda said, placing them next to releases by Def Leppard, AC/DC and Mariah

The teen was wearing a white T-shirt that said, "Brat," in small letters, jeans and a beaded necklace with a silver cross. She talked fondly of her friends as she looked at posters made by her classmates and some green homecoming mums brought to her when she was in the hospital.

Her friends were supportive when she went back to school, Rhonda said. "They were there by my side," she said. "They would walk me to class and help me up and down the stairs." She also was touched by the friendliness of other students, "Before the accident, there were some people I didn't get along with," she said. "The first day back they walked up and gave me a hug and said, 'Hi.' "

Rhonda and her mother also have reached out to others whose lives have been altered by brain injuries. They visited with the family of a teen who is in a coma and talked to a 17-year-old boy who is going through therapy from a similar injury. Rhonda said she thinks she helps the teens. "They know I went through what they are going through and I came out OK," she said. "So they know they'll be OK, too."

Rhonda's accident happened on Aug. 31 as she headed to meet her mother

As she pulled out of the school parking lot in her mother's Ford Probe,

she was struck on the left side by a Chevrolet Blazer, witnesses said. A brush guard on the front of the Blazer went through the driver's side window, hitting Rhonda in the head.

The day after the accident, which came soon after a gang-related lunchtime shooting near Carroll High School, Corpus Christi's high school principals decided to close campuses during lunchtime.

Although many students objected to the closure of campuses, they have not aired their complaints to Rhonda.

"One time, this girl was walking me up the stairs and we were talking about leaving school for lunch," Rhonda said. "She said they had closed campuses after my accident, but she didn't care. She never ate off

campus, anyway."

Rhonda believes that students should stay on campus during lunchtime to avoid accidents. "It should be closed or someone might go through the same thing I did," she

Rhonda and her mother were close before the accident, and the bond has since grown. Now, the teen visits with her friends at noon but waits until 3 p.m. to eat so that she can have lunch with Gutierrez.

For Rhonda, the past nine months have been about setting and meeting goals and surpassing expectations.

When she was in the rehabilitation hospital, she wasn't scheduled to leave until January. But she set her sights toward getting home by Christmas.

She left the hospital a few days after Thanksgiving.

Her next missions were to go back to school and to finish her therapy. She accomplished those and now has set her sights on finishing high school, going to college and becoming a police officer.

"I want to go out there and protect everyone who needs it," she said. For now, she reads books about legal cases and enjoys mysteries.

Rhonda surprised classmates in her reading class recently when she selected a book about mass murderer Jeffrey Dahmer.

"People ask me why I would want to read that and I tell them, 'Who knows, when I become a cop, I might meet someone like that," "she said.

Graham believes Rhonda has the potential to go through a law enforcement academy in a few years. "I think she's got the drive to go for this," he said. "Mentally, I think she probably is capable of reaching that goal. Right now, she doesn't have the skills and the training, but then again, she's a junior in high school.

"She has more drive than many of my non-injured students," he said. Rhonda's biggest obstacle is her

"The hardest thing is trying to remember," Rhonda said. "Like, sometimes, they'll ask me what we did the day before, and I won't remember.'

Many people who suffer head injuries develop ways to compensate for the memory loss, said Coleen Indridson, occupational therapist. They may keep detailed daily calendars and use tape recorders in

But attending college is a definite possibility for her. "I hope she does," Indridson said. "There's no reason why she couldn't." The fact that Rhonda has gone back to school speaks volumes about her integrity and progress, Indridson said.

"She's with her peers and has shown the courage to say, 'I've gone on. I've conquered this terrible tragedy in my life,' "Indridson said. "It's difficult to go back, knowing that she's different than she was before.

"We have a lot of head injury (patients) who don't go back to school. They're nervous. They can function, but their cognitive functions

For now, Rhonda already is looking forward to next year. She is planning to participate in Del Mar College's "College for Kids" summer program and take algebra, reading, Spanish and country and

western dancing.
She will have to retake her junior

year and has signed up for law enforcement again and French.


She has grown closer to her teachers over the past few months,



her mother said. And members of the and the amount of injury she had faculty seem delighted with her Rhonda shouldn't be what Rhonda is today."

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
