





Voters give school board major facelift

The Hereford Independent School District board of trustees got a major facelift on Saturday when four newcomers were selected by voters to take their seats on the sevenmember panel.

Three of the election winners were assuming seats vacating by either resignation or incumbents choosing not to run again.

The fourth, Charlie Arellano, upset incumbent trustee Raul Valdez to claim the District 2 trustee seat.

Unofficial results showed Arellano received 60 votes, while Valdez garnered 51 votes.

All school district election results will be canvassed and certified at a special meeting at 6 p.m. today in the HISD administration building board room. That is the original time set for the session. The Hereford Brand incorrectly reported the meeting time in Sunday's newspaper.


The other three new trustees are David Charest, Tracy Straughan and Jeff Torbert.

Charest topped a field of three candidates to claim the District 4 seat being vacated by Ron Weishaar. Charest garnered 51 votes. Angic Alonzo was second with 32 votes and Leroy Lucero was third with 17 votes.

In District 5, Straughan topped a three-man field to claim the seat



Recovery of economy working to advantage for Clinton re-election

WASHINGTON (AP) - Bill Clinton, the man who used a sick economy to his advantage in winning the White House in 1992, has to be smiling about recent developments a 14-month low.

Suddenly the "Clinton crunch" that opponent Bob Dole has been denouncing doesn't look so bad, at least to the Democrats. And the White House is busy basking in the outpouring of good economic news.

Wage gains from January through March were the strongest they have been in five years. Unemployment fell to a low of 5.4 percent in April. And the gross domestic product, the broadest measure of economic health. rebounded to a 2.8 percent growth rate in the first quarter.

The increase in the nation's total output of goods and services would have been an even more astonishing 4.4 percent had it not been for the General Motors strike, the winter blizzards and the government shutdowns.

Even at 2.8 percent, the GDP advance was five times faster than the puny 0.5 percent rate of economic growth turned in during the final three months of last year.

Dole at the time cited the 0.5 percent figure to bemoan the weakest economic growth since the last recession."

And speaking in Iowa last month, the Senate majority leader and been rising this year because investors presumed GOP presidential nominee are worried about inflation. suffering from "the Clinton crunch of higher taxes and lower wages."

In White House briefings, President Clinton's advisers wasted no time last week highlighting the statistical upturn.

"There is no way anyone can talk about a 'Clinton crunch' with a straight face, when the economy is growing at an annualized rate of 2.8 percent and new job growth is averaging 166,000 per month," Labor Secretary Robert Reich said in an interview.

Of course, the Republicans see things differently. In a speech Friday, Dole contended that Clinton had inherited an economy growing at a 4.3 percent rate and "now we're lucky if it hits a fast crawl."

Dole is correct about GDP growth a strong rebound after a period of in the first quarter of 1993 when sluggishness, and unemployment at Clinton took office. Many private economists say it was the timing of the upturn that played the critical role in President Bush's defeat and Clinton's economic successes.

> Bush had endured a brief but painful recession in 1990-91 and the recovery looked so tenuous in the election year of 1992 that many analysts were warning of a possible 'double-dip" in which the country would topple back into a second downturn.

> Their warnings did not come true, but the expansion did not become firmly entrenched until the final three months of 1992, too late to save Bush at the polls.

> By contrast, Clinton will be the first president since Lyndon Johnson to face voters without having undergone a recession. The current recovery, already the second longest in peacetime history, has allowed Clinton to fulfill his campaign pledge of creating 8 million jobs in four years, with one year to spare.

> Of course, the current forecasts could prove wrong. The biggest threats are in the inflation area, where oil and food prices have been misbehaving, and in long-term interest rates, which have

said American families were But many economists say any depressing effect from the rise in interest rates shouldn't become noticeable until after the election, the television shows and speeches, exact opposite of the situation that confronted Bush. In 1992, the economy's strength did not become apparent until after the polls closed.

> "The economy is going to look pretty good on Election Day," said Michael Evans, economics professor at Northwestern University. "The rise in interest rates will begin to have a negative effect in the fourth quarter. but by then the election will be over."

Democrats can't block gas tax repeal GOP has votes to pass temporary cut in federal levy

WASHINGTON (AP) - Senate Democrats are conceding they can't block an election-year push by Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole and other Republicans to temporarily cut the federal gasoline tax.

"They're in the majority. They have the votes," Senate Minority Leader Tom Daschle, D-S.D., said Monday.

Democrats are forgoing a fight even though many are criticizing the reduction, saying it could amount to a windfall for oil companies if they don't pass along the cut to consumers. And environmentalists maintain the tax cut would encourage more energy consumption and hurt the environment.

Republicans were hoping to unveil details of the bill today and, in the Senate, possibly vote on it. Dole, the presumptive GOP presidential nominee, said he would discuss the timing of the vote with Daschle as well as the possibility of voting on the minimum-wage increase long sought by Democrats.

ressure on the minimum wage, Dole, R-Kan., proposed on April 26 to repeal a 4.3 cent surcharge added to the gas tax by President Clinton and Congress, without a single GOP vote,

His call came amid increasing annoyance from motorists over gasoline prices, which have jumped around 20 cents a gallon since February. Republicans have sought relentlessly to exploit the "issue politically, and Democrats defend

Action by Republicans was to coincide with Tax Freedom Day, also today. As calculated by the business-financed Tax Foundation, Tax Freedom Day is the date the average taxpayer has earned enough to pay federal, state and local taxes for the year.

A rival group, the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities, calculates the cut would shave less than half a day from Tax Freedom Day. But Dole said Tax Freedom Day was "a great day to send a message, a small message, but a message, to

While under heavy political the American taxpayer that relieves at least some of their burden."

At the White House, spokesman Mike McCurry said Clinton wanted the tax cut considered as part of a balanced budget. But that doesn't mean Clinton had decided to veto it.

"If it comes to us separately, we'll look at it separately," McCurry said.
"We would hope that the Congress would give equal priority treatment to raising the minimum wage."

The measure being prepared by Republicans, according to aides who spoke on condition of anonymity, would start the repeal in mid-May or June 1 and end it on Dec. 31. Republicans said they would make it permanent in the 1997 budget due to

be sent to Clinton in September.

The leading proposal in both the House and Senate for paying for the temporary cut was separate legislation strengthening the government fund insuring savings and loan deposits.

That plan requires a one-time premium payment from S&Ls and, under budget rules, the money can be used to offset the \$2.8 billion cost of

the tax cut through December. House GOP leaders also are looking at a cut in Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary's

S&Ls don't mind their money being used for the tax cut because the deposit insurance measure would require commercial banks to share the cost of paying off S&L bailout bonds sold by the government in the late 1980s and early 1990s.

The Clinton administration supports the S&L legislation and Daschle said he was "not necessarily averse" to using it to cut the gas tax.

On Sunday, House Majority Leader Dick Armey, R-Texas, suggested on NBC that the cut could be offset by wringing waste from federal education programs. House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., said Monday, "I don't think that will happen.'

House Democrats nonetheless scheduled a news conference today with education groups to ridicule Armey's suggestion.





SEATTLE (AP) - It was bombs away for the Seattle SuperSonics, and the Houston Rockets' chances of an NBA three-peat took a broadside hit.

With a sizzling 74 percent playoff-record 3-point shooting barrage, Seattle now has the two-time defending champions going back to Texas wondering if their title run is

After their 105-101 victory over Houston on a Monday night when they were better from the 3-point line than they were the free throw line, the Sonics hold a 2-0 lead in their Western Conference semifinal series.

"Nothing surprises me any more with this team," Seattle's Hersey Hawkins said. "Not our 64 wins during the regular season, not our 3-point shooting in this game. Nothing.'

The Sonics, through the first round of the playoffs for the first time in three years, sank 20 of 27 3-point tries, including 13 in a row.

That broke the Rockets' playoff record of 19 3s set last season in the opening round against Utah. It didn't do anything good for Houston's spirits, either.

'Hopefully, Seattle won't keep shooting like this," Houston's Mario Elie said. "But if they do ...

Tonight, it's Utah at San Antonio in the opener of their second-round series, and New York at Chicago in Game 2 of their series. The Bulls won the first game 91-84 Sunday.

On Wednesday, Atlanta visits Orlando in the opener of their second-round matchup.

Nate McMillan ended the first quarter Monday night with a 3-pointer with 1.7 seconds to go. The Sonics sank seven more in the second period to tie a playoff record and had five more in the third quarter.

"Everybody was in a groove," said Hawkins, his team's leading regular-season 3-point shooter. "All year long we've been taking the 3-point shots when they've been there. Everybody was just feeling it in this game."

During the regular season, the Sonics shot 36 percent from 3-point range. Their best 3-point game was a 12-for-20 performance (60 percent) against Orlando on March 13.

The Sonics missed five of 16 free throws (68 percent) against the Rockets in Game 2.

How do you explain it? Coach George Karl couldn't. 'We shot the ball unbelievably," he said. "My gut feeling is we took

Rockets and we're still standing." Houston wasn't bad from beyond the 3-point arc itself. The Rockets were 13-for-27, giving the Sonics and Houston a playoff record for

a hell of a shot from the Houston

combined 3-pointers in a game (33). McMillan continued his dazzling perimeter playoff shooting by hitting all five of his 3s, tying an NBA record.

"The shots are there and my legs feel pretty good," McMillan said. In his first 10 seasons in Seattle, he shot 21 percent (16 of 74) in 69 playoff games. In six games against Sacramento and Houston, he's 14 for

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19 (74 percent).

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"I've always felt I could shoot the ball," McMillan said.

Karl has had his players shooting extra 3s after practices. They must make 30 3s in order to go home. McMillan said he's benefited from the extra work.


"For a month or so, my shot has been falling," he said.

By beating Houston for the 11th consecutive time since March 10, 1994, including six this season, the Sonics are in a position to sweep the Rockets. Games 3 and 4 will be played in Houston on Friday night and Sunday.

The Rockets reminded everyone that they overcame 0-2 deficits the past two seasons against Phoenix in

the conference semifinals. They don't give out medals for winning two games," Houston's Kenny Smith said. "You get medals for winning four games."

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
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

Former CIA Director Colby died in area called his 'favorite spot'

ROCK POINT, Md. (AP) - As a retired spymaster, William Colby was familiar with cities all over the world, but one of his favorite spots was a quiet, southern Maryland riverbank, where he and his wife went on walks together.

The former CIA director bought a vacation home near the tiny stretch of beach, and, his wife said, even talked about buying the property, which is covered with oyster shells and marshland.

On Monday morning, Sally Shelton-Colby returned to the beach along the Wicomico River, this time to identify her husband's body, which was found after an eight-day search involving divers, dogs and sonar equipment. Colby died, apparently by drowning, during a solo canoe outing.

Just two days before the body was found, Ms. Shelton-Colby walked along the riverbank with friends, firm in her belief that her 76-year-old husband, who directed the CIA for Presidents Nixon and Ford, was still

After identifying the body, Ms. Shelton-Colby thanked the searchers and said her husband had left the world a better place.

'There wasn't much that was left undone for him," she said. "He fought fascism and communism and lived to see democracy take hold in

secluded spit of beach about a half-mile from his home, 100 yards he served at the U.S. embassies in downstream from where his swamped Stockholm and Rome, and became canoe was discovered a day after he disappeared April 27.

No life jacket was found with the body, clad in khaki pants, a red windbreaker, a blue and white shirt, and no shoes. Ms. Shelton-Colby said her husband customarily kept the life jacket in the canoe but didn't wear it.

Colby, an avid outdoorsman, was probably alive when he fell into the water and suffered hypothermia and drowned, authorities said. Experts had said that it can take days for a drowning victim's body to surface, so it was not considered unusual that it took so long to find Colby.

There were no marks on the body to indicate foul play, Sheriff Fred

A spy for more than three decades, the bespectacled Colby was perfectly cast for his role: colorless, soft-spoken, precise and thin. He fit this published description: "Mr. Colby never seems to have a hair or an emotion out of place."

Even Colby said, in his 1978 memoir, that he was "the traditional gray man, so inconspicuous that he can never catch the waiter's eye in a restaurant.'

Born Jan. 4, 1920, in St. Paul, Minn., Colby's intelligence career began in August 1944, when he parachuted into France for the Office


