The Hereford Independent School District board of trustees got a major facelift on Saturday when four newcomers were selected by voters to take their seats on the seven-member panel.

Three of the election winners were assuming seats vacating by either resignation or incumbents choosing not to run again.

The fourth, Charlie Arellano, upset incumbent trustee Raul Valdez to claim the District 2 trustee seat.

Unofficial results showed Arellano received 60 votes, while Valdez garnered 51 votes.

All school district election results will be canvassed and certified at a special meeting at 6 p.m. today in the HISD administration building board room. That is the original time set for the session. The Hereford Brand incorrectly reported the meeting time in Sunday's newspaper.

The other three new trustees are David Charest, Tracy Straughan and Jeff Torbert.

Charest topped a field of three candidates to claim the District 4 seat being vacated by Ron Weishaar. Charest garnered 51 votes. Angie Alonzo was second with 32 votes and Leroy Lucero was third with 17 votes.

In District 5, Straughan topped a three-man field to claim the seat

## Incumbents, Soliz win city commission seats Saturday

Voters in the City of Hereford Saturday elected a new city commissioner and returned three commissioners to their seats.

Joe Soliz defeated Eugene Condarco for the Place 2 position, by a vote of 108 to 69.

Unopposed for a new term in the Place 4 seat, Wayne Winget collected 185 votes.

Re-elected to at-large seats on the commission are Carey Black, Place 5, and Roger Eades, Place 6. Frank Maes Jr., running for one of the two seats, polled 257 votes to 718 for

Black and 601 for Eades.

The vote results were canvassed by the City Commission in regular session Monday evening. Newly-elected commissioners will take the oath of office at a meeting of the commission next Monday.

Terms of office are two years. Commissioners Silvana Juarez, Place 1, and Scott Hall, Place 3, have a year remaining on their terms.

In a generally quiet election, a total of 1,000 registered voters turned out to cast ballots. Early voting

accounted for 464 of the ballots.

The defeated Place 2 candidate, Condarco, was appointed to the seat in January, replacing Nancy Grigo, who was called to active duty with the U.S. Army. Condarco was seeking his first full term.

The numbers in the city election are significantly lower than registered voters in the city and individual districts. A total of 1,476 voters could have cast ballots for Place 2.

Registered voters for Place 4 totaled 1,724. Total number eligible in the city is 7,133.

## City adopts park facility policies

A reservations policy for use of City of Hereford park facilities was adopted at the Monday evening meeting of the City Commission.

The commission also approved a Jobs Incentive Program requested by Hereford Economic Development Corporation and voted to move the meeting scheduled for May 20 to May 13.

City Manager Chester Nolen reported that specifications for drilling two new water wells have been re-written and submitted for bids. There were no bids received on May 2.

Explaining that some problems have surfaced in parks over use of pavilions, Nolen said the policy proposed is similar to that used for

the Community Center. A major difference is there is no fee for use of park facilities.

The policy proposed by Nolen and City Attorney Terry Langehennig is designed to establish ground rules for reserving facilities.

There will be no fee for use of public facilities, but reservations should be made at least three days in advance at City Hall.

Reservations will be posted at the appropriate facility to ensure that the pavilion is available to the individual or group requesting use.

Nolen pointed out that a reservation will be in effect for a maximum of 12 hours.

Citizens or organizations applying for reservations will be responsible for proper care of facilities during time of use.

HEDC Executive Director Mike Hatley reviewed the Jobs Incentive Program proposed to encourage expansion of business.

Action by the City Commission on HEDC programs that include expenditure of tax funds is required.

Jobs Incentive offers cash to business owners who add new employees to their workforce and maintain the positions for at least a year.

Basic businesses -- those that derive 75 percent or more of their revenues from outside Deaf Smith County -- will be eligible for the cash incentives, on verification of their employment record.

David Stuart of Oller Engineering, the firm responsible for design of the

## 3 incumbents, Collier capture hospital posts

Voters in the Deaf Smith County Hospital District returned three incumbents to the board and elected one new director in Saturday's election.

Boyd Foster, Larry Watts, Dean Crofford and newcomer Mark Collier drew the most votes in an at-large field of six candidates. Incumbent Steve Cortez and challenger Henry Reid were the other candidates. Voters could choose four candidates.

Foster, elected for a fourth term, polled 644 votes, and Crofford had 643. Watts was next with 603, and Collier polled 556 votes, just 37 more than Cortez. Henry Reid drew 170 votes.

A total of 1,049 ballots were marked, with 500 being cast Saturday and 509 in early voting.

Collier, associated with Premier Medical Services, said he was "pleased with the turnout" and, of course, the results. "I look forward to serving on the board the next two years. Health care is part of my life and I feel I can be an asset to the board."

## Trio sentenced in district court

Three defendants were sentenced in 222nd District Court Monday after entering guilty pleas to charges.

After entering a plea to aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, Kevin Ray Austin, 31, was granted deferred adjudication and given seven years' probation. He also was ordered to pay a \$1,500 fine.

Luz Martina Andrade, 28, charged with the state jail felony of theft over \$1,500 but under \$20,000, was sentenced to two years in state jail, probated for five years. A fine of \$1,000 was levied.

On a plea of guilty to sexual assault of a child, Johnny Joe Zambrano, 20, was sentenced to six years' probation.

Judge David Wesley Gulley heard the pleas.

A motion for probation after completion of Texas Department of Criminal Justice boot camp was granted by Judge Gulley for Marvin Lee Gavina, charged with felony driving while intoxicated. He was sentenced to four years' probation.

Yolanda Fuentes, sentenced to a 10-year term in TDCJ earlier, applied for shock probation and was granted probation of 10 years.

On the state's motion to revoke probation, Judge Gulley agreed to modify terms of probation of Enrique Rios, convicted earlier of felony driving while intoxicated. He will be required to enter a state treatment facility.

## Letter offers help to those who have suffered sexual abuse

Dear Ann Landers: I am writing to help others heal from the effects of being touched inappropriately. I know a lot about the subject -- firsthand.

When I was about 11 years of age, a relative who was five years older asked me if he could scratch my back. I had younger brothers who would often play "What letter am I writing on your back?" so I never thought twice about the offer. After some playful laughter, he touched more than my back.

I was so ashamed, I never told anyone, but I never could put it out of my mind. A year ago, I wrote that relative telling him what I remembered and confronting him about the repercussions I have suffered since. He phoned me several nights later and insisted that I had been the aggressor. What's worse, when I told my family, they believed his denial and insisted I had made up the story because my blood sugar was off. (I am a diabetic.)

I am now in graduate school and a candidate for a medical fellowship. I hope to help women who have been sexually abused. I am now getting counseling and beginning to heal because I finally realize I did nothing wrong.

My message to your readers is this: Don't keep it locked inside, as I did. Confront it, and get it out in the open, even if nobody believes you. Eventually the truth will triumph and set you free. -- Philadelphia

Dear Philadelphia: I want to thank you for urging readers who have been sexually abused to speak out. It doesn't matter how long ago the abuse took place. It is extremely important that you tell someone. And

don't be secretive about it. The perpetrator deserves to be exposed, and telling the story will help you heal.

Dear Ann Landers: I read with interest your column about the woman who was having a face lift done and wondered if she could have a hysterectomy and some varicose veins removed at the same time. The doctor you consulted said it was indeed possible and that he, in fact, had done it.

I am a retired dentist. Many years ago, I had a patient who needed several wisdom teeth extracted. He asked, "As long as I'm out, would it be all right if a surgeon did a circumcision at the same time?" Of course, the surgeon refused.

Please tell your readers, Ann, that for the best results, one should not try to do too many things at once. -- Longtime Follower, in Memphis

Dear Memphis: How right you are. People who try to do too many things at once invariably end up doing some things over. No time is saved, and the results are often unsatisfactory.

Dear Ann Landers: This may seem petty, but I am married to one of the most insensitive slobbs around. The thing that bugs me more than anything is his lack of appreciation.

I have a job that pays well, and I pick up the bills for more than half of the household expenses. I'm a good cook and try hard to prepare meals my husband will enjoy. I keep hoping that I will live long enough to hear him say, "Honey, this dinner is delicious." The big oaf loads up his plate and takes second helpings but never says a word.

I am getting to the point that I just want to open a can of beans and forget it. Any advice? -- Wife of Mr. Lockjaw in N.J.

Dear Mrs. Lockjaw: Tonight when your husband comes home for dinner, serve him a can of beans, and place this column next to it. That should do it.

**A's play well, beat Indians**

The Oakland Athletics needed 14 tries to play to the level of the Cleveland Indians.  
The Indians have the best record in baseball again after a rocky start, and they had Jack McDowell on the mound Monday night to protect a 13-game winning streak against Oakland dating back to July 21, 1993.  
But the A's got timely hitting, strong fielding and solid relief pitching to beat Cleveland 5-3.  
"It's a funny thing about sports. Sometimes you play up to the level of your competition, and I think we did that tonight," A's manager Art Howe said. "We played about as well as we can play."  
McDowell allowed just one hit from the third through the seventh innings, and led 3-2 going into the eighth. But a single by Ernie Young and a sacrifice in the eighth got McDowell out of the game.

Three Cleveland relievers then gave up five straight hits, including an RBI double by Jason Giambi off Paul Assenmacher (0-1), an RBI single by Mark McGwire off Eric Plunk and an RBI single by Geronimo Berroa off Jim Poole.  
"It was exciting. If you can't get up for a game like this, especially against Jack McDowell, you shouldn't be playing," said Giambi, who also made several outstanding plays at third base. "I played a good game. The whole team played a good game."  
Elsewhere in the AL, Seattle edged Minnesota 5-4, Kansas City beat California 9-4 and New York defeated Detroit 10-5.  
Cleveland's loss was just its fifth in 23 games.  
"It's just tough when you come in and throw a couple of pitches and blow the game for the starter," Assenmacher said. "It's the hardest

thing for a reliever, but it's my job."  
Albert Belle hit his 12th homer for the Indians. Julio Franco had an RBI double and Carlos Baerga added a run-scoring single.  
Kenny Lofton stole three bases for Cleveland and leads the majors with 22 steals.  
Terry Steinbach gave Oakland a 1-0 lead in the second with his sixth homer, and Giambi's first RBI double in the third made it 2-0.  
**Mariners 5, Twins 4**  
Seattle got five shutout innings from three relievers, holding Minnesota in check before the Mariners scored four runs in the seventh inning.  
Bob Wells (2-0) was the main beneficiary of the rally, winning the game with 3 2-3 innings of two-hit relief. Norm Charlton pitched a perfect ninth for his fourth save after Tim Davis got the last out in the eighth.  
With Seattle trailing 4-1, Jay Buhner and Paul Sorrento opened the seventh with consecutive homers off Brad Radke (3-4).

**Avery 6-hits Rockies**

Steve Avery just turned 26 and people are already talking about the old Steve Avery.  
The Atlanta Braves left-hander threw a six-hitter in a 4-1 victory over the Colorado Rockies on Monday night.  
That was a lot like that old Steve Avery who won 18 games in 1991 and 1993, and a far cry from last season, when he went 7-13 with a 4.67 ERA.  
"Obviously, I'm a lot stronger upstairs than I was last year," said Avery, who turned 26 last month. "Success breeds confidence."  
Avery (3-2) had allowed more than two runs in only one of his seven starts. Against the Rockies he allowed five singles and a double and only once did he allow more than one hit in an inning.

"Avery was about as good as it gets," Braves manager Bobby Cox said. "That was a good-hitting ball club he beat out there, I'll tell you that."  
In other NL games Monday it was Los Angeles 8, Pittsburgh 4; Florida 4, New York 1; Montreal 6, Chicago 2; and Houston 11, Philadelphia 5.  
**Astros 11, Phillies 5**  
James Mouton had a two-run homer and a two-run double and Doug Drabek allowed three hits over seven innings for his first victory over the season. Drabek (1-2) struck out nine and walked four. The Astros scored four runs in the second off starter Rich Hunter (1-2). Mouton hit his first homer of the year in the fifth and tied his career high for RBIs with the seventh-inning double. The Phillies scored three runs in the eighth off reliever Jim Dougherty.

within one run.

**Sonics bomb Rockets**

SEATTLE (AP) - It was bombs away for the Seattle SuperSonics, and the Houston Rockets' chances of an NBA three-peat took a broadside hit.  
With a sizzling 74 percent playoff-record 3-point shooting barrage, Seattle now has the two-time defending champions going back to Texas wondering if their title run is over.

After their 105-101 victory over Houston on a Monday night when they were better from the 3-point line than they were the free throw line, the Sonics hold a 2-0 lead in their Western Conference semifinal series.  
"Nothing surprises me any more with this team," Seattle's Hersey Hawkins said. "Not our 64 wins during the regular season, not our 3-point shooting in this game. Nothing."

The Sonics, through the first round of the playoffs for the first time in three years, sank 20 of 27 3-point tries, including 13 in a row.

That broke the Rockets' playoff record of 19 3s set last season in the opening round against Utah. It didn't do anything good for Houston's spirits, either.

"Hopefully, Seattle won't keep shooting like this," Houston's Mario Elie said. "But if they do ..."

Tonight, it's Utah at San Antonio in the opener of their second-round series, and New York at Chicago in Game 2 of their series. The Bulls won the first game 91-84 Sunday.

On Wednesday, Atlanta visits Orlando in the opener of their second-round matchup.

Nate McMillan ended the first quarter Monday night with a 3-pointer with 1.7 seconds to go. The Sonics sank seven more in the second period to tie a playoff record and had five more in the third quarter.

Detlef Schrempf finally missed a 3-point try at the start of the fourth quarter.

"Everybody was in a groove," said Hawkins, his team's leading regular-season 3-point shooter. "All year long we've been taking the 3-point shots when they've been there. Everybody was just feeling it in this game."

During the regular season, the Sonics shot 36 percent from 3-point range. Their best 3-point game was a 12-for-20 performance (60 percent) against Orlando on March 13.

The Sonics missed five of 16 free throws (68 percent) against the Rockets in Game 2.

How do you explain it? Coach George Karl couldn't.

"We shot the ball unbelievably," he said. "My gut feeling is we took a hell of a shot from the Houston Rockets and we're still standing."

Houston wasn't bad from beyond the 3-point arc itself. The Rockets were 13-for-27, giving the Sonics and Houston a playoff record for combined 3-pointers in a game (33).

McMillan continued his dazzling perimeter playoff shooting by hitting all five of his 3s, tying an NBA record.

"The shots are there and my legs feel pretty good," McMillan said.

In his first 10 seasons in Seattle, he shot 21 percent (16 of 74) in 69 playoff games. In six games against Sacramento and Houston, he's 14 for 19 (74 percent).

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## 'Healthy Moms Week' designed to emphasis women's health

May has been designated as National Osteoporosis and Breast Cancer Awareness month.

"Early detection is critical for the treatment of many diseases, especially breast cancer," explains Sherald Webb, local Planned Parenthood Clinic Coordinator.

Planned Parenthood includes a breast examination in their annual visits as well as demonstrating self exam techniques so women can test themselves on a regular basis.

Osteoporosis is a disease that affects bone density. Twenty-five million Americans are affected by osteoporosis, making it a national health problem. Hundreds of thousands of women and men experience hip, vertebral, wrist and other location fractures due to bone loss. Osteoporosis is preventable and treatable through diet, exercise and in certain cases hormone replacement

therapy.

The following risk factors have been identified:

- \*Menopause before age 45.
- \*A family history of fractures in elderly women.
- \*Use of corticosteroids or anti-convolusants.
- \*Low calcium intake.
- \*Thin and/or small bones.
- \*Caucasian or Asian.
- \*An inactive lifestyle.
- \*Cigarette smoker.
- \*Excessive use of alcohol.
- \*Advanced age.

Osteoporosis can be detected through specialized bone density tests in various sites of the body. With the information obtained from these bone mass measurements, physicians can assess an individual's bone density

and predict the likelihood of fracture.

"Healthy Moms Week is an opportunity for husbands and children to encourage moms to take good care of themselves, schedule an annual Pap smear and physical exam, mammogram if they are over 50, and perform regular self breast examinations," said Webb.

## Church service sends Gospel out to regions of outer space, beyond

FORT WORTH, Texas -- Presiding over one of the first church services to be sent into outer space, the Rev. Raymond Barber prayed last weekend for American astronaut Shannon Lucid and her two Russian cosmonaut companions aboard the Russian Mir space platform.

"We are thankful for the opportunity to send the Gospel out farther than it has ever been before - to the regions of outer space and beyond," declared Barber in the sermon at Worth Baptist Church, where he is pastor.

In a sermon emphasizing the power of God, he addressed the space travelers personally and prayed for their safety.

"May God be with you through

the trackless miles of space and bring you back safely to your families and your homes safely and soundly," he said.

He added: "God is controlling your spacecraft. Open the window of your space house and see that Psalm 19:1-3 is true: 'The heavens declare the glory of God and the firmament showeth his handiwork.'"

His sermon, "The God of Space," is being sent to the space platform at the request of Lucid's father, the Rev. Oscar Wells of Bethany, Okla., a former missionary to China and friend of Barber's.

Barber said the taped sermon is expected to be ferried by another spacecraft to the Russian space platform in about six weeks.

Dedicating the services to Lucid and the two cosmonauts, Yuri

Usachev and Yuri Onufrienko, Barber said, "It is our sincere prayer that the music and the message will be a blessing and inspiration to the three of you as you explore the beauty and majesty of outer space."

Even the hymns of the worship service had a cosmic focus.

A solo, by music minister Phil Spencer, began, "It took a miracle, to put the stars in place; it took a miracle to hang the world in space."

Church members said they were delighted that their worship services were being taped for the space voyagers.

"It's neat and kind of exciting," said Christopher Wooten, 9.

"Maybe we will be sending missionaries to Mars next," said William Petty, 14.

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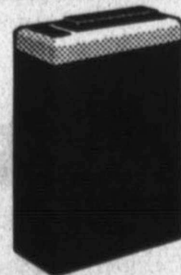
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# HHS honors academic achievement with H-Awards

**Former CIA Director Colby died in area called his 'favorite spot'**

ROCK POINT, Md. (AP) - As a retired spymaster, William Colby was familiar with cities all over the world, but one of his favorite spots was a quiet, southern Maryland riverbank, where he and his wife went on walks together.

The former CIA director bought a vacation home near the tiny stretch of beach, and, his wife said, even talked about buying the property, which is covered with oyster shells and marshland.

On Monday morning, Sally Shelton-Colby returned to the beach along the Wicomico River, this time to identify her husband's body, which was found after an eight-day search involving divers, dogs and sonar equipment. Colby died, apparently by drowning, during a solo canoe outing.

Just two days before the body was found, Ms. Shelton-Colby walked along the riverbank with friends, firm in her belief that her 76-year-old husband, who directed the CIA for Presidents Nixon and Ford, was still alive.

After identifying the body, Ms. Shelton-Colby thanked the searchers and said her husband had left the world a better place.

"There wasn't much that was left undone for him," she said. "He fought fascism and communism and lived to see democracy take hold in the world."

Colby's body was found on a

secluded spit of beach about a half-mile from his home, 100 yards downstream from where his swamped canoe was discovered a day after he disappeared April 27.

No life jacket was found with the body, clad in khaki pants, a red windbreaker, a blue and white shirt, and no shoes. Ms. Shelton-Colby said her husband customarily kept the life jacket in the canoe but didn't wear it.

Colby, an avid outdoorsman, was probably alive when he fell into the water and suffered hypothermia and drowned, authorities said. Experts had said that it can take days for a drowning victim's body to surface, so it was not considered unusual that it took so long to find Colby.

There were no marks on the body to indicate foul play, Sheriff Fred Davis said.

A spy for more than three decades, the bespectacled Colby was perfectly cast for his role: colorless, soft-spoken, precise and thin. He fit this published description: "Mr. Colby never seems to have a hair or an emotion out of place."

Even Colby said, in his 1978 memoir, that he was "the traditional gray man, so inconspicuous that he can never catch the waiter's eye in a restaurant."

Born Jan. 4, 1920, in St. Paul, Minn., Colby's intelligence career began in August 1944, when he parachuted into France for the Office of Strategic Services, the World War II American father of the CIA.

Signing on with the CIA in 1950, he served at the U.S. embassies in Stockholm and Rome, and became the CIA station chief in Saigon in 1959.

In 1966, Colby took charge of the Vietnamese pacification program and its Phoenix project, aimed at rooting out the Viet Cong. Four years later, he defended the project before a Senate committee, but conceded there may have been "some illegal killing."

He was nominated as CIA director on May 10, 1973, by Nixon. After 3 1/2 years, Ford dismissed him - a decision Colby said he believed was motivated by Ford's belief that the CIA chief was too willing to work with a congressional investigation of the agency.

Besides his wife, Colby is survived by three sons and a daughter from a previous marriage.

**Firefighters get help to slow blaze spread**

QUESTA, N.M. (AP) - Airplanes bombarded a raging wildfire with water and fire retardant, slowing the march of a blaze that headed toward a ski resort after charring at least 27 buildings and forcing hundreds of residents to flee.

The fire, which has burned across more than 7,500 acres of tinder-dry ponderosa pine in northern New Mexico's steep mountains and canyons, was also slowed Monday by light winds.

"In some areas it's kind of creeping," said Carson National Forest spokesman Gary Schiff.

The fire was about seven miles southwest of Red River, which sits

at the base of a ski area at an elevation of nearly 8,700 feet. Most of the 450 residents packed up and fled the approaching fire.

"You could see the ashes coming down on the road - it looked like snow," said campground owner Harold Young, one of the 50 residents who defied the order to leave.

Earlier evacuations were credited with sparing lives in La Loma, a New Age spiritual community where the fire on Sunday burned 27 buildings, including a half dozen homes. No injuries were reported, but 18 of the village's families lost their homes. Four structures survived because of a strategic hit by a water-dropping airplane.
