

Lady whitefaces axe Red Oak!

AUSTIN -- The Lady Whitefaces volleyball team chopped down the mighty Red Oak Friday night at the Burger Center.

Hereford knocked off the defending champions of Class 4A in the semifinals of the UIL state volleyball tournament, gaining revenge for a loss to Red Oak in last year's championship match.

The Lady Whitefaces also earned a shot at their own championship with the 15-6, 15-7 victory. They were to face Magnolia, a 15-10, 15-4 winner over New Braunfels Canyon, in the finals Saturday afternoon. Hereford improved to 33-1, and Magnolia is 33-2. Red Oak's season ended at 34-8.

Hereford's middle blocker tandem of Danielle Cornelius and Julie Rampley dominated Red Oak. Cornelius led the Herd with 14 kills and Rampley added 11 kills. Red Oak's 6-foot middle blocker Melissa Godwin proved ineffective at blocking either of the Herd middles.

"We knew that to beat that team, we had to establish the middle, so our outside (hitters) could jump and bang," Cornelius said. "Kari (Barrett) did a good job of setting, and Julie did a great job. When I rotated

to the back row, she was jumping and swinging with confidence."

"Danielle came out on the front row, and she dominated," Rampley said. "She had kill after kill."

"We wanted to get the middles established first," coach Brenda Reeh said. "If they weren't blocking the middle, we'd keep going there. We were able to run quick sets, and we were able to shoot it to the outside, too. If we weren't getting blocked, we'd keep setting what was working."

"(The Herd hitters) were getting to the ball at the height of their reach, and I was putting it there," Barrett said, "and (Red Oak) couldn't dig 'em."

The Lady Whitefaces like to use their serves as weapons, and although they had five service errors, they served for 10 aces, including five by Cassie Abney.

Hereford led 5-3 in the first game when Abney stepped to the line and started a five-point run, combining three aces with two kills by Rampley for a 10-3 lead.

"I was just concentrating on getting my serves in," Abney said. "I wasn't really trying to serve aces, but it worked out for the best."

Red Oak's Godwin ended the run with an emphatic kill. The Lady Hawks got three points on a Herd hitting error, a kill and an ace, but Cornelius ended a long

rally with a kill for a sideout.

Hereford rattled off another three points on a Red Oak hitting error, a Cornelius kill and a Meredith Tabor ace. After four sideouts, Godwin hit the ball long for Hereford's 14th point.

Then Rampley hit a ball that four Lady Hawks touched - two blockers and two diggers - but they couldn't return it, and Hereford had a 15-6 victory in game 1.

Catie Betzen's kill got the Herd off to a good start in the second game, and Kendra Wright's ace gave Hereford the lead for good at 2-1. It wouldn't be easy, though.

The Herd gradually built to a 9-4 lead, although errors started to creep into the Lady Whitefaces' game. A run of Herd errors let Red Oak back into the game, as two hitting errors, a serve into the net and a miscommunication on a Red Oak serve brought the Lady Hawks back to within two at 9-7.

That prompted Reeh to use a timeout for the only time in the match.

"In the middle of the second game, we had several unforced errors (bunched) together, and it was tough to get out of that," Reeh said. "I have to give the kids credit. They took a deep breath, relaxed a little and kept attacking."

Rampley got a kill after the timeout, and two sideouts

later, another Rampley kill and an ace by Abney put Hereford up 11-7.

After two more sideouts, a Rampley ace and two straight kills by Cornelius put Hereford at match point. A Red Oak kill delayed the end, but Cornelius got the ball back with a kill. Wright then served an ace to end it.

"We didn't play very well," Red Oak coach Arthur Stanfield said, "and you can't hide that. But I don't know if we had played well if we could have beaten them."

Middle blocker Melissa Godwin, who has verbally committed to SMU, paced Red Oak with five kills. But after a couple of kills early in the game, she was never much of a factor in the match. Outside hitter Kristy Gmela added four kills and six digs for the Lady Hawks.

For Cornelius, who has verbally committed to Oklahoma, Friday's match made up for the frustration of a year ago. Cornelius sprained an ankle in the final practice before the state tourney last year. She had just four kills and two block assists in two matches.

The Hereford win snapped Red Oak's 12-match winning streak. It marked the Lady Hawks' first loss to a Class 4A team since the semifinals of the 1994 state tournament.

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Clinton to meet China leader

MANILA, Philippines (AP) - President Clinton joined leaders from 17 Asian-Pacific nations in the Philippines Saturday for an economic conference designed to breathe new life into efforts to promote global free trade.

But the most important part of his two-day visit may well be a private meeting Sunday with Chinese President Jiang Zemin that occurs before the leaders formally come together at the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation forum.

Clinton is trying to foster better relations with China at a time of troublesome differences over issues such as trade, human rights and American arms sales to Taiwan. The economic stakes were underscored when the government this week reported that the U.S. trade deficit with China widened to an all-time

high of \$4.73 billion in September.

Promising to discuss those differences with Jiang candidly, Clinton laid out the broader stakes this week when he told a joint session of the Australian Parliament that "the direction China takes in the years to come ... will help to decide whether the next century is one of conflict or cooperation."

Both countries have a big interest in advancing trade and containing North Korea's suspected nuclear weapons program.

After their meeting, Clinton and Jiang are expected to announce an acceleration of talks concerning China's application to become a member of the World Trade Organization, which sets the rules for global trade.

China has been trying to join for more than two years, but the United

States has blocked the effort, arguing that Beijing has done too little to dismantle barriers to free trade.

Clinton also meets privately Sunday with Japanese Prime Minister Ryutaro Hashimoto, with trade disputes sure to be a big focus, and with South Korean President Kim Young Sam to discuss tensions on the Korean peninsula.

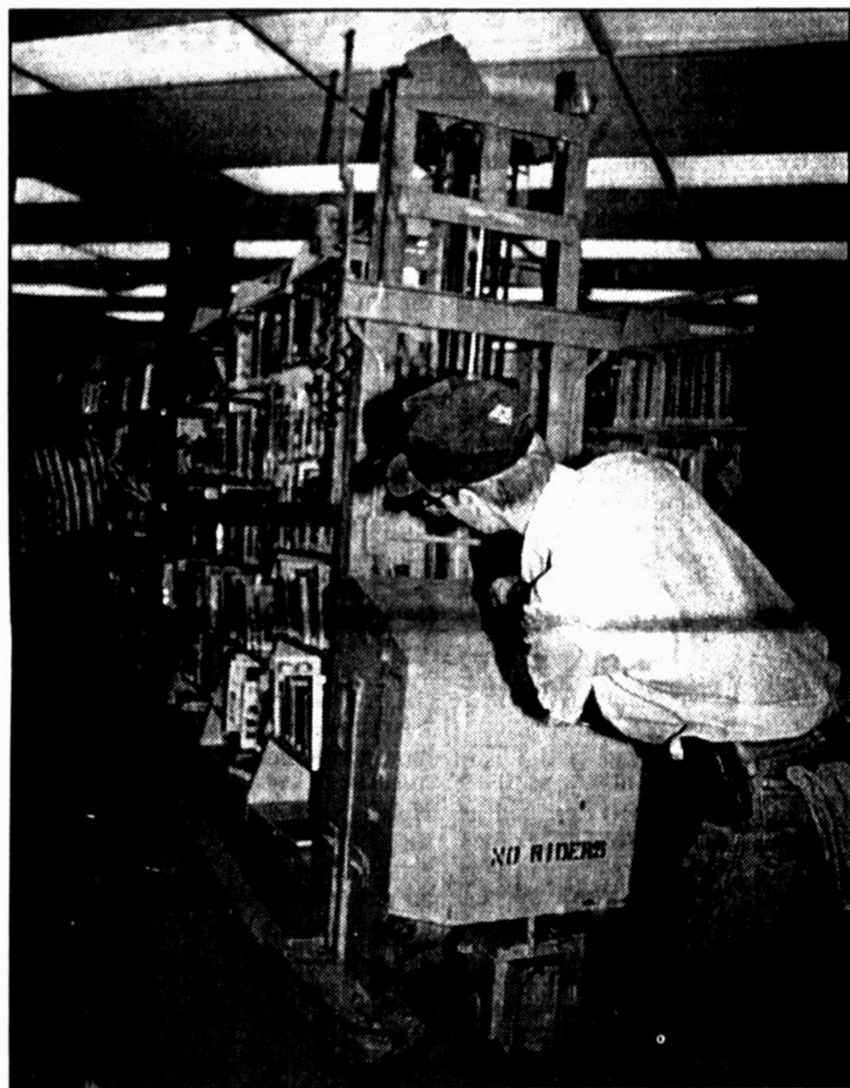
Clinton arrived late in the night Manila time and headed straight for the historic Manila Hotel, his headquarters during the summit.

Security for Clinton's visit was tight: He was arriving amid warnings from U.S. officials of "possible threats" to Americans. Already this week, authorities have found two bombs in Manila, killed two armed rebels outside the capital, and struggled to hold back anti-APEC protesters.

Before leaving Australia today Clinton got in one last round of golf, hiked around a rain forest with his wife, Hillary, and taped his weekly radio address, laying out the thinking behind his three-nation tour of the Asian-Pacific region.

"America's involvement and influence here helps to provide the stability, to promote the economic progress, to encourage the cooperation on many fronts, including preserving our natural environment, that benefits all Americans," Clinton said in his radio remarks.

The APEC nations have made a commitment for free trade by 2010 for the group's richer member countries and 2020 for the poorer ones. Critics say there has been little tangible progress toward those goals and that the time has come to reinvigorate the free-trade movement.

County workers solve library carpet problem

A task that boggles the mind is being worked out in a "necessity is the mother of invention" style at the Deaf Smith County Library.

When Commissioners' Court awarded a contract for 1,000 square yards of new carpet, the low bidder, Amarillo Wholesale Carpet, specified that the firm would not be responsible for moving any furniture or shelves in the library.

The problem basically had two solutions: manually unload all the shelves and move the shelves or move the shelves with books still on them.

County employees in precincts adopted the problem and began the search for a way to move shelves and all.

Greg Conn and Leroy Edwards, both of Precinct 4, took their invention to the library Thursday to determine if their "southern engineering" project would work.

After a couple hours of experimentation, they decided the forklift they modified could be modified further and accomplish the task put before them.

The county previously did not own a forklift. Conn said that they located one at a surplus house in Lubbock. "It cost only \$150 and is worth \$4,000," Conn said.

Pieces of steel were welded to slip over the forks and extend about nine feet, the length of three sections of the library shelving.

Steel bars were inserted at

intervals above the third shelf in the units and the forks run under the bars to lift them.

Conn and Edwards as well as Bobby Hammock, Precinct 3 foreman, and Dean Hacker, county maintenance supervisor, tinkered with the contraption until they agreed that it would work.

The lift, powered by batteries, raised the shelf units off the floor high enough to move them out of the way when the carpet-layers arrive.

Rebecca Walls, county librarian, watched the tests with bated breath, probably because she worried that some shelves might be broken or that the prospect of moving by hand could become real.

"We had an estimate from a professional moving company to do the job for \$4,888," she noted. Commissioners' Court declined to authorize the expenditure, giving rise to the assignment to precinct workers to put their heads together.

In the adult department of the library, 11 three-foot sections are in each of 12 banks of shelves. The forklift can pick up the shelves in three three-foot sections.

The librarian said the forklift should be workable, after some more fine tuning by its operators.

Logistics of moving shelves and laying carpet will be a little complicated, Walls admitted.

"We have to move enough shelves for them to lay carpet in an area, then

Cotton crop here best in years

County's only gin expects 12,000 bales

Cotton is not a major cash crop in Deaf Smith County, so it's noteworthy that approximately 6,000 acres of cotton will be harvested this year.

Hereford Farmers Gin, Inc. Manager David Varner said he expects to gin 12,000 bales of cotton this year.

"We will probably gin more than this gin has ever ginned," Varner said. The most cotton the gin has ever

processed was 8,600 bales. So, Varner expects to beat that total considerably. Hereford Farmers Gin is the only gin in the county.

Local farmers lost 300-400 acres of cotton to hail storms and high winds, Varner said.

"All in all, we probably didn't lose very many acres," Varner said.

Another 3,000 to 4,000 acres of cotton harvested in Castro County will be ginned in Hereford, Varner said.

Farmers started planting cotton in early May. "We had a slow start because of dryness," he said.

Other than pre-watering, Varner said, 70 percent of the cotton was watered only one time during the growing season.

"Most of them will water once, maybe twice, and that's it."

"I've seen a lot of two bale cotton made with a pre-watering behind corn. And that's all it had on it," Varner said.

This season the rains came timely -- the right times and right amounts in July and August, he said.

In the past, farmers depended on the first freeze to cause the cotton plant's leaves to wither, die and fall off, Varner said. Farmers now can spray a defoliant on the plant to kill the leaves for an early harvest.

A defoliant was applied on approximately 30 percent of the cotton before the first freeze, he said. "With the exception of a few little dreary days, its been real good for harvest," Varner said.

In Deaf Smith County, farmers use stripper machines to harvest cotton. The strippers pick the seedcotton, which is lint and seeds, and also pulls in burs, leaves and stems.

In other areas of the state, farmers use spindle pickers to harvest cotton. The spindle pickers have a series of rods that revolve as the machine moves along the row. The seedcotton catches the rods and is pulled from the bur.

If local farmers used a spindle picker, he said, "One good wind and we'd be picking it up off the field."

This year, the first bale of cotton was harvested on Oct. 14 by Ronnie Owens, who farms east of Hereford.

The Hereford Farmers Gin, Inc., which is the only gin in Deaf Smith County, has operated 24 hours a day since that first bale came in.

The gin processes eight to 10 bales an hour, he said.

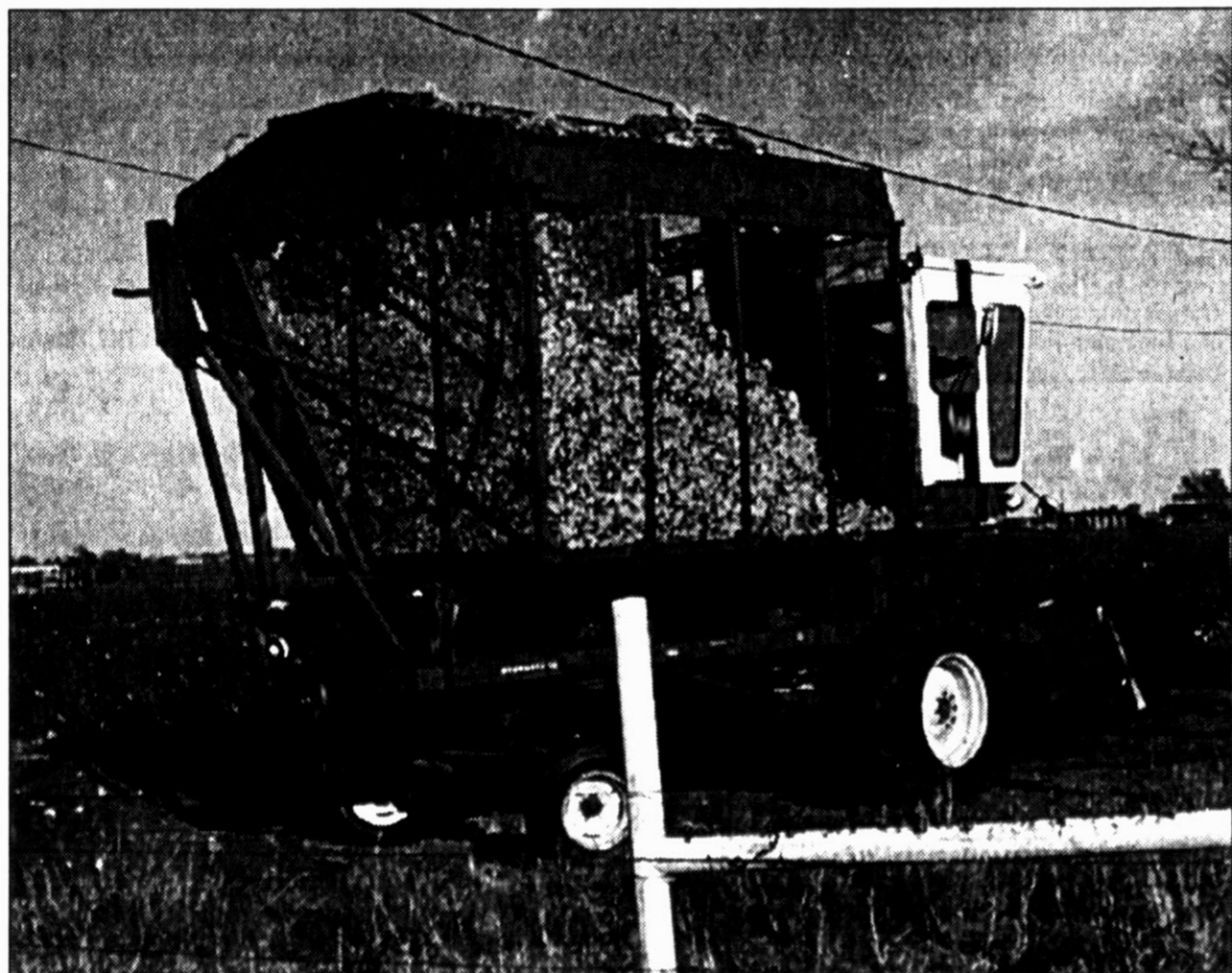
The module builder, a machine that accepts cotton from the stripper or dump trailers and mechanically compacts the cotton in a chamber that forms the cotton module.

A rectangular shaped module measures 28 feet long, 7 feet wide and 7 feet high.

An average non-bur extracted module, which still contains burs, bolls, leaves and twigs, makes eight to 10 bales of cotton, Varner said.

The gin sends specially-designed module trucks to the field to lift the module from the ground. Then, the

trucks transport the modules to the gin.

Of the 12,000 bales to be ginned, 85 to 95 percent will come off of modules and 10 to 15 percent will come off of trailers, Varner said.

Cotton fibers are separated from the seeds at the gin. After separation, machines clean and dry the fibers.

The fibers are then compressed, wrapped and tied into rectangular bales.

The gin grinds the burs to sell to local feedlots, where the burrs will be mixed in feed rations, he said.

The cottonseed is sold to oil mills and dairies, Varner said.

The gin collects mote, small particles off the lint cleaners, to sell to South Plains Textiles in Lubbock, where cotton twine, mop heads and special filters are manufactured, he said.

This year, cotton yields are 1-1/2 to 2-3/4 bales to an acre, he said.

An average yield is 900 pounds, or approximately 1-3/4 bale to the acre, Varner said.

"I haven't seen any official three bale cotton, but we've gotten real close. And we may see a patch or two of that before the end of the year," he said.

Most of the cotton is selling between 62 cents and 66 cents per pound, which is down from the average selling price of 70 cents per pound last year, Varner said.

If the weather holds, harvest should be completed by the first of January, he said.

Airliner crashes after hijacking

MORONI, Comoros Islands (AP) - An Ethiopian airliner believed to have been hijacked with at least 163 passengers aboard crashed today off the Comoros Islands in the Indian Ocean, Radio Comoros reported.

There was no immediate confirmation of casualties. A resident who said he helped rescue passengers told Radio France Internationale there were many survivors but "many dead too."

State-run radio on Comoros - a three-island chain off east Africa - said the plane went down about midday at Mitsamiuti beach on the north side of the main island of Grande Comore, resident Donies Poragne told The Associated Press by telephone.

The radio report called for all hospitals to prepare to treat the wounded, Poragne said.

There were conflicting reports about whether the Ethiopian Airlines Boeing 767 hit land or water. While state radio said the airliner hit the beach, local radio reporter Ibrahim Ahmed told Israel radio that the plane plunged into water off Grande Comore.

U.S. attorney backs off, Apaches reopen Ruidoso gambling casino

MESCALERO, N.M. (AP) - The Mescalero Apache gambling casino, closed for two months under federal threat of seizure, reopened Friday after the U.S. attorney's office backed off on that threat.

And 350 laid-off casino workers were being called back to their jobs, tribal and casino officials said. The casino reopened at 5 p.m.

"They'll all be coming back to work," said tribal financial adviser Ron Burpo.

Burpo addressed a throng outside the Inn of the Mountain Gods, which contains Casino Apache, announcing the agreement with the U.S. attorney's office.

"That means we get to open again," he said, and the crowd cheered.

He made the announcement in the absence of Mescalero President Wendell Chino, who was in Albuquerque negotiating with Assistant U.S. Attorney Jonathon Gerson.

Reaction at the southern New Mexico reservation was swift.

"It's relief, excitement, joy!" said the tribe's chief financial officer, Tom Gallagher. "Most are relieved to have their jobs back, but there's still a bit of uncertainty."

That's because negotiations were to continue with federal attorneys in the coming days, according to a letter Gerson sent tribal lawyer George Fetting.

"Total employment is going to go from about 500 right now to about

900," Gallagher said.

Tribal officials said Chino has agreed to close down his casino if the federal appeals process involving Santa Ana Pueblo and eight other New Mexico pueblos ends with those casinos closing.

Gerson's letter says that while casino-type gambling is illegal, "the

plain fact, however, is that some casinos are operating pursuant to court order pending the outcome of 'Santa Ana.'"

"Now that it has agreed to be bound by the outcome of 'Santa Ana,' there is no reason in principle to treat the Mescalero Apache Tribe any differently than any other gaming tribe in New Mexico.

But, sometimes you wonder if their goal is more profit - through more viewers, more readers - by covering events which are juicy enough to attract the

most attention.

We've all seen it happen right here in Hereford. A regional TV or newspaper reporter shows up to capture a "small-town crisis" of a controversial nature. The region sees the "small town crisis" reported in a 20-second sound bite or a headline.

Sure, controversy is part of the package. The local reporter includes that "crisis" in his story, but he also reports events of the entire meeting - details that may seem boring to some but are important to how our community operates on a daily basis. And, he later reports on the solution to the problem, which is not always the case with the big-city media.

Theoretically, four journalists covering the same event should come away with very similar reports, right? Not necessarily - even two reporters from the same news outlet may differ on the most importance action taken at a meeting, or the highpoint from covering an event.

When there is a mix of television, radio and newspaper reporters, each might approach the subject in different ways. That's just the way things happen. What you hope for is fair, impartial and objective reporting.

Another good neighbor: A photo in Wednesday's Brand showed Ken McLain being recognized by the Pitman Golf Course Association for pruning trees at the municipal links.

McLain gave his time and talents to the job "because I'm proud of our golf course, and I wanted to help make it look better."

McLain sought no pay or recognition in taking on the job. Isn't it great to have neighbors like that?

Victoria Advocate on Cincinnati's finest:
You have to hand it to those police in Cincinnati - they don't let hardened criminals get away with anything. Take the way they swooped down and put a stop to the activities of that notorious scowling Sylvia Stayton, a 62-year-old former Sunday school teacher who had the unmitigated gall to put money into expired parking meters near her home.

Sure, such a random act of kindness is against the law in Cincinnati, even if it's a meter where your own car is parked. But even if authorities insist on enforcing such a nasty and petty little law, did Officer Edward Johnson have to bend Stayton's arm behind her and slap on the cuffs when she objected?

After three hours in jail, Stayton was released on \$1,900 bail. The episode should spur officials in Cincinnati to demonstrate that common sense has not expired in their gracious old city by repealing the law that prompted the embarrassing episode. The meter is running.

The Lufkin Daily News on balanced-budget amendment:
President Clinton has indicated that he will ease his opposition to a constitutional amendment to balance the budget. Apparently, he reasons, the Republican-led Congress will bring it to vote and pass it down to be ratified by the states anyway, so why bother?

Messing with the Constitution, should be reason enough to stand against a balanced-budget amendment. Such an amendment would give our representatives the political cover to do something nearly all Americans do every day - operate under a balanced budget. But that shouldn't be an excuse to trash the Constitution.

But there are millions of reasons more why Clinton should oppose a balanced-budget amendment. The President even hinted around some of those reasons at the same time he was indicating that he would not oppose the balanced-budget initiative.

He said the amendment ought to have an escape hatch in the case of a recession. That is because he knows that no politician will honestly tackle the Medicaid, Medicare and Social Security questions. He knows this all too well. And cutting defense is politically out of the question. Instead, the portion of the budget that would feel the squeeze in a recession is in domestic appropriations. Although this makes up only a sixth of the entire budget, it covers safety-net programs including some welfare,

Head Start and education, among other public programs like highways and national parks.

Obviously, the programs harmed most by a recession are those that would be needed most by our citizens at that time. In a downed economy, the poor and middle-class would get hit coming and going, first by the recession, then by a leaderless government that can't offer relief.

San Antonio Express-News on smokers' rights:
Ten thousand scientific studies answer people who claim there is "no real proof" that tobacco use is harmful, noted local surgeon Dr. Kent Trinkle said here last week.

Even those who cherish smoking, dipping or chewing are less inclined to argue that nowadays, the handwriting being on the wall.

However, Trinkle made another point at the gathering last week of health-care professionals: Tobacco use takes a \$60 billion annual toll in direct and indirect costs to the national economy.

You hear a lot from smokers about their rights," said Trinkle. "Well, your right to smoke costs me and every other taxpayer \$300 a year."

Such candor from one who earns a good living treating people with tobacco-related illnesses is vital. America is undergoing a sea change in how it relates to tobacco, the nation's oldest cash crop.

The Clinton administration is promoting rules aimed at ending tobacco marketing to teen-agers. Every day, a few dozen South Texas teens take up this habit that will probably kill them in time.

Seventeen states are suing the tobacco industry to recover Medicaid funds spent treating people with tobacco-related diseases.

And Congress and many states, Texas among them, next year will debate rules, regulations and laws pointedly aimed at reducing the influence of tobacco.

Legislators must take the moral - and sensible - path whenever the tobacco issue is debated.

The good news is that there is increasingly less defense of Big Tobacco. And, a recent University of Alabama study showed that this year, for the first time, the overall cancer death rate is falling.

Scientists link the decline directly to a drop in smoking. And those in a position to influence young people should tell them never to start.

Thanksgiving is a holiday that evokes howling gastric juices. Merely hearing the word sets off memories of Thanksgivings that have been.

As a child, I remember Thanksgiving was a time for my mother and grandmother to cook huge amounts of favorite foods for the family. All of us had our favorites.

Personally, desserts were my ruin, even as a child. As an old aunt used to say when asked what kind of pie she wanted, "a little piece of each."

Most folks think of pumpkin and pecan pies for the holiday meal. From my perspective, there was no pie that could hold a candle to my mother's chocolate pie. The others were delicious, but being a chocolate freak meant I had to have my favorite. She usually obliged.

Sweet potatoes may be a typical Thanksgiving vegetable but my family thought you couldn't have a meal without mashed Irish potatoes to go with the giblets gravy.

My mother and grandmother saved leftover cornbread and biscuits for weeks, the better to make dressing. No light bread, thank you. My family also was finicky about the ingredients and, especially, the seasoning in dressing.

I doubt that my mother, or grandmother, for that matter, ever bought sage for cornbread dressing. If they had it in the cabinet, it had been bought for something else. But, never for the dressing.

Boiling the giblets was an all-morning task. My mother wanted plenty of broth to add to the dressing. In later years, when canned chicken broth was readily available, she condescended to use some to supplement the giblets juice.

Even after I was grown, my family often traveled five or six hours to join my parents, grandparents, sisters, uncles, aunts and cousins for Thanksgiving dinner.

Then, horror of horrors, my husband, children and I moved out of the territory. Wa-a-a-y out. To the Big Apple.

The first Thanksgiving that I was charged with the sole responsibility of preparing dinner came close to a

disaster. First, several items I was used to in Texas were not available. I discovered, except in very expensive gourmet shops, if at all.

Several days ahead, I started gathering up food. First of all, I couldn't find any purple-top turnips, a staple at my parents' table. The produce man at the neighborhood market never heard of such a vegetable. Then, I spied something that looked like a huge overgrown turnip.

"What's that?" I asked the greengrocer Vinnie. "It's a rutabaga," he replied with disdain at one so unlearned. "What does it taste like?" the conversation continued. "Like a rutabaga," he said.

Finally, I elicited the information that it tasted rather like turnip. As it turned out, it did, but the taste was a whole lot stronger that we liked.

As the years went by and we returned to our old stomping grounds, I became somewhat more adept at preparing a passable Thanksgiving dinner but my mother and grandmother always claimed the winner's prize.

The years in New York were not all wasted, then, because I learned to cook a turkey and trimmings. And, I indulged in an event that will forever be memorable.

One Thanksgiving morning, we got up early, bundled into warm clothing and scooted down Henry Hudson Parkway to W. 76th Street where, we had been assured by knowledgeable people, we could see Macy's parade up close and personal.

While standing on the corner watching the gigantic inflatables guided down the street, we observed Donald Duck veer into the top of a street lamp. We could almost hear the hiss as air was expelled.

As far as we were on Manhattan Island from the Macy's store, we saw all of the parade, got in the car and went home, about a 20-minute drive. We turned on the television set to watch the end of the parade just in time to see the result of Donald Duck's problem.

The inflatable was almost prone and being dragged ignominiously down the street on its face.

Bivins, a Republican from Amarillo, will serve a term at the pleasure of the governor. The SREB is the nation's first interstate compact for education.

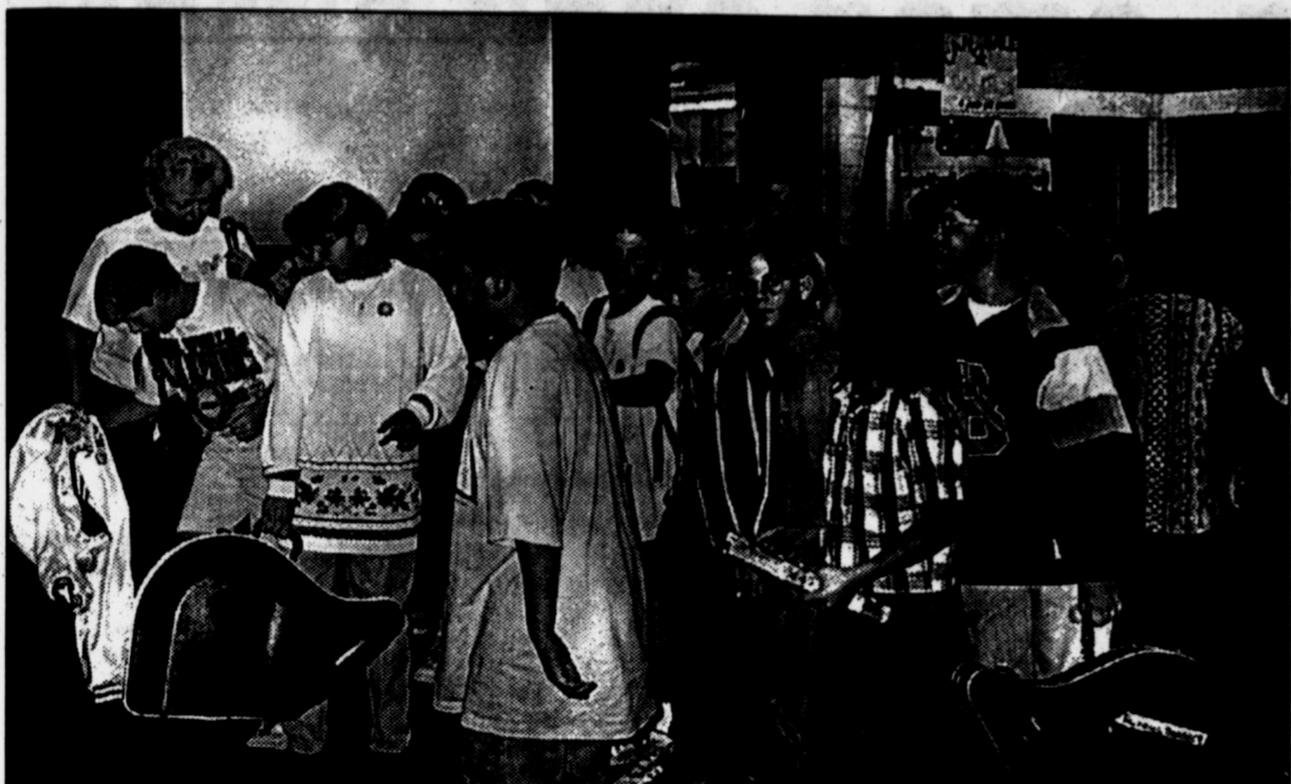
According to its June 1996 annual report, the SREB helps government and education leaders work cooperatively to advance education. SREB stresses the link between colleges and

Spiritual issues becoming entrenched in U.S. politics

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) - U.S. Sen. Jesse Helms said a lot about the state of secular politics when he declared after his recent victory over Harvey Gant: "I am about as Baptist as you can get."

Faith and values, issues which have long been discussed at religious gatherings, are becoming entrenched in mainstream politics.

"He's a preacher as well as a politician," University of North Carolina-Charlotte political scientist Ted Arrington said about Helms, the Republican who won his fifth term Nov. 5.

All the talk during the campaign about morals and values suited many delegates at last week's Baptist State Convention, who called it a sign that more voters are realizing the need for a spiritual rebirth in the nation.

"This has to be addressed," said the Rev. Phillip Davis, who made history at the 166th meeting of the state's largest religious denomination as the first black candidate to win statewide office. "Our nation as a whole is in a desperate state of affairs."

Davis, the conservative pastor of Nations Ford Baptist Church in Charlotte, won his race for first vice president over incumbent Ann Smith, a moderate.

"When we look for answers, we turn to God. Politicians realize this by addressing the issues of faith and values," said Davis, who aligned himself with conservative president Greg Mathis of Hendersonville, who won a second one-year term.

"I feel overall there needs to be a separation of church and state," said Keith Laney, minister of music at Chapman Memorial Baptist Church in Charlotte.

"We don't want to mix politics and religion," said Ed McKeown, an associate pastor at Salem Baptist Church in Apex. "I feel you put your faith in action when you vote."

As it has in past elections, the conservative Christian Coalition distributed copies of its voter guides at churches across North Carolina. In Buncombe County, some 10,000 of the guides were distributed.

Founded in 1989 by religious broadcaster Pat Robertson, the Christian Coalition now claims 1.7 million members nationwide and has

grown to be one of the most formidable forces in conservative politics.

Despite the group's efforts, some candidates don't want to be identified too closely with the religious right, Arrington said.

"Those on the religious right feel intensely about the policies they favor, but they also have a bad image," he said. "Large numbers of the general public have negative views about them."

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Film shows Kennedy greeting well-wishers

WASHINGTON (AP) - A newly released film shows President Kennedy the day before his assassination being mobbed by well-wishers as he and his wife, Jackie, drove down Texas streets in an open convertible.

Taken by a presidential aide who accompanied them on the trip Nov. 21-22, 1963, the film shows people along the presidential route freely running up to the presidential limousine to greet the couple.

"People will be interested in what the security was like during the course of the motorcade," said Tom Samoluk, spokesman for the Assassination Records Review Board, which released the film Thursday.

"Certainly, it is a valuable addition to the historical record, because it is filmed up to a couple of minutes before the shooting," he said.

The film's release came a day before the 33rd anniversary of the

assassination. The board, an independent federal agency, is compiling a public record of the assassination.

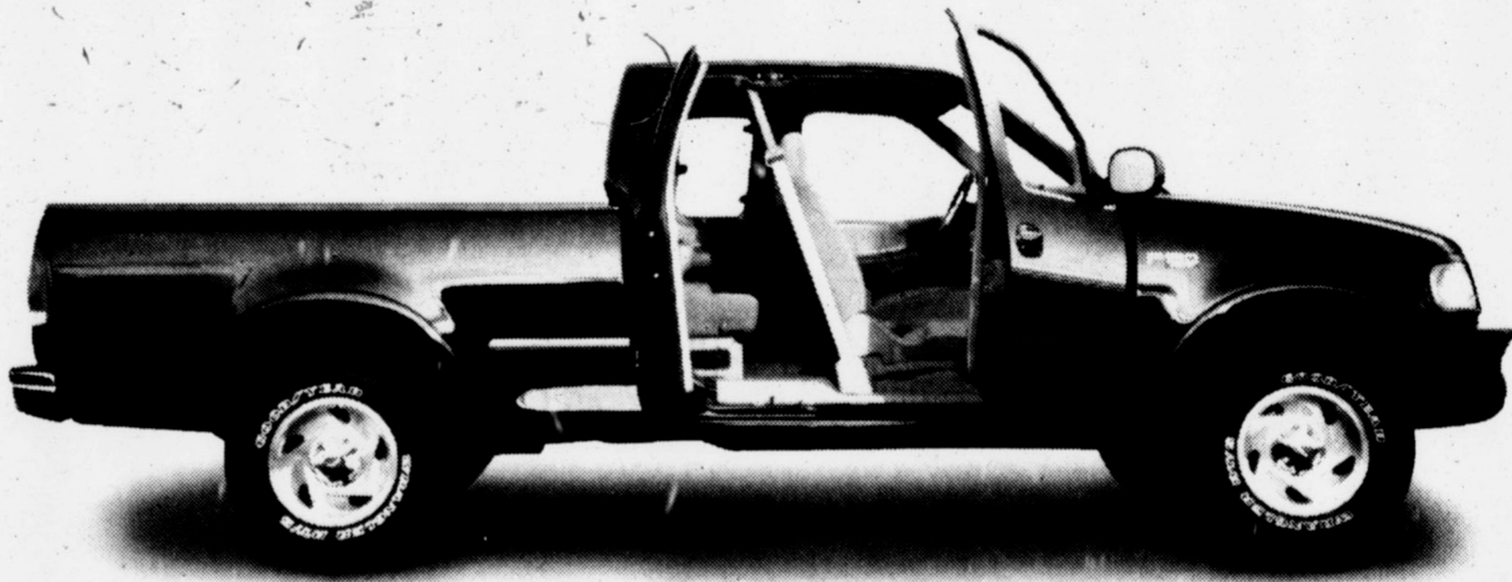
The three-minute, 16-millimeter film was made by Dave Powers, a Kennedy aide who frequently made a video record of presidential trips. Samoluk said board researchers contacted Powers, believing he might have kept a film made on the day of the assassination.

The film turned up among boxes of Powers' records and other possessions, Samoluk said.

The silent, color film captures the youthful, handsome Kennedy appearing happy and relaxed during their tour, which included stops in San Antonio, Houston, Fort Worth and Dallas. It mostly shows the couple's arrival and departures at airports and their motorcades.

On the first day, a soldier, a group of nuns and many others ran up to the convertible to greet the couple.

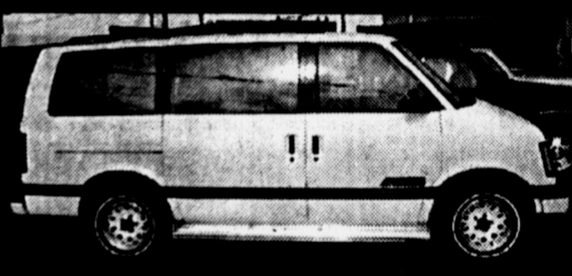
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Morris finds home, new life in Baltimore

BALTIMORE (AP) - After his first start with the Baltimore Ravens, Bam Morris got off the plane from Jacksonville and was asked by his teammates to join them for a night on the town.

Morris politely declined. "Everyone was like, 'Where are

you going?' I said, 'I'm going home.' I called my fiancée and said, 'I'll be there in a minute. Run some water and put some Epsom salt in the tub.' I was in there for about an hour," Morris said, a wide grin spreading across his face.

Morris no longer feels obligated to be one of the guys.

He had been one before, and it cost him dearly. Less than two months

after playing the Super Bowl, the running back and a friend were arrested in Texas on March 22 after police found about 6 pounds of marijuana in the trunk of Morris' car.

Morris, 24, pleaded guilty to avoid jail time but had to pay a fine. More costly were the loss of his job with the Pittsburgh Steelers and a four-game suspension from the NFL. "Now I'm kind of glad it happened," he said. "It made me survive as far as the crowd I was running with and where I was going. It made me see everything that I didn't see during the two years I was in Pittsburgh."

Morris grew up in Cooper, Texas, and excelled at Texas Tech, winning the Doak Walker Award as the nation's best running back in 1993. After he found success with the Steelers, Morris returned home intent upon proving that fame and fortune did nothing to change his personality.

"I didn't want anyone to think I changed because I was in the pros," he said. "You take all your boys out, pack the guys up in the (truck) and roll."

Then came the arrest. "When the tragedy happened to me, all I had was my family and my fiancée. My friends disappeared," Morris said.

"It took all that to find out. I'm still learning, and I learn something new every day. But I'll never go down that road again."

The Steelers dropped him from the roster two days before his sentencing and just a few months after he ran for a game-high 73 yards in the Steelers' Super Bowl loss to Dallas.

"Everybody says the incident cut the lines between me and the Steelers," Morris said. "That's what they tell everybody, but at the end of the year, I wasn't having any fun in Pittsburgh and (coach Bill Cowher)

didn't like me. So when it happened, they had a reason to get rid of me. Really, though, that just added gasoline to the flame."

Abandoned by the NFL and embarrassed in court, Morris went into seclusion, hiding out at his mother's home.

"I was chillin'. I didn't go anywhere for about a month and a half," he said. "I didn't go to football games. I didn't watch football. I ran with my dogs out on the fields. I had a lot to think about. I just had to get my life back on the right track."

Then came the phone call that helped steer him in the right direction. The caller identified himself as Ozzie Newsome, the Ravens' director of player personnel. Morris thought he knew better.

"I thought it was one of my boys calling, playing a little prank, so I go, 'Sure, Ozzie, whatever.' Then he tells me he has (owner) Art Modell with him, and I laughed," Morris recalled. "I said, 'Right, Ozzie.' But when I heard Mr. Modell in the background,

Wheeler rallies for 32-31 thriller over Petersburg

It took one of the greatest comebacks in the rich tradition of Wheeler's football history, but the Mustangs advanced in the Class 1A area playoffs at Hereford Friday night by scoring a 32-31 victory over the Petersburg Buffaloes.

Wheeler was down by 31-19 at the beginning of the fourth quarter, then capped a dramatic rally by scoring the winning touchdown with 1:29 left in the contest, played before about 1,000 fans at Whiteface Stadium.

Wheeler quarterback Travis Stevens hit a wide-open Jason Porton for an 8-yard touchdown on fourth and goal for the winning score.

The amazing comeback earned Wheeler (9-4) a berth in the Class A regional quarterfinals against Monday at 7:30 p.m. Friday at Childress. The Buffs ended the season at 8-4.

The Mustangs trailed 24-7 at halftime, then scored 12 points in a span of just over two minutes to start the third quarter. Running back Brian Judd, who was nursing an ankle injury, had just one carry in the first half but he dashed 67 yards for a score on the first play of the second half.

Judd was a big part of the rally as he finished with 168 yards on 15 carries. Wheeler's Dusty Case recovered a short kick on the ensuing kickoff, and Judd burst up the middle for a 13-yard touchdown run to cut the deficit to 24-19.

Petersburg, which had an overpowering rushing attack in the first half, came back to score and take a 31-19 lead. But Wheeler continued the rally as Stevens scored from six yards out to cut the margin to six at

31-25. The Mustangs started the game-winning drive from their own 11 with 7:05 left to play. Wheeler reached the Petersburg 4 before three straight plays resulted in a loss of four yards.

On a play that Wheeler coach Jim Verden had put in Thursday afternoon, the Mustangs' Stevens rolled out and connected with Porton in the corner of the end zone. Stevens then kicked the extra point and Wheeler held on for the 32-31 win.

Kirk Rogers and Jeremy Crabb led the strong Petersburg attack. Rogers had 119 yards on 19 carries, and Crabb was almost as productive with 116 yards on 16 carries.

Wheeler finished with 347 yards of offense, while Petersburg had 317. The Mustangs recorded 17 first downs and the Buffs had 18.

Carr sparks Tech over S. Mississippi

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - Cory Carr and Tony Battie made their expected solid debuts at the focus of the new-look Texas Tech Red Raiders. Freshman point guard Rayford Young's impressive splash was decidedly unexpected.

Carr scored a career high 29 points with eight assists while Battie added 17 points and 10 rebounds, but it was young Young that made the most noteworthy impression Saturday night in the Raiders' 96-79 victory over Southern Mississippi.

Carr, Tech's sixth man for last season's 30-2 "Sweet 16" team, led all scorers for Tech (1-0), which allowed the Golden Eagles (0-1) to stay within striking distance for most of the game, though they never got closer than nine points midway through the second half.

"It is a win over an outstanding team that is going to be very good by the end of the year," said Tech coach James Dickey. "I'm glad we played them early in the season and at home. When you have somebody down you have to put them away."

Young, who led Pampa to the Texas Class 4A state championship last spring, made his collegiate debut with 13:34 remaining in the first half and promptly sparked the Raiders to a decisive 19-6 run toward its 31st straight home win.

"Before the game the leaders told the younger guys to play their game," Young said. "That gave us a lot of confidence."

Damien Smith led the Golden Eagles with 19 points and helped them hang within striking distance until the closing minutes. Mike Jones and George Scott each added 14.

Young had three steals in the first half and finished with 11 points and four assists in 18 minutes.

The teams traded baskets for the opening four minutes, appearing for awhile to be on equal terms until Young hit the floor.

The game also marked the return from major right knee surgery for Smith, who injured it at the end of last season.

Cowboys want to avoid trap

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) - Beating the New York Giants the first time around has not been a problem for the Dallas Cowboys in recent years.

Doing it the second time has been a lot harder, and Dallas coach Barry Switzer thinks Sunday's game at Giants Stadium might even be more difficult because the Cowboys (7-4) seemingly are ripe for a letdown.

Before you say, "No way" against the Giants (4-7), consider the Cowboys have just finished a streak where they played Miami - and former coach Jimmy Johnson - Philadelphia, San Francisco and Green Bay, losing only to the Eagles on a late mistake. Also look ahead to next week. Dallas is home to play host to the NFC East-leading Washington Redskins, led by former assistant Norv Turner.

"I'm scared to death," Switzer said. "I think it's one of the biggest traps we've got on our schedule. It's real interesting to look back at the scores of our first games vs. New York and our second games in the same year. It just blows you away when you look at it."

The scores are really interesting in Dan Reeves' tenure, starting in 1993. After a 31-9 win at Dallas, the Cowboys had to go to overtime to beat New York 16-13 to win the NFC East in the final game of the regular season.

In '94, Dallas won the first game 38-10 and the lost 15-10 in the final game at New York. The Cowboys won the season opener 35-0 last season and the second 21-20.

True to form, Dallas dominated New York in the second week of this season, winning 27-0 in a game in

which the Giants gained 93 yards. New York played a lot better after that, but it has struggled the past two weeks, losing at Carolina and Arizona. All that seemingly is left in what might be Reeves' final season here is to play the spoiler role.

"If I could lay some cheese I'd be glad to open the trap (for the Cowboys)," Reeves said. "But we have to worry about ourselves. We have to have some breaks. Things have to come our way."

The Giants also have to stop being so generous. They have turned the ball over four times in each of the last two games, something they can't afford to do against the NFL's best defense.

"It's not really that complicated," Giants offensive coordinator George

Henshaw said. "If you turn the ball over, you have almost no chance to win. If you don't, you've got a pretty good chance to win, regardless of the other things that happen in the game."

Neither Reeves nor Switzer is happy with his offense.

Despite having Troy Aikman, Emmitt Smith and Michael Irvin, the Cowboys rank 19th in total offense and 21st rushing the ball, averaging just over 100 yards. In Monday night's 21-6 win over Green Bay, Dallas had to settle for a league-record-tying seven field goals by Chris Boniol, who has made his last 19 kicks.

The Giants are next to last in offense and this week they probably

will be without their leading receiver, Thomas Lewis, who is bothered by a hamstring injury.

New York's defense is coming off what Reeves described as its worst game of the season, a 31-23 loss in which Arizona opened an early 21-3 lead. Linebacker Corey Miller is out with a sprained ankle.

The Cowboys are giving up only 93.4 yards per game rushing and a league-best 165.6 passing. The defense also has surrendered a league-low 14 touchdowns.

"They are very disciplined, they play their techniques extremely well and they are fast," Henshaw said. "On film, it's like someone put it in fast motion. It looks like you have certain things and all the sudden, WHAMMO!, they're on top of you."

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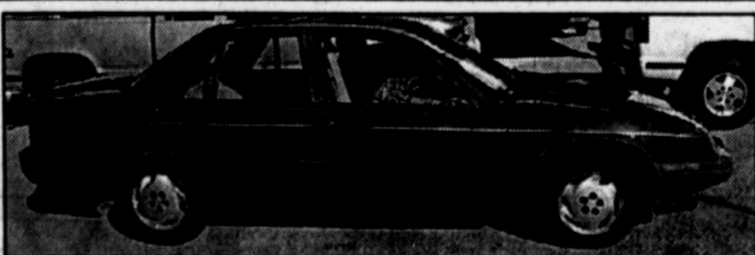

Computerized doll is new tool for parenting class at HHS

Ordinarily dolls would not be considered a proper learning tool for high school students. But two dolls have been given to Hereford High School for use in the parenting and child development class about which teacher Linda Cumpston is enthusiastic.

These are computerized dolls, or "infant simulators," created for the purpose of teaching teenagers the responsibilities of parenthood.

The simulator is called Baby Think It Over. The two Cumpston has just begun using were presented to the school by Hereford Health Care Alliance.

"I am implementing the use of a new tool in an old program," Cumpston said. "This is the same parenting class I've been teaching for 20 years, but the simulator is a new tool to aid in teaching this program."

The simulators are provided with a related curriculum that composes the entire Baby Think It Over

program. The program explores the emotion, financial and interpersonal ramifications of parenting.

The Baby Think It Over program is designed and intended to help young adults understand three important facts about infants:

--Their demands are unpredictable but nonetheless must be met promptly.

--They require a great deal of time and attention, and

--The responsibilities of parenting

will change a teen's lifestyle profoundly and in a wide variety of ways.

"The bottom line in parenting is responsibility and these dolls can be an important part of teaching that," Cumpston said.

Students in the parenting class can participate in the program on a volunteer basis.

"It's a project, just like any other project in the class, and some will choose not to do this project. For those who participate, their grade on this project will not mean that they pass or fail the course," she said.

Parents of the students are involved in the program, also. They must sign a parent consent form before their son or daughter can participate in the project.

The consent form states, in part, "Because the simulation is demanding, you should know how it will affect you and your child. Your teen will be 'on call' by his or her 'baby' 24 hours a day, for one day. The teen must drop whatever she/he is doing, with no warning, whenever the 'baby' needs attention."

"The device used for caring for the doll will be strapped to your teen's wrist with a tamper-proof bracelet. It will wake your teenager at night, and possibly other family members. If extra equipment has been provided, the teen must take it along wherever she or she goes."

Presently there is no extra equipment for the students to use while caring for the "baby," but Cumpston is searching for an affordable car seat, since this is one item that would be a necessity with a real infant.

The students are enthusiastic about the project, according to Cumpston. But the first two students to actively participate were to have taken the dolls this past week.

"We don't know yet what will happen. We'll just have to see what the students think after they've 'taken care' of the dolls for awhile," Cumpston said.

As a part of the Baby Think It Over program, students will take a pre-test before they take care of the doll for 24 hours, then a post-test after the project is completed.

The "tests" are designed to help the students realize how much their own ideas about caring for an infant have changed.

When the infant simulator cries, the "parent" must insert the caring device in the doll's back and hold it for the duration of the feeding/tending period. The doll is designed so that it must be held properly. The student cannot lay it down, give it to someone else, prop it up or otherwise ignore it.

When the simulator is returned to Cumpston, she then checks the computer located in the doll's back which has recorded mishandling, neglect or abuse.

In order not to interrupt other classes, students will arrange with Cumpston for "child care" during the school day. This will include determining the actual cost of such care.

As a part of the project, students will be requested to keep a diary, recording each time the doll cries, how long it cried and what activity the crying interrupted.

The Baby Think It Over infant simulator is not a perfect replica of an infant, and cannot duplicate all infant behaviors.

"The one way that the simulator is least realistic is that you don't have to change its diaper," Cumpston said.

Even before holiday shopping swings into full force, the experts are trying to figure out the meaning of current consumer credit trends. Concerned that consumer-debt obligations have been growing twice as fast as wage and salary gains, the questions are why, when will it slow down and how will the slowdown affect the rest of the economy?

While credit use increased higher than expected over the summer months, more than twice as much credit card debt is available now than five years ago. Consumers seem to

be drawn by lower minimum payments and the accelerated promotion efforts by the credit card industry.

Creditors are seeing consumers using more debt to maintain a desired lifestyle. Of particular concern is increased use of credit cards to buy groceries, health care and other services typically paid for by cash or check.

The delinquency rate for credit card payments is on an increase.

The responsible credit card user does not use credit to buy consumables.

items that will be eaten, worn out or used up before they are paid for. Only when the charges will be paid in full within the grace period of the account should such items be bought with credit.

To avoid credit problems, consumers are encouraged to limit their credit commitments, excluding the home mortgage, to 20 percent or less of their take-home pay. This rule of thumb is best applied when the consumer pays the maximum rather than the minimum payment they can afford each month.

The big challenge comes during impulse sales and holiday shopping. A 30 percent off sale price will not be a 30 percent savings if the bill is put on a credit card and paid out at the minimum payment rate.

The best way to control credit use is to leave the cards at home. Plan the amount you can afford to spend for gifts over the number of pay periods you have between now and the end of the year.

Decide how to spread your gift allowance over the number of gifts

to be bought, and have fun finding the special gift that sends the message you want to send without sending yourself into an unmanageable debt.

Since murder is out of the question for practical and obvious reasons, Sig comes up with the ideal solution. They will join forces and marry Mom off, and she will be someone else's problem. They call the plan "Operation Geezer Quest". Now all they need is to find an old, deaf, dumb, blind, and above all, rich groom.

Ken Follett's *The Third Twin* is the scary but compelling story of Jeannie Ferrami, a brilliant young research assistant studying the genetic components of aggression, who locates two young men who appear to be identical twins: Steve, a law student, and Dennis, a convicted murderer. Yet they were born on different days, hundreds of miles apart, to different mothers.

As she digs deeper, attracting attention from the Pentagon and the *New York Times*, she finds that Steve is accused of a murder he swears he didn't commit. She is falling in love with him, but she is not sure that he is different from his murderous twin brother.

Dear Ann Landers: In a recent column, you recounted how Reader's Digest tested the honesty of Europeans by dropping wallets in various cities. You wondered how the United States would fare if put to the same test. Well, we can tell you. We did some U.S. testing and printed the results in the December 1995 issue. Here's a copy. -- Lesta Cordil, public relations associate director, Reader's Digest

Dear Lesta: Many thanks for the assist. I'm sure my readers will find the results interesting. I certainly did. Readers, if you're wondering how your city stacked up (I thought Chicago would have done very well), you might not find the answer here. The experiment was done in only 12 cities. Here's how it was set up:

One hundred and twenty wallets containing \$50 each were dropped on the streets and in shopping malls, restaurants, gas stations and office buildings in a number of U.S. cities. In each wallet was a name, local address, phone number, family pictures and coupons, as well as the cash. A Reader's Digest reporter followed on the heels of the wallet-droppers, and this is what his research revealed.

Of the 120 wallets dropped, 80 were returned with all the money intact. Seattle turned out to be the most honest city in the experiment. Nine of the 10 wallets dropped in Seattle were returned with the \$50 inside.

Three smaller cities turned out to be very near the top for honesty -- Meadville, Pa., Concord, N.H., and Cheyenne, Wyo. In each of those cities, eight wallets were returned and two were not.

St. Louis came in next -- of the 10 wallets dropped, seven were returned and three were kept. The suburbs of Boston tied with St. Louis. The suburbs of Los Angeles were not quite as honest. Six wallets were returned, and four were kept.

Las Vegas, Dayton, Atlanta and the suburbs of Houston shared the

poorest records. Five wallets were returned, and five were kept.

Small towns scored 80 percent returns and proved to be more honest than larger cities with the exception of Seattle. Women, it turned out, were more honest than men -- 72 percent to 62 percent. Young people posted a 67 percent return rate -- the same as the overall average.

The researchers made it a point to speak with some of the individuals who unknowingly were participants in this experiment.

One woman who returned a wallet with the \$50 intact said it never occurred to her to keep the money. "I was brought up Catholic," she announced. The woman didn't have much confidence in the morality of the majority, however. She said, "Society is going downhill at a fast pace -- especially in Los Angeles."

Several people who returned the wallets said it was the family pictures, particularly the one of a baby, that made the difference.

My personal conclusions are that honesty is taught by example. It's what children learn at home from their parents. The child who is hauled back to the grocery store with the stolen candy bar and made to face the manager learns an extremely valuable lesson.

Agriculture Briefs

AUSTIN -- The Texas Water Development Board approved a 2,000,000 loan to High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

The loan will be funded through the Agricultural Water Conservation Bond Program.

The District will use the funds to make loans to area farmers and ranchers so they can purchase and install more efficient agricultural water conservation equipment. Up to 80 percent of the value of the equipment may be borrowed.

The HPUWCD No. 1 encompasses Deaf Smith County.

Personnel from the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 and the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service began collecting data for the 1997 pre-plant soil moisture survey on Nov. 11.

The survey is conducted annually to determine general pre-plant soil moisture availability and deficit trends within the 15-county HPUWCD service area.

Using this information, area producers can conserve ground water by applying only what is needed to bring the soil profile to field capacity during pre-plant irrigation.

Three teams will begin collecting data for the 1997 pre-plant soil moisture survey in the northern portions of the district.

Glenn Blackmon and Arnold Husky will begin their data collection in Deaf Smith County.

"Soil moisture conditions are measured first in the northern counties of the district in order to avoid bad weather and to allow adequate time before producers begin irrigating winter crops," said Ken Carver, water district assistant manager.

Weather permitting, the entire data collection process should be completed by Dec. 23.

TWPA schedules meeting

A wheat symposium sponsored by the Texas Wheat Producers Board and annual meeting of the Texas Wheat Producers Association have been set for Dec. 5.

The sessions will be held at the Amarillo Civic Center in cooperation with the Amarillo Farm and Ranch Show, according to Bob Beakley of Ennis, chairman of the board and Ben Scholz of Wylie, president of the association.

Producers are invited to attend the

meeting in order to increase their awareness of the many changes facing agriculture and direction relative to them for '97 and into the future. -- Richard Newman is the deputy administrator for farm programs of the USDA's Farm Services Agency (FSA) in Washington, DC. He will address the various farm service provisions under the new Farm Bill.

Beakley, who will chair the morning symposium, said registration will begin at 8:30 a.m. in the Grand Plaza Room within the Farm and Ranch Show at the Amarillo Civic Center. There is no fee for registration. The program will begin at 9:30 a.m.

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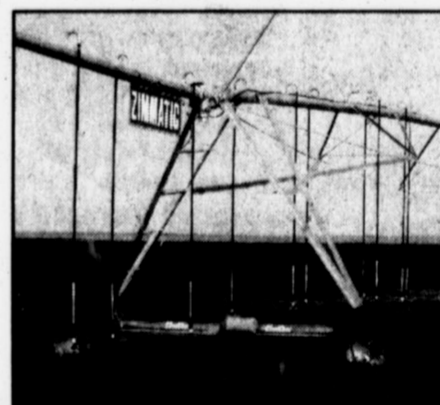
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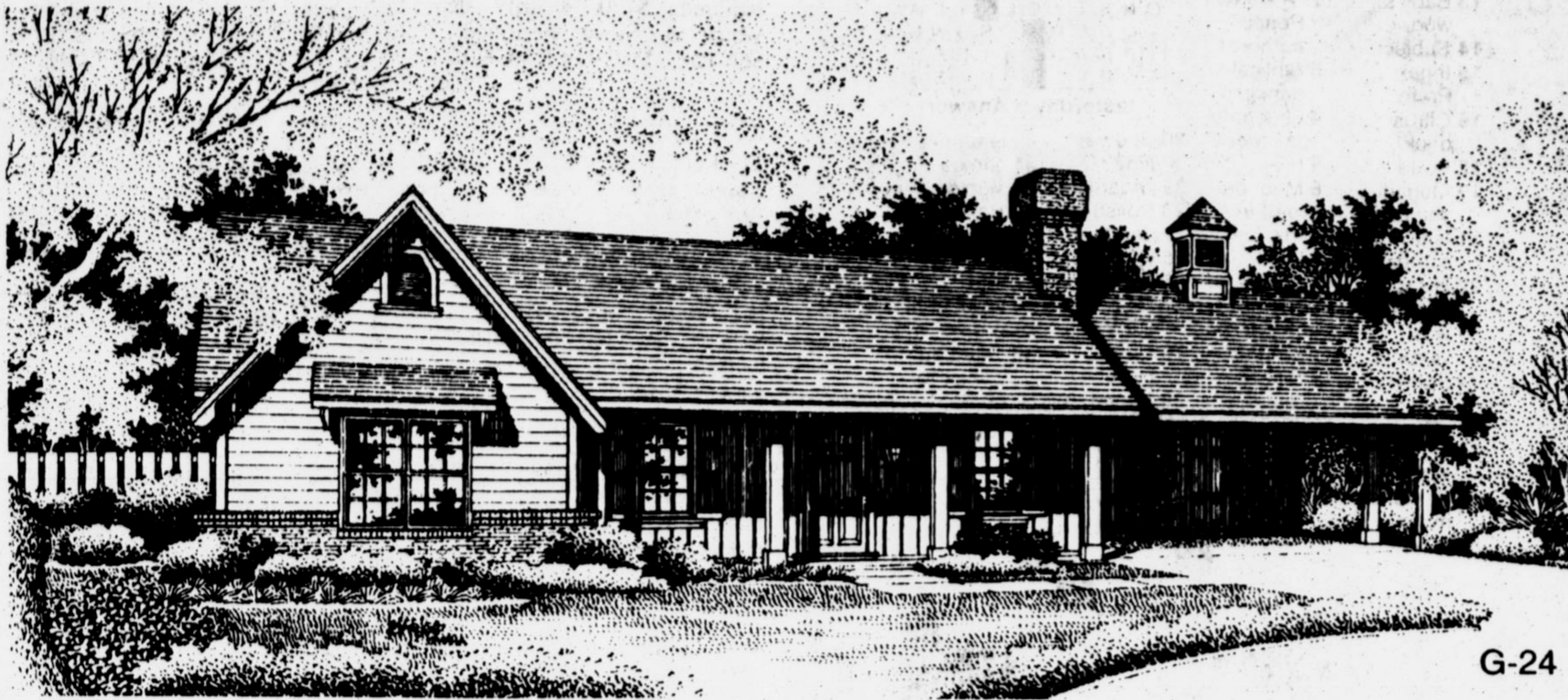

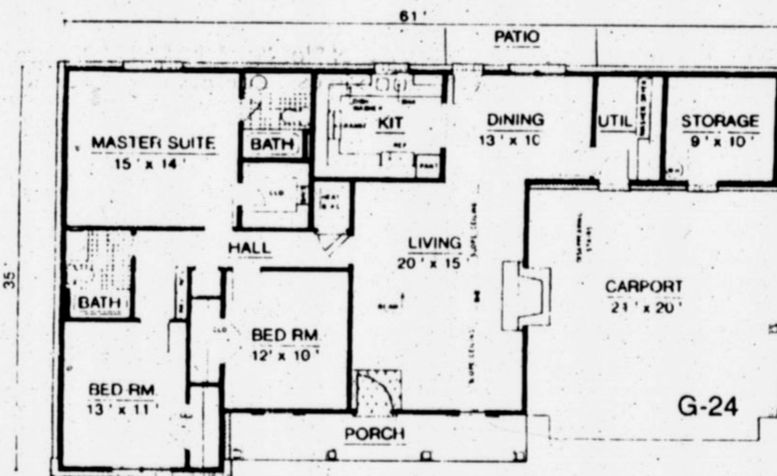

Builders slash housing construction in October

WASHINGTON (AP) - Builders slashed housing construction in October to the lowest level in a year. All regions except the West shared in the cutback.

The 5.1 percent decline was broad-based and included both single- and multi-family units, the Commerce Department reported Tuesday.

Analysts agreed the drop, the second in a row, was further evidence the housing industry had peaked and, like the economy in general, slowed to a more sustainable pace.

"Unless rates move back up or the economy slows further, housing should do well, but not as strong as earlier in the year," contended Fannie Mae economist David Berson. "It's

certainly not falling into recession, or leading the rest of the economy into recession."

Higher rates can make fixed-income investments such as bonds less attractive, forcing down prices to improve the yield. They also can hurt stocks by slowing consumer spending.

During late summer, many analysts were looking for the Federal Reserve to boost interest rates to brake a robust economy and keep inflation under control.

Since then the economy appears to have moderated on its own and the Fed policy-makers have been able to keep rates steady.

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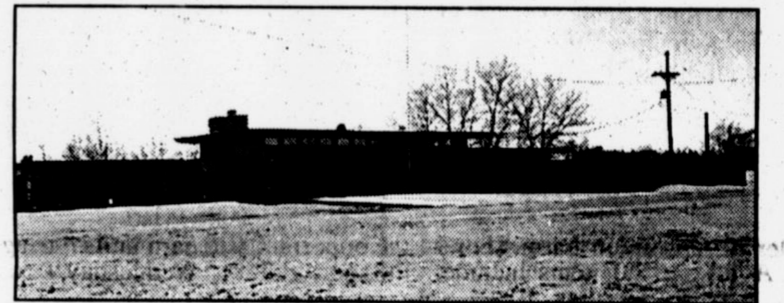

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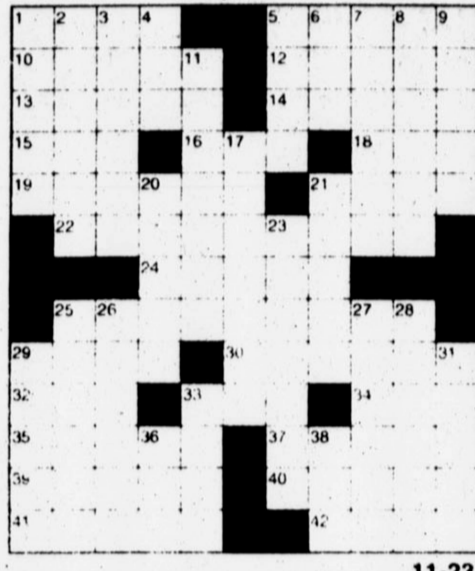

Writing Want Ads that really sell!

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs." Then, remember these hints:

--Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.

--Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.

--Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the word, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.

--Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

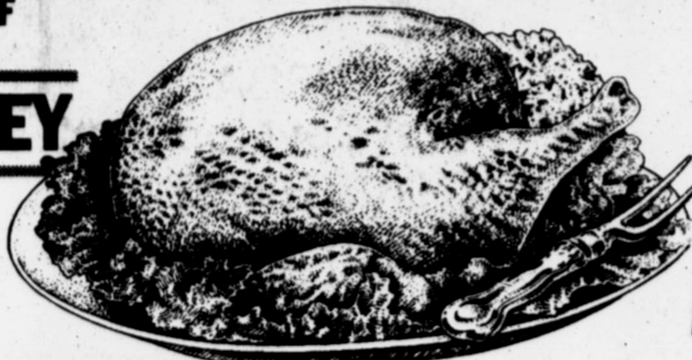

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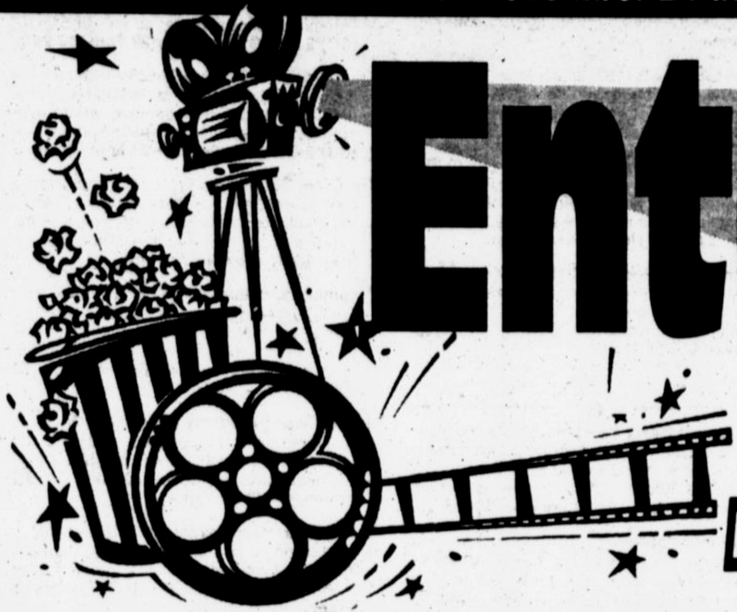

Drew Carey a high point of Thanksgiving themed shows

Monday, Sept. 25, offers an episode of NBC's *The Jeff Foxworthy Show* that finds Jeff and wife Karen (Ann Cusack) clashing over what constitutes

"a traditional Thanksgiving" - especially after his dad, Big Jim (G.W. Bailey), arrives with his current girlfriend and several ex-wives in tow.

Immediately following *Foxworthy*, on *Mr. Rhodes*, Tom (Rhodes) is having a hard enough time getting his gritty new urban drama on the boards - it's being directed by fussy Felcher (Ron Glass) - but to make matters worse, a wealthy school sponsor is urging Tom to give the show a holiday theme.

Airing opposite *Frasier*, on ABC, *Home Improvement* rolls out some striking special effects for an episode that finds Tim (Tim Allen) feeling guilty about not inviting his friend, Benny, for Thanksgiving dinner.

Tim's misgivings spark some strange dreams depicting his family and friends as animated wooden figures.

And famous father-and-son race car drivers Mario and Michael Andretti put in appearances on *Tool Time* and challenge Tim to a turkey carving contest, which is called by veteran Indy 500 announcer Jack Arute.



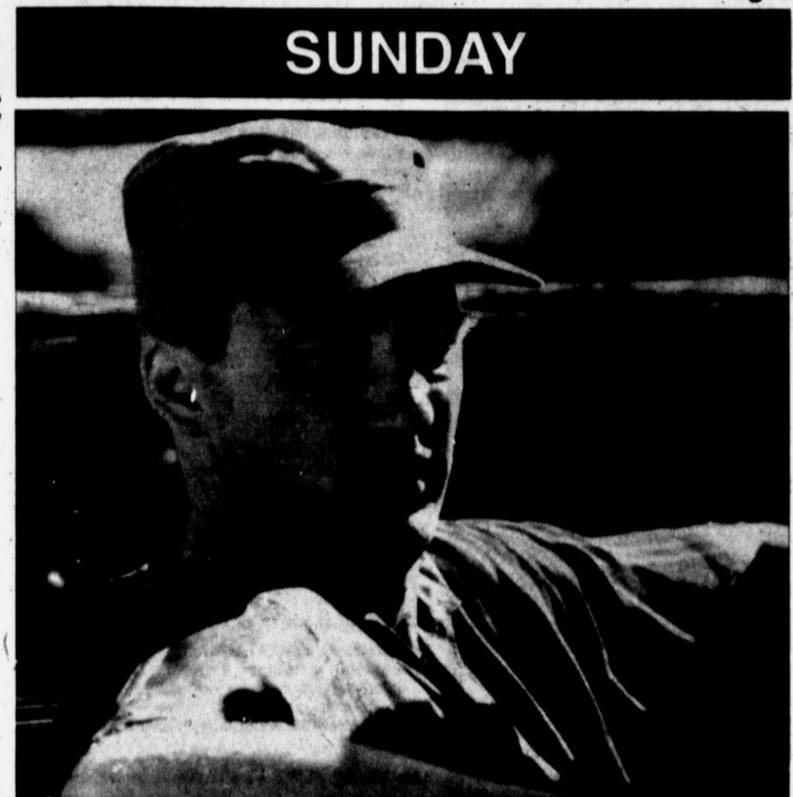

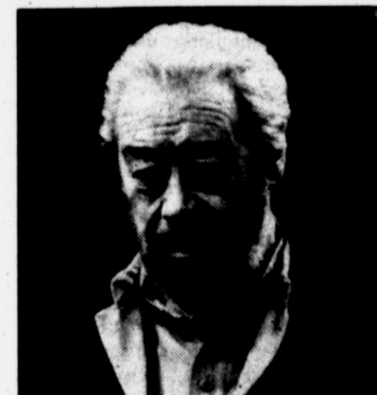
Q: What happened to the popular Crook and Chase show that used to air on The Nashville Network? -Annette R., Anderson, S.C.

His autobiography, A Damned Serious Business: My Life in Comedy, is worth seeking out.

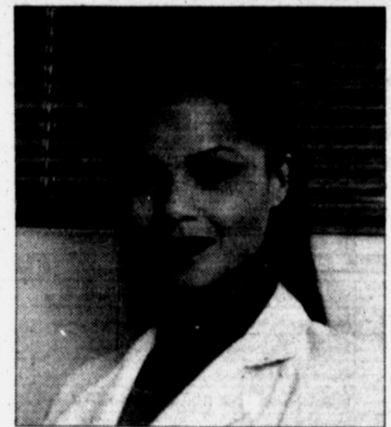

Maya Lin: a portrait of the artist as a visionary

Slender and soft-spoken, Maya Lin is a titan. Now in her late 30s, Lin joined the ranks of the world's best artistic designers at the age of 21, when her design submission was selected from thousands for the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington.

That and her other work, from public art to personal expression, is the subject of the Academy Award-winning documentary *Maya Lin: A Strong, Clear Vision*, airing Wednesday, Nov. 27, as a P.O.V. special on PBS (check local listings).

Filmmaker Freida Lee Mock begins with an account of the memorial's design and construction from Lin's point of view as a Yale undergraduate. Her plan for inscribing the names of the American war victims into walls drew a firestorm of criticism from veterans and government officials desiring a tribute of glory, not mourning. In congressional hearings Lin tenaciously defended her design and her belief that the memorial should be cathartic.

Mock's initial idea for the film was

to compare that first public design with Lin's later memorial to the civil rights movement, commissioned by the Southern Poverty Law Center in Montgomery, Ala.

As the filmmaker began to follow Lin with her camera, she realized "there's a lot more going on (inside her) than what's reported in the paper," and the film mushroomed from an 18-month plan to a five-year project.

"I shifted the whole idea," Mock says, "to a look at 10 years of her work and the creative process."

The result has grace without pretension, becoming a window to Lin's ideas, as well as the stone into which she casts them.

The film chronicles Lin's work on diverse projects, including a fountain at Yale dedicated to its women students, a Japanese-inspired garden of crushed glass and a contemporary residence with a rolling roof line.

"Her work is very accessible," Mock says. "It asks us to respond on a human level.

"It's really art that is for all people."

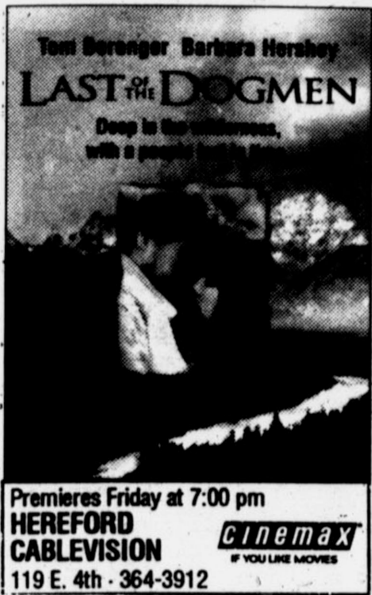



From there the ball just kept rolling, and she landed appearances on *Silk Stalkings*, *Diagnosis Murder*, *Pacific Blue*, *Married ... with Children* and *Weird Science*.

It wasn't long before she landed a role in the new Jim Carrey movie, *Liar, Liar*. Shortly after she finished filming the movie, she went on a casting call for a minor role in the Burt Reynolds film *Raven*.

Following her audition, the casting director chased after her into the parking lot and asked her to come back and read for a lead in the movie.

She got the part and spent the next eight weeks portraying a CIA agent in the action thriller, which is scheduled for release next spring.

Allen is one to watch.

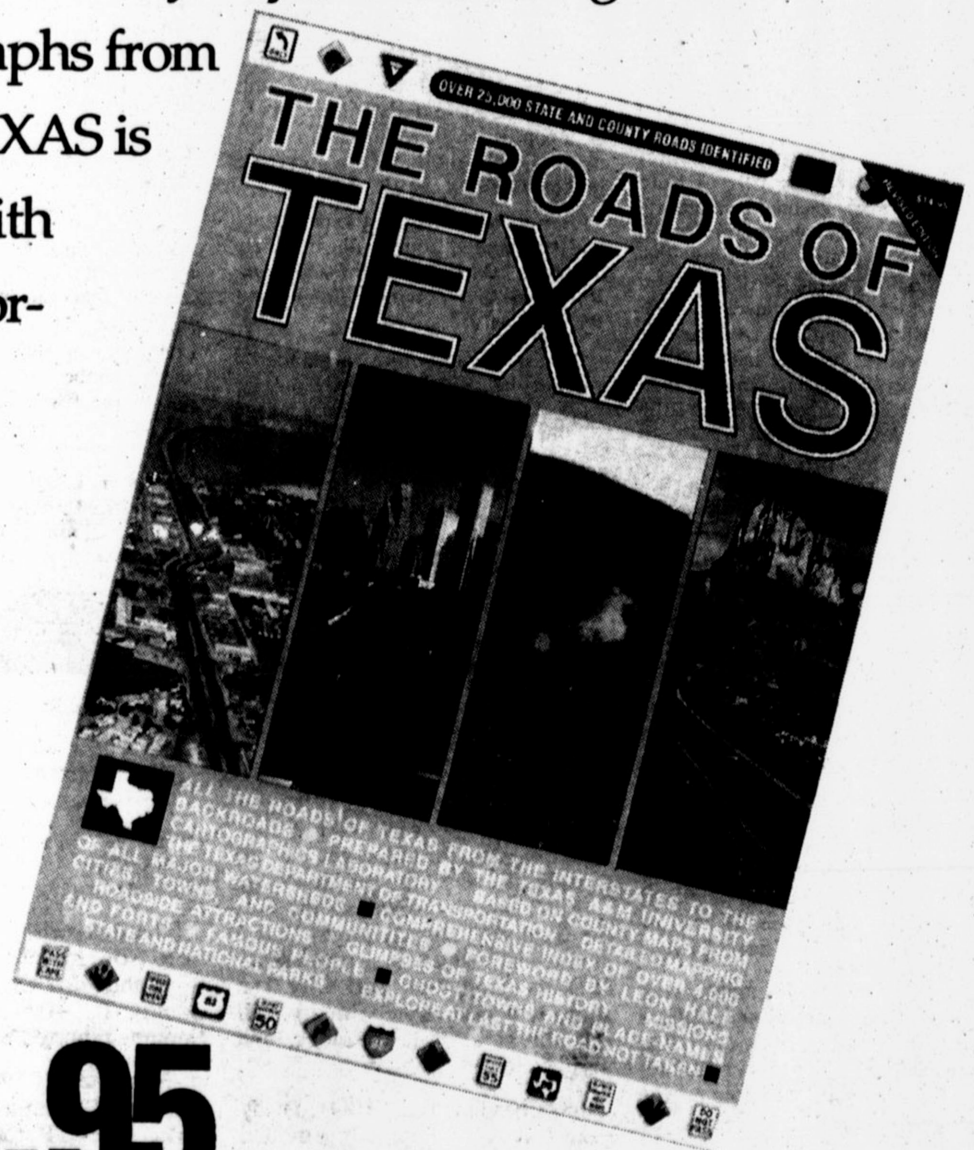

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Nutrition Notes

The Food Guide Pyramid emphasizes food from the five major groups:

- *Bread, cereal, rice and pasta group.
- *Fruit group.

- *Vegetable group.
- *Meat, poultry, fish, dry beans, eggs and nuts group.
- *Milk, yogurt and cheese group.

The sixth food group listed on the Pyramid consists of fats, oil and sweets. These provide calories and little else nutritionally. Most people

use them sparingly. Each food group provides some, but not all, of the nutrients you need. Foods in one group can not replace those in another.

No one food group is more important than another -- for good health, you need them all.

SOCIAL SECURITY QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q: When is the best time to call Social Security without getting a busy signal?

A: Social Security's 800 number is busiest in the week and early in the month so, if your business can wait, it's best to call at other times. However, if you are planning to file for benefits, you should call us soon as possible. You can speak to a representative or make an appointment between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. on business days. For 24-hours a day, including weekends and holidays.

Q: I always thought of Social Security benefits as something for older people. But my sixteen-year-old classmate said she started getting Social Security benefits because her father died. Is this true?

A: Although it's true that many Social Security beneficiaries receive retirement benefits, many others get Social Security because they are disabled; they are a dependent of someone who gets Social Security; or they are a widow, widower, or child of someone who has died, like my classmate. So, depending on a person's circumstances, a person may be eligible for Social Security at any age. To get more information about Social Security, call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, and ask for the pamphlet, "Social Security—Basic Facts."

Q: When you receive Social Security disability benefits, how often is your case reviewed?

A: It depends on the nature and severity of your condition and whether your condition is expected to improve. If improvement is expected, your first review generally will be six to 18 months after the date you became disabled. If improvement is possible but cannot be predicted, your case will be reviewed about once every three years. If improvement is not expected, your case will be reviewed once every five to seven years.

Q: What are Social Security credits?

A: As you work and pay taxes, you earn "credits" that count toward eligibility for future Social Security benefits. You can earn a maximum of four credits each year based on earnings of \$640 for a credit (in 1996). Most people need 40 credits (10 years of work) to qualify for benefits. Younger people need fewer credits to qualify for disability or survivors benefits. For more information, call, Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, and ask for the leaflet How You Earn Credits (SSA Pub. No. 05-10072).

Q: I'm thinking about retiring next year. When should I contact Social Security?

A: If you're thinking about retiring next year, you should contact Social Security now to discuss your plans. In some cases, your choice of retirement month could mean additional benefits for you and your family. Because the computation varies based on your earnings for the year and the month in which you file, it's a good idea to check with a Social Security representative before making your decision. Central Texas historic home worth visit

AUSTIN - The stone wall on the steep, little-traveled block of East 10th Street disguises one of the most pleasant and historic sites in downtown Austin.

Any visitor who passes through the gate at 507 E. 10th St. and climbs the stairs will find a near-secret garden in front of the old German Free School building at the top.

The quiet garden dotted with red, purple, lavender and deep green native Texan foliage is about to become noisier and busier at the home of the German-Texan Heritage Society as it implements a new master plan.

The plan includes the society's straightforward mission statement. "We promote awareness and preservation of the German culture of Texas," said Teresa Chavez, director of the society.

The fabric of Central Texas history and culture from the mid-1800s through today is deeply woven with German threads. Thousands of residents of the area can trace their ancestry back to settlers who arrived from Europe to put their stamp on the area's history. In music, community festivals, foods, language and folklore, they keep German culture alive and attempt to dispel misconceptions about it.

"We have two world wars to live down," said Charles Kalteyer, president of the German Free School Guild. The constant task before German Texans is to remind people that they had nothing to do with the Germans who fought in World War I and II.

"Our history goes way back before the Nazis," he said.

To become a better statewide focal point for German culture, space inside the society's headquarters will be remodeled to provide more room for the burgeoning library of Texan and German history books, and

somewhere, there will be more space for crowds to come hear speakers at the headquarters.

Although there are places where the beer-and-sausage celebratory side of German heritage can be seen, the society's headquarters has a more sedate atmosphere.

"We want this to be a little different fun," said Joe Burges, incoming president of the board of the society. "We're trying to make this into a cultural center."

The group already holds chamber music concerts featuring the works of such German-speaking composers as Bach, Beethoven, Wagner, Brahms and Handel. There also are lectures on chapters in German Texan history, such as the Civil War, which caused major trauma to Germans who did not support secession and fought for the Union.

Kalteyer said his great-grandfather was a captain in the Confederate Army, but that that ancestor's daughter married a Union soldier. Dozens of German men who were against slavery and refused to sign loyalty oaths to the Confederacy were killed as they tried to escape to Mexico. A monument was erected to their memory in Comfort, southwest of Austin near Kerrville.

The society's headquarters was

built about five years before that tragic episode. German immigrants erected it in 1857 as the German Free School.

One of Kalteyer's ancestors, Charles Pressler, was a member of the association that built the school to give even children who couldn't pay for schooling an education.

"It was the first chartered school in Austin. They paid teachers 10 cents a day per student. They were paying for the education of those who couldn't pay," he said. Teachers received 1.5 cents a day for each student whose family could pay for school.

Boys attended class in one room and girls in another.

Eventually, however the school building became the home of the large Schulte family. Pictures in the crowded library space show the Schultes posed formally and having fun together in the early 1900s.

The last person to live in the building before it became the home of the heritage society was Kelly H. Stevens, a world traveler and artist who left the building and its grounds to the society. He died in 1991, leaving behind the eclectic and fascinating combination of antiques and artwork that decorates the building.

Visitors can see fine blue and white

Meissen porcelain from the Saxony region of Germany and Dutch Delft china pieces. The mantelpiece in the main sitting room comes from a Tennessee Stevens family home and dates to the late 1790s.

There is a collection of Stevens' paintings as well as other works he acquired as he traveled the world. The floors and many of the pieces of furniture attest to Stevens love for beautiful wood.

How much of the inside of the old schoolhouse will stay as it remains to be seen. The society obtained a grant and is working with an architect to develop final plans for the remodeling. If any space is added to the building, it will be in the back to allow the front with its columns and curlicue banisters to remain intact, Chavez said.

The gate at the top of the stairs in the stone wall is open every Thursday from 1 to 4 p.m. for free public tours of the property. The society sponsors German lessons and German conversation hours as well.

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The seniors community is designed in a similar fashion to seniors communities that The Sullivan Companies have built in other areas. Sullivan's senior communities offer seniors an active and independent lifestyle. Before, seniors were forced to maintain an expensive older home, live with others, or move to a nursing home.

Seniors might be vulnerable to misfortunes at holiday time

ST. LOUIS (AP) - You're more vulnerable to fraud and financial mishaps in the frenzy of getting your holiday shopping done, notes Michael Greenfield, Walter D. Coles professor of law at Washington University.

His suggestions for not getting socked financially:

- Budget your purchases to avoid finance charges on your credit card account. Pay balances off each month if you can. Greenfield estimates an annual finance charge of \$500 on a \$2,000 balance for some credit card plans. "If you need to carry a balance, by all means pay it off as quickly as you can. Never pay just the minimum monthly payment amount."

- Watch out for telemarketers, he warns. Beware of alleged "surveys" that turn into sales pitches. Never give out your credit card number unless you are the one who places the call. "You could be talking to someone who is after your card number, not your business."

- Keep track of credit card receipts and carbons so that no one can pick up your account numbers. If someone does get your account number, you will only be liable for the first \$50 of the fraudulent credit card use, but it's a big hassle getting fraudulent charges removed from your account. Check your credit card receipts against your bill, he advises.

Frakes, a former Broadway and soap opera star, never watched science-fiction movies as a child.

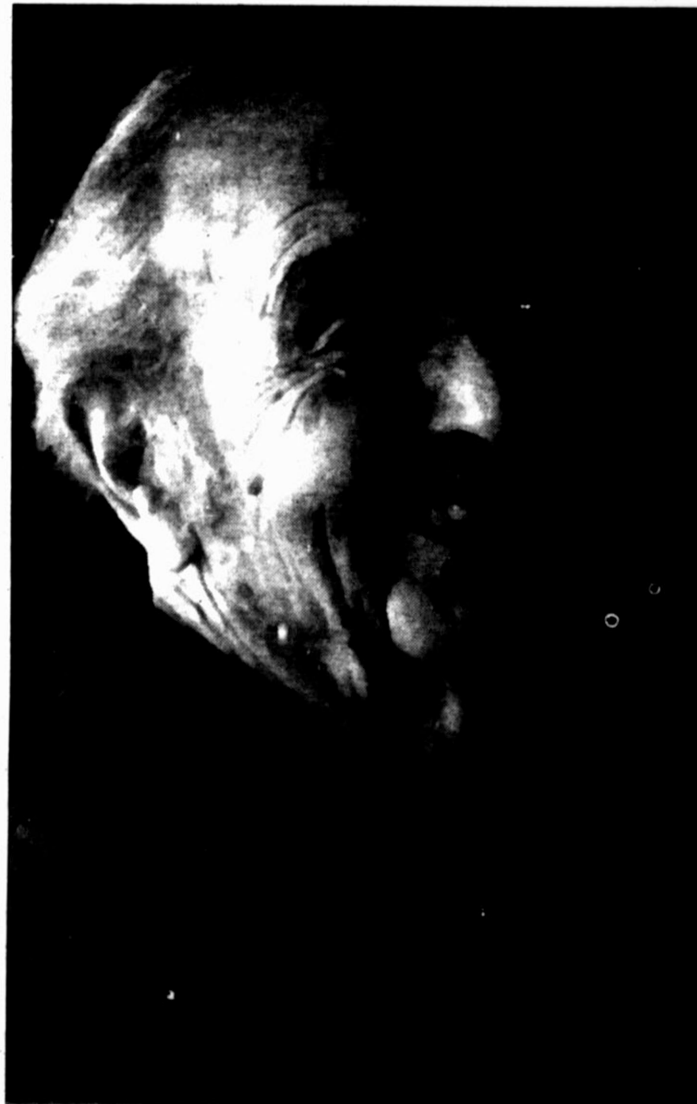
ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) - Gabe Kaplan's card-playing buddies welcomed him back, even though he wasn't actually playing.

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Recipes from victims of Holocaust in book

DALLAS - One of the most talked-about cookbooks these days probably won't be remembered for its recipes.

"In Memory's Kitchen: A Legacy From the Women of Terezin," (Jason Aronson Inc., \$25) has been called, quite literally, a "cookbook from hell." Not because of what words fill its pages, but because of the subtle ones that don't.

Hell was Terezin, a Czechoslovakian ghetto and concentration camp during World War II. A place where supper, if there was any, consisted of watery soup or potato peelings.

But the horrible conditions of Terezin (also known as Theresienstadt) couldn't take away memories. Melt-in-your-mouth memories of rich strudels and fluffy omelets. Of stick-to-your-ribs liver or apple dumplings. Of linzer torte and farina-stuffed geese necks.

Day after day, night after night, the starving, mostly elderly Terezin women discussed recipes. Much, it's been said, as they might have gossiped over back-yard fences in happier days. With whatever bits of paper and pencil they could find, they jotted down what they remembered.

The result, 50 years and an incredible journey later, is "In Memory's Kitchen."

"To recall things in such a painful time is to comfort yourselves," says Cara De Silva, the food historian and author who spent two years readying the book for publication. "For many, they were trying to feel normal, dreaming those dreams."

Collecting the recipes was extremely important to the women, she says. They were creating a manuscript cookbook to be passed down.

They probably realized they wouldn't be personally handing it over to their daughters and granddaughters. Maybe, they thought,

someone might find it and cook with it again.

"This was their treasure," says Bianca Steiner Brown, who lived in Terezin and translated the recipes.

The story of how their manuscript ended up, 50 years later, in an actual cookbook, sounds like a movie: On her deathbed, an elderly woman named Mina Pachter, who contributed many of the recipes, gave the manuscript to a friend. If he survived, she asked, please give it to her daughter in Israel, Anny Stern. Mrs. Pachter died of protein deficiency in the Terezin hospital on Yom Kippur of 1944.

Her friend kept the manuscript for 15 years.

When his cousin was going to Israel, he asked if she'd take it to Mrs. Stern. In Israel, the cousin learned the Sterns had moved to the United States.

Here the trail becomes cold. The packet was carried to New York by someone else in 1960. It ended up in Ohio, and several years later a man passed it along to an acquaintance of Mrs. Stern's in New York.

In the late 1960s, a quarter-century after Mrs. Pachter died, her daughter's phone rang. A voice said, "I have a package from your mother."

Mrs. Stern, who died last year, couldn't bring herself to open the package for four years. When she did, she found poems, photographs, letters - and the recipes.

Translating them wasn't an easy task. Thread bound the deteriorating paper. The script was German gothic, so tiny that Mrs. Brown needed a magnifying glass. But she kept at it.

"I felt I owed something to those of my family and my husband's family who perished," says Mrs. Brown, who worked at several food magazines before retiring. "This is like a monument that I keep or I

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Experts show estrogen aids concentration

WASHINGTON (AP) - Treatment with estrogen dramatically improved the memory and concentration of elderly women with Alzheimer's disease, researchers reported Wednesday.

Experts called the findings encouraging but said they need to be verified in larger trials.

The experiment, conducted at the Veterans Affairs Puget Sound Health Care System in Tacoma, Wash., is the first controlled study among Alzheimer's patients to evaluate the effects of estrogen on the mind-destroying disease. Earlier, noncontrolled studies suggested that the hormone can protect against developing Alzheimer's.

"Women on estrogen had a significantly improved ability to remember things," said Dr. Sanjay Asthana, lead author of the new study. Results were presented Wednesday at the national meeting of the Society for Neuroscience.

Asthana said the study involved 12 women in their 70s, all with clinically diagnosed mild to moderate Alzheimer's disease.

All of the women received drug-delivery skin patches, six with estrogen, the others with a placebo preparation. The identity of the women getting estrogen was not disclosed to treating physicians.

"The effect of the estrogen was rapid," said Asthana. "Within a week, there was improvement."

Throughout the eight-week trial, the women received standard neurological and psychological tests to detect changes.

Asthana said the women on estrogen had memory test scores 2-2½ times greater than their scores before taking the drug. Attention test scores "almost doubled," he said.

Loss of memory and attention span are two of the cognitive functions most severely affected by Alzheimer's, a disease that affects about 4 million Americans. It progressively destroys the mind, eventually killing the victim. There is no proven cause or cure.

Asthana said in his study, the estrogen effect was dose-related - that is, patients who absorbed more of the hormone from the patches improved the most. The memory and attention improvements gradually faded, he said, after the experiment ended.

A number of studies have shown that estrogen tends to slow the onset of Alzheimer's symptoms, including three that concluded the hormone reduces the risk of the disease by up to 40 percent in post-menopausal women.

Researchers from Washington University in St. Louis reported preliminary results last year suggesting that estrogen pills improved the memory of 10 women with Alzheimer's disease.

Asthana said that his study was too small to be conclusive but gives strong support for larger, more extensive tests among Alzheimer's patients.

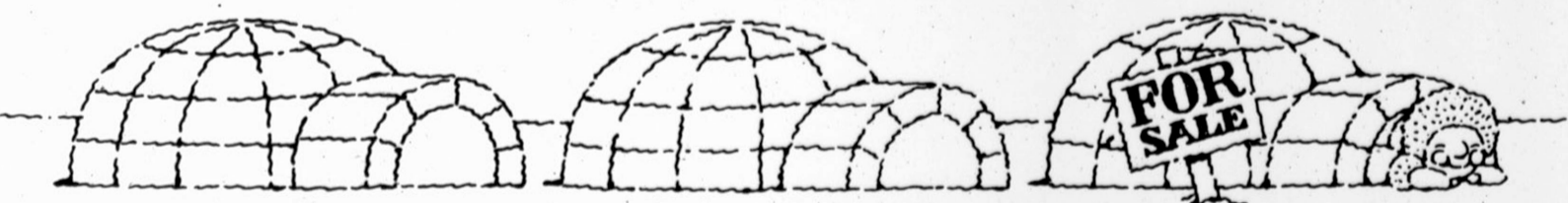
However, estrogen replacement is not risk-free. Studies have shown that the therapy can slightly increase the risk of breast cancer and of developing blood clots.

built."

Many recipes lack key ingredients or length of cooking time. Some are sauced before they're cooked. Mrs. Brown's translations are mostly literal, with some clarifications noted.

"The elderly lived a hellish life," Ms. De Silva says from her New York home. "They had very little else but food memories. Food brings with it an inestimable power. It nourishes the soul, not just the body."

"These recipes tell as much of the story as Anne Frank's diary did," says Ms. De Silva. "They were war-torn, rationed recipes ... the emphasis on cakes and dumplings tells you something."

Middle European women of that era were known for their cooking and baking, Mrs. Brown says.

"I remember coming home from work in the camp and I was very tired and crept up to my bunk," says Mrs. Brown, who now lives on Long Island. "I heard two women discussing chocolate cake. I thought, 'Who could think of discussing that?' Maybe I was a little bit annoyed."

She has prepared several of the recipes, including "Pachter Torte" - Mrs. Pachter's chocolate cake. She also made Mrs. Pachter's "Badener Caramell Bonbons" - caramels from a spa near Vienna.

"I surprised Anny with them and she was just beside herself," Mrs. Brown says. "She said they tasted exactly the way her mother's had. Then she knew she could trust me with the translation."

Mrs. Stern's son, David, translated his grandmother's poems and letters. Late last month, he, Ms. De Silva and Mrs. Brown presented the original manuscript to the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, D.C. About 750 people attended the ceremony.

"When Bianca and I spoke," Ms. De Silva says, "someone later told us, 'Nothing in the room moved except tears.'"

Here's how "Badener Caramell Bonbons" are translated in the book "In Memory's Kitchen." Information in brackets is clarification from translator Bianca Steiner Brown:

CARAMELS FROM BADEN: Brown caramelize 30 decagrams sugar without water. Pour in liter coffee extract (very strong coffee), 1/8 liter cream and bring it to a boil. Add 8

decagrams tea butter (best quality butter) and cook until mixture is thick. Pour boiling into a buttered candy pan. With the back of a knife divide it before it completely cools. Then break it into cubes and wrap in parchment and also pink paper.

Dallas cooking teacher Kyra Effren adapted these recipes from "In Memory's Kitchen."

CARAMELS FROM BADEN

1-1/2 cups sugar
1-1/3 cups strong coffee
1/2 cup cream
6 tablespoons butter

Caramelize sugar in a large heavy saucepan, stirring to melt, then cooking until it is liquid and deep brown.

Pour in the coffee and cream; return to a boil. The caramel will coagulate with the addition of the coffee and cream; stir as it reheats and it will melt.

Add butter; boil on high heat, stirring occasionally until mixture reaches 248 F on a candy thermometer (258 F for chewier candy, 278 F for hard candy), up to 30 minutes.

Meanwhile, generously butter a 4x8-inch pan. Pour the hot caramel into the pan and allow to cool. When the mixture cools to room temperature, score the mixture to divide the candies into serving-size pieces. Allow to set. Unmold and break or cut into pieces; wrap individually in plastic wrap. Makes 32 (1x1-inch) pieces.

PLUM STRUDEL

1-1/2 cups flour
1/2 cup potato starch
2 cups sugar (divided use)
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 cup (1 stick) margarine
5 large eggs (divided use)
1/2 cup plus about 3 tablespoons milk (divided use)
3 small bread rolls
2/3 cup (11 tablespoons) soft butter

1 teaspoon cinnamon
Finely grated rind of 1 lemon
1 cup finely ground hazelnuts
3 pounds prune plums (may substitute apples)

To make pastry, combine flour, potato starch, cup sugar and baking powder in a medium bowl. Cut in margarine. Add 1 egg and process in food processor or knead, adding up to 3 tablespoons milk to get dough to hold together. Form into a ball and

allow dough to rest 30 minutes.

Separate remaining eggs; set aside. To make the filling, soak the rolls in cup milk in a medium bowl until soft; beat until smooth. Add the butter, 1 cup sugar, cinnamon, lemon rind, 4 egg yolks and nuts, stirring to combine. Beat the whites until they form soft peaks. Beat in cup sugar a tablespoon at a time; continue beating until stiff. Fold into nut mixture.

Discard pits from plums and cut plums into strips. If using apples, peel, core and cut in very thin slices.

Preheat oven to 375 F. Roll half the dough out on a lightly floured surface into an 8x12-inch rectangle. Transfer to a sheet of baking paper, which makes it easier to transfer to baking sheet. Spread half the nut mixture down the middle of the pastry dough and sprinkle with half the plums or apples. Fold side over side like a burrito to make a log. (The paper should make this easier.) No need to tuck the ends, unless you just want to. Turn the roll seam side down and transfer roll on its paper to a cookie sheet. Repeat for second roll.

Bake for 25 minutes or until crisp and brown. Pastry will spread to make a flat, oblong strudel. May be frozen; serve at room temperature. Makes 16 to 20 servings.

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Shoppers do not realize health benefits of citrus

Fight Cancer: It is estimated that more than 10 million Americans have a history of cancer and 550,000 of them will die from it this year. Today, the good news is that experts and researchers know more than they used to about the role of diet in the prevention of some cancers. According to the American Cancer Society, about one third of all cancer deaths are related to diet. A growing body of evidence suggests that eating a low-fat diet rich in fruits and vegetables containing nutrients like Vitamin C, A and fibers may reduce the risk of some types of cancer.

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To Your Good Health

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am a 74-year-old man. I have not had physical exams regularly until recently. I took a pre-op exam for cataract surgery, and one of the numbers noted was for PSA. It was 6.1. I have no prostate gland symptoms other than an occasional slow urinary stream. Should I do any follow-up on the 6.1 PSA at this time? — L.B.

ANSWER: Tests for prostate-specific antigen levels can identify cancer in the gland. A PSA level below 4 used to be considered normal, and higher than 10 considered highly suggestive of cancer. Between 4 and 10 was a gray zone, calling for more testing.

The test is relatively new, and familiarity with it has led to refinement of PSA limits.

The new PSA norm for a 70-year-old white man is 6.5; for a 70-year-old black man, it's 5.5. The overall rate of prostate cancer is higher for blacks than for whites, hence the lowered suspicion threshold for them.

If you are white, your 6.1 reading would be considered normal. But you're up there near the 6.5 threshold, so I would want another test in six months or a year.

If are black, your reading would be above the accepted norm, and I would want more extensive testing now —

ultrasound, maybe a biopsy — just to be on the safe side.

I'm making an important assumption — that you have had a recent prostate digital probe for gland texture.
