## Villareal's spirit could fill Texas Stadium

### Special education student loves his Dallas Cowboys

Gabriel Villareal, an avid Dallas Cowboys fan, has enough team spirit to fill Texas Stadium. And even more.

Villareal, 21, is a special education student at Hereford High School. He is the son of Sylvia Mejia.

He has never been to a Cowboys football game, nor to their home field, Texas Stadium.

But, every time there is a Cowboys game on television, Villareal's eyes are set on the game. He also listens to the radio broadcasts and reads the

game highlights in the newspapers.

Emmitt Smith is his favorite player. "He's cool," Villareal said.

And what makes No. 22 such a good player? "Michael Irvin," he said.

He has another team predicted to win the Superbowl since the Cowboys are out of the playoffs. "Green Bay," Villareal said.

And he has some breaking news on Troy Aikman. "He's going to leave. He's going to Miami," he said.

Villareal and other sports fans will have to wait and see if that is true. Yet, there's not too many days that

go by without Villareal talking about the Cowboys.

He often can be heard in the hallways saying, "How 'bout those Cowboys." Cliff Golden, Hereford Independent School District vocational education coordinator, said.

"I think every student in Hereford High School accepts Gabriel. They all know him by name. They know how crazy he is about the Dallas Cowboys and they'll talk to him about that," Priscilla Lacey, HHS community-based instruction

coordinator, said.

Several teachers were talking about how much Villareal's attitude brightened the school days, Golden said.

"He's doing so much for us, so why don't we do something for him. He always has a positive spin on it. And that's what we are really looking at," Golden said.

"I see him as a very caring person -- someone that wants to do the best he can do," Linda Gonzales, HHS transition director, said.

Monty Lewis, an HHS auto mechanics teacher who had Villareal in class, suggested trying to get him some Cowboys memorabilia.

Golden wrote a letter to the Cowboys organization, which was signed by several teachers. Then, a package was sent to Villareal at the high school.

Villareal received an autographed team picture, a Troy Aikman picture, a Emmitt Smith picture, a "Cooking with the Cowboys" cookbook and a Cowboys sports cap from the Dallas Cowboys organization.

Along with the autographs, the team picture said, "Gabriel, We're All Pulling For You!"

The pictures were matted and framed by students in the Life Skills program at Hereford Junior High School.

Villareal cannot wear the cap in the school building because of a school policy, Golden said.

"He wanted to wear it so badly," he said.

When the cap is not on his head, Villareal said, he has it hanging on his bedroom wall next to the framed pictures.

He shares his unabashed love for the Cowboy's team with many of his employers at his community-based training site, the HHS maintenance department.

Villareal enjoys to work about as much as he enjoys to watch the Cowboys play football. He also serves as an offic aide in the HHS main office. "I think work is the most important thing to Gabriel. He enjoys that," Lacey said.

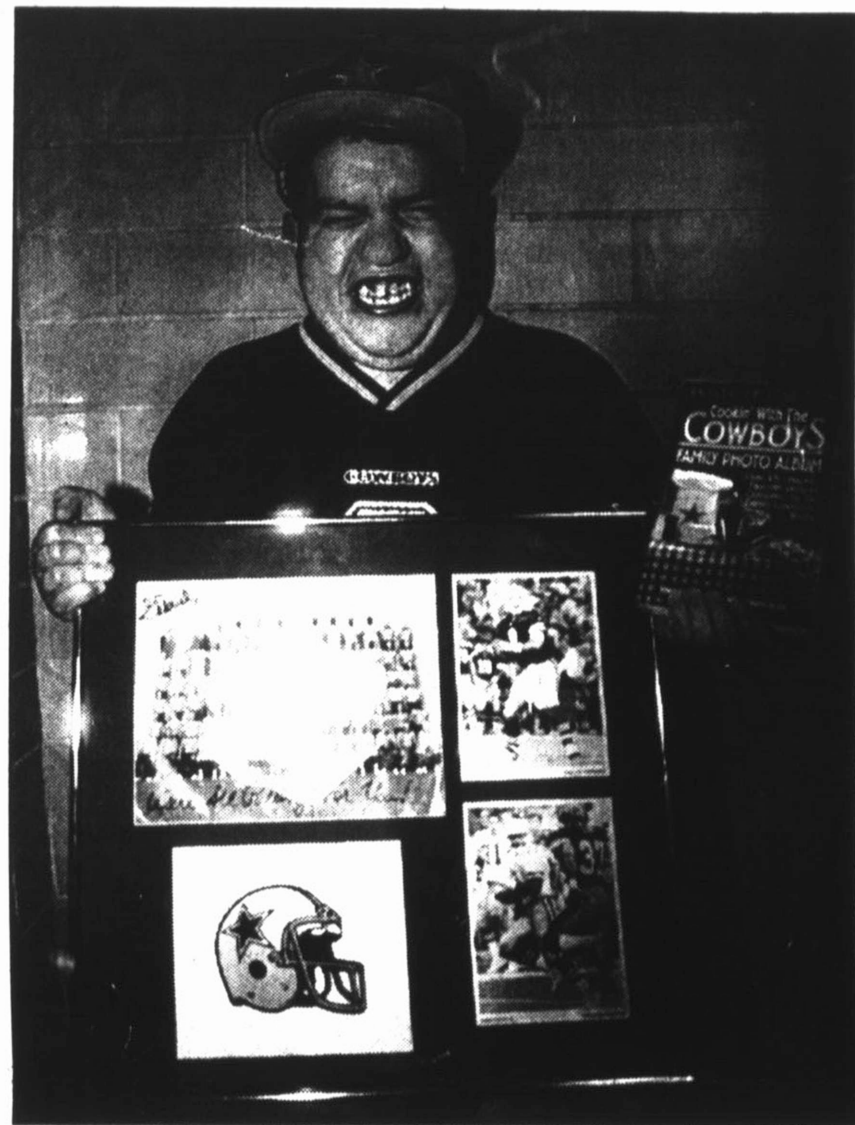
"Even with his handicap condition, he never has had any problems with employers. The employers are always praising him -- how he tries to help,"

## Sugar beet business meet, banquet set for Jan. 17-18

The Texas-New Mexico Sugar Beet Growers Association will hold its annual business meeting and banquet Jan. 17-18 in Hereford, it was announced Thursday by Kenneth Frye, association president.

The business meeting Friday will be held in Hereford Community Center beginning at 9:30 a.m. It will include various speakers, door prizes, and a barbecue lunch. The banquet will be Saturday at 7 p.m. at the Deaf Smith County Bull Barn.

Roger Hill, president of Holly Sugar, will be guest speaker at the business meeting. He is expected to discuss Holly's plans for 1997 and the status of the nation's sweetener industry.

"Hill and Imperial Holly Corporation recently welcomed a strong grower commitment to plant more regional acres for 1997, and they announced Holly's Hereford plant will continue to operate as in past years," said Frye.

Also appearing at the business meeting will be George Grant, a beet producer in Burley, Idaho. He will discuss the Snake River Sugar Co., a farmer-owned sugar cooperative formed after growers in the Idaho region purchased Amalgamated Sugar.

Frye, a Hereford area grower, is coordinating the meeting and banquet with other directors and their wives. He said the meeting will include a review of various beet research projects conducted by individual growers, Holly personnel and soil scientists for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Bushland.

Among the key topics will be low

energy precision application (LEPA) and other limited irrigation practices. Dimmitt farmer Colby Gilbreath, an association director who worked with TAES researchers in field irrigation tests, and Stan McCabe, a Holly agriculturalist who monitored a successful LEPA operation near Nazareth, will head the irrigation discussion.

Hereford grower Charles Schlabs will review his ongoing on-farm research into various beet cultural practices. Research reports from TAES should help educate growers on better disease, weed and insect control. Tachigaren, a seed treatment showing promise in controlling seedling disease, will also be discussed by Scott Pahl of Seed Systems.

A report on chemicals available for

beets will be given by Dave Dahlsad, Holly agriculturalist, and Jack Lyons, Dow Chemical representative. Holly's Alan Telck, Colorado Springs, will discuss seed varieties available to growers this year.

The meeting will also include the election of directors. The terms of Frye, for the Easter area, and Randy Wieck, for the Dawn area, expire this year. Dennis Printz, Holly agricultural manager, will recognize the region's leading growers for 1996.

Door prizes for the meeting will be provided by regional agribusiness firms, some of which will have booths and displays at the meeting. Featured speaker for the 32nd annual banquet on Saturday night will be Lewis Baumgartner, a humorist who claims to be "the world's worst farmer."

Growers who produced 10,000 pounds of refined sugar per acre will be recognized at the banquet.

The traditional award for the "Man of the Year in Agriculture" will also be presented at the banquet by The Hereford Brand. The recipient is selected by a committee of past honorees.

"We urge all beet growers and those interested in becoming growers to attend the meeting," said Frye. "Beets offer an outstanding alternative crop for this area, and information presented at the meeting will be of vital importance as head toward planting the 1997 crop in just over two months," added Frye.

## Artic cold front may bring snow

Skies were mostly clear across north Texas as high pressure continued to build behind an artic cold front moving through north Texas Saturday. Temperatures were in the 20s. Winds were generally from the north at 10 to 20 miles an hour in Dallas-Fort Worth, producing wind chill factors from 0 to minus 5 degrees.

It will be mostly cloudy and cold through Sunday night with a slight change of light snow. Lows 15 to 24. Highs 26 to 34.

A winter storm watch was posted for the northern two-thirds of south Texas Sunday. A wintry mix of sleet, snow and rain was expected over most of the region late Saturday.

In West Texas, scattered snow flurries and a few areas of light snow dotted the western south plains, the low rolling plains and the panhandle. Skies were partly to mostly cloudy elsewhere.

Sunday will be mostly cloudy and very cold with a chance of light snow and flurries with little accumulation. High temperatures will be in the teens and 20s, with lows from 0 to 5 degrees in the panhandle and from 5 to 20 degrees elsewhere.

## Woman's claim against Cowboys false, say police

DALLAS (AP) - Police ended their investigation into Dallas Cowboys stars Erik Williams and Michael Irvin, saying a woman's claim that Williams raped her while Irvin held a gun to her head was false.

The players' lawyers and television and radio reports said the woman recanted the allegation and said it was a hoax, but police would not comment on those reports or discuss details of the case.

"We've determined conclusively that the allegations are not true and that a sexual assault did not take place," police spokesman Ed Spencer said Friday. "We also determined that Michael Irvin was not present at any time."

Spencer said the 23-year-old woman could be charged with filing a false report.

Irvin, met by camera crews as he left the Cowboys Sports Cafe late Friday, told them to report the announcement with the same fervor with which they reported the accusation.

"Rerun it, rewrite it, reprint it," he said. "Just like you did, with the same intensity that you did - the same intensity. Don't lose the intensity. Don't lose the intensity."

Williams' attorney, Peter Ginsberg, said the woman had recanted the allegations after police presented her with evidence there was no sexual attack and Irvin was not present. He said Williams was relieved and angry.

Irvin is on probation after pleading no contest in July to cocaine possession charges. At his sentencing, the judge threatened to put him in prison for 20 years if he violated parole. The NFL also suspended Irvin for the season's first five games.

The woman, a former topless dancer who recently worked at a mall cosmetics counter, told police Williams and an unidentified man

raped her on Dec. 29 at Williams' house while Irvin videotaped and held a gun to her head.

Irvin and Williams strongly denied the accusation soon after it was reported by a television station and discussed by police at a news conference, and Irvin said he had not visited Williams' house in 1 1/2 years.

"I think the police have had sufficient evidence for days to conclude that Irvin was not at Erik's house, that there was no drug abuse and no sexual attack," Ginsberg said. "Under the weight of that evidence, the complainant finally recanted."

Irvin's lawyer, Royce West, said the All-Pro wide receiver's reputation had been damaged "not only nationwide, but internationally."

Defense attorneys said the exact motive for the woman's allegations of rape remain for police to investigate. They said the players must decide whether to pursue civil action against the woman.

Irvin, 30, is a flashy wide receiver who was a member of the 1996 Pro Bowl roster. Williams, 28, is an offensive lineman selected last month for the 1997 Pro Bowl game.

According to the woman's complaint, the woman had said Irvin hugged her from behind and said "something to the effect that 'I need to show you something.'"

He then brandished a small, black semi-automatic pistol, pointed it at her head and told her to be a "good girl," the police affidavit states.

She said Williams videotaped her being raped by the unknown man, then Irvin videotaped Williams assaulting her.

The woman, who had been under police protection since her allegation, told police she has known Irvin for six or seven years. She said they met through Irvin's wife.

## Fallen political consultant's book allows insider's view of Bill Clinton, Washington

WASHINGTON (AP) - What do peace in Bosnia, conflict with Cuba, presidential vacations and the 1995 State of the Union address have in common? Two words: Dick Morris.

That's according to Morris, the fallen political consultant whose 359-page book, "Behind the Oval Office," provides an insider's glimpse at Bill Clinton the person, Bill Clinton the politician and - above all - Dick Morris.

A sex scandal that erupted in August forced Morris to resign as President Clinton's political strategist. In the first pages of the book, he apologizes to Clinton, Vice President Al Gore, the White House staff and his wife, Eileen McGann, for the relationship with prostitute Sherry Rowlands. Morris' wife has said she's leaving him.

"I was in blind denial, out of control, driven by my ego," Morris writes. "Having won a struggle within the White House to help the president get back on his true course, I felt omnipotent."

Morris describes Clinton in mostly flattering terms: a compassionate and brilliant man saddled early in his term with a staff that was often too liberal, suffocating and self-serving.

Like other Clinton tell-alls, Morris reports that the president has a fierce temper. But he excuses the outbursts, arguing that deep down Clinton "doesn't really blame others for his own errors."

He concedes Clinton is consumed by polls - ordering nightly surveys during the 1995 budget showdown -

but says they are done for the right reasons.

"It's not the way many suppose it to be: 'What should I be for? What should I do?' He knows that already. He wants to know how to get there, and he uses a poll to help him find out," Morris writes.

He says Clinton has a "blind spot" for problems created when first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton becomes too visible. Morris says he urged her to withdraw from "overt participation" in White House politics, but he also calls her "a sound, practical thinker."

He says Clinton promised to "work ceaselessly" to get Gore elected president in 2000, and was scared to death that retired Army Gen. Colin Powell would run in 1996. "He'll beat me bad," Morris quotes Clinton as saying.

Morris starts out humbly enough in the book, saying the news media gave him too much credit for the 1996 re-election campaign. "It will become obvious throughout the narrative that the mind behind the victory was that of William Jefferson Clinton," he says.

Although Morris spends the next 300-odd pages finding his own fingerprints all over administration policy, Clinton told reporters Friday he did not think his former aide was taking too much credit.

"I thought the last sentence of the introduction ... said that he was not responsible for my getting re-elected, I was," the president said.

The book says: -Morris acted as a go-between for diplomat Richard Holbrooke and Clinton during negotiations over Bosnia. Morris says Holbrooke told him that without the consultant's help, "I would never have been able to get this done."

-Morris' advice probably prompted Clinton to move more swiftly on plans to redeploy U.S. forces after the attack in Saudi Arabia that killed nine airmen.

-Morris suggested that Clinton deploy warships after Cuba attacked two civilian U.S. planes.

-Unbeknownst to the speech-writing staff, Morris typed out the 1995 State of the Union address as Clinton looked over his shoulder. "I've dreamed of doing exactly this in exactly this way ever since I was 8 years old," Morris tells the president. "So did I," Clinton replies.

## Former lottery director claims firing was driven by vendetta

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - Former lottery director Nora Linares said Friday that her firing this week resulted from a vendetta by Harriet Miers, Texas Lottery Commission chairwoman.

"This has been driven by Harriet Miers," Ms. Linares told the San Antonio Express-News for a copyright story in its Saturday editions.

The Lottery Commission fired Ms. Linares on Tuesday after questions about how a close friend, Mike Moeller, ended up with a contract with main lottery contractor GTECH Holdings Corp. that earned him \$30,000.

The three commissioners didn't cite a specific reason for her dismissal, but before taking the vote one commissioner expressed concern about her ability to lead the agency as the controversy continued.

"I know what I did, and I didn't do anything wrong," she said. "I can't ever stop my friends from going and doing business with people. I can't, and never would have

considered asking anyone not to have business ties with anybody."

In her first interview since the questions arose in November, the San Antonio native said she has done nothing wrong.

"I'm proud of the job I've done," she said. "All I want to do is clear my name, and if there are people out there who have any doubts about me, I want them to know that there was no justification (for the firing)."

Lottery commissioners have not questioned her performance. The lottery has set several records since it began five years ago, growing to become the most successful lottery in the United States.

The \$3.5 billion lottery has 312 people on the state payroll, and has consistently increased its revenue annually, said Ms. Linares. She has been the lottery's only director.

She questioned Ms. Miers' contention that she was only acting in the best interest of Texans.

"Excuse me, but Harriet Miers is not the people of Texas," Ms. Linares said. "If you ask the people

... they would tell you the lottery is in good shape."

Ms. Miers, a Dallas attorney, was out of town Friday night and not available for comment, her husband said.

Ms. Linares said she didn't know anything about the GTECH contract with Moeller before it became public.

"I didn't know about the Mike Moeller contract, but that's beside the point," she said. "It was his business. He never talked to me about it. I didn't know anything about it."

Buck Wood, one of Ms. Linares' attorneys, has suggested that Republicans are seeking to discredit state Comptroller John Sharp, Ms. Linares' political sponsor who has been mentioned as a candidate against Republican Gov. George W. Bush in 2000.

Ms. Linares said that when Bush appointed Ms. Miers to the commission in 1995, the two women had a good working relationship.

"I never had any reason to think there was a problem," Ms. Linares

said. "She and the commission were complimentary at many meetings regarding my work."

But the Moeller matter festered as commissioners continued to question whether his friendship with Ms. Linares influenced the awarding of the contract.

"I've been in state government for 12 years," she said. "Everybody knows each other. I worked in governmental relations and as legislative liaison ever since I've been in state government. So how do you not know people?"

"And I bent over backward to make sure that nothing favorable happened," she added. "I'm not a stupid person. I understand those things. It's an irony that the things that I understood the most and worked the hardest on ... is really what ended up turning out to be my biggest problem."

Gonzales said. The special education program is always looking for more training sites for students like Gabriel, Lacey said.

Special education students can leave the program by completion of credits or age, which is a student who turns 22 after Sept. 1. Villareal will soon age himself out of the program, Gonzales said.

"I think this is the last year that Gabriel can be with us, so we wanted to do something that he would remember," Golden said.

And Villareal will always remember it.

Whether the Cowboys win or lose, Golden said, Villareal continues to support the football team.

"Cowboys lost, but there's always next year," he said after a playoff loss to the Carolina Panthers.

## Editor, hospital wage war; use ink and ad boycotts

GRAHAM, Texas (AP) - Lewis Simmons, the graying managing editor of The Graham Leader who smokes cigarettes while espousing his newspapering philosophy, considers himself a "different breed of cat."

So when he perceived that some members of the community wanted him to "lay off the coverage of the issues at hand" regarding the city-owned hospital, he got his back up.

What has happened since depends on who you ask.

Simmons' boss, Publisher James R. Gray, says the twice-weekly publication has lost thousands of dollars in advertising revenue because of a boycott that followed articles and editorials the small town's "power brokers don't like."

Others deny such tactics, including the former hospital board president who explains away the notion as a "figment of (Gray's) imagination." "I think when I came they encountered a different breed of cat," said Simmons, who joined The Leader in the summer of 1995. "The paramount issue here is not about the hospital. That's only a vehicle for the issue. ... To me, the conflict is between elected or appointed public officials and the public's right to know."

According to Gray, the problems began when the newspaper started covering hospital board meetings and then urged the City Council to vote against the board's recommendation to sell or lease Graham General Hospital to a private corporation or foundation.

"We came out with a front-page editorial and challenged the City Council to either represent the power brokers ... or the people who elected them, the citizens of Graham," said

Gray. "That's when the stuff started."

The Aug. 7 editorial portrayed the city of 9,000 about 100 miles west of Dallas as one where "money and power speak loudly." It said the hospital move "suggests that the power brokers are pursuing an agenda to serve their own selfish interests at the expense of everyday people ..."

Gray concedes he doesn't have proof that certain residents would profit personally from the deal, he only suspects it.

"Our intent was never to expose anyone on the board or the board. Our intent was to save the hospital," said Gray, citing concerns about the possible loss of jobs and medical care for the community.

Ultimately, the city retained control of the 37-bed facility. The board, on a 4-3 vote, had urged the council to do otherwise, citing among other things the possibility of a \$1 million Medicare cost reimbursement. A board resolution said the new money would be a start on a fund to repair and upgrade the 40-year-old facility and that the hospital would not likely generate that amount of money in profits.

A month later, the hospital's proposed 1997 budget showed an anticipated profit of slightly more than \$400,000.

The Leader's front-page editorial was one of many regarding hospital issues, including one that took the board to task regarding the Open Meetings Law.

In response, Elton M. Montgomery, then-president of the hospital board, wrote a letter complaining that the newspaper was not reporting facts.

"You were editorializing, in the course of which you indulged

speculation, conjecture and innuendo which did not really inform the public. You 'guessed wrong,' because you took facts and circumstances out of context and the result was misinformation," he wrote.

Montgomery labeled as "sheer hogwash" the charge that some board members had a personal financial interest in their recommendation regarding the proposed hospital sale.

Chuck Cowell, president of First National Bank and now a hospital board member, said he felt it disparaged people who had given much time and talent to the community.

## For substance abuse Study tries to determine treatments

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) - Get help: That's the message young people hear when they are in the grip of alcohol or drugs.

But at least from a scientific point of view, no one is certain what type of treatment works best.

The Center for Family and Adolescent Research at the University of New Mexico is trying to change that. With a \$900,000, five-year grant from the National Institutes on Drug Abuse, the center has launched an effort to compare therapies and see what keeps young people clean and sober the longest.

"We want to get an idea of what does have an effect," said Holly Waldron, associate professor of psychology and principal investigator for the project.

Since May, the study has recruited 25 people to participate in therapy that lasts three months but will have follow-up through 18 months.

The number barely puts a dent in the number of youths who might suffer from substance abuse problems. A 1993 study, for example, showed 10.5 percent of 12th graders statewide drank beer, wine or wine coolers daily or every few days, said Jill Anne Yeagley, executive director of the National Council on Alcohol and Drug Dependence for the Albuquerque area.

The same study showed 8.3 percent said they used marijuana daily or every few days. And 5.6 percent admitted to using cocaine or crack within the previous year, she said.

Relapse rates are high for anyone

trying to get off alcohol or drugs, but they appear particularly high for teens, Ms. Yeagley said.

"Teens still have a sense that something (bad) is not going to happen to them," she said.

Teens also suffer more peer pressure to drink or take drugs, she said, and have a hard time finding teen support groups to help them fight their problem.

Troubled youths find their way to the UNM program through a couple of routes, Ms. Waldron said. Some get in trouble with the law and are referred by the courts, she said. Others are sent over by school officials who recognize their problems.

"We get a lot of kids under court order," Ms. Waldron said, but said she doesn't think that means those kids lack motivation to change.

"The motivation is to get out from under the court system," she said.

Once they come to the study, they are evaluated to make sure they do have substance abuse problems. If they qualify, they randomly are assigned to one of four groups:

-Family therapy. This can include their parents, grandparents, siblings or even girlfriends or boyfriends. The idea is that teens might be abusing drugs and alcohol because of problems in the family. If the context of those relationships changes, the substance abuse might abate.

-Individual therapy. A teen works one-on-one with a therapist. The approach operates under the theory teens turn to drugs or alcohol because they have no other way to cope with

their problems. Therapy tries to help them learn how to regulate their emotions or stay away from risky situations.

-Group therapy. In this, a therapist works with groups of teens at sessions, trying to teach them how to cope with life and educating them about the effects of alcohol and drugs. This approach adds the ingredient of support from fellow teens grappling with similar problems.

-A combination of individual and family therapy.

The few studies that have been conducted show family therapy works better than no therapy, Ms. Waldron said. One study showed individual therapy to be pretty successful; results have been mixed for group therapy.

Generally, clinicians rely on their sense of what seems to work best, Ms. Waldron said.

"That's a bad way to tell if something is working," she said.

Ms. Yeagley said she hasn't seen much research on effective treatments for youthful substance abusers. But she said recent thinking about who can avoid abuse in the first place centers on an approach termed "resilience."

Simply put, resilience looks at the factors that can make one child grow up strong and capable under difficult circumstances while another might become extremely troubled.

"The major factor (for successful children) is that they had at least one adult they really trusted; they felt the person cared a great deal about them," Ms. Yeagley said.

Rep. Rick Miera, D-Albuquerque,

has been a substance abuse therapist for about 20 years. He said his own experience suggests addicts need to have families involved in their recovery.

"If there's not the whole family involved, don't even bother," he said.

Sometimes family members actually get something out of an individual's drug use, he said. Family members might feel useful by providing support or structure for the addict, he said, or might like the fact the drugged or drunken person is keeping sedated or busy.

But, he added, he doesn't have hard evidence to back his conviction family therapy works best.

Heather Wilson, secretary of the Children, Youth and Families Department, said clinicians from state juvenile facilities tell her the most important ingredient for success is a teen's commitment to stop.

"That's one of the things that make me a little wary of what we do in our institutions, because it's compulsory," she said. Ms. Wilson said the state hasn't done any studies to see if juveniles relapse after they leave detention and programs they receive there.

Part of the problem in gathering evidence is that individual therapists might make a difference. The UNM study is trying to neutralize the effects of a dynamite therapist in one approach vs. an indifferent one in another, Ms. Waldron said.

It's using about 14 therapists, almost all of them part time, so they might cancel out each others' differences.

## Review finds \$730 million in cost-savings

AUSTIN (AP) - An analysis of 12 state agencies by a conservative think tank has identified more than \$730 million in potential savings over the next two-year state budget.

The analysis by the San Antonio-based Texas Public Policy Foundation took particular aim at the Texas Department of Transportation, concluding that it wastes money by not privatizing more projects and has administrative costs above the national average.

"There is a different culture at the Texas Department of Transportation," Jeff Judson, president of the Public Policy Foundation, said Wednesday. "They really feel that they are different from other agencies and show a disregard for legislative mandates."

David Laney, chairman of the three-member Texas Transportation Commission, said he welcomed the scrutiny and would take a close look at the cost-cutting recommendations.

"An industrial strength dose of information like this is often times very healthy," Laney said.

Laney and William G. Burnett, executive director of the Department of Transportation, both, however, took exception with some of the findings by the Public Policy Foundation.

The analysis criticized the department for overbuying materials; using excessive office space; failing to privatize more engineering work; delaying the awarding of engineering contracts; and extravagant use of chartered aircraft by one of the transportation commissioners.

According to the analysis, the Texas Department of Transportation administrative overhead for fiscal year 1995 was 10.9 percent of the \$3.6 billion highway construction and maintenance budget.

That was above the national average of 7.4 percent and the 4.4 percent at Florida's highway agency, which the Public Policy Foundation cited as a model of agency efficiency and efforts to privatize.

Burnett says the figures his agency reports to the federal government include contributions to employee-retirement plans and other costs that aren't all necessarily administrative.

He says that if all states used the same methodology, Texas would be a leader, with administration costs accounting for about 4 percent.

"We show that our administrative

costs for 1996 in this department were 4.2 percent and we've been in the 4 percent range over the last decade," Burnett said.

The analysis said that while the transportation department reduced its workforce by 159 between 1993-95, office space grew by 151,173 square feet.

Laney said most of the department's buildings were constructed 20 to 30 years ago, when there were more employees.

"We have shrunk the size of the agency over that period of time," Laney said. "You end up with buildings that were built to house more people. But you don't go in and tear out part of the building to conform to the square footage."

The analysis criticized transportation commissioner David Bernsen for chartering eight flights - at a cost to taxpayers of \$14,551 - for travel from his home in Beaumont to Austin for state business.

Transportation commissioner Anne Wynne defended Bernsen's use of private charter flights.

"We looked at the different costs between using state aircraft and

chartering private planes from Beaumont, and it turned out to be cheaper for the state to charter a plane from Beaumont than to have a state airplane make two trips," said Ms. Wynne, who added that Bernsen drove many times.

The Public Policy Foundation's report looks at 12 of the 21 state agencies undergoing "sunset" review by the Legislature during the 1997 session, which begins next week.

Under sunset review, lawmakers look for ways to improve state agencies. Every agency must be

examined at least every 12 years.

The \$730 million in proposed savings came from recommended cuts in the following agencies: Automobile Theft Prevention Authority; Texas Commission on Alcohol & Drug Abuse; Criminal Justice Policy Council; Commission on Jail Standards; Texas Youth Commission; Commission on Juvenile Probation; Department of Protective and Regulatory Services; State Preservation Board; Credit Union Commission; Department of Information Resources; Department of Transportation; and Texas Turnpike Authority.

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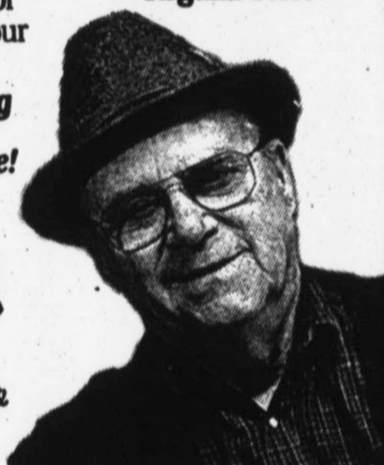
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# Hereford Bull

At most community newspapers like ours, readers feel that they can walk in the front door and express their displeasure or compliment a

news story. Often we run into these folks at the post office, at church or at a restaurant during lunch.

That openness is not always present in larger metropolitan areas. Some large newspapers now have an "ombudsman" to act as the readers' representative to the news staff. Phil J. Record, Fort Worth Star Telegram ombudsman, is one of the best at answering reader concerns through his column in the newspaper.

Record wrote a column about this time a year ago, making some suggestions for journalists, as well as readers. We'd like to share some of those thoughts.

For journalists, he suggests:

--The ability to listen, to understand rather than to immediately become defensive.

--Less reluctance in returning phone calls and answering letters. Less delay in getting corrections into the paper.

--The ability to recognize that all of us have biases and that it is especially important that we in this business confront our own when we are attempting to be fair.

--A willingness to delay publication of an article if we have any doubts as to its accuracy and fairness. Being first is not always best, even in this business.

--A duty to be close enough to the communities we cover that we can know of their hopes, their dreams and their goals.

--A recognition that religion plays a vital role in the lives of many--I would hope most--of our readers, and that major religious events should not be cast aside as unimportant.

--A recognition that our readers have a right to expect us to be compassionate, fair, understanding, respectful, tolerant and accurate.

Here are some of the suggestions Record had for readers:

--A big dose of tolerance. The most discouraging part of this job is listening to the hatred, the irrational anger and fear, the intolerance of a few.

--Acceptance of the fact that if we published a paper that met with your complete agreement, it would be so bland that it would fail quickly.

--A recollection that our Founding Fathers expected the press to present unpopular opinions, to stir up public debate and to present different viewpoints.

--Patience with us imperfect creatures who strive, without success, each day to put out a perfect newspaper.

## Gingrich still faces difficult days

AP Special Correspondent WASHINGTON (AP) - Nobody called Newt Gingrich naive until he said it himself - and then showed why it wasn't so. Adroit, even calculating, and sometimes too brash or pushy by his own account. Hardly naive.

Still, that is part of his defense, meant to be a mitigating factor for the re-elected speaker of the House as his peers decide how to punish his admitted ethical breaches.

That process began Wednesday, a day after Gingrich's hard-lobbied election, as the House ethics committee held a closed session on the speaker's case.

"This has been a very difficult time," Gingrich had said after he retained his job, with only three votes more than he needed to avoid a stalemate that would have forced another ballot.

And there are difficult days ahead of him. There will be a public hearing and a House vote by Jan. 21 on his penalty, which his Republican allies say should be a reprimand. That would be embarrassing, and the first ever dealt a speaker, but not a step that would force him from the post.

Ominously, perhaps, the panel that cited Gingrich for violation of House rules, at the urging of its lawyer, had sought more time for the full ethics committee to deal with the case and settle on its recommendation before the issue goes to a vote. But Republicans, who had tried to get the penalty over with even before the speaker was re-elected, balked at any delay.

The only other speaker formally accused of ethics violations was Democrat Jim Wright, and while Gingrich was his first accuser, the charges that forced his resignation came later, from an outside counsel.

Wright, who quit in 1989, five months into his second term as speaker, was charged with evading the rules on outside income.

The Gingrich case involves political, not personal gain. At issue is the use of tax-exempt donations for political purposes, although the violation he admitted is that he failed to get proper legal counsel to ensure compliance with the law, and that he misinformed the ethics panel, although he said he did not intend to.

"I was overconfident and in some ways naive," he said in admitting the

violations on Dec. 21.

That remains, essentially, his defense - that he didn't purposely do anything out of line, and that he did not intend to mislead the committee.

But Gingrich has acknowledged that he can't predict what might be said when the outside counsel, James M. Cole, makes the case to the ethics panel and then at the public hearing.

Should the mountains of memos and other documents - 14,000 pages by one account - include evidence that Gingrich knew tax-exempt organizations were being used improperly, or that his misstatements were not inadvertent, his problems would become far more severe, and job-threatening.

His allies say none of that will happen, that the violations to which speaker admitted are all there is to it. Kept to that, the opening day votes in the House foretell the outcome against any Democratic move to go beyond a reprimand to the censure that would prevent Gingrich from remaining speaker.

The nine Republicans who broke with Gingrich when he was re-elected made their point then; none of them voted for the subsequent Democratic

move to extend the deadline for final action on this ethics case.

But there's still another Democratic complaint pending, this one accusing Gingrich of breaking campaign finance and gift rules. And the current case could lead to investigations by the Internal Revenue Service or the Justice Department.

Beginning his new term, Gingrich apologized for the ethics problem, saying he had brought some of it on himself while some of it stemmed from "the natural process of partisan competition."

And that competition is by no means done. The public opinion polls show Gingrich's standing, which wasn't high, slumping. In an ABC poll, only 25 percent called Gingrich honest and trustworthy. In a CNN/USA Today poll, 59 percent disapproved of his job performance as speaker. In those surveys and a CBS poll, more than 60 percent said he shouldn't have been re-elected now.

Gingrich said that was because he'd been silent under an agreement with the ethics committee, while some Democrats "have been extraordinarily and maliciously exaggerating things."

Everyone knows Social Security and Medicare are due for a day of reckoning, and with the election safely over (as usual, the democratic crucible was an exercise in avoiding rather than confronting issues), most everybody now acknowledges that the choices are reform or bankruptcy. Real reform might not come this year, but the issues should be on the table.

Houston Chronicle on Rep. Archer's budget clout:

The cordial meeting taking place last week between President Clinton and Republican Bill Archer, chairman of the powerful House Ways and Means Committee, offers hope for better cooperation and less confrontation between the White House and the Congress this year.

Clinton and Archer exchanged ideas on Social Security, Medicare, tax policy and other budget matters and expressed a desire to find areas of common ground.

That sounds encouraging. But the cold reality may be that while there is a willingness between the men to find a common ground, there may be no ground in common in how to go about solving some of the nation's most serious problems.

The Medicare Trust Fund will go broke in just five years, having lost almost \$16 billion since June 1995. Social Security is projected to go bust by 2029. Interest on the national debt has climbed to the point where it is the federal government's second greatest since expenditure, more than taxpayers shell out for either Medicare or national defense.

Archer has clearly outlined his legislative priorities for the 105th Congress over the next two years. His worthy goals include a balanced budget, overhauling the federal tax system to make it simpler and fairer, tax relief, saving Medicare and reforming the laws on campaign finance, among others.

The president, who says the priority of his second term is a balanced budget, must show that he means to move to the center. He is to submit his budget Feb. 3.

Speculation is that Archer will take a greater role in setting the agenda for House Republicans, and in attracting support from moderate Democrats, in the upcoming Congress than he did in the 104th, partially because of the ethics situation House Speaker Newt Gingrich of Georgia has found himself in and because of the Houstonian's increasing confidence.

Archer, with his thoughtful manner and reluctance to engage in bombastics, may, in fact, be more successful in his dealings with the White House than Gingrich or House Majority Leader Dick Armey of Lewisville.

# Former rodeo cowboy ropes kids into better lives

DALLAS - Willie Strong ruffled through the pile of papers on a coffee table and pulled out two knives, one with a 6-inch blade.  
"I took these knives right here from an 11-year-old boy in a gang," Strong said, rubbing the black handle of one knife. "He doesn't carry them any more. It was rough, but I didn't give him up."

The former rodeo cowboy hasn't given up many youngsters in more than three decades of helping east Oak Cliff kids steer clear of drugs and gangs.

Strong routinely takes youngsters to a local ranch to teach them how to ride and rope, friends said.

When the youngsters aren't riding, they're getting their hands dirty planting peas, corn and other

vegetables on the 2 acres in Wilmer owned by Strong's Soul Brothers Riding Club.

"I tell kids that if they deal with drugs and gangs, they'll end up with one of three zeros: death, the penitentiary or nothing," said Strong, 59.

"I'm trying to teach them how to be somebody. There's nothing but trouble in the streets."

Kendrick Jimmerson, 15, said Strong showed him the secret to avoiding such trouble.

"He taught me how to control my temper and how to talk right and respect people," said Kendrick, a ninth-grader at Roosevelt High School.

Strong's approach has won him many admirers. Supporters provide food and toys for his annual Christmas party, and they give him

clothes, books and school supplies during a special drive each summer.

"I'm highly impressed with this man," said Cousin Linnie Henderson, a disc jockey at KKDA-AM and one of Strong's biggest supporters.

"I'm so impressed with him that if he calls me at 3:30 in the morning, I'll be there. And nobody wants to get up at that time."

The kids are impressed, too.

"I have a lot of respect for him," 15-year-old Otis Hunter said. "He is just like another father to me."

Aaron Mitchell, owner of Aaron Mitchell Stables, said Strong is an effective advocate for youngsters such as Otis and Kendrick.

"He's a great leader," said Mitchell, who works with Strong to arrange rides at a 30-acre ranch on Wagon Wheels Trail, near Ledbetter Drive and Houston School Road.

"Some people have to follow and some have to lead," Mitchell said. "He knows how to lead."

The two men are working on what could be their most ambitious project to date. They are buying the 30-acre ranch, which they plan to turn into a youth-training facility.

The ranch would be used to teach youngsters how to grow vegetables, ride horses and repair cars, the men said.

"Some kids don't even know where milk comes from," Strong said during a recent visit to the ranch, which is dotted with stables, barns and horse buggies. "We're going to put some cows down there."

It's easy to understand why Strong thinks he can use animals and agriculture to distract youths from gangs and drugs, his friends say.

He spent much of his life as a rodeo cowboy.

"He did it all - roping, bronco busting and bull riding," said Henderson, who met Strong about 10 years ago.

Strong said he quit the rodeo when his health began to fail about 15 years ago. A bad kidney has caused him to be in and out of the hospital over the years, he said.

But he said ill health is not enough to slow down his work with kids. He began working with them as far back as 1955, when sniffing glue was the

fad, he said.

"I felt that if I could talk to them, I could prevent them from doing it," he said.

A few years later, guns replaced glue, and his work intensified, he said.

"They started killing so much that they couldn't travel from one part of town to the other," he said. "I started getting each section of town involved."

"Each Saturday, I would get them all together. I wanted to let them all know that they could get along together."

Strong said it is difficult to know exactly how many youngsters he has counseled. He estimated that there have been thousands.

Youngsters regularly stop by his home, known in the neighborhood for the horse-drawn wagons in the front yard. The wagons are hooked up to horses during parties, allowing youths to ride around the neighborhood.

# Indians provide clues to genes that protect against Alzheimer's disease

WASHINGTON (AP) - Oklahoma's Cherokee Indians have provided a tantalizing clue to genes that may protect against Alzheimer's disease: for some reason, they are much less likely to contract the devastating brain killer.

So are Indiana's Amish and the Cree Indians in Canada.

Frustrated by failure to reverse Alzheimer's ravages, scientists are searching furiously for ways to delay the disease's attack by testing estrogen, vitamins - and more intriguingly, groups of people whose brains actually seem immune.

"These studies give us tremendous opportunity, open new vistas for developing drugs," said Dr. Zaven Khachaturian, director of the Alzheimer's Association's Reagan Research Institute. "This is very exciting."

The strongest clue to an unknown protective gene comes from Oklahoma, where Dr. Roger Rosenberg discovered that the stronger a person's Cherokee ancestry, the less likely that Alzheimer's will strike.

If doctors could locate such a gene and synthesize the protein it produces, they might one day create a drug to delay Alzheimer's onset. "We predict this is the next wave of Alzheimer's research," Rosenberg, a University of Texas Southwestern neurologist, said.

Four million Americans have the always fatal Alzheimer's, which destroys its victims' minds and kills

200,000 people a year.

Two medications, Cognex and Aricept, slightly ease symptoms by inhibiting the breakdown of a vital brain chemical but can't stop Alzheimer's relentless progression. Two experimental drugs rapidly approaching the market, Sandoz's Exelon and Bayer's metrifonate, work similarly.

Doctors frustrated by this limited impact are hunting options to delay Alzheimer's, arguing that buying disease-free time beats treating damaged brains:

-Several studies indicate post-menopausal women who take estrogen may halve their Alzheimer's risk and that those stricken may get it later in life. Studies are under way to confirm those indications.

-Some 120 people are testing whether the steroid prednisone can reduce brain inflammation thought to increase Alzheimer's risk.

-Doctors are awaiting publication of a new study of Vitamin E and the Parkinson's drug selegiline, suspected to help delay Alzheimer's by fighting brain damage from molecules called free radicals.

But scientists are turning increasingly to genetics, discovering populations with dramatically lower rates of Alzheimer's from Japanese and Nigerians to the Canadian Crees.

Intrigued, Rosenberg studied the Cherokee Nation, which keeps an extensive ancestry registry. He found members of the tribe can harbor a gene called apoE-4, known to cause

Alzheimer's, but the more Cherokee ancestry they have, the less it matters.

Alzheimer's struck 65 percent of elderly people he studied who were less than half Cherokee vs. just 34 percent with more than 50 percent Cherokee ancestry, Rosenberg reported.

With each 10 percent decrease in Cherokee ancestry, the odds of developing Alzheimer's increased nine times.

Another type of apoE is known to mitigate the bad apoE-4 type, but the Cherokee had too little of it to help, Rosenberg said. He concluded that an unknown protective gene is at work.

Although he acknowledges his study was too small - 52 people - to be definitive, he is working with the 80,000-member tribe on a larger confirming study.

Duke University is on the same trail, uncovering an Amish community so seldom victimized by Alzheimer's that researchers concluded they must be genetically protected.

An early explanation was that the Amish didn't carry the bad apoE-4 gene. Then Duke's Margaret Pericak-Vance discovered an Amish family with six Alzheimer's-stricken members - and not one had apoE-4.

That means that lurking aside the presumed Amish protection, this one family may have inherited another, stronger gene that causes Alzheimer's.

Yet another answer may be that certain groups don't encounter some

environmental "trigger" that tells disease-causing genes to start their deadly work, cautioned Neil Buckholz, who oversees Alzheimer's research for the National Institutes of Health.

But Rosenberg says these populations with low Alzheimer's risk may have some common ancestry. The Cherokee are thought to have migrated here thousands of years ago from Southeast Asia, and groups in Japan and Hong Kong have similar low risk.

"It's urgent" that scientists find the answers, Duke's Pericak-Vance said. "Have we proven anything? No. But they (the population studies) seem to fit together."

# Missing papers could mean new trial for Selena's convicted killer

HOUSTON (AP) - A missing box of documents could be the key to a new trial for Yolanda Saldivar, the woman convicted of killing Tejano singing star Selena almost two years ago.

Attorneys for Ms. Saldivar and Nueces County prosecutors were set to return to Houston on Monday for an evidentiary hearing requested by the 14th Court of Appeals, which is reviewing Ms. Saldivar's conviction and life prison sentence.

Ms. Saldivar, 36, fatally wounded the Grammy Award-winning singer March 31, 1995, during a confrontation at a Corpus Christi motel. She contended the .38-caliber revolver went off by accident.

At issue is the whereabouts of a box of files that belonged to Selena's father, Abraham Quintanilla Jr.

The papers were ordered withheld from evidence by State District Judge Mike Westergren, who presided over the October 1995 trial. Westergren also ordered the documents sealed as part of the court record.

But that's the last anyone apparently has seen of the files, which Westergren brought to Houston when he granted a change of venue for the murder trial, moving it from Selena's hometown of Corpus Christi to Harris County because of pretrial publicity.

The judge said he left the box with a court clerk with instructions to make them part of the trial record.

"Where we're at right now is: Who had them? Who was the last one to have them? What was in them? And if whatever was in them is applicable toward whether her trial was appropriate and sentencing

appropriate," Marilee Roberts, Westergren's court manager, says. "And if they can't find them, is not having them now reason to give her a new trial?"

The appeals court says that could be the case.

"If records are lost or destroyed without appellant's fault, appellant is entitled to a new trial," the court said in a Dec. 12 order. "Exactly what documents are missing from the record and whether appellant is responsible for any loss are questions that we cannot decide without an evidentiary hearing."

Attorneys for Ms. Saldivar, who is not eligible for parole until 2025, contend the records are critical to her appeal because trial witnesses should not have been allowed to testify about their belief that Ms. Saldivar embezzled money from Selena.

Prosecutors during the trial accused Ms. Saldivar of embezzling more than \$5,000.

Nueces County District Attorney Carlos Valdez has described the situation as a "sticky mess."

"For our conviction to be jeopardized by something like this is horrible," he said.

The appeals court judges gave Westergren until Jan. 30 to make a recommendation to them regarding the missing files.

## Pro fem league eyes Austin, San Antonio

AUSTIN (AP) - The American Basketball League - a women's professional basketball league set to expand next season - is eyeing Austin and San Antonio as possible sites for a team.

"We're expanding by two more teams and are actively pursuing interested cities and Austin is one of them," said ABL co-founder and chief operating officer Steve Hams. "Austin or San Antonio and a half dozen other possibilities (outside of Texas)."

The eight-team ABL is currently in its inaugural season. It will expand by two teams in the 1997-98 season.

In addition to Texas, the ABL is also looking at Tennessee, Indianapolis, Minnesota, Wisconsin, New York, Florida, Long Beach, Calif. and St. Louis, Hams said.

"It's very preliminary right now," said Hams. "We're looking for investors interested in bringing teams into these areas and talking to local sports foundations. We have six to eight possible candidates (cities). We should know more at the end of the month."

Hams would not name possible investors.

ABL chief executive officer Gary Cavalli said the league had three prospective investors for the expansion teams - none in Texas. But Cavalli said investors aren't the only key to an expansion team.

"Strong local corporate sponsorship or a local sports foundation that would guarantee ticket sales are also factors," said Cavalli. "The decision where we go is not related to the presence or absence of an investor."

The league will contact officials in prospective cities through Jan. 24; visit cities beginning the last week in January and plan to make a decision by mid-February.

Amy Little, director of the Greater Austin Sports Foundation, had not heard from the ABL. San Antonio

Sports Foundation executive director Susan Blackwood said San Antonio's interests lie with the eight-team Women's National Basketball Association, which debuts June 21. The WNBA has a team in Houston.

"This town's initial response about bringing in a team was with a WNBA franchise," said Blackwood.

University of Texas women's coach Jody Conradt was unaware of a possible ABL expansion to Austin.

"I haven't heard that at all, so I don't have thoughts one way or the other," Conradt said of the coexistence of UT women's basketball and a professional team. "We have a fan base for women's basketball, but scheduling would be a conflict."

## Holmgren, Capers differ in style, not substance

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) - Dom Capers and Mike Holmgren are different, but in style more than substance.

"Dom's a good friend," Holmgren said. "We do things in different ways with different styles, but the bottom line is that we both want to win."

The substance is winning, the style is personal - from the professorial Marv Levy to the earthy Barry Switzer and the blue-collar Bill Parcells, who grew up in a white-collar family but projects the image of a New Jersey truck driver.

So it is with Capers and Holmgren, who fall somewhere in between.

- Capers, who will lead the Carolina Panthers into Lambeau Field Sunday to play Holmgren's Green Bay Packers in the NFC title game, is known for his defensive innovations - like the zone blitz, current fad among NFL defensive coaches. He was Bill Cowher's defensive coordinator at Pittsburgh, a defensive coach under a defensive-minded leader. Holmgren is offense. He was a Bill Walsh protege at San Francisco, a quarterback coach and offensive coordinator who grew up in an offensive-oriented system.

- Capers sleeps in his office at Charlotte's Ericsson Stadium three nights a week (Joe Gibbs school of intensity). Holmgren always goes home (laid-back San Francisco although he has the same fire inside). "He's as intense as any coach I've seen," said Lee Remmel, the Packers' public relations director, who goes back to Vince Lombardi. "It just doesn't show all the time."

- Capers is a statistics freak, who knows where every drive started - the 28-yard line and not the 27, and that makes a difference. Holmgren rarely has that kind of thing in his head; he knows the score and that's all that matters. "Coaches are all different and all the same. I've gotten along with most, and some, like Buddy (Ryun), haven't gotten along with me," said Steve Beuerlein, Carolina's backup quarterback.

"The best, I'd say Dom (Capers) and Jimmy (Johnson). Dom's obsessed with football; the way Jimmy was, with being as perfect as can be. You know how Jimmy wants every hair in place? Dom's clothes are never wrinkled. They're both organized and focused. They know what they want."

Holmgren's never been accused of wanting every hair in place and he often seems to look rumped. With his bushy brown mustache, he resembles Craig Stadler, golf's "Walrus," although at 6-foot-5, he's taller and svelter.

And he's more casual California. He once played in a rock band, and last year led his team into Texas

Stadium for the NFC championship game riding a motorcycle.

But beneath that casual demeanor is a rock.

In his first season, when some of the Packers complained after a loss to the New York Giants that they had been done in by the officials, Holmgren snapped at his team: "Shut up. You lost, and the way you played

you deserved to lose."

Almost everyone's gone now from that 1992 squad. All-Pro safety LeRoy Butler and kicker Chris Jacke are the only players Holmgren inherited who remain with the team.

But Holmgren arrived at the same time as a number of current starters, led by Brett Favre, who was obtained in a trade with Atlanta.

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# Surging Jaguars, hot Patriots meet for title

FOXBORO, Mass. (AP) - This is the second time around for the Jacksonville Jaguars and New England Patriots. The only thing that's changed is, well, everything.

When the Patriots got their second victory of the season Sept. 22, they were a struggling group trying to find a balance. Rookie receiver Terry Glenn still was climbing out of coach Bill Parcells' doghouse and the defense was trying to figure out if its shutout of Arizona or its flop against Miami was for real.

The Jaguars, meanwhile, were the obedient second-year team, with the confidence and skill to challenge established teams on the road, but not enough of either to beat them.

On Sunday, the surging Jaguars visit the almost equally-as-hot Patriots for the AFC title.

"They've definitely got my attention," Patriots fullback-tight end Keith Byars said. "It's not Cinderella anymore. That's one of the problems Buffalo had with them, as well as Denver. They didn't take those guys seriously."

The Jaguars have become a serious Super Bowl contender, thanks to a five-game winning streak to close the season and unexpected playoff victories at Buffalo and Denver. Who would have thought that was possible back in September, when they flubbed their way through the first half at Foxboro Stadium, falling behind 22-0?

"We thought the first half was a very poor performance on our part," Jaguars coach Tom Coughlin said. "In the second half, we made some big plays, but we still didn't play up to our capability. At that point in time, we weren't a very good team. At this point in time, we're playing our best football and it's at the right time."

But they might not have reached this point without the comeback they staged at New England.

A desperation 51-yard heave by Mark Brunell on the final play of the first half was caught by Jimmy Smith, making it 22-7.

"We pumped air in their balloon just before the half and continued to do it in the third quarter," Parcells said.

Andre Rison caught 41- and 61-yard TD strikes in the second half and Mike Hollis' 27-yard field goal tied it with 8:26 to go.

Another desperation pass in the final seconds was caught by Willie Jackson, but he came down one foot short of the end zone.

Adam Vinatieri's fifth field goal won it in overtime for New England.

Swoopes, 25, faces at least a six-week wait after delivery and hopes to play a few games at the end of the WNBA season, which runs June 21 through Aug. 30.

Swoopes, a 6-foot forward, scored a record 47 points in the 1993 NCAA title game, and finished that season as the NCAA's second-leading scorer, averaging 28.1 points per game. In the 1993-94 season, she played in Bari, Italy, and averaged 23.0 points.

Marsha Sharp, her coach at Texas Tech, shared her former star's excitement over her pregnancy.

"I think that's awesome," she said. "I told her if it's a girl, I want to sign her to a letter of intent the day she's born."

"That game showed us we could play, even when things aren't going that well," Jaguars defensive end Clyde Simmons said. "As bad as we played, we still had a chance to win that game. It showed us that we've got a chance to be a good team."

It also showed an ability to make comebacks: Jacksonville trailed in six of its victories and in both playoff wins.

"That game was a turning point for the team," Simmons said. "Guys

started to believe."

They still believe. They believe there is nothing they can't achieve.

"This winning streak shows how well we've been growing as a team," Smith said. "It shows our poise and how well we've learned throughout the season."

The Patriots have gone through an education that began four years ago, when Parcells became coach. They made the playoffs in 1994, then slumped last season.

The first game with Jacksonville displayed all that was good and bad about the Patriots this season. They gained 476 yards, but managed only two touchdowns. Their defense was impregnable at times, but a sieve at others.

As with the Jaguars, though, much has changed. New England was one of the league's best and most consistent defensive teams down the stretch, and the Steelers could do nothing in last weekend's playoff

game. Meanwhile, the offense has been balanced, with Curtis Martin's reliable running and Drew Bledsoe's strong passing, often to Glenn.

"I feel we're a tough team, and I feel Jacksonville is, also," Martin said. "We've both been playing good ball and we've both been focused."

Focused on what is ahead for Sunday's winner.

"We're keeping our eyes on the prize and we know a victory gets us

to the Super Bowl," Smith said. "There are a lot of NFL players who are in this league 12-15 years and who never have gotten close. There are a bunch of young, hungry guys who have not experienced this here and we are dangerous to any opponent."

As the Bills and Broncos found out, "They're not an expansion team," Patriots receiver Shawn Jefferson said. "They have been on the road twice and won in hostile situations. It's going to be a challenge for us."

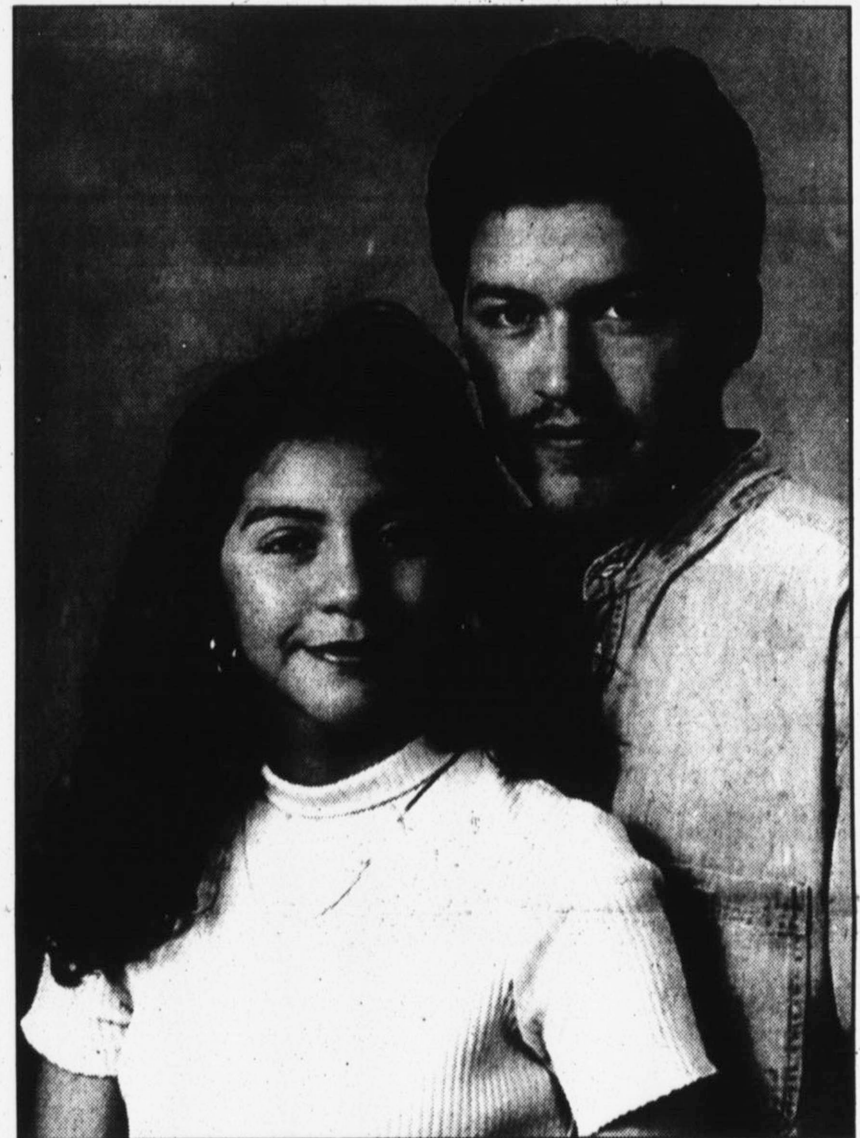

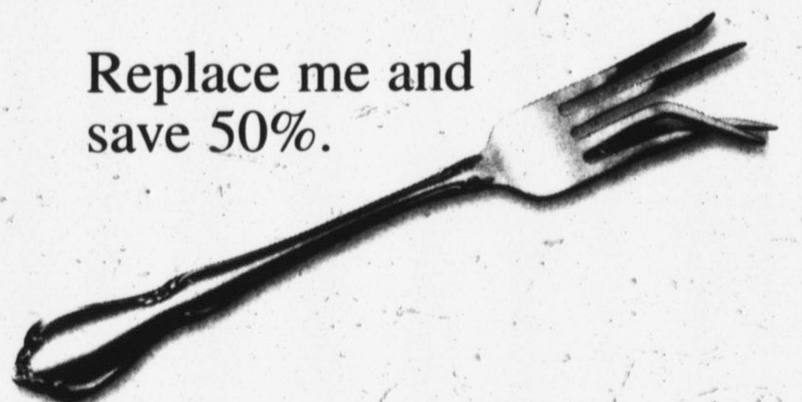

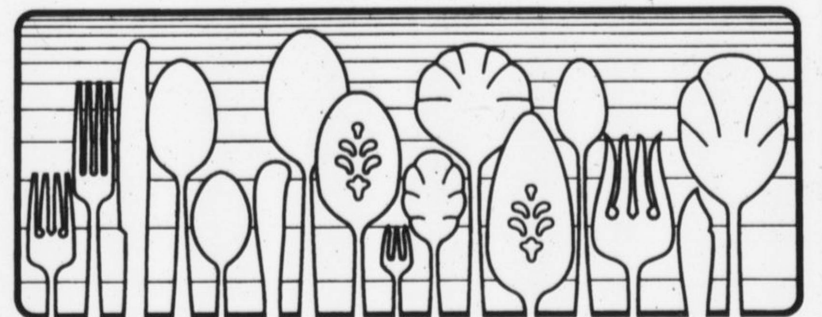

Randles is a West Texas native who has preached around the world. Before entering a full time church evangelism and growth ministry, Randles pastored three churches in Texas.

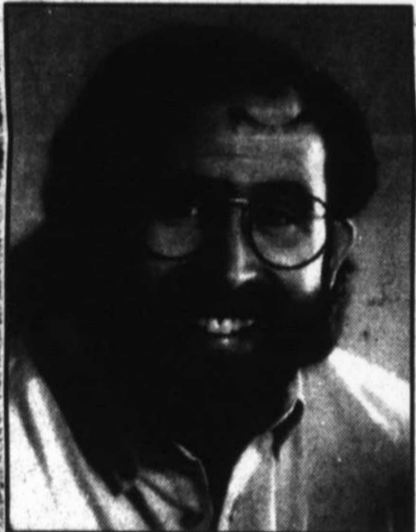
In addition to his ministry to U.S. churches, Randles has also preached in numerous international settings, including trips to Eastern Europe.

## Extension News

(Domestic policy begins in the home. What policy does your family promote -- one of consumption or one of net worth building? This is a continuation of a series of articles sharing ideas for building net worth.)

A great deal has been said in the past 12 months about how much better or worse off we are economically as individuals and families. But, how many of us really know what we truly are worth today compared to a year ago? We feel the crunch of today's bills or financial crisis and assume we are worse off, without a clear picture of where we are financially.

A net worth statement is a picture at any point in time that tells you what you are worth. Like pictures in the family photo album, annual net worth statements give someone a realistic picture of what their financial situation is today, compared to the past and to future financial goals.

Comparing your net worth today with past and future points in time gives you ways to see if you are getting ahead or behind financially. New worth simply is your total assets minus your total liabilities.

List cash you have on hand personally, in checking and savings accounts, money market funds, certificates of deposit or other places you have placed your money. Assets also include non-income producing items such as your home, jewelry, automobiles, home furnishings, art and collectibles such as antiques and coins. Use the ads in your local newspaper to estimate what items similar to assets you own would be worth if you sold them today.

Some insurance policies have cash value. Write to your insurance company and find out how much cash value whole, universal or other cash value policies you currently have.

Other assets may be notes receivable, the book value of your business and investments such as stocks, bonds, rental property, real estate and oil and gas partnerships (the amount of your investment). Check on the current market value of these assets.

Retirement assets such as an IRA, Keogh account, your pension and profit-sharing plans, 401K, deferred compensations and company savings plans should be valued based on what you could take from your employer if you left tomorrow.

Liabilities are easier to track. They include your mortgage, any bank notes, credit card balances or any debit balances and notes due.

Add up your assets and deduct your liabilities to get a fairly accurate picture of your financial health today. If it looks challenging, don't panic. Compare it to a photo of a child's first missing tooth or a broken leg or arm. What may not seem workable today can be healed and made even stronger and longer lasting.

Start by knowing the foundation you will build on...your net worth today. Keep track of your net worth at least once a year, so financial news will not scare you but challenge you to know where you really stand and what financial decisions you have made or can make to build your net worth potential.

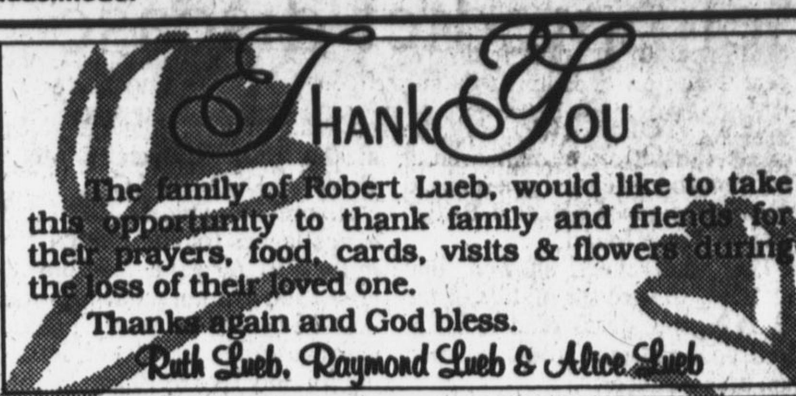

## YOUR EYES



### Why Tint Lenses?

Lightly tinted lenses were first introduced to give comfort to people who are sensitive to harsh indoor light or the glare of some computer screens. These cut out only about 20 percent of ambient light, so they're not useful as sun protection.

But tinted lenses can be flattering, too, enhancing the complexion or helping to hide wrinkles around the eye or dark shadows. Some shades soften the appearance of a high prescription. The color can be uniform over the entire lens or can be applied in gradient tints, darker at the top of the lens and fading downward.

Tinted contact lenses present an opportunity for make-believe. The color does not interfere with vision, yet it's deep enough to make eyes look any color the wearer wants them to be!

Lightly tinted lenses do not offer enough protection to stand in for sunglasses. One option, though, is wearing photochromatic lenses that are lightly tinted indoors but darken in the sun.

# Location of cancer gene's mutation could help predict disease

**NEW YORK (AP)** - The disease-causing effects of a recently discovered breast cancer gene depend on where the gene is mutated, British scientists have found.

The researchers showed that mutations toward the middle of the BRCA2 gene, discovered in 1995, predispose a woman more to ovarian than breast cancer.

That finding could help refine genetic tests, making them better predictors of whether a woman with a family history of breast cancer will get the disease.

"Clinically, it's possible that it could be a very important finding," said Simon Gayther, a research scientist at Addenbrooke's Hospital in Cambridge, England.

Gayther and seven colleagues identified 22 BRCA2 mutations among 25 families with histories of breast or ovarian cancer. When they looked at the specific location of each mutation within the gene, they found that damage near the ends of the gene tended to cause breast cancer.

But damage in a region near the middle of the gene caused more ovarian than breast cancers.

"This observation may ultimately be important in the counselling of women at risk of cancer due to BRCA2," Gayther and his colleagues write in a paper describing their work. They report their results in the January issue of Nature Genetics.

"It's certainly interesting and hopefully will open up some new doors, because right now it's really difficult to figure out what's going

on," said Andrew Futreal, a professor at the Duke University Medical Center in Durham, N.C.

In previous studies, Gayther and his colleagues found a similar effect in the BRCA1 gene, also linked to breast and ovarian cancer. Although inherited genes are not the predominant cause of breast cancer, accounting for only five to 10 percent of all cases, they may hold clues to how the disease develops generally.

In one set of families that the researchers studied, those with mutations in the middle part of the BRCA2 gene were more prone to ovarian than breast cancer. Mutations in the middle part of the gene produced 23 ovarian cancers, compared to 18 breast cancers.

But among those with mutations outside the middle region, there were 91 breast cancers and only one ovarian cancer. Another group of families produced a similar result.

Scientists don't know yet how the effect is produced. Mutations in the middle of the BRCA2 gene could increase the risk of ovarian cancer, decrease breast cancer risk, or do both at once.

It will probably take years to figure that out, Gayther said, as researchers try to figure out what the BRCA2 gene does and how it increases cancer risk.

"At the moment there's absolutely nothing known about the function of BRCA2," Gayther said. "In the end it's just a question of piecing all these bits of information together and trying to find the whole story."

## To Your Good Health

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** My husband developed high blood pressure at 18. He was in good health and active. For 15 years he was treated with pills for control. Ultimately a specialist sent some blood samples to a university, and he was found to have an extremely large adrenal gland tumor. It is rare and can go undetected. Since removal of the tumor, he hasn't had to take even one pill, and his pressure is normal. — K.A.

**ANSWER:** We often categorize high blood pressure as "cause unknown," when it might be a better idea to look for the rare occasion when the problem is part and parcel of another process, such as an overproduction of adrenal gland hormones. Often the pressure is traced to a tumor of that gland, and its subsequent removal cures the problem.

Your husband was in that fortunate minority, whose high blood pressure arises from the process, also known as "Conn's syndrome." Another name for it is "primary aldosteronism." It is excess of the hormone aldosterone that the adrenal tumor is pumping out.

Your husband's story is a classic example of what I mean when I refer broadly to "secondary" high blood pressure. That means it's secondary to a treatable cause — in this case the adrenal tumor.

Other examples of treatable secondary causes include overactive thyroid or parathyroid glands and some kidney ailments.

I know your husband must have mixed emotions about the long-neglected cause, but relief and ultimate success should dominate.

We all need reminding to look behind the commonplace to find the unusual. High blood pressure in a young man is highly suspect.

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** I just read your article on sleep apnea. I happen to use the machine that helps you breathe at night. It has a face mask, as you've described. However, I have sinus problems from an allergy to weeds and grass, so I cannot use the machine most of the time. I am 63, 6 feet tall and 220 pounds. You mentioned redundant throat tissue as a

blockage factor. Would its removal be proper for me? — J.F.

**ANSWER:** I would consider you a candidate for removal of redundant throat tissue. Its removal enlarges the area through which air gets to your breathing tubes. That might stop the episodes of loud snoring and transient loss of breath that's part of sleep apnea.

You can at least inquire about the surgery. Lasers often are used these days to pare away such tissue. Your family doctor can refer you to a doctor doing such work.

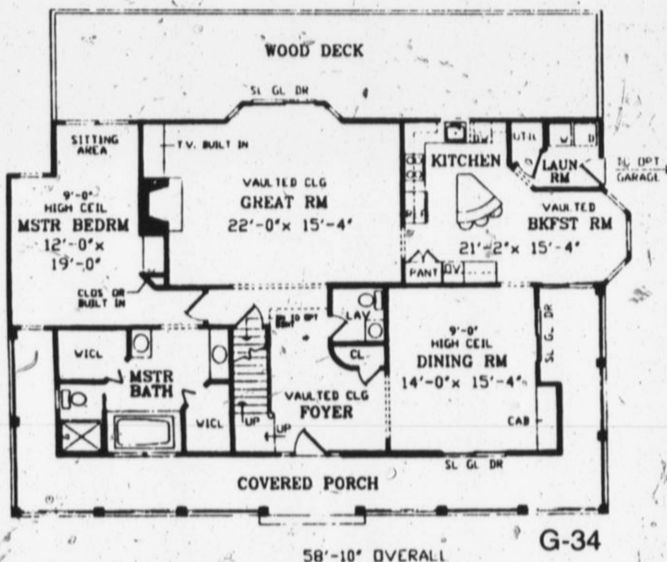

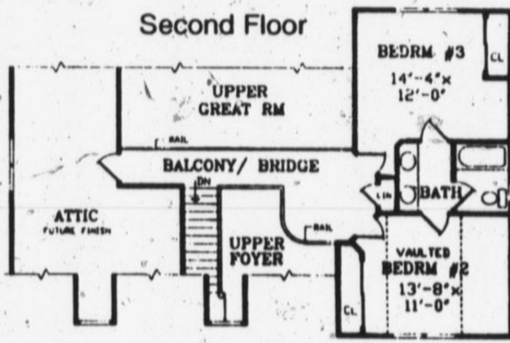

## Increase in appraisal fees expected in 1997

The National Association of Real Estate Appraisers recently conducted a survey of Real Estate Appraisers, both members and non-members. The results of this extensive survey (1,272 polled), indicate that because of fewer appraisers in 1997, a higher demand will be created for the existing appraisers, who plan to charge more for their appraisal reports, simply because of this demand for licensed appraisers.

Additional reasons were cited for the increase in real estate appraisal report fees. Namely, the high cost of the required investment of more expensive, updated computer equipment. The days of the tape measure and Polaroid camera are gone. Appraisers are moving into paperless transaction arena, and to operate in this environment, need to purchase special cameras for digital photography and updated computer equipment and programs to be able to send their reports via Electronic Data Interchange (EDI) now being required by most lenders and mortgage companies.

Also cited as reasons for the increase in appraisal fees is appraisers are likely to be spending more on increasing state licensing fees, additional mandatory continuing education classes and the increase in premium costs for errors and omissions insurance. State regulators have expanded the number of hours of classes appraisers must have to renew their licenses. Educators are charging more for these classes than in the past as appraisers must succumb to these regulations.

Statistics collected show the expectations for increased appraisal reports include a 10-20% rise for residential appraisals and a 5-10% increase for a commercial report increases are low, as the fees are substantially more expensive to begin with. ## MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

### To Keep Customers, Give Them Time

"I need one more house every day," a friend of mine recently lamented. "Maybe then I could get caught up and stay that way."

I suspect if you polled most working Americans today you would find them in agreement. We are all busy and could use more time to accomplish all the tasks on our schedule.

Working Americans have one more thing in common: they are customers. If you operate a retail or service business today, you can ensure greater customer loyalty by giving your customers the gift of time. Even if you are in the manufacturing business, you can build in time savings and watch your sales grow.

No matter what your work is, your customers are most likely very willing to give you money if you can save them time. Let me give you some good examples.

#### Time-saving tips

I do business with a local bank and from time to time I borrow a little money. The last time I needed a loan I simply called my loan officer, explained my needs and she processed the papers. After work, I dropped by the bank, reviewed and signed the papers in less than 10 minutes. There were two key time savers here: I didn't have to take off from work - convenient hours - and I didn't have to wait for the paperwork.

An appliance dealer friend of mine in Oklahoma, saw an opportunity to grow his business by scheduling deliveries for the convenience of the buyer. Instead of delivering on "Tuesday," they schedule deliveries "on the hour." Customers no longer have to take a whole day off from work. Usually, they can adjust their work schedule to be home an extra hour with no loss of time or convenience. This simple time saver has been a great source of repeat business and terrific referrals as well.

A paint store owner might suggest time saving items such as trim guards, corner rollers, masking paper and power painters. You can increase your average sale, boost overall revenues and satisfy customers more effectively if you stay focused on time-saving element.

A Missouri-based rental store owner focuses on two aspects of time saving. He has computerized all rental forms so no regular customer has to wait more than a few seconds for the paperwork. In

addition, all employees are drilled on how to demonstrate equipment for do-it-yourselfers so the renter knows how to operate it safely, and how to do the job right the first time. Once again, this works beautifully for repeat business and referrals.

#### Eliminate time wasters

To begin the process of giving your customers the valuable commodity of time, take a good look at your business. First, determine when and where customers are having to wait. Is it at the check out counter, waiting for your staff to fill their orders or waiting for qualified assistance in making a purchase decision?

Once you see where your bottlenecks are, focus your efforts on finding solutions. You may need additional check-outs, more peak-time personnel or automated systems. Frequently, you can solve time problems easily with minimal expense.

Some businesses offer diversions for customers who must wait. Several family restaurants offer free coloring books and colors to keep youngsters entertained while waiting for meals. A shoe store might provide a foot massage machine to relax customers while store clerks are pulling shoes. A women's clothing store could offer a "Husbands only" rest area complete with sports programming on a color TV.

The best possible strategy is to eliminate the hassles. If you can't make the waiting as pleasant as possible.

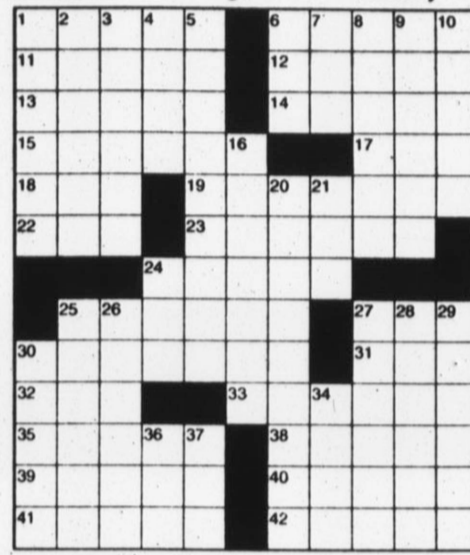

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS PROVIDING THAT SEC. 42-56. OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS BE AMENDED TO ADOPT THE 1994 EDITION OF THE UNIFORM FIRE CODE, VOLUMES 1 AND 2, PRESCRIBING REGULATIONS GOVERNING CONDITIONS HAZARDOUS TO LIFE AND PROPERTY FROM FIRE, HAZARDOUS MATERIALS OR EXPLOSION; PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF PERMITS FOR HAZARDOUS USES OR OPERATIONS; AND PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF; AND REPEALING ALL OTHER ORDINANCES AND PARTS OF THE ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Sec. 42-56 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Hereford, Texas, is hereby amended to read as follows:

SECTION 3. That Sec. 42-57 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Hereford, Texas be and is hereby repealed and null and void and of no other force and effect, and all other Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. That this Ordinance and the rules, regulations, provisions, requirements, orders and matters established and adopted hereby shall take effect and be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by the City Charter.

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## New interpretive anthropology starts at home

HOUSTON (AP) - And there he sat, drinking beers. It wasn't even noon, but Jose Limon had sidled up to the bar in Cielito Lindo, a San Antonio dance hall. The place was slightly decrepit and mostly empty.

"Look, Limon, (it) happened over there," said one of the bar owners, relating in Spanish how the devil appeared in his dance hall. "Now, would you like another beer, bro?"

Although it might not seem so, Limon, an anthropologist, was hard at work. But unlike the Margaret Meads of previous years, Limon was not studying a so-called "foreign" or "primitive" culture - he was studying culture like his own.

The interview in the Cielito Lindo was taken from Limon's book, "Dancing with the Devil: Society and Cultural Poetics in Mexican American South Texas," published in 1994. He conducted scores of such interviews in dance halls, outside South Texas shrines, during barbecues.

Anthropology has changed dramatically since Mead published "Coming of Age in Samoa" in 1928.

No longer is it considered pure science, with anthropologists providing pat explanations based on immutable data. And no longer are "tribes" only those indigenous peoples found in tropical jungles - instead, they can be groups of South Texas Chicanos, California topless dancers, wealthy Americans or art patrons.

The 95th annual meeting of the American Anthropological Association, recently held in San Francisco, illustrated current trends in the field. Among the 5,200 graduate students, professors and researchers were those studying the Tatars of the former Soviet Union, anti-gay violence in the United States and the patrons and owners of Chinese restaurants in San Francisco.

Houston's Rice University also has become a center for such "interpretive anthropology," with students and professors studying the behavior of Galveston's elite, the curators and directors of the Menil Collection, and Hispanic lowriders in the city's east and north sides.

George Marcus, dean of the Rice University anthropology department, said all sorts of groups are subject to study.

"Now it's common for people to write about themselves - they can make tribes of scientists, or tribes of politicians," he said. "Used to just have Anglos writing on Mexicans, or things like that. You still do - and some of it is very good - but now you have a whole body of work (where the investigator) shares the same ethnic background (with the investigated)."

The anthropology program at the University of Texas at Austin also hosts prominent interpretive anthropologists, including Limon, whose "Dancing with the Devil" chronicles his search for truth and meaning in South Texas.

Besides generally exploring the culture of Mexican immigrants, Limon's book describes a common urban myth of a devil who appears in Mejicano dance halls. In the myth, a well-dressed, attractive and often Anglo man appears in a crowded dance hall. The man dances gracefully with several women until it is observed that instead of feet, he has cloven hooves - or in some versions - chicken feet.

"And when she sees the feet, the girl screams and she faints right there on the floor," Limon was told by one woman, who added that the devil disappeared in a puff of smoke. "My brother says that he was in that corner that night, but he only heard the scream - he didn't see the smoke or nothing."

Versions of this story, according to Limon, have been repeated by various working class Mexican women, and by some skeptical men, throughout South Texas and California. It has also been told in various forms to other anthropologists and folklorists.

Limon suggests the devil myth is a cultural reaction to the dissolution of working class immigrant culture - especially as it interacts with dominant Anglo society.

In his book, he writes that wage-earning Mejicano immigrants remain fairly insulated within the confines of a dance hall - where few Anglos deign to enter - but are nonetheless affected by the outside world.

"As more drugs, alcohol, opportunistic sexuality and violence begin to mark the dance scene as a site of cultural contradiction, the devil also enters the dance hall to mark this contradiction," writes Limon.

"The devil - who is such a race and class threat to these men, a source of resentment and jealousy - appears to be a sexually charged site of admiration, delight and playfulness for these women," writes Limon.

ORDINANCE NO. 1363

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS, PROVIDING THAT SEC. 22-132. AND SEC. 22-135. (1), (2), (4) AND (5) OF ARTICLE V OF CHAPTER 22 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS, BE AMENDED BY REVISING THE STANDARDS AND PROCEDURES FOR REPAIR, VACATION OR DEMOLITION OF DANGEROUS BUILDINGS

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS:

Section 1: That Sec. 22-132. of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Hereford, Texas, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 22-132. Standards for repair, vacation and demolition.

The following standards shall be followed by the City Commission in ordering the repair, vacation, relocation of occupants, demolition or removal of a structure:

(a) The City Commission may issue an order requiring the vacation, relocation of occupants, securing, repair (with or without vacation), removal, or demolition of the structure if the City Commission finds that any of the following conditions exist:

- (1) the structure in question is dilapidated, substandard, or unfit for human habitation, and a hazard to the public health, safety, and welfare;
- (2) that regardless of its structural condition, the structure is unoccupied by its owners, lessees or other invitees and is unsecured from unauthorized entry to the extent that it could be entered or used by vagrants or other uninvited persons as a place of harborage or could be entered or used by children;
- (3) if boarded up, fenced or otherwise secured in any manner if:
  - (A) the building constitutes a danger to the public even though secured from entry, or
  - (B) the means used to secure the building are inadequate to prevent unauthorized entry or use of the manner described in (2) above;
- (4) if the dangerous building can reasonably be repaired so that it will no longer exist in violation of the terms of this article it shall be ordered repaired;
- (5) if the dangerous building is in such condition as to make it dangerous to the health, morals, safety or general welfare of its occupants it shall be ordered to be vacated, or
- (6) in any case where a dangerous building is 50 percent damaged, decayed or deteriorated from its original value or structure, it shall be demolished, and in all cases where a building cannot be repaired so that it will no longer exist in violation of the terms of this article it shall be demolished. In all cases where a dangerous building is a fire hazard existing or erected in violation of the terms of this article or any ordinance of the city or statute of the state it shall be demolished.

Section 2: That subsection (1) of Sec. 22-135. of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Hereford, Texas is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 22-135. Duties of City Commission.

(1) Upon receipt of a report of the Building Official as provided for in section 22-134(7), give written notice of a public hearing to the owner, occupant, mortgagee, lessee, agent, lienholder and all other persons having an interest in such building as shown by the land records of the County Clerk to appear at the public hearing on the date specified in the notice and submit at the hearing proof of the scope of any work that may be required to comply with this Article and the time it will take to reasonably perform the work. A copy of the notice of public hearing shall be filed in the Official Public Records of Deaf Smith County, Texas. The notice shall contain the name and address of the owner of the affected property if that information can be determined from a reasonable search of the instruments on file in the office of the County Clerk, a legal description of the affected property, and a description of the hearing.

Section 3: That subsection (2) of Sec. 22-135. of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Hereford, Texas is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 22-135. Duties of City Commission.

(2) The City Commission shall hold a public hearing to determine whether a building complies with the standards set forth in this Article, and shall hear such testimony as the Building Official or the owner, occupant, mortgagee, lessee, or any other person having an interest in such building as shown by the land records of the County Clerk, shall offer relative to the building. In said public hearing, the owner, lienholder, or mortgagee has the burden of proof to demonstrate the scope of any work that may be required to comply with the standards set forth in this Article and the time it will take to reasonably perform the work.

Section 4: That subsection (4) of Sec. 22-135. of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Hereford, Texas is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 22-135. Duties of City Commission.

(4) If the City Commission finds that the building is a dangerous building based upon findings of fact made pursuant to subsection (3) of this section, it shall issue an order requiring the owner, lienholder, or mortgagee of the building to do the following:

- a) secure the structure from unauthorized entry, or
- b) repair, remove or demolish the building unless the owner or lienholder establishes at the hearing that the work cannot be reasonably performed within thirty days.
- c) if the owner, lienholder or mortgagee establishes that the work cannot be reasonably completed in thirty days and the City Commission determines that additional time is necessary, the City Commission shall establish specific time schedules for the commencement and performance of the work and shall require the property be secured in a reasonable manner from unauthorized entry while the work is being performed, as determined by the City Commission.
- d) The City Commission shall not allow an owner, lienholder or mortgagee more than ninety days to repair, remove or demolish the building or fully perform all work required to comply with the order unless the owner, lienholder or mortgagee:

- 1) submits a detailed plan and time schedule for the work at the hearing, and
  - 2) establishes at the hearing that the work cannot reasonably be completed within ninety days because of the scope and complexity of the work.
- e) If the City Commission allows the owner, lienholder, or mortgagee more than ninety days to complete any part of the work required to repair, remove or demolish the building, the City Commission shall require the owner, lienholder or mortgagee to regularly submit progress reports to the Building Official to demonstrate that the owner, lienholder or mortgagee has complied with the time schedules established for commencement and performance of the work. The order may require that the owner, lienholder or mortgagee appear before the Building Official or his designee to demonstrate compliance with the time schedules.

- f) Within 10 days after the date that the order is issued, the municipality shall:
- (1) file a copy of the order in the office of the City Secretary, and
  - (2) publish in a newspaper of general circulation in the city which the building is located a notice containing:
    - (A) the street address or legal description of the property;
    - (B) the date of the hearing;
    - (C) a brief statement indicating the results of the order; and
    - (D) instructions stating where a complete copy of the order may be obtained.

Section 5: That subsection (5) of Sec. 22-135. of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Hereford, Texas is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 22-135. Duties of City Commission.

(5) If the owner, occupant, mortgagee or lessee fails to comply with the order provided for in subsection (4) of this section within the time period allowed by the City Commission, the City Commission shall direct the Building Official to cause the repair, removal or demolition of the structure to be accomplished by City personnel or by private contract under the direction of the Building Official at the expense of the City. Expenses incurred shall be assessed against the property on which the building stands or is attached and as a lien against the property. A Notice of Lien shall be filed in the office of the County Clerk and must contain the name and address of the owner if that information can be determined with a reasonable effort, a legal description of the real property on which the building was located, the amount of expenses incurred by the City, and the balance due.

Section 6: That all other Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 7: That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage as provided by the City Charter.

The above and foregoing Ordinance was duly introduced on the motion of Commissioner Eades, seconded by Commissioner Hall, and was duly PASSED, APPROVED AND ADOPTED by the unanimous vote of the City Commission on the 6th day of January, 1997.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS, PROVIDING THAT SECTION 22-52. OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS, BE AMENDED TO ADOPT THE 1994 EDITION OF THE UNIFORM PLUMBING CODE AND THE 1994 EDITION OF THE IAPMO INSTALLATIONS STANDARDS, TOGETHER WITH FUTURE EDITIONS, REVISIONS AND ADDITIONS THERETO, REGULATING AND CONTROLLING THE DESIGN, CONSTRUCTION, QUALITY OF MATERIALS, ERECTION, INSTALLATION, ALTERATION, REPAIR, LOCATION, RELOCATION, REPLACEMENT, ADDITION TO, USE OR MAINTENANCE OF ANY PLUMBING SYSTEM IN THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS, PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF PERMITS AND COLLECTION OF FEES THEREFOR, TOGETHER WITH THE AMENDMENT THERETO, AND REPEALING ALL OTHER ORDINANCES AND PARTS OF THE ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATING THIS ORDINANCE, AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

# Farm and Ranch

## Extension Agent's Notes

While I am writing this column, I feel like the father that has told his teenagers to be careful with the car a hundred times, and then on Sunday morning on the way to church backs out of the driveway into the neighbors Cadillac across the street.

The reason I feel this way is that I am writing this column at home on my laptop computer, while my broken right leg is propped on a pillow. If you haven't heard, I broke my leg - oh, how I hate to admit it - in a farm-related accident. How many times in this column, in other news releases and during programs for agricultural producers, have I preached safety on the farm? I would be afraid to even know.

On Dec. 30, I was trying to rescue a calf that had fallen into an old pit in the pasture land, south of the old prisoner of war camp. We used a tow strap tied around the calf, put it over a 55-gallon barrel, tied it to the pickup bumper and slowly raised the calf to the surface. I was attempting to get the calf's front legs over the side of the concrete pit wall when he

suddenly jumped to his feet and ran. Since I am the one with the broken leg, it is obvious that the calf ran faster than I did. The tow strap caught me just below the right knee, breaking my leg just below the knee and at the ankle. All this happened in just seconds. The breaks were severe enough to cause transport by ambulance to Hi-Plains Hospital in Amarillo and surgery on the knee and ankle.

While talking to the doctors and nurses on the orthopedic surgery floor at Hi-Plains, they told me that some of the most severe injuries they see are from farm- or ranch-related accidents. The charge nurse on the floor told me that many of the leg and back injuries they see are from animal-related accidents. She also said that many are from falls from atop machinery and trucks, especially during harvest times.

I hope that my experience will be a lesson to many of you. In the future, you can bet that I will slow down and evaluate the situation a bit more before making a move that might have some potential for injury.

It is really ironic that in 1997, we as a staff of the Deaf Smith County office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, have planned, in conjunction with committees of our Extension Program Council, to have an emphasis on farm, ranch and home safety. One good thing about it, I now have a true life accident to tell about as we present programs and information on safety this coming year.

Another good thing about the accident is that I did not have to get out in the snow and ice this week. I know that we needed the moisture, so I guess most could tolerate the cold in order to get the wet.

Producers should mark their calendars for Jan. 21 for the West Texas Vegetable Conference in the Hereford Community Center. Even if you don't produce vegetables, this year's conference will offer a lot of information on new and innovative irrigation systems and techniques. It will also provide information on pesticide usage and will offer 5.5 CEUs for private, commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicators. It is time for everyone to think rain. See you next week.

## Grain Elevator Workshop to feature guest speakers

AMARILLO - Post harvest problems affecting stored grain will top the agenda for the 1997 Texas High Plains Grain Elevator Workshop scheduled at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center, Jan. 30.

The event will feature education updates on damage resulting from diseases, insects and rodents, and will address fumigation concerns, in addition to all laws and regulations of interest in the grain storage and processing industry.

The workshop is sponsored each year by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Tri-State Chapter of the Grain Elevator and Processing Society (GEAPS).

It will be held from 8 a.m. until 3:45 p.m. The workshop has been accredited by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) for five continuing education units (CEUs) and will be offered for commercial, non-commercial and private pesticide

applicator recertification requirements. Categories and units will be given in integrated pest management (1.0), laws and regulations (1.0) and general topics (3.0).

Greg Cronholm, Extension pest management entomologist from Plainview will open the morning session with a general conference overview at 8:45 a.m. Don Shaheen, with DeGesh America, Inc. from Weyer's Cave, Va. will discuss toxicology, a new phosphine generator and phosphine corrosion issues.

Larry Whitlock with the Texas State Chemist's Office in College Station will present sampling data from 1992-96 on aflatoxin in grain and whole seed. The final speaker

before a break for lunch at 11:30 a.m. will be Scott Hyngstrom, Extension wildlife damage specialist with the University of Nebraska from Lincoln, who will discuss rodent control in stored grain facilities.

The afternoon program will begin at 12:45 p.m. with David Hoffman, GEAPS Tri-State Chapter president in Amarillo, as moderator. Gerrit Cuperus with the Oklahoma Cooperative Extension Service in Stillwater.

The workshop will adjourn following the evaluation and CEU certification at 3:45 p.m. The conference cost is \$25. To register and obtain information, call Carl Patrick, Extension entomologist at (806) 359-5401.

## Agriculture Briefs

Consumers will continue to enjoy favorable beef prices during 1997, thanks to ample competitive meat supplies and liquidation that will boost beef production.

"Retail beef prices averaged \$2.78 per pound in 1996, down about 6 cents from last year," said Jim Gill,

market director for the Texas Cattle Feeders Association in Amarillo.

"With record or near record meat and poultry production expected in 1997, retail beef prices will probably continue to trend lower. It will probably be late 1997 or early 1998 before supplies will tighten enough to cause any substantial uptick in prices," Gill said.

While that's good news for consumers, Gill's outlook for cattle prices is less enthusiastic, at least for the first half of 1997. Fed cattle prices will likely range from \$62 to \$66 per cwt. in the first quarter, \$8-64 in the second, \$63-68 in the third and \$68 to \$72 in the fourth.

Feeder cattle supplies should level out, he predicts, and prices may rally in early 1997, reflecting recent decreases in corn prices. "But as corn prices trend higher into the spring, feeder prices will track lower into early summer."

Continued herd liquidation will keep pressure on prices, he said, predicting beef production in 1997 will be near 25.7 billion pounds.

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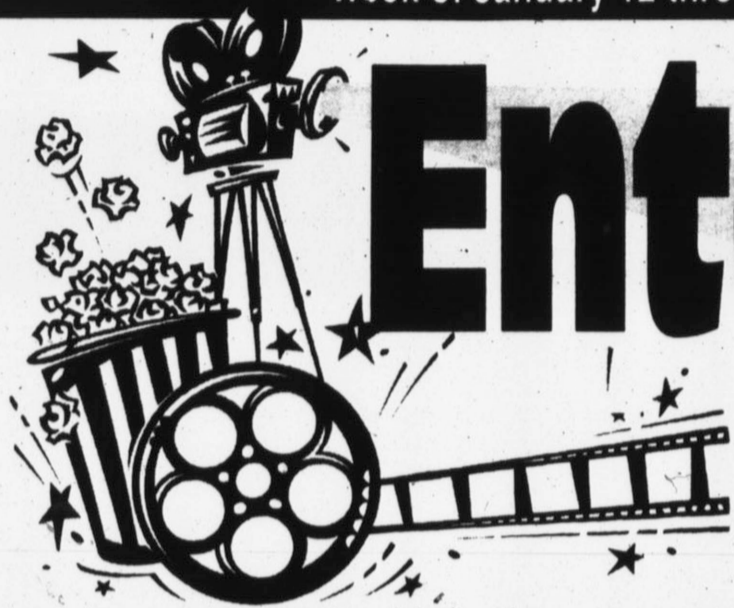

## CBS' Coast to Coast gets out of the studio rut

"Location, location, location." That's how CBS correspondent Alison Stewart describes the difference between *Coast to Coast* and all the other network newsmagazine shows.

"The others are all about time. You know, *Today*, *60 Minutes*, *Primetime Live*, *48 Hours*. We're about location. That's what makes the show different."

Debuting Wednesday, Jan. 15, *Coast to Coast* doesn't want to look or think like any other newsmagazine. So executive producer Michael Rubin has done away with the notion of a studio host and sent his team of correspondents out on the road to work on their stories.

"The thing I like about the show is the pacing and the rhythm," Stewart says. "There's this really deep voice that gets you from place to place, then the correspondent comes on with the story. The only link is that everybody is patchworked across the country."

Reports from off the beaten path have been a specialty at CBS since Charles Kuralt launched his *On the Road* franchise. But *Coast to Coast* has a younger, more energetic pace, mixing seasoned network newsmagazine veterans Cynthia Bowers, Bernard Goldberg and Peter Van Sant — with a group of newcomers with fresh faces and fresh attitudes.

Stewart is one of the latter, coming to the network of Edward R. Murrow and Walter Cronkite from MTV, where she was one of the cable channel's news correspondents.

Her coverage of the 1992 presidential election earned her a Peabody Award, and her assignments took her to 40 states and included coverage of the strife in Bosnia.

A confessed "political junkie," Stewart

is glad, nevertheless, to take a break from the campaign trail.

At *Coast to Coast* her first stories will be about guide dogs being trained by Ohio prison inmates and a corporate lawyer-turned-teacher in the South Bronx. Each report will be about eight or 10 minutes in length.

"They're very positive stories," Stewart admits. "It's not going to give you a cavity, but it's definitely not a downer. There can be angst and pain and controversy in the stories. It's not a soft show."

By moving to CBS, Stewart leaves a network that targets teens and young adults for one that attracts the 50-plus crowd.

"It's much, much quieter in the halls," she says jokingly.

"I did my first set of voice-overs yesterday, and the producer kept asking me to slow down. I said, 'Really?'"

Yet *Coast to Coast* seems designed to take the network in a younger direction. Among Stewart's colleagues on the show are David Turecamo, a filmmaker since the age of 7 who helped pioneer the use of digital video cameras in reporting; Steve Hartman, who gives up a lighthearted segment he called *The Stevener News* on a Los Angeles newscast to join *Coast to Coast*; and Derek McGinty, whose background includes public broadcasting.

CBS has slotted the show between its strong early-evening comedy hour (*The Nanny* and *Pearl*) and the spicy midseason drama *Orleans*. It's a lineup calculated to slice across a broad range of ages, with appeal for both men and women.

"I hope CBS gives us time to build an audience," Stewart says. "I think it's going to be one of those word-of-mouth shows."

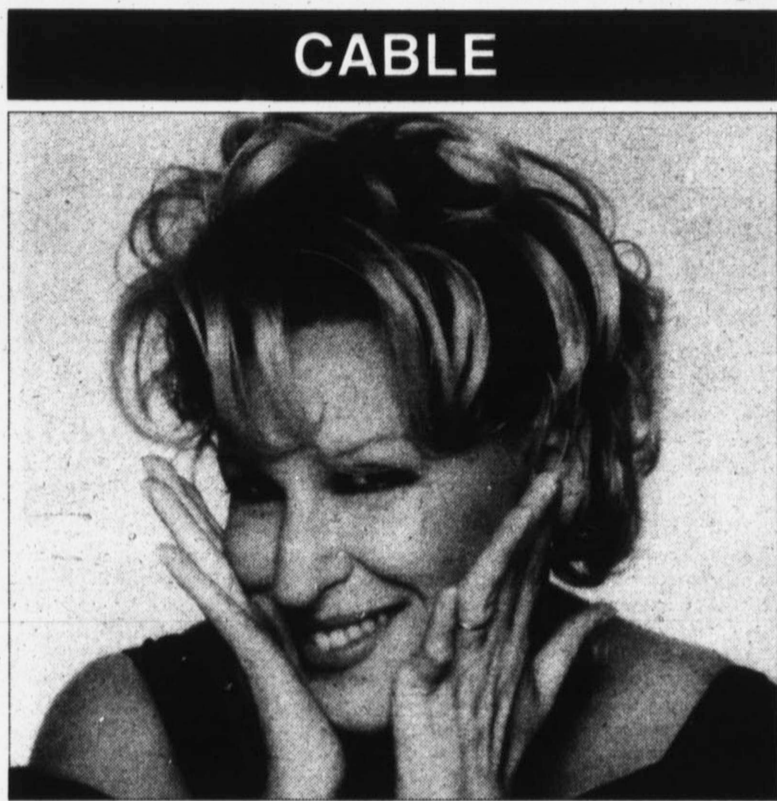

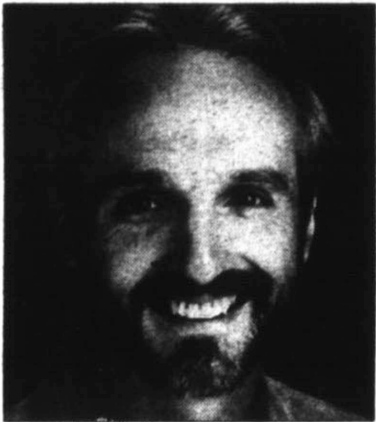

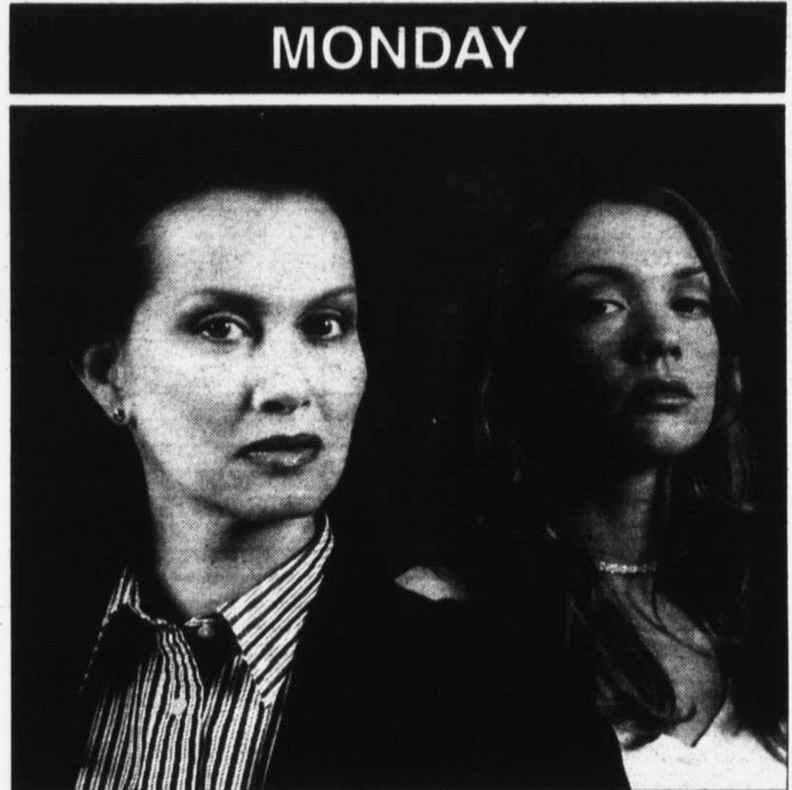

*A Royal Scandal*, airing Sunday, Jan. 12, on PBS' *Masterpiece Theatre* (check local listings), is a midwinter tale poking subtle fun at one such marital debacle.

Though not a masterpiece, *Scandal* is a cheerful hourlong romp through the unhappy union of a prince and princess of Wales.

Narration by Ian Richardson (*House of Cards*) underscores an overall tone of wicked amusement.

*Scandal* is a costume piece, despite the coincidental resemblance of the marriage in question to that of a more recent royal couple: a bachelor prince with too-healthy parents who takes a mistress and dabbles in architecture, all the while mindful of his duty to beget an heir; and an aristocratic virgin, an outsider in a gilded web of courtly cliques, naively hopeful of setting up housekeeping with her husband.

Richard E. Grant plays Prince George IV, son of George III, with Susan Lynch as Caroline of Brunswick, a German princess. Their go-between, the most likable person in the story, is Lord Malmesbury (Michael Kitchen).

Trouble begins even before the nuptials.

George is a bigamist. Though already the secret husband of a Roman Catholic divorcee, he weds Caroline in hopes of paying off his debts with her money and giving the country a Protestant heir.

Caroline is unfashionable and unmannered. She makes thoughtlessly rude remarks, and does not bathe and perfume herself as much as the prince would like.

After a bad beginning, mutual revulsion sets in. Eventually, both fall from popular favor.

Naturally, there's no "happily ever after" to *A Royal Scandal*, only a bitter lesson or two to be gleaned. Most telling, perhaps, is how easily the lives of Charles and Caroline can be turned to comedy, though the waste they made of their years is tragic indeed.

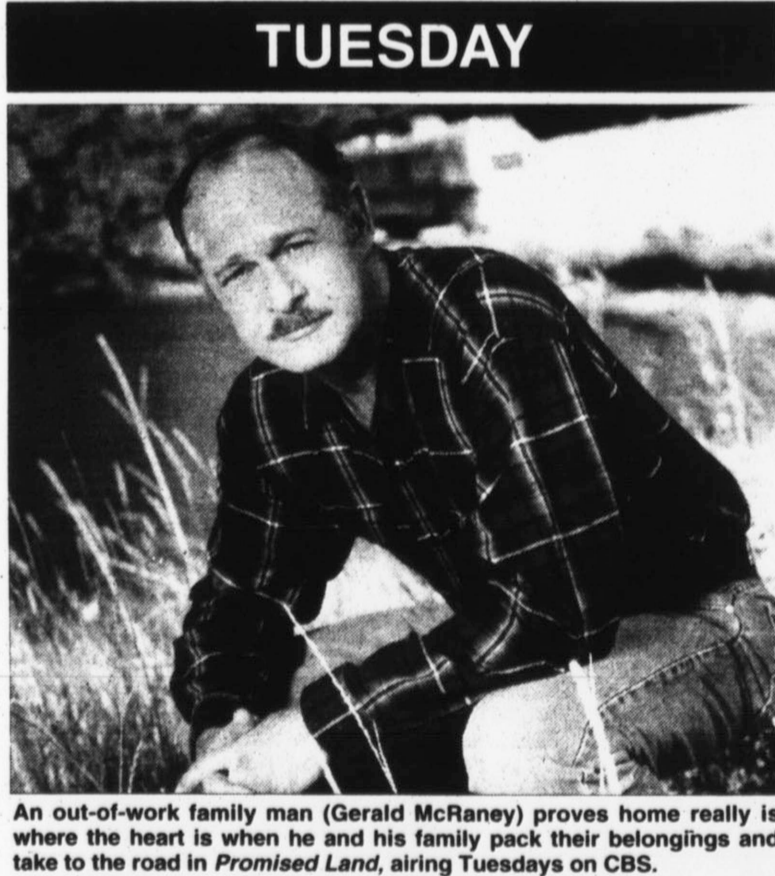

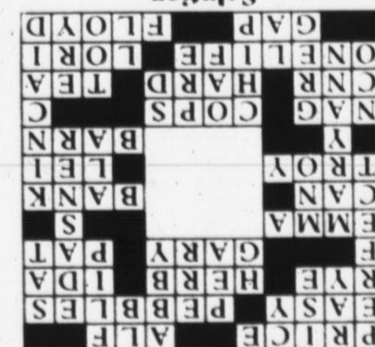
