# Parks, recreation are focus of re-organization proposal presented by city manager

By GEORGIA TYLER **Staff Writer** 

A re-organization of the City of Hereford staff was reviewed for the City Commission during a Monday work session and the commission implemented a revised ordinance for removal of dilapidated buildings during the regular meeting.

City Manager Chester Nolen told the commission that the proposed changes in staff would require no additional employees although at least one replacement employee probably will be needed. No added expense is anticipated, he said.

The re-organization will give the city a parks and recreation department with oversight of several areas assigned to a director, Nolen pointed

During the commission's brief regular meeting, removal of buildings at 226 Avenue A, 318 Avenue A and 314 Avenue A was ordered by resolution. And, a report from the Hereford Economic Development Corporation executive director, was heard by the commission.

Owners of the property will be notified that they have 30 days to tear down the buildings. After 30 days, the city has the authority to raze the buildings and file a lien against the property for expense of removal.

City Attorney Terry Langehennig advised the commission that an ordinance passed several weeks ago speeds up the process of condemning unsafe structures. Previously, court action was required to permit the city to remove such buildings.

Public hearings were conducted on the three buildings but no owners appeared before the commission although they were notified of the hearings. City Building Official Pete Wilt testified to the unsafe buildings. Noten said, probably will be part in the discussions.

If owners do not respond to notices before 30 days elapse, the city may proceed to tear down the buildings. In his review of city staff re-

organization, Nolen said changes

should result in delegation of some authority outside his office. He said the number of "individuals for the city manager to communicate

with on a daily basis to decrease from 13 to seven.

The major target of his plan, Nolen said in a memo to the commission. will be the parks and recreation department. He said such a department has been a longtime goal of the

The activities of the aquatic facility, the pro shop and golf course superintendent and parks maintenance functions would all fall under a parks and recreation director," Nolen said.

"This plan would allow for the structured activities that have been less than coordinated events. It also would allow for more professional supervision in the parks area," he

Nolen said personnel changes are a month, or more, away.

Looking at proposals, the commission agreed with Nolen's assessment of needs, although no action was taken or required for the city manager to implement his plan.

Mayor Bob Josserand suggested that some provision should be made for some city employee "to be in charge" when Noten is out of the city.

Nolen said the assistant city manager plan of a few years ago "didn't work out." He mentioned that the finance director, Steve Bartels, could function in that capacity.

Some decisions on personnel,

discussed with the commission in a closed-door session at a later date.

Mike Hatley, HEDC executive, said he recently has submitted material about Hereford to a pair of industrial prospects and another business.

In addition, the HEDC is staying in touch with prospective theatre operators, a dairy and a discount retailer.

During the commission's work session, Nolen submitted estimates on revitalizing the Main Street business district.

A cost of approximately \$21,600 would cover demolition of existing facilities, construction of new planting areas and islands, 24 trees and 24 sidewalk grates.

The city manager advised the commission that there is no provision in the current budget for the work.

Mayor Josserand suggested that the city should enlist Hereford Beautification Alliance and Main Street merchants in the project.

The city could reasonably handle the demolition, estimated to cost \$2,000,and construction of planting areas, at a cost of \$10,000, Nolen said.

A total of 24 trees and 24 sidewalk grates would be an additional \$9,600.

Commissioners agreed informally that some of the cost should be assumed by merchants.

"I think there should be participation by the merchants," said Commissioner Carey Black. "Business in other parts of town shouldn't pay, through their taxes, to dress up Main Street."

Josserand asked Nolen to notify the Hereford Beautification Alliance that the commission will work in a planning session on Feb. 10, beginning at 5 p.m., and discuss the project. HBA representatives will be invited to take

he means it or it was rhetoric," said Rep. Bob Livingston, R-La., chairman of the House Appropriations Committee. Clinton, who has done some

reading on the largely dismal record of second-term presidents, planned to begin work today fighting the Republican push for a balanced budget amendment to the Constitu-He also was to urge tougher

campaign finance rules during a speech to the Democratic National Committee, a group basking in presidential victory but staring at the prospect of a Republican-dominated Congress poised to investigate its acceptance - and return - of foreign campaign contributions.

Republicans had problems of their own, as the House was to vote today on a resolution to reprimand House Speaker Newt Gingrich for ethical misconduct and assess a \$300,000 penalty.

Clinton began his second term in no position to cluck over the speaker's difficulties.

A special counsel continues to investigate the president's involvement in the Whitewater real estate matter. GOP lawmakers say they will investigate questionable Clinton campaign fund-raising practices and White House abuse of FBI files. And one of the cases on the desk of Chief

on foreign policy, meeting in Washington on Thursday with U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan. Other foreign policy worries include the health of Russian President Boris Yeltsin, which could scuttle a U.S. summit planned for this spring.

On Monday, Clinton's secretary of state nominee, Madeleine Albright, became the first of Clinton's new Cabinet to pass committee scrutiny, winning unanimous approval from the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. The full Senate was expected to confirm her quickly.

Further down the road, Clinton is supposed to deliver a fiscal 1998 budget to Congress on Feb. 6. Among the expected major items of contention are trimming Medicare and defense spending.

But for a night, at least, and part of this morning, Clinton put those cares aside, donned formal wear and celebrated.

With the bands playing "Unforgettable," Clinton danced with Mrs. Clinton. Daughter Chelsea did her own party-hopping with friends, then caught up with Mom and Dad at the Arkansas ball.

Clinton resisted several offers to play the saxophone but did blow his own horn just a bit at the Pennsylvania-Ohio ball.

"The only reason there was a second time around is because the country is better than it was the first time around," Clinton said. "We put this country back on the right track."

# Speaker could face reprimand, \$300,000 penalty for violations

WASHINGTON (AP) - In the ethics dock after two years of controversy, Speaker Newt Gingrich awaited punishment from fellow lawmakers all but certain to impose a reprimand and a whopping \$300,000 penalty for admitted rules violations.

Aides said Monday that Gingrich House chamber for today's debate and vote in a politically charged case in which he denied all wrongdoing until a month ago.

There was little doubt about the outcome, since Gingrich himself agreed in advance to the punishment rubber-stamped it late Friday night.

The vote on the House floor committee of a formal report which concluded that "over a number of years and in a number of situations, Mr. Gingrich showed disregard and lack of respect for the standards of conduct that applied to his activi-

The Georgia Republican admitted on Dec. 21 that he failed to seek proper legal advice on using tax-exempt projects to meet political goals. He acknowledged that "in my

name and over my signature" inaccurate statements had been submitted to the ethics committee.

The prescribed punishment would allow Gingrich to retain his leadership post, although it also apparently would mark the first time in history that a speaker was cited by the full House for ethical misconduct.

And it was clear from some Republicans that there was little was not expected to be present in the stomach among the rank and file for additional transgressions by the powerful speaker. "I think he has pushed the loyalty litmus test to the limit," said Rep. Ray LaHood of Illinois, echoing what other lawmakers said privately.

Still, controversy swirled around and the ethics committee the case even as it reached its conclusion.

Gingrich's lawyer, J. Randolph followed adoption by the ethics Evans, left open the possibility the speaker might tap leftover campaign funds to pay his penalty, although he said no decision would be made without consulting legal specialists.

'We don't want to end up with more problems," the attorney said. He said other options include using personal funds or establishing a legal

payment. He should use "his own declined comment Monday when money," said Rep. Jay Dickey of Arkansas in an interview. "We have him as part of the investigation. endured enough. I don't want us to go through with all that legal hair-splitting."

Dickey and other Republicans expressed surprise at the size of the financial penalty Gingrich will be required to pay. But they said it likely wouldn't have interfered with his re-election as speaker two weeks ago had they known about it.

Rep. Tom Davis, R-Va., said lawmakers knew at the time Gingrich was likely to face a reprimand. Dickey said Gingrich would have prevailed because "he is so important to the leadership with his vision."

In another area, a law enforcement official disclosed the FBI is conducting interviews as part of its investigation into the taping and distribution of a cellular phone conversation on Dec. 21 in which Gingrich and the GOP leadership discussed a plan for blunting political damage. The New York Times reported a few days later that it obtained a copy of the tape from a Democratic congressman.

While Gingrich loyalists have likened his offense to "jaywalking," research at the Library of Congress' Congressional Research Service indicated the House action in the matter was unprecedented.

"Although there have been charges, allegations and investigations with respect to alleged ethical misconduct of speakers of the House in the past, none of these instances has culminated in a formal vote by the House of representatives to cite a speaker for ethical misconduct," the material said.

One other recent speaker who confronted ethical woes, Democrat Jim Wright of Texas, resigned before his case could reach the floor.

Gingrich has chosen the opposite course, fighting for his job at the same time he was agreeing in December to admit to rules violations. His admission permitted him to avoid a protracted ethics trial that could have taken months. That delay, in turn, might have doomed his campaign for re-election as speaker when the votes were cast

# Costs of health care expected to escalate

NEW YORK (AP) - Health maintenance organizations are planning to hike costs this year after holding the price of health insurance in check in 1996, according to a widely watched survey.

The cost of providing health coverage for workers and retirees grew just 2.5 percent last year to \$3,915 per person, according to a survey of 3.200 employers released today by the consulting firm Foster Higgins.

It was the third year in a row rates have been flat or declining for up, the survey showed. two years, are planning increases in 1997, Foster Higgins said.

"And I think the picture for 1998 is a little nastier because of several converging factors," added John Erb, the study's chief author.

For one thing, a public backlash against limitations on care imposed by HMOs is prompting legislation mandating benefits. In 1996, most states and Congress passed laws requiring a 48-hour hospital stay for new mothers.

# Clinton calls for 'one America' in speech starting second term

WASHINGTON (AP) - With a flourish of inaugural pageantry and prose, William Jefferson Clinton claimed his second term today, issuing a passionate call for Americans to reconcile their differences and march together into the next millennium. "We must succeed as

one America," he declared.

raised his right hand and swore the president since George Washington. With that, he stood poised to be the first president of the 21st century. As cannons fired off in salute,

Clinton turned and hugged first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton and their 16-year-old daughter. He pecked them both on their cheeks as the applause swelled - then kissed them again.

Moments earlier, Al Gore took the vice presidential oath. He hopes to succeed Clinton, who became the first Democrat in 60 years to celebrate two inaugurals. Clinton cannot serve another term.

Washington's hierarchy, from Clinton's Cabinet to members of Congress, Supreme Court justices, military leaders, foreign ambassadors and political VIPS gathered at the Capitol to witness the start of Clinton's second term. House Speaker Newt Gingrich, like Clinton besieged by ethical problems, stood nearby.

Hundreds of thousands of people, braving near-freezing temperatures, swelled the Mall in front of the U.S. Capitol. It was a moment of celebration or at least a chance to witness history.

"It's a thrill of a lifetime, probably a once-in-a-lifetime thing," gushed Jean Leboff, who had just arrived from Pennsylvania.

It was a poignant moment for Clinton. His beloved mother, Virginia Kelley, stood nearby as he was sworn in as president four years ago; she died a year later. "The president and I miss Virginia

very much, particularly at a time like this." said Dick Kelley, the president's stepfather.

The first family began their day in worship at the Metropolitan African

paying tribute to Martin Luther King Jr., the slain civil rights leader whose birthday is honored today. Under clear and sunny skies,

Clinton slipped off his overcoat to take the oath of office from Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist.

The 22-minute address, unusually brief for Clinton, promises a government "humble enough" not to try to solve all the nation's ills yet 'strong enough" to help Americans improve their own lots. He called it a government of "New Promise."

"Let us build our bridge, wide enough and strong enough for every American to cross over to a blessed land of New Promise," Clinton said.

**New bishop** announced

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) - The diocese of Amarillo has a new bishop, the Rev. John Yanta, who has been serving as auxiliary bishop of the archdiocese of San Antonio.

Dear Ann Landers: While traveling in Denmark recently, I picked up an English-language newspaper and read a Reuters story thought might interest you:

"Denmark's Social Research Institute says single fathers are calmer and less likely to punish their children than lone mothers, who are often dogged by money problems.

'The daily Berlingske Tidende said yesterday a study of 1,200 children aged between 3 and 5, half living with a single mother and half with only a father, showed that the mothers were far more stressed and depressed than the men.

The single mothers have more psychiatric problems than fathers. Their self-confidence is lower, and they suffer more from nightmares. insomnia and anxiety attacks,' the paper quoted the state-run institute as saying in a report.

"Mothers have far more conflict with their children and are quicker to hit or punish their children,' the

"The paper quoted researcher Mogens Nygaard as saying women were not genetically more irritable than men but were under greater economic pressure, being more likely to be jobless or, if employed, generally lower paid than male workers.

Women also perceived society as having a more favorable attitude to men caring for their children alone

than for single mothers. "Nygaard added that only 6 percent of all single-parent children aged 3 to 5 lived with their fathers, implying that the relatively few men who actively sought responsibility for their children were strongly motivated to meet the challenges.

Flood, an All-Star center fielder of the St. Louis Cardinals who took his fight for baseball free agency all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court, died Monday of throat cancer. He was

Flood died at the UCLA Medical Center. He had been in the hospital for several months.

Although he was a three-time All-Star and a seven-time Gold Glove winner, Flood was best remembered for fighting baseball's long-standing reserve clause - rules that prohibited players from choosing which teams

they wished to play for.
"Every major league baseball player owes Curt Flood a debt of gratitude that can never be repaid," pitchers David Cone and Tom Glavine - the current AL and NL player representatives - said in a

# Weekend sports briefs Red Raiders rally for 70-64 OT win

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - Rayford Young's five-point spurt late in overtime wouldn't have happened if not for Tony Battie, sore hamstring

Battie finished with 28 points and 10 rebounds - playing all 45 minutes in the process - while freshman Young came through in the clutch to give No. 20 Texas Tech a 70-64 comeback victory over Oklahoma

"Next to (Wake Forest's Tim) Duncan, Battie is the best center in the country," Oklahoma State coach Eddie Sutton said.

Battie frustrated the Cowboys' frontcourt all night, but it was Young who saved Texas Tech (13-3, 5-1) with a 3-pointer with 1:31 left in overtime to give Raiders a 66-64 lead just seconds after OSU's Joe Adkins missed two free throws.

Young iced the game a minute later after putting back his own missed layup.

"I was wide open," Young said of his bomb that gave Tech the lead for good. "I couldn't turn it down. I just shot it."

Young and Battie, who played his first full game of the season despite the left hamstring problem that had his status in doubt until game time, credited relentless defense for the Red Raiders' rally from a 43-30 deficit early in the second half.

"I think the press may have won the game for us," said Battie, who said his hamstring bothered him the entire game.

Battie capped his performance by stuffing Brett Robisch's meaningless last-ditch shot for Tech's only block of the game.

Tech has won six of seven while OSU (9-7, 1-4) has lost four of its last six, all in conference play. Two of those losses have been to Tech, and Sutton had high praise for the team coached by his one-time protege, James Dickey.

'Next to (No. 1) Kansas, Tech is the best team in the conference," Sutton said.

The Red Raiders looked nothing of the sort midway through the game. Texas Tech went 10:41 over the

end of the first half and the beginning of the second without a field goal as OSU built their 13-point lead off a 16-1 run.

"I certainly got a lesson in coaching tonight. It was vintage Coach Sutton," Dickey said of his former boss at Arkansas and Kentucky. "This is what Big 12 basketball is all about."

After a timeout midway into the second half, the Red Raiders looked unstoppable, storming back over the next 10 minutes to tie the game at 53 when Cory Carr converted a four-point play after Chianti Roberts hacked him on a made 3-pointer.

Roberts had been OSU's leading scorer with 10 points when he fouled out on the play with 6:28 left.

Carr, who scored 15 points, had a chance to give Texas Tech a one-point lead with 27 seconds left in regulation, but he made one of two free throws and left the game tied at







# TV movie combines stories of Texas, Georgia of

made-for-television movie tonight will tell the story of an 11-year-old Texas girl and her desire to meet President Clinton before she died of

'A Child's Wish" airs on CBS one day after what would have been Melissa Weaver's 15th birthday.

Missy, the star of the two-hour show, is actually a composite of Melissa and Dixie Yandle, a 17-year-old Georgia girl who also died of cancer.

Melissa's doctors told her family to contact the Make-A-Wish Foundation in the fall of 1993 after concluding nothing more could be done for her. Her last wish was granted. She met with President Clinton five days before she died.

We flew to Vancouver to watch them make the movie. That's where we met Melissa's parents," the Georgia girl's mother, Vickie Yandle of Marietta, Ga., said Monday night.

"The first time I saw it, I cried in three different spots. The second time I saw it, I cried for two days," Mrs. Yandle said.

Melissa's parents, Kenneth and Rosy Weaver of Port Lavaca, said some things that were changed make it easier for them to watch the movie: the girl in the movie is older, has a boyfriend and doesn't resemble their daughter.

It does not absolutely reflect either family as a whole. There are

PORT LAVACA, Texas (AP) - A many small details in the film that are from our long conversations with the writer," Mrs. Weaver told the Victoria Advocate.

And there are many similarities. The father is a car salesman, the same as Dixie's father, George Yandle. The mother is a teacher, as is Mrs. Weaver. The father loses his job because of the time he took off to be with his daughter, as did Dixie's

The stars are Anna Chlumsky as Missy, John Ritter as the father, and Tess Harper as the mom. President Clinton plays himself.
It's the final 30 minutes of the

movie that tax the Weavers' emotions.

Those are the scenes depicting Melissa's meeting with Clinton. While the actual meeting at the White House was not in the Oval Office as it is in the movie, the story holds true to the actual events, Mrs. Weaver

It was a wet and drizzly day and Melissa was not feeling well, Mrs. Weaver recalled. They weren't sure she'd actually get to meet personally with the president.

The Weavers, Melissa and her two sisters, Michelle and Melinda, were invited into the White House, and as they waited in a hallway, the president appeared in his jogging

"He dropped to his knees beside Melissa's wheelchair and said, 'I'm so glad you've come to see me,"
Mrs. Weaver said. After changing clothes, Clinton returned and posed for pictures with the family.

The Weavers returned to Port Lavaca. Melissa died five days later.

"The closing scene ... the final scene, they had to stop the production," she said. "Everyone was so involved. The camera guy said he couldn't go on. Something like this touches everyone. Everyone has known someone.'

The Yandles' daughter, Dixie, was 10 when she contracted cancer. She died seven years later.

Both sets of parents say the movie

shows the importance of the Family Medical Leave Act, which Clinton

signed into law in 1993.
Vickie Yandle said her husband was his company's third top salesman out of 22 the week they fired him.

"It was the day after he got out of the hospital. He had been in intensive care for seven days. They thought he had had a heart attack, but it turned out it was all stress. The very next day that he got out, Dixie had to go in for her first chemotherapy," she

They almost lost their house, Mrs. Yandle said.

Because of the difficulty they had, she said, she began working on behalf of the Family Leave Bill, making several trips to Washington to drug up support. In one sp

she urged President Bush not to veto the bill, but he did.

When Clinton signed the bill on April 6, 1993, the Yandles were on hand for the ceremony. Dixie was too ill to go. She died two months later. Because of the Pamily Medical Leave Act, Weaver was able to take

off work in 1993 and make the trip to

the White House with his family.

The film was completed last spring but the president asked that it not be hown until after the election, Mrs.

Weaver said.
"It was by his decision that it wasn't shown. He didn't want anyone to say it was a political move," she said.






