## Hereford health agencies prepare for 'Do Not Resuscitate' directive

Hereford's healthcare system is ahead of other cities in complying with a new state law and in educating the medical community about provisions of a patient's directive, Out-of-Hospital: Do Not Resuscitate Order (DNR).

Jim Robinson, Hereford Regional Medical Center administrator, said Friday he has received calls from health care agencies in Amarillo and Lubbock, asking for information on how Hereford is handling the DNR program.

"They had heard that we were far ahead of most cities in complying with the provisions of the new law," said the hospital administrator.

Robinson attributes much of the headstart Hereford has on the new directive to the efforts of two people - Joe Hamby, EMS director, and Carolyn Simpson, RN, director of Deaf Smith Home Care.

In 1995, under Chapter 674 of the Texas Health and Safety Code, a state law was passed creating the DNR advance directive. Simpson points out that federal regulations require that Medicare/Medicaid providers must inform beneficiaries under their care and new admissions of the

availability of this new advance directive.

Simply stated, the DNR provides terminally ill persons with the option of declining some processes of resuscitation, when the person is unable to speak for themselves.

The form may be executed by a competent, conscious person who has been diagnosed by a physician as having a terminal condition. The order applies to only six processes of resuscitation: cardiac compression,

tracheal intubation, artificial ventilation, defibrillation, cardiac pacing, and the administration of cardiac resuscitation medications.

Hamby said the DNR is not designed to cover the issues addressed by a Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care, or a directive to physician. That is, it will not name an agent to make health care decisions or prevent the administration of life sustaining procedures other than the processes listed on the

DNR form.

"I think we started work on the program too early," said Simpson. "We were supposed to have the DNR forms and information available by mid-January of '97, but the state didn't get us all the information in time to meet the deadline."

The DNR form is a state-approved document with a distinctive logo, unlike advance directives which may

## Clinton defends Gore, renews pledge for highest standards

WASHINGTON (AP) - After a week of embarrassing disclosures about White House fund raising, President Clinton said Friday that "I'm not sure, frankly" whether he also made calls for campaign cash. But he insisted that nothing has undercut his pledge to have the highest ethical standards ever.

At a 51-minute news conference dominated by fund-raising questions, Clinton adamantly defended Vice

President Al Gore and the first lady's top aide as "highly ethical people" and said that neither "would ever knowingly do anything wrong."

However, Clinton said, "I think we should be held to a higher standard than just: 'It is legal.'"

Trying to shift the blame away from his administration for questionable practices, the president lamented a campaign process that he said takes too long and requires too much

money. "The system is out of whack," he declared, calling anew for campaign finance reforms.

Despite persistent questioning, the president generally adopted a smiling, easygoing stance. Yet he seemed uncomfortable at times with the questions.

Clinton met with reporters in the stately East Room on the heels of disclosures that Gore had used his White House office on several occasions to solicit campaign donations. It was also revealed that Maggie Williams, the chief of staff to Hillary Rodham Clinton, had accepted a \$50,000 check at the White House for the Democratic National Committee.

The president said he did not believe that those disclosures - along with news of White House coffees and sleepovers for big-money donors - undermine his promise to have the highest ethical standards of any White House.

"I just simply disagree that it is wrong for a president to ask his friends and supporters to spend time with him," Clinton said.

Despite suggestions to the contrary, Clinton said, "I don't believe you can find any evidence of the fact that I had changed government policy solely because of a contribution."

Gore's solicitations have been attacked by some Democrats as unseemly and improper. Gov. Roy Romer of Colorado, the new chairman of the Democratic National Committee, said Williams' actions were "wrong" and "ill-advised."

Clinton acknowledged he might have made White House calls like Gore's.

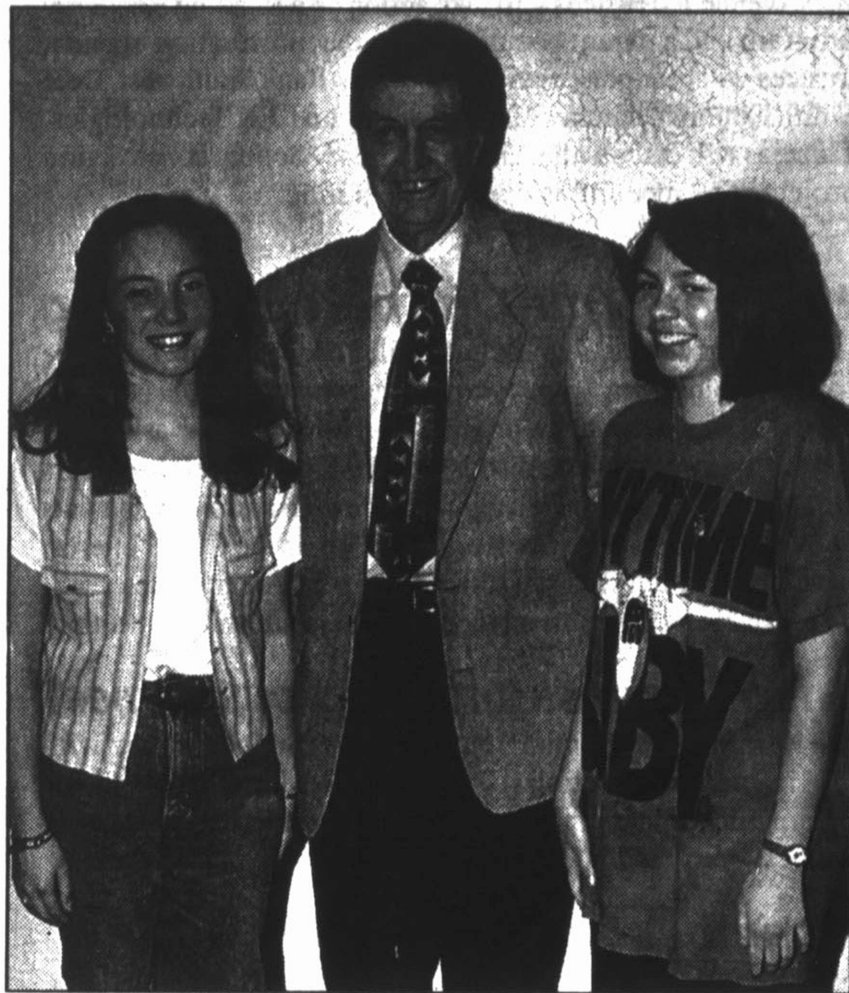
"I'm not sure, frankly," the president said. "I don't like to raise funds in that way."

He said he preferred to talk with people face to face but said that fund raising might have come up in the many telephone calls he's had over the last four years. "I simply can't say that I've never done it," Clinton said. "But it's not what I like to do and it wasn't a practice of mine. And once I remember in particular I was asked to do it and I just never got around to doing it."

Clinton applauded Gore for saying he would never make solicitation calls from the White House again. And he said it would have been better if Williams, "in view of the environment in which we now are," had told Johnny Chung to give his check directly to the Democratic National Committee.

Chung, a California businessman, gave the Democratic Party \$366,000 over the last three years and was rewarded with extraordinary White House access. Clinton said he had wrongly assumed the White House had a screening process to keep out questionable visitors.

He said he did not recall when he first met Chung and never saw a National Security Council memo that warned that Chung was a "hustler." Even without knowledge of that memo, Clinton said, he had raised questions about pictures of himself with Chung and five Chinese officials

Erin plays the piano and shows animals in 4-H. She is scheduled to perform in piano competition in Lubbock on the same day as the Regional Bee. Mrs. Louder hopes to work out the scheduling so Erin can do both. Erin also plays basketball at Community Christian and is a band student.

## A trio of Hereford wrestlers hope to be leaving Las Vegas with world titles next weekend

For Rip Evers this is a time of anticipation and excitement. A time of feeling the butterflies flutter in the pit of the stomach, causing an uneasy tingling to creep up and down the spine.

In essence, it's the best of times for the veteran Hereford wrestling coach. And the worst of times.

Evers, a former world champion who went head-to-head with some of the legendary personas in the business, hopes to hit a jackpot when he takes three local wrestlers to Las Vegas next weekend for the 1997 Junior World Championships. Hereford's Jeremiah Beltran, Kris Cathey and Joe Lira are among 3,000 wrestlers - some from as far away as Asia and Europe - who are scheduled to invade Nevada's largest city in hopes of finding one thing: a gold medal. The meet, which is being sponsored by former two-time Olympic gold medalist Danny Hodges, will last three days, beginning on March 14.

"I think I'm more nervous than they are," said Evers, who actually had five wrestlers qualified for the event. "The kids have been working real hard, and I think they all have a pretty good chance. My biggest concern is that when they get there and get out with all the glitz involved in the championships that they might get butterflies."

"It will be a completely different thing for them. I've been telling them to look at as just another tournament," he stated.

Hereford matmen Kris Hammerbeck and Javier Alonzo also qualified for the tournament, but will not make the trip.

Evers and the three wrestlers are slated to depart for the double-elimination tournament on Friday morning. Beltran, Cathey and Lira will weigh-in that night in a pageantry-filled meeting, which will be

held in the Circus Circus casino. The matches are slated to begin Saturday morning at 8 a.m.

Beltran is one of the top-ranked young wrestlers heading into the tournament. The Texas Amateur Wrestling Association's Wrestler of the Year has lost just once in his career - a point-based decision to a wrestler from Alaska several months ago. Over the past year, the 6-foot-2, 275-pounder has posted a 33-1 record, including a convincing win in the Texas State Finals in Amarillo last month.

"I think his chances are excellent," said Evers. "The only thing that could hurt him is the excitement involved. As far as wrestling ability and strength, he is right up there with everyone."

Beltran will be competing in the 15- & Under, 275-pound Division.

He isn't the only title candidate, however. Evers said Cathey and Lira both also had excellent chances in the meet, which will be held in the Cimmerron High School gym.

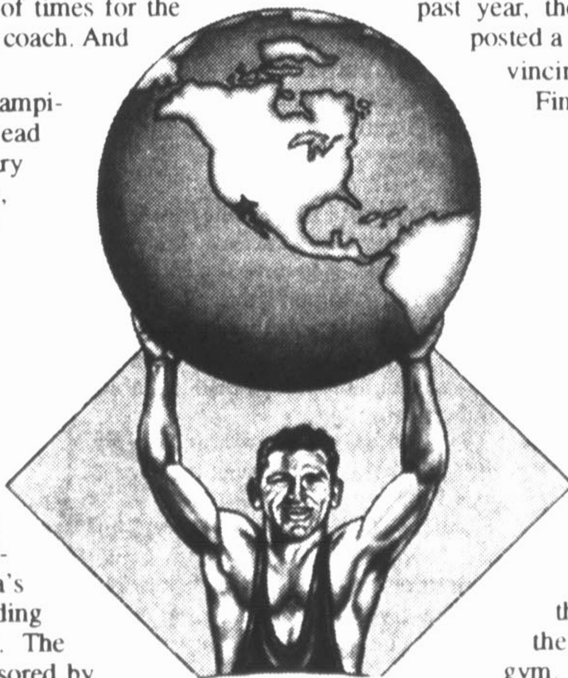
"If Kris keeps his head he'll be okay. He's determined that he's going to place. And I expect Joe to do real well because he's very fast, and strong."

Cathey is slated to wrestle in the 18 & Under, 215-pound Division, while Lira will compete in the 18 & Under, 145-pound category.

Wrestlers, who could take to the mat as many as eight or nine times in a single day, will compete until only one remains. Some divisions, Evers said, could contain upwards of 70 contestants.

Should Beltran, Cathey or Lira manage to place among the top six in their respective divisions, they would earn automatic bids to the next level of the amateur wrestling hierarchy - the Junior Olympics, which will be held in Charlotte, North Carolina later this year.

For now, though, having his kids leaving Texas without butterflies...and leave Las Vegas with gold worries Evers most.

## Lottery tickets land two men in area jail

CANYON, Texas (AP) - The unluckiest scratch-off lottery in Texas landed two men in jail on Friday. The men will face charges after police in Canyon arrested them for trying to cash in tickets stolen in a crash-and-grab burglary in nearby Amarillo earlier in the day.

The suspects' identities were not available Friday evening.

The men will face theft charges in Amarillo, where about \$7,000 worth of tickets were snatched after a car was driven through the front doors of

D.J.'s Quick Stop.

The bandits abandoned the car and took 34 packs of tickets, Lottery Commission spokesman Steve Levine said.

The tickets became worthless as soon as store owners reported them stolen. When the suspects tried to cash in the loot at a store in nearby Canyon, bar codes on the tickets tipped off clerks, who called police.

"These idiots went to a whole lot of trouble for nothing," Amarillo police spokesman Mike Shumate said.

## Airlines raise fares after new ticket tax

NEW YORK (AP) - The nation's largest carriers, forced to pay a renewed 10 percent ticket tax, are playing a game of air-fare chicken.

"John Q. Consumer better sit around and wait until the dust settles, probably by Monday morning," said Tom Parsons, editor of Best Fares magazine.

After the government reinstated the ticket tax, Northwest, United and Continental raised prices 4 percent Friday.

Delta, US Airways and American Airlines kept rates the same, although American warned that it might raise prices. Southwest Airlines not only kept fares the same but brought back a 2-for-1 ticket promotion it had dropped in April.

Parsons said the airlines soon will settle on either the 4 percent increase or no increase at all.

"This is typical when you have a major change in the pricing environment," Delta spokesman William Berry said. "It's probably going to take most of the weekend before we have a better understanding."

Airline bookings typically slack off during the weekend because business travelers aren't making plans and many travel agencies are closed.

That gives the airlines time to check competitors' fares and wait for either low fares to evaporate or high fares to drop. However the fares shake out, travelers can expect another round of sales soon, Parsons said.

## Bank robber suspect shoots, kills himself

HAPPY, Texas (AP) - A suspected Amarillo bank robber shot and killed himself Friday after a failed attempt to flee authorities, police said.

A Bank One branch in Amarillo was robbed just before noon. After he told tellers he had a gun under his coat and received an undetermined amount of money, he left the building without incident.

However, a dye pack hidden among the cash exploded, staining the man and causing him to drop some of the money, which caused a

scramble among onlookers in the parking lot.

Later, his stolen pickup truck was spotted about 45 miles south of Happy in Swisher County. The man rolled the truck as he tried to evade arrest, then shot himself in the head, an Amarillo police report said.

He was pronounced dead at a hospital in Swisher County. His identity was withheld pending notification of family.

A woman who was in the car, but not believed by police to be involved in the bank robbery, wasn't injured.

# Prime Minister's Cabinet agrees to withdraw 9 percent of troops

JERUSALEM (AP) - Palestinians stoned Israeli soldiers who did not leave the West Bank on Friday, and Yasser Arafat said he was "completely shocked" when he learned a planned troop pullback gives him only a third of the territory he had expected.

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's Cabinet narrowly approved a plan early Friday to withdraw troops from 9 percent of the West Bank's rural areas as part of the U.S.-backed peace accords.

The agreement stipulates a three-phase pullback, which was to begin Friday and conclude by mid-1998. The size of each withdrawal is not defined.

The Palestinians expect to be in control of 90 percent of the West Bank by the third stage, but Israeli leaders say they plan to retain control of half the West Bank. Final borders

will be set in talks on a permanent peace agreement to begin this month and conclude by May 1999.

In the West Bank village of Beit Omar, dozens of Palestinians stoned Israeli soldiers, who responded with tear gas. The stone-throwers apparently were upset that troops hadn't withdrawn on Friday as expected.

"People were disappointed. ... They thought today they would wake up and find Beit Omar liberated and under Palestinian authority," said Mohammed Abu Ayash, a 35-year-old farmer from Beit Omar.

Israeli media said Beit Omar was to be handed to Palestinian control this weekend, although the government has not provided details of the pullback. There were no signs Friday that Israeli troops had begun withdrawing from any of the other places mentioned in the Cabinet-ap-

proved plan. Meanwhile, Netanyahu defended himself against hard-line critics, saying he was giving the Palestinians the smallest amount of land he felt he could get away and still keep the peace process going.

Under the plan, 7 percent of the West Bank will be transferred from joint Israeli-Palestinian control to full Palestinian oversight. Another 2 percent now under Israeli occupation will come under joint control. Palestinians now have full control over 2.8 percent of the land and partial control over 24 percent.

"We are talking here about the most minimal thing," Netanyahu said.

Palestinian leaders said they felt betrayed by Israel. Yasser Arafat said he was "completely shocked" when informed of the scope of the Israeli withdrawal.

"This is a clear violation of the peace agreement," Arafat said.

Ahmed Qureia, the speaker of the Palestinian legislative council, suggested Palestinians should leave the peace talks.

"It is a shame for the Palestinians to continue talks with a partner who imposes his own conditions," he said.

Palestinian negotiator Assad Abdel Rahman said Arafat told Secretary of State Madeleine Albright, who telephoned during a Palestinian Cabinet meeting late Friday, that the Palestinians were growing restless.

"A crisis atmosphere is gathering momentum in the street. ... Unless something is done by the international committee to put the peace process back on track, the population might explode," Arafat was quoted as telling Albright.

After the Israeli Cabinet decision, State Department spokesman Nicholas Burns said the United States believes Israel is committed to the peace process, but hopes it "will do more in the second and third phases."

Israel, with U.S. backing, has said it alone will decide how much land to hand over in each of the three stages.

Netanyahu suggested Friday that future pullbacks would depend on Palestinians keeping their promises, such as disarming Islamic militants. He also warned that he would stop the peace talks should Palestinians resort to violence.

In the disputed city of Jerusalem, 2,000 Palestinians held a prayer protest Friday on a hill in Arab east Jerusalem where Israel wants to build a large Jewish housing project. Organizers held back demonstrators trying to confront Israeli police.

Palestinians are angry about the plan to build 6,500 apartments at the site, saying it will make it increasingly difficult to establish a Palestinian capital in east Jerusalem, which was captured by Israel in 1967.

At U.N. headquarters in New York on Friday, the United States vetoed a European-sponsored resolution in the Security Council criticizing Israel's plan to build the apartments.

## Flood aftermath causes painful new discoveries

FALMOUTH, Ky. (AP) - Even as people downriver awaited the arrival of the flooding Ohio River's slowly advancing crests, those in its aftermath were still making painfully fresh discoveries.

"We kind of expected it to be bad, but once you see it, it really hits you," said Randy McQueen, 27, as he and his wife hugged each other after entering their warped house in this northern Kentucky town. "Everything's a total loss."

"I've cried so much my face hurts," said Lisa McQueen. She was one of many left in tears and even sobs after townspeople were allowed to return to their homes Friday, nearly a week since flooding began March 1.

be produced and copied by many sources. The logo is designed to quickly inform the EMS response team that the Do Not Resuscitate form is valid.

The form is filled out by the person, or person's agent, and the person's attending physician and is witnessed by the individuals who are not related to or caring for the person completing the form.

The DNR form should remain with the person wherever he/she goes, and the person may also wear a state-approved identification bracelet or necklace. The form and ID may be obtained only from the person's doctor.

Hamby said it is the presence of the form bracelet, or necklace which informs the EMS, home health, or hospice that the resuscitation efforts usually required by practice standards are not required.

Simpson said physicians and health care workers are required by law to honor an advance directive if they know it exists. For that reason, it is wise to have multiple copies made of the directives and give them to all health care agencies involved with the patient's care.

Simpson said the DNR forms and

the ID bracelets are now available locally.

Texas law allows Texans to use three different advance directives: 1. Out-of-Hospital DNR order; 2. Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care (DPOA); and 3. Directive to Physician (also known as a Living Will).

Anyone over the age of 18 may obtain and fill out any of the advance directives. The easiest way to obtain advance directive forms, with more information on the requirements and regulations governing them, is to ask your physician, health care provider, home health agency, or hospice.

Hereford EMS and Deaf Smith Home Care will be providing public education programs as service of Hereford Regional Medical Center.

killer tornadoes in Arkansas one week ago today and flooding since in West Virginia, Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky, and Tennessee have claimed at least 58 lives.

Vice President Al Gore planned a tour today of disaster spots with stops in Huntington, W. Va.; Vinton, Ohio; Lebanon Junction, Ky.; and Bogota, Tenn.

President Clinton has declared federal disasters in a total 89 counties, most along the Ohio.

The Ohio crested almost 16 feet above flood stage Friday in Louisville, at 38.8 feet. Normal river level at this time of year is 12 feet, and the water was not expected to drop significantly until Sunday. Some western Kentucky towns don't expect

a crest for a week. In Grandview, Ind., where a crest is expected Sunday, water churned up from storm drains and advanced on Main Street, forcing even the most stubborn defenders to end efforts to hold back the Ohio with sandbags. The only businesses still open were a liquor store and a tavern.

The Ohio was expected to rise 2 more feet and cover Main Street before cresting here Sunday. About half of Grandview's 800 residents had left Friday.

Ellen Hardesty, her husband and three children had left their mobile home two days earlier, but she returned Friday to have the National Guard collect some clothing and other belongings. Soon she was headed out of town, her pickup truck loaded with mattresses, a bicycle, a wooden table and clothing.

"We didn't have a home to go to," she said. "That was the worst part."

A few miles upstream in Troy, Jim and Joyce Efinger refused to leave their three-story house that has stood on the river bank since the early 1860s. They are depending on the home's 21-inch-thick sandstone walls to protect them.

"We're going to stick it out," Efinger said, "because this is our home and anything I can do to save it, well, we're going to try to save it."

Back in Falmouth, 17-year-old Andrea Pennington walked down the middle of her street Friday, clutching her stuffed monkey tight to her chest. "I've had him all my life, my great-grandmother gave him to me," she said. "I'm just happy I still have him."

Rosalee Lafolett didn't know what to cry about first as her eyes kept refilling. All three houses and trailers she owns are damaged. Her hometown is in ruins. And this week, her brother-in-law, Charles Lafolett, 75, drowned in West Virginia.

His body was taken to Grants Lick, Ky., the nearest funeral home that wasn't under water, for services this weekend.

# El Hormiguero Project to send group to California

El Hormiguero Project, a rural community outreach geared towards Hispanic small landowners, is sending a group of nine persons on a six-day exchange visit to California the week of March 12-17.

The project is sponsored by the Promised Land Network, an ecumenical rural outreach sponsored by the Catholic Diocese of Amarillo.

The small farmers are residents of rural colonies in Deaf Smith and Castro counties. While in California, they will have an opportunity to interact and exchange ideas with Hispanic farmers who sell their produce through farmers' markets and follow organic farming techniques.

The Texas group will also visit sustainable agriculture training centers in the Central Valley and Bay Area of California. They will focus on raised-bed bio-intensive mini-farming, dryland agriculture, community supported agriculture (CSA) and small animal production. Tours will be conducted

in Spanish.

Lydia Villanueva, lead organizer and coordinator for El Hormiguero Project, will accompany the group, along with Ken Hargesheimer, training supervisor with Llano Estacado Organic Gardeners in Lubbock.

"The people going on the trip are leaders, and they're real excited about having the privilege to travel and learn about methods with people like themselves, one on one," said Villanueva. "They will bring back whatever they learn and teach to those we work with at five sites around the Panhandle."

Father Darryl Birkenfeld, PLN director and a doctoral student at University of California-Berkeley.

El Hormiguero Project was started by PLN in 1994, offering training to rural Hispanic residents in community building, leadership skills and sustainable land management. Citizenship classes are offered to residents through the Diocese of Lubbock Catholic Family Services.

Colonia residents recently participated in a three-day course in Spanish at San Jose Community Center. It outlined principles of a land management model called Holistic Resource Management (HRM). Last summer project members grew a community garden that marketed \$300 worth of produce. They plan to set up a CSA in two colonias for the new growing season.

In addition, monthly meetings are held to build community organizations responsible for working on shared concerns like road improvements, water availability and health care services.

Funding for El Hormiguero's California/Texas exchange is provided by a grant from the National Center for Appropriate Technology in Butte, Mt. Additional funding support for community leadership training comes from the U.S. Catholic conference Campaign for Human Development.

## Auditors discover U.N.D.P. overpaid some contractors

UNITED NATIONS (AP) - In what could be a major fraud case spanning three continents, 16 current and former U.N. staffers are under investigation after auditors discovered a U.N. agency overpaid contractors by at least \$6 million.

James Gustave Speth, the director of the U.N. Development Program, said two staffers have been suspended, and his agency had stopped all construction projects.

The agency, known as UNDP, is headquartered in New York City and manages U.N. economic development programs in 174 countries and territories.

Speth did not indicate the reasons for the overpayments. He said an

investigation was under way on three continents to get to the bottom of the case.

Speth, an American, refused to identify the staffers by name or position pending completion of the investigation. He said the irregularities were uncovered during a series of investigations by private auditors hired by his organization.

"Subject to due process, swift and appropriate corrective actions will be taken," Speth said. "Sanctions will be applied to staff members wherever required, including dismissal, reprimand and return of funds."

He said U.N. investigators were gathering evidence about possible overbilling over a period of eight

years for construction of houses for UNDP staffers as well as office space used by other U.N. agencies.

Speth said the irregularities turned up in UNDP operations in Zambia, Uganda, Maldives, Ghana, Mozambique, Comoros, Sao Tome, Cape Verde and Guinea-Bissau. The \$6 million in overpayments represents 13 percent of the agency's payments from a special construction and housing fund as of Dec. 31, Speth said.

"We shall hold them accountable," Speth said of those involved. "All of us in UNDP are deeply disturbed by the findings. I will do everything in my power to ensure nothing like this ever happens again."

Most UNDP operations take place in poor countries without adequate infrastructure, thereby requiring the agency to build its own staff housing and office buildings.

The possible fraud emerges at a time when President Clinton is asking Congress to approve a significant increase in U.S. contributions to UNDP.

The White House has asked Congress to earmark \$100 million for UNDP, whose expenses are funded through voluntary contributions and not the regular U.N. budget.

Congress had slashed America's contributions from about \$113 million at its high point to as low as \$52 million in 1996. For 1997, Congress increased the contribution to \$75 million.

## Rwandan refugees attack own people

LUBUTU, Zaire (AP) - At a narrow wooden bridge over the Luberinga River lie hints of a tragedy: a toddler's shoes, heaps of clothes, sacks of corn - all jettisoned when Rwandan refugees opened fire on one another.

Former officers in the Rwandan army, now among the refugees, attacked their own people in frustration after being chased away - once again - by Zairian rebels, rebel commander Augustin Zeh said.

One of the refugees, Paul Rwasondo, said rebels drove the refugees from Tingi-Tingi camp to Lubutu, four miles east, last week. He said men opened fire when they reached Lubutu, killing more than 100 people.

No corpses remained on the bridge Friday, a week after the attack. But the trampled belongings of panicked Rwandans were there, and the stench of rotting flesh rose from the river, where a few tangled bodies floated downstream.

A breeze carries the sickeningly sweet smell of death through Lubutu, where bare shelves in shops looted by Zairian troops can be seen through open doors, and the red bougainvillea flowers stand in bright contrast to the gloom of a near ghost town.

Even before the refugees arrived, Lubutu's residents had fled. On Feb. 8, Zairian troops ran through the only street, springing padlocks and emptying every shop.

The refugees took whatever was left.

It's a familiar pattern. From the border towns of Goma and Bukavu west to Lubutu and beyond, towns along eastern Zaire's war front have been ravaged more by larcenous retreating troops than by the fighting itself.

Since September, the rebels advanced to capture the eastern third of the country. On Friday, they were only a few miles from the strategic northeastern city of Kisangani.

In addition to the army of Zairian President Mobutu Sese Seko, the rebels are fighting Rwandan Hutu soldiers who fled to Zaire with a million of their countrymen in 1994.

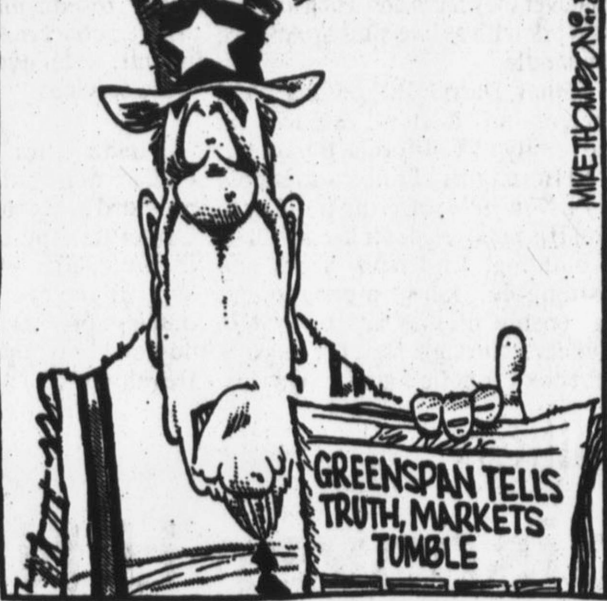

## Editorials from around the State

A sampling of editorial comment from Texas newspapers:

**Valley Morning Star (Harlingen) on habitual criminals:** America is facing a dilemma we shouldn't have to confront. What should we do with dangerous men who have already served their prison time?

An Associated Press story asked that question after Lawrence Singleton admitted stabbing a prostitute to death last week in Florida. The 69-year-old predator was released from prison after a mere eight years for raping a teen-ager, cutting off her arms and leaving her dead by the side of the road.

It is fair to ask whether the criminal justice system shares the blame in the death of Singleton's latest victim. ...

More than half of those convicted criminals out on parole or probation are caught committing new crimes within three years of their release. Surely, there must be something Americans can do to protect ourselves from these repeat offenders. ...

While there are no easy answers to America's violent crime problem, there is no great dilemma. Americans simply must find ways to keep violent criminals locked up longer. ...

Have the gumption to keep them behind bars for the duration of the sentences they are given.

**The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal on juvenile crime:** Some bipartisan efforts are more promising than others. While it might be hard for Republicans and Democrats to agree on such things as entitlement spending or budget balancing, they can come together more easily on other issues.

Optimistically speaking, it appears that one of the "easy" issues may be America's growing problem of juvenile crime.

President Clinton announced a crime bill last week that has several similarities with one that was earlier introduced by U.S. Rep. Bill McCollum, R-Fla., chairman of the House Judiciary Committee's crime subcommittee. U.S. Attorney General Janet Reno promised House members from both parties that she would combine elements of both bills into a mutually acceptable bill.

A key part of both bills is the establishment of appropriate responses to every juvenile offense. Juvenile offenders would learn that breaking the law brings punishment and that the punishment becomes more severe with subsequent offenses.

**Conroe Courier on keeping TAAS:**

A proposal by State Board of Education member Donna Ballard to abolish the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills test came out of left field and should return there as quickly as possible.

Ballard came out swinging against the test last week, complaining that teachers have begun teaching the TAAS to the exclusion of giving students a well-rounded education.

She argues that teachers feel compelled to spend their time teaching the test because of the state's accountability system. Texas law requires the 15-member education board to administer an accountability system that takes into consideration student test scores, among other items. Those scores are a key factor in the ratings given annually to school districts and campuses, and starting next year will be used to evaluate teacher performance.

In addition to evaluating school and teacher performance, the exit-level TAAS, administered starting in the 10th grade, is required for students to graduate high school.

For the above reasons, Texas would be taking a major step backward if it eliminated the TAAS.

TAAS provides parents, legislators and school administrators with a tool to compare their child's school with other schools and help determine how good a job the schools are doing. TAAS is the best statewide measure yet of school performance and shows how schools are doing in teaching the state curriculum.

Oddly enough, Ballard uses similar logic to argue for replacing TAAS with a national, norm-referenced test such as the Iowa Test of Basic Skills. "Without a nationally recognized test, Texas parents cannot accurately measure the performance of Texas schools," Ballard was recently quoted as saying.

Now, why is it good for Texans to compare their schools with schools from other states, but bad for Texans to use their own test to compare their schools with others across the state?

If Ballard is concerned that TAAS is used to evaluate teacher performance, that issue can be addressed without eliminating the TAAS. Perhaps legislators and the Texas Education Agency should look at whether or not the accountability system places too great an emphasis on the TAAS. But the concept of having a standard of achievement against which every student and school in Texas can be measured is valid, and should not be abandoned.

**Oil and Gas  
 on the Front Burner**

Most Texans don't need to be reminded that domestic oil and gas production is one of the most strategically important industries in our country.

But I am concerned that the rest of the country does not fully realize how important energy independence is to America: it is the lynchpin of our national security and of our continued economic stability and growth.

In this era of cheap, plentiful foreign oil, the lessons about energy independence we learned back in the 1970s — when the Arab oil embargo caused severe economic dislocation — are going unheeded. I believe greater public awareness of these issues is essential.

In January I was named co-chair of the Congressional Oil and Gas Caucus, a bipartisan coalition of senators and representatives focused on energy issues. I intend to use this platform to raise public awareness of what is at risk. My priorities in this position will include:

*Tax relief to encourage oil and gas drilling and*

*production, especially for marginal wells and difficult-to-develop formations.*

We must work to adopt an agenda that encourages capital formation for oil and natural gas exploration, development and production. Federal policy should aim for the maximum recovery of domestic oil and gas resources through initiatives that will maintain existing production and promote the use of advanced drilling and recovery technologies.

*Shifting more responsibilities to state and local regulators.*

Currently, certain activities are regulated by the federal Bureau of Land Management as well as state oil and gas conservation agencies. This duplication of effort is expensive, counterproductive and unnecessary. Right now, too many producers, particularly in the natural gas industry, spend as much on regulatory compliance as they do on exploration and production. This does not make sense.

Environmentally responsible development of our domestic oil and gas resources will contribute to a freer, stronger and more economically competitive nation in the 21st century. The re-evaluation of federal environmental regulations is urgently needed.

I am particularly concerned about regulations regarding produced water discharges that clearly pose no threat to surface waters. And I am also concerned about the Environmental Protection Agency's proposed new National Ambient Air Quality Standards, which are scientifically untested.

Since 1995, the United States has imported more than 50 percent of its oil supply — a clear threat to our national security. It is time for this issue to go from the back burner to the front.

We have developed a legislative and regulatory agenda that will allow this industry — and America — to grow stronger. And we intend to see it initiated.

**Proposed legislation on divorce restriction causes much conflict**

DALLAS (AP) - When the 35-year-old nurse decided that a broken nose and jaw was enough, she left her husband in the middle of the night, her two young children and two garbage bags full of clothes in tow.

She sought a no-fault divorce, citing irreconcilable differences, when he didn't want to call it off.

The Palestine woman sees proposed legislation to make it harder for a husband or wife to walk away from a marriage against the other's wishes as a "red flag to an obsessive control freak if they don't want to let their spouse go."

Current law allows a divorce with only one party's consent and a 60-day waiting period. Neither party has to be found at fault for the breakup.

Some Texas lawmakers are seeking to make the requirements for dissolving a marriage more restrictive.

"We believe that marriage is important enough to the state of Texas that if people are going to get divorced and destroy families, they ought to at least stand up and say why," said Rep. Arlene Wohlgenuth, R-Burleson, one of five authors of the proposal that is awaiting a committee hearing.

"We have made it easier to break the contract of marriage than to break the lease on a rental car."

Between 1970 and 1995, divorces in Texas peaked at 6.9 per 1,000 population, state figures show. About 97,000 divorces were granted in 1995, the last year for which complete data was available. That's a rate of 5.2 per 1,000.

The proposed legislation would require both parties' consent for divorce and, if they are not the parents of children younger than 18, a one-year waiting period.

If the couple have children or only one party consents, a divorce could be granted if one spouse proves the other was at fault — such as being absent, unfaithful, abusive or a convicted felon.

"We are seeing all these problems with juvenile crime, and a large percentage of those cases are from divorced homes where there is no father," Ms. Wohlgenuth said. "Fathers are important people. Mothers are important people. Let's keep fathers and mothers together."

Advocates for victims of domestic violence are among those who think reviving a fault requirement after 27 years is a bad idea.

Karen Perkins, executive director of the Women's Center of Tarrant County, contends that because many violent men are stalkers, women and children may be in greater danger if it takes longer to get divorced.

"We don't need to throw up barriers in the path of mothers getting away from a violent marriage," Ms. Perkins said.

University of Texas law professor Sarah Buel, who teaches a course on domestic violence and the law, said she sympathizes with the goal of lawmakers.

"I, too, want families to stay

together, but not if the price is continuing to bury the number of victims we are around this state and around the country," she said.

Many lawyers who specialize in divorce are critical of the bill.

"I think it's a giant step backwards," said Fort Worth attorney Jim Loveless.

Several divorce attorneys related anecdotes about private investigators pairing with prostitutes to stage adulterous situations so one spouse could sue to end a marriage.

Noted Dallas family lawyer Louise Raggio, who helped assemble the Texas Family Code, said she fears that a return to finding someone at fault is "just a vehicle for fraud and lying."

But she also advocates a one-year waiting period in some cases and favors sending parents to seminars about how a breakup affects kids.

Family law Judge Richard Johnson of Dallas requires parents and children going through a divorce to attend such a 4½-hour program.

"I don't ask them, I order them, because to me that's the way that we're going to stop the juvenile delinquency problem," he said.

**Names of Texas towns difficult to pronounce**

DALLAS - Several years ago, when the Superconducting Super Collider was under construction near Waxahachie, a story made the rounds about the scientists who were commuting into the rural area from around the world.

Some of the scientists had gone to a nearby Dairy Queen for lunch. They were puzzled by the unusual Indian name of the town. One of them politely asked the waitress, "Would you be so kind as to explain to us exactly how you pronounce the name of this place?"

She looked puzzled herself for a moment. Then she patiently explained in a drawn-out, Central Texas accent, "DAY-uh-ree Kuh-WEEN."

Of course, what they wanted to know was how to pronounce Wox-uh-HATCH-ih. But that didn't occur to the waitress, because the name of the town doesn't seem unusual to people who live there.

The story may strike a familiar chord with anybody who has puzzled over some of the colorful names for Texas towns.

One most often mispronounced is Refugio. The town of 3,110 is now famous as the birthplace of Nolan Ryan. It was named for the last Spanish mission established in Texas: Nuestra Senora del Refugio (Our Lady of Refuge). But it's not pronounced Ree-FOO-gee-oh - it's Reh-FYOOR-ih-oh.

You can check for yourself in a little book called "Texas Towns from A to Z." It's just hitting the bookstores this month. The handy pronunciation guide for 1,400 Texas towns is the work of Bill and Clare Bradfield of Dallas. They decided it was time to help all the broadcasters and political candidates who stumble over names like Mexia, Diboll, Falfurrias and Quitaque. It's Muh-HAY-uh, DYE-bawl, Fal-FOO-rih-uhs and KIT-uh-kway.

Thumbing through the book, you may discover you've been mispro-

nouncing some burgs yourself. Natives call Miami Mye-AM-uh. Not to be confused with the Middle Eastern country, the West Texas town of Iran is pronounced Eye-ruh-ANN. Leakey is actually LAY-kih. In Spanish, Lamesa would be Lah-MAY-sah, but to the Panhandle residents it's Luh-MEE-suh. Chillicothe should come out Chil-ih-KAH-thih and Nacogdoches is Nak-uh-DOH-chis.

To double-check the pronunciations, the Bradfields often called the town mayor, newspaper editor or librarian and sounded them out. In the process, they discovered a wealth of anecdotes about how many of the towns got their names.

The town of Blessing, in Matagorda County, was blessed by postal officials only after they rejected the town's first choice: "Thank God." The townspeople were thankful, you see, that a railroad line had been extended into the area.

"So many towns were named for railroad people," Mrs. Bradfield says. "The railroads were ace-high back then. When the railroad came through your area, you were proud because it meant prosperity. People

didn't demonstrate and say 'Get your tracks out of my town.'"

Balmorhea was named in honor of the town founders Balcom, Morrow and Rhea, taking three letters from each name. Delmita got its name from founder Nicefora G. Pena. He simply asked each of his seven sons to draw a letter of the alphabet in a sort of lottery. The seven letters they drew were combined into Delmita, which sounds Spanish, but is more like Scrabble.

If you guessed Kamay, a town of 642 near Wichita Falls, was pronounced like the Camay soap, you'd be wrong. The town was founded as Kemp City by some land investors named Joe Kemp, W. Munger and Reese Allen. They also founded the K-M-A Oil Co., forming the name from the initials of their last names.

## Raiders, Longhorns eliminated from Big 12 basketball tourney

Hopes for Big 12 basketball titles for Texas Tech and Texas have been dashed, but Texas Christian has hung on all the way to the Western Athletic Conference final.

No. 16 Iowa State escaped with a 72-70 win over the Red Raiders on Friday when Cory Carr's 3-point try at the buzzer rimmed out. With the win, the Cyclones moved on to Saturday's Big 12 semifinal in Kansas City, Mo., against No. 1 Kansas. The Jayhawks beat Oklahoma State 74-59.

Meanwhile, 10th-seeded Missouri got crucial free throws from Jeff Hafer and Jason Sutherland in the final two minutes to beat second-seeded Texas 80-75 Friday night and advance to Saturday's Big 12 semifinal against Oklahoma. The Sooners beat No. 18 Colorado 55-41 in their quarterfinal.

Meanwhile, the Horned Frogs continued to ride a hot hand, beating Tulsa 64-59 to advance to Saturday's WAC final in Las Vegas against No. 3 Utah. The Utes beat No. 14 New Mexico at the buzzer, 72-70.

In the Big 12, Iowa State's Dedrick Willoughby scored 28 points, including the free throw with 2:48 left to play that provided the winning margin over the rallying Red Raiders.

Tech's Stanley Bonewitz had made a leaning 3-point shot with 5.1 seconds to play.

"When they banked that shot late in the game, I thought 'That's it. It's over,'" said Iowa State coach Tim Floyd of Bonewitz' shot.

Then Carr drove the length of the court to try the winning shot, but to no avail.

Tech held Deuce Jones out of the game after the NCAA reported that he was not making sufficient academic progress. Tech pulled Gracen Averil from the game shortly after the start of the second half after learning he was having similar problems.

"We did take decisive action and we will look into this matter further," said Tech athletic director Gerald Meyers, who declined further comment. Coach James Dickey also declined comment.

Missouri was a crowd favorite in Kansas City's Kemper Arena as the Tigers used a 10-1 scoring run after Texas' Reggie Freeman picked up his fourth foul with 10:39 left to play. Freeman wound up with 25 points to lead the Longhorns.

Sutherland had 17 to pace the Tigers.

"It was a hard-fought game," said Texas coach Tom Penders. "Our kids played their hearts out. But Missouri played very well."

But in the WAC tournament, the Horned Frogs appear to be charmed. Prince Fowler made two free throws to open a 62-59 TCU lead with 15 seconds left. Mike Jones added two more free throws with 1.5 seconds left to cap the scoring for the Frogs.

For the first time, people are talking about the possibility of an NCAA Tournament bid for TCU. But coach Billy Tubbs isn't getting carried away.

"If we win tomorrow night we're there. That's the only way I know we're in for sure," TCU coach Bill Tubbs said. "Nobody's even been talking about us as a bubble team. If we win, they can't deny us."

In the Southwestern Athletic Conference Tournament in Dallas Friday, Jackson State beat Alcorn State 72-68, then Mississippi Valley State beat Texas Southern 87-78. The two victors advanced to the SWAC title game Saturday.

In the Southland Conference Tournament in Shreveport, La., Friday, Southwest Texas State beat McNeese State 76-59 after Northeast Louisiana defeated cross-state rival Northwestern State 72-54. The two winners advanced to Saturday's SLC final.

In the Conference USA Tournament in St. Louis, North Carolina-Charlotte beat Alabama-Birmingham 67-65, while Marquette defeated Cincinnati 91-79. The winners advanced to Saturday's title game.

## Herd shutout at Dumas

The Hereford Whiteface baseball team lost in the semifinals of the Dumas Baseball Tournament Friday afternoon as the Berger Bulldogs blanked the Herd by a 10-0 count.

Borger held Hereford without a hit in the abbreviated five-inning game. Results of the game were

unavailable from the Whiteface coach Saturday morning.

Hereford had scored a 11-5 win over Guymon on Thursday to reach the semifinal match. Pampa and Borger were to meet in the championship game. Guymon and Sanford-Fritch played for the consolation title.

## Utes edge New Mexico

Utah (25-3) advanced to tonight's final against Texas Christian, a 64-59 winner over Texas Christian.

"We're not here without Keith," Utah coach Rick Majerus said.

New Mexico coach Dave Bliss wasn't quite as impressed after his Lobos dropped their second game in two weeks to the Utes.

"Keith is a fine player making big plays, but he just picked up an errant shot and put it in the basket," Bliss said.

Miller led Utah with 21 points, while freshman Lamont Long topped New Mexico (24-8) with 23. Charles Smith, New Mexico's leading scorer at 18.3 points a game, had a season-low four points.

## Tech players lost to grades

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) - Deuce Jones of Texas Tech did not play in the Red Raiders' game against No. 16 Iowa State in the Big 12 postseason tournament Friday after Tech was notified by the NCAA that Jones was not making sufficient academic progress.

Tech pulled Gracen Averil from the game shortly after the start of the second half after learning that he was having similar problems.

The Red Raiders found out about Jones at 2:05 CST, about 15 minutes before the game with Iowa State was scheduled to start, said Bob Sweazy, the Tech faculty representative. The team found out about Averil during the game.

"We did take decisive action and we will look into this matter further," said Tech athletic director Gerald Meyers, who declined further comment.

Coach James Dickey also declined comment.

Texas Tech lost 72-70 to Iowa State, but was still hopeful of an NCAA bid with a 19-9 record.

Averil averaged 8.3 points in 23 games, seven of which he had started. Jones averaged 2.7 points a game in 24 games.

Kansas (30-1), which outscored the Cowboys 15-2 in the final 5:20, moved into the semifinals against Iowa State. Dedrick Willoughby scored 28 points as the Cyclones (20-7) held off Texas Tech 72-70.

In the other quarterfinals, Nate Erdmann scored 21 points in Oklahoma's 55-41 victory over Colorado, and Jason Sutherland scored 17 points in 10th-seeded Missouri's 80-75 victory over Texas.

At Memphis, Tenn., B.J. McKie hit four 3-pointers in a 22-point performance as South Carolina (24-6) beat Alabama 72-61 to secure a semifinal berth against Georgia.

Defending NCAA champion Kentucky also advanced, routing Auburn 92-50 behind Ron Mercer's 21-performance. The Wildcats (28-4) will face Mississippi, a 64-62 winner over Vanderbilt.

Georgia (23-7) beat Arkansas 65-63 on Larry Brown's layup with less than a second remaining.

At St. Louis, Chris Crawford scored 22 points and Marquette made a season-high 13 3-pointers in a 91-79 semifinal victory over Cincinnati. The Golden Eagles (21-8) will play

North Carolina-Charlotte, a 67-65 winner over Alabama-Birmingham.

Big East

At New York, Tim Thomas scored 21 points as the Villanova (23-8) beat Providence 73-63 to advance to the final for the fifth time. The Wildcats will face Boston College, a 70-58 winner over Georgetown.

Atlantic 10

At Philadelphia, Terrell Myers scored 21 points as St. Joseph's (23-6) won its seventh straight game to reach the final against Rhode Island, a 69-66 overtime winner over Temple.

# Heat beats Bullets; Rockets, Spurs win; Mavs lose

There were 12 NBA games to start the weekend, and nary a shocker. That would not have been the case Friday night if Juwan Howard had made a free throw.

The victory kept Miami within a half-game of New York in the Atlantic Division standings and put the Heat a half-game ahead of Detroit

in the overall Eastern Conference picture.

The Knicks had a comeback of their own in a 113-102 victory at Boston, but the Pistons didn't fare as well in losing 95-88 at Utah.

In other games, Chicago defeated Indiana 104-96, Houston drubbed the Los Angeles Lakers 111-90, Seattle defeated New Jersey 109-90, Atlanta beat Milwaukee 90-80, Golden State downed Orlando 108-101, Portland topped Dallas 90-69, Minnesota beat Denver 96-83, Phoenix defeated Sacramento 104-87 and San Antonio nipped Toronto 106-103.

Miami, which blew a 15-point fourth-quarter lead on Thursday night

in losing at home to Washington, watched the same thing happen one night later as the Bullets got back into the game by opening the fourth quarter with a 25-4 run which included 16 unanswered points.



## Andrews draws hazardous waste plant

Facility will process waste into dry material, bury in pits

ANDREWS, Texas (AP) - Pumpjacks, tanker trucks and "poison gas" warning signs are fixtures on the desolate landscape of western Andrews County, where people understand that a healthy economy isn't always pretty.

Drawing oil and gas from beneath the loam doesn't pay what it used to, so residents seem virtually unanimous in using their once profitable geology in another way: storage of hazardous and radioactive wastes.

"It seems to have a good future here," said Ronny Alaniz, a deputy who recently joined a few hundred other residents at a barbecue thrown at Waste Control Systems' new facility near the New Mexico line. "This is not a temporary setup. It's going to be here forever."

Since wildcatters first descended upon West Texas in the 1920s, Andrews County has been the nation's most prolific oil producing county at more than 3 billion total barrels. Despite the boom times, oil's unpredictability has sent officials looking to diversify for more than a quarter century.

Pasadena-based WCS answered the call.

The plant began accepting hazardous waste last month from manufacturers in the United States and Mexico. The 1,333-acre facility will process the waste into a dry material, then bury it in four planned pits.

The dirt-like end product is less toxic than much of what lies in an average city dump, customer service manager Gary Grissom said.

WCS handles toxic materials such as contaminated soils related to petroleum production. The company also has applied to the U.S. Department of Energy to treat and dispose of low-level radioactive waste produced by about 90 public sites, including the nation's nuclear weapons complex.

Jerry Kirkwood, who works at the government's Waste Isolation Pilot Plant in Carlsbad, N.M., had a new job on his mind as he and his family

ate barbecue and listened to country music at WCS's February open house.

"Red-light bells go off when you talk about radioactive waste," he said. "They've got to educate people that they're not going to glow in the dark."

While WCS officials and politicians mingled with locals inside, a lonely sheriff's deputy kept an eye out for trouble at the gate. Unlike the emotional protests at a similar proposed site in Hudspeth County, 175 miles to the west, not a peep has been heard here.

Most of the county's 14,000 citizens live in Andrews, about 20 miles east of the site. During the state permitting process, not one person said anything negative through two different six-week public comment periods.

WCS's popularity and quick approval enticed Utah-based Envirocare to buy 888 acres nearby and apply for a permit to treat - not store - low-level radioactive waste. Envirocare operates the Salt Lake City-area site where the DOE currently sends 97 percent of such residue.

"The plan is to bring waste in, treat it at the facility and return it to a licensed facility," said Craig Thorley, Envirocare's regional affairs manager. The state health department and Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission must approve Envirocare's permits before it begins construction.

Back in Utah, Envirocare is embroiled in a controversy in which that state's top regulator accepted \$600,000 in cash, gold coins and real estate from Khosrow Semnani, the company's owner. If regulators neuter Envirocare, which is under an FBI investigation, then WCS's Andrews County site might become the country's main resting place for federal radioactive waste.

"We've proposed that the DOE look at the facility and do a thorough analysis, and at the same time have an analysis done by (a third-party) oversight team led by Texas Tech,"

WCS spokesman John Kyte said from his Washington, D.C. office. "We'd hope that at the end of those activities the DOE would then say the site

would pass muster and is appropriate for DOE waste.

"We're not seeking to be the only place those wastes go to. We're seeking to have the opportunity to bid for those waste contracts."

Don't bet against WCS's federal application. Every New Mexico and Texas congressman remotely related to the area has backed it vociferously. Former U.S. Rep. Kent Hance is the board chairman and owns an option to buy 25 percent of the company.

If the permitting goes through, West Texas could become the Grand Central Station of nuclear waste. The Texas Low-Level Radioactive Waste Disposal Authority wants to dump commercial power plant waste near Sierra Blanca, while it appears likely that the Amarillo-area Pantex Plant is destined to store thousands of plutonium cores from dismantled nuclear bombs.

While Sierra Blanca and Pantex have been flashpoints for anti-nuke protests, the only fighting here has been between WCS and Envirocare, who have accused one another of backstabbing and name-calling.

Thorley on WCS's eagerness to store radioactive waste without state regulation: "It's a good policy to give a comfort level to citizens of the state. We're one of the most carefully regulated companies in the state of Utah. I don't know what the (nuclear regulatory) qualifications are at Texas Tech."

Kyte on Envirocare's unannounced land purchase last fall: "If you look at the way in which Envirocare came into Texas, they came in and bought site unseen a piece of land, never met or talked to people in Andrews, then filed an application with TNRCC."

WCS has hired 45 full-time employees here and says it could employ up to 1,000 if its plans for four huge pits, radioactive waste treatment and a research "campus" materialize. Envirocare has done little here except acquire land. Thorley knows his company's low profile here has led people to think that Envirocare arrived simply to make trouble for WCS.

"Our reception has not been quite as warm, but they (WCS) have been talking to those folks for a few years, and we're the new kids on the block and there are rumors we're not really serious," Thorley said. "We are

## Pager industry remains strong

DALLAS (AP) - Beepers are not just for doctors and drug dealers anymore.

The chunks of plastic and circuitry have been emitting their demanding tones since the 1940s, although their use had been limited the last 20 years to doctors and plumbers alerted to call their offices. Then, as pagers became more available, the industry was amazed to see a seedier side emerge when drug dealers found they could be used to easily contact one another.

"Many of the management teams still shake their heads over that. They'd like not to be associated with it," laughed Jeanine Oburchay, associate managing director at Bear Stearns in New York.

Although still popular with original customers, the pager industry has gone mainstream, experiencing exploding growth as new products

and services capture the business world and reach out to Middle America.

Paging services was one of the top-growth industries in 1996, according to American Business Information Inc.

Analysts estimate the number of people carrying a beeper has jumped from 27 million in 1994 to more than 40 million today.

"I don't know if it will be everyone, but I do think that we can get to a point in the year 2000 where 72 million people are using pagers," Ms. Oburchay said.

As the industry has grown and consolidated, the increase in usage has been driven by several factors including, declining consumer costs and increased distribution.

There also have been some technological advancements due to a development by Motorola Inc.

## Hereford resident strives to help others by offering assisted living

Charlene Pietsek has seen the need for assisted living in Hereford and she is working toward meeting that need. "Assisted living is for people, mostly senior citizens, who need more help than personal care provides but aren't ready for the total care of a nursing home," said Pietsek. "We are trying to provide a home to bridge this gap."

The assisted living residence that Pietsek has prepared would allow up to three clients a place to live. Each client would have a private room within easy walking distance of the dining room, kitchen and living area.

"There will be a caregiver on duty 24 hours a day who will prepare meals, assist with medications and provide other help for the clients," Pietsek said.

The caregiver will have a private bedroom with an adjoining bathroom but will always be easily accessible for the clients.

Clients will be encouraged to bring their own furniture for their individual bedrooms so that they will have comfortable, familiar surroundings.

"The living area will provide a place where clients can meet to visit, play games or watch television together, but they will each have their own room if they want privacy,"

Pietsek said.

The kitchen will be available to the clients at any time, according to Pietsek, so they can have the freedom of fixing snacks or getting something to drink without having to go to a central dining room.

Pietsek said clients will enjoy other freedoms such as having a pet or being able to work in the yard if they feel like it.

"If a client has home health care at their private residence, they can have home health care here as well," she added.

Although she has met all the requirements for licensing, since the

facility will house less than four people, it is not required to be licensed, she said.

"We will be a private-pay facility, at least initially," Pietsek said. "We hope to fill a need for some who require assisted living but do not qualify for Medicare."

Janell Debrri, R.N., will serve as caregiver.

"We want our clients to maintain as much independence as they can," Pietsek said.

## WTRT to award two scholarships that will keep local dollars 'at home'

Two \$1,600 scholarships that will be awarded this spring reflect efforts by the West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative membership and board of directors to keep local money "at home."

The scholarships, to be announced in May, are the first to be awarded by WTRT. They were made possible by an amendment to the cooperative's bylaws that was approved by members in 1995.

Prior to the amendment, funds from unclaimed patronage capital credit checks issued by the cooperative reverted to the state if they didn't find their way to their owners after a period of time.

Concerned at the loss of local benefit from locally-generated dollars, WTRT's board proposed - and the membership approved - channeling those unclaimed dollars into a scholarship fund, with scholarships to be awarded to recipients in the cooperative's service area.

Qualified applicants in the Hereford, Dimmitt, Friona, Bovina, Farwell, Lazbuddie, Adrian and Vega

area are eligible.

The initial WTRT scholarships will be disbursed in increments of \$800 per semester, beginning this fall. Scholarship applications won't be limited to high school seniors.

Dick Fellers, chairman of the WTRT board, and the Dawn exchange director, says along with seniors, individuals who have been out of high school awhile and want to attend college or a vocational or trade school are eligible to apply for the WTRT scholarships - provided that their parents or guardians, or they, receive telephone service from WTRT, and they have graduated from high school or completed their GED.

"We're hoping that these scholarships will present the opportunity for someone to attend college or trade school who otherwise might not go," said Fellers.

The WTRT-sponsored scholarships may be used at any state or church-sponsored college or university, or at any accredited vocational or technical school.

Applicants must maintain a minimum of 12 credited hours

throughout each semester, or have full-time student status at vocational or technical schools.

Application forms must be accompanied by two letters of recommendation, one of which must be from a teacher, principal or counselor from the high school that the applicant is currently attending, or attended.

To be considered for the WTRT scholarships, applications must be fully-completed, have no attachments other than the letters of recommendation, and must be received at the WTRT offices, Box 1737, Hereford Texas 79045, no later than April 10, 1997.

Applicants may be asked to attend an interview at the discretion of the WTRT board.

Fellers said that the recipients will be required to provide a confirmation of enrollment or pre-enrollment for the fall semester from the registrar's office of the university or trade school they plan to attend. If a student drops out for any reason, the unused portion of the scholarship will be rescinded.

Scholarship winners will be asked to send a report of their grades to WTRT at Box 1737, Hereford, Texas 79045.

Applications for the WTRT scholarships may be picked up at counselor's offices at high schools in Hereford, Dimmitt, Friona, Farwell, Bovina, Lazbuddie, Adrian and Vega.

Application forms are also available at the WTRT offices on South Highway 385, Hereford.

## Extension News

Nutrient density is a measurement of food value that compares the amount of essential nutrients to the amount of calories in food and when it comes to nutrient density, red meat measures up.

Meat is among the most valuable

sources of important vitamins and minerals in today's diet.

For example, beef makes 4-1/2 times as great a contribution to iron needs, 3-1/2 times as great a contribution to zinc needs, nearly two times as great a contribution to niacin needs and nearly eight times as great a contribution to vitamin B 12 needs.

Red meats are abundant sources of iron, the mineral required to build and maintain blood hemoglobin. Heme iron, the type of iron found in red meat, is the form of iron used most effectively by our bodies. It also has a "booster" effect, enhancing the absorption of iron from the other non-meat sources.

The zinc in red meat is an essential trace element which contributes to tissue development, growth and wound healing.

Red meats have a rich supply of the B vitamins. Pork is an especially good source of thiamin, which is essential to convert carbohydrates to energy.

Vitamin B 12 occurs only in

animal products such as meat, fish, poultry and milk. It's essential for the formation of blood cells in the bone marrow.

Niacin, riboflavin and vitamin B 6 are also found in significant amounts in red meat.

But meat is perhaps best known as an excellent source of protein, a fundamental component of all living cells. Red meats contain high-quality or complete protein with all essential amino acids.

## Weight management vital to health

Obesity is a condition in which excess fat may put a person at health risk. Excess body fat results from the body's inability to balance caloric intake with energy expenditure.

The prevalence and health risks associated with obesity underscore its prominence as a major public health problem. According to the National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey made in 1994, 33 percent of adults in the United States are obese.

Health risks related to obesity include coronary heart disease, hypertension, dyslipidemias, diabetes, gallstones, sleep apnea, osteoarthritis, and cancer of the reproduction organs. Obesity-related medical conditions are the second leading causes of death in America, resulting in 300,000 lives lost each year. The estimated annual health care cost due to obesity in the United States is about \$70 billion.

At any one time approximately 25 percent of the men and 45 percent of the women are trying to lose weight. American's spend more than \$33

billion per year on weight control products and services, yet these efforts seem to have no effect on slowing the increasing prevalence of obesity.

Social pressures and obsession with thinness may be contributing to our increasing obesity. The consumption of dietary energy from fat has decreased but the total energy intake of an adult has increased six percent since 1979. Only one-fifth of the population currently gets enough exercise to affect health and weight positively.

The goal of obesity treatment should be refocused from weight loss alone to weight management, which means achieving the best weight possible in the context of overall health. "Weight management" is defined as the adoption of healthful and sustainable eating and exercise behaviors indicated for reduced disease risk and improved feelings of energy and well-being.

All weight management programs should at the very least include training in lifestyle modification with the following goals:

(a) gradual change to a healthful eating style with increased intake of

# To Your Good Health

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am a 28-year-old woman. I had an eye exam and was told one pupil is larger than the other. I was told not to worry. I do worry, though, because the doctor mentioned neurological tumors. And could this be a sign of multiple sclerosis? I have had tingling in parts of my body that come and go quickly. Please reply! — S.

ANSWER: Right now, you need a dose of reality.

As many as 20 percent of healthy humans have unequal pupils, something to keep in mind as you read my answer.

Can pupil difference be significant? It can if it is a recent development related to a head injury, inflammation, glaucoma or a tumor.

A specific condition we call "Adie's syndrome" has the pupil enlargement sign along with disruption of certain body reflexes. The doctor cannot elicit the knee reflex from the familiar hammer tap. Even so, an Adie's pupil is notable only as an oddity.

Horner's syndrome is more serious. With that, a pupil constricts to

cause the size differential. That eyelid sags, and the eye appears sunken. Lack of facial perspiration on the one side can be part of the general symptom mix. Horner's syndrome has to do with disruption of nerve signals to the pupil, often caused by a tumor compressing nerves.

Multiple sclerosis is tricky. Eye involvement would be more of a blurred-vision symptom, perhaps with eye pain. Body tingles can be an MS sign, but they would last longer than yours.

I would put MS concern on the back burner for now. You can do without that baggage.

Anatomical deviations can lead us along dark and scary paths lined by doubts and fears reminiscent of Dorothy's in "The Wizard of Oz."

A neurologist can pinpoint any real problem.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am 50. Five years ago, my first mammogram showed a small benign breast mass. I had ultrasound tests too. It has not changed since. Now, my doctors disagree. One sees the need for a biopsy. The other does not.

What is your opinion? — L.P.

ANSWER: Let's retrace things. When tests determine a breast lump to be "probably not cancer," then follow-up tests every six months for the next two years is an accepted approach. If no change has occurred by then, you could assume the lump is not cancer.

In this instance, after five years, the chances of cancer are all but nonexistent.

I have not seen your test results. I have not examined your breasts. I have no knowledge of your family history. But, given the professional doubts present, were I approached for an opinion, I would order a biopsy to settle the matter for good.

That's a timidity that might fly in the face of shrinking medical budgets, but uncertainty isn't helping anybody.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I have been informed by several knowledgeable people that if a person ate food containing poppy seeds, such as a poppy-seed kolacky (a favorite of mine), and shortly afterward submitted a urine sample for drug testing, it would test

positive for drugs. Is there validity to this thought? — D.A.

ANSWER: After eating poppy seeds, urine can test positive for morphine and codeine.

The answer is to avoid poppy-seed items at least a day, preferably two, prior to the test.

The issue comes up frequently in personnel departments during drug testing of potential employees, as well as among athletes in competitions such as the Olympics.

### See Better On The Slopes

Long exposure to intense blue light may lead to some loss of visions - at least in lab animals. But the scattered blue light -- caused by the same dust particles that makes the sky look blue -- does make it harder to see distant objects, especially in snow, haze or overcast weather. That's why many skiers opt for goggles with a built-in "blue-blocking" filter to assure really sharp vision on the slopes. These tinted goggles screen out the blue light, enhancing the focus of the remaining colors on the retina. Seeing better means skiing better, and more safely, too.

There's another safety issue to consider, too. At the higher elevations of ski slopes, the sun's ultraviolet rays can be especially dangerous. Be sure that your goggles offer sufficient protection against both UVA and UVB. Best bet for high-glare conditions on the slope are "special purpose" lenses that block at least 99 percent of UVB and 92 percent of UVA.

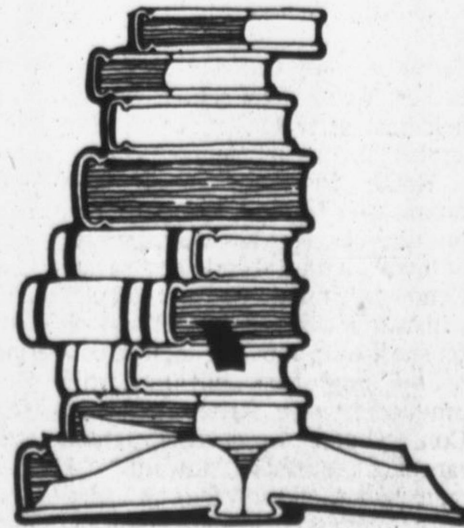

The Texas Cattle Feeders Association's Junior Fed Beef Challenge informational meeting will be at 7 p.m. Wednesday in the Hereford Country Club.

The 1997 Junior Fed Beef Challenge will be Aug. 23 at West Texas A&M University.

-- April 19, Last date steers can be purchased and validated.

-- May 14, Entry form, validation and entry fee due to TCFA.

-- Aug. 11, Team challenge registration due.

-- Aug. 11-14, Final steer closeout weights taken.

-- Aug. 15, Steers arrive at Amarillo Livestock Auction for check-in by 12 p.m.

-- Aug. 18, Record books due in

TCFA office.

-- Aug. 23, Contest Day. All registrants must check-in between 8 a.m. and 9 a.m., contest begins an 10 a.m. and winners will be announced that evening.

The contest will be divided into two groups -- junior (up to 8th grade) and senior (9th-12th grades) to allow more participation and competition between similar age groups.

Competition is in four areas: steer performance, record book, written exam and oral interview. More than \$16,000 in scholarships, awards and premiums are at stake.

The team challenge allows more youth an opportunity to learn about commercial cattle feeding without having to own a pen of steers. Teams of two or three youth may compete in a written exam and a live evaluation.

## TSCRA sets ranching school in Fort Worth

What will feed cost this year? What is the best way to pass on the ranch to my children and deal with estate taxes? How can I protect myself against price fluctuations in the cattle market?

These and other tough questions will be tackled at the 1997 Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association School for Successful Ranching on March 22-23 in the Tarrant County Convention Center in Fort Worth. The school will be held just prior to TSCRA's 120th annual convention and trade show.

Roddy Peoples, veteran farm broadcaster from San Angelo, will interview Dr. Ron Knutson, director of the Agricultural and Food Policy Center in College Station. Peoples will interview Knutson on his outlook for short-term and long-term effects of the new farm bill on cattle producers, new criteria of the Conservation Reserve Program, ranchers' attitudes toward risk management and how the new make-up of Congress could impact farm and ranch organizations.

"The farm bill will result in increased price fluctuation for feeds used in U.S. livestock production. This will translate into more variation in the price of feeder and fed cattle as well. The implication for livestock producers is the need to employ risk management strategies," Knutson said.

Financial problems that have given ranchers many sleepless nights will be addressed in a special business workshop, where producers have the opportunity to get advice from well-known tax attorneys and estate planning specialists. Paul Martin, a Houston-based tax attorney, will discuss how to get around estate taxes.

Taxes, lawsuits and family conflict will be discussed by Norm Bevan, financial consultant, also from Houston. Gordon Richardson, TSCRA consultant from Caldwell, will explain how to set up a benefits plan for employees that can be deducted. He'll also discuss ranch operator fringe benefits under tax law changes.

Armstrong, Deaf Smith, Potter and Randall County residents are invited to hear information and express their opinions about a proposed regional precipitation enhancement program during a public meeting to be held at 3 p.m. March 20 in the Hereford Community Center.

Informational meetings, such as this, will be held in March within the five District Directors' Precincts of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

George Bomar with the Texas natural Resource Conservation Commission in Austin will be the guest speaker.

Bomar has been involved with precipitation enhancement programs since 1975.

Precipitation enhancement is an attempt to encourage clouds to generate more rainfall than they would otherwise through the introduction of seeding agents, such as silver iodide.

It is also known as cloud seeding. He oversees the permitting of all weather modification activities in the

state of Texas.

Bomar will discuss the theory of cloud seeding for precipitation enhancement, the benefits of additional rainfall to regional surface and ground water supplies, the operation of the Water District's proposed precipitation enhancement program, and how precipitation enhancement differs from hail suppression programs.

"These meetings will allow the public to learn more about precipitation enhancement and how both agricultural producers and homeowners can benefit from additional rainfall.

"In addition, the meetings will give our five-member Board of Directors an opportunity for feedback from the public as to whether or not the Water District should implement a precipitation enhancement program this spring and summer," A. Wayne Wyatt, manager of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 said.

Robert Meyer of Hereford is the District Director representing

## Beef industry institutes plant 'safety revolution'

DALLAS (AP) - The beef industry is instituting changes in its packing plants to remove bacteria during production, making steaks safer and roasts less risky.

The "safety revolution" is partially in response to an E. coli outbreak in 1993 that sickened more than 500 hamburger eaters and killed three children.

"It really affected consumer confidence in the products," said Caroline Smith DeWaal, director of food safety at the Centers for Science in the Public Interest, a consumer watchdog group.

As Americans heard about the diseased meat, they reacted by turning their backs on beef and consumption bottomed out at 61.6 pounds per person, according to the National Cattlemen's Beef Association.

"The industry has been badly shaken by the types of media attention that the outbreaks of food poisoning have caused over the years," said Ms. Smith DeWaal. "The companies are very sensitive."

So, beef producers and the government responded. Last month, Agriculture Department inspectors began requiring slaughterhouses to test meat and poultry for contamination such as E.

coli, which was first identified in 1982. Previously, carcasses were examined only by sight and smell tests designed in 1906.

Although there are no standards and regulations are only for monitoring bacteria levels, levels will be mandated within the next year. The largest plants are moving now to improve the safety and the quality of their product, Ms. DeWaal said.

"The outbreak in the Northwest was probably the major factor that gave us the final push to get us moving," Gary Acuff, associate professor of food microbiology of Texas A&M University, said of the testing and new technology. "If people are dying, that gets a lot of attention."

To combat bacteria, there have been several different germ killers introduced on production lines, including a high-temperature water spray and vacuum, an organic acid spray and steam pasteurization.

The hot water-vacuum spray was introduced about a year ago and is in use in most major packing plants. The organic acid spray includes sprinkling the beef with antibacterial agents such as vinegar or even orange juice.

But the most recent development - and the one believed to be the most effective - is steam pasteurization.

# MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

## This Will Make You Rich: or maybe not

There are two ways of getting on in this world: by one's own industry, or by weakness of others.

- Jean de La Bruyère

Nearly every week for the last few weeks, my mailbox has contained information on some new business venture someone believes I should be involved in. They all have one theme in common: for little money, with no selling and almost no effort you can make some major bucks.

The headlines are exciting. Phrases such as "Earn \$3-5,000 per month part-time!", "Would you like a big raise? (usually followed by a long list of folks earning thousands every month)" and

"I make \$1,000 per day.", are typical.

I'm certain I'll get more mail after writing this column. Folks who believe in multi-level marketing businesses (and there are thousands of them out there) are going to flood my mailbox.

So for the record, let me stress that this is not an anti-multi-level marketing piece. I will try to cover the subject in a neutral manner. Some are bound to perceive it in a negative way simply because I don't happen to share their enthusiasm.

In reality, multi-level marketing offers comparable opportunities to franchises and other types of businesses. Some concepts are better than others, some ideas require more money than others and all have some element of risk.

Not every multi-level marketing business is a good one. In addition, no business will make you rich (legally) without some investment and a good deal of effort on your part.

### Separating the wheat from the chaff

So how can you spot a good multi-level marketing opportunity? How do you know when to jump in with both feet? Let me share a few thoughts on what to look for.

• **First, look closely at the opportunity.** Are the products or services the company provides really needed or wanted by a wide range of people? What makes this company's offerings truly unique and marketable? Can your potential customers purchase similar products through conventional retail channels? Why are this company's products and services better or more attractive to consumers?

• **Second, determine if the products or services offer good value:** Remember, that value is a comparison of price versus quality and quantity. Compare products with other brands and companies. Try the products before you sign on. Can you really save money? Does this product or service save time or enhance your life? If you become a believer, it's easier to convince someone else.

• **The next step is to evaluate whether the company is more focused on tangibles (products and/or services) or intangibles (building mass by creating huge down lines).** Long-term success will depend on tangibles. No one builds real wealth unless someone in the down line is selling product. You can only maintain sales year after year with quality and value.

• **Finally, take a good look at the company.** Is the firm one with a proven track record? Has it survived the test of time? There is a downside here. Recent research shows that those folks who become part of a multi-level marketing program early on have better than average odds of achieving real wealth from the venture. There are analysts who believe you've waited too long, if you wait to see a firm develop a proven record.

I wish you well with your efforts. If you decide to jump in, please don't try to sign me up. I've already got all the opportunities I can manage. I would, enjoy hearing about your success.

### Writing Want Ads that really sell!

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs." Then, remember these hints:

--Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.

--Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.

--Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.

--Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

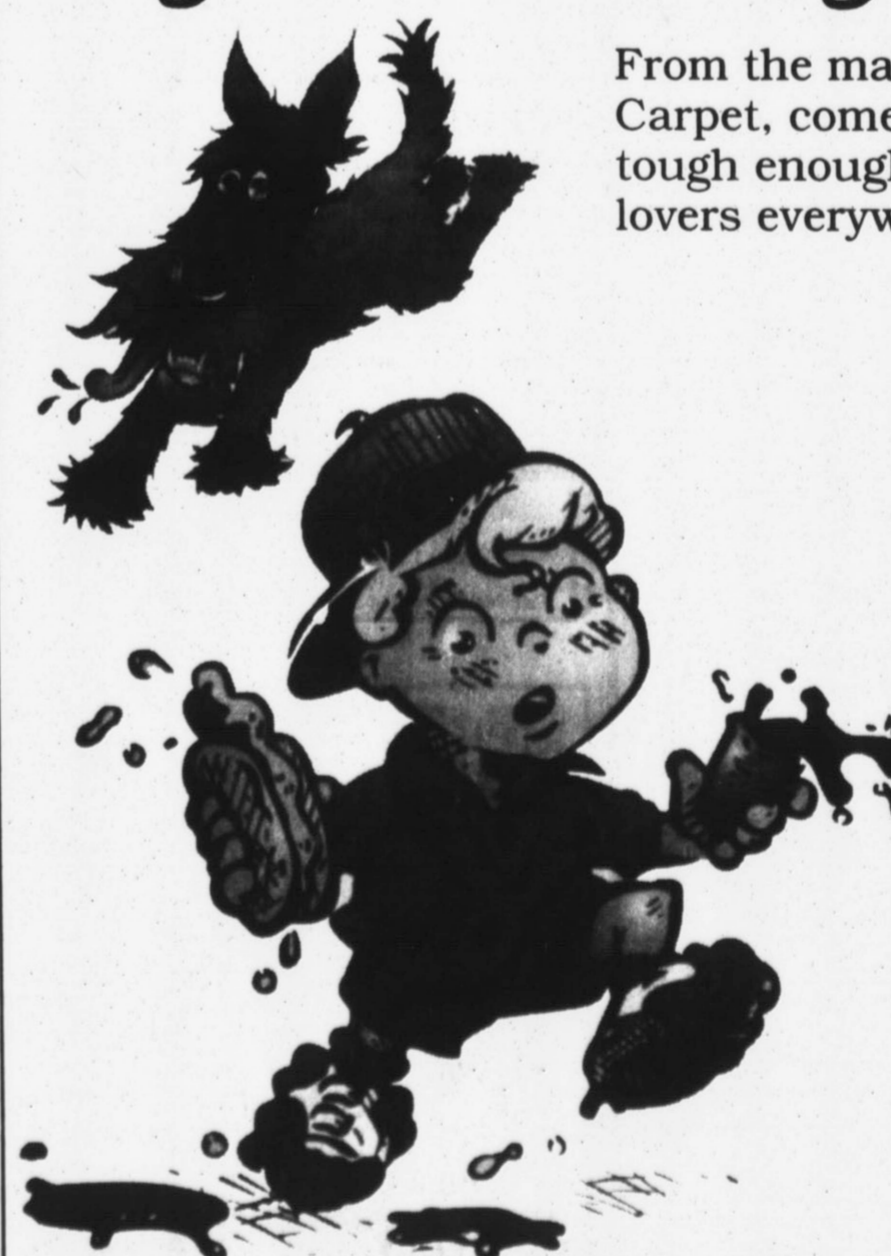

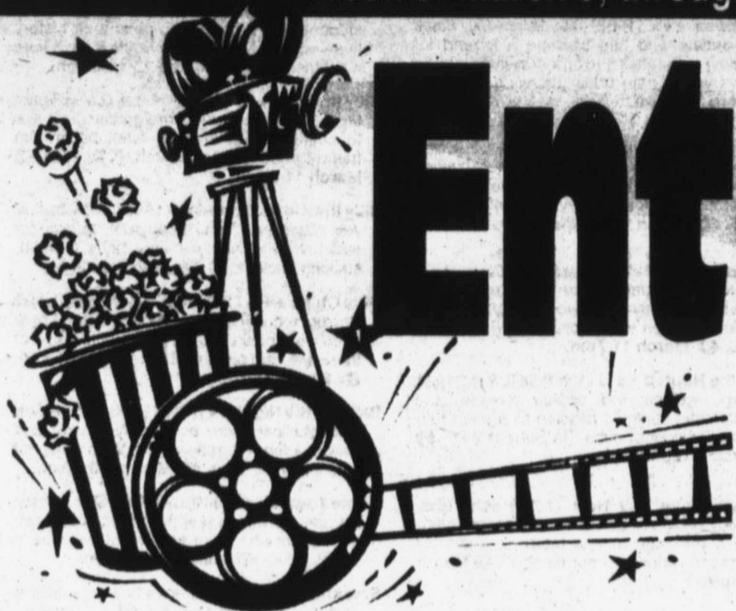

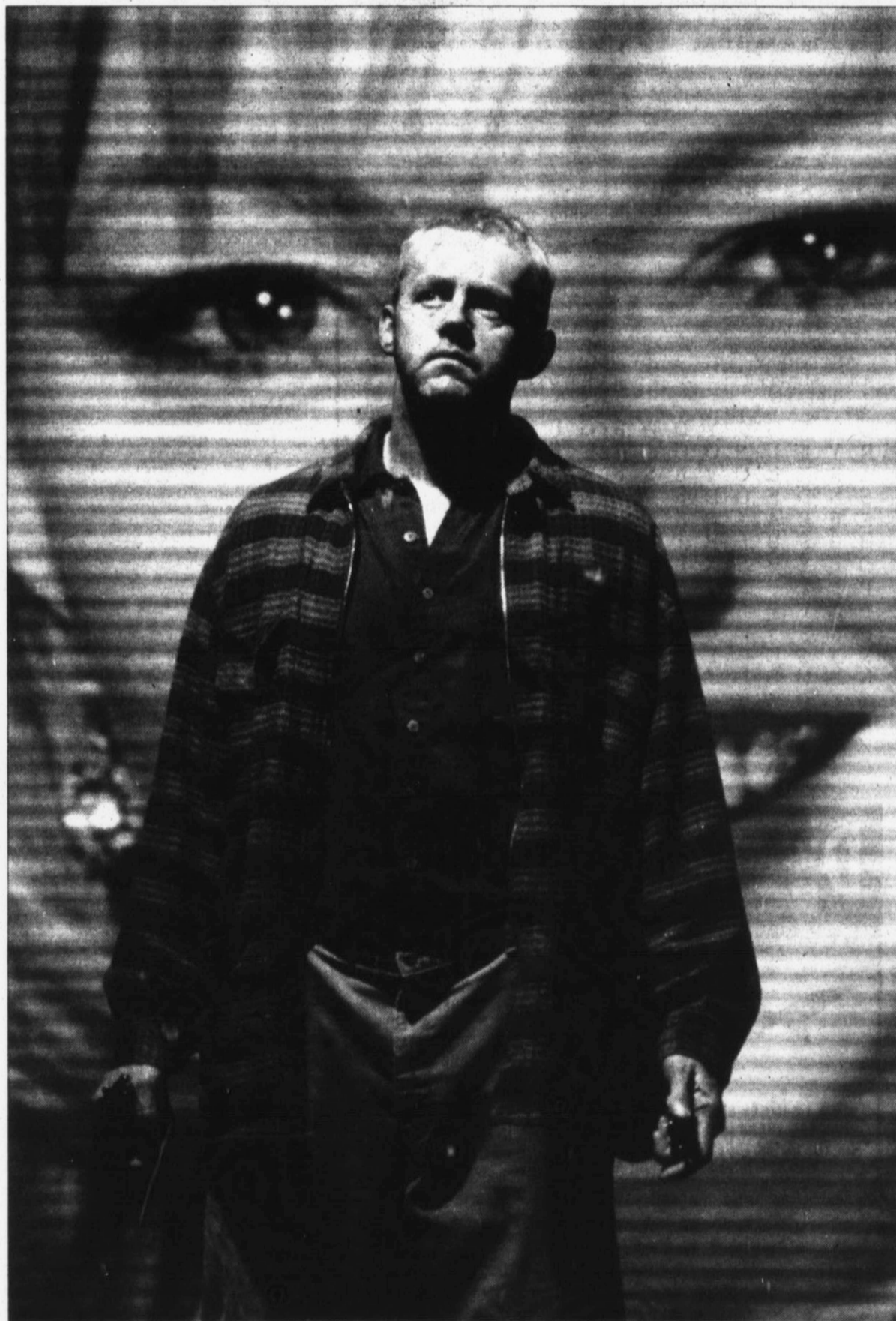

Convincing *Murder Live!* poses interesting possibility

You're watching your favorite daytime talk show when suddenly a distraught-looking man steps onto the stage, flashing a gun and a bomb detonator.

Many escape the studio amid the ensuing chaos, but as the confusion subsides, the willowy blond host and members of her crew and audience find themselves taken hostage.

And the cameras are still rolling.

This harrowing scene plays out during the opening minutes of *Murder Live!*, a thought-provoking two-hour TV movie starring Peter Horton, Marg Helgenberger and David Morse that airs Sunday, March 9, on NBC.

Like a contemporary version of Orson Welles' *War of the Worlds* radio play, the gripping drama unfolds as a live broadcast.

*Murder Live!* clearly is inspired by the 1995 killing of a gay guest who had revealed a crush on Jonathan Schmitz on *The Jenny Jones Show*.

Schmitz, 26, was convicted this past November of second-degree murder in Pontiac, Mich., after fatally shooting his admirer.

Horton (*thirtysomething*), who co-wrote the evocative story and also serves as an executive producer, taps into the public's growing distaste for the "trash talk" genre, as evidenced by numerous cancellations and the rise of positive-minded hosts such as Rosie O'Donnell.

Horton and co-writer Chris Bertolet cleverly combine the Jones tragedy with the premise of the 1976 film *Network*, in which a fired television anchorman announces he will kill himself on the air at the end of his final broadcast.

Like *Network*, *Murder Live!* is in-

tended as an indictment of television, as well as a call for broadcasting responsibility.

Morse plays Frank McGrath, a grieving father enraged by his daughter's suicide following an unauthorized expose on a TV talk show.

The insensitive host, Pia Postman (Helgenberger), revealed his daughter Sally as the victim of a highly publicized gang rape. Sally, in no small irony, ended her life by leaping from a broadcast tower.

McGrath plans to extract an apology from the host, whom he blames for his daughter's suicide, then execute her on live TV.

McGrath begins working the studio like Phil Donahue with a detonator instead of a microphone in his hand. With the defiant host taped to a chair, McGrath holds a mirror to the medium as his viewing audience swells to 70 million.

How plausible is the premise? As the Jones case illustrated, the notion of talk show guests or their relatives feeling so betrayed that they take lives or hostages isn't beyond the realm of possibility.

Morse makes McGrath believable by playing the character with calm resignation, rather than raving anger. Helgenberger confirms our worst suspicions about trash TV with her unflattering portrayal of the callous, self-centered Postman.

*Murder Live!* maintains its "live broadcast" approach for the first 30 minutes, but ultimately expands the story in a more conventional fashion to include Clay Maloney (Horton), the sympathetic SWAT team lieutenant who negotiates with McGrath.

The only problem with the story's premise is that TV talk shows of this variety are rarely broadcast live.

**The central characters were the idealized Nielsen family, the stars of a vintage sitcom that had been canceled. While awaiting a return to the airwaves, the Nielsens were relocated from TV's "Springfield" to New Jersey, where only the kid next door realized their true identity.**

**When modern life got too overwhelming, the Nielsens would activate the Turnerizer, which made things black and white.**

## Buffy the Vampire Slayer stakes its claim on WB

A show with a title like *Buffy the Vampire Slayer* naturally is going to have trouble getting respect.

The WB Network needs the right publicity spin to clue in viewers to this witty action series, which premieres Monday, March 10.

Maybe they'll use some ads that say, "Prep for the SAT! Watch *Buffy* and hear words like 'matricide,' 'hyperbole' and 'jeepers' used in a sentence!"; or, "Realize your potential as a young woman! Spend an hour each week with a fully empowered female! (Hey, guys, Buffy's a babe, too!)"

Yes, *Buffy the Vampire Slayer* has its tongue in its cheek, but it's the thought in its head that makes it entertaining. *Buffy* clicks on several levels at once.

Sarah Michelle Gellar, who won an Emmy at 15 for her role on *All My Children*, stars as Buffy Summers. She's the only human from her generation with the power to confront nocturnal blood-suckers - yet she's only a mediocre cheerleader. Anthony Stewart Head (from the romantic *Taster's Choice*

commercials) co-stars as her mentor, the school librarian.

Buffy's devoted friends, always behind her (way behind her) in time of crisis, are wallflower Willow Rosenberg (Alyson Hannigan) and Xander Harris (Nicholas Brendan), who has a somewhat secret crush on Buffy.

Thanks to some seismic serendipity, their school, is located at the mouth of hell, a seething cauldron of story ideas. Besides vampires, Buffy will encounter witches, giant insects and other horrors.

Still in touch with his inner sophomore, series creator-producer Joss Whedon (*Toy Story*, *Speed*, *Buffy* the movie) delivers vampire-busting action in a surprisingly smart and wholesome atmosphere that dares to laugh in the face of high-school angst.

"Everything is so turgid when you're in high school," Whedon says. "There's never a time when life is more like a TV show."

"I was a strange, unlovable child," he jokes. "I wish I had been Mr. Popular, but then the show would be very different."

But *Mr. Popular the Lady Killer* wouldn't have the quirky charm of *Buffy*.

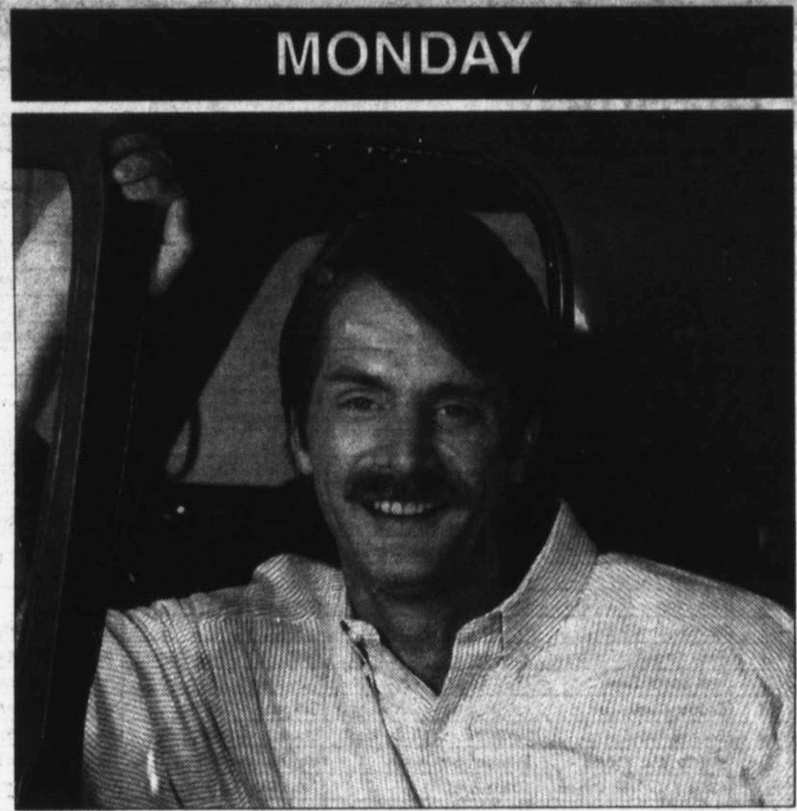

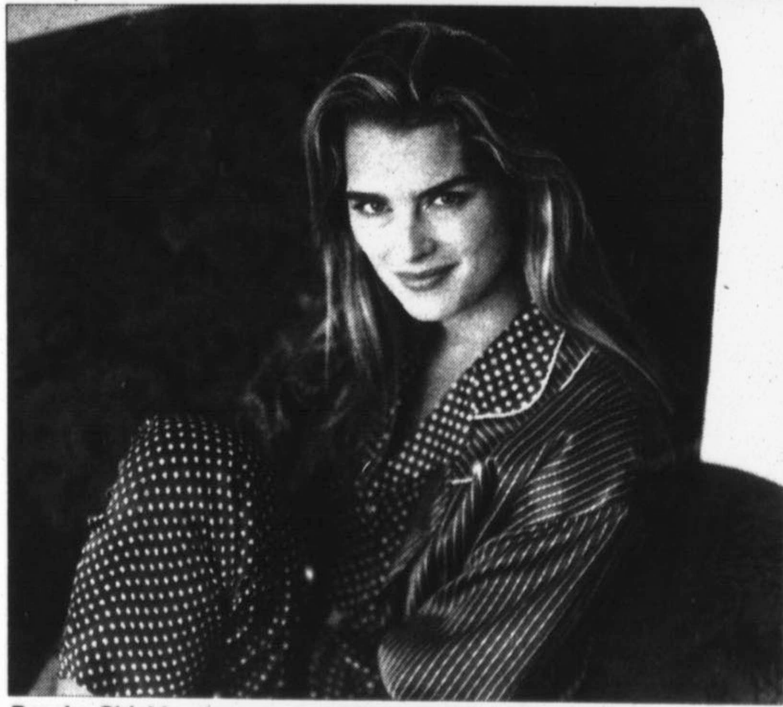

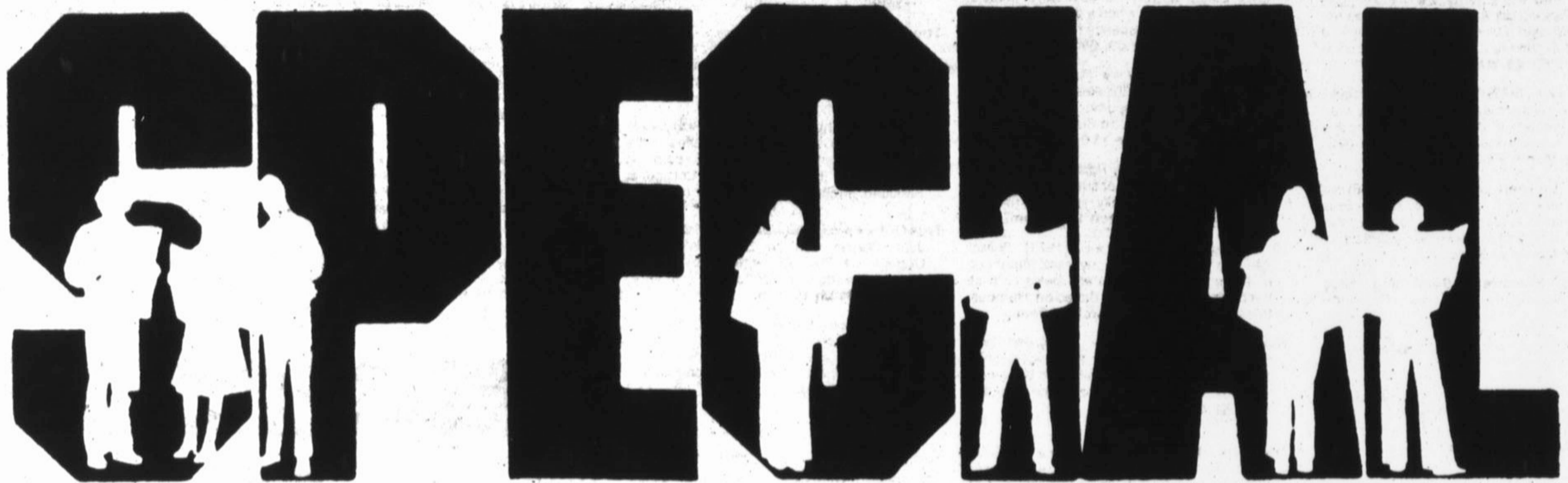

If you have been making charitable gifts to Deaf Smith Health Care Foundation or any other charitable organization in memory of someone special, you already know the satisfaction of honoring a life by furthering an endeavor that will make a difference in the lives of people in this community.

Memorials made to the Foundation are of two levels. As you might imagine, the many gifts received "in memory of" upon the death of a loved one or a friend make up an important source of financial support for us each year.

Envelopes, similar to the forms pictured with this article, are available at local funeral homes, the banks, the hospital, or by calling the Foundation office at 364-2141.

Upon receipt of your request, the Foundation sends a card to the family of the deceased informing them you have given a generous donation to the Foundation in memory of their loved one. The donor also receives a card of acknowledgment from the Foundation.

The Foundation reminds families in the community to designate the Health Care Foundation as one of the charities of choice for memorials when faced with such a decision.

The Foundation has also received several sizable memorial gifts for the "Tree of Life" at the hospital. This is a way to permanently and visibly honor the life of a loved one.

At another level, memorial gifts can be included in your longrange financial plans. Large memorials can provide you with ways to save taxes while giving you the personal satisfaction you desire.

Here, you can think beyond gifts of cash. By giving non-cash assets, you may be able to give more than you thought possible. For example, if you donate securities that have appreciated in value, you generally receive a charitable tax deduction for the full present value of the securities.

You also avoid capital gains tax on the increase in value, whereas the tax would be owed if you sold the asset. In addition, you give while reserving your cash for other purposes such as the purchase of other securities.

Establishing a memorial by will is probably the most well-known method of arranging for a gift that is received later. Let your attorney know of your giving wishes, and he/she can incorporate them in your will, trusts, or other estate plans in proper legal form.

As we can see, memorials can come in all varieties and sizes. Do think of the Deaf Smith Health Care Foundation as a recipient of your memorial gifts.

We all want to be assured that when and if the need arises, we will receive the highest quality medical care. This is the heart of the Foundation's reason for existence.
