Local student, teacher to attend MADD summit

The studies are enough to scare any person. Although the minimum legal drinking age is 21 in every state, recent studies show that more than half of all junior and senior high school students drink monthly. However, the statistics are even scarier. Eight young people a day die in alcohol-related crashes. Cindy Harder, a student, and Veronica Gallegos, a teacher, will represent Hereford High School at the National Youth Summit To Prevent Underage Drinking May 10-13 in Washington, D.C. Harder and Gallegos have been selected as delegates along with 434 other students and 49 other teachers, who will represent each congressional district in the United States and the U.S. territories. The local delegates are committed to changing the social norms of underage drinking. "I don't approve of it. I don't think it's right," Harder said. "I want it to become the norm for people not to drink," Gallegos said. Harder, 17, is the daughter of Norman and Sherry Harder. She is actively involved in Keywanettes, PALS, band, twirling, National Honor Society, 4-H and First Baptist Youth Group. Gallegos is an English/Spanish teacher. She was actively involved in

the West Texas A&M University Peer Education program. The youth summit will be hosted by MADD, Mothers Against Drunk Drivers. The youth summit will consist of six general sessions, each focusing on a specific alcohol-related topic, as well as small discussion groups where youth delegates will address issues unique to their communities and states. Topics to be covered include legislation, alcohol accessibility, alcohol usage and impaired driving, peer pressure and parental roles, media images and enforcement policies to curtail alcohol use. General sessions will be facilitated by policy makers, elected officials, researchers and community activists. At the conclusion of the summit, the delegates will vote on recommendations to address illegal underage drinking and present their report to policy makers and elected officials. Harder and Gallegos will have the

opportunity to meet with United States Rep. Larry Combest. "I'm real excited about meeting Larry Combest," Harder said. "It'll be interesting to meet with him one-on-one," Gallegos. Harder and Gallegos were selected on their commitment to addressing the problem of underage drinking and their willingness to work with MADD chapters and community leaders to implement summit recommendations on a local level. "I'm really excited. I was shocked when Mrs. (Cindy) Simons called me down and said I got it," Harder said. "I'm very excited about going. It will be neat to see the students get together," Gallegos said. Former U.S. Surgeon General Antonia Novello will serve as honorary chairwoman of the event. She will speak to delegates during the opening session on May 10, and at a national press conference to unveil the summit recommendations. (See SUMMIT, Page 2A)

Country switches to DST Sunday

WASHINGTON (AP) - Millions of Americans will set their clocks ahead Sunday as the country switches to daylight-saving time. As usual, some will forget and show up an hour late for church, work or other events. For most of the nation, the change means to set clocks ahead one hour before going to bed on Saturday night. Standard time returns Oct. 26. A few places exempt themselves from daylight-saving time: Arizona, Hawaii, part of Indiana, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands and American Samoa. For the rest of the nation, the change means later sunsets for people to enjoy working on gardens or outdoor projects, playing sports, having barbecues or just idly relaxing outdoors.

Front produces twisters in North, Central Texas

More than three inches of rain fell and at least four funnel clouds developed in North and Central Texas Friday as a large low-pressure system spiraled over the region in advance of a cold front. The front and its dry line produced more twisters and heavy rain as it moved eastward through the state, the National Weather Service said. But no one was hurt. Tornado warnings were issued for northern Denton and Grayson counties and eastern Panola County Friday afternoon. A service station near downtown Pilot Point was damaged. But it was unclear whether damage to Hampton's Exxon and Quick Mart on U.S. 377 resulted from straight line winds or a twister, said Larry Kish, Denton County sheriff's spokesman. Weather service radar indicated possible twisters near Tenaha and two miles east of Lampasas. Other tornado warnings were issued for western Waxahachie and Weatherford. Law officers found no damage or injuries.

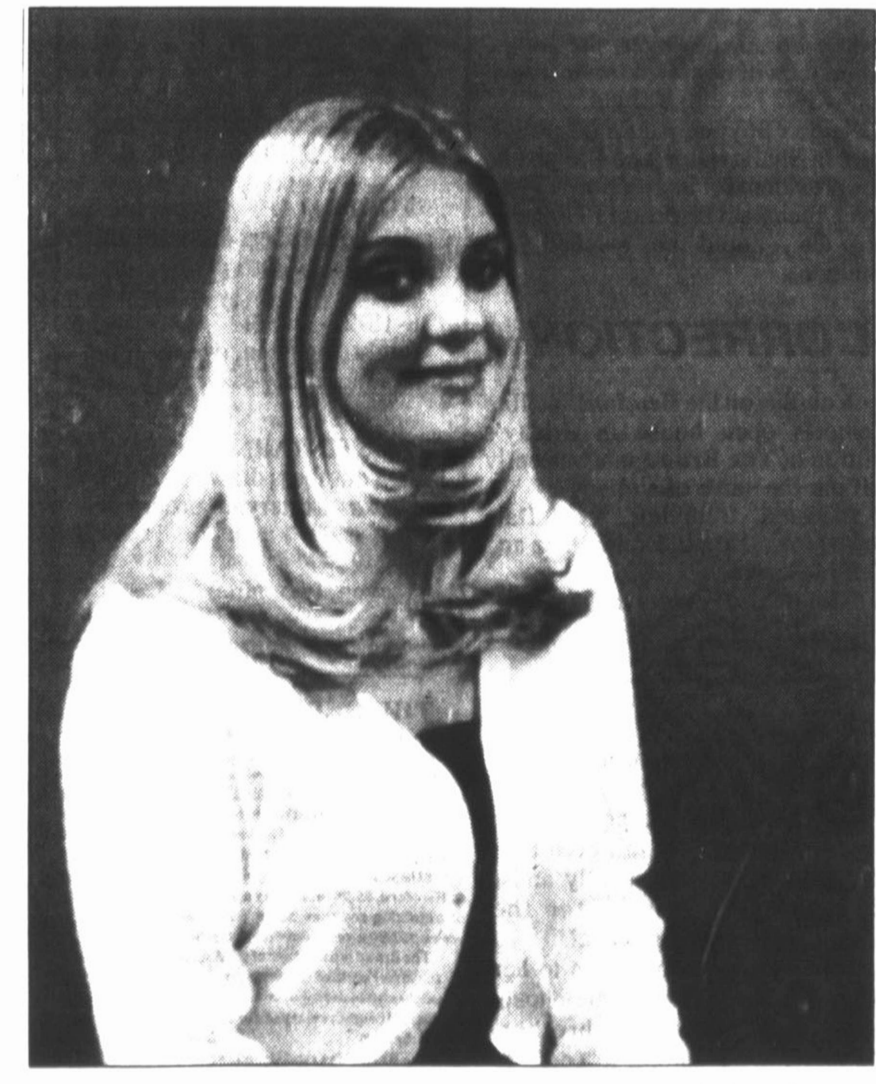
However, a tornado watch continued Friday night for Central and East Central Texas. Flash flood warnings were posted for Central and Southeast Texas while thunderstorm watches were issued in north and north central regions of the state. Some streets flooded in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, where thunderstorms had already dampened qualifying trials for the Texas Motor Speedway's weekend opening. One-inch hail and heavy rain fell near Mineral Wells, said police spokeswoman Rhona Hubble. A high wind advisory was in effect for the Panhandle and South Plains through Saturday. Storms extended from the South Plains southward into the Concho Valley and Edwards Plateau, triggered by a dry line stretching from near Childress to near San Angelo. Afternoon highs ranged from the 50s and 60s behind the front to 70s and 80s amid the upper-level low-pressure system. Winds were mostly southwesterly to westerly at 15 to 30 mph and gusty.

Space shuttle crew opens lab for round-the-clock experiments

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - Astronauts began two weeks' worth of experiments with fire and plants Saturday, a day after blasting into orbit aboard space shuttle Columbia. "Great to be here," Janice Voss, the astronaut in charge of the 33 experiments, said Friday as she floated into Columbia's bus-sized laboratory. "My, there's a lot of space back here." Voss and six crewmates rocketed into orbit Friday afternoon for round-the-clock work with flames, vegetables, crystals and metals. They opened the lab 4 1/2 hours after liftoff. Commander James Halsell Jr. and his crew, working 12-hour shifts, are performing experiments that may

contribute to the operation of a planned international space station. Because people spending long amounts of time in space may need to grow their own food, tests will run on pine seedlings and about 50 spinach, clover, sage and periwinkle plants to study their reaction to space. The astronauts will also ignite as many as 200 fires in a closed container to see how flames spread in weightlessness. The studies may lead to cleaner and more efficient fuels and improved firefighting methods in space and on Earth. Before liftoff, an unusually large number of spectators - including Neil Armstrong, the first man to walk on the moon, and Mercury astronaut

Wally Schirra - gathered around the Kennedy Space Center to see NASA's oldest shuttle blaze through the bright blue sky. Several thousand tourists were drawn by the warm, sunny weather and the convenient 2 p.m. launch time. "I just can't tell you how fantastic a ride it was for all of us here," Halsell told Mission Control. Columbia took off a little late because technicians had difficulty conducting a leak check of the crew cabin after a small, O-ring seal on the hatch became dislodged. Columbia is scheduled to return to Earth on April 20.

Culture shocked McNaughton likens trip to 'Hairferd' to Old West movie - complete with cowboys

You'll have to excuse Carol McNaughton if she happens to break into a smile as the mere thought of a cowboy hat, or gazes in amazement at the flatness of the land here in West Texas. It's culture shock you know. As a child growing up in Alyth, Scotland, she had seen the John Wayne and Clint Eastwood cowboy films and tried to imagine such a place where people actually wore hats and rode horses across a dusty, wind-swept plain. Those scenes, she felt, were a figment of someone's imagination. Even in her home of Alyth - a small 500-year-old village of a few thousand people located about an hour from Edinburgh, the idea of a cowboy seemed a mere dream - especially today as we near the start of the 21st century. Welcome to the real world, honey. Or at least West Texas. McNaughton, a 17-year-old

senior at Hereford High School, is finding those ideas she dismissed as imaginary only a few months ago are true. And almost every day, she stumbles across a part of American culture that gives her reason to smile - and wonder. "It's almost like a movie for me," said the blonde-haired Scottish beauty, who has been living in Hereford for the past few months as a foreign exchange student. "I remember when my friends back home found out I was going to Texas they said 'Oh Cowboys'. I laughed at them. I didn't really think there were cowboys, and then when I got here there are." "I was shocked," she said. "It's like opposite of where I live. In Scotland, it's all hills and lochs (lakes). It (Scotland) is so urbanized. The whole country is about the size of the panhandle with about five million people in it. And it rains a lot so it's really completely opposite from Hereford." McNaughton, who plans to return

and Jeri Bezner and their daughters Rachel and Jacque - at approximately midnight in Amarillo. Getting to Hereford wasn't quite as hard, the youngest of Doug and Linda McNaughton's four children indicated. In order to become a foreign exchange student, she filled out a brochure, wrote an essay on herself and attended an interview with exchange officials. Only about half of the students who applied for the program were accepted, she said. A native of Perth - a city about 40 minutes south of her parents' home, McNaughton has two older brothers; Matthew, 22, and Douglas, 29; and an older sister, Claire, 26. What about coming to the Lone Star State? "I didn't ask to go anywhere," McNaughton acknowledged. "I certainly didn't expect Texas." "When I found out I was coming I got a travel book on Texas and

on May 13. "The National Youth Summit is an important forum that will allow young people to join the fight against illegal underage drinking and impaired driving. "Together, they will develop creative and pertinent strategies that will lead possible solutions to a problem that directly affects all of us," she said. Harder and Gallegos will share those strategies with their classmates and colleagues.

"We will get to meet people and learn more about different ways to target the teenagers," Harder said. "Hopefully, we can use these ideas in the high school," Gallegos said. The National Youth Summit is one of seven programs in MADD's Youth in Action movement, a new youth focus announced in the fall of 1996. Since its inception, MADD has fought for tougher drinking and driving legislation. It has provided assistance to victims of drunk driving crashes.

MADD is committed to continuing these efforts and believes it can have an even greater impact on impaired driving and underage drinking by recruiting young people as partners in its new youth programs.

"We believe young people want to play an important role in helping establish new policies to change social norms about underage drinking and impaired driving," MADD National President Katherine Prescott said.

Federal judge refuses to block new rules in immigration laws

WASHINGTON (AP) - A federal judge refused Friday to block new rules allowing the nation's immigration agency greater authority to turn away foreigners seeking safe harbor in the United States.

In the first of several planned challenges to the nation's new immigration law, immigrant-rights lawyers asked U.S. District Judge Emmet G. Sullivan to block expedited removal rules that took effect

Tuesday. They contend potential refugees will be improperly turned away - and returned to the homelands they fled in fear - under unduly harsh regulations written by the Immigra-

tion and Naturalization Service. Sullivan declined to grant the temporary restraining order sought on behalf of the American Immigration Lawyers Association. Before getting to the merits of the "significant and important" issues raised, Sullivan is giving the Justice Department and immigrant-rights lawyers until mid-May to marshal their cases.

The Justice Department contends Sullivan's court has no jurisdiction to hear the case. The immigration law passed last year by Congress sharply limits courts' ability to review INS actions.

Lawyers for the American Civil Liberties Union and Lawyers' Committee on Civil Rights, who filed the legal challenge, expressed disappointment that the restraining order wasn't granted.

"Obviously, we're disappointed because we believe there are people at the airport right now who are being turned back," said Judy Rabinovitz, an attorney with the ACLU's Immigrant Rights Project.

Rabinovitz and her colleagues argue the INS went well beyond Congress' intent in drafting the expedited removal rules.

The regulations allow INS agents to refuse entry to travelers without documents or with improper paperwork unless the refugees demonstrate a credible fear of persecution if returned to their homeland.

The immigrant advocates contend the INS rules withhold information regarding asylum interviews from potential refugees and don't stipulate that the applicants have right to counsel.

Citizens group files lawsuit against hog farm operation

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) - A citizens group has given notice to Premium Standard Farms that it intends to sue unless the corporation ends alleged polluting at its northern Missouri hog farm operation.

The lawsuit will allege Premium Standard Farms is violating the federal Clean Water Act and Clean Air Act.

Under provisions of that law, notice has to be given 60 days before a lawsuit is filed to give the target time to correct any alleged violations.

The law does not provide for monetary damages, but may be used to force the correction of violations. A Kansas City law firm is representing the non-profit Citizen's Legal Environmental Action Network in the case. The group, adopting the moniker CLEAN, includes about 40 families who live near Premium Standard, which operates on about 30,000 acres in Mercer, Putnam and Sullivan counties.

The lawsuit would also name the Environmental Protection Agency for failing to enforce the law, CLEAN said. The group's announcement also blamed the Missouri Department of Natural Resources for failing to enforce the law, but did not say DNR would be named a defendant.

CLEAN alleged violations dating to 1991 of waste spills, leaks from waste lagoons, illegal application of waste on land and illegal disposal pits for dead pigs and trash.

The lawsuit would allege that Premium Standard's waste lagoons

have not been properly tested for leaks and that illegal amounts of particulates and gases are being allowed to leak into the air.

The company said it operates within the law, and said Missouri laws governing such operations are among the most stringent in the nation.

"We believe the case is completely without merit," said company spokesman Charlie Arnot.

The corporate farm has long been controversial in the rural part of the state. Objections include not only concerns about pollution but complaints that large hog farms force family farmers out of business.

Supporters of Premium Standard

say that the company has brought jobs and tax revenue to what otherwise may be a depressed area economically.

"This isn't about money," said Scott Dye, a spokesman for CLEAN. "We've complained, we've lobbied, we've petitioned to have them comply with the law, and nothing's been done. This is about preserving a way of life for the families in that area."

But Arnot said it was another attempt to force the Premium Standard out of business.

"Nothing would make these groups happy other than us going out of business," Arnot said. "And that's not going to happen."

Judge reduces award against TSTA system

WACO, Texas (AP) - An Austin judge Friday dramatically reduced a \$36 million judgment against the Texas State Technical College System.

Judge Scott McCown awarded more than \$2 million to David Snyder, former police chief at TSTC's Amarillo campus, and Eldon Davidson, the Amarillo school's former dean of students.

Snyder will get 1.5 million. The original award would have been almost half of the 8,000-student

system's operating budget of \$80 million.

On March 7, an Austin jury found that the two men were forced out of their jobs for reporting alleged campus corruption in November 1994.

"If the money was taken from our funds - and we didn't get it back some other way - it literally would have wrecked the TSTC System," said Ralph Strother, TSTC's interim chancellor.

"We would have had to reduce programs, maybe close campuses. This is a great relief."

Both Snyder and Davidson can decline to accept the judge's award. If they do so, however, the jury's judgment will be set aside and a new trial would have to be held.

Neither Snyder, who is the police chief in Shallowater, and Davidson, vice president for instruction at Flint River Technical Institute in Thomasville, Ga., could be reached for comment.

McNaughton, who speaks to her parents once a week via the phone, said her mother and brother, Matthew, are planning to come to Hereford next month to see the HHS graduation ceremony.

NEW YORK (AP) - It's a big switch - from a role as an AIDS-infected drug addict to a savior for Big Bird.

Daphne Rubin-Vega, the star of the Broadway musical "Rent," said Thursday that she had only one answer when asked to appear alongside the yellow-feathered star from Sesame Street.

"I couldn't say no to Big Bird," the 28-year-old actress said. "I think everybody wants to walk down Sesame Street. I grew up with Big Bird."

Rubin-Vega plays herself in the 30-minute Sesame Street video, "Quiet Time," released this week. She comes to the aid of Big Bird who is at a loss for things to do after his Granny Bird tells him it's "quiet time."

"It's about the little things that you can do during quiet time," she said. "I sing with Big Bird and give him ideas from the ridiculous to the sublime, like hanging a spoon from your nose and listening to raindrops."

"I'm sure he'd be pleased with the integration factor of players," Rachel Robinson said Thursday. "But the front office and general scheme still don't have equal opportunity. We still don't own any part. He'd be disappointed with that."

"A legacy was created in the struggle. He was looking for and impatient for progress. So am I."

Mrs. Robinson's remarks came during a conference on the impact her husband, baseball's first black player, had on the sport 50 years ago.

She said Robinson would be gratified with all the attention.

"He'd also be pleased that this is not just a ritual celebration of 50 years, but also looks at the present and where the residue of racism still exists and its impact," she said. "How can we recommit to the future? Without that, this would be empty for him and for me."

The play visualizes the havoc youthful innocence can wreak in the somber world of harsh realities.

Town to be remembered for beauty, designs

TYRONE, N.M. (AP) - The old copper mining town of Tyrone no longer exists, but its era is remembered as a rich and colorful period in the history of southwest New Mexico.

"It will go down as one of the best designed and most beautiful of the company towns," says Susan Berry, director of the Silver City Museum.

Plans for the community were drawn in 1914 by architect Bertram G. Goodhue. He had designed buildings at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y. and the National Academy of Sciences in Washington, D.C., and became known for designs featured at the Panama Pacific Exhibition, staged to celebrate the opening of the Panama Canal.

"His building designs created a sensation," Ms. Berry says.

Goodhue had recently returned from a trip to Mexico, and that probably influenced him to design Tyrone in the Spanish mission style, which would become popular in the Southwest in the 1920s, says a history of the townsite.

Phelps Dodge Corp. built Tyrone at a cost of about \$1 million, completing the project in 1918.

Tyrone succeeded the company town of Leopold, the townsite and mining operation of the Burro Mountain Copper Co., owned by the Leopold Brothers, according to the Silver City Museum. Phelps Dodge purchased the Burro Mountain Copper Co. in 1909, including Leopold and a 50-ton-a-day concentrator.

Tyrone's townsite included an administration building, bank, store, post office, railroad depot, court building, morgue, public library, school and a hospital.

The Silver City Museum received memorabilia, including office records, equipment and mementos from the hospital.

"The hospital was one of the most modern and best-equipped of its time," Ms. Berry said. "It was state of the art."

Some 83 dwellings for miners and administrators could accommodate about 235 families and were built on the hill above the townsite and in nearby canyons.

"Its buildings were arranged along hillsides in a most pleasant and remarkable manner," Ms. Berry said. "All the homes were special, down

to the dwelling of the most humble employee."

There also were six frame structures at what was known as The Pines, a resort Phelps Dodge had purchased in 1914. The area was turned into the Rancho Los Pinos Guest Ranch and remained popular through the 1930s.

"It seemed to be popular among Eastern scientists," Ms. Berry said. "Dr. Jonas Salk was said to have been a guest."

The resort offered tennis courts, croquet grounds, a swimming pool and a corral. But the gas rationing at the beginning of World War II virtually ended the tourist business and spelled the doom of the resort.

Tyrone's underground mine operated from April 1916 to April 1921.

A museum document about Tyrone said high copper prices at the outset of World War I led to the development of the town, "and the collapse of the world copper market after the war spelled the death of Old Tyrone."

Residences later were rented to local families until the mid-1960s, and the townsite became known as the "million dollar ghost town."

The buildings were sold or razed between 1966 and 1969.

Parts of the town are covered by tailings from the Tyrone Mine, and

the site of the plaza is now occupied by maintenance buildings. The court and a chapel are the only original buildings that still stand.

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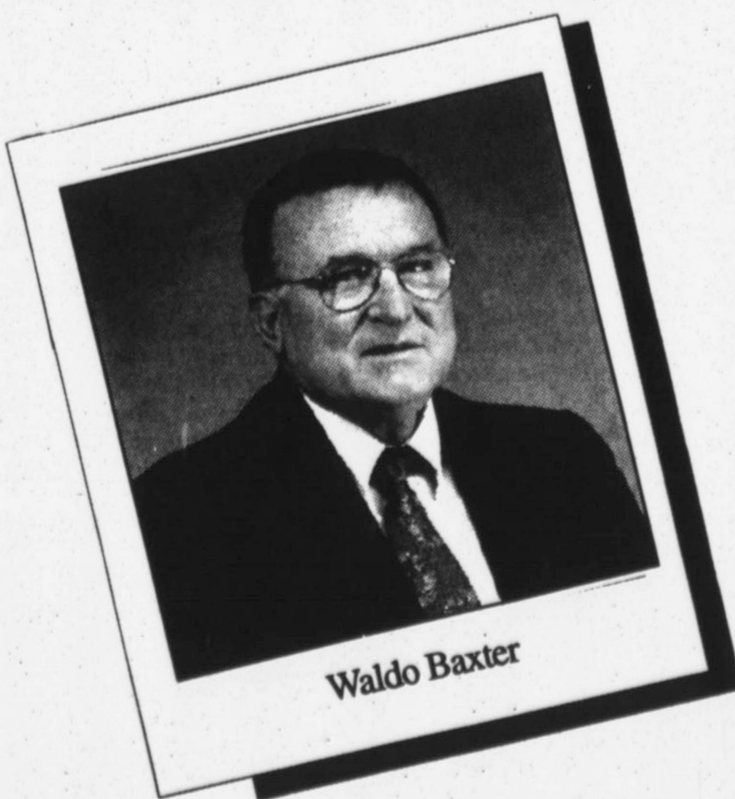

A sampling of editorial comment from Texas newspapers:

Austin American-Statesman on so-called tort reform:
Having gotten a large bite of the apple in the 1995 legislative session, tort "reformers" are back for another. But the Legislature ought to wait and see if consumers finally start getting their full slice of the apple - benefits they were supposed to reap for having the number and size of lawsuits curtailed.

Texans for Lawsuit Reform put up a passel of bills this session alleged to "maximize the benefits of all Texans - business professionals, trade groups and consumers alike," the group stated in a cover letter to an analysis of its new agenda. The letter also promised that the group was "performing in-depth background research as well, to insure that each initiative has a solid foundation in both the law and common sense."

But despite all that effort, at least one of the initiatives contained an enormous loophole that would have enabled nursing home owners to escape liability for the criminal acts of employees who hurt patients. ...

Maybe the savings will increase down the road, if fewer lawsuits result in more savings to corporations and insurers. But lawmakers ought to hold off on more "reform" until and unless consumers see more dramatic results.

Fort Worth Star-Telegram on allocation of high-definition TV channels:

There are plusses and minuses if the federal government gives broadcasters the TV channels needed for high-definition digital television signals - the next generation of television.

Broadcasters feel they were promised the airwaves free, and plead that they have spent a lot of money developing the higher-quality TV technology. Also, the government would have more leverage over use of the "public airwaves" than it would if those airwaves are sold. Those are among the reasons for giving away the channels.

On the other hand, selling these frequencies to the broadcasters - who will then make fabulous profits from them, not only for standard TV but also for data transmission and other commercial uses - could raise somewhere between \$11 billion and \$70 billion for the public good.

We tend to agree with former Sen. Bob Dole and the public interest group Common Cause - an unusual combination - that it is in the taxpayers' interest for the frequencies to be sold, and that a giveaway would be perceived by many as a rip-off. At the very least, the decision should be delayed and Federal Communications Commission ground rules firmly established for use of the new channels, because this is a matter of immense public importance.

The Dallas Morning News on the State Board of Education:
One thing can be said for certain. State Board of Education meetings are no longer dull.

The usually calm sessions have been turned upside down by heated charges that a national public education conspiracy is about to infiltrate the Texas schools.

Six board members, supported by Christian conservatives, are fighting a new curriculum plan on the basis that it will tie this state's schools to "liberal" national education standards.

The six also claim technical courses recommended for the curriculum are an attempt by industry to have available cheap labor.

The Texas Business and Education Coalition, a group of educators and top business executives, is infuriated by the charges. And rightly so. The coalition supports courses that help high school students prepare to enter the work force. But the organization also strongly supports greater math, education and science requirements. ...

Another false claim is that the new curriculum can be linked to one source - the National Center on Education and the Economy.

Dear Editor:

On Feb. 19, 1997, an article by Speedy Nieman reported on the director's meeting for the Deaf Smith County Hospital District. The article reported that Henry Reid was Dr. Johnson's landlord. This is not correct. Henry Reid represents C&R Company as property manager of the Professional Center where Dr. Johnson's office is.

Concerning the report and the hospital's dilemma, I feel the issue was a very simple business transaction. The original lease was between Dr. Johnson and C&R Co. The hospital bought out Dr. Johnson's practice around July of 1996. Since this lease was not assignable without written consent, we required that the hospital transfer or assume Dr. Johnson's lease. However, the hospital did not respond and this resulted in default of the lease agreement.

Last year, I went in person to the hospital and tried to resolve this matter. I sent several letters with proposed leases on simple printed forms and have not received a response since July of 1996 regarding the lease. Therefore, I hired an attorney who informed me that he could not foresee any problems getting such a simple rental agreement signed.

My attorney attempted to resolve this matter, however we still have not received a written agreement with a specified occupancy term nor other items incidental to a rental agreement. Due to the high liability costs involved, I was advised to increase the rent since we did not have signed rental agreement. All of our other tenants have taken care of their business and have signed leases on the same simple printed forms with no problems and seem to be very happy.

We also presented a proposal to the hospital for the purchase of the Professional Center. C&R Co. and the hospital negotiated the contract three times. We were approximately 6 percent apart when the hospital abruptly withdrew their offer and informed us they were going to construct a new building. They made this announcement public, which was reported in The Brand article referenced above.

The day after the hospital board meeting, Dr. Johnson called me and asked me to meet with him at his office. He asked me to please make every effort possible to sell the hospital the building (Professional Center). Dr. Johnson informed me that he is very satisfied and happy with his clinic and its location. After designing the clinic to his own specifications and having it built exactly to suit him, Dr. Johnson would rather not move and disrupt his practice and his patients. Therefore, I promised him I would make every effort on C&R Company's part to reach

an agreement.

From what I understand, C&R Company might have exactly what the hospital wants. The Professional Center is 13,500 sq. ft. and has all of the following benefits: completely remodeled inside and out; fully insulated; thermal pane windows; air lock doors; accessible by wheelchair; contains four Doctors' Clinics, three of which are presently occupied and one that is currently available; contains three additional spacious tenant spaces; a new roof; encompasses four large commercial lots; a completely paved parking lot with 70 parking spaces; easy access; located in the center of town; and only three minutes from the hospital.

If the Professional Center fits the wants and needs of the hospital and

will solve their problem, C&R Company will sell it to them for the last price they offered before the cease of negotiations, and we will schedule the closing for July 15, 1997. Or, if they will sign a lease, we will charge them reasonable rents.

In so doing, I believe we will have made every effort to deal with the hospital in a fair and legal way. We want to help the taxpayers save all the money they can and not make a hardship for Dr. Johnson or his patients. Again, we are willing to work with the hospital in any way we can. I do appreciate and thank the people of Hereford, as I have never received a negative response from the article on the board meeting.

WASHINGTON (AP) - For a vice president looking for a promotion, being No. 2 offers assets that far outweigh the inevitable liabilities.

Al Gore has been having his troubles lately, but his job as vice president still gives him a major advantage over other Democrats with ambitions for the 2000 presidential nomination.

The flap over his aggressive campaign fund raising and the criticism of his China diplomacy are examples of the downside. Vice presidents take their assignments from presidents. On foreign missions, they can't go past administration bounds to make political points at home.

President Clinton set the tone for the hard-sell fund raising that Congress is investigating. The vice president was part of it - making calls from his office that he said weren't wrong but won't happen again - and the case is denting his image of campaign cleanliness. He certainly bent the rules, and Republicans say he broke them.

In Beijing, his role was to pursue Clinton's policy of engagement with China, and while he said he'd gained momentum for progress on human rights and trade, there were no specific commitments. That's not unusual and Clinton's China policy is little changed from George Bush's.

But the long-scheduled trip put Gore in a politically difficult spot. The FBI is investigating alleged Chinese attempts to buy U.S. influence with campaign donations. And House Speaker Newt Gingrich followed Gore to Beijing, taking a harsher public line on stress points, including rights in Hong Kong after China takes over and a U.S. defense of Taiwan against any attack from the mainland.

Gore, under diplomatic constraints, looked soft by comparison. But the president's spokesman said the vice president had a very specific mission and fulfilled it.

"He was there to further and deepen a dialogue that ... ultimately leads to an exchange of visits between the two presidents," Mike McCurry

said, "and he did that exceedingly well. Mission accomplished."

Political missions are another matter.

Vice presidents are supporting players, not stars. The shift to running for the top job always is difficult. It is a matter of gaining stature independently, without breaching vice presidential loyalty.

That is a particular problem for Gore because of the political attention he is getting so early, with an off-year election and most of the second Clinton term still ahead. While Gore clearly intends to run next time, he doesn't, and can't, talk about 2000.

Obviously, his standing will be closely tied to Clinton's. In a poll conducted March 24 to 26 for CNN and USA Today, that was underlined by their identical job approval ratings: 59 percent.

Other recent surveys show more people doubt he would be a good president than think he would, but that he is far ahead of any other prospect for the 2000 Democratic nomination.

Vice presidents or former vice presidents do better than anyone else in gaining presidential nominations. There's been one on a ticket in five of the past seven presidential elections. Four of the last seven presidents served as vice president first, although only Bush was elected while serving in the second job.

McCurry said Gore's problem on the China trip was that it was scrutinized for the impact on his own political future. "He took a political press corps with him that covered him like he was making a trip to Des Moines instead of a trip to Beijing," McCurry said.

Actually, it was no different from contingents that have covered him before. It is the political surroundings that have changed since Clinton's re-election and signals that he wants Gore to succeed him. Gore, like Bush, already had run unsuccessfully for nomination, in 1988.

He won't get there in 2000 without a contest. Rep. Dick Gephardt of Missouri, the House Democratic leader, is drawing issue lines and appearing in the early primary states. At least three senators and a former senator are potential entries.

Lawmakers want to add tax to lottery ticket price

AUSTIN (AP) - Some state lawmakers want to squeeze another dime out of the Texas lottery — and it could come from players' pockets.

The House Select Committee on Revenue and Public Education Funding is looking for ways to lower local school property taxes by increasing the state's share of local school funding.

One proposal would expand the state business tax, increase some other taxes and expand the number of goods and services to which the sales tax is applied. One of those items could be lottery tickets, which would be hit with a 10-cent tax.

"If people are willing to drive to Louisiana (to gamble), they'll pay 10 cents more to play Lotto," said Rep. Mark Stiles, D-Beaumont.

"It's not going to happen," responds Rep. Ron Wilson, D-Houston. Wilson introduced the constitutional amendment that led to the Texas Lottery.

Rep. Paul Sadler, D-Henderson,

chairman of the committee, said the issue could be compromised so that the state gets another dime's profit out of every lottery dollar without raising prices.

But Steve Levine, a spokesman for the lottery, said there are few places to get another dime out of lottery proceeds.

The state currently gets 31 cents from every lottery dollar. Seven cents goes to lottery administration, five cents goes to lottery retailers and 57 cents goes to prizes.

The state has made more than \$4 billion since the lottery started in 1992. Stiles thinks it can get more.

"I don't apologize for this one," he said, adding that the goal is to pay for cuts to local school property taxes. "We're talking about a substantial cut."

Under state law, retailers get 5 percent of lottery proceeds. Even if that law was changed, at least some of the 10 cents would have to come from the administration and-or prize allocations.

"We've seen information that shows that when the percent of

prizes go up, sales go up and profits go up for the state," Levine said.

Levine said lowering prizes would have the opposite affect, driving sales down. He could not say how much.

Fiscal analysts at the Texas Comptroller's office have said a 10-cent tax could cut sales by at least 10 percent. They figure people planning to spend \$10 on lottery tickets would have only enough to buy nine tickets, with a dime left over, rather than the 10 tickets they would have bought without the tax.

No other state taxes lottery tickets. A 10 percent lottery sales tax in Western Canada, which lasted less than six months before being repealed, was publicly rejected and drove sales down dramatically, Levine said.

But even with the potential sales losses attributed to a \$1.10 ticket, analysts estimate the state would bring in an extra \$300 million in 1998-99 and another \$361.6 million in 2000-2001.

The total local school property tax cut plan is about \$5.7 billion.

The proposed tax, and all future revenue from the lottery, would be dedicated to education under the pending plan and under other bills pending before the Legislature.

Lottery proceeds go to the state general fund.

Of the \$83.3 billion being budgeted for spending between Sept. 1 and Aug. 31, 1999, about \$36 billion will go to education. Lottery proceeds would be far short of covering the total expense.

Wilson said dedicating lottery proceeds to education doesn't mean schools would get extra money. Instead, an equal amount of general fund money would be taken away.

"If it's not extra, why do it," asked Brenda Clark, an Austin woman. "I was under the impression that it would be extra."

Ms. Clark, who said she occasionally buys lottery tickets, also opposed the dime tax. She said it would hit those people who already shouldn't be spending money on the lottery.

But Sen. Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, said people are angry with

lawmakers because they believed the lottery would go directly to education. Mrs. Nelson has a bill dedicating lottery proceeds to schools pending before a Senate subcommittee.

Sen. Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, said dedicating the funds to education would be decep-

tive. "We would be telling the people of Texas we dedicated those proceeds to education, and then we would have to turn around and take out the same amount of general revenue. People would have every right to be incensed that we were playing games with them."

Parents may begin teaching kids to drive

AUSTIN (AP) - Beginning Monday, parents may take the wheel in teaching their children to drive.

Until now, only schools and instructors certified by the Texas Education Agency could provide official driver training courses.

But under a law passed by the 1995 Legislature, parents or guardians will be allowed to teach their children.

The Department of Public Safety said Friday it has developed administrative rules and curriculum materials to implement the program. Successful completion of the course allows teen-agers to obtain licenses at age 16.

Starting Monday, parents wanting to teach their children may pick up request forms at most DPS drivers license offices. They must follow procedures and curriculum guidelines set by the DPS.

The approved curriculum requires at least 32 hours of classroom instruction and 14 hours of in-car instruction. Parents must use state-approved textbooks in addition to materials provided by the DPS.

The first step is obtaining a driver education packet request form.

Parents fill out the form and include the address of the license office where the student will undergo testing, since a driver education certificate must be mailed to that office in the student's name.

The completed form must be mailed to DPS headquarters, along with a \$20 fee, for the material packet. The packet includes instructions, forms, a Texas Drivers Handbook, a model curriculum guide and a resource list for textbooks and other materials, the DPS said.

La. oyster beds to reopen soon

BATON ROUGE, LA. (AP) - The state health department said oyster beds in eastern Louisiana, closed since November because of the red tide algae, will reopen Saturday.

"We are happy to report that all oyster beds which had been closed previously because of the red tide algae are being reopened. What's even better is that we were able to detect the algae and close the beds before anyone got sick from contaminated oysters," Bobby Jindal, secretary of the Department of Health and Hospitals, said in a news release Friday.

Last November, DHH halted oyster harvesting in coastal waters east of the Mississippi River Gulf Outlet to the Mississippi state line because of the red tide algae, which had not appeared in Louisiana for at least 30 years.

By February, the algae had dissipated, allowing for some beds to be reopened. Others in extreme eastern Louisiana remained closed. Those will reopen Saturday at sunrise.

Red tide is made up of microscopic algae that attack the nervous systems of fish and create a reddish tint in seawater. Its toxins can penetrate shellfish tissues, making them unsafe to eat.

Symptoms caused by consuming seafood contaminated by red tide toxins include numbness, severe stomach cramps and diarrhea. The contamination can be fatal, although no human deaths have been attributed to the algae bloom, according to the University of Texas Marine Science Institute.

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State lawmakers could be ready to send Robin Hood plan to graveyard

AUSTIN (AP) - The Robin Hood school funding system that forces wealthy school districts to share their money with poorer ones could be on the way out.

Lawmakers struggled for nearly 10 years before coming up with the share-the-wealth plan in 1993. Before that, three school funding plans were ruled unconstitutional by the Texas Supreme Court.

The current system, upheld by the court in 1995, depends heavily on local school property taxes and state contributions to pay for school operations. It designates 91 school districts as wealthy because they have an abundance of taxable property to raise local money for schools.

The plan forces those schools to

share their money with districts that have less taxable property from which to raise local school funds for themselves. There are 1,044 Texas school districts.

A House committee working on a way to lower local school property taxes across the state has developed a plan to replace much of the local school taxes with state taxes, eliminating the need for wealthy districts to share their money, committee members say.

Under the plan, local residential property taxes would drop from an average of \$1.40 per \$100 in value to 50 cents per \$100 for school operations. Business property would be taxed by the state at \$1 per \$100. Taxes could be higher to pay for school buildings and other debt.

The funding plan also allows

school districts to increase the 50-cent residential property tax level by up to 10 cents to pay for extra programs.

Districts would have to hold local elections to raise that additional money and wouldn't get additional state funds for the extra tax.

Under the current funding system, schools are guaranteed a certain amount of money up to a tax rate of \$1.50.

Members of the House Select Committee on Revenue and Public Education Funding on Friday said that has been a driving force in the growth of local school taxes across the state.

To pay for the local school property tax cuts, lawmakers would expand the state business tax to all businesses - except sole proprietorships. Only corporations currently

pay the tax. Lawmakers also would raise some taxes, like those on alcohol and tobacco products and would increase the number of goods and services subject to the sales tax.

The committee, which has scheduled public hearings on the plan Monday and Tuesday, had considered a 10-cent tax on lottery tickets. That would have driven sales down, but would have increased lottery revenues by \$300 million in 1998-99.

The committee has opted away from the 10 cent tax. Instead, it will force the Texas Lottery Commission to cut administrative costs, which average about 7 percent of all lottery proceeds. It will also lower prizes, which average 57 cents per \$1 spent on tickets, to about 55 cents per \$1.

"It won't make a blip," said Rep. Ron Wilson, D-Houston. He sponsored the 1992 constitutional amendment that led to the lottery.

Tech to open historical research center

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - Last week, Texas Tech was playing catch-up with other schools when it broke ground on a new basketball arena.

Today, the school aims for a leadership position with the formal opening of its Southwest Collection research center.

The building will feature literature, art and historical materials on topics ranging from the defunct Southwest Conference to the Vietnam War.

"By June, we would say without fear of contradiction that we've got the best research collection on the Vietnam War in the country," said James R. Reckner, director of Tech's Center for the Study of the Vietnam Conflict. "Especially considering that in 1989 we started with nothing, that's quite an achievement."

In June, Douglas Pike will haul his extensive Indochina Archive from the University of California-Berkeley to the Southwest Collection-Special Collections Library.

The 78,000-square-foot building

has 50,000 books on the American West and Southwest, 35,000 photographs, 4,500 oral history tapes, 1,500 newspaper and magazine titles, and 9,300 reels of film.

The collection previously resided in a building with one-fifth the space.

Half of the photos include scenes from almost every major Texas ranch, captured through the lens of former Fort Worth Star-Telegram livestock reporter Frank Reeves.

"Selected prints will form the basis of two exhibits, which will focus on the depth and breadth of Reeves' work," said Southwest Collection director David Munnah.

A who's who of former SWC names was on hand Thursday to honor the presence of documents and materials from the league, which disbanded last summer. Among the guests were former Baylor football coach Grant Teaff and Fred Jacoby, SWC commissioner from 1982 to 1993, who helped forge the relationship that resulted in the Big 12.

Of the vast array of research materials, the Vietnam War collection might be the crown jewel.

"People will still seek answers to our involvement in Vietnam," said Reckner, a 20-year Navy veteran who served on South Vietnamese riverboats. "Just as we still seek answers to the Civil War, 130 years later, they'll have to come to places like Texas Tech to study Vietnam. The wall (monument in Washington) won't provide answers; the documents will."

The collection will be especially important for the growing generation of researchers who didn't experience the war, he said.

"Just now, the first books are appearing that were written by people to participate in the war," Reckner said. "They will present a different story of our war than we can."

"It doesn't matter how hard we try to be balanced. The fact is, every one in of our generation was influenced one way or another by the war."

Columbia blasts off on 16-day science mission

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - Space shuttle Columbia and seven astronauts soared into orbit today on a 16-day mission to advance the age-old science of fire.

"Enjoy your on-orbit spring break," a launch controller told the crew just before liftoff.

NASA's oldest shuttle blasted off at 2:20 p.m., after a one-day delay so thermal insulation could be installed on two exposed water pipes. It was an ideal spring day for launching. Columbia pierced thin, wispy clouds in an otherwise vivid blue sky.

Liftoff was scheduled for 2 p.m., but technicians at the launch pad had trouble conducting a leak check of the shuttle cabin because of a seal on the hatch that had to be replaced at the last minute.

The area was so jammed - primarily with tourists taking advantage of the Easter holiday and spring break - that roads leading into the Kennedy Space Center were closed to traffic 1 1/2 hours before liftoff.

The astronauts will set as many as 200 small fires in Columbia's laboratory - more than on any previous shuttle flight.

Scientists want to see how quickly flames spread in weightlessness in order to develop cleaner fuels and better firefighting techniques, both in space and on Earth.

The tests are among 33 planned experiments that are considered precursors for the future international space station. Also on board are spinach, clover, sage and pine seedlings, as well as various crystals and metals.

The actual flames, no more than 4 inches high, will be inside a closed, triple-layer chamber in the lab. Hot wires and various fuels will be used, including hydrogen, heptane and methanol.

"One of the reasons that we don't have many combustion experiments until this late in the game is precisely because of NASA's concerns with safety," said Forman Williams, chairman of engineering sciences at the University of California at San Diego.

There are built-in extinguishers and five hand-held extinguishers on board. In a worst-case scenario, astronauts could evacuate the burning lab, close the hatch and empty the air inside to smother the flames.

An accidental fire burned for 90 seconds aboard the Russian space station Mir in February.

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Clinton urges Senate to pass chemical-weapons ban

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Clinton stood shoulder-to-shoulder with a star cast of Republicans and Democrats Friday, urging the Senate to pass a global ban on chemical weapons.

Without the United States' imprimatur on the 161-nation treaty, "America will go from leading the world to joining the company of pariah nations," the president said.

Among Republicans joining Clinton at the South portico of the White House to push passage of the treaty before an April 29 deadline were former Secretary of State James A. Baker III, former Kansas Sen. Nancy Kassebaum Baker and retired Army Gen. Colin Powell.

Addressing critics of the accord, a product of two previous administrations that has languished in the Senate since 1993, James Baker said, "Frankly, the suggestion that George Bush and Ronald Reagan would negotiate a treaty detrimental to this nation's security is outrageous."

Lawmakers, diplomats, religious

leaders, military brass and chemical company executives applauded from their chairs on the sun-splashed lawn.

The Chemical Weapons Convention, signed by 161 countries and ratified by 70 so far, would ban development, production, acquisition, stockpiling, retention and transfer of chemical weapons.

The accord takes effect with or without U.S. approval. Supporters say that without ratification, the United States will have no role in its implementation and U.S. chemical companies could face sanctions.

Opponents assert the pact would be difficult to enforce, leaving the U.S. vulnerable to rogue states who don't sign on, and might burden companies that produce chemicals for legitimate purposes.

"Can somebody cheat? Somebody can always cheat. But are you better off with having some rules to try and catch the cheaters or no rules at all," asked Powell, who was not included in Friday's lineup on stage but talked with reporters after-

ward.

Clinton himself acknowledged that the treaty was no sure-fire guar-

antee that poison gas is never used in warfare - but he said having help from 161 other nations was better than any other option.

"Trying to stop (chemical weapons) spread by ourselves would be like trying to stop the wind that helps carry their poison to its target," Clinton said.

Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, and a staunch opponent, has scheduled a hearing on the treaty on Tuesday - its 14th congressional hearing since first landing in the Senate in November 1993.

"If the administration negotiates in good faith and we reach agreement on the remaining issues that divide us, we could have a treaty," Helms said.

Helms is negotiating with the administration on a ratification resolution that would bind the United States to certain monitoring and enforcement conditions in implementing the treaty. Helms also wants to address effects on the U.S.

chemical industry.

While Majority Leader Trent Lott has promised to bring up the treaty before it takes effect, Clinton would still need a two-thirds majority in the Senate for ratification.

He refused Friday to speculate on the vote's prospects, saying only "We're going to have to work like crazy to get there."

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State employees ready to fight for pay increases

AUSTIN (AP) - State employees acknowledge they face a tough battle but say they are ready to fight it out for a pay raise.

Hundreds of state agency employees on Friday spent their lunch hour talking strategy and getting an update on current efforts to get a raise.

State senators have included in

their \$5.5 billion "wish list" a \$200-per-month across-the-board raise for all employees. That proposal, tied to the proposed \$83.3 billion state budget for the next two-year spending period, faces negotiations between the House and Senate.

"I wish it was in the base budget and was a done deal. That's not the case and there's a lot of work to be done," Sen. Gonzalo Barrientos, D-

Austin, told the state workers. Barrientos fought to increase a \$100 raise in the wish list to \$200.

State workers said while they are fighting for raises, they also must be wary of pending efforts to turn over state jobs to private companies. A plan to allow private companies to vie for the business of determining who gets welfare benefits is awaiting approval from federal officials.

"Any time you downsize, quality

of service goes down," said Susanne Gutierrez, a systems analyst for the Texas comptroller's office.

Barrientos told workers to use everything and everyone they could to convince his fellow lawmakers that a pay raise should be worked into the budget.

"There are many needs and priorities in this state and they are all important," Barrientos said. "But as I have reminded my colleagues, they need state employees to make their programs work."

Joe Gunn, president of the AFL-CIO, told workers they must be organized and direct in asking for their raise.

Law enforcement officials won't dismiss charges against man — even if he's dead

ROCKWALL, Texas (AP) - Robert Staley didn't show up for his day in court this week, but no one's out beating the bushes for him.

He's been dead for a year.

However, the county's legal system has kept the August 1995 cocaine-possession charge against him very much alive, repeatedly resetting pretrial hearings.

Until a death certificate arrives, Staley is officially a bail jumper in the eyes of the law.

"We have to have a death certificate," said Judy Perser, court administrator for state District Judge Sue Pirtle. "Then we will gladly lay him to rest."

The court has repeatedly asked defense lawyer Ted Sansom to provide the death certificate, but he claims that's the district attorney's

job, Ms. Perser said. "It's been going back and forth," she said.

Assistant District Attorney Rick Calvert said it's difficult to get a death certificate unless you're an immediate family member because "you have to jump through all these hoops" with Dallas record-keepers.

Relatives of Staley, a longtime Veterans Affairs Medical Center employee, could not be located for comment, The Dallas Morning News reported Friday.

Sansom, a court-appointed lawyer, says he's had almost no contact with the family and showed court officials an obituary in hopes that would suffice.

At the latest court hearing Monday, Sansom told the judge, "I'd rather do a jury trial than get a

record out of Dallas."

"I assume your client wants to maintain his right to remain silent," the judge jokingly told Sansom.

One problem in getting the record straight is a strange coincidence.

Staley and his son, also named Robert W. Staley, died almost exactly a year apart while living at the same address.

The younger Staley died of a cocaine overdose on April 2, 1995. His father, 60, died of a heart attack on April 3, 1996.

Calvert said he understands the judge's position because some criminals are so crafty.

"What better way to get out of it than to pretend you're dead?" the prosecutor said.

Guards who wouldn't shoot escapee fired

BEEVILLE, Texas (AP) - Two prison guards who failed to shoot an inmate as he scaled a fence and escaped March 22 have been fired, prison officials say.

Jose Salaz, 21, was serving a 35-year sentence on two charges of aggravated assault against a public servant and one charge of aggravated kidnapping when he escaped from the Garza East Unit. He remains at large.

Texas Department of Criminal Justice spokesman Larry Todd said Thursday that two female tower guards should have fired their weapons to first warn and then injure Salaz.

"It's a direct violation of policy to not fire, first a warning shot and then a second shot, at an escaping inmate," Todd said. "The second shot is to disable or stop a fleeing inmate who is obviously trying to escape."

Allowing an inmate to escape is "very extreme. We are charged with public safety. They both failed and, therefore, violated departmental policy," Todd told the Victoria Advocate.

The women were terminated earlier this week, Todd said. He would not release their names, however, because "they are effectively under administrative review and, also, they have a right to appeal."

Texas Department of Criminal Justice officials say an intensive

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HIV virus no longer detectable in Magic's system

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Magic Johnson's HIV infection has dropped to undetectable levels because of drug therapy, doctors say.

Lon Rosen, agent for the former Los Angeles Lakers star, confirmed: "Earvin's viral activity is infinitesimal."

Rosen says that does not mean Johnson is free of the virus that causes AIDS.

Thousands of HIV patients have seen their infections recede to undetectable levels after taking powerful drugs called protease inhibitors, approved last year by the Food and Drug Administration.

Protease inhibitors lengthen life and reduce illnesses in infected patients. The drugs are taken with at least two other AIDS drugs on a difficult schedule that must be followed strictly.

As many as 40 percent of patients on the potent "cocktail" of drugs eventually develop resistance to

them, either because they have a virus made resistant after years on other AIDS drugs, or because they are unable to take the drugs as ordered.

The regimen sometimes requires constant attention and meticulous timing - some drugs must be taken an hour before eating or two hours after. And many patients suffer nausea, vomiting, headaches, backaches and gastrointestinal problems on the drugs.

The basketball star's wife insists it was God who intervened.

"The Lord has definitely healed Earvin," Cookie Johnson told Ebony magazine in an interview published this month. Doctors "think it's the medicine. We claim it in the name of Jesus," Mrs. Johnson said.

Johnson announced in 1991 that he had been diagnosed with HIV. He played 14 seasons with the Lakers, from 1979 to 1992.

"It's bittersweet," Dishman told Houston's KRIV-TV. "Bitter, 'cause I'm leaving Houston, a place I've been for so long. It's like I would never leave. It's also sweet because it's a new beginning."

Dishman, 31, also entertained offers from Chicago and Pittsburgh. He entered the free agent market hoping to secure a contract worth \$3 million a year, and rejected a three-year offer from the Bears worth about \$6 million. The Steelers reportedly had a bigger deal on the table, but withdrew the offer before a contract was signed.

Sharp is finishing the first year of a five-year contract at Tech.

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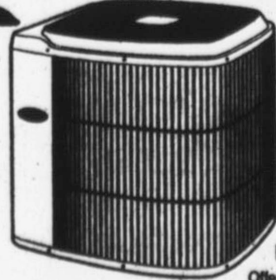
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Spurs feeling effects of poor season in pocketbook

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - The Spurs' gloomy season on the court is taking its toll on the ticket booth. With less than three weeks remaining in the NBA regular season, the Spurs' average attendance so far is lower than any of the franchise's previous years in the Alamodome.

"There's no question about it being off," said Spurs president Jack Diller. "We're sort of pleased that we're able to get the kind of

support that we've gotten." David Robinson, Sean Elliott and several other players have been sidelined with injuries. So Spurs fans have had to be content watching lots of reserves and witnessing lots of losses.

The Spurs' dropped to 18-54 after Wednesday night's 99-92 loss to Detroit. San Antonio holds the third-worst record in the NBA and is headed toward being a lottery team.

Average home attendance through Wednesday's game was

17,138. That is down from the average of 19,791 for the 1995-96 regular season. The Spurs began playing in the Alamodome at the start of the 1993-94 season. Attendance averaged more than 22,000 each of the first two seasons in the building.

Spurs executives are pushing for the construction of a new, smaller arena they say would be better suited for basketball and would be equipped with revenue-producing luxury suites.

Lower attendance and not making the playoffs this season will factor

into the team's bottom line when the fiscal year ends June 30.

Last year, when the Spurs advanced to the Western Conference semifinals, the franchise made about \$300,000 for the fiscal year, Diller said. The Spurs lost \$2.6 million in the regular season, but that was offset by profits from the playoffs and other Spurs-promoted events.

Projections for this fiscal year were not yet available.

"The trends obviously are negative this year versus last," Diller

said.

Evidence of the attendance slump can be seen at the Spurs box office, where all levels of tickets often are available in the days leading up to a game, even one against a top visiting team.

Inside the Alamodome during games, areas of empty seats are apparent.

But many fans who have been attending Spurs games remain loyal.

Louis Konze, an insurance agent

and season-ticket holder, said he understands injuries have hurt the Spurs. "Die-hard" fans will continue to support the team, while "fly-by-nighters" won't, he said.

Tino Hernandez, a retired United Parcel Service driver, said it's obvious to "a true fan" that the Spurs are working hard.

"The potential is still here for a championship team next year," Hernandez said. "By showing up and having fun in the stands, it will keep them motivated."

Morgan opens two-shot lead in event

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP) - Gil Morgan dressed like Santa Claus. Then he coaxed some gifts out of the Cochise Course at Desert Mountain.

Wearing a red stocking cap with white trim and red sweater to deal

with another day of below-normal temperatures, Morgan took advantage of rain-softened greens Friday to record his second straight 6-under-par 66.

His 36-hole total of 132 was good for a two-stroke lead over Terry Dill, John Jacobs and Isao Aoki at the midpoint of The Tradition, the

season's first senior major. Each made a run at Morgan after the senior tour rookie finished early, and came up short after costly bogeys.

Jim Dent, Graham Marsh and J.C. Snead were five shots back at 137, with George Archer at 138 and Walter Morgan at 139 among chal-

lengers in the tournament, which is sponsored by Countrywide.

Simon Hobday, who shared the lead with Morgan, Jacobs, Aoki and Snead after the first round, was in a six-member group at 140, and Jack Nicklaus followed his opening 67 with a 2-over 74 to land with five others at 141.

The struggles of Hobday and Nicklaus, who has won four of his seven senior major titles in the Tradition, and the fact only 31 players in the field of 78 bettered par, underscore Morgan's mastery of the inclement conditions.

Morgan won his second senior event last fall at the age of 50 years, 11 days - the youngest ever - but he is still a rookie because he played only five tournaments. He had played only 27 practice holes on the mountainside Cochise Course.

But the lack of practice didn't show. In the second round, he made birdie putts of 25 and 18 feet, saved par with a 20-footer, and on No. 18 pitched out of the rough to three feet for his eighth birdie.

New race track creates problems for drivers

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - Good or bad, one thing most of the Winston Cup drivers agree on is that the 1 1/2-mile oval at the new Texas Motor Speedway is unlike any other race track they've seen.

The track was the major topic of discussion Friday as rain that began Thursday - postponing the first round of qualifying for Sunday's Interstate Batteries 500 - continued to fall.

After waiting until 4 p.m. CST in the hope of getting in at least some activity, NASCAR decided the day was a washout. The new schedule for Saturday will give the Winston Cup drivers 30 minutes of practice before the 42-car field is decided in one round of time trials at 9:30 a.m.

The Coca-Cola 300 Busch Grand National race will go on as scheduled, beginning at 1 p.m.

Dale Jarrett, the series points leader and winner of the last two Winston Cup races, struggled in Thursday's practice sessions, ranking 34th on the speed list.

"This is something totally new," Jarrett said. "We were kicking ourselves because we didn't come here to test like a lot of the teams did. It's a totally different race track. We struggled when we first went out there. The car was better than the driver for much of the day."

"We started to make some progress in the second (practice) session, and I think we could have got a good top 10 qualifying effort."

Terry Labonte, the defending Winston Cup champion and third in the current standings, said, "We did come here to test and we found out real quick it was a good thing we did. When we started (the test), we were out in leftfield."

"By the time we finished, we had a good handle on it," Labonte added. "I hate that qualifying got rained out (Thursday). We had a good run in practice."

"At a new race track like this, you want to get in every minute you can get on the track," Jarrett said. "You just don't want to waste time. All we've done so far is a qualifying-type effort. We need more track time."

"Right now, when you come to a track like this, everybody goes out and makes one or two laps," Labonte said. "Everybody is running the same line, and the track just has one (racing) groove."

"Tomorrow, after the Busch race, when there's some passing and lapping traffic, the groove will, hopefully, widen out. Hopefully, there will be a lot more rubber on the track."

"It's a tough track. ... It's different than any track we run at. ... It's a tricky place. You've got to make

some laps to get comfortable. Then you have to work on your car, too, because your Atlanta setup and your Charlotte setup aren't what you need here. I don't know if it's a driver's track or a car's track."

Jarrett agreed.

"Like most places, it takes a combination of car and driver," he said. "Until he can get his car to feeling like he can run down into these tight corners and get back into the gas, the driver can't make up the difference. You've got to get the car right. It's not like anywhere else that we run."

Sorghum disease spreads to Texas High Plains area produces 90 percent of U.S. sorghum seed

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) - Leaders in the Texas sorghum industry are trying to decide how to protect their crop from a disease that has never been reported in the United States before.

Researchers at Texas A&M said the sorghum ergot (ERR-got) was an Eastern Hemisphere disease until 1995, when it was discovered in Brazil. It spread quickly throughout South America, up through Central America and into Texas - all within two years.

Officials say it made its way to Brazil possibly on the shoes of travelers or in shipments of planting seed.

The discovery of ergot in a Texas field was announced late last week. It was found in a field where sorghum had sprouted from last year's crop in the lower Rio Grande Valley.

Ergot causes the flowers of sorghum heads to secrete a sweet, sticky fluid, rather than grain - causing significant losses in yield and quality.

"Ultimately, we probably will have ergot throughout the entire sorghum growing area of the United States," said Dr. Richard Frederiksen, a pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

"We had long argued that the one thing we (sorghum industry) did not want in the Western Hemisphere is ergot. So now it shows up. We have it," Frederiksen said.

Texas producers have begun planting sorghum at the southernmost reaches of the state, and planting will proceed northward on up to 3 million acres through early summer.

To confront the problem, at least four efforts are racing through the decision-making process:

- Dr. Gary Odvody, Experiment Station plant pathologist at Corpus Christi, is assisting with paperwork that will ask the Texas Department of Agriculture to allow for an emergency authorization to use the

fungicide propiconazole. It is available in the United States but not currently labeled for use on grain sorghum for control of ergot.

- State Sen. Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo, has introduced legislation to allocate \$500,000 in ergot research -- half of which would go to specific scientific research and the rest to public education through the Extension Service. That measure will be considered in conference committee this week, but may not be voted on until May.

- Experiment Station scientists are joining with researchers in New Mexico, Kansas and Nebraska to propose collaborative research funding efforts to state and federal agencies.

- Farmers, through the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Association headquartered in Abilene, are fronting approximately \$20,000 to initiate an education program to provide information on how to deal with the problem this year, according to Travis Taylor, TGSPA executive director.

"The allocation of \$20,000 is the first step in the stairs to controlling this disease, until we find out more about it," Taylor said. Indeed, little is known.

One drop of the honeydew contains several million spores which can go with a whiff of the wind, or land on clothing or animals to contaminate crops when conditions are right. The fungus only affects unfertilized female flowers.

Typically several hundred such flowers will develop on a sorghum head over a period of up to seven days. Over a large field, the crop can play host to the spread of ergot for extended periods.

Ergot likes to spread in cool temperatures which also happens to be the time that female flowers are less likely to be fertilized.

What is not understood, Frederiksen said, is the structural survival of

the fungus. How does it know, for example, only to fire its pathogen at female sorghum flowers at the precise time they are susceptible to infection -- prior to fertilization?

Frederiksen said researchers will attempt to find ways to interrupt the ergot life cycle using cultural and chemical methods and, more pressing to the current crop, will look at the most efficient rates and application methods to apply chemicals to kill the fungus in fields.

Experiment Station researchers will conduct field trials in Mexico, where the disease is more prevalent, and in Texas laboratories where the fungus will be grown in conditions replicating those of Texas producing areas.

Berend graduates from PAI seminar

Michael Berend of Wilbur-Ellis Inc. of Hereford graduated from the Professional Applicator Institute (PAI) in Kansas City, Mo.

This PAI, which was taught over a two-day period, presented by the Agricultural Retailers Association, in sponsorship with Ag-Chem Equipment Co., Inc., DowElanco, DuPont Agricultural Products, FMC, Helena, Jardine Group Services, Inc., Spraying Systems and Zeneca Ag Products in cooperation with the Kansas State University and the University of Georgia.

The seminar is designed to increase the efficiency, improve the ability, enhance the professionalism of applicators, farm suppliers, and agricultural producers who custom-apply crop protection materials and plant nutrients.

Participants receive continuing

education units toward the Certified Crop Adviser program.

Scientists also will try to determine other plants that may be hosting the fungus prior to its attack on sorghum. "The economic threshold for a plant disease is different than that for insects," Frederiksen said. "With insects you can do counts and make predictions about population buildup. With diseases, if you see it, it's already too late."

Frederiksen said farmers who typically grow sorghum as a grain crop are least likely to be affected, but those who produce the crop for planting seed should be most concerned.

The High Plains area around Lubbock produces about 90 percent of the sorghum seed planted in the United States and much of the world, he said.

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Cellular phones serve as lifelines for victims

New program donates cellular phones to domestic crisis centers

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - Tammy Bain loved walks in the park and solitary country drives. She liked her quiet time.

But all that was shattered when she was shot in the stomach by her boyfriend.

Ms. Bain was able to begin picking up the pieces when a crisis center in Ottumwa, Iowa, loaned her a cellular telephone that she could use to call for help during the two years before the man was finally convicted of first-degree assault.

"I lived with the guy for a year and a half. I lost a lot of myself

during that time. The phone helped me get some of that back," she said.

Now, women at a shelter in Duncan can take advantage of the same offer - cellular telephones that can quickly link them to the sheriff's office, the crisis center and 911.

Cellular phones are lifelines for victims who often don't have another way of making calls for help, said Donna Antwine, a victim's advocate for the Stephens County Volunteers for Crisis Intervention.

She said in rural areas the phones are a blessing for women who are trying to escape their abusers and

regain control of their lives.

"The batterer's attempt is to isolate the victim with total control," said Ms. Antwine. "When she decides to leave, she will often find herself with no friends, family, money or even a telephone to call for help."

United States Cellular started the program that donates the phones to domestic crisis centers. Geni Stevens, a company spokeswoman, said other programs are in place in Florida, Iowa, Washington and Wisconsin.

The company hopes to have similar programs established in many

of its markets across the country by the end of the year, Ms. Stevens said.

In Duncan, the center works with local law enforcement to inform victims that the cellular phones are available, Ms. Antwine said.

"When she arrives at the courthouse to get a protective order, we want to make sure everyone works together to inform her of this service," Ms. Antwine said.

The phones are set up with speed dials for quick access to emergency services and the crisis center; they won't accept incoming calls and can't be used to call anywhere else.

Stephens County Sheriff Ron Hunter said the phones will help women who are involved in domestic disputes away from their homes.

"If the assault happens when she is out in the grocery store parking lot, she will have the phone right there," he said.

"The cell phones would get the

information to us a lot quicker than us having to go out and pick up the pieces after the assault has already occurred," Hunter said.

Ms. Stevens said it's up to the center to decide who is qualified to check out a phone.

Some of the criteria for the Duncan center is:

- Must be a recent victim of domestic abuse.

- Must be a client of the crisis center.

- Must not have a working phone nor the means to obtain one.

- Must sign an agreement to disclose necessary personal data to the provider and law enforcement officials in the event of loss, damage or improper use of the phone.

Ms. Antwine said the most dangerous time for a domestic abuse victim is directly after divorce papers or a restraining order are served, especially when the abuser is not

expecting it.

"If these papers are delivered down at the factory in front of all his buddies. He's going to be hacked off," she said. "This phone is a life line she knows she can use. It helps give her strength and support. Having that phone literally could be the difference in saving her life," said Ms. Antwine.

"I think the safety feature is immeasurable."

Now that her attacker is behind bars, Ms. Bain, who never had to use the phone, has turned it back over to the crisis center in Iowa so that others can benefit.

"They gave me a choice, but there was another lady who I felt needed it worse than I did."

HOW TO SPOT A CON ARTIST

IMAGINE your doorbell rings. When you open the door you see what appears to be a nice young fellow. He apologizes for disturbing you, and tells you about what sounds like a compelling offer: Explaining he has some "left-over material" from a construction site in the neighborhood, he offers to repave your cracked driveway for a bargain price.

If you accept this imaginary offer, you will be a victim of fraud. The "left-over material" doesn't exist, and you will be charged a big fee for little service.

Here at the Office of the Attorney General, we hear about cases like this all the time. While the circumstances vary, the common fact of all cases is that there is a certain psychology at work. With that in mind, we offer the following tips.

The psychology of a con

The clever con artist is a good actor who disarms victims with an affable, "nice" approach. Hidden behind the friendly exterior is a shrewd amateur psychologist. The truth is that con artists and telemarketers are finely honed professionals who take advantage of others precisely because of their trusting nature. Unless properly warned, even the wildest Texan can have difficulty dealing with sharp perpetrators of fraud.

Your best defense? Guard yourself with a healthy skepticism when a stranger appears at your door. Is it common to get something for nothing? Compare what your visitor wants you to hear with what may really be going on.

Characteristics of a con

A con artist doesn't have a typical look. He or she takes on many guises, including nice lady, young student, or solid citizen. Don't be fooled. If you hear any of the following words from someone, chances are you are dealing with a con artist:

- Cash only! Why not a check or credit card? Chances are, this bad actor wants to skip town quickly with your money.

- Secret plans. Why are you being asked not to tell anyone? Honest business people deal with others in an honest, open way.

- Get rich quick! Very little that is worthwhile comes quickly or easily, especially money. "Get lost quick" is a good answer to this come-on.

- A courier will collect your fee. All too often, this method is used to avoid wire or mail fraud charges. Hang up or shut the door.

- Today only! This is commonly said in order to prevent you from thinking about the deal. Given time, you might reconsider that multi-level chinchilla pearl farming scheme. In any case involving your money, you should always take the time to thoroughly investigate any opportunity.

- Left-over material. This scheme is often used by perpetrators of home construction scams. Instead of asphaltting your drive-

way, they'll sprinkle a little used motor oil on the pavement, while charging you a small fortune.

- I know it sounds too good to be true, but... It is. Run away.

In summation, watch out for "high-profit, no-risk" investments. Ask exactly how much everything costs and get everything in writing. Finally, take the time to check out all offers.

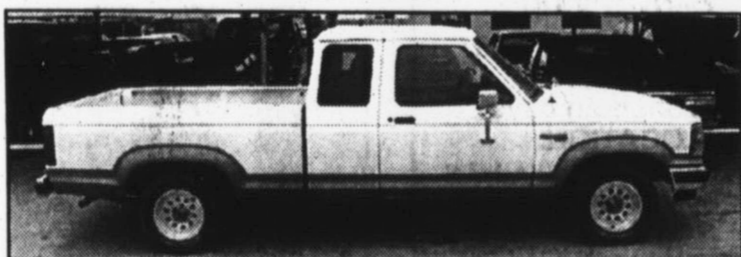

Dear Ann Landers: I am writing this letter from prison. My wonderful and supportive wife sends me your columns regularly. They help keep me in touch with the rest of the world. Whenever I read a letter in your column about molestation, it's always young girls who are the victims. I would like to speak for boys who have been molested, since I was one of them.

Back in the early '60s, when I was 10 years old, my mother helped get her brother released from a mental hospital. She arranged for him to move into a trailer right next to our house. My mother was thrilled to have her brother back in her life and made sure he spent as much time with us as possible.

We had no father figure in our lives and adored and trusted this uncle. But along with his kindness and love, there was a lot of brutality. He raped me and my four brothers repeatedly. My mother, my uncle's wife and several other relatives knew about this abuse, but they did nothing. I can never forgive them for being so afraid of what the neighbors might think that they allowed our young lives to be ruined.

When I was 24, I killed a man and

was sentenced to life in prison. My state of mind at the time was definitely unbalanced. I actually believed the man I killed was my uncle, and I thought I was acting in self-defense. I've been here for over 16 years, and my case is on appeal. I am hoping my psychiatrist's testimony will be heard this time. My mother, meanwhile, has told me she hopes I will rot in prison for ruining the family name by telling my story publicly.

I am 42 now, and my struggle for justice goes on. Please tell your readers that young girls aren't the only ones who are being molested and the consequences can be fatal. -- Also a Victim in Pittsburgh

Dear Pittsburgh: You have written a letter that will educate millions of people today. I don't know enough about the details of your case to comment. However, temporary insanity can be a valid defense. Your history of sexual abuse may fit the picture.

MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

Marketing Basics - Follow the money

According to Greek legend, King Midas had the power to turn everything he touched into gold. If you want to grow your business you may find that marketing is your "midas touch."

I believe that success in any venture is the long-term result of doing simple things well. Since marketing is a critical element of business success, you must understand the basics and do them well. The following questions will help you understand where money comes from and how to keep it flowing into your business.

10 Marketing Questions

1) Where does cash come from? The source of cash - sales, revenues, income - is your customers. Once you know the

source, you should focus on keeping the source from drying up. Therefore, the next nine questions will guide you toward serving your customers more effectively.

2) Who are my customers? If you're in an existing business you have at least six types of customers. These include current, potential, former, most-profitable, somewhat-profitable and unprofitable customers. The key is to know which customers are helping you achieve your business goals.

3) How can I define (describe) them? There are two main ways to categorize customers: demographic and psychographic. Demographics include age, gender, income levels, education, location, etc. Psychographic factors include attitudes, lifestyles, preferences, prejudices, etc. Knowing your customers' characteristics will help you find ways to serve them better.

4) What are my customers thinking? There are four sub-questions you need to ask: What are they thinking about our products and services? What are they thinking about our business practices? How do they feel about our employees? How do they feel about me?

5) Where are they? This question is aimed at pinpointing the exact location of your customer base. Most important is the geographic location of your best customers. These are the ones who spend the most with you and generate the most profit for your firm. This information is critical in answering question six.

6) How can I reach my customers effectively and efficiently? How can we deliver a strong marketing message for the lowest possible cost? What media and methods will serve us best? We can use newspapers, radio, TV, direct mail, yellow pages, billboards, etc. What message do we want to send? What format will we use to drive the

desired message home? See question eight for more on the message.

7) What are our customers buying? First, what are they buying from you? You can get this information from your sales records. Second, what are they buying from others? Here we're looking for general patterns and trends in your industry.

8) What can I offer my customers that they can't get from anyone else? This is your position. The future strength of your business depends on this point. The only advantage you have in the marketplace is what you offer your customers that no one else can. You may offer better pricing, higher quality products, faster service and follow-up, better work or quicker response. These advantages become the cornerstones on which you build your promotional message.

9) What are they likely to be looking for next? Anticipating your customers' future needs will help you position your business for success. You can get a jump on this by talking candidly with your customers, analyzing future trends and studying tomorrow's needs and wants.

10) Which products or services from question nine would be natural blends with, or extensions of your current offerings? This is your future market direction. Finally, items that work well with your current mix will help you keep a leg up on the competition. Tomorrow's profitable decisions will depend on the answers to the questions you ask today.

When we received the Texas Book Festival Award application form, by first thought was "I don't have time for this." However, several things had occurred that week to cause me to give it a second, third or even fourth thought.

We had several parents and children come into our library to look for books. When specific titles on the shelves couldn't be found on the accelerated reader list, or when specific titles on the list couldn't be found on the shelves, children and parents would leave empty handed. This really began to concern me. As a result, Martha Russell and I got together and wrote a proposal and

filled out the application and sent it.

Last week we received word that the Deaf Smith County Library was selected as one of the award recipients. We were asked to attend the Texas Library Association Conference in Fort Worth and receive the award from Mrs. Bush. Well, need I say more? Martha and I are at TLA this week receiving our award, and getting our picture taken with Mrs. Bush. We will let you know how things turn out when we return.

Putting a book in the middle of the family circle is one way to demonstrate to children the importance and joy of learning to read. It can also be a great way to bring the family together. Some of my fondest memories are of Mother sitting in the chair reading aloud. Jeni, Kay Rue and I would lay on the floor and listen to mysteries by Mary Roberts Rinehart, hanging on every word.

I also remember those moments with my own children when our time together involved reading a favorite story, or reading the new library books. I encourage each of you to start an official family reading time.

You won't regret it.

Some new books available at the library this week range from a very informative *Kitchen Handbook* to Robin Cook's *Chromosome 6*.

If you want a book that grabs your attention on the first page and holds it through the last, give Robin Cook a try. Cook is truly "the master of medical thrillers." In this book, a notorious mobster Carlo Franconi, is gunned down. The Franconi family has a pretty good idea who was responsible for the shooting. They become even more upset when Carlo's body is stolen from the morgue before the autopsy.

Forensic pathologist Dr. Jack Stapleton, the resident cynic, finds the theft amusing. A few days later a mutilated, unidentified body arrives at the morgue. What puzzles Dr. Stapleton about this body is not the fact that the head, hands and feet are missing, but that the liver is missing.

With the assistance of colleague Dr. Laurie Montgomery the body is identified as Carlo Franconi, but that is only the first step in solving this case. Who killed Carlo? Who took his

liver and why? Jack and Laurie are determined to keep looking until all their questions are answered.

The Informant by James Grippando may not be something you read to your children, but is another one that will keep you turning the pages.

FBI Special Agent Victoria Santos has been tracking a gruesome serial killer across the U.S. "Miami Tribune" reporter Mike Posten has covered many crimes during his career, but nothing has prepared him for this one. Then Mike receives an anonymous phone call from someone who claims their mind works so much like the killers, that he can actually

predict the next time, place and victim.

The catch is he wants a lot of money in exchange for this information. When the predictions prove to be true, Mike contacts the FBI. The FBI is convinced the informant is the murderer, but they still aren't much closer to finding and stopping the killer.

Minette Walters' book *The Echo* is an Edgar Award winner and as you would expect it is a psychological thriller. Finding Billy Blake, a homeless alcoholic dead of starvation isn't a great surprise. Canned Foods: Convenient,
Safe and Nutritious

When it comes to eating right for a healthy lifestyle, you have more food options than ever before. These options are available in a number of packages -- in bags, cartons, bottles and cans.

For those seeking convenience, safety, and a variety of nutritious foods, canned foods offer one smart choice. Busy cooks are returning to using canned food to fit into their hectic and nutrition-conscious lifestyles.

How does the nutrition profile of canned foods compare with fresh and frozen? Canned food is a convenient and versatile option for nutritious eating.

In fact, canned foods along with fresh and frozen foods can help you prepare easy and nutritionally balanced meals for the whole family. Canned food may be as nutritious as its fresh and frozen counterparts upon preparation.

Because fruits and vegetables are processed within a few hours after harvesting, canned food locks in taste and nutrients (except water-soluble vitamins such as Vitamins B, C and folacin). Canned foods can also offer a variety of essential vitamins, mineral and fiber that the body needs to stay fit and healthy.

What varieties will I find in the canned food aisle? More than 1,500 varieties of canned foods are available, ranging from artichokes to zucchini.

Many brands offer options of sodium-free, low-sodium, low-fat and fat-free varieties for balanced food choices and for those with special dietary restrictions or concerns. Many out-of-season foods, such as pineapple and asparagus, can be

found in cans year-round.

How do I include canned foods as part of a sensible meal plan? Nutrition experts recommend eating a variety of foods to stay healthy using the Food Guide Pyramid as a practical tool to make wise food choices.

All of the five food groups of the Pyramid can be found in canned foods. For example, rice and pasta in soups is a good choice of grains; evaporated milk fits in the milk, yogurt, and cheese group; and canned chicken and beans fit into the meat, poultry and fish group. Canned foods offer the option for many out-of-season foods to be available year-round.

Canned Food: Uncanny Safety in the Package

Long shelf life. Canned food will be safe as long as the container remains intact. Although more canned products are coded with the "use by" dates, it is still wise to rotate use of canned products for turnover at least once a year, using older products first.

Tamper resistance. Cans are one of the most tamper-resistant forms of packaging available, since any opening of the package is clearly evident. Rust spots or dents do not affect the contents of the can, as long as it does not bulge or leak. However, do not use if there is severe rust or a dent on the seam.

Food safety. Food is heated to destroy bacteria and then sealed in cans within hours of harvesting. For maximum flavor and value, from canned foods, it is best to use the product immediately after opening. However if that is not possible, canned foods should be poured out and stored in sealed containers in the refrigerator to retain taste and nutrient quality.

Dear Heloise: I appreciate your great concern for animals. I just learned of an unexpected new danger for kitties: shopping bags with handles.

While playing, one of my kitties got his head and one leg caught through one of the handles, which was then dangerously tight around his neck. day in my kitchen. I knew that by just putting a tablecloth or place mats on the surface of the table the wood could be ruined by damp glasses, etc.

The problem was solved by having a piece of glass made to put on top. I looked up a local glass company and I was surprised that it didn't cost much. The glass looks beautiful and keeps my table protected as well as being easy to clean. — Theresa Blevins, Denver.

A glass tabletop can be very attractive, as well as help save the wood from being damaged from heat and scratches. Also, it is so easy to keep clean; a little vinegar and water does the job.

Astigmatism

The visual distortion we call astigmatism is caused by a common defect of the cornea: light rays passing through the lens cannot meet in a single focal point on the retina in the back of the eye. Just as when a camera with an out-of-round lens projects an out-of-focus image onto the film, the picture comes out blurry.

If the defect is minor -- and most people have some degree of astigmatism -- the eye can adapt to the imperfect picture it sees. But if the condition is more pronounced, the images tend to be distorted. There may be headaches and fatigue, eye strain and reddened eyes after reading or doing close work.

Where astigmatism is advanced enough to interfere with vision, corrective lenses are usually advised -- glasses or, in some cases, special contact lenses. Quite often, astigmatism accompanies nearsightedness or farsightedness, though it may occur alone. The degree may change with age.

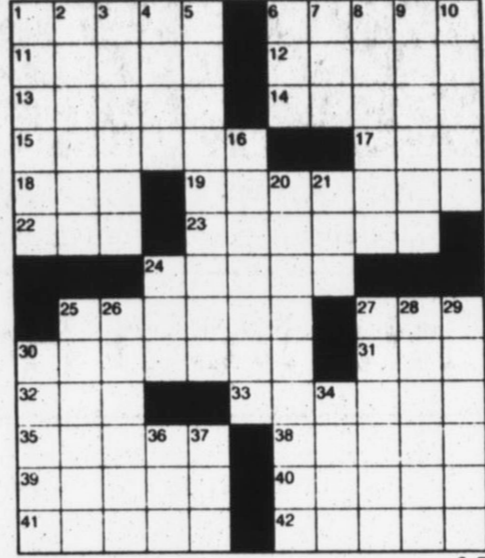

"Old-fashioned look" still sought In new home decorating

The latest thing in kitchen remodeling is making it look old-fashioned - even to the point of adding antique touches where none existed.

"Some people have gone so far as to recondition and restore their old

gas stove rather than replace it," says Nina Hughes, an interior designer in New York.

"The old-fashioned look is so popular that people are even incorporating an antique table or sideboard into a new kitchen," says

John Troxell, design director of Wood-Mode, Inc., kitchen cabinet manufacturer in Kreamer, Pa. "Including an old piece adds a warmth that is difficult to get with contemporary cabinetry alone."

It's not hard to keep or add antique character to a kitchen.

"The looks of kitchen cabinets didn't change over a long period of time," says Troxell, "and cabinets that call to mind the feeling of a Victorian, a 19th century farmhouse, an Arts and Crafts style house, or a simple workman's bungalow are readily available."

No matter how charming an antique kitchen may appear, most people also want it to function efficiently and to be equipped with the latest appliances.

To get the modern appliances in without changing the character of the room, build in as much of the equipment as possible, advises Hughes. Refrigerators and dishwashers can be hidden behind wood paneling that matches details in existing paneling or moldings.

"You really can't disguise modern stoves and double ovens, but that is not necessarily a problem," Hughes says. "What carries the day in a period interior is the moldings, cabinetry and floor treatment."

Antique-style woodwork is readily duplicated, and even the glass-fronted upper cabinets used so often in old kitchens are now available as reproductions.

Linoleum - no longer readily available - was the workhorse floor in old kitchens. While the florid patterns of the past are not being reproduced, simpler linoleum patterns with an antique feeling are available in sheet vinyl at a fairly moderate cost, Hughes says. There are also a few places that have old linoleum for sale.

Reproduction lighting also is available. "You have to combine it with undercounter lighting because period lighting does not give

sufficient light for a kitchen today," Hughes says.

Old houses typically had taller ceilings than the eight-foot ceilings common today. Those who still have their old kitchen cabinets with generous dimensions up to the ceiling may well prefer to keep them. If the doors do not open or close easily or are unsightly, replacing them with custom doors could be less expensive than ripping the cabinets out and replacing them entirely.

There are lots of ways to get an old-kitchen look. One of the best is to install bead-and-board wainscoting (slender vertical panels) on the bottom half of the wall, Hughes says. This was a common wall treatment in kitchens from the turn of century to the 1920s, and the product has been revived.

Both wainscoting and old cabinetry are used to good effect in the recently remodeled kitchen at The Mount in Lenox, Mass., to which Wood-Mode contributed cabinetry and design help. The house was built in 1902 by the famous American novelist, Edith Wharton, and is now a historic house museum.

When remodeling began, the house no longer had its original kitchen located in the basement. But it did have the kitchen created in the mid-1960s when a butler's pantry and a brush-room (or storage area) were combined. The room included a number of original cabinets, wood moldings, wainscoting, a marble backsplash and counter and original doors, drawers, and hardware dating from 1902.

The new kitchen, which is included on the house tour, also accommodates catering, which is an indispensable part of the institution's fund-raising efforts. So it was necessary to add new major appliances without interfering with the historic look of the room.

A refrigerator was installed in a former closet. A new stove, dishwasher and a second sink were placed in a center island.

"So as not to confuse visitors to the house museum, the center island is white to differentiate the modern

from the old," says Troxell. "In a private home, the need to differentiate between the old and the new would

not be so great. So it would make sense for the new cabinets to blend in with what is already there."

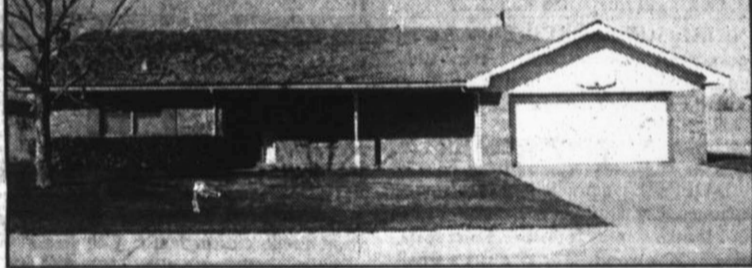
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Survey shows luxury items finding way into average homes

A recent survey commissioned by the National Association of Home Builders found that features formerly considered luxuries in new houses - high ceilings, pantries, great rooms with bars and media centers - are now regarded as desirable in homes built for average-income buyers.

So what are the remodeling or building trends that the affluent consider "musts" that will soon be filtering down?

Old-world moldings are hot on Fifth and Park avenues in New York City, says David Cohen of I. Grace Company, Inc., a remodeling contractor.

For the living room, library, dining room and gallery of a 15-room apartment on Manhattan's upper east side, Cohen copied paneling found in model rooms at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Each room in the 7,500 square-foot apartment was modeled after a different famous French room.

Home laundries with professional equipment such as pressing machines and several washers and dryers and kitchens equipped with stainless steel counters, a commercial range and an outside freezer and refrigerator are other requests Cohen filled recently

in fancy apartments in Manhattan.

"Most of the affluent insist on a kitchen with everything, even if they don't necessarily use it," says Nina Hughes, a decorator in New York. "They want the huge refrigerator, the warming oven, and the granite counters."

There is a purpose for all that equipment. "Most people who are affluent do a lot of entertaining and the kitchen will be used by the caterer," Hughes says.

Home automation is another area that appeals to the wealthy. Cohen sometimes installs sensors that monitor temperature and humidity and notify an outside service if something is amiss.

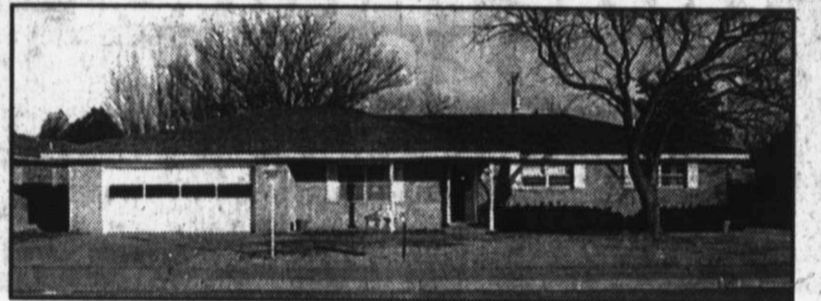

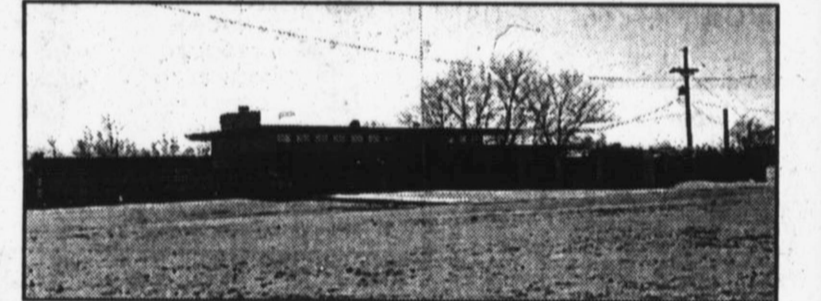

Altman takes a shot a TV in quirky *Gun* anthology

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One of the most acclaimed (and controversial) directors in American movie history brings his eccentric vision to prime-time television in *Gun*, a new anthology series premiering Saturday, April 12, on ABC.

Four-time Academy Award™ nominee Robert Altman, who directed such American classics as *M*A*S*H* and *The Player*, co-produced the new series with James Sadwith (*Sinatra*) and Robert Dwek (*Harts of the West*).

Altman also directed one of the trial episodes (ABC has ordered six).

The basic premise for the show is simplicity itself, following a semiautomatic, pearl-handled pistol as it changes hands from owner to owner.

Altman warns viewers not to read too much into this inanimate recurring "character." The gun is simply something to set into motion these otherwise separate stories.

Altman's episode, the comic "All the President's Women," is being held for May sweeps; the cast includes such movie stars as Altman veteran Sally Kellerman (an Oscar™ nominee for her role as the original Margaret "Hot Lips" Houlihan in *M*A*S*H*), Randy Quaid, Daryl Hannah, Sean Young and Jennifer Tilly.

Kirsten Dunst (*Interview With the Vampire*) and novelist-actress Carrie Fisher (the *Star Wars* trilogy) star in another episode.

Given Altman's penchant for making unpredictable films — the same man who directed the masterpiece *Nashville* also directed the notorious Robin Williams flop *Popeye* and the embarrassing *Ready to Wear* — it's disappointing to note that the pilot episode is written and directed by Sadwith,

who does a very competent, workman-like job.

The story involves a security guard (James Gandolfini) who buys the gun to protect his beautiful, bored and much younger wife (Rosanna Arquette) and their young daughter. Soon the wife is letting the postman — or, more accurately, the handsome, randy writer (Peter Horton) across the way — ring twice. Too predictable, right?

Wrong. Actually, most viewers will be able to spot the killer and the victim within the first 15 minutes, but the "why" is a very clever twist indeed.

The producers all talk optimistically about their plans for future seasons of the show, but there seem to be a few strikes against them:

•Anthologies have become a tough sell to modern audiences, who tend to revisit shows to see favorite characters.

•At a press conference in January, Sadwith indicated *Gun* would premiere during May sweeps. While it is set to run into that sweeps period, ABC is premiering it in April, on the night with the lowest TV viewership.

•Those ratings aren't going to be helped by the rest of the ABC Saturday lineup. *Lois & Clark: The New Adventures of Superman*, which has been on life support all season, opens the evening, followed by the unpromising and underpromoted *Leaving L.A.*, in which the Los Angeles County coroner's office investigates unsolved murders and suicides. Opposite *Early Edition* on CBS and *The Pretender* on NBC, this is one show likely to be leaving ABC — and quickly.

Bottom line: If you find *Gun* intriguing, plan to catch it soon. This quirky little show, even with Altman's help, isn't likely to make it onto the ABC fall schedule.

'Kids and Family Week' puts the prime back in prime time

Just imagine turning on your television during prime time and knowing you'll find something suitable for your family to watch.

That's what you'll get on many cable networks during "Tune In to Kids and Family Week," Monday, April 7, through Sunday, April 13. More than 75 national and regional cable networks have pledged to showcase their best family fare during prime time.

Programs flagged with a "Kids & Family" icon will be free of excessive violence, strong language, sexual themes and stereotypes.

"Cable has been a leader in delivering children and family television for a long time," says Scott Broyles, spokesman for the National Cable Television Association. "We're raising awareness of that in high fashion by carving out prime time."

Getting the week started on Monday is *The American Family and Television: A National Town Hall Meeting*, hosted by journalist Linda Ellerbee. Her guests and audience members in-

clude producers, network executives, advertisers and viewers. The program will air simultaneously on Nickelodeon, USA Network, The Disney Channel and The Family Channel.

"The thing that appeals to me about that show is that we put the people in charge of television in the same room with the viewers," Ellerbee says.

Some of the week's other highlights include Dr. Seuss specials on the The Cartoon Network, nature programs on the Discovery Channel and *My Life as a Dog* on Showtime.

Nickelodeon will offer episodes of *Doug* and *Rugrats*, and Disney will air *Cinderella*, *Pocahontas* and *The Lion King*.

A study last year by the Annenberg Public Policy Center found that cable networks provide 65 percent of all television programs for children.

"I have found that there are some wonderful programs out there," says Amy Jordan, who conducted the study. "What we hope for and work for is to increase the audience for these shows. We know that educational television can benefit children."

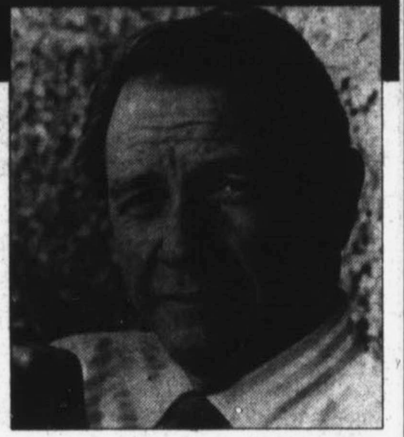

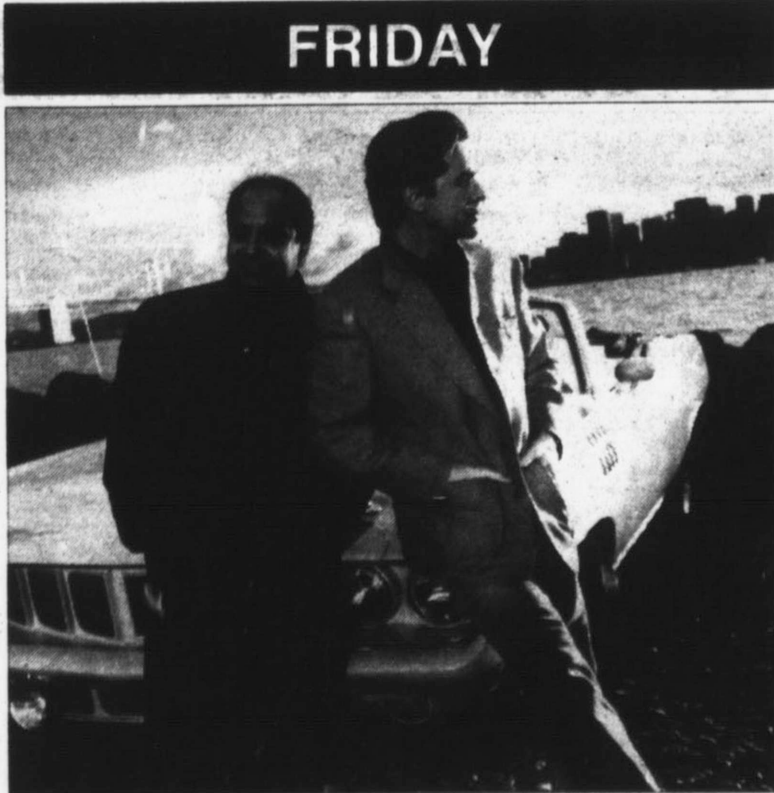
