Sources said the defense will use an attack strategy to poke holes in the prosecution's case.

For example, prosecutors called co-manager Eric McGown, who said he saw McVeigh in a Ryder truck at the Dreamland Motel in Junction City, Kan., April 16 or April 17 in 1995, two days before the bombing.

Defense attorneys plan to call McGown's mother, Lea, who has said she saw McVeigh at the motel in the truck on April 16, 1995, not the following day.

Prosecutors have contended McVeigh rented the truck April 17, 1995, in Junction City.

As they left the courthouse Wednesday, relatives of bombing victims said they were pleased with the prosecution's case, but still filled with sorrow.

"I'm not happy," said Roy Sells, whose wife, Lee, died in the explosion. "And if he's convicted, I still probably won't be a happy man, maybe satisfied, but not happy."

Graduation celebrations and alcoholic beverages don't mix. Many students think drinking alcohol goes along with graduation, Hereford High School

Counselor Cindy Simons said. "It (alcohol) can sure ruin their graduation.

Graduation is a real special time. It's a time for a new beginning, not an ending," Simons

Hereford Regional Medical Center Trauma Coordinator RoseMary Barrett agrees.

Barrett, co-founder of EN C.A.R.E. (Emergency Nurses Cancel Alcohol Related Emergencies), wants to heighten awareness of the dangers associated with underage drinking.

She presents school programs on the dangerous, deadly effects of underage drinking.

'We've been real encouraged by these programs," Simons said.

Alcohol can affect the mental and physical skills needed for safe driving, Barrett said. It is a mind-altering drug that

works as a sedative, she said. Alcohol changes the way a person thinks and acts. It affects judgement and coordination, Barrett said.

Safe driving requires an observant eye, a steady hand and a clear head, she said.

Students who want to celebrate their high school graduation with alcohol may find themselves in the company of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission (TABC).

TABC and the Texas Hotel and Motel Association have started a campaign to stop underage drinking called "Operation Safe Graduation 1997.

The campaign is an enforcement initiative which targets graduation celebrations, TABC Agent Rolando Garza said.

The initiative will help minimize alcohol-related injuries and deaths, TABC Administrator Doyne Bailey said.

"The basic purpose of this operation is to ensure that this milestone achievement in a young person's life is a safe and sober occasion that they can treasure for a long time," Bailey said.

TABC agents will bring their campaign to Hereford this weekend.

The agents will visits local hotels, inspect licensed premises and conduct random sting operations, Garza said.

"We want to deter people, youth in particular, from drinking alcoholic beverages," Garza said. Parents should be aware of their teenagers activities both in the home and outside the home.

Simons said.

Alcohol-related accidents are senseless situations, Garza said. "We recognize that graduation is a very special time in their lives.

"We want the students to remember their graduation for a long, long time," Garza said.

Some years ago, I would have agreed with "Long Island" and said it was time for James to "get a life." I even spoke with my mother about it, and she told me flat out, "Mind your own business. You don't know our situation."

Mom's house has six bedrooms. That's what was needed for our family of nine children, which she raised. My father divorced her for another woman. Although the marriage wasn't a good one, the divorce was very painful for her. Mom now rents out two rooms, and my brother lives on the main floor.

For a long time, I was angry that James was living rent-free and would almost certainly inherit the house and mental health. toward your brother will pay include anaphylactic shock and death. Dear Ann Landers: Please tell your readers about latex allergy. I was hospitalized for 10 days because of this and have yet to return to work. A lot of your readers may not realize that they or their loved ones could be allergic to such simple things as balloons, doctors' gloves or, in rare cases, condoms made out of latex. Severe allergic reactions to latex can

for fast-food workers, toll takers, anitors, police officers and especially health care workers who use latex gloves routinely to protect against AIDS. Mild sensitivity can produce a skin rash. Extreme sensitivity can include symptoms similar to hay fever or asthma, and the consequen-

ces can be deadly.

Medical and dental personnel should ask every patient about the possibility of latex allergy, especially those scheduled for surgery. Ask if the patient has ever had a reaction to balloons, condoms or latex gloves. Patients who have had multiple surgeries are at high risk. Also at high risk are those allergic to bananas, chestnuts, avocados and some tropical

Extreme sensitivity to latex is a growing problem. The Food and Drug Administration recognized the severity of the illness in 1991, when 16 people undergoing surgery for spina bifida died after coming into contact with latex.

There are safer alternatives, but the government must set standards. Get the word out, Ann. -- An M.D. in California

Dear M.D.: Thanks to you, the word is out. You've saved some lives.





'60 Minutes' streak of Top 10 Nielsen ratings may end

NEW YORK (AP) - Coming from a television show renowned for its journalistic rigor and attention to detail, last week's announcement about "60 Minutes" was a little, well, odd.

CBS said the venerable newsmagazine, whose tick-tick-ticking stopwatch alone draws beads of sweat to the foreheads of newsmakers, would finish among the year's Top 10 shows in the Nielsen Media Research ratings for the 20th year in

Only Lucille Ball's 10-year streak for two different comedies came closer, the network boasted, adding that a party would be held next month to toast the newsmagazine's two-decade streak.

There's just one problem: It probably ain't going to happen. With a week to go in the season, which officially ends May 20, Nielsen's season-to-date ranking lists "60 Minutes" at No. 11. It could

pass CBS's "Touched By an Angel" to move up a slot, but that's not The network contends that the show now tied for fourth, NBC's "Fired Up," should not be considered in the season standings because

it has run for only a limited time. Six

episodes of "Fired Up" will have

aired by the season's end. There's general agreement within the television industry that programs airing six times or less are not considered part of the season rankings, says David Poltrack, head

of research for CBS. It galls Poltrack that seven of the top 10 shows are rated so high because, at least for awhile, they have been part of NBC's powerhouse Thursday night schedule. Along with "Fired Up," those shows include the critically drubbed "Single Guy" and "The Naked Truth."

"The logic is on our side," Poltrack says. "For any rational person to get up there and say they believe 'Fired Up,' which ran six times and may not even be renewed, should be considered a top program like '60 Minutes,' '20/20' or 'NYPD Blue,' they'd laugh at you."

If there is such an industry standard that overlooks short-run series in the final Nielsen standings, NBC and ABC say they haven't heard

Neither has Nielsen, which omits specials from its season rankings but

includes all regular series.
"I don't believe that's an industry rule," says Karen Kratz, spokeswom-an for Nielsen. "I've never actually heard that before."

CBS's claim is puzzling because there are so many legitimate accomplishments "60 Minutes" can Emmy Awards, has ranked at the top of Nielsen's rankings in four seasons, touching on three different decades first in 1979-80 and in 1992-93.

And all of the other popular newsmagazines - "20/20," "Dateline NBC," "PrimeTime Live" - owe "60 Minutes" an obvious debt.

Its average audience of around 20 million is just over half what it was at its peak in 1779-80, when nearly

39 million people watched each week. Broadcast television in general has suffered audience erosion because of cable, and "60 Minutes" lost the advantage of having football games as a lead-in for half the season. And the show still has remained atop the

newsmagazines this year. "20/20" is ranked No. 12 for the season so far, but it's doubtful it will pass "60 Minutes."

"We'll lick any kid in the house." says Don Hewitt, the only executive producer "60 Minutes" has ever known. "We'll lick any kid in television. We're very competitive. We're tough. The mystery to me is why at our age the fatigue factor has highly competitive pack of not set in."







Writing Want Ads that really sell!

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/ products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs." Then, remember these hints:

--Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no

-- Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condi-

-- Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.

- Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual



Beav's 'brother' turns camera on some of hottest new stars

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Amidst the meandering aliens on the set of television's "Babylon 5" is a familiar-looking humanoid yelling

Walk a little closer and the familiarity grows stronger. The short, wavy hair is now gray, the face creased by age and adorned with glasses. One phrase, though, could casily give him away: "Hey, Beav."
It's none other than Wally Cleaver,

Beaver's older brother, calling the shots from behind the camera.

"It's what I've wanted to do since the time I was 16 years old," says Tony Dow, who played the quintessential American teen-ager on the series "Leave It to Beaver" from 1957 to 1963.

'Being on television you get sort of typecast and I was doing a lot of roles that weren't as interesting as they could be," Dow says. "So it wasn't as much fun for me."

Like many of his colleagues, Dow has swapped the acting chair for the directing chair and turned the cameras onto some of today's hottest stars.

For example, TV's lovable Opie grew up to be a big-time director. Ron Howard's credits include the box-office hits "Apollo 13," "Backdraft" and "Cocoon."

Rob Reiner, who spent his early career as Archie Bunker's bumbling son-in-law on "All in the Family, graduated to the director's chair as the man behind "When Harry Met Sally," "This Is Spinal Tap," "A Few Good Men" and, most recently, "The Ghosts of Mississippi."

Then there's "Hill Street Blues" alums Charles Haid, who directed episodes of "Murder One," "ER" and "High Incident," and Betty Thomas, who directed HBO's "Late Shift" and the Howard Stern smash hit "Private Parts."

Peter Bonerz, Jerry the dentist on 'The Bob Newhart Show," and Michael Lembeck, Julie's husband Max on "One Day at a Time," have also found a second career as directors.

Bonerz recently directed an episode of "Friends" and had a cameo role as a theater-goer.

"It's great to work on 'Friends," says Bonerz, who frequently directs "Murphy Brown" and "Home Improvement." "I'm 58 years old and I keep getting invited back to work with these hip people who are my sons' ages!"

Does a director who's been an actor have a leg up on other directors?

Martin Sheen thinks so. He

recently appeared in an episode of episodes. "Gun," directed by Peter Horton, of He a

"thirtysomething" fame.
"I think the best directors are actors because they understand the actors' problems, so they're sympathetic to the process," Sheen says. "So this guy knew what we were trying to do and was very, very supportive in that."

For some, directing is a logical step after the acting roles start to

"I was sick of being a co-star and it didn't look like I was going to break into the leading man category, Bonerz says. "I figured I can make better use of my experience by directing."

And rewarding, too. Bonerz won a Directors Guild of America award in 1992 for his second "Murphy Brown" episode, the one when Murphy finds out she's pregnant.

Lembeck has also been recognized by Hollywood, winning an Emmy for directing the "Friends" hour-long

special after last year's Super Bowl. So did any of these guys go to film school? Not a chance - it was all on-the-job training.



Authorities believe 13-year-old pulled trigger on her grandfather

are preparing their case against a 13-year-old girl accused of shooting her grandfather as part of a plot to steal \$1,300 and flee to Mexico with

her 20-year-old boyfriend.

The boyfriend, Bobby Ake, was arraigned for attempted capital murder and held on \$50,000 bond Wednesday, a day after 73-year-old J.B. Brimhall was shot through the head at his home.

Authorities believe the girl pulled

The two called police after Brimhall survived thg gunshot, delivered by the granddaughter whom he has helped raise, authorities said. He remained in stable condition Wednesday night.

"At first they claimed it was a drive-by shooting," Chief Deputy David Kinney said. "The house is in the middle of nowhere kind of on a hill, so officers determined immediately that was not true."

They were found with \$70 that might have been taken from Brimhall, though Kinney said Ake admitted that the scheme was to take much more, then flee to Mexico.

"(Ake) said they were going to take the grandpa's (\$1,300 oil) royalty check and go with it," said Kinney, who added that authorities haven't determined if such a check

The girl faces an attempted capital murder charge in the juvenile system, and prosecutors are preparing a case for a grand jury.

Authorities couldn't immediately discuss the matter with Brimhall because of his injuries. He was transported to University Medical Center in Lubbock, about 20 miles to
