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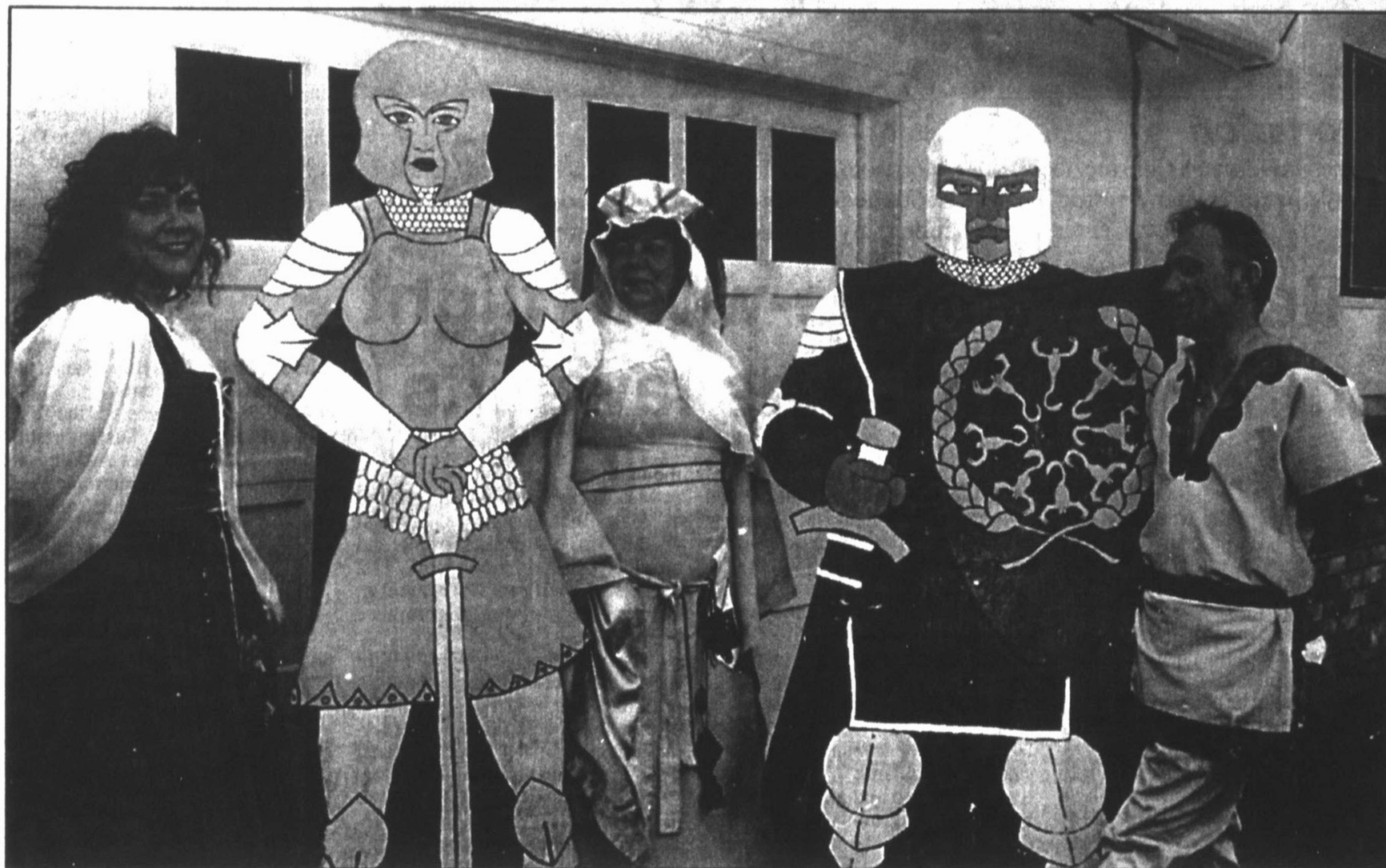

Pas d'Armes to offer something different to see next weekend

Looking for something different? A visit to Veterans Park next weekend may be just the ticket.

Members of the Society for Creative Anachronism will convene in Hereford for fun and games, in full costume of the historical period in which they are interested.

Joe Bosko, Lord Brennan of Acrubray, or general chairman of the Pas d'Armes, if you prefer, expects participants to come to Hereford from near and far.

The weekend begins at 6 p.m. Friday when the site opens. Events on the schedule start Saturday at 9 a.m. and continue through the day, until a feast at 6 p.m. The weekend will wind up Sunday morning.

Spectators are invited, indeed, encouraged to join participants at Veterans Park for the festivities. There is no admission charge but a visitors wishing to join in the evening

feast Saturday will pay a moderate fee.

SCA offers experiences for those who are interested in history and "love to pretend," said Julie Bosko, who is working with her husband on the Hereford gathering.

A member is free to adopt any persona that interests him, or her, up to the end of the Elizabethan Era, or the late 16th century.

Bosko said there are members who seek European identification and there are those who are interested in other parts of the world.

"We have at least one Samurai from Japanese history," he added.

Host for the Pas d'Armes in Hereford is the Shire of Adlersruhe, which takes in SCA members from a wide area of the Texas Panhandle and surrounding states.

The last Pas d'Armes at Lake McClellan attracted 60 participants, Julie Bosko pointed out. "We really expect to have more."

Competition during the weekend will be conducted in a manner similar to the Middle Ages. Participants in the armored group will be divided into defenders and challengers. A challenger will touch a shield representing the weapons group of choice before entering the field.

Rapier, archery, axe, knife and spear competitions are scheduled during the day.

Merchants will bring to the site items associated with particular times in history.

Joe Bosko is noted for his honey wine and etched glassware. He also is an archery buff.

His wife leans toward the needlecrafts of the Middle Ages. She makes her costumes, including some that don't adhere strictly to medieval times.

"They wore velvets but in our hot weather, I wear cottons," she laughed. "I wear velvets for formal occasions."

Another Hereford participant, Jennifer Parson is into medieval

cooking. She also has an interest in armor.

The Boskos remind that, in contrast to the medieval period, the SCA permits women to compete right along with the men.

"There's no discrimination," said Julie Bosko.

Joe Bosko's costume is patterned after a Celtic merchant of the late ninth century or early 10th century.

Parson is into the early Elizabethan period. And, Julie Bosko wears costumes reminiscent of time of William the Conqueror, about the end of the 11th century.

Joe Bosko, retired from the U.S. Air Force, was stationed in England for three tours of duty. He and his family became interested in the country and its history. A daughter still resides in England.

The Pas d'Armes at Veterans Park is an avenue for history buffs to walk for an interesting and exciting weekend.

Clinton warns against budget busting tax cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) - Boasting that America's economy leads the world, President Clinton today said Congress must stay within the outlines of the broadly written balanced budget plan as lawmakers draft specific tax cuts.

Clinton said tax cuts "must not be written in such a way that they reopen the deficit and bust the budget in years to come." Trying to limit the reach of congressional tax writers, Clinton said, "We cannot put our prosperity at risk through time bomb tax cuts that explode the deficit in five or 10 or 20 years."

The president focused on the balanced budget plan with Republican leaders of Congress in his weekly radio address. Separately, he was flying to New York to deliver the commencement address at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point.

The trip caps a week focused on foreign policy, with the president traveling to Paris, London and the Hague in the Netherlands. As he did in Europe, Clinton was making his case to expand NATO to include former Soviet bloc nations.

The Senate will have to approve any enlargement of the 16-nation military alliance, and the administration expects a fight. "It is a tough public sell because Americans look around the world, they see a world at

peace, largely," presidential spokesman Mike McCurry said.

The administration makes the case that peace and prosperity in Europe creates economic benefits in the United States. And on the economic front, the president seized Friday's news that the economy grew at a robust 5.8 percent rate, the highest in a decade.

"Our economy is the healthiest in a generation," the president said. With a 77 percent reduction in the deficit over five years and the lowest jobless rate in 24 years, "our economy leads the world," he said.

The balanced budget outline agreed upon by Clinton and Republican leaders sets overall spending and tax totals for the next five years. Actual changes in tax and spending law will have to be made in 15 separate bills later this year, and battles over these are certain.

Over the five years, the measure is to produce \$321 billion in savings. It also maps \$85 billion in net tax cuts and \$31 billion in new spending for children's health care as well as restored welfare benefits for many legal immigrants - for a net deficit reduction of \$204 billion.

The plan envisions \$35 billion in tax relief targeted at helping families pay for college.

Bush seeks federal aid

Merchants rush aid to tornado victims

GEORGETOWN, Texas (AP) - As merchants are rushing to aid the victims of the Jarrell tornado, Gov. George W. Bush formally asked President Clinton to join the effort.

Bush asked Friday that Williamson and Bell counties in Central Texas be declared a presidential disaster area, which would provide federal money for recovery. U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, R-Texas, added a letter to President Clinton in support of Bush's request.

Jim Wilson is helping with the arrangements. Words nearly failed him when he spoke of how thoroughly devastated was Jarrell, a town of about 400 residents that lost about 7 percent of its population to the Tuesday storm.

"Here, I want to show you something," he said Friday, motioning to a room to the rear of Gabriels Funeral Chapel in Georgetown, just south of Jarrell.

With the flick of a switch, Wilson lets the room speak for him. Inside stand 20 caskets, still in their protective wrappings.

"They're devastated," Wilson says of the endless stream of survivors to the mortuary. "I don't know how they're making it."

Beginning Saturday, the mortuary will begin the first of what will be several funerals for at least 20 of the 27 people who died when the tornado ripped through the town, about 15 miles north of Georgetown. One person died of a heart attack during the storm in Cedar Park, about 12 miles southwest of the Williamson County seat.

Bush is scheduled to attend church services Sunday at the First Baptist Church of Jarrell.

Tuesday's twister swept through Jarrell, spinning winds of up to 300

Judge in Oklahoma City bombing trial warns jurors against sympathy

DENVER (AP) - With a warning not to give in to sympathy ringing in their ears, jurors in the Oklahoma City bombing trial spent nearly a full day deliberating without reaching a verdict.

U.S. District Judge Richard Matsch dismissed the jurors late Friday afternoon, announcing they would return Saturday morning. The panel of seven men and five women spent about seven hours behind closed doors.

McVeigh smiled nervously, scratched his head and whispered to defense attorney Stephen Jones as the judge dismissed the jury.

The jurors appeared serious and tired as Matsch told them not to talk about the case in the hotel where they have been sequestered for deliberations.

"It's time to rest and relax - as best you can," Matsch said, drawing smiles from some.

Matsch told jurors to place any notes they had made into a box, which he said would be sealed until they returned.

Jurors had informed the judge that they wanted to deliberate Saturday. The time they would resume wasn't announced, but Matsch told attorneys to be on call starting at 8:30 a.m.

Earlier Friday, Matsch read out his jury instructions.

"Under your oath as jurors, you are not to be swayed by sympathy," he said.

Chance of showers continues

Thunderstorms that threatened to form tornadoes over some parts of South Texas relented Saturday, but more storms are expected across the state.

In West Texas, abundant moisture and unstable air was producing showers Saturday morning. Temperatures ranged in the 60s and 70s.

West Texans can expect mostly cloudy skies Sunday with a chance of showers. Highs will be in the 80s and 90s.

In North Texas, skies were clear

All of them nodded when the judge asked if they were ready to deliberate. One man turned to the juror next to him and grinned sheepishly.

Escorted by plainclothes marshals, the 29-year-old Gulf War veteran then walked out of the courtroom with his hands buried in the pockets of his khaki pants.

For bombing survivors and victims' relatives, the deliberations are the most anxious time since the aftermath of the April 19, 1995, blast that tore apart the Oklahoma City federal building and killed 168 people.

"Waiting for the jury to come back in is going to be a little rough," said Charles Tomlin, whose grown son, Ricky, died in the blast.

Jannie Coverdale, whose two young grandsons were killed in the federal building's day-care center, said she was willing to be patient.

"After I waited almost four days to find out about Aaron and Elijah, I can wait for this," Ms. Coverdale said.

Jurors will pore over hundreds of pieces of evidence introduced during the 22 days of testimony by 138 prosecution witnesses and 25 defense witnesses.

Pilot, around-the-world flight embroiled in Texas lawsuits

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - Linda Finch and her re-creation of Amelia Earhart's around-the-world flight are embroiled in lawsuits in Texas over money relating to the highly publicized journey.

The litigation in San Antonio and Dallas arose from a dispute between Ms. Finch, a wealthy businesswoman who runs nursing homes, and Julie Markel, who once handled marketing for the now-famous flight.

Court documents in the two pending lawsuits shed some light on the financial side of World Flight Inc., a non-profit corporation established in 1995 to oversee Ms. Finch's journey.

On Wednesday, Ms. Finch returned from her 2 1/2-month, 26,000-mile trip, landing in Oakland, Calif., in her restored Lockheed Electra 10-E, the same type plane Earhart flew in her ill-fated attempt to circle the world in 1937.

"I feel a little bit like Dorothy from the Wizard of Oz," Ms. Finch told a cheering crowd waiting to greet her. "I followed my own yellow brick road in the sky, visiting many wonderful countries."

In the coming months, Ms. Finch likely will be visiting courthouses. The Texas Department of Human Services alleges one of four nursing

homes Ms. Finch owns was operated under life-threatening conditions and has asked the Texas Attorney General's Office to assess fines possibly ranging from \$500,000 to \$50 million.

A trial based on those allegations is set for September. Ms. Finch denies life-threatening conditions existed and is contesting the fines.

"In only one instance was one of my homes cited for serious deficiencies by the department," Ms. Finch said from Oakland. "This occurred three years ago and all deficiencies were corrected immediately and so documented by the department 10 days later."

In a World Flight lawsuit against Ms. Markel, Ms. Finch said in a deposition that she arranged for Care Centers Management Corp., her nursing home management company, to loan money for the early stages of the endeavor.

"It's been as much as hundreds of thousands of dollars," Ms. Finch said.

World Flight aimed to attract sponsors to pay for Ms. Finch's plane, the flight and educational programs. The overall budget was about \$4 million, and aircraft engine-maker Pratt & Whitney was

the main sponsor.

Ms. Markel, who'd been a friend of Ms. Finch's, was to be paid \$270,000 to help recruit sponsors and provide public relations work. Ms. Finch said she fired Ms. Markel in October 1995 for non-performance of duties.

About 10 days later, World Flight sued Ms. Markel and obtained a court order banning her from speaking to scores of potential sponsors - including Shell Oil Co., Trammell Crow Properties and the Tandy Corp. - and even elected officials and news reporters.

Texas' 4th Court of Appeals in San Antonio later struck down the order, saying it violated Ms. Markel's freedom of speech.

For her part, Ms. Markel filed a lawsuit in Dallas against Ms. Finch personally, alleging breach of contract, fraud, libel and slander. Ms. Markel alleges Ms. Finch's remarks that she didn't perform her contractual duties were "false and defamatory."

Ms. Markel claims she and Ms. Finch signed an agreement in 1995 creating a "joint venture" under which they would each benefit from World Flight through property or profits.

Outdoor grill won't be casualty of tougher pollution standards

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Environmental Protection Agency has a message for summertime barbecuers: Its proposal to toughen air pollution standards won't douse their backyard grills.

In the heated debate over the EPA proposal, opponents have charged that the outdoor grill may become a casualty in the name of cleaning up the air.

And while backyard chefs may pay little attention to statistics on smog-causing ozone and fine particulates, they perk right up when someone suggests they may lose their outdoor grills.

But no such attack on barbecuing actually is being considered by the EPA, or by any other federal officials as far as anybody can determine. The proposal going through final review

at the EPA and White House calls for further reducing the amount of ozone-causing chemicals in the air and for the first time regulating microscopic soot, much of which comes from grilling.

"EPA is not contemplating nor have we ever contemplated restrictions on the use of charcoal and gas grills," EPA Administrator Carol Browner wrote a congressman recently, suggesting any state or local attempt to curb barbecues would "defy common sense."

Under the EPA proposal, states would have to develop pollution control plans to meet the new standards, in many cases over a 10- to 15-year period. Factories, industrial plants and coal-burning electric power plants as well as automobiles spew millions of tons of

such pollution into the air.

And no one denies barbecues also pollute.

But senior EPA officials, health experts, and many state environmental control officials say that to put controls on backyard grilling would amount to committing political hara-kiri over a hibachi.

State officials also have little desire to take on the barbecue crowd.

"There are a lot of things we would look at before we went to that extent," concedes Kenneth Silfven, spokesman for the Michigan Quality of Environmental Quality. "Nobody's out there eyeing the backyard grill."

California often is cited as the state where the barbecue already is under fire.

Amarillo philanthropist dies at 93

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) - Longtime Amarillo contractor and philanthropist L.P. "Pete" Gilvin died Friday. He was 93.

Gilvin was a past president of the National Associated General Contractors of America and the Texas Highway Heavy Branch of the Associated General Contractors of America.

The board chairman of Gilvin-Terrill Inc., Gilvin had been a major contractor for road and highway building since the 1920s. He was inducted into the Texas Good Roads Hall of Honor in 1995.

In 1933, after working in his father's construction business, Gilvin joined what would become the engineering firm Gilvin-Terrill.

Among Gilvin's civic works was pushing for the creation of Palo Duro Canyon State Park in 1968 and helping develop the production of "Texas" with the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation.

He served as chairman of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission after his appointment by Gov. John Connally in 1968. He also served on the boards of the Lone Star Ballet, Cal Farley's Boys Ranch and the Amarillo Art Center.

In 1976, Gilvin received the Texas Art Award for Distinguished Contributions to the Arts by an individual for his philanthropic work. Gilvin's wife, Wanda, died in 1995.

Services will be at 10 a.m. Monday in Polk Street United Methodist Church. Burial will be in Llano Cemetery.

Boll weevil war resumes

AUSTIN (AP) - The state effort to stamp out the boll weevil appears to be back in business.

Gov. George W. Bush signed legislation Friday to resume the war against the biggest enemy to the state's important cotton production.

The Boll Weevil Eradication Program bill, which both the House and Senate approved unanimously, provides for a referendum in the South Plains on Aug. 1 to activate the program.

The Texas Supreme Court struck down the state's existing program earlier this year, responding to a lawsuit by 130 cotton farmers in South Texas and West Texas who challenged the way fees were assessed for the pesticide spraying program.

"Our top priority with this legislation was to develop a statewide program that will eliminate the boll weevil. Texas needs to have policy in place to fight this major threat to our economy," said the bill's author, Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock.

He headed a delegation of legislators who attended the signing.

The suing farmers argued that the Legislature delegated broad governmental authority improperly to a private foundation administering the program.

The new law gives Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry more direct control of the program, including approval of its budget.

"We went through the bill and made the changes that were necessary to address the concerns of the court. We also resolved the issues that have been ongoing in these eradication zones to gain the confidence of cotton growers," Duncan said.

mph, consuming some 50 houses in five-mile-wide, half-mile-long path.

Wilson shrugs his shoulders at the attention focused on Gabriels' offer to bury the victims without charge.

"It doesn't make sense to me to profit off people's misery," said Wilson, the mortuary's general manager.

Wilson cites many gestures of goodwill from other merchants and residents in and near Georgetown. He shows a room filled with eight flower arrangements for the first victims to be buried. He tells how florists here and across the state have called with offers of flowers and monetary donations to help with funeral costs.

Insurance industry estimates of damage in Williamson and parts of nearby Travis County are expected to reach between \$20 million and \$30 million, said Jerry Johns, president of the Southwestern Insurance Information Service.

The horrific images have touched even those barely old enough to speak.

Tiny children, their hands sweaty from clutching pennies, have made

their way to the Williamson County Courthouse in Georgetown. There, Kathryn Adamek and Lissa Sauls of the tax collectors' office collect their donations.

"It just really touches my heart to see that," said Ms. Adamek.

Her co-worker smiles in agreement. "It's great to see everybody come together," said Ms. Sauls.

Outside their office and down the hall in the courthouse rotunda stand two large tables overflowing with donations of canned goods and household items.

"We were just sorry to hear about the families," Ms. Adamek said. "That tornado was just devastating. It touched everybody."

On Friday, emergency relief organizations began moving mobile homes into Jarrell to house those left homeless by the tornado.

Former Texas Ranger remembers Bonnie and Clyde

Now 83, Pasadena man was only 22 when he joined manhunt for outlaws

PASADENA, Texas - The five men sat by the Louisiana logging road waiting for the arrival of the outlaws. It was a cool May morning in 1934. The men had assumed their ambush positions at around 3 p.m. the previous afternoon.

The night spent by the roadside was a small inconvenience for the chance to end their mission. Some of the men had hunted their quarry for more than three months across half a dozen states. Yet somehow, America's most famous couple had eluded them, leaving a trail of bank robberies and corpses in their wake.

At 9:30 a.m. on May 23, a lookout announced the stolen grey '34 Ford Deluxe was coming up the hill to its unsuspecting rendezvous.

Of all those present that fateful morning when the outlaws Bonnie Parker and Clyde Barrow met their deaths, only one is still alive today to tell the story.

He is 83-year-old Edd Miller, one of Pasadena's sturdiest and most illustrious civil servants. On the day

when his life and Bonnie and Clyde's intersected, he was a 22-year-old Special Texas Ranger.

"Everybody in the country was looking for them," he said. "They were cold-blooded people."

The flamboyant couple had killed 15 people and robbed more than a dozen banks in eight states.

Even today, more than 60 years later, their deeds continue to fascinate and intrigue. How else to explain last week's auction in San Francisco, that netted \$187,809 from the sale of a few of Clyde Barrow's effects?

Miller got a crash course in the misdeeds of the legendary couple in 1934, when he was recruited to join the hunt by the equally legendary Texas Ranger Frank Hamer.

Hamer had been called out of retirement after Bonnie and Clyde broke into Eastman Prison near Trinity in January of that year. They had shot and killed two guards and freed Barrow's cousin Raymond Hamilton from the death sentence he awaited in his cell.

After the escape, Lee Simmons,

then-manager of the Texas prison system, spearheaded the effort to raise money to capture the couple, dead or alive.

Earlier, Hamer had quit the Rangers rather than serve under the first female governor of Texas, Miriam "Ma" Ferguson. But the challenge of capturing Bonnie and Clyde proved irresistible and he agreed to head the team.

"He was the best Ranger they had," said Miller.

A big man with a penchant for poker and whiskey, Hamer had killed 50 outlaws in his career, according to Miller.

But despite his reputation, he couldn't hunt Bonnie and Clyde alone - he needed a chauffeur. The man he picked was Miller.

"He told me when he swore me in that I would never be in the record," said Miller. "He didn't want anyone to know he couldn't drive at night."

By that time, Miller had already ridden the rails, fought fires in Arizona and helped keep the peace in the rough-and-ready oil fields of Kilgore and Arp. His cousin Lee Miller, Ranger Captain from San

Antonio, recommended him for the job with Hamer.

The young Ranger slept in the car at night to guard the guns while Hamer wandered the clubs and beer joints looking for leads. Miller was paid \$5 a day plus \$5 for expenses, a princely sum at the time.

The pair cruised Oklahoma, Missouri, Kansas, Alabama and Texas in search of the outlaws.

"The Texas Rangers went anywhere they wanted to go in those days," said Miller.

Finally, a tip relayed to a sheriff in Dallas brought the pair, along with another Ranger and two deputies, to Gibsland in Bienville Parish, La.

That May morning, all five of the men waited patiently until they saw the Ford coming down the hill - then poured round after round of rifle fire into the car. Miller estimates they put about 50 bullets into the car.

"Them days you didn't get scared, you had too many rifles," he said.

They found eight bullets in the body of 22-year-old Bonnie Parker and 25 to 30 in Clyde Barrow, who was 26. In the back of the Ford, the men discovered a tin box with over

\$10,000 in stolen money.

"Last time I saw it, the Rangers were counting it up," said Miller, with a smile.

The young Ranger rode in the wrecker that towed the car and bodies to nearby Arcadia for the inquest. The town of 2,000 swelled to triple its size from curious onlookers, the newspapers of the day reported.

Jesse Warren of Topeka, Kan. came to claim her stolen Ford. She later sold it to a carnival, according to Miller.

The car traded hands until it ended up with its current owner, Raymond Paglia of the Nevada-based casino Whiskey Pete's.

Paglia kept a high profile at the April auction, paying \$85,000 for a bullet-riddled shirt worn by Clyde Barrow the day he died.

Shortly after the ambush, the young Ranger was laid off in Depression-era cutbacks. At 22, he had already had more adventure than most men see in a lifetime.

Miller later served stints as Pasadena's police chief and as a judge. Yet he will never forget the major excitement in the days of Bonnie and Clyde, he says.

"Today it's petty excitement but it's just as bad if it kills you," he said.

Girlfriend's death led man to garden at nearby church

LOS ANGELES (AP) - The man devotes each weekend to the church.

Some days, he prunes the rose bushes. Others, he repairs the brick patio, or installs better lighting or builds new windows. He knows just about every corner of the building by heart - except the inside.

He has little use for religion, and not much more for God. But on the grounds of the one-room, clapboard sanctuary, on a whizzing four-lane boulevard in this city's sprawling suburbs, Dan Chandler has rediscovered his soul, and his sanity.

Mad with grief after the death of his adored girlfriend, Chandler thought he might explode. In the hours following her death in 1992, he had fantasies of going somewhere quiet and shooting a bullet through his temple.

Vicki Kelem died at age 44 from a disease called amyloidosis in which abnormal proteins build up in body tissues and eventually destroy organs. She was sick for a year and a half.

As he tells it, she was a woman of boundless enthusiasms. She loved Chandler. She loved the congested San Fernando Valley neighborhood where they lived. And she loved the country village look of the Little Brown Church on nearby Coldwater Canyon Boulevard.

Well, Chandler thought, that's as good a place as any.

"Three days after she died, I went to the church to get baptized and blow my brains out," he said.

Instead, after a long talk with the pastor, he wound up asking if he could plant three rose bushes, one pink and two red - Vicki's favorite flowers, in her favorite colors.

Soon, "I started planting more roses," he said. "They didn't have any flowers there. I put three bushes in, it made everything else look bad."

Chandler, now 62, laughed. "I'm an overachiever."

Financially speaking, the church did not need him. The burgeoning congregation recently bought a new house of worship nearby.

So when Chandler planted a whole new garden, then moved on to improve the fencing, pathways and parking lot with his own money and sweat, the congregation was dubious.

"You always wonder, you know, 'What's his angle?'" said the chapel's senior minister, the Rev. Laurence Keene. "I think it took a year or two for us to realize - he doesn't have any ulterior motive. He was just a lost soul."

Chandler ran away from home at age 13 and drifted through various Western cities. He eventually bought a string of auto repair shops, married, had a son, then divorced.

In 1977, Chandler moved to Los Angeles and met Kelem a year later. "I fell in love with her instantly," he said.

Pictures show a bright-eyed woman with a cheery smile and chin length, platinum-blond hair. She favored blue, cycliner and pink clothing, manicured nails and glittery rings, one for each finger of each hand.

"She was always smiling - very, very cheerful," Chandler said. "She wouldn't let herself be sad."

Chandler was a bitter man when he met her. "She changed me," he said.

They would have married - in the little church, of course - but legal issues lingering from Chandler's first marriage prevented it.

Instead, when Kelem got sick Chandler tended to her himself until, overwhelmed, he placed her in a nursing home for the last six months of her life. He visited her every day.

That's when he started, surreptitiously, stopping by the Little Brown Church.

"The pain broke my spirit," he said. "I've always been a 'Here, I'll do it' type of person. It broke me down to the point where I could no longer do it."

With its simple, country look, the Little Brown Church is often rented out for weddings. It's where Nancy married Ronald Reagan in 1952, and where Marlon Brando, Mickey Rooney and David Hasselhoff have tied the knot.

"The Little Brown Church met all our requirements," recalled Mrs. Reagan. "It was small and had a certain quaint, old-fashioned charm we loved."

The building dates to 1940, when the Disciples of Christ denomination offered \$600 to build a church.

Despite the departure of its congregation, the community remains welcome at the church, which never closes its doors.

Like the church, Chandler leads a simple existence. His home doubles as an office in the company he owns - U.S. Labor Services, which produces practice manuals for federal civil service exams.

Cockleburrs and Devil's Claws

Remember when your momma got out her iron skillet, put about an inch of lard in it, floured a steak -- maybe even a T-bone or sirloin -- and dropped it into the bubbling grease?

When she was through frying that beef, she poured out most of the grease, dusted it with flour and poured in the milk, for a white gravy that still makes me drool, just thinking about it.

Of course, virtually the same procedure produced "southern" fried chicken and cream gravy, a gourmet meal, if you please.

Living in the country part of the time was not my idea of heaven, but there were some advantages. There were the cows that produced milk and, with an old-fashioned separator, cream. As a kid, I remember hating the milk; obviously it wasn't pasteurized. After the cream was separated out, the remaining liquid was called "blue john," why, I don't know.

But the cream was the integral ingredient in homemade ice cream. A mixture of eggs, sugar and cream, beaten until frothy and flavored with vanilla, was poured into the metal bucket of the ice cream freezer. After it was placed in the wooden container, ice was chipped off a 50-pound block and dropped into the freezer, along with rock salt.

Incidentally, the ice block, or what was left of it, later was installed in the real ice box.

As a little kid, it was my job to sit on top of the freezer as an adult patiently cranked. A big towel covered the ice to keep me dry on the bottom. As I grew older, my younger sister got the sitting job and I did the cranking. In the summertime, I much preferred sitting (it was cool).

These examples of country cooking make my mouth water even as my brain reminds me of the cholesterol and other bad things that entered my body.

Nowadays, those who still eat red

meat (there are a bunch of us, I'll wager) buy lean cuts and trim off any excess fat. The old days of "marbled" beef are gone forever. The broiler in the kitchen range is fired up or, in so many families, an outdoor grill serves the purpose of broiling the meat.

To digress, there are more and more outdoor propane grills on the market. I've come across the luxury car of the grill genre -- a stainless steel item that sells in the neighborhood of \$800. A lesser model costs only \$500. The meat cooked on the grill is delicious but I've yet to decide if it's \$500 delicious.

My mother's recipe for homemade cream is inscribed on a postcard she mailed to me more than 30 years ago, when I lived in the Big Apple. Friends up there hadn't the faintest idea what we were talking about when we mentioned ice cream freezers. I dragged out mine, but soon realized I didn't know what to do with it. My mother always made the ice cream in our family. A hurry-up message to her produced the postcard recipe.

Through the years, I've misplaced or flat lost many recipes but that postcard has been my most prized culinary possession. What I need to do is write it down for my daughters so if the card falls through a crack, we still have the recipe.

My mother never made anything but vanilla ice cream. I never saw any reason to deviate from that tradition.

Without a cream separator, my mother went to the dairy case where she filled her shopping basket with half and half and whipping cream, with a tiny bit of whole milk, just to top off the bucket. Again, I know of no good reason to vary a tried and true ice cream.

Long ago, I decided there were lots of food items I could forego to reduce my cholesterol intake. Ice cream is not one of them.

Hat-maker linking Stetson to bullriders

GARLAND, Texas (AP) - Dallas Western-wear salesman Chris Williamson - looking sharp and starched in long-sleeved shirt, laundered jeans and antecater-skin boots - already has his eye on his next cowboy hat: a \$480 Resistol "Black Gold" model for fall and winter.

Who needs a hat? "If you're at the bars, you need a hat," says Williamson, 21, stating the obvious to the obviously clueless.

And if you need a hat - not a baseball cap, but a crease-crowned, roll-brimmed beauty that adds inches heightwise and impresses would-be dance partners - chances are good your choice will say Resistol or Stetson inside the crown.

Together, those brands made by Hatco of Garland dominate the U.S. cowboy hat market, thanks to Resistol's irresistibility to working cowboys and the legendary cachet of the 132-year-old Stetson name.

The question for Hatco and the rest of the Western wear industry - beneficiaries of the "Urban Cowboy" 1980s and country-line-dancing early 90s - is where growth will come from until the next boost from the cyclical pop-culture machine.

"They're not a Nike, a fast-growth industry," observes Manhattan-based Alan Millstein, editor and publisher of a newsletter for retail clients.

Hatco's answer to the industry

blahs is expansion into the margins of traditional markets. Move over, country crooners George Strait and Alan Jackson; make room for bull riding great Tuff Hedeman, female country singer Terri Clark and Dallas Cowboys cornerback Deion Sanders.

The Stetson label recently inked a sponsorship deal with Bull Riders Only, a company that capitalizes on the glamour of bull riding by producing competitions without the six other traditional rodeo events (e.g., calf-roping and barrel racing).

In bull riding, judges evaluate the form and flair of riders who stay on the back of an enraged animal at least eight seconds while holding on with just one hand. The difference with the increasingly popular standalone contests is their broader audience, says Eric Dickson, a spokesman for Bull Riders Only of Englewood, Colo.

"They're not regular rodeo fans. They're NASCAR-type fans and sports fans in general," Dickson says. "They like bull riding because it's very macho, it's very dangerous and it's very intense."

In linking Stetson with bull riding, Hatco hopes to put hats on the heads of some of those fans who wouldn't attend traditional rodeos, says Albert Luiz, vice president of manufacturing.

Luiz oversees Hatco's World War II-era plant near Dallas where dozens of workers produce some 350 hats per day out of "hat bodies,"

cones of floppy wool-and-fur felt made by Hatco plants in Longview and Newark, N.J. Straw hat bodies come from outside vendors in Latin America.

Amid the roar of fans, sanders and sewing machines, the hat bodies are sized, dried, shaped, creased, trimmed and packaged to retailers' order, their leather sweat bands stamped with the store names. The hats leave the plant in big boxes marked with Resistol's brown-and-white cowhide pattern or Stetson's elegant black motif befitting models like the top-of-the-line \$1,500 beaver-and-cashmere El Presidente.

Hatco's lines also include Dobbs dress hats (whose fans include Tom Landry) and Charlie 1 Horse specialty cowboy hats. Hatco, Montana Silversmiths of Billings, Mont., and Denver-based Imperial Headwear, a maker of golf headwear, make up Hat Brands, the largest designer, manufacturer and marketer of headwear in the United States.

Dallas investment firm Hicks, Muse, Tate & Furst Inc. bought Hat Brands in 1992. The company said its revenues doubled from \$100 million to \$200 million in 1994. John Muse did not return calls from The Associated Press.

Overall, the Western headwear market, including hats, hat bands and accessories, adds up to about \$100 million to \$150 million annually, said Gordon Moore, president of the Denver-based Western and English Manufacturers Association in Denver and chief executive of Renegade Headwear of Denton.

In another move to rope in nontraditional hat buyers, Hatco is launching its first full-fledged line of cowboy-style hats for women this summer.

While most cowgirls will buy a man's hat and put a different band or crease on it, the Lady Stetson brand will be "a little bit more fashion, more trendy," says Ginger Pate, who is overseeing the line's development. The nine styles have accouterments like ribbons, bows and concho bands on smaller brims and crowns than their menswear counterparts.

"This is designed to try to interest the people who are well-dressed in the Western industry - someone like the wife of a banker in Odessa," explains Hatco's Gary Rosenthal, Ms. Pate's boss.

Appealing to young fashion-conscious men who wouldn't normally wear any variety of cowboy hat is the goal of the new Deion by Dobbs line.

The catalog cover sports a grinning Deion Sanders clad in silk shirt and diamond jewelry tipping a red fedora.

In addition to fedoras, Deion by Dobbs features porkpies, bowlers, leather ball caps and newsboy styles, many adorned with ribbon bands and feathers.

No matter the style, every hat makes a statement.

Williamson, the Western wear salesman, said nothing happens if he goes bareheaded to places like the mall.

"If you go in there with a hat on, everyone stares at you, like you're different," he says approvingly. "The hat puts you out there."

Are today's events predicted in Bible?

NEW YORK (AP) - A book that claims the Old Testament contains coded clues to future events - including the assassinations of Abraham Lincoln, Gandhi, John F. Kennedy and Yitzhak Rabin - has been met with skepticism in theological circles.

"The Bible Code," written by Michael Drosnin and published by Simon & Schuster, arrived in bookstores Thursday.

The \$25 book claims that the original Hebrew text of the first five books of the Bible, when analyzed by computer, identifies rabbis who lived centuries later and foretells 20th-century assassinations and the 1969 moon landing.

The code is likened to a huge crossword puzzle, with letters scattered throughout the text with equal numbers of letters between them.

Drosnin said he found the phrase "assassin will assassinate" across "Yitzhak Rabin" down, and nearby on the same page, in letters spaced 10 apart, the name "Amir" - Rabin's assassin.

His book was based on a 1994 article in the scholarly journal Statistical Science, in which two Israeli experts said they proved that Genesis contained names and birthdates of several dozen rabbis born centuries later.

But one of those experts said Drosnin has taken the codes too far. "All attempts to extract messages from Torah codes or to make predictions based on them are futile and of no value," said Dr. Eliyahu

Rips, a mathematics professor at Jerusalem's Hebrew University.

Drosnin said: "I don't care what people claim. The fact is that I found these predictions, including Rabin's assassination, encoded in the Bible and it's clear as a bell. A child could have seen it."

Drosnin said he tried to warn the Israeli leader through a friend before his assassination in 1995, but was ignored.

Bob Bender, a Simon & Schuster vice president and senior editor, told The New York Times that the publishing house believes the book "reflects serious research."

Some scholars said computers could be used to find evidence of almost anything by sorting through vast amounts of raw data. References to Jewish holidays have been found by analyzing a Hebrew translation of "War and Peace."

The theory of coded predictions in the Bible has been used by some Christian and Jewish fundamentalist groups for fund-raising and proselytizing.

Shaul Magid, a philosophy professor at New York's Jewish Theological Seminary, said he finds the idea of seeking evidence of future events in the Bible offensive because it "reduces scripture to technology ... eliminating any insights or inspiration" from the words.

Alan Brill, a professor of Jewish mysticism and thought at Yeshiva University, said that the material in Drosnin's book lacks any "theologically meaningful" basis and that there is no reason to believe modern-day events are predicted in the Old Testament.

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Satellites that measure winds and waves tracked a warm water mass the size of the United States as it moved across the Pacific Ocean, a sign that a weather-disrupting El Nino may be brewing, NASA scientists announced Thursday.

If so, heavy rains and drought could be in store around the world come winter.

An El Nino occurs when westward-blowing trade winds weaken, allowing a mass of warm water normally located off Australia to drive eastward to western South America. The phenomenon got its name from the Spanish words for baby Jesus because the huge, warm pool usually arrives around Christmas.

Simultaneous readings from two

instruments are giving scientists strong suggestions about ocean and wind conditions that could foreshadow an El Nino.

Because water expands as it heats up, warmer seas are higher seas. A radar instrument aboard the U.S.-French TOPEX-Poseidon satellite detected a 6-inch to 8-inch rise in sea height in the equatorial Pacific, said Lee-Lueng Fu, TOPEX project

scientist at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena.

Radar images from March and April, released Thursday, showed the sea-level hump moving east along the equator from Australia, through the tropical Pacific. It arrived at the west coast of South America in early May, Fu said.

With the shift, the hump of warm water that usually piles up at the western end of the Pacific "sloshes back eastward in the form of a Kelvin wave," Fu said.

On May 15, NOAA researchers said they detected early indications of an El Nino coming in late 1997. Their prediction was based in part on the satellite observations, Fu said.

There have been local signs of El Nino, too. Fishermen in Newport Beach this week reported their biggest haul of jumbo squid since 1990, when a warm Pacific current brought them north from Mexican waters. Klaus Weickmann, a meteorologist with the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration in Boulder, Colo., said the squid swarm could be indicative of an El Nino.

Coffee futures prices spiraling, nearing all-time highs over \$3

Coffee futures prices on Thursday moved within striking distance of all-time highs after topping \$3 a pound on the possibility of frost in Brazil and reports of poor crops in smaller coffee-producing countries.

On other commodity markets, soybean futures prices rose sharply amid concerns there will be spot shortages before the next harvest. Palladium futures retreated after a strike in South Africa ended.

Coffee futures easily surpassed \$3 a pound for the first time since mid-1977 in a market increasingly concerned about the potential for a frost in June and July in Brazil, the world's leading producer.

Meteorologists say there is a one-in-five chance of a damaging frost this winter in the Southern Hemisphere. But with world supplies growing increasingly tight and projections for a world deficit of 1.5 million bags of coffee next year, speculators and roasters were taking no chances, buying heavily to obtain whatever supplies are available.

"People in the coffee-growing regions of Brazil are still walking around in their bathing suits, but we're seeing one of the tightest supply situations in history," said Michael Segal, president of coffee brokerage firm Lamborn Securities Inc. "A cool breeze will put this market up another 50 cents and if there is truly a frost, the sky's the limit."

Colombia, which combines with Brazil to produce 45 percent of the world's coffee crop, is expected in October to begin harvesting a below-par crop for a second year because of heavy rains and labor problems.

Brazil's production also has been significantly lower in recent years following severe frosts in 1994 that damaged coffee trees, which generally take about three years before they can again produce good yields. Production this year could be 18 million bags, one group estimated, far below the normal 27 million bags. Each bag weighs 132 pounds.

Meanwhile, Nicaragua and Tanzania reported drought in both

countries' most fertile coffee-growing regions has damaged trees and likely will lead to significantly reduced production.

Further supporting prices were reports that some producing countries had defaulted on delivery contracts to the United States and Europe. The situation is leading to further tightening of near-term supplies.

Green, arabica coffee for July delivery to the Coffee, Sugar and Cocoa Exchange in New York rose 19.25 cents to \$3.148 a pound after soaring as high as \$3.18 a pound. Coffee futures now are at their highest since April 1977 and threaten to surpass an all-time high of \$3.375 touched that same month.

Court rules on PSF side

PRINCETON, Mo.—A lower court's ruling that townships do not have the authority to impose zoning regulations on farm structures was unanimously upheld by the Missouri Supreme Court.

The high court denied the appeal of Lincoln Township and affirmed the ruling of the Putnam County Circuit Court. The high court ruled that Lincoln Township exceeded the zoning powers granted by state law in an effort to zone Premium Standard Farms.

In the opinion issued by the court, Justice William Price wrote, "...our decision is based upon the lack of statutory authority for Lincoln Township to promulgate the regulation at issue... The only issue to be determined is whether regulation of such structures is regulation of farm structures.

"Because the finished buildings and sewage lagoons are structures and are incident to the raising of livestock, which is farming, they are farm structures... There is no genuine issue of material fact concerning the nature and composition of the lagoons and finishing buildings. Premium is entitled to judgment as a matter of law," the opinion concluded.

"We are pleased with the court's ruling," said Charlie Amot, a vice president for Premium Standard Farms. "Our only goal was to continue to operate the White Tail Farm the way it was designed and built. This ruling provides additional protection for all Missouri farmers."

Eligible dates for these drought affected counties are from Oct. 1, 1995 through July 25, 1996 and continuing.

Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for these SBA loans. Applications and further information can be obtained by calling the SBA toll-free at 1-800-366-6303.

These loans are intended to assist businesses in offsetting working capital losses which they suffered as a result of the drought reducing the crop income of the area farmers and ranchers.

Bulls favored but Jazz finished strong

CHICAGO (AP) - If the Chicago Bulls show up for the NBA Finals expecting to win just because they've been there before and the Utah Jazz haven't, they will be in trouble.

Michael Jordan says the Bulls must be smart enough to ignore conventional wisdom, which would suggest that the Jazz are satisfied to merely reach the finals after years of near misses.

Not one Utah player ever has gotten this far. Neither has coach Jerry Sloan.

The Bulls' Jordan, Scottie Pippen and coach Phil Jackson are going for their fifth title in seven years. Dennis Rodman and Robert Parish have won three championships each.

In fact, backup center Brian Williams will be the only Chicago player making his first finals appearance when the best-of-7 series begins Sunday night at the United Center.

"I don't think you want to put too much emphasis on that because when we won in '91, that was the same scenario," Jordan said Friday. "We had never won. We had never been into the finals. We played against a team that was very experienced, the Lakers, and yet we won in five.

The Jazz have every reason to believe in themselves.

No, they don't have Jordan, the ultimate big-game player. But they do have Karl Malone, who edged out Jordan for league MVP honors, All-Star guard John Stockton and a

talented supporting cast.

The Bulls' 69-13 record matched the second-best in NBA history, trailing only their 72-10 of last season. But even though the Jazz won "only" 64 regular-season games, they actually have a better record than Chicago since the All-Star break - 42-7 to 38-9, including playoff games.

LSU edges Rice by 5-4

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) - It's tough to keep LSU's power hitters from getting one over the outfield wall. Even a stiff wind that stumped other hitters all day long couldn't do it.

When the defending champion Tigers finally connected, it couldn't have come at a better time. Brandon Larson's two-run homer in the bottom of the eighth off Rice's Matt Anderson tied the game at 4-4 and set up LSU's 5-4 win on the opening day of the College World Series.

The second-seeded Tigers (54-13) advanced to Sunday's winners' bracket game against No. 3 Stanford (44-18), a 8-3 first-game winner over No. 6 Auburn earlier Friday. Seventh-seeded Rice (47-15) meets Auburn (49-16) in an elimination game Sunday.

It was Larson's 38th homer of the year, upping LSU's NCAA record total to 179 for the season. It also marked the 68th game in a row the Tigers have homered.

Rice's players weren't about to let the loss get to them. It's the Owls' first appearance in Omaha, and they were just happy to be there.

"I think we have already rebounded," first baseman Lance Berkman said. "We're not going to give up. We still have some pretty good pitching left, and we know we belong here."

Anderson, Rice's pitching ace and a projected first-round draft pick, entered the game with 1.82 earned run average, a 10-1 record and nine saves. He was third in the nation in ERA.

First-game jitters and two strong opposing arms proved costly to Auburn, which lost its CWS opener against Stanford. Three errors led to four unearned runs, including three in a five-run fifth, to give Stanford the win.

The Tigers managed only six hits and stranded 14 runners against Cardinal starter Chad Hutchinson (8-3) and reliever Jeff Austin, who picked up his fourth save.

Favorites fall at French Open

PARIS (AP) - It was a tough third round for the favorites at the French Open.

Pete Sampras is out. So are Thomas Muster and Jana Novotna. Yevgeny Kafelnikov, the defending champion, barely survived. Steffi Graf looked anything but convincing.

For Sampras, the No. 1 player in the world, the French Open remains the only Grand Slam title still out of his reach. He was beaten 6-2, 6-4, 2-6, 6-4 Friday by Magnus Norman, a 65th-ranked Swede who was celebrating his 21st birthday.

Sampras looked devastating in his first two matches, winning in straight sets and declaring he'd be tough to beat.

But the American came down with a case of diarrhea Thursday, and asked that his match be rescheduled for later Friday. It didn't help.

This was Sampras' eighth French

Open. He has won a total of nine Grand Slam titles, but none on the red clay of Roland Garros.

Muster, the fifth-seeded 1995 champion, tumbled against another low-ranked player, No. 66 Gustavo Kuerten of Brazil.

Kuerten stunned Muster with spectacular backhand winners in the final set to win 6-7 (3-7), 6-1, 6-3, 3-6, 6-4.

Kafelnikov, the third-seeded Russian, needed five sets to overcome Frenchman Cedric Pioline 7-5, 6-4, 6-7 (7-3), 1-6, 6-4.

The women's field lost its highest seed so far when No. 4 Novotna, a semifinalist last year, lost 3-6, 6-4, 6-4 to Nicole Arendt, an American ranked No. 87 in the world.

Graf, a five-time champion at Roland Garros who is the No. 2 seed, overcame a shaky start to advance to

the fourth round with a 7-6 (7-4), 6-1 victory over Magui Serna of Spain.

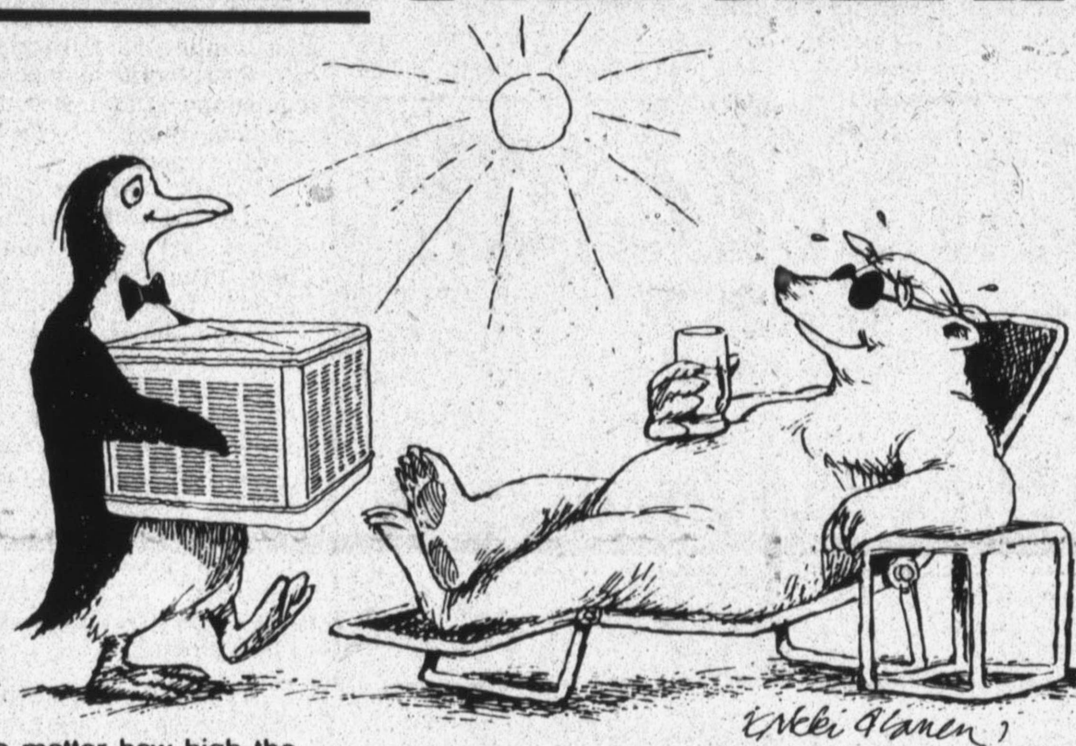

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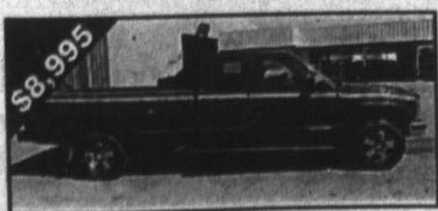
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Mussina almost hurls no-hitter against Tribe

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Presidential library will feature Bush memorabilia

Museum at Texas A&M will recreate offices, display World War II carrier airplane

COLLEGE STATION, Texas - There are treasures hidden in College Station - tributes from the nations of the world, from gold and diamonds to picture postcards. There are state secrets, too, hundreds of boxes of them, waiting for time and the events of man to pass, waiting for historians who have not yet been born.

They are the papers and memorabilia from the long career of George Bush. From home movies of his first baby steps to state gifts like a solid silver and gold samovar presented by Russian President Boris Yeltsin, all have been gathered for the George Bush Presidential Library and Museum set to open at Texas A&M University in November.

For now, though, they are hidden in a nondescript brick building that once housed a bowling alley and Chinese restaurant in an ordinary shopping center.

A visitor who enters through one of the deeply tinted doors is greeted by armed guards and a huge presidential seal. But there are no outward indications of the treasures that lie within.

"We've tried very hard to be invisible," David Alsobrook, director of the Bush Presidential Materials Project, explained last week.

Those days of anonymity are about to end. The project's staff of 20 employees and dozens of volunteers are boxing up materials to make the cross-town trip to the museum where visitors can see a re-creation of Bush's Camp David office and hundreds of other displays. There, too, scholars will be able to access increasing numbers of the 38 million pages of documents from all those years of public service.

It will become the nation's 10th presidential library.

The most visible part of the 90-acre complex will be the 17,000-square-foot Bush Museum.

A TBM Avenger aircraft, the kind a young George Bush flew during World War II combat in the Pacific, already hangs in the main gallery. The largest single-engine carrier plane during that war, it is so big that the building is being constructed around it.

But the museum has a problem with an Iraqi Scud missile from the Gulf War. "We don't know how we're going to get it inside," Alsobrook said. "It's too big."

Bush has said he has no desire to fly another TBM of the type he flew when he was the Navy's youngest aviator - and that he parachuted from after being shot down.

The former president made

headlines recently when, at 72, he made another parachute jump under much more peaceful circumstances. That second parachute will be part of the museum collection, as are movies of his 1944 rescue by a submarine.

Another vehicle, no less important to Bush, is a red 1947 Studebaker identical to the one he and his family drove to Midland when they moved to Texas in 1948.

The Bush museum also will have a whole section of the Berlin Wall, as well as a bigger-than-life statue of horses leaping over that symbol of a divided Germany.

The Gulf War, another key part of Bush's presidency, will be represented by a Patriot missile and other weapons, including the Scud if it can be fit in, a display of uniforms worn by coalition troops and a battlefield display that visitors will view through night-vision goggles.

Most presidential libraries include a mock-up of the Oval Office at the time the president was in the White House. Bush's museum instead will feature mock-ups of his private study at Camp David and the office he took all over the globe aboard Air Force One.

A 13-foot model of the specially built Boeing 747 used by the president sits on packing crates and slumbers under a plastic shroud in a warehouse-like storage room in the former Chinese restaurant.

"People give their presidents things," Alsobrook explained, "all kinds of things."

The museum has gathered 60,000 different items given to Bush - or donated by him and his family to the museum - over the years. Some of those already are on loan to other museums. The baseball glove the president-to-be wore as captain of Yale's varsity team has been displayed not only at that university but at the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N.Y.

Many items are on display at the temporary archives, as are some of the 1 million photographs in the collection. Some are treasures, like an elaborate, inlaid table from Morocco that sits in the corner of a meeting room. Some are a more mundane, such as a three-dimensional puzzle of the White House that sits in a display case in a hallway.

"We're getting more items all the time," Alsobrook said.

One example is the collection of 1,500 elephant figurines made of everything from coconuts to crystal. It was left to the project in the will of Houstonian Doris Hankammer in 1994.

Foreign gifts vary widely, some are more sentimental than valuable. There's a "We Love Uncle Bush" sign from Kuwait. Another shows somewhat less esteem - a shooting range target U.S. troops found in the palace of Panamanian strongman Manuel Noriega. Drawn in the outline of a life-size human form, it had Bush's name scrawled on it.

About 3,000 of the items are state gifts, valuable items given by foreign heads of state and world leaders to the president. By law they belong to the U.S. government.

The ornately tooled and silver-encrusted saddle presented by former Mexican President Carlos Salinas is part of that collection, as is a silver and gold statue of a rider on a camel given to Bush by the country of Jordan.

Perhaps most valuable, from a jeweler's standpoint, is a model of a Saudi desert fortress given Bush by that nation's leaders. The size of a big desk top, it is made of solid gold.

That model and several other valuable pieces are kept in a secure and undisclosed place. "We keep it safe," Alsobrook said.

A big set of double doors in a heavy frame opens to show another door, weathered and obviously very old. At the threshold is a brass plaque recounting a Kuwaiti tradition that says if a person gives his door to a visitor, that visitor is forever welcome in his home.

The door is from a Kuwaiti desert palace, the plaque says, and Bush is always welcome there. Framing the century-old door are other plaques that contain the names of each American serviceman and servicewoman who died in the Gulf War.

Under U.S. law, the papers used by an administration as part of a president's constitutional duties also belong to the people and are preserved by the National Archives. As in other presidential libraries, those state papers will be administered by archives staff while the library construction is paid for by private donations. Texas A&M donated the 90 acres of land and will administer the educational part of the complex.

Compilation of the state papers with a view for preservation for the future goes on while presidents are still in office, Alsobrook said. A couple of weeks after Bush lost the 1992 election, a special team began boxing materials to be shipped to Texas.

Only about 35 percent of the 38 million pages of papers held by the library are from the Bush presidency. Others are from his years as vice president, ambassador to the United Nations, head of the Central Intelligence Agency, Republican Party chairman, congressman and from his private life. The project also has the official papers of former Vice President Dan Quayle as well as some other members of the Bush administration.

Some of those papers will be open to the public in January - five years

after Bush left office. Others will be sealed for 12 years and still others, which contain more highly classified information, will be sealed much longer.

Future historians will find many documents to research Bush's life, Alsobrook said. He has always been a frequent writer of notes and letters, he said, and many boxes of his personal correspondence have been kept over the years.

The Bushes will decide just when the former president and first lady Barbara Bush's personal papers will be released, Alsobrook said.

Because the papers are to be kept forever, there are special considerations in their storage. High-acid paper, which might deteriorate over time, is copied and removed for special storage.

Sticky notes, which came into

widespread office use while Bush was vice president, offer another problem. Since nobody knows how long the adhesive on such notes last, each note is stapled or taped to the page it is stuck on, Alsobrook said.

If Ronald Reagan's administration saw the proliferation of sticky notes, Bush's saw the widespread introduction of the use of computers.

The library inherited a computer system the Bush administration used to handle many of its documents and will use that to build an electronic database. The library already has an Internet Web site through A&M's computer network.

Planners also included an apartment for Bush near the George Bush School of Government and Public Service and centers for presidential studies that are to be part of the library complex.

Man with horse, carriage gets trash hauling job

BRISTOL, Vt. (AP) - Patrick Palmer beat out the competition to become Bristol's garbage man because he had what others didn't - a horse and carriage.

Selectmen in this historic, 200-year-old town were impressed by Palmer's plan to pick up the trash - sans truck.

"This is pretty unique; that's why he got the bid," Town Administrator Bob Hall said Tuesday, Palmer's first day as the new village trash hauler.

Palmer and his two draft horses, Luke and Zack, cover their 8-mile route at a leisurely pace, moving through the traffic of Bristol's one main street without a hitch, and stopping briefly every once in a while to let Palmer's nephew, Jake, jump off to throw the trash into the wagon.

The route, which he covers twice - once to pick up garbage and once to pick up recycling - takes all day.

Selectmen for the town of 3,900 chose Palmer over three other bidders even though two of the contenders - both private citizens with trucks - put in bids that were \$600 or \$700 lower than his. Palmer will be paid \$15,600 for the year.

"I think Bristol's trying to create a friendly image, a small-town atmosphere," Hall said.

Prindle Wissler Mullin, an artist from Middlebury who stopped in Bristol for lunch, said she hoped the town's decision to hire Palmer signaled a trend away from modernization and development.

"We're going in the other direction, hopefully," said Mullin, 85.

Palmer, 50, drew some waves and greetings from friends, but no undue notice as he passed through the village.

"If I had a bigger rig, or more room in there, it would be just as quick as the truck," Palmer said.


If the horses leave anything behind, Jake picks it up with a shovel and throws it in the wagon.

Palmer is Bristol's first private trash collector; until now, the village has done the job itself.

"I think that \$600 (above the lower bids) is well worth it," said Suzanne Widlicka, whose home and clothing store is on Palmer's route. "It's our past and it's worth preserving."

Dear Ann Landers: I hope I'm not too late to respond to "Somewhere in California," who intended to commit suicide after she "settled a few things." She wanted to know how to make it easier on her family and whether she should leave a note. You told her the pain for survivors is excruciating and it never goes away. Your answer was right on the money, Ann, but I'd like to expand on it.

I lost a brother and a stepbrother to suicide. One left a note, and the other didn't. It made no difference. I want to tell "Somewhere" that no matter what you say in your note, the grief will be immense and the unanswered questions many. Survivors blame themselves, no matter what anyone says.

"What if I had done something differently?" or "If I had called that day, would it have changed things?" or "If I had been nicer or hadn't said that one little thing, would it have made a difference?" Those are the questions your survivors will ask themselves forever, whether or not you leave a letter.

I pray "California" will see this letter in your column and reconsider. How sad that my children will never know their uncles who chose suicide. They could have added so much to their young lives. Everybody lost. -- Still Questioning After 20 Years in Indiana

Dear Indiana: I hope "California" has gotten the help she needs. Some people are unaware that chemical help is now available for depression. It can make a world of difference. I've received many letters from suicidal readers who have said that after taking medication, it was as if a fog had lifted and the sun broke through. Life can be good again for "California."

Here's more on the subject:
From Boston: I was a teen-ager when my mother killed herself. Dad moved the family to another state soon after. My brothers and I agreed not to tell anyone how Mom died. We were ashamed. We also were afraid we might be looked on as "unstable." Suicide stigmatizes the

whole family. I know this is terribly unfair, but that's the way it is in the real world.

Seaford, N.Y.: My mother took her own life 27 years ago when I was only 11. I never got over it. There were no suicide hotlines or mood elevators like there are today. I hope the woman who wrote is around to read this.

Mesa, Ariz.: I, too, planned to kill myself. The fact that I had a husband, kids and friends who loved me made no difference. I didn't believe I deserved their love. A master's degree and success at work meant nothing. I decided the world would be better off without me. I had made too many mistakes. The only thing that made me hesitate was the belief that my suicide would mean more problems for my husband and I had already caused him enough grief.

Then, I read an article explaining how a chemical imbalance in the brain could cause depression. In my case, it made me feel worthless. I suddenly realized I wasn't worthless or crazy and that I had been given many gifts that were meant to be shared.

I sought the help I needed and am now a contented, contributing member of the human race.

Dear Mesa: A testimony such as yours beats anything I might say. Thank you for helping millions of people today.

Gem of the Day (Credit Casey Stengel): The secret of managing is to keep the five guys who hate you away from the guys who are undecided.

people gather to practice leadership and demonstrate skills and knowledge gained through work in 4-H projects. Also, the Texas 4-H Foundation, with assistance from 28 donors in the state, recognizes potential college students with more than \$800,000 in educational scholarships.

Many youth who come to Roundup this year will be setting foot on the same soil as their parents and grandparents years ago, said Dr. Nelson Jacob, Extension 4-H youth development specialist. The demonstration method--a concept of Extension founder Seaman A. Knapp--was adapted by 4-H and is used by youth today, he said. Youth demonstrate techniques and skills learned through 4-H projects.

Fashion still takes center stage with the Texas 4-H Fashion Show. More than 100 contestants exhibit knowledge and skills in purchasing, construction and modeling skills.

Today, newer programs include T.O.T.A.L. (Teams of Texas Acquiring Leadership)--a hands-on, two-day leadership seminar and Texas 4-H Beating the Odds Program, which recognizes 4-H members who have achieved significant personal accomplishments while dealing with limiting circumstances. Events that have been around for years and remain highlights of Roundup include the Texas 4-H Food Show, Share the Fun talent contest and judging events.

"Over the years, Roundup has changed to meet the needs of each generation, said Wooten.

"However, one thing remains constant--the tradition of recognizing outstanding youth, adults, alumni and sponsors."

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Extension News

If you are interested in starting a home based business, gaining the necessary funding to begin can be a challenge. Banks are usually unwilling to make loans to individuals for business start-up due to the high risk of failure and loss on loans. The reason is that smaller businesses are believed to be a more risky investment for traditional lenders, such as banks, than larger business ventures.

Some people use credit cards as a source of alternative funding, to generate a quick source of capital for their new businesses. Credit card capital should only be used when no other source can be secured. It should be used with extreme caution. Make certain that you can exercise strict self-control in the use of credit cards as sources of money. Remember that you are personally liable for the debt and that cash advances on credit cards often cost more because of higher interest rates or fees associated with cash advances.

The credit card should only be considered as a temporary funding source. Most credit cards require payment within 30 days. Otherwise high interest rates on unpaid balances after the 30-day payment period can cost more than you had planned. Currently, credit card interest rates are very competitive. Shop around for

low interest cards. Replace the credit card loan as soon as possible with a conventional bank loan or other lower interest loan. Use the credit card only to fill a short term need, not to fund the entire initial start-up of your business. You should have enough cash from other resources before you begin your business without relying on credit card financing.

In a recent study of small businesses seeking alternative sources of start-up capital, only a small percentage used credit cards. However, the more difficulty encountered in raising capital the higher the percentage of use of non-traditional capital, such as credit cards. More new businesses in smaller communities with a population below 25,000 relied on personal savings for obtaining cash for the business. Entrepreneurs needing

smaller amounts of money to start the business also tended to use more non-traditional sources of funding. Use of personal resources, such as a family savings account, can also be risky for the new owner. Making yourself "credit worthy" is a positive step to take before seeking a loan for your business. Using a credit card to gain access to money for the business should be a last resort. And when used, should be paid off within the 30-day payment period to avoid additional costs.

If you work with kids, in any sport - baseball, soccer, football or whatever -- then this certification is for you. You're going to want it even if it isn't required -- yet!!

If you are a CPR/First Aid instructor, this will be an easy upgrade for you, and you can then certify all the other coaches in your organization, thereby, serving as a Red Cross volunteer or authorized

provider.

Unfortunately, the coming of summer also means it is time to be prepared in the event of tornadoes. It is a good idea to take a weather-proof container like a plastic soap bucket, and fill it with items like a flashlight, a radio (with extra batteries for each), rain gear, food and water (with a can opener), and a First Aid kit (with prescription medicine).

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YOUR EYES

Double Vision

When the brain receives the normal, focused images from two eyes, it creates a perception of depth. When the images are mismatched, however, the result is double vision.

What happened? It may be only that bifocals are misaligned, and it's a simple matter for the optometrist to readjust the glasses. Or double vision can be a sign of a developing health problem, in which case the eye doctor may refer the patient to a specialist.

But in children, double vision is more likely the result of poor eye-muscle coordination that can result in crossed eyes. Confronted with two different, mismatched images, the child's brain may simply just "cancel" one. Results: loss of normal binocular vision and depth perception. School activities, even play, may be limited. Count on the optometrist to diagnose the condition carefully and prescribe the appropriate glasses and/or vision training to enable the child to function in his or her world.

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The most successful companies today are those who focus on doing simple things well. Today's results do not satisfy them. The know the level of world-wide competition will increase tomorrow. Therefore, continual improvement becomes their only guarantee of survival and success.

The best run companies focus on excellence. They know their products and services must be of superior, quality, deliver true value and improve with every new product generation.

The benefits of quality are widespread. Customers receive better products, competitive prices and vastly improved customer service. Management benefits from increasing employee morale, reduced stress levels and higher levels of compensation based on

increases in productivity. The owners of the company gain in the areas of increasing profits and growing long-term company value. When quality companies implement improvement programs correctly, everyone wins.

Even small businesses can profit from quality improvement efforts. While the process itself may not be as sophisticated as a larger company's programs, the benefits are the same. The second reason companies haven't begun quality programs is that it requires change. Experts agree that only babies are comfortable with change. I cannot explain why some well-run companies would resist utilizing proven self-improvement concepts, but change is a barrier.

The third reason is unconcern. These companies know about quality, but they just don't care.

I believe these firms may not survive many more years. We will see

some of them fall by the wayside. They may fall with the fanfare of front page headlines or just slip quietly from the scene. Quality-driven companies will swallow up some of these non-performers and will change the culture in a dramatic and positive way.

Writing Want Ads that really sell!

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs." Then, remember these hints:

- Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.
- Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.
- Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.
- Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

The students will not soon forget this trip. It served its purpose, Carlile said.

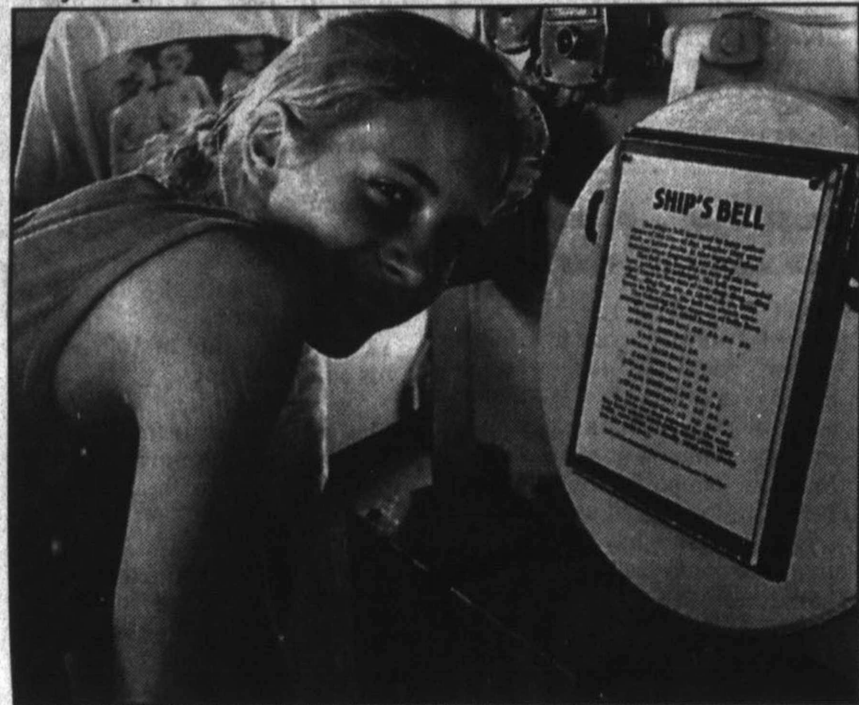
"The whole trip was great. There was always something for us to do and many places to go, Brinkman said.

Sloane Merrick is finding information during a "Hunt for History" aboard the Lady Lex in Corpus Christi.

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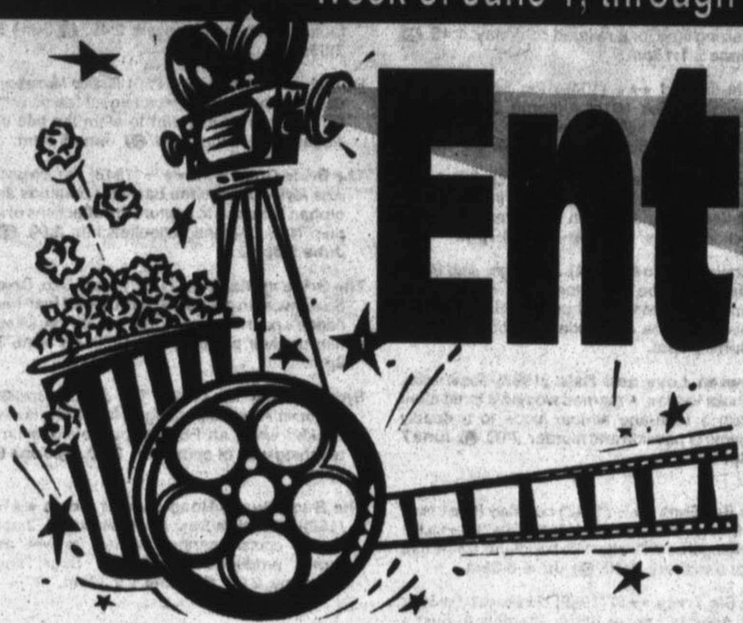

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Reynolds can't keep *Life...and Stuff* together

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Why can't TV be more like real life? Why can't life be more like a TV show?

Ever since the appearance of *All in the Family* in 1971, television has tried to show America its foibles, while critics have tried to melt the sugar coating off TV.

Life ... and Stuff, a comedy starting a six-week run Friday, June 6, on CBS, begets another question: Do we actually want to bring real life and TV life closer together?

The show is based on the cathartic stand-up act of its lead, Rick Reynolds, who plays adman Rick Boswell. Pam Dawber (*Mork & Mindy*, *My Sister Sam*) co-stars as his stay-at-home wife, Ronnie, and the series is primarily about the state of their relationship after 15 years of marriage and family life.

The supporting cast includes comic Andrea Martin as Ronnie's unmarried friend Christine, who serves as Rick's gadfly; David Rowe as Rick's free-loading brother; and character actor Fred Applegate (*FM*) as Rick's deadpan co-worker, Bernie, who counsels him a la Tim Taylor's (Tim Allen) neighbor, Wilson, in *Home Improvement*.

"I don't think there's another male lead on TV who is so consumed with finding the truth of himself," Reynolds says of his TV alter ego.

One of the show's running gags is Rick's habit of buttonholing strangers—even a fast-food clown—to act as his analyst.

"(As a child) I had a view into what I considered to be the real world ... through my television," Reynolds says, recalling a "dysfunctional childhood" with a widowed mother and a couple of

father substitutes. "I am very disheartened that life isn't like TV."

Specifically, Reynolds wishes life were more like *Leave It to Beaver*. To that end, he has settled his real-life family in Petaluma, Calif., the same suburb that produced the cul-de-sac comedy of *The Mommies*.

"Living in Petaluma gives me the sense of normalcy," Reynolds says. "It seems more like a TV show than to live down here (in Los Angeles)."

Reynolds suffers from two common misconceptions about America's *Leave It to Beaver* years: first, that real family life in those days was like the Cleavers' experience, and second, that adult viewers back then actually thought Cleaver life was a mirror image of their own.

They didn't, no more than audiences today tune into *The Nanny* or *Step by Step* to see the documentary "rushes" of their day.

As for *Life ... and Stuff*, the summer tryout spot is faint praise from CBS, which has had the series on the shelf since January. The differences in tone from episode to episode are almost manic, in direct correspondence to the admixture of Reynolds' egocentric whining.

Reynolds says he wants to create a comedy for adults, one that mirrors their lives. But his idea of a comedy for adults is to not give the children on the show any joke lines, because kids don't tell jokes, they do kid lines. It seems on his show, only Reynolds gets the joke lines.

But unfortunately, he really isn't funny enough (like Jerry Seinfeld) or insightful enough (like Woody Allen) to carry it all.

There may be plenty of people who wish life were more like a TV show, but *Life ... and Stuff* won't be one they'll want to call home.

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Q: I love to watch *The Drew Carey Show*. The cast is great, especially Kathy Kinney. Can you give me some more information on her? -Susan D. Brumbaugh via e-mail.

A: Kinney has become a pop-culture icon for her portrayal of Mimi Bobeck, the abrasive, bitter secretary who never met a mascara stick she didn't like. Originally the character was only to appear once, but the role was later expanded.

A native of Stevens Point, Wis., Kinney was doing improvisational comedy in New York clubs in 1986 when a friend, the late Bill Sherwood, cast her in his independent comedy film *Parting Glances*, in which she played the close friend of a gay New York couple.

Other film offers followed, and Kinney relocated to Los Angeles in 1987. Since then, in addition to a number of feature film appearances, she has played several memorable TV guest roles, including Miss Goddard, the eccentric town librarian, on *Newhart*; Nora, Martin Tupper's obsessed fan, on *Dream On*; Katie Banks, a guest villainess (with Drew Carey) on *Lois & Clark: The New Adventures of Superman*; and the angry woman who gave George Costanza what for after he parked in a handicapped space on a very funny *Seinfeld*.

Q: I recently heard that Noah Wyle did not sign a contract for *ER*. Does that mean that he no longer will be on the show? -M. York, Portland, Ore.

A: I'm not sure where you heard this, but it is not true. Like the other original cast members, Wyle is under a five-year contract, of which only three years have elapsed. (Sherry Stringfield, who got permission to leave her role as Dr. Susan Lewis this past sea-

son, is still technically bound by her contract as far as accepting other TV work).

"Noah's not going anywhere," NBC publicist Pam Morrison says with a laugh. For the record, George Clooney, despite a lively film career, has stated he fully intends to honor his own *ER* contract as well.

Q: When and how did Aneta Corsaut (Helen Crump on *The Andy Griffith Show*) pass away? -C. Lightner, Wooster, Ohio.

A: Corsaut died of cancer on Nov. 6, 1996.

Q: On *Life Goes On*, did the character Tyler (Tommy Puett) die in a car accident? What is Puett doing now? -D. Briggs, Bedford, N.H.

A: Yes, Tyler Benchfield, played by Puett from 1989-91, was indeed written out in a fatal car crash. Puett seems to have dropped out of sight since then, except for playing himself in a 1991 direct-to-video release called *Teen Vid I*.

World Music Awards rings in one enchanted evening

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"This is a very glamorous, glittering, Monte Carlo-type evening; very black tie, very upscale," says Gary L. Pudney, describing the ambience of the ninth *World Music Awards* telecast, airing Monday, June 2, on ABC.

Further setting the scene, Pudney, the program's executive producer, points out that the awards show was taped at the famous Sporting Club of Monte Carlo before a black-tie audience of 1,000.

While the country club accouterments surrounding the show may not jibe with most viewers' perception of popular music, that Monte Carlo feel is at the core of the pedigree of the awards show, which originated in Monaco and aired exclusively on European television until Pudney entered the picture four years ago with nothing less than global intentions.

The experienced producer (several *Academy Awards* shows) sought to bring the *World Music Awards* telecast first to the United States, then to the world.

"Now the show is seen in roughly 110 countries by over a billion people," Pudney says. "This is rapidly becoming the pre-eminent international music awards show."

Acknowledging the charges of irrelevance and being out of touch that nip at the heels of other music awards shows such as the *Grammy Awards* and the *American Music Awards*, Pudney says the *WMA* dodges these criticisms for one reason: "This is a very simple setup. It's all tabulated on album sales. The criteria for winning is simple: selling the most."

"This is a performance show - no speeches, no politics," he continues. "It's entertainment."

Hosting the high-gloss affair are Princess Stephanie of Monaco, actress Halle Berry and musician Jon Bon Jovi.

Highlights include performances by Celine Dion, Gloria Estefan, the Fugees, Julio Iglesias and Kenny G. The Bee Gees and Lionel Richie will receive awards for lifetime achievement and Michael Jackson will make a special appearance.

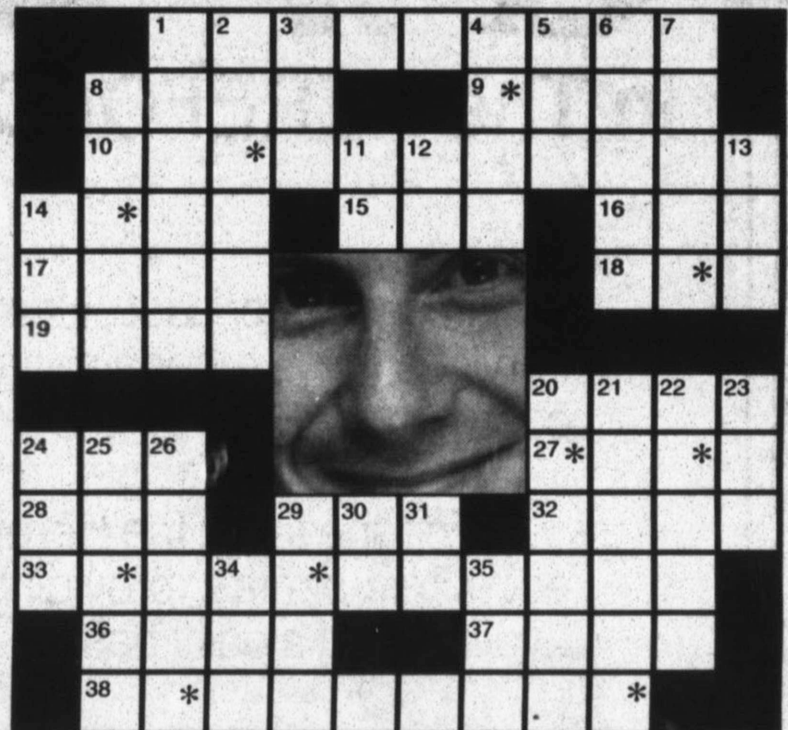

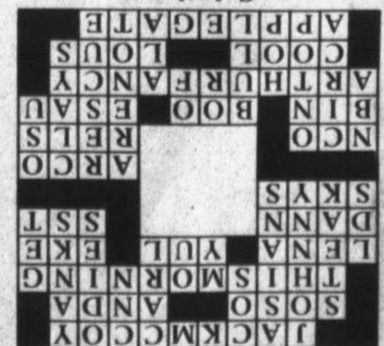

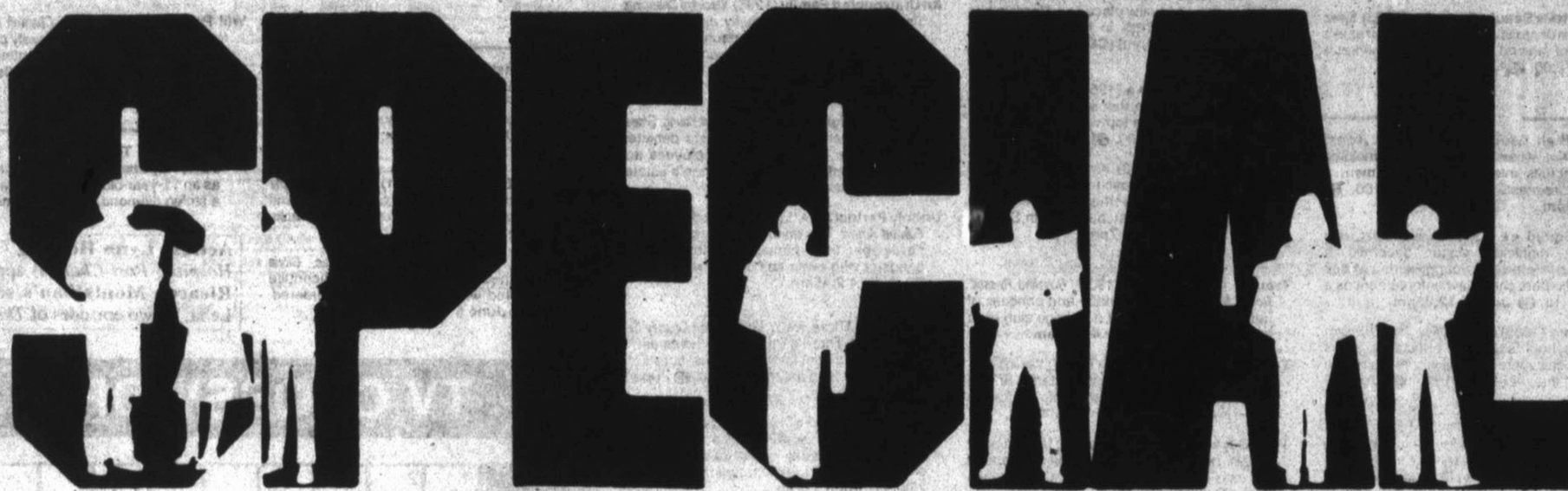
