City sells bond issue to finance plant work

By GEORGIA TYLER **Staff Writer**

Moving toward compliance with state regulations on wastewater disposal, the Hereford City Commission Monday night approved a \$500,000 revenue bond issue.

After hearing from a Southwest Securities financial advisor, Mark McLiney, commissioners adopted a resolution authorizing sale of the bonds, described as "revenue anticipating" bonds, to Hereford State Bank.

In other business, the commission: -- Adopted a resolution permitting condemnation of a dangerous building located at 337 and 339

-- Approved a miscellaneous service agreement with Oller Engineering of Lubbock.

-- Heard a report from Mike Hatley, executive director of Hereford Economic Development Corroration.

The commission at a meeting earlier this month approved a 10 percent increase in fees for city services, effective June 1 and appearing on city bills in July, to raise funds for improvements in the infrastructure of Hereford.

The increases, projected at 10 percent per year for three years, will produce revenue to pay for the bonds approved Monday night. The city expects to issue additional bonds in the future to finance infrastructure improvements.

The wastewater treatment plant is the most immediate concern because the city must deliver an application for renewal of the permit by 5 p.m. on Aug. 8.

Fine powder said to link McVeigh with explosives

DENVER (AP) - In the first the Oklahoma City bomb. evidence tying Timothy McVeigh to explosives, an FBI agent said the only use for a fine powder found on the Oklahoma bombing suspect's pants, T-shirt and earplugs is to detonate a

FBI chemist Steven Burmeister said Monday he was "not aware of any other way" the explosive powder known as PETN would show up on McVeigh's clothing other than by his having touched a detonator cord.

Pointing out that McVeigh, 29, scribbles notes in court with his right hand, Burmeister testified the PETN was found in the right pocket of McVeigh's black jeans while an unidentifiable trace amount was in the left pocket.

Traces of the material were found on clothing McVeigh was wearing when pulled over on an interstate north of Oklahoma City about an hour after the bombing, he said. The powder also showed up on earplugs in his pocket, Burmeister testified.

McVeigh faces the death penalty in the federal building bombing that killed 168 people and injured 500 the worst act of terrorism on U.S. soil. Burmeister was scheduled to return to the stand today for additional cross-examination.

In addition to trying to connect McVeigh to PETN, the prosecution also demonstrated the explosive power of ammonium nitrate, a fertilizer that McVeigh is accused of than others because they have more buying in large quantities from a farm supply store.

Prosecutors charge McVeigh packed the explosives in a rented Ryder truck in retaliation for the fatal FBI raid on the Branch Davidian complex near Waco, Texas, two years beforehand.

The bomb work and explosion left McVeigh spattered with clues, prosecutors charge.

Burmeister said explosive material was found on both of the T-shirts McVeigh had on: a dark blue baseball-style shirt and, over that, a short-sleeved white T-shirt with a picture of a tree dripping with blood and the Thomas Jefferson quotation: "The tree of liberty must be refreshed from time to time with the blood of patriots and tyrants.'

On the earplugs, Burmeister found PETN and two other substances nitroglycerine and EDGN - a combination he said "suggests a dynamite.'

Burmeister escaped the most scathing criticism in a recent Justice Department report critical of the FBI lab, but others were accused of bungling tests or slanting their findings in the bombing case in favor of the government.

McVeigh's attorneys earlier accused an FBI scientist of mishandling and staging the collection of the fragments of the Ryder truck used in the blast.

McVeigh's attorneys also raised suspicion about the handling of McVeigh's clothing after his arrest near Perry, Okla., about 78 miles In 1993, the FBI had exploded from Oklahoma City. In conjunction with this declaration, and to honor those who have served their country, the following was submitted by Troyce Hanna, poppy chairman.

As we look ahead to Memorial Day weekend, to the last day of school, the opening of swimming pools and the running of the Indianapolis 500 Mile Race, let us stop for a moment and look back to

the month of May in another time. America was engaged in a world war with other nations to defend a free society. The young men of the American Expeditionary Forces faced a war in France more cruel than they could have imagined -- a war fought from trenches that stretched from Switzerland to the North Sea.

That May of 1918, spring rain filled the trenches, turning the frozen earth to mud. On the spring breezes came waves of Mustard gas -- and the smell of death, while the young

Brother Michael, 22, provided the most visible Scottish presence at the prom as he decked out in kilts to escort his sister to the event. Kilts are a time-honored attire worn by men of the Scottish Highlands. They are short, pleated skirts that extend to the

And the senior parents who decorated Hereford Community Center for the event had an extra volunteer - Lynda McNaughton, who made a 27-hour flight to Amarillo with her son so they could be here for graduation.

Mrs. McNaughton was surprised that their flight was only 20 minutes behind schedule, and so were Frankie and Jeri Bezner who met them at the airport. Carol has been here for her

senior year, living with the Bezner family since Jan. 1. She became great friends with Rachel and Jacque Bezner and said she "enjoyed learning about country life in Texas." Rachel. the Bezners oldest daughter, also graduated this year.

Graduation ceremonies were new to Carol. In Scotland, she said, seniors take a national test and receive a graduation certificate in the mail a few weeks later.

Carol and her mother were honored at a brunch Thursday in the home of Wanda Hoover. Guests included Jeri Bezner and her daughters, and Millie Barrett and Lavon Nieman.

Mrs. McNaughton said letters between her and Carol usually took no longer than a week to arrive. Telephone calls are about \$10 for a 20-minute talk, she reported. Calls from Hereford to Scotland are more expensive.

Carol took her mother shopping in Amarillo so she could see a big mall. She reported that prices were considerably higher in Scotland. The most surprising moment for Mrs. McNaughton came when she saw guns on sale in a big discount store. University and major in journalism.

"I had never seen a grocery store that sold guns."

And, she was also surprised to find an item was more than the figure on the tag. In Scotland, the price tag includes the tax. She said tourism was probably Scotland's biggest industry. They raise sheep and cattle but the farms are much smaller

The animals are fed mostly hay and turnip greens, said Mrs. McNaughton. In the winter, most of the animals are kept inside a barn. She said agriculture is highly subsidized in Scotland and regulated by the government.

The McNaughtons are in the furniture business in Alyth, Scotland, a village of less than a thousand people located about one hour from Edinburgh. The business was started by their ancestors 125 years ago. It closed briefly during World War II, then re-opened. They also sell carpet, drapes and home accessories, and they hold estate auctions.

Lynda and Michael plan to return to Scotland soon, but Carol is staying to take a family vacation with the Bezners before she leaves America. She plans to attend Glasgow

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

In fact, the television network likes Big 12 basketball so much it outbid CBS for the championship game in Kansas City which will be held in March, 1998.

ESPN also said it wanted the Big 12 back for its Big Monday basketball package because of high ratings, calling them "one of the strongest" they've ever had.

"We have a great marriage with ESPN," Castiglione said. "Our other games in the tournament will be syndicated like they were last year. We had some good news shared with us by ESPN.

The Big 12 also announced the annual football media day will be moved from St. Louis to Irving, Texas.

On the first day, Thursday July 24, Texas Tech, Nebraska, Texas, Kansas State, and Baylor coaches and selected players will be available for interviews at the Omni Mandalay/-Harvey Hotel in Irving, a sprawling

On Friday July 25, Iowa State, Texas A&M, Oklahoma, Missouri, Oklahoma State and Colorado coaches and players will be available.

'We feel it's easy to get in and out of Dallas for the media, football coaches and the players," said commissioner Steve Hatchell. "We might make this a permanent spot for the football press day.

Last year the first Big 12 football press day was held in St. Louis, site of the league's inaugural championship game.

The 1997 championship football game will be held in San Antonio's Alamodome on Saturday, Dec. 6. Big 12 officials said the game is scheduled for 3:30 p.m. whereas it was held at noon last year in the TWA Dome in St. Louis. Attendance fell short of the 65,000 capacity in Texas' 37-27 victory over Nebraska.



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
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Tech, four other Texas teams in NCAA tourney

OVERLANDPARK, Kan. (AP) Five Texas teams will be part of this year's NCAA baseball tournament. For the first time since 1977, the Texas Longhorns aren't among them.

The NCAA on Monday announced a tournament field dominated by four conferences and five states. Defending champion Louisiana State and top-ranked Alabama, both from the Southeastern Conference, were made No. 1 seeds.

The SEC landed six berths in the 48-team field, which begins play at eight regional sites on Thursday. Five

bids went to the Pac-10 while the Atlantic Coast and Big 12 conferences each got four.

Twenty-six berths - more than half the field - went to schools in California, Florida, Texas, Alabama and North Carolina.

Miami, the No. 1 seed in the Atlantic Regional and last year's runnerup to LSU, extended its NCAA record with a 25th consecutive bid. Marist and Southwest Texas State will be making their first appearance in the 51-year-old tourney while Tennessee Tech, seeded sixth in the Mideast Regional, returns for the first

time since 1956.

Other Texas teams in the tournament are Texas Tech, Texas A&M, Rice and Houston. Texas (29-22), a perennial powerhouse in recent years under coach Gus Gustafson, failed to make the field in Gustafson's first year of retirement.

"Competition for the 48 slots is incredible," said Ron Maestri, chairman of the selection committee. "We had 70 teams with 30-plus wins and eight with 40-plus wins."

Maestri said this year's tournament strengthens the growing argument to

expand the field to 64 teams.

The six-team regional tournaments will run Thursday through Sunday and the eight regional winners will advance to the College World Series May 30-June 7 in Omaha, Neb. Six of the regonal hosts, all selected last week, drew No. 1 seeds.
