Texas CRP acreage falls short of signup

WASHINGTON (AP) - Nearly 1.8 million acres of Texas farmland have been enrolled in a conservation program designed to keep sensitive land fallow, an amount some 1.4 million acres shy of what Texas producers had sought to include in the redesigned program.

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman announced Thursday that 16.1 million acres nationally have been enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program, with new emphasis placed on environmentally sensitive

"We set out to enroll land that would yield the highest environmental benefits, keep productive cropland growing food and fiber, and be fair to taxpayers in providing the most environmental bang for the buck," Glickman told reporters.

Producers will be notified beginning next week if their land has



Conference committee moves to compromise on property tax law

AUSTIN (AP) - A House-Senate committee has moved closer to a compromise in its effort to resolve differences between two vastly different plans meant to lower local school property taxes.

The committee, which abruptly ended a meeting Tuesday and canceled a meeting Wednesday, considered a compromise proposal on a statewide business property tax Thursday but did not vote on it. The tax, approved by the House but rejected by the Senate, is a major sticking point between the plans.

"I think you see the potential for it," Rep. Paul Sadler, D-Henderson, chairman of the committee, said of the compromise idea

The proposal would leave all property subject to local school taxes statewide tax for maintenance and operation.

The Senate rejected that idea. Senators said it would replace the current Robin Hood system, in which 91 school districts share their tax revenue, with a much larger Robin Hood system, forcing all districts to share their business property tax

The Senate left the taxing authority with local districts but changed parts of the system to force cuts to the tax

Both plans would allow local districts to continue taxing residential property for maintenance and operation and all property for school debt. The compromise does not

change that idea.

Recess interrupts budget action push

Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) - Congress' push to approve the balanced budget outline this week was scuttled after the House adjourned in a fight over an unrelated bill, delaying final work on the budget agreement until June.

Nonetheless, Senate leaders were determined to finish their part of the work today after dispensing with as many as 30 pending amendments.

The votes were to be on a blueprint agreement reached by Congress' Republican leaders and the White House to balance the federal budget in five years while providing for an \$85 billion tax cut - the biggest since 1981 - and slowing the rise in Medicare spending by \$115 billion. Over the five years, the measure is to produce \$321 billion in savings.

The House approved a version of the agreement Wednesday.

effort by Sen. John Warner, R-Va., to add \$12 billion to the package for road building and mass transit. The closeness of the vote suggested once again how popular transportation projects are with legislators. The House defeated a similar bill early Wednesday morning by a two-vote

Earlier in the day, senators voted 56-43 to reject an amendment by Sen. Carol Moseley-Braun, D-Ill., that would have provided \$5 billion for school repairs. President Clinton embraced a similar idea in his State of the Union address but dropped it during budget talks.

These votes showed that the

budget deal continued to remain intact despite the temptation to tinker. The agreement ranks as a major achievement for GOP leaders, and Clinton has called balancing the budget the paramount priority of his second term

"We'll give our country the first balanced budget we've had since the 1960s," said Clinton, cheering lawmakers on from an airport rally in Bridgeport, W.Va.

Senate action on the budget deal was just one step in a prolonged process. Congress later must take up 15 separate tax and spending bills that put meat on the bones of the budget

In the House, work on the tax bill was expected to be fast and furious, as the Ways and Means Committee was expected to vote out a bill with \$135 billion in tax cuts offset by \$50 billion in revenues by June 13.

Dear Ann Landers: You recently printed a sweet "how-we-met" story. The woman said at the end of World War II, she sat behind a soldier in church. He knew all the lyrics to the songs so she figured he couldn't be all bad. Later, she learned he was a doctor. Three months later, she slipped on an icy walk and injured her arm. That same doctor insisted she stay in the infirmary, and he visited her twice a day. When she was discharged, he asked her to the movies to celebrate. They subsequently married in the same chapel where they had met.

Here's how that same story would go if it happened in 1997:

"Dear Ann: Last week, I attended church services and noticed that the soldier sitting behind me knew all the words to every song. I figured anyone who knew those lyrics was probably a member of the religious right.

"I bumped into him a month later. After cussing him out and telling him to watch where he was going, I learned he was a doctor. Three months later, I slipped on an icy walk and injured my arm. After suing the property owner for all I could get, this same doctor treated me and insisted that I stay in the infirmary. They searched his apartment to make sure there were no shrines built to me and no bodies hidden under the floorboards.

"I married the guy anyway, because after all, doctors earn six-figure incomes." -- Tuned in and Turned on in La Jolla, Calif.

Dear Tuned and Turned: If you aren't a professional writer, you ought to consider it. Your updated version cracked me up.

Dear Ann Landers: I have been a Lutheran pastor for almost 37 years. Marriage counseling has been a large part of my work. You wondered why so many World War II marriages between people who didn't know each other very well lasted so long. I think it's because 50 years ago, we had lower expectations of what a marriage was supposed to do for us.

Back then, if a man had a job, came home from work with his paycheck, didn't drink too much, helped with the kids, took his wife shopping once a week, went to church and took a bath on Saturday night whether he needed it or not, she didn't expect much more and the marriage worked.

By the same token, if she would stay home, cook, do the laundry, take care of the house and the kids, be nice to his parents, live within a budget and have sex with him regularly, she was a good wife.

Today, a spouse is expected to be soul mate, a best friend, a golf partner and a psychiatrist and hold down a full-time job. She must look like Cindy Crawford, and he should look like Tom Cruise.

With such unrealistic expectations, the pressures are bound to increase and the disappointment level accelerates. It should come as no surprise that after three months of marriage, couples are writing to you and asking if they should send back the wedding gifts. -- A Voice From the Heartland in Iowa

Dear Voice: You underestimate the young people of today. True, some have unrealistic expectations of marriage, but by and large, I find them pretty level-headed. Today, a successful marriage is a partnership, and I see that as an improvement.





Opposition leaders protest Kabila's Cabinet ministers

By TINA SUSMAN **Associated Press Writer** KINSHASA, Congo (AP) -Laurent Kabila consolidated power in his own hands today, scrapping the post of prime minister and snubbing the man who led years of peaceful protests against dictator Mobutu Sese Seko.

The move angered opposition activists who had wanted their leader, Etienne Tshisekedi, to be named prime minister, a job from which he was twice ousted by Mobutu. They reacted by staging a loud march through the capital, denouncing Kabila as another dictator.

"We cannot fill a hole by creating another hole," said protester Papi Kongolo. "We are going to struggle for our liberty, even if our blood is

Six days after declaring himself president, Kabila named a partial list of Cabinet ministers today, most of them from his rebel alhance that rolled across the country in an eight-month rebellion. He included some other political groups, but refused to take Tshisekedi, the country's most prominent opposition leader.

The new information minister, Raphael Ghenda, said Kabila would rule without a vice president or a prime minister and would also retain

control of the military. "It's a presidential system," Ghenda said.

Writing Want Ads that really sell!

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/ products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs." Then, remember these hints:

-- Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no

-- Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condi-

-- Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.

- Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

Thurmond graces the town square.
At 94, he's already the oldest member to serve in Congress. And on Sunday, the Republican senator will be here to commemorate the town's centennial and mark another milestone - as the longest-serving member of the U.S. Senate.

"You won't find anybody to say

anything bad about him," said Golda Fox, whose known him for 40 years. She reeled off his hallmarks: honesty, determination and doing things right. "Just anything that anybody from Edgefield County wants, he'll do his darnedest," she


