The notes are unsecured other than by the stock itself, and ARE NOT PAYABLE UNTIL THE RAILS ARE ACTUALLY AND CONTINUOUSLY LAID INTO HEREFORD. This stock is to be turned over to the financing Corporation, which underwrites it.




