Federal Expenditures by State report issued Wednesday by the Census Bureau

Although Texas overtook New York to become the nation's second most populous state in 1994, it remains third in receipt of federal funds.

In large measure that's because Texas historically has been tightfisted in providing welfare and social services benefits, receiving less in federal dollars because it has provided less of a state match than New York.

The federal government spent \$1.4 trillion in the fiscal year that began Oct. 1, 1995, and ended Sept. 30, 1996. Not included in the overall spending are interest on the national debt and some payments that could not be allocated geographically.

Texas' 1996 federal allocation was up \$3 billion from the year before a 4 percent growth rate that outpaced California's 3 percent and New York's 1 percent.

# Jones, Cowboys hire Hill to monitor players' behavior

IRVING, Texas (AP) - Most NFL teams have one or two people in charge of monitoring player behavior. Dallas' wayward Cowboys will soon have a whole department geared toward keeping them in line.

Sports

Cowboys owner Jerry Jones, apparently tired of his team's ailing image, has launched a multi-faceted effort to improve player behavior, including an alumni advisory board and an orientation program for rookies, The Dallas Morning News reported in Thursday editions.

By the time the Cowboys kick off the 1997 season, the team will have at least four managers and more than 10 employees dedicated to player behavior. There'll be department managers in the areas of security, player development and assistance, psychology and spirituality, Jones said Wednesday.

The wide-ranging plan was devised by Calvin and Janet Hill. The former Dallas running back and his wife, the parents of basketball star Grant Hill, were recently hired as team consultants.

"The fans of the Cowboys deserve this type of intense commitment to good behavior," Jones said, calling the effort a "multimilliondollar commitment over a number of years.'

Dallas' image as America's Team has taken a beating in recent years because of well-publicized colli-

The Cowboys also lead the league in drug-related suspensions, including recent incidents involving Michael Irvin, Leon Lett and Shante Carver.

"We have a very keen sensitivity and feeling about where we've been regarding our on- and off-the-field behavior," Jones said.

Hill, a Yale graduate who played for Dallas from 1969 to 1974, said the plan is based on drug programs he put together for the Cleveland Browns and Rand Corp.

Jones said the plan will become a model for the NFL.

# SCHOLARSHIP SCAMS HURT STUDENTS

INCE 1980, THE COST of tuition at public colleges and universities nationwide has risen three times faster than household income, putting many parents and students in a severe financial bind. As a result, thousands of Texas students search for financial assistance to help pay for their education. Scholarships are the most attractive form of financial aid because they have no workstudy requirements and do not have to be repaid.

At the same time, the amount of scholarship funding is shrinking when compared with loans and other forms of financial aid. The competition for scholarship dollars is fierce. We at the Office of the Attorney General know that this creates the perfect environment for scholarship scams.

#### 300,000 victims

According to the National Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators, roughly 300,000 people are victimized by scholarship scams each year, losing more than \$50 million that could have gone toward paying tuition. Students and parents are lured into these scams by tales of billions of dollars in hidden scholarship money going unused each year. In reality, more than 96 percent of all

available scholarship funds are distributed to students each year. Some common scholarship scams are:

The scholarship prize. This is a variation on the old "lucky winner" scam, in which you are required to pay an up-front fee to receive the scholarship.

The scholarship with an application fee. This looks like a real scholarship, and may even hand out some money, but the amount of fees received far outweighs the amount given in scholarships.

The low-interest loan. In this scam, you are asked for an origination or insurance fee up front. Real student loans charge these fees when the money is disbursed.

The scholarship search service. This service guarantees that you will win a scholarship or your money will be refunded. If they do provide you with any information, it is usually out-of-date or worthless. While there are legitimate financial aid search firms that will compile a list of scholarships you might qualify for, you can find nearly all of this information yourself by spending some time in the library, at your high school or college financial aid office, or on the Internet.

#### **Common tip-offs**

Some common clues to a scholarship scam include:

"We have access to scholarships you won't hear about anywhere else or that aren't readily available to the public."

"We will do all the work for you." In reality, applicants usually must fill out their own scholarship and financial aid forms.

•"You have been selected by a national foundation to receive a scholarship" or "You are a finalist in a scholarship competition." Chances are you have never heard of the foundation and did not apply for the competition.

"We guarantee you a scholarship or your money back." No one can guarantee that you will win a scholarship. Also be suspicious of promises of a minimum amount of money.

"We need your bank account or credit card number to reserve this scholarship for you." This is just a thinly disguised attempt to raid your bank account.

Other signs of a scholarship scam are the use of officialsounding names that imply a connection to the government (like "Federal", "Division" and "Administration"), having a mail drop for a return address, not providing a telephone number, claiming that everyone is eligible, undue time pressure, and excessive hype.





# Writing Want Ads that really sell!

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/ products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs." Then, remember these hints:

--Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.

-- Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.

-- Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.

-- Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

In just a month less than 30 years at the corner of Mulberry and Washington streets, Zaby has watched the slow changes come to this quiet county seat 35 miles southeast of Dallas. A lot of them have been good for the town and the county that shares its name, though perhaps not so good for Tony Zaby.

Twenty years ago, Zaby's Barbecue sat at the center of the little world of Kaufman, doing a brisk business with the folks from the County Courthouse in the center of the town square and with shoppers and business people from the stores that ringed it.

That yellow sign, the type usually hauled on small trailers to the grand openings of modest shopping centers, is about the only modern affectation at Zaby's. Unsplit logs of oak and hickory line an outside wall, and the ghostly image of an ancient Coca--Cola mural barely brightens the wall's midsection.

The building hugs the corner of Mulberry and Washington so tightly that it will be taken down soon, demolished some time next year to improve traffic on State Highway 34. Too many big rigs find the hard right turn too snug to negotiate.

We get a truck a week that gets hooked up in the intersection and can't make the turn," says Lee Ayres, executive director of the Kaufman Chamber of Commerce. "So the state got some money to tear that building down."

There was talk about trying to save Zaby's Barbecue as a landmark, Ayres says, but "it's about to fall down, so historic preservation couldn't save it."

But others, including a couple of longtime merchants and members of the City Council, are hard-pressed to say why Zaby's business is slipping away while others on the town square are doing well.





Why this micro-inflammation, as doctors call it, happens is still a mystery. However, a leading theory is that chronic infection with common germs might be the cause.

If so, the study raises the possibility that antibiotics and vaccines, along with stronger anti-inflammatory drugs, might someday be added to the medicines routinely used to treat heart disease.

The new research also helps explain why aspirin is so good for the heart. For years, experts thought aspirin's main benefit was its interference with blood clotting. But the new study suggests it also works by fighting inflammation inside the blood vessels.

Heart attacks strike when fatty deposits build up in the arteries. When one of the deposits, called plaque, suddenly breaks open, blood clots form and choke off the supply of blood to the heart muscle. While

Ridkler and colleagues studied male doctors who had taken part in a large aspirin study that began in 1982. They looked at levels of C-reactive protein, a sign of inflammation, in 543 who went on to suffer heart attacks, strokes or vein clots after eight years of follow-up and an equal number who stayed

healthy.

The men were divided into four categories, depending on their levels of this protein. Those in the top quarter had twice the risk of stroke and three times the risk of heart attacks of those in the bottom quarter.

Ridker said this makes checking the level of C-reactive protein about as accurate as measuring the ratio of total cholesterol to high-density lipoprotein cholesterol. That's currently the most sensitive means doctors have of predicting a heart attack.

While the latest study can't answer that question, some doctors think a germ might be involved. One of the leading candidates is Chlamydia pneumoniae. Unlike its cousin that causes venereal disease, this common microbe is frequently involved in pneumonia. People with recent infections seem especially likely to suffer heart attacks, and the bacteria have been found inside the buildups in heart arteries.
